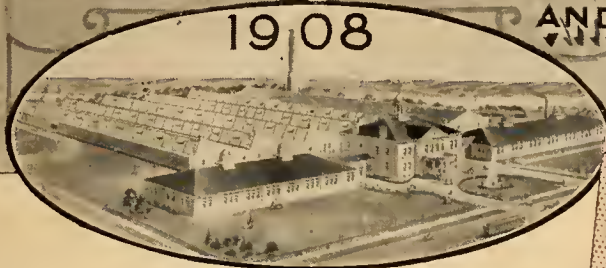

HOW TO ORDER.

USE OUR ORDER BLANK, if practical to do so. (See other side of this page.) Additional order blanks will be sent free upon application.

In any case, **USE PLENTY OF PAPER** and write with ink.

GIVE YOUR FULL NAME, POST OFFICE, STATE AND COUNTY, also street number, if you have any.

PRINT YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS, if you do not write a very plain hand, take time to print out your name and address. About half the mistakes made in filling orders are because customers do not write name and address plainly.

GIVE CATALOGUE NUMBER and name of each article wanted, together with quantity wanted and price.

Carry out the cost for the entire quantity of goods of each kind ordered.

Be careful to read and figure out prices right, so you will send the right amount of money. Many orders contain too much or too little money.

Foot up the prices, and write down the total, so that if there is any mistake we can see where it is.

Always state the amount of money you enclose, and send enough money to pay for all goods ordered.

After you have written your order, look it over carefully to see that it is all right, and that you have not omitted anything.

KEEP A COPY OF YOUR ORDER. When goods arrive you can then check off and see that you have received all you ordered. If part or all of goods should be lost in transportation, you can then tell us what is missing.

HOW TO SEND MONEY.

Send money by Draft, Registered Letter, Post Office Money Order or Express Order.

(Post Office Money Orders and Express Orders can now be obtained at a trifling cost.)

Make your money order or draft payable to the David C. Cook Publishing Co.

Do not send personal or business **CHECKS** under any circumstances.

Do not send **POSTAGE STAMPS**, except for very small amounts. They often become damp in the mail and are so stuck together as to be worthless.

Do not send **CURRENCY** or **SILVER** by mail unless in registered letter. Either is liable to be stolen.

IMPORTANT. Whenever Draft, Money Order or Express Order is sent us, no one but this Company can get the money. If lost or stolen, a duplicate may be secured without cost to you.

INSURING PACKAGES.

Until further notice we will **INSURE** mail or express packages, if we are so instructed, at the rate of 5 cents for each package valued at \$5.00 or under, 10 cents for each package valued at between \$5.00 and \$10.00, etc.; that is, 5 cents for each \$5.00 or fraction thereof in value.

In case of loss, we will duplicate the **INSURED PACKAGE**, or refund money, upon notification. If you want your packages insured—that is, if you want us to assume all the risk of possible loss in transportation—be sure to write the word "**INSURE**" at bottom of order, and enclose **INSURANCE FEE** in addition to postpaid price of goods.

WHY SEND CASH WITH ORDER?


Because it is economy to do so. You save time and money. It would cost us thousands of dollars in book-keepers' hire if we did anything but a cash business. This needless expense would force us to raise our prices.

We will send goods **C. O. D.**, if requested, where order amounts to \$3.00 or more, provided 25 per cent. of purchase price accompanies order; but we prefer not to do this.

INDEX. If you fail to find what you want in looking through this catalogue, please refer to Index on first inside page of cover.

WE TAKE BACK GOODS whenever requested (for any reason or no reason), and refund full amount paid for them, or exchange for other articles where this is preferred. All we ask is that they be returned in good condition and postpaid, the same as sent out by us. If we are in any way at fault we will also refund postage paid for returning goods. (See "How to Return Goods" explained in opposite column.)

WE PAY EXPRESS OR POSTAGE. Please notice that our prices in every case (except in a few instances where otherwise stated) include delivery. You have no extra express charges to pay, which often amount to more than the goods cost. In comparing our prices with others, please bear this in mind.

HOW WE SHIP GOODS.—In most cases we send goods by mail. It is the safest way, the most prompt, and generally the least expensive for us. We reserve, however, the option of sending by express, for sometimes this is much better. When customer insists on our sending by express, and to do so costs more than by mail, we send as directed, but send "not prepaid."

How to Order.

USE OUR ORDER BLANK, if practical to do so. (See previous pages of this catalogue.) Additional order blanks will be sent free upon application.

In any case, use plenty of paper and write with ink. Give your full name, post-office, state and county. Also street number if any.

PRINT YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS, if you do not write a very plain hand. Half the mistakes made in filling orders are caused by name and address not being plainly written.

GIVE CATALOGUE NUMBER, also letter and name of each article wanted.

Be careful to read and figure our prices right, so you will send the right amount of money. Many orders contain too much or too little money.

Foot up the prices and write down the total, so that if there is any mistake we can see where it is.

After you have written your order, look it over carefully to see that it is all right, and that you have not omitted anything.

ORDER EARLY, PARTICULARLY DURING DECEMBER. Not only is our shipping department crowded during the holiday season, but the mails and express companies as well.

KEEP A COPY OF YOUR ORDER. When goods arrive you can then check off and see that you have received all you ordered. If part or all of goods should be lost in transportation, you can then tell us what is missing.

ORDER FROM ELGIN. Although we have salesrooms in Chicago, New York and Boston, these are maintained especially to accommodate local trade. Our publishing house, general offices, storerooms and shipping rooms are located at Elgin.

ORDER FROM US DIRECT. The goods advertised in this catalogue are largely of our own manufacture. We are not mere agents or jobbers, but devise and manufacture a large portion of the goods which we offer for sale, and aim to keep on hand a large supply. You may be able to secure some of our goods through dealers, but if you buy direct from us you are far more certain of receiving goods promptly and of avoiding mistakes.

The Personnel of This Company.

We have been publishing Sunday-school supplies since 1875, and our business is confined entirely to the manufacture and sale of such goods. We now furnish more than 50,000 schools with a part or all of their supplies.

Our goods are used by schools connected with all Evangelical denominations, as well as union schools.

We employ regularly eleven editors and upward of one hundred writers. Many are persons of world-wide fame.

Our publications do not overlook or fail to teach any of the great truths for which our various Protestant churches stand. Truth is not discordant. It is failure to carefully examine into truth that leads to discord.

The policy of this Company is controlled by Mr. Cook, whose ambition is, and ever has been, to help the cause to which for many years he has given his life and energies.

Prices of Sunday-school supplies have been greatly reduced through the efforts of Mr. Cook and this Company.

Nearly every improvement in Sunday-school supplies in the past thirty years has been first brought out by us and at our risk. We have thus put many thousands of dollars into experiments for the benefit of schools.

Our profits go to improve our supplies, cheapen their production and help needy schools. We publish many supplies at a loss. We sell others so low that profits are small, and much of these must go into new plates and machinery.

If Goods Ordered Do Not Reach You Promptly.

First, remember just when you sent your order, and consider whether you have allowed a reasonable length of time for the goods to reach you.

Second, inquire both at post-office and express office. Packages may be too large for postman to deliver, or a part or all of your order may have been sent by express. When you inquire for packages, remember that we may have spelled your name incorrectly, or may have used the wrong initials.

Third, in writing us, if you have received **ONLY PART** of the goods you ordered, say just what goods you failed to receive, giving quantity of each and full description.

If you have **NOT RECEIVED ANY** of the goods you ordered, tell us just what it was you ordered, giving quantity, catalogue number, amount of money sent, etc.

How to Return Goods.

Where for any reason you wish to return any goods bought from us, please observe the following rules:

1. Wrap package carefully and securely, so that goods will not be damaged in transit. Do not put any writing in package.

2. Address package to David C. Cook Publishing Co., Elgin, Illinois.

3. Write on corner of package the word "From," followed by your name and address.

4. In all cases send package by mail postpaid, unless where you find it cheaper to send by express prepaid. We send goods prepaid, and do not receive returned packages if not prepaid. Where any fault of ours, we refund return charges.

5. Write immediately, saying what you have returned, and what you wish us to do, whether to return price paid, or send other goods. If the goods were wrong in any way, please explain.

NOTE. Where goods are bulky, and cost of returning is likely to be considerable, write us before sending back.

Choosing Supplies vs. Church Loyalty.

Sometimes the Sunday-school management is in doubt as to the right stand to take regarding the question of supplies. To such the following statements will certainly be of some assistance:

True Loyalty.—Loyalty to the church can never require that the school act contrary to its own welfare. The school that carefully considers and buys the best is the only one truly loyal.

The Right of Choice.—The management of the individual school is responsible for the success of the school. In this connection Lesson Helps and Papers play an important part. The right of each to choose its helps and papers is absolutely essential to highest success, and should be exercised as a privilege as well as a duty. To deprive the school of this right is to discourage interest and stifle aggressive effort.

What Others are Doing.—The largest, most wide-awake and successful schools are using Interdenominational or "outside" publications in part, if not altogether. Rules requiring individual schools to purchase supplies of their own "authorized" publishing house, regardless of merit, are not in accordance with the spirit of the times.

A Safe Argument.—The school has a great responsibility toward its members. Where the best publications—not the poorest—are used, boys and girls are more likely to be held to the school and led into a Christian life. Were you considering the interests of your own boy alone, you would not hesitate to buy and place before him those you believed to be the best.

The Home Department is a rich field for Sunday-school work, and a great feeder for the church and school, but Home Department workers need instruction and encouragement. Our Home Department Visitor's Quarterly supplies this great need. There is nothing else like it. (See page 6.)

We are publishing the only **Beginners Helps** on the uniform or regular series of International Lessons. They are far more convenient than others. Using our **Beginners Helps** will greatly encourage your **Beginners Department** workers. (See page 4.)

Our **Primary Helps** are not only the best as a whole, but our **Primary Teacher** is the only **Primary Teacher's help** of any importance. Even the most casual comparison with others will show that this is true, and its use will mean much to your **Primary Department**. (See page 4.)

We have solved the boy and girl attendance problem, by providing a paper just for boys, and another for girls. No other publisher does this. (See page 8.)

How to find teachers for boys' and hold them has been a difficult question in most schools. Teaching boys is not like teaching others. Boys' teachers need special help. This we furnish in our **Boys' Teacher**. No one else supplies such a publication.

The home may and ought to be of great assistance to the

"Authorized" Publishers and Their Goods.

The claim is made that the goods of the "authorized" or denominational publishing house must be the best for the schools of its own church, because of representing the work of men and women connected with that church. There are some things to be said in this connection which will be of interest to all who desire to know the truth and act intelligently.

Same Publication Sold as Baptist, Methodist, etc.

It is not generally known to what a large extent syndicate material is used in goods furnished by "authorized" publishers. Sunday-school publications provided by them contain much of the same material. Some are printed partially, and others entirely, from the same matter, in one case being sold as Baptist, in another as Methodist, etc.

The Lesson Helps for the **Beginners Department** now advertised and furnished by "authorized" publishing houses in general are the same as to contents, though the names of editors are different. This line of publications includes helps for both teachers and pupils.

For the **Primary Department**, **Picture Lesson Rolls** which are alike are supplied by the leading "authorized" publishers under various names, such as "Leaf Cluster," "Bible Lesson Pictures," etc. **Picture Lesson Cards**, under various names, alike in part or as a whole, are also supplied by these houses.

Not a single Bible or Testament is published by an "authorized" publishing house. Most of the **Standard Reference Books**, **Teacher Training Books**, and **Books on Sunday School Methods**, are published by "outside" houses; so are **Sunday-school cards**, **calendars**, **wall mottoes**, etc., as well as **charts**, **maps**, **blackboards**, etc.

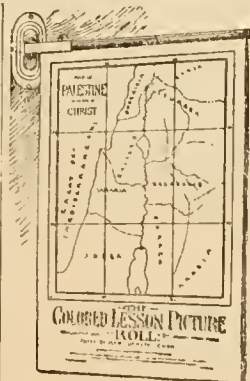

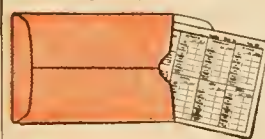

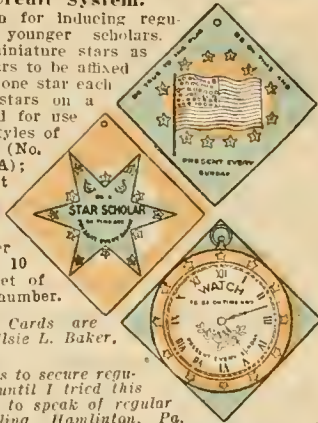

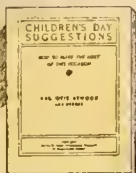

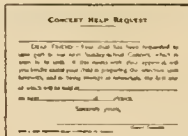

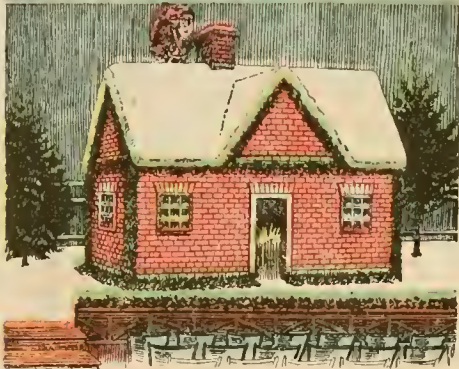

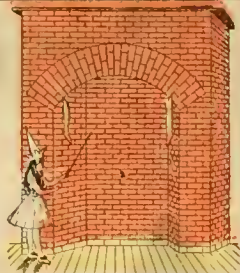

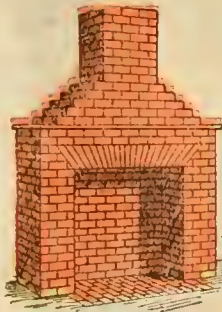
