CASE AGAINST CITY IN SUPREME COURT

Mrs. William Oliphant Sues for Damages for Damage to Property Through Flooding from Sewers.

So involved has become the statistics, so confusing the plans and descriptions entering into the case of Oliphant vs. the City of Victoria, at trial before Mr. Justice Gregory in the supreme court, that the court will occupy an hour or so this morning in viewing the property on Suttel street, which the plaintiff claims was flooded with sewage last fall, when the surface drains caused the sewers to overflow. The plaintiff, Mrs. William Oliphant, asks \$25,000 damages and is represented by J. A. Alkman. The case began last Thursday and was resumed yesterday morning. The plaintiff's husband, William Oliphant, had been on the stand only a short time when adjournment was taken yesterday afternoon. It is likely that he will be the last witness for the plaintiff. W. J. Taylor, K.C., city counsel, will then put in the defence and it is probable that the case will not be finished today. The major portion of the forenoon session was occupied with the late city engineer, C. H. Topp. Mr. Alkman examined Mr. Topp on the matter of the increase in the amount of work demanded of the sewers over and above what they were planned to do. Mr. Topp told of having received a complaint from Mr. Oliphant in the fall of 1909 to the effect that water from the park was being drained on to his property. Mr. Topp said that there had been no other complaints to his knowledge. No laterals were put in to relieve this drainage. Overflows were not included in the original plan of the sewage system by the former city engineer, Mr. Mohun, but were put in to avoid a flood in a business district. The sewers had had to be connected with surface drains because the city had not provided sufficient money for surface drains. Moveover much ground water got into the sewers between the joints. Asked directly if he thought there was more matter going through the sewers than they had been designed to carry, Mr. Topp said he thought there was more. A Dominion Government engineer, G. A. Keefe, and F. N. Denison, of the meteorological department, were called to show the height of the actual tide on the dates of November 27, 28 and 29 last. Mr. Mohun Heard Mr. Mohun was the first witness after the noon recess. He was examined by Mr. Alkman and stiffly cross examined by Mr. Taylor on the plan of the sewerage system and the work it was designed to do. He stated that he had designed the system for 75,000 people. In his cross examination, Mr. Mohun stated that if the sea level was as high as the top of the granite curb (marked on one of the exhibit plans)

It would cause matter in the sewer to back up for a distance of at least 6,000 feet. Mr. Cameron, of the firm of Cameron & Winsby, real estate dealers, who said that he had been brought up in the vicinity of the property in question, was called to testify as to the depreciation in the value of the property. He stated that the 45 lots in the property were worth, at the time when the flooding occurred, from \$1,000 to \$1,200 each. He considered the whole property worth about \$50,000. He thought that the depreciation would amount to at least 40 per cent., but personally he would not now buy one of the lots for any money, owing to the fact that they had been flooded with sewage and had been given a "black eye" for a long time to come. The Anti-Tuberculosis Society held its regular meeting yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Stuart Robertson in the chair. Mrs. Carmichael reported that Dr. Fagan had ordered all the furnishing for the new sanitarium, but that the building would not be opened until autumn. The accounts for the expenses of the rummage sale were ordered paid. Mrs. Murray, the treasurer reported that the proceeds were \$480.75 and the expenses \$34, leaving a balance of \$446.75. A vote of thanks was passed to all who donated articles for the sale and to the mayor for the use of the hall. At present there were no advanced cases of tuberculosis under the care of the society in the city. Several of the ladies expressed regret that there was a tendency on the part of consumptive patients and their friends to delay consultation with a doctor until it was too late. After some informal discussion as to ways and means the meeting adjourned.

PREACHES SERMON THEN HELD UP TRAIN

Anecdote of Bill Miner's Last Exploit Illustrates Diversity of Characteristics of Notorious Outlaw

Many anecdotes, all possessing an intense human interest, have been told of Bill Miner, the outlaw of the West, but it is questionable if any of them so exemplify the incongruity of characteristics possessed by the train robber better than one which Provincial Police Superintendent Hussey has just recalled in conversation with the Colonist. A couple of days before the train robbery which led to the arrest and incarceration of Miner at New Westminster, the outlaw arrived on foot at a ranch about fifteen miles from Kamloops. He was on his way to the scene of the holdup, and undoubtedly had already rehearsed in his mind all the details of the crime. With the winning personality which has gained him so many friends Miner entered into conversation with a group of ranchers and their families who had gathered from the vicinity to hold a reunion at a friend's farm. It was Sunday morning and one of the ranchers wives present remarked: "What a pity, now we are altogether, we cannot have a church service." Bill Miner was equal to the occasion. He offered to conduct the service. He prayed, sang hymns, and preached what is described as an eloquent sermon. The settlers were delighted and overwhelmed him with courtesies. In the course of the day the outlaw resumed his journey, and not many hours later the news of the holdup electrified the province. Some weeks afterwards the trial was in progress at Kamloops. In the course of the proceedings a woman came to Superintendent Hussey, as he stood in court, and asked him if she might see the prisoner. The superintendent brought her where she could obtain a good view. "Yes," she said, "that's the man. Only to think of seeing him here. And he gave us such a beautiful prayer!"

PORTENDS LINE COWICHAN LAKE

Timber Surveyors in Field Out of Duncan Indicating That E. & N. Company May Have to Provide Transportation

That there will be some movement towards the construction of a branch railway line from Duncan to Cowichan lake at an early date is indicated by the fact that the capitalists who have acquired the timber limits of that district from the E. & N. Co. have put surveyors into the field. Several gangs are going over the section and, according to official advice, this can portend but one thing, namely, that it is proposed beginning logging operations there as soon as the preliminary arrangements can be completed. It is pointed out that this would mean the early construction of a branch of the E. & N. through the district. According to the terms of agreement, it is understood, those in possession of the timber are to be provided with transportation facilities when they are ready. When the E. & N. undertakes to furnish this it is a foregone conclusion that a passenger service will be inaugurated for the benefit of those wishing to reach Cowichan lake to fish or to spend a short vacation.

CHINA BOY FINED

Found Guilty of Ringing in Alarm From Curious Box He Investigated.

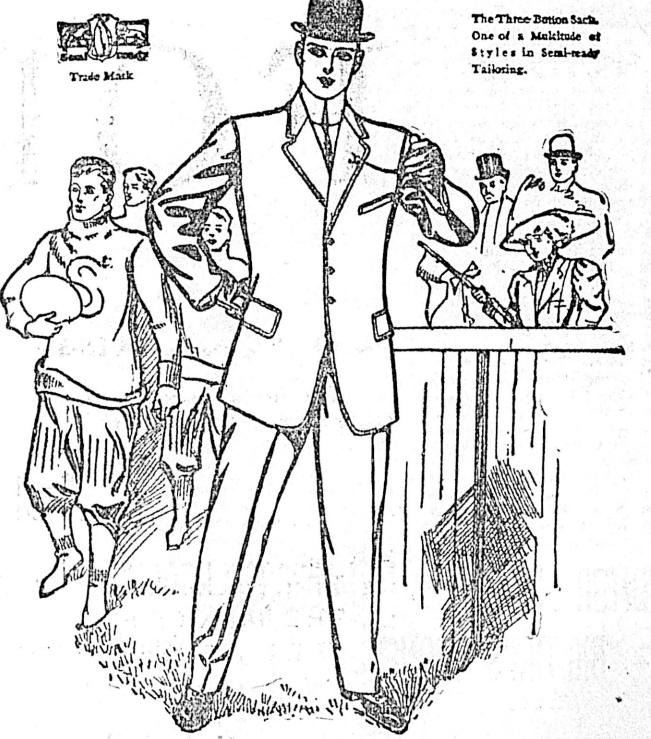

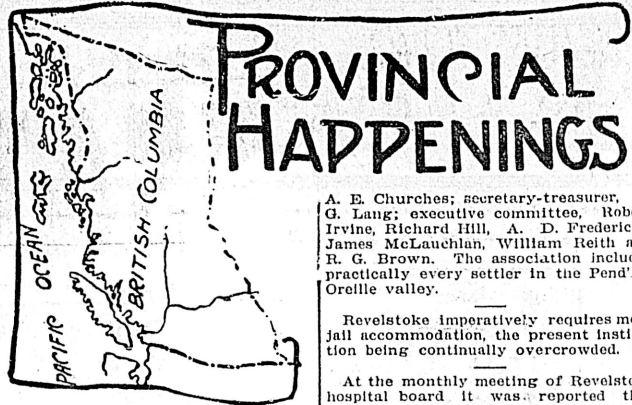

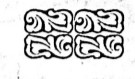

DRAFT ARRIVES FOR GARRISON

Forty-Two Non-commissioned Officers and Men Arrive at Work Point From the Halifax Station

Forty-two non-commissioned officers and men for the Esquimalt garrison, reached the city yesterday afternoon on board the steamer Princess Charlotte in charge of Capt. Lindsay, of the staff at Ottawa, who met the party at the capital. The arrivals are from Halifax, being the first draft to be sent from there to Esquimalt, from where ten men were recently transferred to the eastern station. There were four non-commissioned officers and two bandsmen among the number, which includes eight engineers to be added to the nineteen now at Esquimalt. The remainder were artillerymen. Other than for a slight accident while passing through Ontario, the train in which they were coming having jumped the track without much damage, the trip west was uneventful.

LETTERS TO EDITOR

Re Widening of Port Street.

Sir—My attention has been called to the grossly misleading article in this evening's Times with reference to this important undertaking and on behalf of committee of property-owners on said thoroughfare who have had this matter in hand for the last four months, would ask your kind indulgence and space in your valued paper to the end that I may, in a feeble way, correct the erroneous impression that the article referred to would naturally create and give to any person who has not thoroughly perused the figures and estimates as prepared by the city assessor and now open for inspection at the city hall. The first misstatement is as to the cost involved for the proposed expropriation of 8 feet on either side for purposes of widening this main thoroughfare from Douglas street east to Cook street, (and where there is likely to be much congestion of traffic in the very near future owing to this portion being double-tracked by the tram company.) Instead of this cost for "widening" being over \$200,000 the exact figures as prepared by Mr. Northcott for the expropriation and repairs to buildings, fences, etc., is a little over one-half that sum, \$125,000 odd to be nearly exact.

The next statement as to unimproved property being benefitted to a greater degree than improved property and that property-owners who have improvements on their several properties would not be reimbursed for necessary alterations, repairs, etc., is totally at variance with the plan for the general improvement scheme. The city assessor has most carefully estimated such damage and cost of reconstruction of all buildings affected and such cost has been included in his figures and furthermore all property-owners in any way so inconvenienced will be allowed such sum as may in his estimation be necessary to effect necessary repairs and alterations.

With reference to the contention set forth that in some instances it might be found that the money paid as compensation for expropriation of the necessary eight feet would exceed the total value of the lot so affected, I need only state that the estimate for the cost or value of this eight feet has been figured by Mr. Northcott to show how very misleading and ridiculous this statement is.

In conclusion I would say that the petition for this very important piece of proposed improvement was signed willingly by about 70 per cent. of the property owners and although there are a few of the owners on this street who are not in accord with the plan for assessment for "widening expenses" as now prepared by the city assessor, a meeting of all property-owners in the area affected is to be held next Tuesday evening at the office of Pemberton & Son when, no doubt, an amicable arrangement will be arrived at so that the work of improvement will be so advanced that a start on this project will be made within a few weeks from date of final passing of bylaw by the city council.

The committee have to thank the mayor and board of aldermen for the courteous manner in which they have met us and the attention they have given the matter.
