


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FOREWORD

For many years I have desired that some one should prepare a genealogy of the descendants of Andrew Warner, but I felt that my own time was so fully occupied with other duties that I could not consider it. Finally, as no one else seemed likely to undertake the task, in 1914, after completing the publication of my "Personal Memoirs," I decided to commence work on the genealogy. I was fortunate at the outset in securing the assistance of Mrs. Josephine G. Nichols (Mrs. L. Nelson Nichols), a genealogist of large experience and skill. For the past four years she has given almost her entire time to this work and it is largely to her painstaking labor and ability that the genealogy has been carried through with such eminent success.

In first planning the work, I expected to give to it a large amount of my own time, but the extra duties thrown upon me by the great world war has made this impossible. Almost the only direct contributions I have made to the genealogy are the two chapters on "The Warners in Europe" and "Andrew Warner in America." I am especially gratified that I have been able to get together so full an account of our first American ancestor. The numerous data collected from many sources at first seemed like dull statistics, but by being brought together and carefully studied, they take on life and character and bring before us a vivid portrait of the sturdy pioneer. the devoted Christian, the loyal and public-spirited citizen, and the aggressive leader in every important enterprise. Every descendant of Andrew Warner can read this record with a feeling of pride that we have as our first American ancestor a man of such ability and character, and one so worthy to be an example to all succeeding generations of the Warner family.

In gathering the material for this work, help has been received from many sources. As a foundation we had a small volume of fifty pages prepared by Andrew Ferdinando⁸ Warner, Jr., and later published by J. J. Warner. Mr. J. R. Hutchinson, a genealogist of London, has made extensive examinations of the records of Essex County in England, and has carried back the record of Andrew Warner from his parents, John and Mary Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak, to his grandfather, John Warner of Great Waltham, and probably also to his great-grandfather, Thomas Warner. Mrs. Selah Raymond of Hartford has also collected for me important facts connected with the history of Andrew Warner, and also

of many of his descendants, especially the descendants of Joseph⁴. Special acknowledgment should also be made to Frank F. Starr of Middletown, Conn., who has published a sketch of Andrew Warner based on a careful examination of the original records; also to Henry E. Warner, Ernest N. Warner, Rev. Edgar Haga Warner, Mrs. Erastus S. Warner, S. M. Alvord, Moses M. Warner, and to numerous other members of the Warner family, who are represented in this genealogy. Without their assistance, the facts could not have been secured.

The record has been made as complete as possible with the data which we have been able to collect. There are many breaks in the different lines which we have not been able to fill out. In many cases we have only been able to secure the names and dates of birth, marriage and death, with no incident to give life or individuality to the possessor, but wherever possible, we have inserted some act or circumstance which should reveal the personality of the individual.

As the years go by, records of this kind become increasingly valuable. The history of the Warner family in its earlier generations is largely a New England history. As such the Warners have contributed their full share in developing this continent, and shaping the character of its people. It is for us to see that the contribution of the present and future generations shall be not less honorable and useful than that of our forefathers.


THE WARNERS OF ENGLAND

Several explanations have been suggested as to the origin of the name "Warner". It was used in England in early times as a personal name and occurs in the Domesday Book. In the reign of Henry III of England, mention is made of "Henri le Warn", and in 1302 the annals of Crokerdon Abbey contain the name of "Ythel le Warner". An early English record speaks of "Jacke le Warner", and Langland, the poet, writes of "Watte the Warner". Some authorities give the derivation from Wern, in the sense of nationality, combined with Hari, warrior, making the Old High German form Warender, from which come the English Warner and Warrener, meaning hero-warrior. Others have considered the name as springing from the office or occupation: Warner, one who issues summons in a law court; or, game-warden, who warns away intruders from his lord's domains. These trace the derivation to Anglo-Saxon Warian, the "ware" of alarm shouts in England, like the "gare" of France, the latter syllable of beware and aware, and the wehrer of Germany.

Andrew Warner, the American ancestor of the Warners described in this book, was descended from the Warners of Essex County, England. The first of his ancestors of whom we have direct proof is John Warner, the father of John² Warner and the grandfather of Andrew. He resided in Great Waltham, or, as it is called in "Much Waltham," Essex County, England. In his some wills. will, dated May 23d, 1584, and proved the 9th of the following September, he bequeaths the lease of his farm in Much Waltham to his wife Margaret. He mentions nine children: Thomas, John, Edward, Andrew, a daughter unnamed (probably Mary who married Emmaston), Margery, Elisabeth, Margaret and Joan, each of whom received bequests, either of money or other property. He calls himself a "husbandman" and his gifts would indicate that he was a man of thrift and of considerable prominence in the community.

Some writers have believed that Great Waltham was the earliest home of the Warners in England. John Philiputt's writing in 1629 gives the pedigree of the early Warner families with their coats of arms, and adds, "All these families with this surname now in existence were surely descended or derived from the Warners of Great Waltham." He does not, however, give proof of this statement that can be accepted as conclusive.

A study of the coats of arms of the different Warner families in England reveals at least six quite different types among the twenty-eight noted in Burke's General Armory (London, 1883, pp. 1076, 7). The simplest and probably the oldest are the arms of the Warners of Great Waltham in Essex County, which were emblazoned on their shields and carved in several parts of the ceiling of the south aisle of the church. They were: Or, a bend engrailed between six roses or cinquefoils three and three gules barbed vert. As our branch of the Warner family resided in Great Waltham, there is strong presumption that this is the shield used by our early ancestors.

Eleven Warner crests are described in Fairbairn's Book of Crests (London 1905, pp. 576, 7). The Great Waltham family used a man's head couped below the shoulders, habited chequy or and azure, wreathed about the temples gold and gules, on the head a cap argent. In these heraldic descriptions or denotes gold; gules, red; vert, green; argent, white or silver; sable, black; azure, blue. No motto is quoted for this family but "Spero" is the motto of the Warners of Walthamstow whose arms are almost the same.

Another ancient and simple design was that of John Warner, Esq., High Sheriff of Kent: Argent, a chevron gules between three mulletts pierced sable. The arms of John Warner, Sheriff and Alderman of London, were similar to the above, except that boars' heads took the place of the mullets.

The coat of arms of John Warner of Norfolk (1374) was: Vert, a cross engrailed argent, ermines. This is very similar to the arms engraved on the silver of Captain Augustine Warner, who settled in Virginia in 1628, except that the ermines are omitted.

Still another type is seen in the arms of Sir Edward Warner of Norfolk: Per bend indented sable and argent, azure a fleur-de-lis or. John Warner, Bishop of Rochester from 1637 to 1666, adopted a coat of arms very similar to that of Sir Edward Warner of Norfolk.

The arms of the Warners of Middlesex were: Azure fesse argent

with five ermine above and three fleur-de-lis below.

The records of the Great Waltham Warner families go back to the fourteenth century, and from them are traced Warners who



resided in the counties of Essex, Suffolk, Hants, Leicestershire, Norfolk, Kent, Middlesex and London. The most noted of the Essex family was Edmund Warner, Esq., who had an estate as early as 1360 in the eastern part of Essex County between Great Waltham and Dunmow, known as "Warner Hall" or "Warner Manor." Edmund was succeeded in 1372 by his son, John Warner, who added largely to the estate through his marriage to Jane, the sister and heir of John Walden. This property, consisting of 418 acres, descended to successive Warner heirs until 1556, when the direct line become extinct, and it was purchased by Richard Lord

It is quite probable that our ancestor, John Warner, and the Warners of Warner Manor were derived from a common ancestry. though the evidence is not complete. Among the wills recorded in

the Archdeacons Court of Essex, is one of William Briggs of Waltham, dated 21 April 1553, which is witnessed by Thomas Warner. The date of this will and the fact that Thomas was the name of both a son and grandson of John Warner who died in 1584, makes it probable that this Thomas Warner was the father

of John.

Another of these Essex wills reveals the maternal grandfather of our ancestor, Andrew Warner. John Purchas, in his will dated 27 March, 1585, makes the following bequest: "And the other £10 I give to Mary, my daughter, wife of John Warnerd. I give to either of the two children of the said Mary, my daughter, namely: to Thomas Warner and Mary Warnore, 6 shillings, 8 pence apiece at the age of 18, or the day of marriage." The John here mentioned is the father of Andrew Warner, and Thomas and Mary were two of his brothers and sisters. This will, therefore, connects our ancestors directly with the Purchas family, one of the most distinguished of the Essex families. Samuel Purchas, born in 1577 at Thaxted, less than ten miles from Hatfield, was a noted clergyman and author. His best known work, "Purchas, his Pilgrimage," is still read because of its great literary and historic value.

It is evident from all the above facts that the ancestors of Andrew Warner had been residents of Essex County for several generations, at least, and were connected with the prominent families of the county. It is quite probable, therefore, that further research will reveal a common ancestry of our family and the Warners of Warner

Manor.

John² Warner, the father of Andrew, was a legatee under and a witness to the will of his brother Thomas, made in 1613. In 1609 he had evidently settled in Hatfield Broad Oak, about ten miles from Great Waltham, as the "Lay Subsidies" or personal taxes for Essex showed that John Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak in that year paid a tax on £3 of household goods, but there is no record of a tax on land. Five years later, on March 10th, the "Feet of Fines," corresponding to our record of deeds, shows that he bought thirty-five acres of freehold land consisting of garden, meadow and pasture, for which he paid forty-one pounds sterling.

Hatfield Broad Oak was formerly known as Hatfield Regis, or Kings' Hatfield, because the manor of Hatfield was a royal manor and was owned by the Kings of England, and to distinguish it from several other Hatfields in the kingdom. It has been associated with many names familiar in English History, and is the supposed burial place of Harold, last of the Saxon Kings. The later name of Hatfield Broad Oak probably originated from the

great oak which stood in the forest near the village. It is a pretty, quaint old English village, and not much change has taken place in the number of its inhabitants during the past three hundred years. It still preserves its ancient appearance, notwithstanding some modern innovations. It is situated on an eminence commanding an extended view of the country to the south and west, and is located about twenty-five miles north of London.

In the will of John² Warner made a few months after purchasing this land at Hatfield Broad Oak, he calls himself a "Yeoman," that is, one who owns and works his own land as distinguished from the tenant farmer on the one hand and the wealthy landlord on the other. This land usually consisted of several detached pieces; one for a homestead, another for pasture and others for the cultivation of crops. He evidently belonged to the class of small freeholders, or what is now termed the middle-class.

We have little positive knowledge of the members of the family, with the exception of the son, Andrew Warner, and the daughter, Rose Sanford, three of whose sons came to America and settled near Andrew Warner in Hartford. We know that Andrew was born in about the year 1595, the exact date, however, being unknown, and that he remained in England until about his thirty-fifth year. It is probable that he was born in Great Waltham, and that there he passed his earlier years, removing with his parents to Hatfield Broad Oak when he was twelve years old. From his surroundings, and the circumstances of the family, we can infer with some certainty the nature of his early life. During that period he received some education, and was undoubtedly employed in assisting his father and perhaps others in the tillage of the soil. It is probable that he accumulated some property while still in England, for soon after reaching America he became a landowner.

It may be of interest to describe the circumstances which led to the discovery of the will of John Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak, and through it the identity of the father and mother of Andrew Warner. In searching the early history of Hartford, Conn., a record was found of a Court Order on December 5th, 1678, in the settlement of the estate of Zachary Sanford, late of Saybrook, Conn., giving letters of administration to John Durrant and John Loomy of Hadley, as the representatives of Miles Clay of Braintree, England. Miles Clay was one of the heirs of the estate of Zachary Sanford, and it was known that three of the Sanfords, Thomas, Robert and Andrew, were nephews of Andrew Warner and either came to America with him or followed soon after and settled in or near Hartford. This clue led to a search of the records

of towns in the vicinity of Braintree, England, and to the discovery of the wills of John and Mary Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak in

Essex County.

The will of John Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak, dated July 16th, 1614. mentions six children: Thomas, John, Andrew, Edward, Elizabeth and Rose; also four grand-children, Thomas Warner and Thomas, John and Elizabeth Sanford, who were the children of his daughter Rose. The will of Mary Warner, made thirteen vears later, mentions nineteen grand-children. Among these were "The two children of Andrew my sonne." Diligent search has been made to find a record of the birth or baptism of the children of Andrew Warner, who were born in England, but without success. Records were found of an Andrew Warner and his wife, Mary, who bought land in Waltham Holy Cross, Essex County, in 1627, which they sold in 1636. Between 1630 and 1635 there is a record of the baptism of their five children, three of whom were named John, and died within a few days of their baptism. The two who survived were Mary, baptized June 20, 1630, and Francis, baptized November 1, 1635. Four of the dates here given are after the arrival of our Andrew Warner in America, as is shown by the records of Cambridge, Mass. We must conclude, therefore, that the records of Waltham Holy Cross refer to some other Andrew Warner, perhaps a cousin, as there was an uncle of Andrew Warner bearing the same name, and the name Andrew Warner occurred in England after 1700.

We append herewith complete copies of the wills of John Warner of Great Waltham, and of John and Mary Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak, also that of John Purchas. It will be observed that each will is signed with a mark, showing that they could not write, or, what is more probable, that they were too feeble to sign their names. One of the witnesses of the will of John Warner was his son-in-law, Ezekial Sanford. The will of John Warner is dated in the year of the reign of His Sovereign and not in the year of our Lord, as is now customary in giving dates. The wording of these wills is a fine example of the quaint English of three hundred

years ago.

The early colonial records show that there were five immigrants of the name of Warner who came to America in or before 1639. The first was Andrew Warner, who was residing in Cambridge in 1632. Another was John Warner, who came on the ship *Increase* in 1635, and settled in Providence, R. I., in or before 1637, at which time he signed a "Compact" in that place. Later he went back to England with his family, but his son John returned to

Rhode Island in 1655 where he afterwards resided. In 1676 he was married to Ann Gorton.

The third was William Warner, who came from England in 1637 accompanied by his two sons, John and David, and settled in Ipswich, Mass. This family has a large number of descendants residing in New England and scattered throughout the states.

The fourth was John Warner, who appears among the original proprietors of Hartford in 1639 and later was one of the original settlers of the town of Farmington. He died in 1679, when he was planning to remove to Waterbury. Colonel Seth Warner of Revolutionary fame is descended from the line of John¹ Warner of Farmington, Conn.; John² of Waterbury, Conn.; Doctor Ebenezer³ and Martha (Galpin) of Woodbury, Conn.; Doctor Benjamin⁴ and Silence (Hurd) of Woodbury and Arlington, Vt. Colonel Seth⁵, born May 6, 1743, died December 26, 1784, married Hester Hurd. Colonel Seth Warner was third in command of the forces at the taking of Ticonderoga by Colonel Ethan Allen, May 10, 1777, was in the battle of Bennington, August 16, 1777, and was in command at the taking of Crown Point. A monument has been erected to him in his native town, Roxbury, Conn., and another is in Bennington, Vt.

The fifth was Captain Augustine Warner, who came to Virginia about 1628 and settled in York County. Later, in 1656, he removed to Gloucester County, where he acquired a large estate and was prominent in the affairs of the colony. His son, Colonel Augustine, was educated in England and succeeded to his father's estate and influence in the colony. He married Mildred, the daughter of George Reade, and their daughter, Mildred, married Lawrence Washington the grandfather of General George Washington.

No direct relationship has been traced between any of these families, but the fact that the John Warner who settled in Hartford was a fellow townsman of Andrew Warner in both Hartford and Farmington makes it probable that he was connected with the Hatfield Broad Oak family, perhaps a brother or cousin of Andrew Warner. This probability is strengthened by the names of his four children: John, Daniel, Thomas and Sarah, as John and Thomas were the names of two of the children of John Warner of Great Waltham and also of his son John² Warner of Hatfield Broad Oak, while John and Daniel were the names of two of the children of Andrew Warner.

WARNER WILLS

In the Name of God Amen the xxiijth Dave of Maye and in the yeare of our lord god 1584 I JOHN WARNER of Much Waltham in the countye of Essex husbandman being sicke in bodye and troubled with Disease but perfect in remembraunce thanks be to Allmightie god for it and waighinge the vncertantve of my life doe ordaine and make this my present testament and last will in manner and forme followinge That is to save firste and moste principallie I humblie recomend and bequeath my Soule into the hands of Allmightie god my maker steadfastlye beleving that I shalbe saued by Jhesus Christe my savior and redemer and by the marcye of god and by no other meanes merritts or diserts of myne owne or any others and my bodye to be buried in the Churchyard of Much Waltham aforesaide wth such coste of funeralls as shalbe thought most meete by my executrix. Item I give vnto Margarett my wyfe the lease of my ffarme with the stocke and Cattells as it is nowe and yf it shall happen that Margaret my wyfe do marrye againe before thend and terme of the Indenture or lease of my ffarme as it dothe appeare in the same then I will that the lease of my ffarme remaine vnto my two sonnes Edward and Andrewe payeing the Legacye yf there be any to paye Also I give vnto them foure of my best horses and the one halfe of my moueable goods to be parted betwixt my fyve daughters and my foure sonnes equallye Deuided Item I giue vnto Thomas my sonne the least shott of Barley in Stonecrofte and two seame of wheate and the ploughinge of half the ground he hathe this year and the next Item I give and bequeath vnto Edward my sonne fyve pounds to be paide within fyve yeares after my decease Item I give and bequeath vnto Andrew my sonne fyve poundes to be paide within sixe years after my decease and yf it shall happen either Edward or Andrewe to departe this worlde then the one of them to be thothers heire Item I giue vnto Margerye my daughter Sixe poundes thirteene shillings foure pence to be paid at the Daye of her marriadge or at the age of xxvj yeares websoever shall first happen. Item I give vnto my daughter Elizabeth three poundes to be paid at the age of xxvi yeares or at the Dave of her marriadge wchsoever shall first happen. Item I giue vnto Margarett my daughter three pounds to be paid at thage of one and twentye yeares or at the daye of her marriadge wch shall firste happen Item I giue vnto Johan my Daughter three poundes and one wennell calfe to be brought vpp vntill it be wth calfe and yf it shall happen the said Elizabeth Margarett and Johan to departe this worlde before the portion be paid then it allwayes prouided thone to be thothers heire I giue vnto Thomas Saward iijs iiijd to be paid imediatlye after my decease Item I giue vnto Xpian Casse iijs iiijd to be paide yinediately after my decease Item I giue vnto Thomas Warner the sonne of John Warner my sonne one quarter of Barley or so much money as shall buye one quarter of Barley to be deliuered vnto him when he shall accomplishe the age of tenne yeares Item I give to three of the children of my daughter Emmerston xs viz iijs iiijd to Vrsula iijs iiijd to John iijs iiijd to The residue of all my goode vnbequeathed aswell moveables as vnmoveable in this present will and testament not deuised given or bequeathed my Debts paid my necessarye funeralls discharged and this my present will performed accordinge to the true meaning thereof I giue and

bequeath vnto Margarett my welbeloued wyfe whe said Margarett my wyfe I ordaine and make my full and sole Executrix of this my present testament and last will hoping that she will be good vnto her children and myne according to the truste I reposse in her. And I clearly renounce all bequeasts guiftes and Deuises whatsoever heretofore by me made or done and doe ordaine and make this to be my true and last will. In witnes whereof I haue putt my hand and seale the daye and yeare aboue written. Sealed and Deliuered in the presence of Richard Pond Thomas Blower John Warner junior. The marke of John Warner. Probatum fuit hujusmodi testamentum nono die mensis Septembris Anno Domini 1584 jurata relicte et executrice.

Memorandum that THOMAS WARNER of Much Waltham, co. Essex, husbandman, deceased, did on xxvij May, 1613, declare his last will nuncupative in manner and form following:—Unto his daughter Margerie Warner iijii. To Sarah Warner iijii. To Marie Warner iijii. To Elizabeth Belsted, wife of William Belsted, xis. All the rest of his goods he gave to Thomas Warner his son, whom he made sole executor, in presence of John Warner, Nicholas Hutt and Andrew Warner. Proved I July, 1613, by the executor named. (Arch: Essex, 1613, Filed Will No. 66.)

WILL OF JOHN PURCHAS

27 March, 1585, I John Purchas of Much Waltham, co. Essex, tanner, being grown in age and trobled with disease, do ordain this to be my testament and last will:-First I commend my body to be buried in the churchyard of Much Waltham with such costs as shalbe thought mete by myne executor and my wief. I give to ten of the poorest householders 5s. on the day of my burial. I give to Margaret my wief one-half of my moveable goods within the houses and £13-6-8. To John Purchas my eldest son £6-8-4, and to his three children John, William and Alice 6s.8d. each at 21 or marriage. To George Porcas my youngest son £40, and if it happen to him to depart the world ere he receive it, then John my younger son shall have £20 of his portion, Thomas my son £10, and the other £10 I give to Mary my daughter, wife of John Warnard. I give to either of the two children of the said Mary my daughter, namely, to Thomas Warnar and Mary Warnare, 6s.8d. apiece at the age of 18 or the day of marriage. To the daughter of Thomas my son 10s. To Mary my daughter, wife of John Warner, £5. To my sister's daughter Joan Downham 10s. at 23 or marriage. To my sister Sandford's daughter Mary 5s. All the rest of my goods I give unto John Purchas my youngest son, to do his will and best withal; which said John my youngest son I ordain and make my full and whole executor, and Thomas my son overseer. Witnesses: Thomas Edwards, Richard Pond the writer of the same. Proved 11 October, 1585, by John Purcas the younger son and executor. (Arch: Essex, Draper, 85.)

WILL OF JOHN WARNER

Commissary Court of London (Essex and Herts). Will filed July, 1614.

In the name of God amen The Sixtenth daie of July in the yeares of the Reigne of our soueraigne Lord James by the grace of god of England Scotland Fraunce and Ireland Kinge Defender of the faith that is to say of

ANDREW WARNER IN AMERICA

The first direct mention of Andrew Warner in America is an entry in the town records of Cambridge, Mass., then known as "Newtowne." On January 7th, 1632-3, there are recorded several votes regarding the erection of houses in the town and the division of the pale or fence to enclose the common, with the number of rods each settler was to build. This was the first entry made in the records of the town, except for a single item on December 24th calling a monthly meeting. Forty-two names were given in two columns, and the eleventh line in the first column reads:

"Andrew Warner, 20 Rod"

Twenty-four of the forty-two settlers built less than ten rods each, while only eleven built as much as twenty rods. This would indicate that Andrew Warner was already a resident of Cambridge and was among the more prominent and wealthy members of the new colony. Among the other names was that of John Steel, who afterwards married Mary, the oldest daughter of Andrew Warner.

The same record shows that on November 4th, 1633, Andrew Warner received one "Acker" of land in an award of "Lotts for Cowyards." In January 1634, he bought one piece of "swampe ground by the 'ould feild'" and a little later another piece of three acres in the division of planting ground in the Neck.

On February 3d, 1634, Andrew Warner was appointed on a committee of five to survey the Towne lands and enter them in a book. The constable was head of the committee and "itt is further ordered that these 5 men meet every first Monday in the month at the Constables house....at the Ringing of the bell."

In April 1634, a law was passed by the General Court of Massachusetts Bay Colony, requiring the inhabitants of each town to choose four or more men who, with the constable of the town, should make a record or survey of the lands of each of the inhabitants and send a report of the same to the colonial officials. Andrew Warner was chosen by the inhabitants of Cambridge or Newtowne as one of the four to act for that town.

On May 14th, 1634, Andrew Warner was made a freeman of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

On November 23d, 1635, Andrew Warner was the third of nine persons "Chossen to order bussines of the whole Towne for the year following and untell new bee Chossen in their rooms,....wch

nyne are to haue the power of the whole Towne as those formerly Chossen hadd." This record shows that "commission government" is not altogether a modern invention, but was practiced in the early

New England colonies.

The above records show that as early as 1632-3 Andrew Warner was residing in America and was a member of the Cambridge colony. He was born about 1595, so he was at this time thirty-seven years old—in the full vigor of early manhood. The reason for his removal to America we can only know by inference. It was during the reign of Queen Elizabeth that Protestantism was restored to England, and it was also during her reign that Puritanism appeared. Towards the close of her life, the persecutions of the Puritans, who were non-conformists to the established church, became severe, and under her successor, James I, matters became decidedly worse for them both in civil and religious affairs.

In 1625, Charles I ascended the throne of England. He at once assumed all the power of Church and State and commenced a pitiless warfare against Puritanism. His chief instrument for that purpose was the infamous Archbishop Laud. The ministers of that religion were driven from their livings, or into exile, and the laymen were tortured and forced from their homes. Thousands of the best blood in old England sought a home or refuge in the

new world.

Among those who dared to oppose this policy was the brilliant preacher, Rev. Thomas Hooker. He was "silenced" as a minister of the church by Bishop Laud in 1626, but he continued to speak as a "lecturer" in Chelmsford, Essex County, until 1629, when the persecution became so strong that he left Chelmsford and

the following year fled to Holland.

Hooker had a powerful influence in all that part of England where he lived, and after his escape to Holland, a large number of his followers emigrated to America. These were known as the "Hooker Company" and also as the "Braintree Company" from Braintree, which was the chief town in that part of Essex County from which they came. In 1633 Mr. Hooker left Holland and came to America, where he arrived September 4th, 1633, on the Griffin, to become the pastor of the church at Cambridge, made up very largely of his former followers.

John Warner, the father of Andrew, moved to Hatfield Broad Oak in Essex County, England, in 1609, where he lived until the time of his death in 1614. Hatfield is only twenty miles from Braintree, and only sixteen miles from Chelmsford where Hooker lectured from 1626-29. Andrew Warner must have lived in or

near Hatfield at this time, for in 1627 his mother died at Hatfield and Andrew was the executor of her estate.

We see, therefore, that Andrew Warner was a member of the community in England which was so profoundly stirred by the teaching of Hooker and that he came to America at the same time as the large emigration of Hooker's followers. We also learn that later he followed Hooker to Hartford and was a deacon in his church. In view of all these facts, it seems altogether probable that Andrew Warner was one of Hooker's adherents while in England; that he left England to avoid persecution, and that he came to America to find that freedom in religious wor-

ship which was denied to him in his own country.

It is interesting to note that Andrew Warner came to America near the beginning of that great tide of emigration which started in 1629. Up to that time Plymouth and Salem had been settled, but the total English population of New England was hardly more than eight hundred. In 1629 Charles I dissolved Parliament and began his active crusade against all dissenting forms of religion. In April, 1630, Winthrop left for America, followed later in the year by seventeen ships and over one thousand people. By 1634 the annual emigration had increased to four thousand. In 1640 the Long Parliament met, the power of the King was checked and the active flood of emigration ceased, but at this time the population of New England had increased to 26,000.

The first of the Braintree Companies settled at Mount Wallaston, afterwards called "Quincy." Governor Winthrop's history of New England makes the following reference to this colony under date of August 14th, 1632. "The Braintree Company (which had begun to sit down at Mount Wallaston) by order of Court, removed to Newtowne. These were Mr. Hooker's company." There is a tradition in the Warner family that Andrew Warner was at Mount Wallaston with this early Braintree Company and it is quite probable that this is true, but no positive evidence has been discovered. The reason for removal to Newtowne or Cambridge was for the greater safety of the people, as Newtowne had been fixed on as the site of a fortified town, by order of the General Court December 30th, 1630.

Before the advent of the Braintree Company, Mount Wallaston passed through a unique and unsavory experience for a New England town. A trading settlement was established there about 1625, by Captain Wallaston, who soon went away to Virginia leaving affairs in the hands of Thos. Morton. He gathered about him a boisterous crowd of adventurers, quite non-Puritan in their

conduct. The Plymouth colony was so outraged by their behavior that Governor Bradford in his history of Plymouth Plantation devoted eight pages to their unholy doings. Hawthorne's "Maypole of Merry-Mount" is based on the stories of this band.

The following records are an additional evidence of the prominence of Andrew Warner in the town of Cambridge, as well as an illustration of the early methods of doing town business. These early records show that spelling was not an exact science three hundred years ago.

"The 4th January 1635"

"It is furthered ordered that the burryinge place shalbee palled in: whereof John Taylcot is to doe 2 Rodd, Georg Steele 3 Rod and Agate Thomas Hosmer 3 Rod, Mathew Allen 1 Rodd and Andrew Warner appointed to get the Remainder done at A publik Charge & he is to have iii A Rodd"

The homestead occupied by Andrew Warner is thus described in the "Proprietor's records of the town of Cambridge":

"June The 4th (1635)"

"Andrew Warner In the Towne one Howse and about one Roode for a Backside and garden, Marsh Lane on the south west, Creeke Lane on the northwest, Will Kellsey northeast, Mathew Allen on the southeast."

According to Page's History of Cambridge, Marsh Lane corresponds to the present Elliot Street, and Creek Lane to Brattle Square. This places Andrew Warner's early home within a few rods of Harvard University, in the very heart of Cambridge. Besides this home lot he also owned six other parcels of land in Cambridge; one acre in the West End, eighteen acres in the Neck, fifteen acres in the Great Marsh, two lots of one-half acre each in Ox Marsh and twelve and one-half acres in Old Field.

William Wood, writing about this time of Cambridge, describes it as follows:—

"One of the neatest and best compacted towns in New England, having many fair structures with many handsome contrived streets. The inhabitants are most of them very rich and well stored with cattle of all sorts, having many hundred acres of ground paled in with one general fence, which is about a mile and a half long which secures all their weaker cattle from the wild beasts."

"The 4th of Aprill 1636"

"Andrew Warner and Joseph Cooke to make a rate for the devision of the Aylwifs"

"The 23d Aprill 1636"

"Agreed with Andrew Warner to fetch home the Aylwifs from the weir and he is to have a Thowsan and load them himselfe for Caredge and to have power to take anny man to help him he payeinge of him for his woorke." The significance of hauling Aylwifs will be made clear by the following quotation from "Johnson's 'Wonder-Working Providence'":

"But the Lord is pleased to provide for them great store of Fish in the springtime, and especially Alewives about the bignesse of a Herring, many thousands of these they used to put under their Indian Corne, which they plant in Hills five foote asunder, and assuredly when the Lord created this Corne hee had a speciall eye to supply these his peoples wants with it, for ordinarily five or six graines doth produce six hundred."

On December 20th, 1636, Andrew Warner sold to Capt. George Cook his dwelling house, and all his other lands in the town of Cambridge, and either before or soon after this time, he removed to Hartford, Conn. After the coming of Hooker and his colony to Cambridge, the people began to question the desirability of their location and in May, 1634, complained to the General Court of straitness for want of land, especially meadow, and asked leave to look out either for enlargement or removal. Their request was at first refused, but in September of the same year, after a fuller statement of their needs had been presented to the General Court, they were granted more territory. The people having heard glowing accounts of the fertility of the soil of the Connecticut Valley from some of their number who had been there, and not being fully satisfied with the new arrangement, petitioned the General Court for permission to remove to Connecticut, stating that it was not desirable that this territory should fall into the possession of the Dutch who had settled in New York. It is also probable that Mr. Hooker was restive under the theocratic form of government which had been established in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, for "religious liberty" meant to them that the right to vote and hold office should be limited to the members of the Congregational Church. Mr. Hooker was probably the earliest man in America to advocate true democracy, or the rights of all the people, and under his leadership a new and much broader policy was adopted in the Hartford Colony.

Seeing the "strong bent" of the people to remove to Connecticut, the General Court held at Newtowne, March 3rd, 1635-6,* granted their petition. At the same time a commission was appointed to govern said plantation, to hear and determine in a judicial way all

^{*}Up to 1751 England and her colonies adhered to the old calendar in which the year began on March 26th instead of January 1st. Accordingly in most of the dates before that year we find the old year with a new year affixed to it in giving dates between January 1st and March 25th. This was not a uniform practice and leads to some confusion of dates.

differences that might arise among the people, and in case of misdemeanor to fine and levy the same or inflict corporal punishment as might seem best, to make and decree such orders as might seem necessary for the public good and military discipline. This commission was composed of eight members, one of whom was Andrew Warner. He had already served on a similar commission in charge of the affairs of Newtowne, and it is proof of his able and faithful service that he was, within less than a year, appointed on the new commission for Hartford.

A few of the Newtowne company removed to Hartford in October, 1635, but the majority did not leave until May 31st, 1636. Mr. Benjamin Trumbull gives the following description of the journey in the History of Conn., pub. 1797, p. 55:

"About the beginning of June, Mr. Hooker, Mr. Stone and about a hundred men, women and children took their departure from Cambridge and travelled more than a hundred miles, through a hideous and trackless wilderness to Hartford. They had no guide but their compass; made their way over mountains, thro' swamps, thickets and rivers, which were not passable, but with great difficulty. They had no cover but the heavens, nor any lodgings but those which simple nature afforded them. They drove with them a hundred and sixty head of cattle, and by the way, subsisted on the milk of their cows. Mrs. Hooker was borne through the wilderness upon a litter. The people generally carried their packs, arms and some utensils. They were nearly a fortnight on their journey."

Arriving at their destination, this little company laid the foundation of Hartford, Conn. They proceeded at once to obtain title to the land and purchased the same in 1636 from the Indians. The portion, now covering the older settled part of the city, was parcelled out to each, the home lots consisting of about two acres of land.

The first mention of Andrew Warner in the records of Hartford is a description of his home-lot entered in February, 1639:

"One parcell on which his dwellings house now standeth with other out houses, yards, or gardens therein beinge, Containinge by Estimacon two acres, more or lesse, abuttinge on the high way lyinge on the South side of the little river on the North, and on the high way Leadinge from George Steels to the South meadow on the South and on Samuell Wakemans Land on the East, and on Nathaniell Wards Land on the West."

According to this description, his residence was on the north side of the present Charter Oak Avenue a little east of Main Street. In addition to the home lot, the records show Andrew Warner to have owned four other parcels of land located in different parts of the town, aggregating in all about 80 acres.

In speaking of him as the owner of the "home lot" described

above he is called "Andrew Warner, Deacon to the Church of Christ there." There is no direct proof of the time when he was made deacon, but most of the writers have thought it was before

his removal from Cambridge.

The records of Hartford, like those of Cambridge, give evidence of the abundant activities of Andrew Warner in the new town. In later years a monument has been erected to the Founders of Hartford in the burying ground back of the First Church, and tenth of the names inscribed on this monument is that of Andrew Warner. The following items are for the most part published in the Public Records of Connecticut and in the Conn. Hist. Soc. Publications and are also given in the careful accounts compiled by Frank F. Starr in his work on the Ancestral Lines of Judge Goodwin.

In 1639-40, there were entered on the Town Records

"The names of such Inhabitants as have Right in undivided Lands."

The fifteenth name in the list is that of Andrew Warner.

January 3d, 1639-40, the inhabitants of Hartford entered into an agreement as to the proportion each resident should receive in the division of common lands, evidently based on their financial rating.

The largest apportionment, that of one hundred and sixty acres, went to John Haynes, Esq. The smallest division was three acres. Only eight persons had larger shares than Andrew Warner's allotment of eighty-four acres. It is interesting to note that his prosperity was well maintained, for seven years later, on the tax list of 1657, Andrew Warner stood fifth from the highest.

At a town meeting held January 11, 1640 (1639-40), a committee of ten men, including Andrew Warner, was appointed to survey

and divide the lands on the east side of the Great River.

In January, 1639, and again in 1647, he was chosen a Surveyor of Highways, and in January, 1640, he with two others were appointed to lay out highways in the South Meadow and the Forty Acres and highways leading to the swamps, and to arrange with the owners satisfaction for the land taken for such highways.

At this time his abilities were recognized by the General Court of Connecticut, for on the 8th of February, 1640-1, he was appointed on a committee of six, consisting of two men from each of the towns

of Hartford, Wethersfield and Windsor:

"For the prventing of differences that may arise betwixt the Plantations from trespasses of Cattle wch are ofte necessitated by reson of their bordering on agt another—they shall take into their serious consideration how the grownd belonging to the seuerall Plantations may be best imprued, so as to

sute ech others conuenience, whereby their Corne may be prserued and their Cattle keepte wth lest chardge of fencing or herding, as may most conduce to the common good".

A few days later, Feb. 18th, 1640-1, the town appointed him on a committee to arrange for the equable division of lands on both sides of the Great River.

"At a Ginerall Toune metting" held in Hartford, Jan. 27th, 1647-8, he with four others was appointed to survey the common lands and fences.

The name of Andrew Warner does not occur in the Hartford records from January, 1647-8 to April, 1650. With others he had become interested in the adjoining plantation of Farmington, and it is probable that he resided in Farmington during this time. The Farmington records show that Andrew Warner in March, 1648, owned four pieces of land in that town. The five acres "on which his dwelling house now standeth" was bounded north on the common, south on the highway, east on land of William Lewis, and west on land of Matthew Webster." The second volume of the Memorial History of Hartford County contains an old map of Farmington which locates this home lot on the north side of the highway facing Main Street. This is now the property of the Country Club. Andrew Warner also owned ten acres in the "Slipe," twenty-two acres in the Lower Meadow and one-hundred acres in the Great Meadow.

Andrew Warner must have returned to Hartford in 1649-50, for in February, 1650, his home lot in Farmington is recorded as the property of William Lewis.

In the records of the Particular Court of Hartford, for the term

beginning March 7th, 1649, is this interesting entry:—

"This Courte Adiudges Natha: warde and Andrew warner to pay Thomas Lord for Curing the eare of the Indian Squaw which theire doggs bitt off, and to pay the squaw 2 bush of Indian Corne, which Corne, the next Indian or Indians that Shall any way by clapping hands or throwing stones at any dogg or doggs, provoke them, shall pay to the said warde againe."

At a town meeting held April 15, 1650, power was given to Andrew Warner and five others

"to set in order the worke of the high wayes belonginge to both sides of the Towne & to establish the same."

At the same meeting, he and John White agreed with the town

"to make a fence crosse the riuerett & to Indeavor keepe the same for seauen yeares for the keepinge of cattell & swine out of the meadowes that they shall haue for their Labor flowerty shillings by the yeare to be payd them wth in the yeare in euery of the sayd seauen yeares."

Andrew Warner was chairman of a coroner's jury, Dec. 2, 1652, which decided that, "Wee doe finde that the sd partye, going against his master's Comand with his master's cannoe into a place of danger, or that is to the milldam, is guilty of his own death,

being drowned—" (Hartford Court records, p. 38).

In May, 1657, Mr. Clarke and John Allen were asked to present at the next session of the Court "a list of them that desire to bee troopers... which said Court is to approve of them they see meet." This list contains fourteen Hartford men, of whom Andrew Warner was one. As Andrew Warner was at this time over sixty years of age, it is possible that this record refers to the son Andrew, and not to the father.

Upon the death in 1647 of the Reverend Thomas Hooker, the latter's associate, Samuel Stone, was in charge of the church as teacher, but not as pastor. In a few years differences arose between Mr. Stone and many of the congregation. This controversy, at first local, regarding matters of church membership, discipline, and baptism, spread to neighboring churches and was felt throughout New England. It led not only to the establishment of the Second Church of Hartford, but to the settlement of Hadley by colonists from Hartford, Wethersfield and neighboring churches, and greatly disturbed the peace of the town and colony.

Attempts were made by the General Court and various advisory bodies to end the quarrel. Warner belonged to the anti-Stone party and with twenty others signed a letter dated March 12th, 1655-56, in which they stated their inability to accept the sugges-

tions of the other side and asked for

"an Able and Indifferent Councell".

The letter is so characteristic of our early New England ancestors that we give it entire.

Dear Brethren,—We have as seriously and sadly as the Lord hath helped vs considered and weighed what hath beene presented to vs in the papers received from Mr. Stone and severall brethren, and doe solemnly profess wee have laboured wth all or might according to or Abilities and Light, to receive satisfaction in those things wee have presented to you for help in, but cannott meete wth that in yor Answrs wch wee hoped and looked for, and therefore, doe declare orselves that or doubts and difficulties yet remaine wth vs, and in some of them they are rather increased than removed, and therefore to the great greife of or hearts must say, that as the case now stands wth this Church wee cannott wthout sin till wee receive other Light joine wth you in any office acts put forth by Mr. Stone, for hee hath as much as in him lyes laide downe his place, hath acted since accordingly, and the church hath done that wch wee conceive holds forth their acceptance; neither has Mr. Stone in his Answer to those questions that concernes the same held forth satisfying and convincing Light to vs to the contrary: Wee

doe therfore humbly desire that you would forbear doing that w^{ch} will put vs oppon doing that w^{ch} you shall Judge offensiue or otherwise expose vs to temptations to act wth you doubtingly, to the great offence of God and hazard (if not wounding) o^r inward peace, vntill wee can haue helpe from an able and Indifferent Councell mutually chosen w^{ch} wee desire may bee indeauored and attended wth as much speed as may bee.

The following extract from Hull's Diary (p. 183) sheds a little side light on the controversy:

"The breach at Hartford again renewed; God leaving Mr. Stone their officer, to some indiscretion, as to neglect the Church's desire in the celebration of the Lord's supper, and to proceed to some acts of discipline towards the formerly dissenting brethren; and Satan taking occasion also by Mr. Stone's absence some weeks from them, and neglecting of the use of all means to cherish and to look unto their newly set bones and joints, they easily brake again."

George Leon Walker, D.D., pastor and historian of the First Church, Hartford, after reviewing this controversy concludes that

"On the whole, respecting the controversy itself which turmoiled the Church so long, the impartial verdict of history must be, that spite of many irregularities and doubtless a good deal of ill-temper on both sides, the general weight of right and justice was with the defeated and emigrating minority."

In this view, Doctor Edwin Pond Parker, historian of the Second Church, Hartford, concurs.

Finding all attempts at reconciliation impossible, a number of the residents of Hartford with some of their friends from Wethersfield and Windsor entered into the following agreement which resulted in the founding of Hadley, Mass.

"At A meting at Goodman Wards house in Hartford Aprill 18th, 1659, the Company there mete Ingaged themselves (under their owne hands or by their Deputies whom they had Chosen) to remove themselves and their ffamilies out of the Jurisdiction of Connecticut Into the Jurisdiction of the Mattatusets as may Apeare in A paper Dated the day and yeare Abovesaid: the Names of the Ingagers are these:"

Then follow fifty-nine names, of which Andrew Warner was one. At the end of the names is the following addition: "Not fully under this Ingagement Danniell Warner A house lot."

On April 25th, 1659, at another meeting, a committee of five was appointed to go to the new territory which they had selected on the east side of the Connecticut River opposite Northampton and to lay out home lots for the new settlers. Andrew Warner at this time was about 65 years old. He had been a resident of Hartford for over twenty years, and had seen it grow from a few huts in the

wilderness to an organized and prosperous town, but now for the third time in his life he left an established home to settle as a pioneer in the unbroken wilderness.

Andrew Warner sold his Hartford homestead on November 17th, 1659, to William Loveridge of Hartford for £130,

"to be payd one-third part In wheat, the other third part in peas, both at the price Currant and the other third part in suteable Hatts the corn to be payd in at the Comon landing place or any House in Hartford as the sayd Andrew or his assigne shall appoynt, the corn to be sweet & every way well Conditioned & the hats to be two shillings in the pownd cheaper than I sell thos sorts By retayle".

The manner of payment for this property suggests that Andrew Warner may have been engaged in the mercantile business. In any case he must have been very much of a trader to have taken one-third of his pay for this land in hats.

Another piece of his Hartford property was sold to Jonathan Gilbert, for in Gilbert's will, September 10th, 1679, he speaks of the

"pasture I bought of Andrew Warner."

We do not know just when Andrew Warner removed to his new home, but it was before October 8th, 1660, for on that date there was "a Towne meeteing at Andrew werner's House" at which action was taken regarding the admission of inhabitants. The votes passed at this meeting were signed by twenty-eight men, including Andrew Warner. It is probable that these twenty-eight were all the settlers who at that date had taken possession of their land. Some of the original signers of the agreement did not remove to Hadley and others selected lots on the west side of the river at Hatfield. The village of Hadley, as finally laid out, consisted of fortyseven lots, nearly all of eight acres each, laid out on each side of a street running north and south, 330 feet wide and about one mile in length. These lots were situated in a bend of the river so that the street led directly to the river at both the north and south ends. Andrew Warner's homestead was on the west side of the street, the twelfth lot from the north end. The present highway and street car line from Amherst to Northampton runs immediately to the south of Andrew Warner's former lot.

In addition to the home lot, Andrew Warner later became the owner of eight other pieces of property in or near Hadley, aggregating in all forty-two acres. It seems to have been the custom of the early New England settlers to have their land scattered in several parcels rather than united in one or two holdings. As we have shown, Andrew Warner was the owner of seven pieces of land in Cambridge, at least four in Hartford, and four in Farmington.

The records of Hadley show the active part that Andrew Warner continued to take in public affairs. He was three times elected Townsman, or Selectman, as it was afterwards called, in 1660, 1667 and 1673.

Rev. Samuel Hooker, the son of their Hartford pastor, was at this time preaching at Springfield. On December 17th, 1660, Andrew Warner was one of a committee "chosen to meet and Confere together to send Some propositions to Mr. Hooker About his Removell to us." Mr. Hooker did not accept the invitation to Hadley, but he became the pastor of the church in Farmington, where he died.

On December 12th, 1661, the town voted to build a meeting house in the common street and "Goodman Warner" was appointed one of the committee to take charge of the work.

In March, 1662-3, he served on a committee to treat with the town of Northampton about the lay-out of the highway through the meadows of that town.

February 13, 1664, he was chosen on a committee

"to view the way to the mouth of Chickopay River & to the Falls in the Great River, to see if it is a feasible way for transporting goods & to confer with Springfield & Northampton men about it".

In August, 1663, November, 1664, and September, 1665, he was one of a committee appointed to view and report concerning lands which certain inhabitants of the town had desired to have set out to them.

July 11th, 1666, he was appointed one of a committee to lay out some land given by the town for the benefit of the Grammar school. In the following March he was one of a new committee to let out the land.

In February, 1667, he was one of a committee of five to "provide a Boate ffor the fferrye who shall have power to call out all men that are willing to worke aboute the same rather than to pay their proportion in come as allsoe to call out any they Judge most meete ffor the worke."

In March, 1661, and September, 1663, he served on the jury of the Hampshire County Court.

In March, 1665, suit was brought against Andrew Warner by the legatees of John Barnard, a former resident of Hadley, for damages caused by the burning of a malt house he was using which belonged to Barnard's estate. The case did not come to trial, but was settled by agreement.

The evidence that Andrew Warner was a maltster is further

shown by the following entry on an account book of John Pynchon, the leading citizen and merchant of Springfield:

"Goodm: Warner of Hadley, ye Maulster Dr."

The credit side, covering a period from February 28, 1671, to September, 1674, reads thus:

"By 7 bush. of Malt 1672 at 4*3d" July 5, 1673, By 33 bush & ½ Malt at 4*6d" Sept. 1674 By 30 bush of Malt at 4*	07-10-09
	15-00-06"

It is very probable that Andrew Warner learned the brewing business at his childhood home, for in his mother's will is recorded this item:

"I give unto Thomas Warner my eldest sonne, the somme of Twentie shillinges and also my brewing Leade."

Judd, in his History of Hadley, makes the following statement of Andrew Warner's still: "Andrew Warner was the owner of a small still, valued at 10 shillings." That this was of small size is shown by the valuations of other stills in the settlement, notably that of Dr. Hastings of Hatfield, whose still was valued at 40s. Most of them ranged from 15 to 45s. The small stills were used for distilling cordials, sweet waters and medicinal waters from herbs, flowers, spices, etc. Judd also states that the malting business established by Andrew Warner was continued for 130 years by three generations of his descendants, Jacob,² Jacob,³ Jr., and Orange.⁴

-Under date of March 29th, 1670, the Hampshire County Records contain the following entry:

"Andrew Warner of Hadley is free fro military exercise with the company there."

As he was at this time about seventy-five years old, he might well be excused from further military service.

In October, 1678, the General Court passed an act that

"all his majestjes subjects within this jurisdiction that are of sixteene yeares of age and upwards"

should take the oath of allegiance. Among those who took the oath from Hadley were "Andrew Warner, Isaac Werner and Jacob Werner." Among the Hatfield names was "Daniel Werner."

Of the first wife of Andrew Warner we have not been able to

discover a single record. The family tradition is that her name was Mary, but we find no positive proof. Not far from the time of Andrew Warner's removal to Hadley, he was married to Esther or Hester Wakeman Selden, baptized June 15, 1617, died in Hadlev in 1603, daughter of Francis Wakeman of Bewdley, Worcestershire, England, and his wife, Anne Goode. Her first husband was Thomas Selden who died in 1655. They had eight children, Thomas, John, Mary, Esther (1), Joseph, Hannah, Esther (2), and Sarah. The first mention of Esther Selden in connection with Andrew Warner is a record of the Connecticut Probate Court. December 3d, 1663, in which complaint is entered against Andrew Warner because he had not given proper security to the Court for the payment of the legacies due from the estate of Thomas Selden to his children. The children were not of age, and Andrew Warner evidently had the custody of the money. The matter was adjusted as is shown by the court records for the following March. Later records show that in 1673 Andrew Warner conveyed to Joseph Selden certain lands for £60, of which £40 was the legacy due from his father and £20 was for labor. In 1678-9 a similar deed was given to Hannah Selden for her share of the legacy from her father. It is probable that the settlements were made at about the time the children became of age.

In the original volume of "Births, Burials & Marriages of Fam-

ilies" of Hadley on folio 20 is this entry:

"Andrew Warner died jenewary 1684"

This entry does not give the exact date and probably was made some time after his death, for in the inventory of his estate taken December 23, 1684, it states "who dyed december 18, 1684, aged about 90 years." This latter statement may therefore be accepted

as the date of his death, and also as authority for his age.

The life of Andrew Warner was remarkable because of the time in which he lived, as well as because of the many important incidents connected with his own distinguished career. Born in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, he outlived the reign of two kings, the Protectorate of Oliver Cromwell and saw the restoration to the throne of Charles II. His life thus covers the entire period of the religious persecution in England, and the great flood of emigration which settled and gave character to the American colonies.

We cannot but admire the record of the life of this sturdy Puritan, and the spirit which caused him, for the sake of a greater religious freedom, to give up the comforts of civilization in old England, for an unknown destiny in a far distant and unexplored

country; which impelled him to take up a life of self denial, privation, hardship and danger in the depths of the New England wilderness, that he might be independent, and might worship God in the manner dictated by his conscience.

He saw, at the dawn of the early settlement of this country, history in the making, and for fifty years was a part thereof; and, at last, after a long period of devotion to his Church, of which he was a pillar, and to the new State, of which he was a founder, he laid himself down to sleep in the last home he had made in the lovely valley of the Connecticut. In the quaint language of his day, he "rested from his labors." No monument marks his grave in Hadley, but Mount Warner, nearby, standing through the ages, is a sufficient and enduring monument to his memory. Time may erase the name, and destroy the stone, but the mountain will remain forever.

On March 31st, 1685, the will of Andrew Warner was presented to the Hampshire County Court by his son Daniel Warner, an inventory of the estate was filed, and the property was distributed as directed by the will. There is so much of interest connected with the life of Andrew Warner on the part of all of his descendants, that we give his will in full.

Immediately following the will is an inventory of the property which consists of real estate, clothing, household goods, grain and stock of a total value of £365–11–4. The real estate consisted of nine parcels as follows:

"4 acres Ld in Hoccanum at 201	£020-00-00

12 acres of Land Over ye River at 551	055-00-00"

The will of Andrew Warner mentioned nine children, each of whom received legacies. Five of the number receive only ten shillings each, probably for the reason that they had been provided for by earlier gifts. The widow, Esther, received £100 which was over one-fourth of the estate, besides annual payments during her life of eighty shillings, the use of one-half of the dwelling house and lot, ten loads of wood and other supplies. The only gift not to his immediate family was five pounds to Mary Taylor, the daughter of his wife Esther by her first marriage. It is probable that she came into the family with her mother as a little girl, and this gift was a special token of his affection for her.

It has generally been considered that Jacob, the youngest child of Andrew Warner, was the son of his second wife Esther, though the reasons for this view are not entirely conclusive. Andrew Warner in his will directs Jacob to pay "forty shillings annually or yearly to his mother, Easter Werner"; but in the next paragraph he uses the same language in reference to Daniel who was a young man at the time of his father's removal to Hadley and one of the signers of the Hadley agreement. A stronger proof is found in the fact that after the death of Esther Werner, in March, 1693, a bond was filed in the settlement of her estate by Thomas Selden, Joseph Selden and Jacob Warner, "Sons to Easter Werner alias Selding of Hadly deceased." On the other hand, Jacob did not receive any of Esther Warner's estate, but it was divided between four of her children by her first marriage, Joseph Selden the eldest

receiving £36 and the others £18 each.

No record of the birth of any of the children of Andrew Warner has been found so that our knowledge of them is not accurate. In the will of Mary Warner, the mother of Andrew Warner, made May 12, 1627, she gives twenty shillings to "the Two Children of Andrew my sonne," showing that Andrew then had two children, and as he was made the sole executor of the will, he must have been living in England at that time. In the will of Andrew Warner he mentions "My daughter Pratt." This is believed to be Hannah Warner, the wife of Daniel Pratt of Hartford. In the graveyard of the First Church of Hartford is a tombstone to the memory of Hannah, wife of Daniel Pratt, who died September 3d, 1682, aged about 50 years. This would indicate that she was born in 1632 at the time Andrew was living in Cambridge, Mass. The term "about 50" is, however, rather elastic, and it is possible that she may have been born one or two years earlier or later. It is probable that the two children mentioned in the will of Mary Warner were Mary and Andrew, and it is quite probable that the next two sons, Robert and John, were also born before the removal to America. The date and place of Daniel's birth are altogether uncertain. If Hannah's age and date of death are correctly given on the tombstone, it is probable that Daniel is younger than Hannah instead of older, as has been heretofore assumed.

"I Andrew Werner of Hadley in the Countie of Hampshire in New England being through ye mercy of God Sound in mynde & Memory doe make & Ordeine this as my last Will & Testiment in Manner & fforme ffollowing

"Impr I Comitt my self Soule & Body into the hands of almightie God my havenly ffather & into ye Armes of the Lord Jesus xt my Only Redeemer & Saviour On whome On whome I desire Ever to repose & Stedfastly to beleive & my Body I leave it to bee interred with Christian & Comely buriall in Assured hope of a blessed Resurrection through the mercy of God Unto Eternall life at the Glorious appeareing of the Lord Jesus christ at the Last day, And ffor that Outward Estate the Lord hath Blessed me with all My Will is that after my just debts are payd & funerall Expences discharged as ffollowes

"It I give to my Loveing Wife Easter Werner according to a former agreem^t Signed Under my hand One hundered Pounds to bee payd Out of my Moveable Estate Viz household Goods & Chattells & in case the s^d Moveables amounts not to y^e Sum afores^d then to be made up in Other Estate & this to be at her free & absolute dispose to her & to her heir^rs for Eyer

"I give to my Wife ye One half of my Now dwelling house to be for her use & improvement dureing the tyme of her Natureall life as alsoe the use of half the Garden plot ajoyneing to the sayd house as alsoe the use of half the Ortchard with the fruites thereon & the use of half the Yards ajoyneing to ye house all these to be for her use dureing the tyme of her Natureall life

"I give to my Son Jacob Werner ye One half of my dwelling house and ye whole of the sd house at his mothers decease with the house-lot Containeing Eight acres with all Edifices & buildings thereon to be to him & his heir for Ever

"I give to my Son Jacob Werner alsoe ten acres of Meadow land lyeing in ye great meadow belonging to Hadley Viz my Six acre Lot of plowing Land & four acres of grass Land lyeing in the Swamp or Aquevitie Comonly Soe called to be to him & his heir for Ever, That is the heir begotten by ye body of the sayd Jacob Werner, provided alsoe & withall that the sd Jacob Werner hee his heir Executor & Assignes truely pay fortie shillings Anuallie or yearelie to his Mother Easter Werner dureing the tyme of her Natureall Life as alsoe to Cowes for his sd Mother & to keepe & provide winter meate for them & all this dureing the Term of her Natureall life as alsoe anualy to bring home to his sayd Mother ten Loads of Wood dureing her life

"I give to my Son Dan^{II} Werner all my Land lyeing Over the great River in great ponset & litle ponset being twelve acres more or Less to be to him & to his heir^rs for Ever he paying within a Yeare after my decease ten pounds to his sister Ruth Werner & alsoe fortie shillings Anuallie to his Mother Easter Werner dureing the tyme of her Natureall Life

"I give to my Son Isaack Werner the One half of my alotment in

Hoccanum to be to him & his heir's for Ever

"I give to my Daughter Ruth Werner fowr acres of Meadow in the great Meadow abutting against the Middle high way to be to her & to her heir for Ever,

"I give to my Son Andrew Werner ten shillings
"I give to my Son Robert Werner ten shillings
"I give to my Son John Werner ten shillings

"I give to my Daughter Hills ten shillings & to my Daughter Pratt I give

ten shillings

"And my Will is that if my Moveables make not up ye hundered pound above Expressed to bee payd to my Wife it shall bee made up Out of the Other half of my Land in Hoccanum & of that two acres & One fowrth ajoyneing to the burieing place the Rest of what Remaynes of sd prsells I Leave to my Executors Only paying Out five Pounds which I give to Mary Taylor the wife of John Taylor

"And of this My present Testiment, I make & Ordaine my deere Wife Easter Werner and my Loveing Son Dan¹¹ Werner as mine Executors Revokeing & adnulling all & any Other Testiments, Wills, Legacies, bequeasts, Executors by me in any Wise before this tyme made, Named, Willed & bequeathed as Witness my hand & Seale this Eighteenth day of June Anno

domini One Thousand Six hundered Eightie One

"Sealed & delivered & Subscribed in ve prence & Witness of

Andrew Werner
To wch Instruemt was a Seale afixt"

SECOND GENERATION

2 MARY² WARNER, daughter of Andrew¹ Warner, was doubtless born in England before the removal of the family to this country. Her name has appeared as Mercy in some of the records. Owing to the peculiarities of the writing of some of the early scribes, the two names are easily confused, Mercy

often being spelled Marcy.

She was first married in Hartford, Conn., January 22, 1645-6, to JOHN STEEL, JR., who died in 1653, in Farmington, Conn. "John Steel was maryed To Maryy Warner on the Twenty & Two of Jenrur one Thousand Six hundred forty & five." (Conn. Hist. Soc., vol. 14, 606.) He was son of John Steel, who married at Fairstead, near Braintree, England, Rachel Talcott, daughter of John and Anne (Skinner) Talcott, and sister of John Talcott, Jr., one of the early proprietors of Hartford. John Steel, Sr., was one of the original proprietors of Hartford and was secretary of the colony from 1634 to 1639. For a complete record see "A Genealogical history of John and George Steele, settlers of Hartford"; Albany, 1862.

Mary Warner married (2) WILLIAM HILLS, who was born in England, came in the ship Lyon, arriving in Boston, September, 1632, and died July, 1683, probably in Hartford, as his will was probated there December 6, 1683. He married (1) Phillis Lyman, (2) after 1648, Mrs. Richard Risley, the date of whose death is not known, (3) Mary Warner. He had children: William, b. 1646; John, b. 1648; Joseph, b. 1650; Benjamin; Susannah, b. 1651; Mary, b. 1654; Lieutenant Jonathan, b. in Hartford, about 1665, d. there Sept. 29, 1727; Hannah, and Sarah. It is possible that some of these were by Mary Warner. The will of William Hills, Sr., of Hoccanum, within the township of Hartford, dated February 21, 1680-1, mentions his wife Mary, sons William, Jonathan, Joseph, and Benjamin, and daughters Mary Hills, Sarah Ward, and Susannah Kilbourn. (Manwaring's Early Conn. Probate, vol. 1, p. 321.) See also Hills Family in America, N. Y., 1906, p. 2, etc.

Farmington; not married.

Samuel Steel, b. March 15, 1652; d. 1710; resided in Hartford; m. Sept. 16, 1680, Mercy Bradford, b. Sept. 2, 1660; d. 1720; daughter of Deputy Governor William and Alice (Richards) Bradford, and granddaughter of William Bradford, who came in the Mayflower, and his second wife, Mrs. Alice (Reynor) Southworth. Children of Samuel and Mercy (Bradford) Steel: i. Thomas, b. Sept. 9, 1681; d. 1757; resided in West Hartford; m. May 10, 1709, Susannah Webster, b. April 25, 1686, d. Nov. 27, 1757, daughter of Deacon Jonathan³ and Dorcas (Hopkins) Webster (Robert², John¹), and had eight children. ii. Samuel, b. Feb. 15, 1684-5; d. 1710; not married. iii. Jerusha (twin with Samuel), b. Feb. 15, 1684-5; m. - Smith and resided in Hartford. iv. William, b. Feb. 20, 1687; d. in Hartford, 1713; not married. v. Abiel, b. Oct. 8, 1693; m. Dec. 25, 1712, John Webster, who resided in Southington, Conn. vi. Daniel, b. April 3, 1697; d. May 28, 1770, in West Hartford; m. 1725, Mary Hopkins, and had six children. vii. Eliphalet, b. June 23, 1700; d. July, 1773; m. Catharine Marshfield, who died in West Hartford, June 7, 1788, and had eleven children. Fourth of these eleven was Mercy Steel, bapt. Oct. 8, 1727, who married Noah⁵ Webster, b. 1722 (Daniel⁴, John³, Robert², Governor John¹ of Hartford, b. in Warwickshire, England). Noah⁵ and Mercy (Steel) Webster were parents of the more celebrated Noah Webster, and among their descendants of the present generation are Paul Leicester Ford, Worthington C. Ford, Gordon L. Ford, and Mrs. Roswell Skeel, Jr.

ANDREW² WARNER, son of Andrew¹ Warner, may have been born in England before his father's removal to America, but no record of the date of his birth has been found. His marriage occurred in 1653, thus indicating 1625-30 as the approximate date of his birth. He died in Middletown, Conn., January 26, 1681-2. At the time of his marriage he was called of Hartford and his name is among the list of troopers from Hartford under Major John Mason, March 11, 1657-8. (Public records of Conn., 1:309.) Later he settled in Middletown and was a land-holder there as early as 1666. With his brothers, Robert and John, and their wives, Andrew and his wife Rebecca signed the covenant, "the 4th of the 9th mo 1668," the date of the beginning of the records of the Middletown Church. According to the old-time system of reckoning this would be November 4, 1668. The wives of Andrew Warner and Robert Warner were admitted to full membership in the church, March 18, 1669.

Some of Andrew Warner's property was described as situated in the district "commonly called Wongum." The inventory of his estate February 20, 1681, amounted to £329, 05, 03, a considerable sum for that time. Administration papers were granted on March 2d to the widow Rebecca, John Warner and Robert Warner, and the estate was divided on April 2d, 1684, the eldest son receiving £86, the others smaller amounts. The list of heirs, as given in 1681, was: Andrew, aged 19; John, 11; Joseph, 9; Abigail, 21; Mary, 17; Hannah, 15; Rebeckah, 6. (Manwaring's Probate Records of Conn., 1:374.)

It is probable that Andrew Warner's death was untimely or unexpected, as his executrix was empowered after his death to complete the sale of lands for which he had arranged but had not yet signed the deeds. The widow was instructed to give a deed, May, 1683, to David Sage, for property sold him by Andrew Warner before his death; again, May, 1684, a deed to John Hollybutt, for property in Wongum sold him in the

same way.

"Rebecca, widow of Andrew Warner, sen., of Middletown, Testified that at her husband's request, some time before his decease, she had written a deed of gift of a parcel of meadow and swamp to his son-in-law, John Wetmore, but that he died before executing it." The instrument was later signed by his administrators. (Public records of Conn., 1:109, 120, 140.)

Andrew² Warner was married, Oct. 10, 1653, to REBECCA FLETCHER, who died in Hartford, June or January 25, 1715, aged 76 or 77. "Andrew Warner of Hartford was married to Rebecca ffletcher dau. of John ffletcher of Milford, Oct. 10, 1653, before me William ffowler, Majistrate". She was the daughter of John and Mary (Clark) Fowler and married (2) Jeremy

Adams who came from England with Thomas Hooker's company and resided in Cambridge, later in Hartford. His first wife was Rebecca, widow of Samuel Greenhill, by whom he had children, John, Ann, Hannah, Samuel, Hester, and Sarah.

Andrew Warner, b. Mar., 1662; d. Apr. 9, 1726, in Middletown, buried in old North Cemetery. He was a wheelwright by trade. In May, 1717, he was appointed lieutenant of the trainband or military company on the south side of the ferry in the town of Middletown. He , who died Aug., 1726. They probably had married Hannah no children as his property was left to his sister Hannah. A copy of his will appears further.

Mary Warner, b. April, 1664; d. in Middletown; m. - Bartlett. Her children received a share of her brother Joseph's estate, 1745.

John (1) Warner, b. Sept., 1667; d. Sept., 1667.

Hannah Warner, b. Nov. 14, 1668; d. Dec. 6, 1730, not married; buried in old North Cemetery. Administration upon her estate was granted to John Warner, Dec. 9, 1730, and the inventory included also the estate of her brother Lieutenant Andrew Warner, that had been given to her. (Middletown probate records.)

12 John (2) Warner, b. April 8, 1671; m. Anna Ward.

Joseph Warner, b. Feb. 20, 1672; d. June 8, 1745, in East Middletown or Chatham, now Portland, Conn.; buried in the old "Quarry Yard." He moved to the east side of the river in Middletown among the early settlers there and seems to have been a man of influence with extensive land holdings. In October, 1720, he was one of a committee of three to arrange about the tax rates on the east side of the river. He married in Middletown, June 16, 1703, Sarah Hurlbut, b. Nov. 5, 1676, in Middletown; d. Jan. 4, 1765, daughter of John and Mary (Deming) Hurlbut. She was buried in the old "Ouarry Yard" in Portland, They had no children. By his will, dated March 21, 1745, he bequeathed an estate valued at £700, as follows: one third to widow Sarah for life; to niece Mary Churchill, daughter of John (or Nathaniel), who lived with him, £200; to children of his sister Mary Bartlett, children of his sister Rebecca, the wife of John Hurlbut, Jr., and children of Daniel Hurlbut, decd., son of his brother-in-law John Hurlbut, Jr., fourteen in all, £205; to the church in Chatham, £5; balance to nephew David Sage, who was also executor. (Conn. probate records, etc.)

Hurlbut.

WILL of Lieutenant ANDREW³ WARNER of Middletown.

I, Andrew Warner of Middletown, in the county of Hartford & colony of Connecticut in New England being sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God . . . Imprimis—I give and bequeath to my loving sister Hannah Warner, the use of all my dwelling house and barn and all my Homelot and the meadow bought of Thomas How and the Land we call Adams Lot and my Indian Hill Lott—the use of the whole of these till my nephew Andrew Warner who dwells with me, shall come of age and then to assign one half of the barn and house and one half of all the above lands to him, and to keep the use of the other half during her natural life. Also I give to her, after my just debts and funeral charges are paid and the legacy . . . to the Church and that to John Barns; the use of all my household stuff, money, stock, husbandry, utensils, and moveables of all kinds during her natural life, then to be equally divided between my brethren and sisters.

Item—I give to my Cousin Andrew Warner who now lives with me, my house and my Lott at Indian Hill. All the above I give to him and his heirs forever to have use of the one half when he shall arrive at the age of 21

years and the other half at the decease of his aunt Hannah.

Item—To my brothers John and Joseph and my sisters Mary and Rebecca I give all my other land excepting what is given to John Barns, to be equally divided among them, and also what shall be left of my . . . flock at my sister Hannah's decease to be equally divided among them and their heirs.

Item—I give to the Church in this place £10 to be delivered to the pastor and deacons, to be laid out in a piece of plate for the sd. church's use.

Item—I give to John Barnes all my wheelwright tools . . . , also I appoint my sister Hannah with my brothers John and Joseph my executors to this will.

Signed, sealed, and published and declared the names of us

to this my last will and Testament

In addition to what is written on the other side this Paper and Explanation my will is that if my Cousin Andrew Warner should die without issue then what I have here given him shall be divided equally between my brothers and sisters and their heirs

(Recorded in Middletown.)

4 ROBERT² WARNER, son of Andrew¹ Warner, died in Middletown, Conn., April 10, 1690. The time and place of his birth have not been found on any record, but he was probably born not far from the time of his father's coming to America, and may have been brought to this country as a baby. The earliest records of him are those of his marriage and the births of his children entered upon the Middletown records, 1654 and following. In 1665 David Sage pre-empted the town pound of 12 square rods, and it was ordered "that Robert Warner shall forthwith see what the town hath suffered by David Sage's pulling down the . . . and so to get the town rited for soon as may be in that case." (Middletown town records.) He was made freeman, May 21, 1657; was a Deputy to the General Court, October 12, 1665; held land, as recorded at Middletown, January 10, 1665; was on the list of proprietors of Middletown,

March 22, 1670; was again Deputy, January 26, 1686, October 14, 1686, March 30, 1686-7, May 12, 1687, June 15, 1687, and September, 1689. March 31, 1687, Robert Warner sold 42 acres of land on the east side of the Connecticut River, which had been laid out to Seth Grant, his father-in-law. The inventory of his property, taken June 5, 1690, shows him to have been a man of means, with a valuation of over four hundred pounds. The property was distributed to his heirs: Seth, aged 32; John, 28; Samuel, 7; Elizabeth, 30; Mary, 26; Sarah, 20; Mehitable, 17; Ruth, 15; Bethiah, 10. The widow and eldest son Seth, with Francis Wetmore and Sargt. John Warner, were overseers. (Hartford probate records, 5:62.)

Robert Warner married (1) February, 1654, ELIZABETH GRANT, who died December 26, 1673. She was the daughter of Seth Grant who came from England in the ship "Lion" in 1632, was one of the original proprietors of Hartford and lived later in Windsor. She and her husband signed the covenant, November 4, 1668, when the records of the church in Middletown were commenced. She was admitted to full communion

in the church, March 18, 1669.

Robert Warner married (2) February 2, 1674, **DELIVER-ANCE** (BISSELL) ROCKWELL, who died June 12, 1718. "Robard warrenak of Mideltown & deliuranc Rockwell wido that had bin wife to John Rockwell of Windsor ware married by m' wolcott—febuy-2-74." (From entry in Hartford land records, folio 46.) She was admitted to the church in Middletown, July 30, 1681, and, with her daughter Ruth Warner Bissell, she was dismissed from the First Church of Middletown to the Scantic Church in Windsor, August 22, 1708.

Children of Robert and Elizabeth (Grant) Warner, recorded in Middletown Samuel (1) Warner, b. Sept., 1656; d. "in the beginning of November,

1662" (Middletown records).

14 Seth Warner, b. March 1, 1658; m. Mary Ward.

Elizabeth Warner, b. "in the I March 1660"; was living at the time of her father's death. The records given under Elizabeth³ (John²)

may refer to this Elizabeth.

John Warner, b. Feb. 1, 1662; d. Dec. 2, 1711, not married. An inventory of his estate was taken on May 3, 1712, and his brother Seth was made administrator. "John Warner aforesaid is indebted to Seth Warner for his keeping etc. about 20 years, more than £100," an amount exceeding the value of the estate.

15 Mary Warner, b. Sept., 1664; m. Abraham Bartlett.

Sarah Warner, b. March 5, 1669-70; m. (1) Sergeant John Clark, son of John Clark of Farmington. He was elected hayward, Dec. 17, 1694, and the same day received a grant of land from the town. He

died intestate, Oct. 6, 1709, and the property was distributed April 9, 1712. They probably had no children. His widow probably married (2) Oct. 25 or 11, 1711, Captain Job Ellsworth, as his second wife, and was living at the time of his will, Sept. 5, 1750. He was born April 13, 1674, and died Sept. 29, 1759, son of Sergeant Josias and Elizabeth (Holcomb) Ellsworth. His first wife was Mary Trumbull. They were married in 1695 and had six children. (Stiles' Ancient Windsor; Clark Genealogy.)

IOHN² WARNER, son of Andrew¹ Warner, died in Middletown, Conn., June 24, 1700. The date and place of his birth are unknown but he was probably born in England before the removal of the family to America. According to the records of Connecticut, October 8, 1663, he was to be made a freeman on the following day. There is no record of his early life in America but he settled early in Middletown, Conn. His name is one of those on a granite and bronze memorial unveiled in 1905 to Middletown's "Founders, Fathers and Patriots," as one of the founders of the period from 1650 to 1680. With his wife and his brothers, Robert and Andrew, and their wives. he signed the covenant of the Middletown Church, Nov. 4, 1668, the date of the beginning of the church records. The list of proprietors of Middletown, March 22, 1670, gives John Warner, with a valuation of £96, slightly larger than that of his two brothers of the same town. His lot was on the west bank of the Connecticut River, next south of Thomas Rannev's and the middle one of five lots between the roads. He seems to have spent the remainder of his life as a farmer there. His will, made March 19, 1700, mentions the following: eldest son John; John North, guardian to his two children by Mary Warner, Anna and Mary North. Distribution of the property was made to John Warner, the eldest son, Jonathan Warner, Hannah Warner, Elizabeth Warner, John North's children by his first wife, and to Ebenezer Ranney in right of his wife.

Married ANNA ————. Her name is given as Anna Norton in Nash's Fifty Puritan Settlers, p. 62, but this may be an error, for John Warner, the early settler of Farmington, married Anna Norton. The Middletown Church records have the following entry: "May 23, 1669, Goodman John Warner & his yoke fellow Anna Warner & the wife of David Sage in full com-

munion. . . . May 30, 1669 (baptized) childⁿ of Brother Warner; viz.: Hannah, John, Jonathan, Mary, Elizabeth, our sister Sage herself likewise and her 3 children namely, David, John, Elizabeth in ^y seale."—John Warner Sen^r and Anna Warner Sen^r were among the signers of the covenant at the Middletown Church, "the 4th of the 9th mo 1668."

Children, order not known but inferred from record of their baptism in Middletown in 1660

Hannah Warner, mentioned in the distribution of her father's property, 1700, probably not married.

19 John Warner, b. about 1657; m. Mrs. Silence Hand Wilcox.

Mary Warner, died March 1, 1694-5. Married, as his first wife, John North, who died April 20, 1745, son of Samuel and Hannah (Norton) North of Farmington and grandson of John and Hannah (Bird) Norton who came to Boston in the Susan and Ellen in 1635. He was made guardian for his two children Anna and Mary North, who were minors at the time of their grandfather's death. Anna North, b. about 1694; m. June 28, 1716, Thomas Wilcox, b. July 5, 1687, d. Jan. 20, 1726, son of Israel and Sarah (Savage) Wilcox, and had children, Hannah, Thomas, who m. Freelove Bradley, Jonathan and Hannah. Further records of this family will be found in Nash's Fifty Puritan Ancestors, p. 63.

Elizabeth Warner, received part of her father's property in 1700. It is not clear if the following record refers to this Elizabeth or to her cousin, Elizabeth, daughter of Robert Warner. In October, 1703, the court of Middletown ordered that land of Elizabeth Warner be sold, "as much as may be needfull for the defraying of the necessary charges that have been or shall be expended for the keeping and maintenance of the said Elizabeth, she being a distracted person and now in close custodie to prevent her doing mischieff." One Elizabeth Warner married Nov. 22, 1709, Samuel Pease (Hadley Town Records), but she may be a descendant of William of Ipswich.

Jonathan Warner, b. 1660; d. Nov. 4, 1733, in East Middletown (Portland) to which place he had removed about 1710; buried in old Quarry burying ground, Portland. He was a farmer and died leaving a substantial property to his wife by a will of May 22, 1733. After her death, it was distributed, Jan. 3, 1758, to Ebenezer Ranney, Richard Coleman and Jabez Warner. Jonathan Warner married in Middletown, Aug. 4, 1698, Elizabeth Ranney, b. in Middletown Upper Houses, Apr. 12, 1668; d. Feb. (or Sept.) 11, 1757; buried in old Quarry burying ground, Portland. She was the daughter of Thomas and Mary (Hubbard) Ranney, and a sister of Ebenezer Ranney who married Sarah Warner (see below). She was received into full communion of the Middletown Church, July 28, 1695, was an original member of the North Society, Jan. 5, 1714-5, and an original member of the Third Church at East Middletown, which was organized in 1721. Children, b. and d. in Middletown: i. Jonathan, Jr., b. July 2. 1699-1700; d. July 6, 1699-1700. ii. John, b. Aug. 16, 1701; d. Sept. 19, 1701.

20 Sarah Warner, b. Mar. 5, 1669; m. Ebenezer Ranney.

6 HANNAH² WARNER, daughter of Andrew¹ Warner. In the will of Andrew Warner he mentions his daughter Pratt. This is believed to be Hannah, wife of Daniel Pratt of Hartford, Conn. In the graveyard of the First Church of Hartford is a tombstone to the memory of Hannah, wife of Daniel Pratt, who died September 3, 1682, aged about 50 years. As this designation of her age is somewhat indefinite, it is hardly possible to state that she was born in 1632 at the time when her father was

living in Cambridge, or a year or two earlier or later.

Married DANIEL PRATT, born in Hartford about 1639, son of John and Elizabeth () Pratt. He was made freeman, February 26, 1656; was a Trooper, March 11, 1657-8; appointed "to order the affaires of the town," February 11, 1657; held the offices of fence-viewer, constable, collector and other local offices for many years; was proposed for deacon in the First Church in Hartford, March 11, 1686, but was not elected. He was buried April 24, 1691. His will, dated April 19, 1680, probated April 29, 1691, "at present under weakness of body & know not how soon the Lord may put an end to my days," mentions his son Daniel and seven daughters. Several of these daughters have already received their portions and are not named, only Hannah, "daughter Goodwin," and Mary Sanford being designated. (Manwaring's Early Connecticut Probate, vol. 1, p. 499.) For further records of this family, see "The Ancestry and descendants of John Pratt of Hartford, Conn.," Hartford, 1900, by Charles B. Whittlesev.

Elizabeth Pratt, bapt. Aug. 20, 1693; d. after July, 1724; m. as second wife, Nathaniel Goodwin, b. about 1637, d. Jan. 8, 1714. Children: i. Samuel, b. Aug. 22, 1682; m. Mary Steele. ii. Hannah, b. Dec. 6,

1685; d. Jan., 1693. iii. Ozias, b. June 26, 1689; m. Martha Williamson. iv. Mary, b. 1690. v. Elizabeth, b. Oct. 14, 1691; m. John Cole. (See Goodwin's Genealogical Notes.)

Sarah Pratt, perhaps m. as second wife Timothy Phelps, b. 1692, son of Samuel Phelps of Windsor, Conn. There was another Sarah Pratt

contemporary.

Esther Pratt, died Oct. 7, 1702; left a will in which she mentioned her brother Daniel and five sisters.

7 DANIEL² WARNER, son of Andrew¹ Warner, was probably born after his parents came to America. His birth record has never been found and the year is uncertain, although the evidence would be in favor of a date between 1632 and 1635. He died in Hatfield, Mass., April 30, 1692. He went in 1659 with his father from Hartford, Conn., to Hadley, and settled in the part of town that was set off as Hatfield in 1670. Dani: Warner, freeman, Hatfield, May 7, 1673 (Mass. Bay Records, vol. 4, pt. 2, 587). Daniel Warner was appointed ensign to the foot company in Hadley, Oct. 7, 1674, and returned a bill for caring for soldiers, May 30, 1679 (Mass. Bay Records, vol. 5, 239, 336, etc.). He is designated in early records as Lieutenant Daniel Warner. He was a grantee of Northfield in 1682 and was there at the Second Settlement (History of Northfield). With seven others from Hadley he signed a letter to the General Court, sent from Hadley April 29, 1676, regarding the nearness of the enemy (N. E. Reg., 41:202). This was during the French and Indian War.

The settlers on the two sides of the river at Hadley were obliged to do many things separately on account of the treacherous swiftness of the water at the point of crossing. The church was on the east side of the river and the ninety residents of the west side found great difficulty in attending services. In May, 1667, Daniel Warner was one of those who sent a petition to the General Court asking to be set off as a separate parish or society. They had lived on the west side for six years and found it difficult and dangerous to cross. "Our vessels tossed up and down so that our women and children do screech, and

are so affrighted that they are made unfit for ordinances, and cannot hear so as to profit by them by reason of their anguish of spirit."—"When we do go over the river we leave our relatives and estates lying on the outside of the colony, joining to the wilderness, to be a prey to the heathen when they see their opportunity." Thrilling tales were told of the canoes filling with water, or of the worshippers breaking through the ice. (History of Hadley.)

The Court appointed the widow Martha and Samuel Partridge as administrators on September 30th, 1692, and ordered the "property to be devided amongst ye children of the deceased which are fowrteen, the eldest son named Dan¹¹ Werner a double portion, 2d son Andrew, Sarah Shelding, Anna Hubbirt, Mary Warner, Hannah Worner, John, Abram, Samuel, Ebenezer, Mahitabell, Elizabeth, Hester, Nathaniel." (Northampton Probate Records, 3:1.)

Daniel² Warner married (1) **MARY** ———, who died September 29 (or 19), 1672.

.Married (2) April 1, 1674, MARTHA BOLTWOOD, who died September 22, 1710, daughter of Robert and Mary () Boltwood of Northfield.

Robert¹ Boltwood, a native of Essex County, England, came to America before 1648, when his name first appears in the Connecticut records. He settled in the east part of Wethersfield, in the part now included in Glastonbury, and received a grant of a pond with a quantity of land adjacent thereto, which he purchased from the Indian chief. Peckharen. He was made freeman May 20, 1658, and the following year was one of the "engagers" who removed to Hadley, Massachusetts, and became one of the original proprietors of that settlement. His home lot of eight acres was located on the west side of Main Street of Hadley, the fourth in order from the north limits of the settlement. He died in Hadley April 6, 1684, and his wife Mary, whose parentage is unknown, died there May 14, 1687. In Hadley Robert Boltwood was a sergeant in the militia, held many civil offices, was a farmer and ran the corn mill from 1677 until his death. Robert and Mary Boltwood had five children: Samuel²; Sarah², m. (1) Isaac² Warner of Hatfield (see number 8); Lydia2, m. April 2, 1674, John Warner of Springfield; Martha², m. Daniel² Warner; and Marv², m. October 24, 1667, James Beebe. Samuel² Boltwood was a soldier stationed at Deerfield at the time of the fearful Indian attack upon the settlement, February 29, 1704, and was killed in the encounter. When the news of the attack reached Hadley, his sons, Samuel, Robert, and Eleazer, knowing that their father was involved, joined the troop and rode rapidly to the relief of Deerfield. The father and three sons were all engaged in the desperate fight on Deerfield meadows for the recovery of the captive inhabitants. In the same band were four other grandsons of Robert Boltwood, John³, Ebenezer³, and Samuel³ Warner (sons of Daniel² and Martha (Boltwood) Warner), and Daniel³ (son of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner).

Robert Boltwood of Hadley, in his will dated 19 Jan. 1682, proved at Springfield 30 Sept. 1684, provides as follows (among other items):

"Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Sarah wife to Isaac Warner ten pounds. Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Martha wife to Danll Warner fifteene pounds. Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Lydia wife to John Warner fifteen pounds Item I do give & bequeath to my daughter Mary deceased her three children five pounds apiece. Item— to

my loveing son Sam^{ll} Boltwood—five pounds. Item—al the rest—I bequeath to my Loveing wife. Son Samuel Boltwood Executor."

(Hampshire Probate, Northampton, 2:18.)

8 ISAAC² WARNER, son of Andrew¹ Warner, died in Deerfield, Mass., 1691. No records of the date and place of his birth have yet been found, although some have conjectured that he was born in Hartford, Conn., about 1645. As one of the inhabitants of Hadley, Mass., to which place he had doubtless removed with his father in 1659, he signed a petition against imposts, February 19, 1668. He was one of the engagers for Northfield in 1683 and was there at the Second Settlement. He

became a man of influence in the new plantation, but when the settlement was deserted after King William's War, he removed to Deerfield where he died.

Inventory of his property was made March 26, 1692 (Spring-field probate, A:8). The Judd MSS. in the Forbes Library, Northampton (2:159) gives the following note:

"Court at Northampton March 31, 1691
Isaac Warner of Deerfield Deceased—Sarah relict, presented
Inventory 59£ free—Land in Northfield & Hadley not prized.
Inventory taken by Thos Wells & Jos. Barnard."

The widow Sarah Warner was appointed administrator and asked that her son Isaac and brother Ltt. Daniell Warner and Jacob Warner be also appointed. The widow Sarah, "relict of Isaac of Deerfield," made a deed November 4, 1692, to Abigail, "relict of Thomas Croffts sometime of Hadley." (Springfield records, A:12, 124.)

In Book A, land records at Springfield, page 8 at the back of the book, among other entries regarding estates, is the following entry:

"Sarah the relict of Isaack Warner deceased late of Derefld who dyed intestate presented to this Court an Inventory of the Estate of her late Husband to which she made oath it was a true Inventory soe farr as she knew & if more estate doe appear she will make discovery of it."

Powers of administration were granted to the widow Sarah and Lieutenant Wells and they were under bond for two hundred dollars. The inventory was taken by Lieutenant Thomas Wells and Joseph Barnard, March 26th, 1692.

Sarah Boltwood's sister Martha married Daniel² Warner, and a more complete account of the Boltwoods will be found on page 43.

- 9 RUTH² WARNER, daughter of Andrew¹ Warner, was probably one of the younger children and born in this country. The only definite information we have of her is in a Hadley court record of 1677 that well illustrates the times and puritanical conditions under which the family lived. An ordinance had been passed forbidding women to wear silk, unless their fathers or husbands were worth a certain stated amount, endeavoring to prevent by law what is best left to those most deeply interested. Ruth Warner defied this old blue law and openly appeared in public apparelled in silk. She and two others, who had likewise offended, were, as expressed in the court record, "presented at court." They were charged with "wearing silk contrary to law," and two of them for "wearing it in a flaunting manner to the offense of sober people." Ruth was admonished by the court and her father was ordered to pay the clerk's fees and witnesses. Andrew Warner was worth £356, a large amount for this period, and one cannot but admire the spirit of Ruth Warner who thus asserted her inherent and inalienable right to adorn herself in such manner as she saw fit.

The name of her husband has been variously reported as John or Daniel Pratt, — Caley, or — Kellogg. The Pratt is doubtless an error for her sister Hannah's marriage. The name Caley does not appear among the early colonists. Of the early Kelloggs but one is recorded as having a wife Ruth. John⁴ Kellogg, son of Lieutenant Joseph³ Kellogg, bapt. in

IACOB² WARNER, son of Andrew¹ Warner, died Hadley, Mass., Nov. 8, 1711 (tombstone record) or November 29. 1711 (Hadley town record). He was a freeman in Hadley, May 30, 1600. The date and place of his birth are unknown. There have been some who think he was the son of Andrew by his second wife, Esther Selden, but the facts on which they base their claim are not sufficient, in the absence of more conclusive evidence, to substantiate the claim. From the dates of birth of his children, it is evident that he must have been one of the younger children, at any rate. His grave in Hadley is next to Meadow Road. He was one of the early settlers on Plot 10, Hadley, the tenants of which were: Andrew Warner, 1663: Andrew and Jacob, 1682; Widow Andrew Warner and Jacob, 1690; Widow Elizabeth Warner and Jacob, 1720 (the son); Jacob, 1731; Orange, Elihu, and Oliver, 1770; 1821 and later, other family names. (Grafton Magazine, vol. 1.) Letters of administration on the estate of Jacob Warner were issued to his widow Elizabeth and son Jacob, May 18, 1711. The inventory was taken February 7, 1711-12, and listed housing and homestead, land in Aqua Vitae and at ve Great Meadow, together with an extensive list of articles, the whole valued at £359, 5, 4. The son Jacob, as eldest, received a double portion, and the other five children, portions of £29, 11, each. (Northampton probate records, 3:255, 267, etc.)

Married (I) REBECCA ———, who died April 10, 1687 (Hadley town record). No children are recorded by this mar-

riage.

Married (2) ELIZABETH GOODMAN, daughter of Richard Goodman and his wife, Mary Terry, daughter of Stephen Terry of Windsor. Richard Goodman was killed by the Indians April, 1676, at the age of 67. He was of Cambridge, 1632; Hartford, 1639; Hadley, 1659. Another of his daughters married John Noble, first settler of New Milford, Conn., where many of this branch of the Warner family later settled. Mrs. Elizabeth Warner probably married (2) ——— Picket.

He had land holdings in New Milford, Conn., near those of his brothers John and Joseph; bought land Jan., 1732-3; sold land to John, Feb. 12, 1733-4; David of Hadley sold land to John of New Milford, Feb. 15, 1748. He received an annuity of \$30.00 by the will of his nephew Oliver in 1779. (New Milford public records.)

THIRD GENERATION

11' ABIGAIL³ WARNER, daughter of Andrew² and Rebecca (Fletcher) Warner, born in Middletown, Conn., 1660; died

May 5, 1685.

Married December 30, 1680, JOHN WETMORE or WHIT-MORE, bapt. at Hartford, Conn., Sept. 6, 1646; died Sept. 1, 1696, son of Thomas and Sarah (Hall) Whitmore. He married (2) April I, 1686, Mary Savage, daughter of John Savage, Sen., of Middletown, by whom he had children, Elizabeth, Mary, John and Ebenezer. After his death she married Obadiah Allen. John Wetmore's name, variously spelled, is found on the land records of Middletown as early as 1668. The executors of the estate of Thomas Whitmore and the administrators of Andrew Warner's estate in 1682 gave him deeds to property. "Rebecca. widow of Andrew Warner, sen., of Middletown, Testified that at her husband's request some time before his decease, she had written a deed of gift of a parcel of meadow and swamp to his son-in-law, John Wetmore, but that he died before executing it. Catherine, widow of Thomas Wetmore, testified that her husband intended to perfect a deed of gift, written but not signed, to his son John Wetmore . .

The will of John Whitmore of Middletown was made August 6, 1689. The inventory showed an estate of about £267. He left six minor children, the last four being children of his present wife, Mary Savage: Thomas, to whom was given the home in Middletown; Abigail; Elizabeth, aged 9; Mary, aged 5; Ebenezer, aged 3 months. He mentioned land given him by his father Thomas Whetmore, and signed himself John Wettmore. "I give to my daughter Abigail Wetmore one peice of Meadow Land at Wangonque containing about two acres, with the pond adjoyning to it, as it is specified in Father Andrew Warner's Deed of Guift to me." His wife Mary Savage was executor, and his two brothers, Beriah and Joseph Wetmore, and his

brother-in-law Andrew Warner, overseers.

Children of John and Abigail (Warner) Wetmore
Thomas Wetmore, was under 21 at the making of his father's will in
1689. There is no record of his marriage but the name appears
among some fifty heads of families belonging to the Middlefield
Society in 1744.

Abigail Wetmore, b. in Middletown, May 2, 1685; d. Apr. 2 or 9, 1738.

Married June 21, 1733, Ebenezer Clark and had two children: i. Abigail, b. Apr. 1, 1734; ii. Jedediah, b. Jan. 16, 1738. Ebenezer Clark married (2) Anna Warner, b. Apr. 12, 1716; see number 50.

JOHN³ WARNER, son of Andrew² and Rebecca (Fletcher) Warner, born in Middletown, Conn., April 8, 1671; died in Upper Middletown, Aug. 5, 1743. His tombstone may still be seen in Riverside Cemetery. He was a farmer, a weaver by trade and a man of influence in his town. As early as 1698 he received a grant of land in Upper Middletown; in 1712 he was Deputy to the General Court; in 1716 he was appointed ensign of the north company or trainband of Middletown, lieu-

tenant in 1719, and captain in 1725.

Records of Middletown contain many references to John Warner, and it is not always clear if the record pertains to John, son of Andrew², or John, son of John². It is probable that this John is the one who took an active interest in the school question and was treasurer, receiving "for his trouble about the school, 6s., Id." He was on a committee to hire a school master in 1714-5 and the following year was one of a "comity to look after the school and to hire a school master or school dame as they shal think fit and most for ye Society's advantage." A Mrs. Smith, who had a husband and three children to care for,

kept the school for three months in this year for £5.

His commission as captain and account books from 1698 to 1743 are carefully preserved by some of his descendants. There are several accounts showing that he received for his weaving about a shilling a yard. His account with the Rev. Joseph Smith extends over a period of years and is particularly interesting. He did weaving in exchange for his church rates at times, or in exchange for 3 pounds of sugar, at 2 shillings, or a quart of rum, at one shilling, and so on down to 1736, when the account ended with the charge for digging the grave of the minister. These accounts show dealings with nearly every family in Middletown, and often show the trade of the people. They were of great value in preparing the history of the town. Many references to the Warners are found in Charles Collard Adams' "Middletown Upper Houses."

The inventory of his property was taken June 2, 1743, and amounted to about £160. Letters of administration upon "the estate of Captain John. Warner, late of Middletown, were granted unto Jabez Warner of Middletown, son of the late dec'd." (Early Connecticut Probate Records.) His homestead

was deeded to his son Jabez, who later sold it and removed to

Washington, Conn.

This places the date of birth as 1659. He was a farmer and died at Middletown Upper Houses. To his son

John he left his dwelling and homelot, seven acres of pasture at Siding Hill, a three-acre piece of land at Pistol Point, and land at Wongunk, "as well what is my own proper inheritance as also what right I have in any lands there or that did belong to my brother Jonathan Warner deceased." He also left property to the heirs of his daughter Mary Wilcock, deceased, and to his daughter Hannah; son John, sole executor. The will is recorded as Capt. John Warner's.

There is some danger of confusion between records of John³, b. 1671, son of Andrew², and John³, b. 1659, son of John², as they were living in Middletown and active at the same period, and both names occur frequently on the land, town and vital records.

There is found in the land records of Middletown a receipt given by John Warner, May 11, 1726. "These are to signify that I have Recev^d the whole part of the estate that belounged to my wife who is deceast who was the widow of Epram Willcock and of her children and therefore I do acquit James Willcock administrators from all molestation from me or my children. John Warner."

Joseph Hand was a Representative to the General Court in 1720, and seems to have been one of the substantial men of the town, serving on various committees. ANDREW³ WARNER, son of Lieut. Daniel² and Mary () Warner, born in Hadley, Mass., June 24, 1667; was a large land-holder in Hadley and removed to Saybrook, Conn., about 1696, where, in partnership with Joseph Selden and John Church, he purchased Twelve Mile Island Farm, situated on both banks of the Connecticut River in the towns of Lyme and Saybrook. A deed of John Leverett of Boston, dated February, 1695, conveyed this land to Joseph Selden, who on June 22, 1697, deeded the Saybrook part to Andrew Warner. Part of the land is still owned by the family. The early dwelling house stood

about one quarter mile northeast of where the Middlesex Turnpike crosses the Warner's Ferry Road, or from the present homestead.

He was one of the first deacons of the Sunderland Church and was a member of the council that installed the Rev. Jonathan Edwards at Northampton. (History of Sunderland.)

25 JOHN³ WARNER, son of Lieut. Daniel² and Martha (Boltwood) Warner, born in Hatfield, Mass., April, 1677; died March 17, 1750. "Sargt John Warner died March 17, 1750" (East Haddam records). Both he and his wife are buried in the old cemetery near the residence of George Rose, in Hadlyme, Conn., about three miles southeast of Chapman's Ferry. He went from Hatfield to Sunderland, Mass., at an early date and from there to East Haddam, and received a grant of land there in 1735-6. There have been published various records of this John Warner which cannot be proved correct: Judd's History of Hadley says he removed to Wethersfield and died in 1714, aged 38, and this has been quoted in later works; the History of Northfield says he removed to Westfield and died in 1714.

Field's Haddam, p. 48, says: "John Warner from Sunderland, Mass., was the father of John, Daniel, Nathaniel, Jabez, Abraham, Noadiah, a clergyman, and Joseph." In 1744 there was recorded in East Haddam, "John Warner his mark for his creatures is a hole in the near ear and a half penny the upper side of the of ear. . . . March first 1798 this mark is Recorded to John Warner . . . the now 2d." Between 1740 and 1746 John and Mehitabel made several deeds to their sons: to John, 30 acres with a barn on the east side of their lands between lands of Jabez Chapman and Samuel Richardson; to Daniel, 30 acres with house, bounded on the east by the Great Highway, north on highway, west on land of Lieut. Jabez Chapman and south by land bought of the widow Ann Selden and Robert and Joseph Selden; to Nathaniel, 60 acres, of the eighth division of land in East Haddam, commonly called parsonage land.

The record of the family is found on the fly leaf of volume I of East Haddam land records: "John Warner and Mahittable Richardson ware Joyned in marage March ye 21st 1716." Dates of the births of the children there recorded are exactly as given below.

His will was probated January 17, 1748, and mentioned wife Mehitabel and children, John, Daniel, Nathaniel, Jabez, Abraham, Noadiah, Joseph, and Elizabeth. (Colchester probate records, 2:88.)

John Warner married in East Haddam March 21, 1716, MEHITABEL CHAPMAN RICHARDSON, born 1690, died March 10, 1776, aged 86, daughter of Captain John Chapman of East Haddam and widow of Lemuel Richardson. According to one account her mother was the widow of Lemuel Richardson and married John Chapman, and the daughter was called by both names. She is buried by her husband in Hadlyme. She and her husband were among the heirs of her sister Lydia Chapman of East Haddam, August, 1838.

He was appointed Lieutenant in the Colonial troops in 1738 and served in the war of 1745 under Sir William Pepperill; was a member of legislature of the colony in 1747-8-9; belonged to the ecclesiastical society of Millington in 1733 and was its first clerk; held many positions of trust and responsibility. By his first wife he had children, Elizabeth, Mehitable, Huldah, Sylvanus, Rufus, Esther, and James. For further records see the Cone Genealogy.

Abraham Warner, b. Feb. 13, 1725-6; d. Apr. 5, 1791. He resided in the lower part of the town of East Haddam, received a deed of land from his father, and sold land in 1755 and 1782. Married Thankful Beebe, daughter of Jonathan Beebe, 2d, who sold land in Millington Parish, East-Haddam, Apr. 27, 1780, to his daughters Thankful, wife of Abraham Warner, and Rachel, wife of Samuel Dean. They had no children, and were recorded in the Census of 1790 as living

alone.

names his wife Elizabeth, sons Jesse, Nathan and Samuel and daughter Rebecca, and refers to other children. The inventory, dated December 19, 1746, gives a long list of clothing and utensils, with seventy acres of land, valuation, \$480. In February, 1747, guardians were chosen for his children: Ebenezer Morton for David, over 14; Deacon John Hubbard of Hatfield, for Joshua, over 14, and for Hannah, Elizabeth, Abraham and Sarah, under 14.

Hannah Warner, d. in infancy. Elizabeth Warner, m. Israel Chapin. Abraham Warner, was lost at sea. Sarah Warner, m. Elijah Wait.

Samuel Warner's first wife, Hannah⁴ Sackett (William³, John², Simon¹), was a descendant of Simon¹ Sackett who sailed from Bristol, England, December 1, 1630, in the ship Lyon, arriving at Boston, February 5, 1631, after a severe mid-winter voyage. He was in Newtown in the spring of 1631, and was settled there in 1632, when, on January 7, he was given six rods of the pale or fence to build. He resided on the north side of what is now Winthrop Street, between Holyoke and Dunster Streets. trials of the voyage were said to have undermined his health, and caused his early death, at Newtown, October, 1635. In 1636 his wife Isabel and her children accompanied the Hooker party to Hartford, Connecticut. Their son, John² Sackett, was born in 1632, the first white child born in Newtown; resided in Springfield, Mass., 1653-9; in Northampton, 1659-65; after that in Westfield, where he was selectman in 1672 and for many years thereafter: died October 8, 1719. On October 27, 1675, his house and barn were burned by the Indians, who drove off his cattle and also destroyed a large amount of other property. He married November 23, 1659, Abigail² Hannum, daughter of William¹ and Honor (Capen) Hannum. She was baptized November 22, 1640; died in Westfield, October 9, 1690. Their son, William³ Sackett, was born April 20, 1662; married, 1689, Hannah Graves, daughter of Isaac and Hannah (Church) Graves of Hatfield; was drowned March 28, 1700, in the Connecticut River near Deerfield, while returning from a wedding with a party of relatives and friends.

William Hannum, one of the first settlers in Dorchester, removed to Windsor, Conn., and, in 1655, to Northampton, Mass., where he died June 1, 1677. His wife Honor died 1680. She was the daughter of Bernard Capen, a native of Dorchester, England, who came in 1633 to Dorchester, Mass., with his wife Joan, and daughter Honor. Bernard Capen was born about 1562 and married on Monday of Whitsun week in 1596, Joan, daughter of Oliver Purchase. He received grants of land in Dorchester, Mass., 1633; was by trade a shoemaker; was made freeman in 1636; died in Dorchester, November 8, 1638. His wife Joan died March 26, 1653, aged 75 years. The original stone erected over their graves is now in the possession of the New England Historical and Genealogical Society, the inscription partially destroyed by time.

Isaac Graves, mentioned above, was born in England, probably as early as 1620, and came to America with his parents, Thomas and Sarah, locating a few miles inland from Boston before 1632. They later removed to Hartford, and in 1661 to Hadley, settling in the part that was later Hatfield, where Thomas died in 1662, and his widow Sarah, in 1666. Isaac was a prominent man in Hatfield; was one of the committee in 1663 to build the church; went to Boston, May, 1668, as the representative of Hatfield settlers in the proceeding for the separation from Hadley; was a sergeant in the colonial militia and a member of the Council of War held to provide means of defence against the Indians. During King Philip's War he and his brother John were surprised by the Indians, September 19, 1677, while shingling a roof in Hatfield, and were killed with several others.

Hannah Church, wife of Isaac Graves, born November 2, 1632, died June 9, 1695, was the daughter of Richard and Anne (Marsh) Church of Braintree, England, Hartford, Conn., and Hatfield, Mass., and granddaughter of Richard and Alice Church, and of Edward Marsh. The Church ancestors have been traced back

in a direct line for eight generations in England, to Great Parndon Parish, manor of Geround, County of Essex. (From MSS. of Henry E. Warner.)

27 EBENEZER3 WARNER, son of Lieut. Daniel2 and Martha (Boltwood) Warner, born November 5, 1681, in Hatfield, Mass.; died August 25, 1749. He removed from Hatfield to Belchertown probably among the early settlers of that place and was on a list of valuations there as early as 1743, with lands valued at £30, housing, £4, and personal estate, £12, s.15. The territory now known as Belchertown was first called "Equivalent lands," because of their having been given by Massachusetts to Connecticut in exchange for Suffield and Enfield, which had been at first controlled by Connecticut. At that time these "Equivalent Lands" were not settled. They were later, in 1727, sold in six divisions to parties from Boston, who induced three families from Northampton and two from Hatfield to locate there in 1731. The settlement was called Cold Spring until 1761 when the name was changed to Belchertown in honor of one of the Boston owners.

Ebenezer Warner married (1) December 15, 1709, RUTH ELY, born in Springfield, Mass., about 1688, died in Belchertown, Mass., about 1747. She was the youngest of the sixteen children of Samuel and Mary (Day) Ely and was a granddaughter of Nathaniel Ely and Robert Day, the emigrants.

Ebenezer Warner of Cold Spring married (2) July 5, 1748, Mrs. MARY BELLOWS of Hadley (Descendants of Nathaniel

Ely, p. 14), or Sarah Bellows (Hadley town records).

Roger Clapp was born in Salcombe Regis, Devon, England, came to America in the "Mary and John" in 1630, was lieutenant and captain of an artillery company, and representative from 1652 to 1673.

"The inventory of the estate of Jonathan french of Northampton, taken March 19, 1714 by Ebenezer Strong, John Kingsley, and Ebenezer Wright, amounted to £107:4:8, and was presented to court May 6, 1714 by Sarah the Relict of Jon. Frentch of Northampton deceased. An account of the debts of the estate was given in by widdow Sarah French administratrix, Jan. 28, 1724-5. Aprizement of the Estate of Lands of Jonathan French presented Jan. 28, 1724, total £103-10-00; In moveable goods at 32-7-5; ffees at 12-0; Totall 134-15-5. As to a settlement of the estate of Jonth Frentch deceased the total sum of 134-15-5 which is devided to Jonth Frentch 29-10-00 for his double portion; to Ebenr Frentch 14-19-6; to Samll Frentch 14-19-6; to John Frentch 14-10-6: to Sarah Frentch alias Coss 14-10-6: to Hannah Frentch alias Edwards 14-19-6; to Mary Frentch alias Edwards 14-19-6; to Elizabeth Frentch alias Bascomb 14-19-6. This estate being mostly in land and it will not be broken without damage, therefore the whole estate is disposed to Jonathan Frentch; he is to pay out . . . to his brothers and sisters as above distributed to them and this settlement was to the satisfaction of the wido Sarah Frentch the mother of them all; this is allowed as a settlement of said estate Jan. 28, 1824-5." [Hampshire Probate, 58:27.]

Coventry, Dec. 16, 1750, in his 53d year, son of Benjamin and Thankful (Sheldon) Edwards; she appears to have married (2) a Sprague (perhaps Ephraim Sprague of Lebanon, whose will, sworn to by the witnesses John, Eliakim, and Susannah Sprague at Coventry, Dec. 2, 1754, left to his wife Mary so long as she should remain his widow all the eastward part of his dwelling house, etc.); for as Mary Sprague of Coventry she married Dec. 29, 1763 (as his second wife), Denis Maraugh, who died in Coventry, Dec. 1, 1767, in his 79th year, probably son of Denis and Jaen [sic] Marroh of Norwich, 1711. Benjamin Edwards of Northampton in his will of Oct. 30, 1724, the day before his death, gave to his son Joseph the homelot on the other side of Mill River and the house, and made him co-executor with his eldest son Benjamin, but provided that "if Joseph removes without paying the legacies he is to have only the lot over the river." sold his Northampton lands to his brother Benjamin in 1725, and removed to Coventry, where, as Joseph Edwards of Northampton, he had purchased 72 acres from Ezekiel Herrick of Coventry, Nov. 4, 1724. Joseph Edwards of Coventry, by his will dated Nov. 20, 1749, sworn to by the witnesses Dec. 25, 1750, and proved April 29, 1751, gave all his property to his wife Mary, except twenty shillings to his brother Ebenezer Edwards. The will of Mary Meraw, wife to Mr. Denis Meraw of Coventry, dated July 18, 1767, recites "The estate now in my possession is estate given to me by my former husband Joseph Edwards late of Coventry which I have a lawful right to dispose of"; she therefore bequeaths "unto John Waite, to Ebenezer French, and to the widow Hannah Star relict of Thomas Star, all of Northampton, all my stock and cattle . . . to my Brother Eben^r. French abovesaid my grate Bible; to the children of my Brother Jonathan French late of Windham deceased, and to the female heirs of my sister Elizabeth the wife of Daniel Bascom late of Lebanon, and to Sarah wife of Eleazer Gillet of Lebanon" other bequests are made to Mehitabel Colman wife of Eben^r. Colman of Coventry, to Sarah wife of Ebenezer Wintworth Junr. of Coventry, to Joseph Phelps son to Benjamin Phelps deceased and to his sister Eunice the wife of John Robinson, grandchildren to William Phelps of Northampton; Ebenezer Colman of Coventry is appointed executor. The inventory of the estate of Jonathan French late of Windham was taken by Nathaniel Skiff, Joseph Hebard Jun., and Joseph Warner, Dec. 1, 1743; administration was granted to Capt. Samuel Murdoch, who gave bonds with Mrs. Sarah French, Dec. 14, 1743. Distribution was made March 1, 1744, to the widow Sarah French and the children, Jonathan, Sarah, Rachel, and Miriam French. 31 ISAAC³ WARNER, son of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner, born in Hadley, Mass., January 13, 1669-70; died in Northfield, Mass., September 8, 1854. He doubtless removed with his father to Northfield about 1686 and when the settlement was deserted on account of the Indian raids, he may have gone back to Hadley for a time. He was a resident of Northfield at the Third Settlement and was selectman there in 1718.

Married in Hadley, January 24, 1693-4, HOPE NASH, born in Hadley, November 26, 1670, died in Northfield, daughter of Lieutenant Timothy and Rebeckah (Stone) Nash. Timothy

was the youngest child of Thomas Nash, the immigrant, and was born in England or in Leyden, in 1626. Thomas Nash was a gunsmith by trade, became a blacksmith, came to Boston first, then went to New Haven (then Quinnipiac), landing March, 1638. Timothy Nash was a blacksmith, came from Hartford, Conn., to Hadley in 1663, and died in 1699, aged 73. His wife, Rebeckah, was the daughter of Rev. Samuel Stone of Hartford.



Hartford Co. 1.235]). The widow Deborah Crow was appointed administratrix of the estate of Nathaniel Crow, September, 1695; February 6, 1709-10, Andrew Warner

late of Hartford, now of Windham, and Deborah his wife. administrators on the estate of Nathaniel Crow, presented an account; Andrew and Deborah Warner were awarded one third of the real estate. [Manwaring, Early Conn. Prob. Rec., 1:435, 7:121.] That Andrew Warner's wife was an unrecorded daughter of Thomas Leffingwell¹ is proved by his deed recorded in Windham [Book D:45]: "I Thomas Leffingwell of Norwich in consideration of the love good will and fatherly affection that I have and bear to my well beloved daughter Deborah Warner. give . . . unto my son-in-law Andrew Warner of Hartford Conn. all my right in 100 acres of land, mentioned in the within deed given to me from Abimelech; June 21, 1704." Samuel Whiting of Windham conveyed to Andrew Warner of Hartford for £6, 50 acres on the southeast side of Auquebatuck abuting northerly on s'd Andrew Warner's land, March 2, 1708; witnesses, John ffitch, Joshua Lassell. Samuel Whiting also sold to Andrew Warner of Windham for £5, ten acres of meadow on the southwest side of Shautucket River, August 1, 1711. January 15, 1714, Andrew Warner of Windham conveyed to Ensⁿ. Thomas Leffingwell of Norwich 58 acres on the southwest side of Shautucket River, which he had purchased of Samuel Whiting. [Windham Deeds D:72, 211, 413.] Andrew Warner of Windham sold to Samuel Hutchinson of Lebanon "one acre on the south part of my farm in Windham and adjoining to s'd Hutchinson's land," March 5, 1711 [D:205]. February 6, 1729-30, Andrew Warner of Mansfield conveyed to his son Joseph Warner of Windham for £50 the "tract I purchased of Whiting on the southwest side of Shautucket River in Windham (ten acres)." [Windham Deeds 8:98.] January 21, 1731-2, Andrew Warner of Mansfield, farmer, for natural affection, love and good will, conveys to "my well beloved son Joseph Warner of Windham" 88 acres on the west side of Windham River. January 25, 1731-2, Andrew Warner of Mansfield (7):424.] conveys to his son Thomas Warner of Mansfield land in Windham on the west side of Windham River; witnesses Elisha Warner, Richard Abbe. [9:27.] Andrew Warner and Deborah Warner his wife of Mansfield sold land there to Thomas Fitch of Boston, October 18, 1723; Nathaniel Bassett and wife Joanna of Mansfield sold land to Andrew Warner of Mansfield, November 26, 1723. [Mansfield Deeds 2:295, 290.] No later deeds are found in Mansfield, although Andrew Warner calls himself of that town in his will dated 31 Jan. 1731-2.

The children of Andrew and Deborah Warner were recorded all together in Windham as late as 1726; and a comparison of

the records of baptism in the Second Church of Hartford [pages 307, 309] indicates that a mistake of one year was made in the case of the first two children.

34 EBENEZER³ WARNER, son of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner, born probably in Hadley, Mass., February 25, 1676. He was a resident of Deerfield, Mass., at the time of the memorable attack upon the settlement by a band of some three hundred French and Indians during Queen Anne's War. In the dead of night on February 29, 1704, the stealthy invaders attacked the little town, overpowered the faithless guard, and assisted by the crust on the snow that had carelessly been allowed to drift against the palisades, they effected an easy and noiseless entrance just before daybreak. The inhabitants roused from sleep were practically all either killed in the fighting there or were taken prisoners, and their dwellings set on fire. The captives were almost immediately started under guard for Canada. The story of this terrible journey in the middle of winter with the snow up to the knees is vividly described by the Reverend John Williams, the aged pastor of Deerfield, in "The Redeemed Captive," first published in Boston, 1707, but in many subsequent editions. An appendix by his son Samuel Williams gives the names of the captives and their fate, in cases where that was known. The minister with his family was captured and started on the march. His wife was unable to keep up with the rest and he was compelled by his savage captors to leave her behind. Her death at the hands of one of the enemy was soon reported to him. He was later redeemed and returned to the settlements. In a few cases children were carried by the Indians, but most of them were killed when they could no longer keep up the pace set by the band, and their elders were subjected to all kinds of tortures.

Among the captives was Ebenezer Warner with his wife and two little ones. His wife was killed on the march to Canada but Ebenezer and his daughter Sarah were redeemed by the party from the nearby settlement of Hadley which rushed to their relief. The daughter Waitstill was among those who never returned and whose fate was unknown. The relief party from Hadley contained several of their relatives. See under number 7.

The desolated town of Deerfield was at once made a military post and strongly garrisoned. The men were pressed into service and those not able to fight were sent to the towns below. Persistent efforts were made to recover the captives. Ensign Sheldon was sent to Canada three times on this errand. One by one, and against great odds, the most of the men and women were recovered, but a large proportion of the children remained in Canada. Many of their descendants have been traced and

among them are some of the most distinguished men and women of Canadian history. Miss C. Alice Baker has published an interesting account of these in "True Stories of New England Captives."

A petition to the General Court, under date of May, 1743, regarding John Smead, contains the following deposition by Ebenezer Warner:

"I was in Dearfield Meadow fight . . . and I see the said Smead kill an indian, & some of the souldiers tock off this Indians scalp & secured it, & I see the said John Smead shoot at another Indian, which he gave a mortal wound & ye Indian died in a short time at the place where he received ye wound or very near the place.

(Signed) Ebenezer Warner" (Mass. Archives.)

Ebenezer Warner also did service with the Thomas Baker

Scout, in April, 1712.

Married January 5, 1689-9, WAITSTILL SMEAD, daughter of William Smead. She was captured by the Indians at the Deerfield massacre and was killed on the subsequent march into Canada.

35 DANIEL³ WARNER, son of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner, born probably in Hadley, Mass., February 25, 1677; died December 21, 1711 (Hadley town record). He was of Deerfield in 1702. The inventory of his estate gave a valuation of two hundred pounds.

Married April 13, 1704, SARAH GOLDEN or GOULDING, daughter of Peter Golden or Goulding of Hadley. She married (2) July 6, 1714, Thomas Horton.

36 SAMUEL³ WARNER, son of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner, born March 14, 1681, probably in Hadley, Mass.;

he was a joiner and lived in Springfield, Mass. There is recorded in Springfield (Land records, T:348) a transfer of property from Samuel Warner of Springfield, yeoman, to Jabez Hendricks of Union, Windham County, husbandman and joyner, land in the lower division of the outward common on the east side of the river, September 6, 1751, to which Zechariah Warner was a witness. He also sold land to Ebenezer Warner in 1754. His will was dated May 14, 1756, probated August 31, 1758 (Northampton probate records, 9:25). The heirs were his wife Sarah, children Zechariah, Sarah Morgan, Mary Mirick, Desire Ely, and Catherine Morgan, and grandchild Abigail Chapin, daughter of his deceased son Samuel.

Married November 18, 1702, SARAH FIELD, born June 30, 1683, probably in Northfield, Mass., daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Gilbert) Field. Samuel Field settled in Hatfield, was sergeant under Captain Turner in the Falls Fight and was killed by the Indians, June 24, 1697. The Springfield records contain the record of the intention of marriage: "October 10th 1702 Samuel Warner of Springfield doth enter his intention of mariage with Sarah Feild of Hatfeild & were published the

same day."

Zechariah (1) Warner, b. July 23, 1707; d. July 12, 1712.

Sarah Warner, record of birth not found on Springfield records; was mentioned among her father's heirs, 1756 and 1758; m. in Springfield, June 20, 1737, Ebenezer Morgan, son of Nathaniel and Hannah (Bird) Morgan, and grandson of Miles and Elizabeth (Bliss) Morgan. He married (1) in 1719, Mary Horton; no record of children by this marriage. Children of Ebenezer and Sarah (Warner) Morgan, recorded in Springfield: i. Ebenezer, b. June 12, 1738; m. Feb., 1766, Miriam Kilbourn, and had Lucius, Philip, Lucretia, Ebenezer, Zelotes, Abiram, Jonathan and Miriam (Morgan Genealogy). ii. Samuel, b. Feb. 2, 1739-40; m. Mary Warner, b. Jan. 31, 1713-4; d. June, 1813, in her one hundredth year; m. May 15, 1738, as his second wife, Thomas Merrick, b. in

Springfield, Jan. 13, 1703-4, d. Feb., 1785, son of John and Mary (Day) Merrick. He m. (1) Eunice Stebbins by whom he had one child. They resided in Wilbraham. Children of Thomas and Mary (Warner) Merrick, recorded in Springfield: i. Timothy, b. May 24, 1739; was bitten by a rattlesnake and d. Aug. 7, 1761. ii. Eunice, b. May 8, 1742; d. Dec., 1808; m. Jan., 1771, Deacon Gideon Burt. iii. Lucy, b. Nov. 11, 1746; d. Oct. 15, 1752. iv. Mary, b. Sept. 9, 1751; m. Lieut. 37 ICHABOD³ WARNER, son of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner, born about 1684, probably in Northfield, Mass., as his father was an engager in that settlement in 1685, and his birth is not recorded with those of his older brothers and sisters in Hadley, Mass.; died in Windham, Conn., January 18, 1767, in his 83d year.

Ichabod Warner probably went to Lebanon, Conn., with his mother and her second husband, Deacon John Loomis. Deacon John Loomis received a grant from the proprietors of Lebanon

in 1700 and settled there as early as 1703-4.

"I, John Mason of Lebanon . . . for & in consideration of three years & eight months service allready served by Ichabod Warner of Lebanon . . . have granted . . . unto him ye s'd Ichabod Warner . . . one hundred acres of Land . . . in Lebanon in yt tract of land commonly called & knowne by ye name Mr. fitches Mile & also to alow the s'd Warner two suits of appariell & the breaking up of two acres of land the land above mentioned . . . Lying on the southwestwardly side of peases Brook . . . ," dated Oct. 26, 1705. (Lebanon Deeds, 2:4.)

In 1714 Samuel Hutchinson deeded to Andrew Warner, land adjacent to that of Ichabod Warner, lying south from Aquebatuck, part in Lebanon and part in Windham. November 2, 1714, Ichabod conveyed to his brother Ebenezer of Lebanon, 20 acres of the farm he bought of John Mason. January 10, 1714-15, Andrew Warner conveyed to his "brother Ichabod Warner of Lebanon", eight acres of the land he had bought of Samuel Hutchinson, and adjacent to Ichabod's holdings. (Lebanon Deeds, 1:116.)

Ichabod Warner of Lebanon bought land in Windham of James Babcock, June 29, 1721. James Babcock of Coventry sold to Ichabod Warner land partly in Lebanon and partly in Windham, November 25, 1728. Ichabod Warner exchanged land with William Allen of Windham, January 26, 1729. Ichabod Warner of Lebanon bought from Joseph and Caleb Downer of Norwich, the mill and property which said Downers bought of Ephraim Sawyer, July 7, 1734. Ichabod sold part of this mill to his son Ichabod, August 6, 1735. Ichabod of Windham and Ichabod of Lebanon sold their farm to Nathan Bushnell of Norwich, January 6, 1735-6, land partly in Windham and Leb-

anon. (Weaver's MSS. in Conn. Hist. Soc. Library.)

An early mention of Ichabod Warner in the public records of Connecticut is February 21, 1711-2, £9-4-7, wages due, probably for his services on the expedition to Canada the preceding summer. In May, 1725, he was appointed ensign of a trainband in the town of Lebanon. The records of Windham show that permission was given to Ichabod Warner to build a dam across Pigeon Swamp Brook in 1727. A meeting at Lebanon, October 18, 1731, considered "the great difficulty the east farmers some of them are under, namely Benjamin Seabury John Johnson Thomas Bishop and Ichabod Warner to come to the sd Town street of Lebanon, Having no Highway thither." Perhaps the condition of the highways may have been the reason for Ichabod and his wife Mary belonging to the church in Windham in 1726. In May, 1732, a memorial was issued by Thomas Badcock, Ichabod Warner, John Johnson, Benj. Seabery and Stephen Bingham, all of Lebanon, regarding "Needful Highwais yn Lebanon for them to travill yn to ye Publick Worshyp of god in ye sd Lebanon." On May 8th Ichabod Warner was one of those residing in the township of Lebanon, adjoining Windham, who asked to be relieved of their rates in Lebanon and worship in Windham, or given a road. (Conn. State Library, Travel, 1:36, 38a, 39, 44b.)

The following records from Windham Probate Records 7:232, 234, 344, 508, give valuable information about him and his

family:

The original receipts of the heirs are on file, with their autographs. These were signed by Isaac Warner, dated "Liverpool, Nov. 17, 1768" (copied Windham); John Warner of Windham; Gideon Bingham and Ruth Bingham of Windham; Nathan Hebberd of Windham, guardian to Hannah Warner; William Ripley of Windham, guardian to Irene Warner; David Ripley of Pomfret, guardian to Jared Warner; Daniel Warner of Dutchess County, New York; Ebenezer Warner of South Hamton, Province of New York.

The family of Ichabod's son Daniel have within recent years, as least, been the possessors of his family Bible and an old coat which he is said to have worn. One of his descendants wrote a description of the coat about 1890.

"About fifteen years ago the coat was in the possession of Joshua Warner, the great, great, great, grandson of Ichabod. Jonas Warner and his wife saw this coat and handled it, the former put on the coat and he says it hung to the floor. It was the longest coat he ever saw and must have belonged to an exceedingly tall and slender man. It was made of some kind of thin cloth of a grayish blue color, was a sort of sack coat without many seams and had nine silver-colored buttons."

Ichabod Warner married (1) in Lebanon, March 5, 1711-2, MARY METCALF, who died April 26, 1747 (recorded in Windham). She was the daughter of Jonathan and Hannah (Kenric) Metcalf and was first married to John Pratt (N. E. Register, 6:175). She was a member of the church in Windham.

Ichabod Warner married (2) February 4, 1748, SARAH PHELPS of Lebanon (Connecticut marriages, 2:44), who survived him and is probably the widow Sarah Warner who died June 2, 1783, aged 78 (Abington Congregational Church records). She joined the church in Windham in 1748. There were probably no children by this marriage.

The cemetery in Windham contains the gravestones of Ensign

Ichabod and his wife Mary, inscribed as follows:

Here lies ye body — of Ens. Ichabod — Warner who — died Jan ye 18th— 1767 in ye 83rd— year of his age
Mrs. Mary wife of Ens. Ichabod — Warner died April ye 20th 1747 in ye 57th year — of her age.

38 MERCY³ WARNER, daughter of Isaac² and Sarah (Boltwood) Warner, born September 25, 1685, at Deerfield, Mass.; died October 31 or 13, 1759, in Hebron, Conn., buried in Gilead Selection.

Some of the published records have given her marriage to Samuel Gillette but an original deed and records of Hadley prove conclusively that she married SAMUEL GILBERT, born

in Hartford, Conn., February 5, 1687-8; died May 1, 1760, in Hebron, buried in Gilead. He was the son of Captain Samuel and Mary (Rogers) Gilbert. He probably resided early at Colchester; December 11, 1718, he made his first purchase of land in Hebron. His will, made September 20, 1754, probated June 16, 1760, mentions 5 sons and 5 daughters. The first children were probably born at Colchester, others were recorded at Lebanon, and the last five in Hebron. Records of this family are found in "One of the Gilberts in New England," and the Carter Genealogy.

Children of Samuel and Mercy (Warner) Gilbert, 1-3 recorded in Lebanon, Conn., 5-10 in Hebron

alogy, p. 27.

Samuel Gilbert, b. May 1, 1712; d. Lyme, N. H., Oct. 16, 1774. He removed to Lyme about 1771, and was buried on his farm on the bank of the Connecticut River; the inscription on the headstone is gone, but the footstone still shows "Honorable Colonel Samuel Gilbert Esquire." During the French and Indian War he was captain of the 7th Company in the 3d Regiment, raised for the expedition against Crown Point. In his will, dated at Hebron May 1, 1773, and a codicil, dated at "Lime," N. H., Sept. 28, 1774, he mentions his wife Susannah and her brother Lawrence Grosse, his sons Samuel, John, Silvester, Gardner, and Thomas, his daughter Elizabeth Sumner, and son-in-law Rev. Samuel Peters; to John Gilbert he gives the "Tillotson farm" (now owned by F. P. 44 JOHN³ WARNER, son of Jacob² and Elizabeth (Goodman) Warner, born in Hadley, Mass., March 10, 1701; settled in New Milford, Conn., and died there December 9, 1762. He was one of the first settlers at the South Farms, so called, in New Milford, about 1725, and became one of the large landholders and a man of influence in the community, in town, ecclesiastical and military affairs. The births of his first two children were recorded in New Milford, January 28, 1731-2, but it was not until February 27, 1742-3, that he was admitted to the church. He was a member of the Second Military Company, organized 1744, captain of the company in 1751, lieutenant of the 5th Company

in the 6th Regiment of the Colony in 1754, and captain of the same in 1756. He was interested in the Iron Works and petitioned the town for the privilege of utilizing the ore in 1758. His house, erected in 1735, was a pretentious one for the period. with a fireplace sixteen feet in width and intended to burn wood from ten to twelve feet long. "On each side of the fire stood a large block of wood on which one could sit on wintry evenings, and through the enormous opening, one could, if inclined to the study of astronomy, get a pretty good view of the firmament."

To each of his seven sons he gave a farm, and built, or helped to build, a house. His heirs, June 15, 1763, were: Oliver, Lemuel, Martin, Eliezer, John, Asa, Orange, Prudence Bostwick. and Mercy Warner. The name is often spelled "Walner" on the New Milford records.

Married July 3, 1727 (attested by the Revd Mr. Wm. Burnham and recorded in New Milford, August 24, 1727), MERCY CURTIS of Farmington, who died in her 52d year at the South Farms, buried in Gallows Hill Cemetery, New Milford. She was the daughter of Thomas Curtis.

45 JOSEPH³ WARNER, son of Jacob² and Elizabeth (Goodman) Warner, born April 2, 1707, in Hadley, Mass.; died — 21, 1743, in New Milford, Conn. He settled in New Milford in 1728, and received his first grant of land, May 25, 1728, west of the half-way falls adjacent or near to that of his brother John Warner. This property was probably at the "Iron Works," then called Newbury, and a part of New Milford. He was a cooper by trade. June 18, 1738, he united with the church at New Milford and the children were baptized there.

On October 8, 1738, there was "baptized a son of John Dean of New Fairfield, called Ebenezer, whom Joseph Walner took charge of and baptized upon his own account." The name is most frequently spelled Walner in the early New Milford records.

An interesting account of this family will be found in "Middletown Upper Houses" by Charles Collard Adams. 54 SAMUEL⁴ WARNER, son of Seth³ and Mary (Ward) Warner, born in Middletown, Conn., February 6, 1694-5; died in 1773. This is probably the Samuel Warner who was lieutenant of a company or trainband at Three Mile Hill in the town of Middletown, October, 1740, and captain of the 16th company, 6th regiment, May, 1749. He was administrator of the estate of his brother Lieutenant Robert Warner and was empowered by the court to sell lands, May, 1737. His will dated June 29, 1773, was probated September 20, 1773. Heirs were his wife Mehitabel; son Samuel; Timothy and Anne Miller, children of his deceased daughter Ann Miller; son Williams John. The inventory amounted to £495. There is in Middletown a deed by which Samuel, Jr., conveyed to his brother Williams John, property received from their mother Dorothy and the four heirs of Robert Warner, deceased.

Some authorities have wrongly said he was an officer in the Revolution and died unmarried, but the data here given shows the error of that statement.

Williams John Warner, b. July 13, 1741, name usually spelled in this way on the deeds found in Middletown. He served from Apr. 12, 1761, to Dec. 2, 1761, in the 6th Company, 1st Regiment, under Captain Herlihy of Middletown. (Volume 10, French and Indian War Rolls, Campaigns of 1758-64.)

55 JOHN⁴ WARNER, 3d, son of John³ Warner, Jr., and his second wife, Silence (Hand) Wilcox, born in Upper Middletown, Conn., March 14, 1718-9, recorded in Middletown; died in Middletown, 1751. His will is found in Hartford probate records (16:187). It bears the date, November 14, 1751, and was probated January 7, 1752. He calls himself "John Warner the second of Middletown, sick in body," and mentions his wife Rachel, gives equal portions to his sons John, David, and Jonathan, not of age, also bequests to his daughters Elizabeth, Temperance and Rachel. Captain Joseph Ranney and "brother" Jabez Warner were executors. The inventory shows a large estate of about £4500.

Married in Cromwell, Conn., April 14, 1741, RACHEL BUR-LISON, who married (2) John Fuller of Simsbury, Conn., and died in Pittsford, Vt., aged 86. She was appointed administrator for John Warner's estate, January 4, 1764, and the following November was made guardian for their son Jonathan. She deeded property to her sons David and Jonathan, March 23, 1771. August 5, 1769, Elijah Wilcox received a deed of land in Middletown, from David, Jonathan, Rachel, Jr., and Temperance Warner of Middletown, and Edward Prouty and Elizabeth his wife, of Simsbury, Conn., land that had belonged to their mother Rachel.

"Vermont Revolutionary Soldiers" gives the following service under David Warner: Oct. 17-21, 1777, in Capt. Abraham Salisbury's Company, on Otter Creek, raised in Clarendon; sergeant in same company, 12 days service, 1781; in Capt. Ichabod Robinson's Militia Co., Clarendon, 1781, 2 days; in list of Capt. Salisbury's Scouts, Oct. 17-21, 1777, at Pittsford. He married Rebecca Smith and had a large family. The boys all died in infancy, and the

56 DANIEL WARNER, 3d, son of Daniel and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born in Hatfield, Mass., March 1, 1693; died in East Haddam, Conn., January 1, 1770. He was one of the forty first settlers of Sunderland, Mass., having home lot number 15, west side. He removed to East Haddam before 1736, as in 1736-7 he sold property there. In 1739 his ear-mark was recorded in East Haddam, "Daniel Warner his mark for his creatures is a half crop the upper side of each ear, April 12." This mark was recorded to Roswell Rogers in 1802.

Married December 29, 1719, **ELIZABETH ADAMS**, born August 16, 1686, in Suffield, Conn., daughter of Jacob² Adams, son of Robert¹ Adams, and his wife Anna Allen. She died in East Haddam, January 3, 1778, aged 90 ((town record), or 88 (tombstone). The inscription in the River View Cemetery, East Haddam, reads, "Mrs. Elizabeth wife of Mr. Daniel Warnor d. Jan.3.1778 in 88th yr."

57 MARY WARNER, daughter of Daniel and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born probably in Hatfield, Mass., August 17,

1694; died at Whately, Mass., August 18, 1792. It has been said that she was 99 years, 9 months old at the time of her death, so this date given for her birth may be a baptismal date. In her extreme age her mental faculties almost entirely failed her, and she became like a child up to about a week before she passed away, when her mind suddenly brightened and she repeated the whole of the Assembly's shorter catechism, questions and answers and proof texts. She was residing with her daughter Mary in Whately at the time of her death. She left 6 children, 45 grandchildren, 98 great-grandchildren, and 1 great-great-grandchild.

Married September 22, 1720, JOSEPH WAITE, born at Hatfield, November 11, 1688, son of Sergeant Benjamin and Martha (Leonard) Waite. He married (1) Hannah Billings, by whom he had two children, Moses and Hannah. Sergeant Benjamin Waite was well versed in Indian warfare and was a brave and fearless guide and leader of scouts, in this way of much service to the colonists. He was killed February 29, 1704, while driving the enemy across the meadow in Deerfield, during the memorable attack on the town. His son Joseph was also much occupied with military affairs and often led bands of scouts. In 1710 he led a band nearly to Canada, their purpose being to reach Canada and destroy the enemy at the beginning of hostilities. They went up the river 120 miles, then struck off for the French River, then to Lake Champlain, where they met two canoes loaded with Indians and a battle ensued. One Indian was killed and scalped; then, being discovered, they started homeward.

The story is handed down in the family that Asahel Wright's mother had been anxious for him to marry and settle down in life. The Sunday after Lucy's marriage to Reuben Bardwell, she attended church in Deerfield, and Asahel told his mother that if he could find a girl just like her, he would not hesitate to marry at once. The death of her husband in a few months made the way clear for him to find such a wife, and as soon as her period of mourning had elapsed, he courted and won the fair Lucy.

59 JONATHAN⁴ WARNER, son of Daniel³, Jr., and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born 1704, probably in Hatfield, Mass.; died in Hardwick, Mass., May 28, 1763, aged 59, buried in the old Cemetery in Hardwick, where his tombstone is one of the oldest. He removed early from Hatfield to Hardwick and resided a few years in the south part of the town. In 1743 he bought a large farm adjoining the Common, land which was in the family for many years. He was an energetic and thrifty farmer and also kept the store and tavern at the south end of the Common. He was selectman for five years from 1738, and town treasurer for nineteen years from 1744 to 1762.

Married August 8, 1733. BATHSHEBA ALLIS, daughter of Ichabod and Mary (Belding) Allis of Hatfield, granddaughter of Captain John and Mary (Meekins-Clark) Allis, and great-granddaughter of William Allis who came from England. He took the freemen's oath at Braintree in 1630, removed to Hatfield in

1662, where he was lieutenant and a prominent citizen. Bathsheba Allis Warner married (2) August 19, 1765, John Burt, born April 13, 1712, died September 14, 1794, son of Captain John and Abigail (Rix) Burt of Springfield. His first wife was Sarah Stebbins.

60 JOSEPH⁴ WARNER, son of Daniel³, Jr., and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born in Hatfield, Mass., June 18, 1710; died in Cummington, Mass., April 20, 1794. Some time before 1747 he removed from Hatfield to Hardwick, and resided on a farm on the road from Hardwick to Enfield, a mile or more from the Hardwick Common. He took an active part in the life of the neighborhood, as is shown by the frequent appearance of his name in the town, church and military records that have been preserved.

Captain Joseph Warner led a company in Col. Timothy Ruggles' Regiment to the relief of Fort William Henry, August 9, 1757, during the French and Indian War. In 1761, as Captain of the 2d Hardwick Company, Col. John Murray's Regiment, he

enlisted for the invasion of Canada.

Slavery, even in the Colonial period, was never regarded with general favor in Massachusetts, yet it was allowed by law, and negroes brought from the Barbadoes and other British colonies were occasionally sold to the colonists for about twenty pounds each. Joseph Warner was one of the few slave-holders of Hardwick, as, on July 27, 1755, Rev. Mr. White baptized one Zebulon,

the son of Philip and Bathsheba, man and maid servant of Joseph Warner. Zebulon is probably the young colored man who enlisted with the Revolutionary army in May, 1781, at the age of 21, the very year that slavery was abolished in Massachusetts.

In 1762 Captain Joseph Warner and several others received temporary licenses to act as innholders during the fair held in the town in May and October. In 1770 he was elected selectman and assessor of the town.

Shortly after this he must have removed to Cummington, for Capt. Joseph Warner was moderator of the first meeting of the proprietors of that town, July 19, 1771, and also at a meeting August 21, 1771, was on a committee "to see about hiring a preacher and to listen to the report in regard to a meeting house cite." It was not until September 4, 1774, that he was dismissed from the church in Hardwick and recommended to the church in Lot No. 5, the town later known as Cummington. On February 3, 1773, he was on the committee to supply the town with preaching.

After the Second Continental Congress, held at Philadelphia September 5, 1774, Committees of Correspondence were appointed, for the purpose of spreading as quickly as possible through the colonies any news regarding the actions of Great Britain. The proprietors of Cummington voted, at a meeting September 29, 1774, that their Committee of Correspondence be composed of Capt. Daniel Reed, Ensign Peter Harwood, and Capt. Joseph Warner. This committee continued until March 4, 1777. The town also voted the purchase of a barrel of powder and half a hundred of lead, for a town store of ammunition.

About this time there was a fad for persons or whole families to segregate themselves and inoculate for smallpox, hoping by this means to avoid the usual serious effects of the disease as it often occurred in epidemic form. On May 25, 1774, the town ordered a hospital for the inoculation of smallpox set up on the southwest corner of Capt. Joseph Warner's lot in Cummington.

All during the war there were frequent meetings of the proprietors, called for the discussion of ways and means of providing clothing and other necessities. Capt. Warner was a contributor financially, as is shown by entries on the records. He was on a committee chosen to make remarks upon the new constitution, May 22, 1780, but the record failed to note whether the remarks were made or not.

By 1790 his family had doubtless all married and left home, as the Census of that year records him and his wife only.

His will, made December 21, 1783, was probated August 5, 1794, and is recorded in Northampton. Mention is made of his wife Rebecca, who was a widow at the time of her marriage to him. To his son Elijah, besides the lands already given him, he left all his land in Greenwich, and one-fourth of his lands on the Susquehanna. Land was also given to his sons Moses, Joseph, and Stephen, and household furniture and smaller bequests to his daughters, Anna Page, Hannah Bradish, Huldah Warner, Mary Clark, Persis Mitchell, and a grandson Timothy Moore.

Joseph Warner married (1) June 19, 1738, MARY HUB-BARD, born July 28, 1719, died March 2, 1779. She was the daughter of John and Hannah (Cowles) Hubbard of Hatfield, granddaughter of Timothy and Hannah (Pitkin) Cowles of East Hartford, and great-granddaughter of John Cowles who came to Massachusetts about 1635, and of William Pitkin. The latter came to Hartford in 1650, was appointed attorney for the Colony in 1664, and was a member of the General Court much of the time from 1670 to 1690. William Pitkin married the daughter of Ozias Goodwin, the progenitor of the large and influential Goodwin family of Connecticut, and his wife Mary Woodward, daughter of Robert Woodward of Braintree, Essex County, England. Of this family was Martha Pitkin, who married Simon Wolcott, and became the ancestress of seven governors, one of them, Oliver Wolcott, the signer of the Declaration of Independence.

Joseph Warner married (2) November 12, 1781, Mrs. REBECCA SPOONER, born May 12, 1718, died January, 1812, widow of Thomas Spooner of New London, Conn., and daughter of Judah and Alice (Alden) Paddock. She was granddaughter of John and Mary (Southworth) Alden and great-granddaughter of John and Priscilla (Mullins) Alden, of Mayflower fame.

Family records and the published account of the Warner family, "One of the Warner family," 1892, have said that Daniel who married Elizabeth Clark and resided in East Haddam was the son of John and Mehitabel (Richardson) Warner, but the present compiler feels that there has been lost a record of an intervening generation. In the record of the marriage, 1769, he is called Daniel, Jr., and he would be 52 years old at that time. No other definite proofs have been discovered, and no record of the older Daniel's family. The older Daniel may have spent most of his life in Sunderland, and had only the one son.

Daniel Warner is recorded in the 1790 Census of East Haddam, one male over 16, one under 16, six females. In 1800, we find him with three males and four females residing in his family. He was one of the founders of the Episcopal Church in East

Haddam on April 26, 1791.

65 JABEZ⁴ WARNER, son of John³ and Mehitabel (Chapman-Richardson) Warner, born in East Haddam, Conn., November 25 or 5, 1720; died about December 17, 1816, aged nearly a hundred years. He was a farmer and resided a little north of the East Haddam line, near Hadlyme. The ear-mark for his cattle was recorded in East Haddam in 1750, "a crop off the end of the off ear, and a half penny the uper side of the same ear." This mark was recorded next to Halsey Brainerd in 1831. In the Census of 1790, Jabez Warner was recorded in the town of East Haddam, two males over 16, three females in the family.

Before his death he made several deeds to his heirs: to Lucinda Willis, wife of Richard Willis of East Haddam, "a certain part of the house in which I now live, viz. the kitchin or northeast room in sd house also the east half of the middle room at the north eand of the house adjoining sd kitchin also the chambers over sd rooms also the one half of the barn standing near sd house it being the west end of sd barn," March 19, 1814; to "dutiful daughter Mehitabel," grant of a "bedroom and ½ little room adjoining and ½ east part of the barn" and certain privileges, December 23, 1811; to Sarah Warner of East Haddam, "guardian to Jabez Warner, eldest son to Jabez Warner, 2d, decd., also guardian to Lucy, fifth daughter to sd decd also guardian to Asa H., 2d son to sd decd, and also as guardian to Mary, 6th daughter to sd decd," August 16, 1814.

Jabez⁴ Warner married May 9, 1749, HANNAH BRAINERD, born in East Haddam, April 17, 1729; died in the fall of 1811. She was the youngest daughter of Daniel³ (Daniel², Daniel¹, of East Haddam in 1649), and his wife Hannah Selden, who was the daughter of Joseph² and Rebecca (Church) Selden, and granddaughter of Thomas Selden, the emigrant. Rebecca Church was the daughter of Ensign John and Elizabeth (Olmstead) Church and granddaughter of Edward Church of Hatfield, Mass. Elizabeth Olmstead was the daughter of Samuel and Mary (———) Olmstead and granddaughter of Captain

Nicholas Olmstead of Hartford.

Richard Willys was appointed administrator of Hannah Warner's estate, March 18, 1818, inventory was made July 7, 1818, and the property was distributed to the heirs: daughters Susannah Banning, Hannah Phelps, Elizabeth Graves, Mehitabel Warner, Sarah Clark, Lucinda Willys; sons Selden and Jabez Warner (Colchester probate records, 8:94, 109, 132, 139).

66 NOADIAH4 WARNER, son of John3 and Mehitabel (Chapman-Richardson) Warner, born in East Haddam, Conn., January 12, 1728-9; died in Newtown, Conn., February 2, 1794, aged 66. He was a graduate of Yale College, 1750, and the Divinity School. He became a Congregational preacher and was settled as pastor in Danbury in 1762, later preached in Hoosac and Trumbull, Conn. In 1781 when the church he was preaching in was taken to store rebel provisions, he bought a farm in Newtown, Conn., and passed the remainder of his life there.

One of his descendants sends a copy of a paper found among the papers of Harvey De Forest Warner, probably written in the hand of Noadiah himself:

Noadiah Warner married September 17, 1761, ELIZABETH DE FOREST, who died September, 1812, aged 75. She was of Huguenot descent from Jesse De Forest, born 1575, who removed from France to Holland in 1615, and was one of the leaders of the Huguenot colony that settled in New York in 1623. She was also descended from John Peet who came from Duffield, England to Stratford, Conn., in 1635.

JESSE⁴ WARNER, son of Samuel³ and Hannah (Sackett) Warner, born May 6, 1718, in Hatfield, Mass.; died in Hinsdale, Mass., May 10, 1793. He was a resident of Belchertown, Long-meadow and Dalton, Mass. In 1743 he appears upon the Belchertown records assessed for taxes. In 1755 was called "yeoman" and sold property to Alexander Smith of Hadley, a farm of ninety-four acres in the Turkey Hill district of Cold Spring (Belchertown). Jesse of Dalton, County of Berkshire, deeded property to his son Jesse of Conway, County of Hampshire, April 14, 1784, land in Longmeadow. (Springfield deeds, 23: 326.) May 5, 1789, he was one of the members at the organization of the Baptist Church of Whately, which was made up of those who had withdrawn from the Congregational Church and settled in the western part of the town. Administration upon the estate of Jesse Warner was granted to David Warner of Warrensburg, N. Y., Nathan Warner of Dalton and Thomas Hubbard acting as his bondsmen. An allowance was made to his wife Mary. This was dated January 31, 1794, and the estate was found to be insolvent. (Berkshire County probate records at Pittsfield.)-

Jesse Warner married (1) October 30, 1739, MIRIAM SMITH, born October 30, 1718, daughter of John and Elizabeth

(Hovey) Smith of Belchertown, Mass.

John³ Smith; Robert¹ Andrews, Abigail², m. Daniel Hovey; Aaron¹ Cooke, Captain Aaron², Sarah³, m. Thomas³ Hovey; Thomas¹ Ford, Mary², m. Aaron¹ Cooke; William¹ Westwood, Sarah², m. Aaron² Cooke.

Joseph¹ Smith was first recorded in Hartford; freeman, 1657; had three brothers, Christopher, Simon and William, who settled in the Connecticut Valley after 1640; died in Hartford, January, 1690. His wife Lydia Huit was the daughter of Rev. Ephraim and Elizabeth Huit or Hewett, pastor of Wraxall, near Kenilworth, Warwickshire, England, who was prosecuted by the Bishop of Worcester for non-conformity in 1638, and removed to America, where he became teacher of the church in Windsor.

In 1644 he published a book of 358 pages on the prophecies of Daniel.

Joseph² Smith was born in Hartford, March, 1657, eldest of fifteen children; died October 1, 1733; removed about 1680 to Hadley where he was cooper and inn-keeper in 1696, selectman in 1707 and 1710; sergeant of militia; took charge in 1687 of the grist mill in Hadley which was located in a lonely spot three miles north of Hadley and had been given up by others. With his three sons he attended this mill most of the time during the Indian wars and until his death, but for some reason he was not molested by the Indians. He married February II, 1681, Rebecca³ Dickinson of Hadley, born about 1658, died February 16, 1731, daughter of John² and Frances (Foote) Dickinson, and granddaughter of Nathaniel and Anna (Gull) Dickinson, and of Nathaniel and Elizabeth (Deming) Foote, the latter of whom came from Colchester, England, to Watertown, Mass., then to Wethersfield, Conn., where he was one of the first ten "Adventurers" to settle the place, became one of its richest men, was Deputy to the General Court at Hartford, 1641-4, and held many offices of trust.

Nathaniel¹ Dickinson was born in 1600, son of William and Sarah (Stacey) Dickinson of Ely, Cambridge, England; married in 1630 at East Bergholat, Suffolk, Anna, widow of William Gull; came to America in 1634, settling at Watertown, Mass.; removed in 1636 to Wethersfield, Conn., where he was appointed Town Clerk in 1645, and was Deputy to the General Court of Connecticut from 1646 to 1656. In 1659, with his sons John, Thomas, and Nathaniel, Ir., he joined the Hartford band in their removal to Hadley, and he was chosen one of the delegates to lay out the new plantation. He was also present at the town meeting held at the home of Andrew Warner, October, 1660, at which the laws for the government of the new settlement were promulgated. At Hadley he was Town Clerk, assessor, magistrate, a member of the Hampshire Troop under Captain Pyncheon, one of the founders and first trustees of Hopkins Academy, and a deacon in the church, as he had been at Wethersfield. removed to Hatfield for a time but returned to Hadley and died there June 16, 1676. His son Sergeant John² Dickinson went with his father to Hadley and was killed by the Indians in the (Turners) "Falls Fight," in King Philip's War, May 19, 1676. Two of Nathaniel Dickinson's sons had been slain by Indians the year before and another son was taken captive and carried to Canada, but returned the following year.

In the "Ancestry of Nathaniel Dickinson," the line is carried

back for fourteen generations to Walter de Caen (or de Kenson), who accompanied William the Conqueror in 1066, and from there back to Ivor, a soldier of fortune who appeared at the court of the King of Norway in about 700, became commander of the king's army and in 1725 married Eurittia, daughter of King Halfdan of Norway.

Daniel Hovey was the son of Richard, born at Waltham Abbey, Essex, England, 1618, came to Ipswich, Mass., before 1635, was surveyor and town officer there, removed to Brookfield, then to Hadley, and returned to Ipswich where he died in 1692. Abigail Andrews, Daniel's wife, was the daughter of Robert and Elizabeth (Franklin) Andrews, who came to America as captain, owner and master of the ship "Angel Gabriel," which was cast away at Tammaquid, Maine, during a terrible storm on August 15, 1635. He settled at Ipswich and kept an inn for

many years.

Their son Lieut. Thomas Hovey died in Hadley and his monument is in the old cemetery there. His wife, Sarah³ Cooke, was daughter of Captain Aaron² Cooke of Hadley, a justice for thirty years and captain for thirty-five years, and his wife Sarah Westwood, daughter of William and Bridget (———) Westwood. William Westwood was one of the six members of the commission appointed to govern affairs at Hartford, one of its founders, and later one of the committee to lay out the settlement of Hadley. Captain Aaron Cooke was the son of Major Aaron Cooke, an original proprietor of Windsor, Conn., of Northampton, Mass., in 1661, and of Westfield in 1667-8, a popular figure in all the communities in which he lived. (From data collected by Henry E. Warner.)

69 JOSHUA⁴ WARNER, son of Samuel³ and Elizabeth (Morton) Warner, born December 12, 1733, in Hatfield, Mass.; died about 1820; settled in Williamsburg, near the Hatfield line. The following records probably refer to Joshua, son of Samuel. He made several deeds, recorded in 1773, 1789, 1791, 1792, etc., in some of which he is styled "gentleman"; in 1789 he is called of Newport, Cheshire County, N. H., but in 1791, of Hatfield. His will, made September 23, 1816, was probated September 5, 1820. His land was located partly in Hatfield and partly in Williamsburg, and the administrators were Aaron Cleveland and Elisha Hubbard, Jr. His will mentions the following: wife Hannah; daughters, Naomi Cleveland, Catherine Curtis, Lois Smith, Judith Kingsley; grandchildren, the sons and daughters of his son Solomon, deceased; sons Samuel, Guy

Carleton, and Obadiah, to whom he bequeathed the lands and buildings in Williamsburg.

70 MOSES4 WARNER, son of Ebenezer3 and Ruth (Elv) Warner, born May 13, 1717 (Hatfield records), or June 27, 1717, probably in Hatfield, Mass.; died January 9, 1759, in Belchertown, Mass. He settled in Belchertown, then known as Cold Spring, before 1743, and perhaps immediately after his marriage in 1739. The first mention of him as a land owner in Belchertown is on a list of 1743, when he owned land valued at £7, housing, £1, 10s., personal estate, £9, 8s. On December 7, 1747, he was appointed one of three who are to cut and draw firewood for the pastor. October 12, 1750, he appears as a member of the church and one of the town committee. January 22, 1753, he was appointed one of a committee of three, "to take care of disorderly persons on the Sabbath." In 1755 and later, he was officially paid from two to three shillings a night for keeping the council's horses over night, and after February 16, 1756, he was called Sergeant Moses Warner, although no special service or appointment to this office is noted. Late in the year 1756 he was on a committee to oversee the mending of the "great rode through the town from Hadley to Brookfield."

There is on record in Springfield, Mass., a deed by which Eli Warner of Hatfield, laborer, Moses Warner of Hatfield, laborer, Jonathan Warner of Belchertown, joiner, and Submit Warner of Belchertown, convey to their brother Seth Warner of Belchertown, land which they had received from their father Moses

Warner of Belchertown, and which "our said Honored father deceased owned and held by virtue of deeds from his honored father Ebenezer Warner of Cold Spring formerly now Belchertown long since deceased and of his brother Ebenezer Warner of said Belchertown and which our grandfather Ebenezer Warner held by deed from Ebenezer Marsh of Hadley." The land was located in Belchertown and the deed was signed November 24, 1780, by Jonathan, Submit (mark), and Ely Warner. In other deeds of 1747 and 1757, the father Moses is described as a husbandman of Cold Spring.

James Porter of Hatfield was appointed administrator of his estate and guardian to the older children, Seth, Phinehas and Martha, April 3, 1759. His brother Ebenezer was appointed guardian, November 11, 1762, to his children, Jonathan, Sarah, Moses, Submit and Ichabod, minors under the age of 14. Eli, aged over 14, on November 3, 1767, chose Moses Hannum as his guardian. The estate was settled April 5, 1768, when £375, 5s. were equally divided between Seth, Eli, Jonathan, Moses, Ichabod, Martha, Sarah and Submit, "saving that Seth Warner the eldest son is to have a double share."

71 EBENEZER4 WARNER, son of Ebenezer3 and Ruth (Ely) Warner, born in Hatfield, Mass., July 29, 1729, Old Style: died in Belchertown, Mass., in 1812, aged 83. He doubtless removed early with his father to Belchertown before 1743, and his name is found frequently on the town records in various capacities. He was an inn-keeper; was elected fence-viewer at the first town meeting, September 30, 1761; was first selectman, 1788-9, second selectman, 1791. The Census of 1790 notes him with one male over 16, one under 16, three females in the family. In 1800 he is listed with a family of four. He died within twenty-four hours of the death of his wife, and the death of the wife of his son Elisha, with whom these parents lived, occurred the same day. His will was made August 21, 1806, probated April 14, 1812. The inventory showed an estate of over \$2700. The property was left to his wife, Dinah, daughters Jerusha, Molly, Miriam, sons Elisha and Phineas.

His name occurs frequently on the land records of those towns, beginning with a deed from his father, Andrew of Mansfield, in 1731, "in consideration of natural affection, love and good will to Thomas Warner, his son, of town, county and colony aforesaid." By the will of his father, January 31, 1731, he received property. In a deed of January 30, 1734, to Daniel Allen, he is described as of the town of Windham. In a mortgage transaction of 1738-41, he is also of Windham, but in a deed of 1742, he is called of Mansfield. Again in 1747, Joseph Warner of Windham deeds property to Thomas of the same place. The papers pertaining to the settlement of his estate are recorded in Pomfret, Conn. William Warner of Windham was the administrator and the final division was made May 3, 1760, upon motion of Eleazer Warner, eldest son of Thomas.

It seems most probable that the following records of a Daniel Warner who settled in Wilbraham, Mass., are of this Daniel⁴. Daniel Warner of Wilbraham died in 1774, aged 66. (Centennial of Wilbraham, p. 310.) Administration on his estate was granted August 2, 1774, to his son Jesse Warner.

81 ICHABOD* WARNER, JR., son of Ichabod³ and Mary (Metcalf) Warner, born December 10, 1712, recorded in Lebanon, Conn., baptized First Church, Lebanon, July 16, 1712 (1712-3?); died in Windham, Conn. He received land lying between Windham and Lebanon by deed from his father in 1734, also a share in mill property. As his wife is said to have been of a Long Island family, the following records of Brookhaven, Long Island, must be of this Ichabod: 1741, town assessment, Icobud Warner, 1s., 5½ d.; Samuel D'Honneur of Brookhaven in will of March 5, 1844-5, mentions "land I bought of Ickabud Warner" (Abstract of Brookhaven Wills). He was not assessed there in 1749, so probably returned to Windham before that date. He may have been the proprietor of the ferry across the Connecticut in 1769 (Acts and laws of Connecticut, 4th revision, 2d edition, 1769, p. 345).

"An Act for Stating the fare of the Ferry called Warner's Ferry, on Connecticut River. Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the Fare of the said Ferry shall be for a Man and Horse, Three Pence, for a Footman, One Penny, for a lead Horse, One Penny Halfpenny, for an Ox or other Neat Kine, Two Pence, for Sheep, Hogs and Goats, one Halfpenny per Head. 1769."

Ichabod Warner married March 12, 1737, Mrs. MARY (MAPES) GOLDSMITH, widow of Joseph Goldsmith, probably from Long Island.

82 DANIEL4 WARNER, son of Ichabod3 and Mary (Metcalf) Warner, born July 10, 1714, recorded in Windham, Conn., (town records), or in Lebanon (Moravian Church records). He joined the Congregational Church at Windham in 1729 or 1731, and after his marriage resided for a time in Windham, where his first five children's births were recorded, and later in Hebron. He removed with his family to Dutchess County, New York, about 1755, as his son Samuel was born in the Oblong in 1756. They became members of the Moravian settlement known as the Sichem Moravian Congregation, near the border line of Connecticut. According to the catalogue of 1769, the membership consisted for the greater part of the two large families of Warner and Edmonds, living on rented farms. On the expiration of their leases they were attracted by the favorable offers of land on the Mahoning in Pennsylvania, and, after a tour of inspection made in July, 1770, Daniel Warner, his wife and six children, moved to Gnadenhütten, Northampton Co., Pennsylvania, and took up temporary quarters in the old Fort Allen. In February, 1771, they were followed by his son Nathan with his wife and three children, and in October their old neighbors, the family of Edmund Edmonds, joined them. The two Warner families completed their houses in Gnadenhütten in January, 1772, and moved from the fort across the river.

During the Revolution the family remained true to their belief as Moravians, that they should not take part in army service. On September 24, 1777, "Brother Warner's oxen and horse were taken to Allentown," where, to redeem them, he had to pay his son John's fine of £50. On December 12th of the same year, "the married Brethren Nathan and Daniel Warner, both heads of large familes, were forcibly taken to Allentown, and, being unwilling to serve in the militia for two months, and unable to pay £108 ransom, they were forced to cut fifty cords of wood each, in the neighborhood of Allentown, for the use of the soldiery." Their task was duly completed and in February of the following year they returned to their homes with the promise of four pence per cord as pay for their services.

Daniel Warner was a cooper by trade. Tradition says that in

later life he became insane and died in that condition. His spirit was said to have returned to his former cabin, and he was known as "Spookin' Dan'l." The date of his death has not been found, but the necrologies of the Moravian Church during the incumbency of Schmidt include "several of the older members of the church, viz. Daniel Warner, his wife Bethia" and others. He was probably buried in Gnadenhütten.

The will of Daniel Warner, of Gnadenhuetten on the Manony Creek, mentioned his wife Bethia, deceased, children, Samuel, Ezra, Massa (the executor), Hannah, Daniel, John, Mary (wife of Elisha Smith). Boaz Walton and Peter Edmunds were wit-

nesses (Northampton Co., Pa., probate record).

Daniel Warner married December 8, 1739 (Windham, Conn., town records), BETHIAH GINING (JENNINGS?), born in Windham, March, 1720; died in Gnadenhütten, Pa., before her husband.

Children, first five recorded in Windham, next two in Hebron, Conn., dates of others from family record. The dates of the family record are given Old Style, while the town records are New Style, thus accounting for the discrepancy in dates

Daniel Warner, Jr., b. Aug. 15 or 26, 1740. He may be the Daniel Warner who married in Hebron, Oct., 1775, Hannah Sumner (Records of Gilead Church, Conn. Hist Soc. Library), He doubtless removed with his father and brothers to Pennsylvania, as there was a Daniel Warner taxed in Penn township, Northampton Co., 1780-8, owner of a considerable tract of land. In 1777 he was one of the Moravian Church at Gnadenhütten, Pa., and with his brother Nathan, both heads of large families, was compelled to cut wood for the soldiers at Allentown in place of doing military service which was

contrary to their religious principles.

Jonathan Warner, b. Aug. 25 or Sept. 5, 1742. He went to Gnadenhütten, Ohio, from Pennsylvania, Nov. 6, 1799, and with his wife Sarah and six children, settled as a lessee on the Gnadenhütten tract west of the Tuscarawas river. It is recorded in the records of the Beersheba Moravian Church that, during September and October of 1805, Jonathan Warner filled in the chinks of the new building that was erected that year and stood one mile west of Gnadenhütten. He was married in Gnadenhütten, Pa., Sept. 18, 1774, to Sarah Everit. The new chapel was dedicated on Sept. 17, 1774, and the following day in the new chapel "was performed the marriage ceremony of the single brother Jonathan Warner with the single sister Sarah Everit." No list of their children has been found, but at least six were born before 1799.

John Warner, b. Aug. 5, 1758, in Sichem, Dutchess Co., N. Y.; d. in Bethlehem, Pa., 1797. He learned the carpenter's trade and worked

at Gnadenhütten, Pa., and at Bethlehem.

83 ISAAC⁴ WARNER, son of Ichabod³ and Mary (Metcalf) Warner, born January 4, 1717 (Lebanon town record), or January 11, 1716 (family record). He resided in Windham, was a tavern-keeper and a man of some prominence as is shown by these records from Connecticut Colonial Records (10; 176, 463).

"Upon the memorial of Isaac Warner of Windham showing that on or about the 12th of November 1752 he had 3. £ 3 bills new tenor of this Colony and about forty sh. new tenor bills more, and that his pocket-book, in which were said bills, by accident fell into the fire and said bills were all consumed and burnt up" . . . The Assembly ordered the Treasurer of the Colony to pay him £ 11 in bills of this Colony new tenor.

"Isaac Warner declares that 3 men of Windham are suspected of having counterfeit bills in their possession & he is apptd. to pursue them and search for counterfeit money at the expense of Colony," February, 1756. The fol-

lowing May he returns a bill for £ 9 for his services.

Married October 11, 1739, recorded in Windham, ANN DAVI-SON. In 1760 she was granted a license to keep a tavern in Windham.

He had a powder horn that had been made for him and was handed down to the family of his nephew Andrew Warner, who was a teamster in the War of 1812. The horn was engraved with the words, "Andrew Warner His horn made at Cambridge Nov. 24. A. D. 1775." It bore a picture of the liberty pole and flag at Prospect Hill, a fort, gunboats, British and American soldiers, birds, flags and other emblems.

84 NATHANIEL⁴ WARNER, son of Ichabod³ and Mary (Metcalf) Warner, born February 18, 1722, recorded in Lebanon, Conn.; died April 12, 1807, recorded in Windham, Conn. He was recorded in the 1790 Census of Windham with a family of two males over 16, two males under 16, and seven females. He and his wife joined the church at Windham in 1750 or 1751. The family record is in the possession of George D. Wells of Windham, a descendant.

His will is on file in Windham, dated April 2, 1807, in which he called himself "stricken in years." To beloved wife Elizabeth improvement of one-half the real estate; to son Elnathan, all real estate with buildings; to daughter Elizabeth, wife of Eleazer Hibbard £50; to five children of daughter Huldah Fitch. £10; to two daughters Azubah and Tryphena, £10 each; son Elnathan, executor; witnesses, Zachariah Howes, David Howes, and Hezekiah Manning. The will was sworn to by the first two witnesses April 17, 1807, probated April 22, 1807. Receipts were signed by the following heirs: Elizabeth Warner, widow, Windham, July 3, 1807; Eleazer Hibbard and Elizabeth Hibbard. Windham, June 24, 1807, with Sarah Warner and Lydia Warner, junr., witnesses; Tryphena Young, Windham, March 30, 1808; Azuba Maxwell, Windham, March 19, 1808; grandchild, Nath¹¹ Fitch of Verona, N. Y., January 29, 1810; grandchild, Jesse Fitch Jun. January 11, 1810 (no place given); grandchild, William Fitch, Windham, May 4, 1809, Lucy Warner witness; grandchild, Daniel Fitch, Windham, April 2, 1811. (Windham probate, 15:292, 551.)

Nathaniel Warner married in Windham, June 19, 1749, ELIZ-ABETH WEBB, who died in Windham, November 27, 1812, in her ooth year.

85 DR. TIMOTHY* WARNER, son of Ichabod³ and Mary (Metcalf) Warner, born December 21, 1724, recorded in Lebanon, Conn.; died April 8, 1760, recorded in Windham, Conn., buried in old Cemetery in Scotland, Conn., where the following inscription is found on his tombstone:

Here lies ve Body of Dr Timothy Warner who died Suddenly by a Fall From a horse April 8th 1760 in ye 36 Year ` of his Age. The Benevolence of his Temper his un wearied Application to Business & Exten five Usefulness as a Phyfician Rendered his Person Amiable his life very benefici al & his death Great ly lamented.

He was appointed physician to the "army gone to Crown Point, October, 1755" (Conn. Col. Records, 10:444).

Documents pertaining to the settlement of his estate are found in the Windham Probate Records, 6:162, 7:117, 118. He owned buildings near the meeting house of the third society of Windham.

The inventory was taken May 9, 1760, by John and Hezekiah Manning, and Ichabod Warner, jun^r, and showed a valuation of £633-14-11, which was finally divided among the widow and heirs in 1766. Jonathan Rudd, John and Hezekiah Manning were the distributors, and property was set out to Mrs. Ireny Hibberd the widow and Relict of the aforesaid Deceas^d; to Jared, eldest son; to Hannah, eldest daughter; to daughter Ireney. David Ripley, William Ripley, and Nathan Hibberd signed as guardians of the last three respectively.

Dr. Timothy Warner married January 11, 1749-50, recorded in Windham, IRENA RIPLEY, born February 11, 1729, died February 24, 1804, daughter of David and Lydia (Carey) Ripley of Scotland, Conn. She was a descendant of William Ripley, the emigrant, of John² and Elizabeth (Hobart) Ripley, and of Joshua³ Ripley who married Hannah Bradford, the daughter of Deputy Governor William Bradford and the granddaughter of

Governor William Bradford. Irena Warner was received as a member of the Scotland Church in 1750; was administrator of her husband's estate, and married (2) as his second wife, December 4, 1764, Nathan Hebard, by whom she had three children, Timothy Warner, Elizabeth and Lydia. She married (3) Rev. James Cogswell, D.D., pastor of the Congregational Church in Scotland.

He resided at what was later called Bingham's Mills, which he had purchased from his father-in-law who owned it as early as 1735. The mill and farm descended to his son Roger Bingham. The Bingham Genealogy contains an account of this family.

Timothy Warner, b. Nov. 13, 1763; d. between Feb. 13, 1844, and June 14, 1856; resided in 1844 in Oppenheim, Fulton Co., N. Y. He was a Revolutionary soldier and the pension application gave the following data: Served I month in 1780 as private in Connecticut, names of officers not remembered; 5 months, 15 days, in 1781, under Capt. Vaughan; enlisted in Windham, Conn.; application made Feb. 13, 1844, but rejected for lack of proof of six months service as required by law then in force. On June 14, 1856, his son John stated that his father was dead. John Warner with his wife Nancy appears on the land records of Fulton County, N. Y., as making deeds in 1840 and 1842 to Arphaxed Loomis, Bingham Warner and John Robinson. Bingham Warner and wife Pamelia made deeds in the same county 1841-4. Timothy may also have had a daughter who m. ———Deuslar.

"The 'Inhabitants' are very amusing in the preference they exhibit for the schoolhouse near Landlord Warner's tavern as the place to which to adjourn their meetings. Doubtless the meeting-house was cold; and doubtless Landlord Warner knew how to warm the chilled voters."

Both he and his son were on record as opposed to the establishment of the Second Church of Amherst in 1773. His widow and brother Oliver were administrators of his estate, 1774, and April 12, 1797, his estate was divided between his widow, the children of Moses Warner, the younger, and Mary, wife of David Smith.

Married May 18, 1738(?) MARY FIELD of Hadley, born June 18, 1715, died 1796, daughter of John and Sarah (Coleman) Field,

according to one account, or the daughter of Zachariah and Sarah (Clark) Field (History of the First Church of Amherst, p. 107). John Field was a soldier in the Indian Wars. His wife Sarah Coleman was one of the captives in Ashelon's raid in September, 1677, and was redeemed by Wait and Jennings in 1678. A shoe worn on her homeward trip from Canada in 1678 is one of the treasures of Deerfield Memorial Hall.

89 JACOB4 WARNER, 3d, son of Jacob3 and Mary (——) Warner, born in Hadley, Mass., November, 1716; died 1795. He went to Amherst from Hadley after his brothers Moses and Aaron, some time after 1745; was appointed on a committee to issue warrants for precinct meetings, 1752, and was one of the incorporators of the Second Parish in Amherst. He was surveyor in 1754, and at the first meeting of the district of Amherst, March 19, 1759, was elected fence-viewer. Frequent mention of his name occurs on the records of Amherst for the next few years, and in 1788 he was on the list of land owners.

Married July 29, 1742, ANN FOWLER. The New Milford Church record, p. 25, has this record, "Jacob Warner of Deerfield married Ann Fowler, July 29, 1742,"

Wareham Warner, records are rather uncertain, as there was a Wareham Warner living in the same locality who was a descendant of William Warner of Ipswich, Mass., an entirely different line. The following probably refer to this Wareham: served in the Revolution 18 days in 1775 and three months in 1777, was one of the minute men at Ticonderoga; bought land from Jacob Warner, Jr., in Amherst, April 18, 1791; was in the 1790 census of Amherst with wife and one other in the family.

Jacob Warner, 4th, bapt. Dec. 15, 1745; was probably the Jacob of Amherst, who served in the Revolution; together with other young men was appointed hog reeve in 1772; was one of the incorporators of the Second Church in Amherst in 1773; sold land in Amherst to Wareham Warner in 1791; was mentioned in the 1800 Census of Amherst, one male and one female over 45, two females between 16 and 26, and two females between 10 and 16. Married ——— Hulet of Belchertown.

90 AARON4 WARNER, son of Jacob3, Jr., and Mary in Amherst, Mass., about 1787. He was a blacksmith by trade and settled in the third precinct of Hadley which was later the town of Amherst. His name occurs frequently on the records of the town beginning with his purchase of land in 1741. March 25, 1743, the town voted "to give Aaron Worner thirty shillings to sweep the meeting Hous and to give a Signe when to go to Meeting." Other town records show that the customary way to give the sign in those days was to 'blow ye Kunk," and this was doubtless Aaron Warner's method. He was on a committee to give out warrants for precinct meetings, March 19, 1745, and March 18, 1746; with his brother Moses was appointed to help build the pound, November 3, 1746; was tithing man in 1766; received a grant of land in 1770; signed a petition against the building of a second church in 1773. His inventory was taken December 6, 1787. His son David was administrator, and sons Aaron, Noadiah and Jonathan, deceased, are mentioned.

He settled on the farm given him by his father on Wood Creek Hill in the southern part of the town of New Milford, and was a man of influence and a successful farmer. With his wife he owned the covenant at the New Milford Church, December 17, 1752; in 1772 was on a committee to arrange for draining land so as to prevent the overflow of Wood Creek; in 1776 was on the Committee of Inspection and Correspondence; was Deputy for New Milford in May, 1777; was noted in the Census of 1790, and on church and town records at frequent intervals. This company became the 7th Company, 7th Regiment of Connecticut in the Revolution and he was commissioned captain, July 6, 1775. The regiment assisted in fortifying New York City and was at the battles of White Plains and Trenton. Captain Bostwick was one of the advance guard who crossed the Delaware on Christmas night, 1776, and received honorable discharge, December 31, 1776. Martin Warner gave to each of his sons a hundred acres of land and built each one a house. To each of his daughters he gave fifty acres of land. The house which he built for himself still stands on the road leading from the upper Longmeadow road to the Housatonic River, in Brookfield, Conn. The south part of the house was the original home and the north part was added as a home for his son Lemuel. Lemuel's son Solomon lived and died in this house. Benjamin Ruggles Warner's house stood on the same road near the river and Clarissa Warner Wildman's house was in sight of that.

Martin Warner was a private in the 10th Company of Col. David Wooster's 3d Regiment, Connecticut Levy, in 1759, also did military service in 1751, at Fort William Henry, and in 1758. He was ensign in a battalion raised in the state, May, 1777, and ensign of the alarm list, 10th Company, 16th Regiment, May, 1777 (Conn. State Records, vol. 1, 256, 276). His name occurs frequently in town proceedings and also in land records. In 1780 he was selectman of New Milford and on March 13, 1780, he was appointed on the Committee of Inspection for provisions in the War of the Revolution. He was on a committee to fix a place for and the dimensions of the schoolhouse, December 24, 1787. He was a farmer and was known as "Lieutenant." when he was first selectman elected at the first town meeting of the newly formed town of Brookfield, June 9, 1788.

Married MARY RUGGLES, born about 1730: died December 16, 1819, in her 80th year, buried in Gallows Hill Cemetery.

With his wife, he owned the covenant at the New Milford Church September 7, 1764; in 1772 he was one of the committee appointed by the Congregational Church to converse with those who had withdrawn to form an Episcopal Church and to learn their reasons; was on committee to assist the pastor in examining persons wishing to renew their covenant with the church, 1779; was a deacon of the Congregational Church after 1792; in 1797 was one of the seven New Milford signers of a paper upholding the preaching of the Rev. Stanley Griswold, at the time of his trial. "not at that time seven men in New Milford more capable of judging in such matters as these; all of them advanced in years." He was early a member of a militia company; was lieutenant in the 2d New Milford company, May, 1770, and also in a company that served from February 1, 1776, for two months and twenty-three days; captain in 8th Company, 3d Regiment. May, 1776; captain in the 7th Connecticut Regiment, January, 1777, and resigned September 1, 1777; was on the committee of inspection and correspondence, 1778; on committee of inspection of provisions, March 13, 1780. He settled in New Milford on the farm given him by his father, just below the homestead farm. See also many references in Orcutt's History of New Milford regarding this family.

His will, made March 14, 1799, was probated March 22, 1800, mentions his wife Eunice, son John, Jr., daughters Annice Stevens, Lucina Keeler, Anne Bostwick, Hannah Stevens, and Lois Bostwick. Annice was to receive a larger share than the other daughters "on account of her long continuance in my service." His son John was executor and Elizur Warner and Reuben Warner, Jr., were witnesses. The inventory shows a long list of furniture and clothing valued at about £125, and real estate valued at £475. (New Milford probate records, vol. 3, p. 474.) The family is listed in the Census of 1790 in New Milford.

He was appointed lieutenant of the 10th Company, 6th Regiment or trainband, October, 1770 (Connecticut public records, 13:378). The inventory of his estate amounted to over a thousand pounds and the distribution was made April 6, 1775, to the following heirs: widow Lois; oldest son, John; second son, Hezekiah; sons Ebenezer and Junia; eldest daughter, Huldah, a minor, to whom Timothy Clark was appointed guardian, October 3, 1774; second daughter, Mary: daughters Submit and Lois. The widow was appointed guardian to Ebenezer, Hezekiah, Junia, Submit and Lois, May 8, 1775. John Warner was appointed guardian to Hezekiah, 1783. (Middletown probate records, 3:159, etc.)

Married February 8, 1759 (Wallingford-Meriden records), LOIS (or LOIZA) PENFIELD of Wallingford, who died before July 31, 1815. Her name is found on the probate records of Middletown at the settlement of her husband's estate, and in connection with a settlement made by her children after her second marriage to John Higby of Ballstown. On January 2, 1786, Mr. John Scott, one of the heirs, asked for a distribution, and this was done by Comfort Sage, Benjamin Henshaw, and Asher Miller, April 21, 1787. Heirs were: the widow Mary; Lucretia Scott, widow of the late John Scott, deceased; Mary Starr, wife of Josiah Starr.

II2 JONATHAN⁵ WARNER, son of John⁴, 3d, and Rachel (Burlison) Warner, born March 17, 1750, probably in Middletown, Conn.; died in Pittsford, Vt., March 20, 1810. He lived in Wintonbury from the age of 6 to 14, in Middletown until 18, then went to Vermont. He purchased, in 1772, land in Pittsford, Vt., a part of which remained in the family, at least until recent years. The following year he began improvements on his place, made a clearing and, in 1774, built a log house. The following year he married and intended to make Pittsford his home but the outbreak of the war altered his plans and he entered the service of his country. He was in the battle of Brooklyn, was with Washington on his retreat through New Jersey, and was in the battles of Trenton and Princeton.

It is said that upon arriving at the Delaware River the night before the former battle, Washington wished to obtain a boat from the opposite shore, and called upon someone to swim the stream to get it. Warner volunteered and obtained the boat. Patting him on the shoulder, Washington exclaimed, "Brave fellow," and sent him for a dry suit of clothes. His term of enlistment expired in the fall of 1779, when he was discharged and took his pay in continental money, which, on account of its great depreciation, went but a short way toward procuring an outfit for housekeeping. He paid \$60 for a small kettle and other things in proportion.

In the spring of 1780, he went to Pittsford and occupied the house he had built some years before. After a short residence there his house was burned while he was on a visit to his old friends in Connecticut, and on his return he built another house on an adjacent site, which was used until 1795, when he built the home later occupied by his grandson. "No blemish is left to sully his character."

Jonathan Warner married in Connecticut, January 1, 1775, MARY GRIFFIN of Simsbury.

The Warner Genealogy published in 1892 says he married Elizabeth, daughter of John and Mehitabel (Richardson) Warner, born January 25, 1724-5, and a cousin of this Elizabeth. The Brainerd Genealogy gives the record of this marriage and, as the data is more complete, this is probably the right Elizabeth.

Bezaleel Brainerd was a farmer and lived about a mile north of East Haddam Landing. He was appointed Captain of the South Company or trainband in the town of East Haddam. "As he took command of the military company, his soldiers, wishing to honor him on his promotion, fired a salute, which, by an acci-

dental discharge of the gun, wounded him in one of the legs, causing his death. He died while making his will and before he had signed it. The will was accepted, however, and is now filed at Colchester." He married (1) Mary or Hannah Gates, by whom he had seven children, and (3) Phebe (Smith) Almany or Almang, by whom he had one child. She was a woman of considerable talent, greatly respected and

beloved by all who knew her.

He seems to have become a resident of Hardwick immediately after his marriage and lived at the north end of the Common. He was a physician, served in the French War two campaigns in Col. Ruggles' regiment; surgeon, 1757, and surgeon's mate in 1750. The date of his death is not known, but his inventory

was taken June 21, 1771.

Lydia Warner married (2) November 20, 1777, Dr. JONAS FAY, born January 28, 1737, in Hardwick, son of Stephen and Ruth (Child) Fay; died in Bennington, March 6, 1818. By his first wife, Sarah Fassett, daughter of Captain John Fassett, he had seven children. During the campaign at Fort Edward and Lake George in 1756, Jonas Fay was clerk of Capt. Samuel Robinson's company, and was described as cordwainer. In 1761 he was noted on the town records as ensign. He studied medicine and practiced in Hardwick, Mass., for several years, and also taught school. About 1768 he removed to Bennington, Vt., where he became distinguished as a physician and politician. In 1772 he and his father were among the agents sent to Gov. Tryon of New York to explain the grounds of complaint of the Vermont settlers. In 1774 he was clerk to the convention that resolved to defend by force, Ethan Allen, Seth Warner, and others who were threatened as outlaws by the New York Assembly, and, as clerk, he certified their proceedings for publication. He served as surgeon in the expedition under Ethan

Allen at the capture of Ticonderoga, and held the position under the Committee of the Massachusetts Congress who were sent to the Lake in July, 1775, also appointed to muster the troops as they arrived for the defence of that port. He was also surgeon in Col. Warner's regiment for a time. In January, 1776, he was clerk to the Convention at Dorset that petitioned to be allowed to serve the country as inhabitants of the New Hampshire Grants and not under New York; he was a member of the Westminster Convention of 1777 that declared Vermont a separate state; secretary of the Convention that formed the Constitution of the State in July, 1777; one of the Council of Safety then appointed; member of the State Council, 1778-1785; judge of Supreme Court in 1782; judge of probate, 1782-7; attended Continental Congress at Philadelphia as agent of Vermont, 1777. 1779, 1781, and 1782. He was able to draw with skill and ability the public papers of the day, and was the reputed author of many of them. In 1780, in collaboration with Ethan Allen, he prepared and published a pamphlet on the New Hampshire and New York controversy. Dr. Fay resided in Bennington except for a few years after 1800, which he spent in Charlotte and Pawlet.

Married Nov. 1, 1796, Betsey Doty (see number 117) and removed in 1800 to Enosburg, Vt., where he was a farmer. He was elected deacon in 1833. "He won the confidence and friendship of his fellow-citizens to a remarkable degree, and it was not known that he had an enemy in the world."

Ethan Allen Fay (twin), b. Jan. 12, 1779. He kept a hotel in Char-

lotte, Vt., and died at Queensburg (Fort Ann), N. Y.

Heman Allen (twin), b. Jan. 12, 1779. He was graduated from West Point in 1808; was appointed Lieutenant in the army; served through the War of 1812; soon afterwards became keeper of military stores in Albany, holding the office for several years, then returned to Bennington.

sheba (Allis) Warner, born in Hardwick, Mass., November 1,

1742; died in Greenwich, December, 1837.

Married (1) in Hardwick, September 8, 1762, THOMAS WHEELER, son of Thomas and Mary (Brooks) Wheeler, born at Acton, Mass., March 22, 1788-9; died at Hardwick, July 10, 1804. He was a farmer and resided at Hardwick all his life except from 1770 to 1777 when he was at Brookfield. The Massachusetts "Spy" of July 18, 1804, says, "while giving instructions to his hired men respecting his hay, he felt himself faint, fell into their arms, and instantly expired."

Sarah Warner married (2) December 30, 1807, as his third wife, her cousin, Captain ELIJAH⁵ WARNER, son of Joseph⁴ and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born in Hatfield, December 14, 1738; died there January 24, 1819; see number 122. She had no

children by this marriage.

A more complete account of the Wheeler family will be found in the Wheeler Genealogy, although Sarah's name is recorded Anna by error.

120 JONATHAN⁵ WARNER, son of Jonathan⁴ and Bathsheba (Allis) Warner, born in Hardwick, Mass., July 14, 1744; died January 7, 1803, at Craftsbury, Vt., where he had gone on a matter of business. He inherited his father's homestead in Hardwick, cultivated the large farm and managed the store and tavern. At the beginning of the Revolution he was Lieutenant of the South Company. September 22, 1774, he was elected Captain of that company and Captain also of the company of minute men that was organized that day. The following October he was elected Colonel, and was promoted to the office of Brigadier-General, February 13, 1776. Upon the reorganization of the militia in 1781, after the adoption of the Constitution, he was elected Major-General, to which office he was re-commissioned, April 3, 1786, under the new arrangement. He faithfully performed the arduous duties of his office during the Revolution and Shays' Insurrection and was honorably discharged upon his voluntary resignation, December, 1789.

General Warner was also active in civic affairs; a member of the Committee of Correspondence for three years; selectman, three years; representative, five years; senator, nine years; member of the Council, two years. His name occurs frequently on the annals of Colonial history. His will, made December 9, 1802, probated January 10, 1803, in Orleans Co., Vt., mentions his wife, and surviving children: Susanna Howe; Bathsheba Brown; Hannah Hitchcock; Frances Parker; Harriet, Alma, Mary White, Louisa and William Augustus Warner, all under 21; Jonathan Warner, to whom is given the home farm at Hard-

wick. Land in Craftsbury is mentioned.

Jonathan Warner married in Hardwick, February 5, 1766, HANNAH MANDELL, daughter of Paul and Susannah (Ruggles) Mandell. She died in Enfield, Conn., August 3, 1839, aged

91. She resided at the homestead until late in life, when she

entered the home of her youngest daughter in Enfield.

The Ruggles pedigree is as follows: Thomas¹, from Nazing, Essex Co., England, of Roxbury, Mass., 1637, wife Mary; Captain Samuel² and wife Ann Bright; Captain Samuel³ and wife Martha Woodbridge, a descendant of Governor Thomas Dudley; Rev. Timothy* and Mary White of Rochester, Mass.; Susanna5; who married Paul Mandell. Paul Mandell was a merchant of New Bedford, Mass., and is said to have left the town because his aristocratic nature could not brook the idea that an apprentice should presume to compete with him in trade in the same town. He removed to Hardwick, Mass., thereby placing his family where educational advantages were few, and throwing upon himself and his wife the task of educating their children. For this duty they were, fortunately, both well qualified, as Mrs. Mandell had been educated with her brothers, at least one of whom, Brig.-Gen. Timothy Ruggles, was a graduate of Harvard College. Consequently Mrs. Hannah (Mandell) Warner was never a student at any school.

He frequently represented his town in the Vermont Legislature and was for seven years a member of the Executive Council of the state.

table 122 ELIJAH⁵ WARNER, son of Joseph⁴ and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born in Hatfield, Mass., December 14, 1738; died in Hardwick, Mass., January 24, 1819. He accompanied his father's family to Hardwick when he was a boy and later settled in that town on a farm on the road to Enfield, three and a half miles from the Common. When he was but nineteen he joined his father's company which was ordered to the relief of Fort William Henry in the French and Indian War. Again in 1774, at the outbreak of the Revolution, he was called to military duty. At a meeting held in Hardwick, September 22, 1774, to make provision for those who were to serve as minute men, the members

of the earlier organized military companies of the town resigned and two new companies were formed, known as the North and South Companies. Of these, Elijah Warner was appointed ensign of the South Company. On May 14, 1776, he was elected lieutenant of Captain Josiah Locke's 10th Company, from Hardwick, 4th Worcester County Regiment, Mass., militia, under Col. James Converse, and was commissioned by order of the Council, May 31, 1776. He served the town as selectman in 1777, 1780, and again from 1793 to 1795. In 1781, after the adoption of the constitution of Massachusetts, the militia was re-organized and, on the roster of the newly appointed officers, was the name of Elijah Warner, commissioned as captain, May 23, 1783. This was four months before the definite treaty of peace was signed and six months before the British evacuated New York.

The Census of 1790 in Hardwick gives him with a family of three males over 16, one under 16, and nine females. Again in 1810, the Census notes his family of one male and one female over 45, one female between 26 and 45, three males and three females between 16 and 26, two males and two females under 10. His will was made January 2, 1810, and mentioned his thirteen children then living. There are many references to this family in Paige's History of Hardwick.

Elijah Warner married (1) in Hardwick, Mass., January 14, 1762, SUBMIT WELLS, daughter of John and Martha (Allis) Wells of Hardwick, and granddaughter of Ichabod Allis.

123 JOSEPH⁵ WARNER, JR., son of Captain Joseph⁴ and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born in Hatfield, Mass., July 2, 1743; died in Cummington, Mass., June 8, 1818. A deed of September 5, 1771, gives his residence as "Hardwick in the province of Massachusetts Bay," but he later joined his father and brother Stephen in Cummington. In 1774 he was chosen lieutenant of the company of minute-men pledged to take the field at a minute's notice, raised by the town in anticipation of the approaching conflict with the mother country. When news of the battle of Lexington was brought to the town, this company, under command of Lieutenant Joseph Warner, marched to Lexington, stopping at Williamsburg for recruits and leaving the latter place on April 21st. After a service of seven days the company enlisted in Capt. Abel Thayer's Company, Col. John Fellows' Regiment, and Joseph Warner, Jr., was commissioned lieutenant of the company. March 22, 1776, he was commissioned captain of the 15th Company, 2d Hampshire County Regiment, and August 16, 1777, captain of Col. Benjamin Ruggles' Woodbridge Regiment: served at the battle of Saratoga. Besides his actual service on the field, he loaned the town money to pay its soldiers. (Massachusetts soldiers and sailors in the Revolution; Massachusetts State Revolutionary Archives, certified copy: Proprietors' records, Cummington.)

He held various town offices and was also interested in the affairs of the church. He was chosen to attend to the "seating

of the pews," and paid for his own pew the sum of thirty-three dollars, an amount considerably above the average. His will was probated August 11, 1818, and mentions land in Palmyra, N. Y., and Marlborough, Vt., a mill site in Cummington on Westfield River and Swift River, dwelling house, homestead and other property. The heirs were his children: John, Paul, Susannah French, Sally Norton, Molly Warner, Rhoda Robinson, Cynthia Warner, and Joseph Warner, the last of whom was executor.

STEPHEN⁵ WARNER, son of Joseph⁴ and Mary (Hubbard) Warner, born in Hardwick, Mass., 1744; died in Cummington, Mass., December 12, 1812. He was an early settler and proprietor of Cummington, Lot No. 5. He was a farmer, and operated a clover mill, and is frequently mentioned in the records of the town for his public services. He enlisted on July 19, 1777. Lieutenant in Capt. Nathaniel Harwood's Company, Col. John Dickenson's Regiment, marching on the alarm to Manchester under the command of his cousin, Col. Ionathan Warner. He was commissioned Lieutenant, July 6, 1778, in a company of the 2d Hampshire County Regiment, under Col. Israel Chapin, and also served as one of the Committee of Correspondence during the last years of the war. (Mass. Archives, vol. 19, p. 220; vol. 28, p. 45.) The first town meeting, or meeting of the proprietors of Cummington, was held at the house of Stephen Warner, June 19, 1771. This was later known as the Deacon Rogers Place. The Proprietors' Records are full of allusions to the various activities in which he took part, as tithing-man, fenceviewer, warden, constable, collector, selectman, surveyor of lumber, roads, and bridges, inspector of corn and flax, etc. Lieutenant Warner was on the committee to survey the line between Cummington and Windsor, January 17, 1780; was on a committee

chosen, May 22, 1780, "to make remarks upon the Constitution": was on the committee to hire four soldiers, June 15, 1780, when the town voted the money to hire and pay such soldiers; was chosen to "perfix" the site where the two pounds were to be built: was one of a committee to hire laborers to work on the roads, who were to be paid by the town at the rate of 37 cents a day; with Andrew Packard was appointed to build the bridge across the Westfield River. Stephen Warner was on the committee to divide the school and ministerial lands, and was a delegate to the convention held at Hatfield, March 27, 1781, to consider ways of remedying grievances arising from the late war and to establish a new form of government. He was appointed to instruct Deacon Barnabas Packard, who was a delegate to a convention held at Hatfield for the same purpose, August 22, 1786. In 1800 he represented the towns of Plainfield and Cummington in the General Court at Boston.

His interest in church matters was no less keen than his attention to public duties. He was one of the organizers of the Cummington Church and one of the first eight to sign its covenant. He assisted in selecting the site for the church and building it. Later, in 1806, he was one to arrange "to paint the meeting-house anew and to paint it white." Not long before his death he wrote a farewell letter of advice to his children and step-children, some

copies of which have been preserved.

His will, made May 4, 1812, bequeaths lands in Palmyra, N. Y., to his son Jonathan; his farms in Cummington and Windsor, Mass., to his son Stephen; lands in Onondaga Co., N. Y., to his daughters, Betsey Baldwin, Lois Warner, Rosamond White, and to his grandchildren, Aurelia, Cordelia, Celina, and Philena, children of his daughter, Nancy Fobes.

In the 1800 Census, his family consisted of one man and two women over 45, two boys and a girl between 16 and 26, two girls between 10 and 16. In 1790 he was recorded with three males over 16, one under 16, and five females in the family.

Stephen Warner married (1) in Hardwick, Mass., LOIS GOSS. The date of this marriage is given as May 26, 1768, in Early Massachusetts Marriages, vol. 1, p. 118, the same date as the marriage of Mary Warner and Timothy Moore. There is doubtless an error here and the marriage of Stephen Warner was earlier.

When a boy of II, he removed with his family to Cummington, and was entrusted with the driving of the two vokes of oxen that drew the family's possessions. In August, 1777, he was a private in Capt. William Ward's Company, Col. Ezra May's Regiment, on the expedition to Bennington, Vt. Later in the same year he served in Capt. Christopher Bannister's Company of the same regiment on an expedition to Stillwater and Saratoga. In 1779 he served in Capt. Benjamin Bonney's Company, Col. Elisha Porter's Hampshire County Regiment, at New London. Conn. For his Revolutionary service, he was granted a pension in 1832. He appears in the 1790 Census at Cummington with two males over 16 and three females in the family. In the 1800 Census of the same town, he is recorded with one female over 45, one male and one female between 26 and 45, one female 16 to 26, one between 10 and 16, and a boy and two girls under 10.

Above Swift River Village on the Westfield River was a grist mill and a sawmill owned in early times by Moses Warner. He was surveyor of highways in 1795 and 1803; tithingman in 1797; superintendent of the surveyors of highways in 1800; served on the committees on roads and bridges at various times from 1795 to 1800. His will was dated March 18, 1825.

He was a farmer and took an active part in civil and military affairs. He is probably the Jonathan Warner who had the following military record: Ensign, 9th Company, 6th Regiment, May, 1752; Lieutenant, same, 1759; Captain, 9th Company, 3d Regiment, Oct., 1764; Ensign, 5th Company, Lyme, May, 1773; Lieutenant, same, Jan., 1774. With other inhabitants of Lyme and Saybrook he signed a petition for the establishment of a ferry, April

25, 1760. A petition of Jonathan and Eliza Warner, Samuel Selden and others, object not stated, was refused by the Assembly, October, 1766. In May, 1769, there was recorded a permit for Jonathan Warner to run a ferry from Fort Hill, parish of Chester in Saybrook, to Lyme. The fares were as follows: man and horse, 3 pence; footman, one penny; a led horse, 1 penny half penny; an ox or other neat kine, 2 pence; sheep, hogs and goats, ½ penny per head. In May, 1787, he was noted as the proprietor of Warner's Ferry. (Conn. State Library, Travel: 292; Conn. Public Records, 10:82, 11:265, 12:301, 538.)

Jonathan Warner was on a committee for supplying the Continental soldiers during the Revolutionary War. He was recorded as a resident of Saybrook town in the 1790 Census. In

1798 he built the house in Chester which has been handed down by inheritance to the present owner, Andrew E.8 Warner. The frame and most of the timber of which it is constructed is oak, hewn from trees which grew on the farm, but the clapboards and boards with which the interior is finished, are of pine which came from Maine in rafts. There are in existence the bills of cost of building, amounting to £1616–11-. An old building in the rear of the house is still designated as the "Chaise house."

Jonathan Warner married in Hadlyme, in 1751, ELIZABETH SELDEN, born November 27, 1722, died June 17, 1804, buried in the South Burying Ground in Hadlyme. She was the daughter of Joseph Selden of Hadlyme.

It is said in the family that he or possibly his son Eleazer was one of the guard over Major André the night before his execution. Eleazer Warner removed to Washington County among the first settlers there and his name is found among the quit-rents, 125 acres, on lot 11 (Cambridge town clerk's book, 1787). He and his wife were among the founders of the First United Presbyterian Church in Cambridge.

They moved their effects through the wilderness with an ox-team, finding their way by means of marked trees. The town clerk's book of 1787, Cambridge, has the following entries regarding him: quit-rents on

lot number II, 300 acres, land taken or damaged during the Revolution; mark of the stock, a slit in the end of each ear. In 1701 a petition was entered for a road to run east along James Warner's land on the south side through to the Annaquasicoke road. His tombstone notes him as a Revolutionary soldier.

133 SETH5 (or SETH ANDREW) WARNER, son of Andrew⁴, Jr., and Sarah (Graves) Warner, born in Saybrook, Conn., January 28, 1743; was lost at sea, April 9, 1790. His home was in Saybrook. He was a sea captain and was for many years captain of a vessel engaged in the West India trade. In the Revolution he rendered valuable aid to the colonies by raising a crew of forty seamen for service on the lakes. An order for £180 was made out to him on August 13, 1776. The men were to receive a bounty of five pounds for enlisting; for finding themselves blankets, twelve shillings; guns, six shillings; cartouch-box, belt, and knapsack, two shillings; and one month's

wages of forty-eight shillings advanced.

Married in Newport, R. I., December 19, 1773, Mrs. HANNAH LE MOYNE DE ANGELIS, born in Boston, January 29, 1742, died August 16, 1804, in Saybrook. She was the daughter of Captain Charles Le Moyne and granddaughter of the Sieur Charles Le Moyne, a native of Sables-d'Olonne, near Rochelle, France, one of the distinguished Le Moyne family that furnished a governor of Montreal, one of Rochefort, one of Cayenne, and two governors of Louisiana. Her first husband was Pascal Constant Petit De Angelis, of Italian ancestry, a resident of the Island of St. Eustatia, West Indies. While in feeble health he engaged passage for himself and family on one of Captain Seth Warner's return voyages, and died on the journey. His widow later married the captain, who adopted her son, Pascal Charles Joseph De Angelis, born on St. Eustatia, 1763, and gave him as liberal an education as the times afforded.

146 JESSE⁵ WARNER, JR., son of Jesse⁴ and Miriam (Smith) Warner, born February 1, 1747, in Belchertown, Mass.; died August 14, 1834, in Orleans, Ontario County, N. Y. He resided in Belchertown and he and his wife were members of the church there; he removed to the town of Conway, Mass., in

the latter part of the year 1773, and became one of the early settlers of that town. He took up his residence on Poplar Hill in the extreme southern portion of the town. Here he remained until 1796, when there was an exodus of many families from Conway and vicinity to Ontario County, N. Y. In that year, Jesse, with his family, made the long journey to the town of Phelps. Ontario County, and settled on what was afterwards known as "Warner Hill," just above and a little to the east of the village of Orleans. He left a rocky, barren farm in Conway, and came into a country which was covered with heavy timber, but which when cleared was found to be very fertile land. He purchased several hundred acres of such land, and, with the aid of his sons, cleared it up. He gave a farm to each of his sons. Tesse built a log tavern over what developed to be an old Indian burial ground. This building was situated on the southwest of the four corners on Warner Hill. His son John located on the northwest corner on said hill. Another son. Elijah, settled on the farm north of John's, where Dwight Severance now resides. Another son, Lewis, was located on the farm south and adjoining that of his father's, while Oliver, another son, settled a short distance west of the village of Orleans in the town of Hopewell. In the early days of his residence in this new country, Jesse had many experiences with the Indians, who found it convenient to call when journeying through the wilderness.

He no doubt served in the Revolution but there are at least four of the same name, so his services cannot be defined. One Jesse Warner, with the rank of corporal, served in Capt. Abel Dinsmore's Company of Conway, Col. David Field's Regiment, August 17 to 19, 1777. They marched northward at the request of Gen. Horatio Gates and were dismissed by order of Gen. Lincoln. Jesse Warner of Conway was appointed on a committee to go to Northampton "to attend upon the Superior Court," and to form a convention with reference to the controversies which led to Shays' rebellion, 1782.

Jesse Warner was one of the prominent men of his community and acted in many official capacities in town affairs. He was a rigid Baptist and a deacon in the church. He was a most positive character, fond of theological argument, a hardy pioneer and a man of great physical strength. During an epidemic of fever throughout the country, he was so near death that his son Lewis measured him and went to Geneva, the nearest town, for a shroud. Upon his return the father was out of danger, but the son was stricken with the same disease and the shroud was soon

used for him. Jesse Warner died in the town of Phelps, August 14, 1834, at the ripe old age of 87 years and 6 months, and was

buried with his wife at Orleans.

Jesse Warner married in Springfield, Mass., May 11, 1769, SARAH⁵ WARRINER (Ebenezer⁴, Ebenezer³, James², William¹), born in Longmeadow, Mass., September 14, 1745, died in Orleans County, N. Y., 1826. See below.

His son James², born November 21, 1640, died May 14,

1727, was a soldier in King Philip's War and deacon in Spring-

field Congregational Church.

Joseph¹ Baldwin was son of Richard of Cholesbury, Bucks, England, born about 1610, came to Milford, Conn., in 1639 among first settlers; removed to Hadley, 1660; was made freeman,

1666. See Baldwin Genealogy.

Rev. Adam¹ Blakeman, born in Staffordshire, England, about 1598, was educated at Christ's College, Oxford, and was pastor for many years in Leicestershire and Derbyshire before coming to America in 1638. He was one of the first settlers and first minister at Stratford, Conn., "a man of great learning, prudence and fervent piety, and greatly beloved by his people." He married Jane Wheeler, probably sister of Moses Wheeler (who came from County Kent to New Haven, 1643, and Stratford, 1648, died 1698, married Miriam Hawley). Samuel² Blakeman, born probably in England, died 1668, married Elizabeth Wheeler and had a daughter Abigail, born December 11, 1663, married Hezekiah Dickinson of Stratford, Hatfield, Hadley and Springfield. She was the mother of the famous Jonathan Dickinson, president of New Jersey College. See also under number 68.

Samuel¹ Chapin came from England to Roxbury, Mass., about 1635 with his wife Cicely and children, and removed later to Springfield, where he died in 1675. He was freeman at Springfield, 1644, selectman, 1644-52; deacon, magistrate, and on the commission to rule the affairs of the town. His son Henry is said to have been master of a merchant ship, then resided in

Boston, and after 1659, in Springfield and Chicopee.

Lieutenant Thomas Cooper, born in England about 1617, came to Boston in the ship Christian about 1635, was early in Windsor and removed to Springfield about 1641; was a farmer and carpenter, bonesetter and surveyor, practicing attorney before the County Court, Deputy at General Court, one of the principal Indian traders, and invaluable in dealing with the Indians. His daughter Mary married Isaac Colton of Springfield. See also Green's History of Springfield. (From data compiled by Henry E. Warner.)

He moved to Unionville, Ohio, in 1811, took up five hundred acres of land, endured the hardships of frontier life and did considerable fighting in the War of 1812.

SETH⁵ WARNER, son of Moses⁴ and Sarah (Porter) Warner, born October 28, 1739, in Hatfield, Mass., or possibly in Belchertown; died in Belchertown, 1822, aged 83. He was a resident of Belchertown, in the "Middle of the Town District," and in his early life took a prominent part in public life, so that his name occurs frequently on the town records. His father died when he was but twenty, and his uncle James Porter of Hatfield became his guardian. On March 3, 1762, the town voted that Josiah Lyman and Seth Warner be "Dear reves." From 1763 to 1766 he was buying his home farm, a part of which he received from his father's estate, and he also purchased his sister's share of that estate. March 2, 1763, he was one of the four appointed surveyor of highways, but for some reason he was not sworn. December 20, 1764, the town "voted Seth Warner to be a constable to serve in the Room of Stephen Crowfoot that is moved away, to serve with Phinehas Hannum." March 17, 1766, the town chose Caleb Clark for constable in the year ensuing and Caleb Clark hired Seth Warner to serve in his stead, the town accepting him by a vote. December 8, 1766, it was voted that one-half the town shall get the wood for the pastor, Rev. Mr. Forward, this year, and the other half the next. Seth Warner's side is to get it this year.

In a list of January 26, 1784, he is listed in the "Middle of the Town District," and a few years later his name is found in a list of some forty or more, "concerned in the late rebellion... lived in Belchertown and took and subscribed to the oath of allegiance." This is in reference to Shays' Rebellion. He is listed in the 1790 Census with two males over 16 and two females in the family, and in that of 1800 with one male and one female over 40. He purchased a piece of property in Belchertown in 1795. The appraisal of his estate noted about a hundred acres of land, a grist mill on Batchelor Brook with its

privileges, and two pews in the Congregational meeting house, one in the gallery. It is interesting to note that the pew in the Church and the grist mill had the same value, \$103.00, and both were considered real estate. His personal property included the following items: I horse, \$.50 (fifty cents); I cow, \$14; 5 sheep, \$6.67; 85 gal. cider brandy, \$28.05; 7 bbls. cider liquor only, \$5.25; I bed, \$2.00; 2 coverlets, \$2.00; 2 blankets, \$1.50; 3 woolen sheets, \$1.00; 2 looking glasses, \$.20; I bible, \$2.00; I inkstand, \$.17; I pr. spectacles, \$.25; 3 hats, \$2.50; 2 old coats, \$1.00; 2 vests, \$.25; 3 pr. pantaloons, \$.50. His son having died, the estate was divided among his grandchildren, Alonzo, Fanny, Park, Mary, Seth Porter, and George Warner.

Seth Warner married MARY CLARK of Northampton, daughter of Samuel Clark, born about 1740, died in Belchertown in 1819, aged 79. Both Seth and Mary Warner joined the Bel-

chertown Congregational Church in 1779.

He served in the Revolution from Hatfield and was a deacon in the church there. The History of Hatfield has many references to him and his family, p. 276, etc. Deacon Warner was a man held in high esteem by the whole

community. His will, recorded in Northampton, was dated April 17, 1822, with a codicil of May 6, 1823, and was probated September 2, 1828. The heirs were: his wife Mary; sons Moses and Elisha; son John, who received the homestead in Hatfield; daughter Sarah; daughter Mercy, to whom the codicil bequeathes "the mansion house in which I now live," as her husband was in embarrassed circumstances and unable to provide for Mercy and her children. (Northampton probate records, 37:274.)

Married June 4, 1779, MARY KING of Hatfield who died November 30, 1831. She was the daughter of Elisha King.

Mercy Warner, b. Aug. 16, 1790; d. Feb. 5, 1868, probably in Hatfield; m. Oct. 22, 1812, Henry Hubbard of Charlemont, who died at Reading, Pa., in 1826, aged 40. Children: i. George W., b. Moses Warner, 3d, b. Sept. 14, 1793; d. Feb. 26, 1868, not married. About 1830 there were many mulberry trees set out in .Hatfield. Moses Warner was one of the three largest growers and set out several hundred. It proved to be an unprofitable and short-lived industry.

152 PHINEAS⁵ WARNER, son of Ebenezer⁴ and Dinah (Phelps) Warner, born March 7, 1764, in Belchertown, Mass.; died there April 9, 1849. He is doubtless the Phineas Warner mentioned in the 1790 and 1800 censuses as a resident of Belchertown. His will (Northampton probate records) was made November 26, 1838, probated June 5, 1849. He mentions his wife Mary H., heirs of his daughter Henrietta, lately the wife of Joseph Kennedy, sons Theron, Ebenezer, Jairus R., and John Ely, and the wife of his son Theron, who had no children at that time.

Y., in 1854, when he made deed to his brother Ebenezer of Belchertown for some property in Belchertown, formerly owned by Phineas Warner. Married Angeline T. No children in 1838.

Ebenezer Warner, b. Nov. 21, 1802; joined the Belchertown Congregational Church in 1819; was representative from Belchertown in 1855. There are on file deeds of 1854 and 1855, conveying land from Theron to Ebenezer, and relating to a sale of land in which Ebenezer reserved rights of his "mother-in-law, Mary H. Warner." There has been no record of his marriage found, but the Mary Warner who married Samuel Bascom, Jr., Aug. 28, 1843, may have been his

daughter.

Sarah Rich Warner, b. Aug. 8, 1805; d. Mar. 24, 1828, in Monson, Mass.; m. in Belchertown, Dec. 27, 1826, Lucius Freeman Newton, b. in Monson, Aug. 15, 1795, d. there Apr. 23, 1879, son of Stephen and Susannah (Davison) Newton. He m. (2) Maria Dunham (by whom he had children, George Henry, Sarah Warner, and Frederick Dunham, d. young), and m. (3) Zerviah Miller, and had Frederick Dunham, David Lucius, and Abbie Maria. No children by the first marriage. Mr. Newton was a carpenter and later a merchant. With his brothers he settled near his father's homestead, making a little colony of Newton families, known as "Newton's Corner."

Married in Windham, October 28, 1751, Lieut. THOMAS TRACY, born August 19, 1725, in Windham, died in Hartford, January 28, 1821, son of Stephen and Deborah (Bingham) Tracy. Thomas Tracy was one of the charter proprietors of the town of Hartford, where he settled with his family in 1778-9. He was a large land owner, and took a prominent part in the affairs of the town. During the Revolution he was active in the frontier service of the militia: the names of Thomas Tracy and Sergt. Tracy appear on a pay roll of Capt. Edmund Hodges' Company for service done at Fort Fortitude by the order of Col. Joseph Safford, from the towns of Pomfret and Hartford in October. 1780; the names of Thomas Tracy, James Tracy, and Sergt. Andrew Tracy on a pay roll of Capt. Joshua Hazen's Company in Col. Wood's Regiment that marched to Brookfield in the alarm. October, 1780; also on a pay roll of the same company who marched to Piermont, upon Gen. Bailey's request, March o. 1781, in the alarm at Peacham [Vt. Rev. Rolls, pp. 201, 283, 355]. The title of lieutenant which appears on his tombstone was doubtless received after the Revolution.

Regiment, from May 7, 1777, to July 8, 1777; he was a lieutenant in Capt. William Brakenridge's Company, Col. Porter's Regiment, from July 9 to July 29, 1777; he was in Capt. Benjamin Cox's Company of Militia scouting in Barnard in 1780, and in Lieut. and Capt. Beriah Green's Company of Rangers in 1781 and 1782; he applied for a pension, Aug. 9, 1832. He was a brigadier general of the Vermont Militia after the Revolution. He represented Barnard in the Legislature, 1788-89, and was a selectman in Barnard, 1790-1801; overseer of the poor, 1808-15, 1817-21. No issue.

Susannah Tracy, b. July 2, 1758; d. in Hartford, Nov. 30, 1820; m. there Dec. 7, 1780, Capt. Asa Hazen, b. in Woodbury, Conn., Nov. 5, 1749, d. in Hartford, Mar. 12, 1819, son of Thomas and Ann (Tenney) Hazen. Asa Hazen was a constable in Hartford in 1776, a lister in 1778, and town clerk in 1780. In Aug., 1778, he served in

a scouting party sent out by Capt. Joshua Hazen; he served as a sergeant in Capt. Joshua Hazen's Company in 1780 and 1781; also lieutenant in Capt. William Bramble's Company which marched to Bethel, Aug., 1781. He was appointed captain of the 1st Company in the 2d Regiment, 3d Brigade, Militia of Vermont, Oct. 2, 1787.

James Tracy, b. Jan. 28, 1760; d. in Hartford, Sept. 19, 1834. He was clerk of the charter proprietors, 1800 to 1809, treasurer of the town, 1802-1828. He married Oct. 22, 1795, Mercy Richmond, b. in Taunton, Mass., June 15, 1772, d. in Hartford, Oct. 19, 1859, dau. of Sergt. Ebenezer and Mercy (Paull) Richmond of Barnard.

Thomas Tracy, b. Sept. 4, 1761, drowned, unmarried.

Joseph Tracy, b. July 18, 1763; d. in Hartford, Mar. 10, 1829; m. in Hartford, Ruth Carter, b. in Fryeburg, Me., Dec. 7, 1772, d. in Hudson, Ohio, Feb. 20, 1845, dau. of Ezra (?) and Mary (Fifield) Carter.

154 WILLIAM⁵ WARNER, son of Joseph⁴ and Elizabeth (Allen) Warner, born in Windham, Conn., April 7, 1729, baptized May 3, 1730; died July 10, 1799; buried in Windham, Conn., tombstone inscribed Captain William Warner. He joined the Windham Church in 1766; was tithing man about 1755; was ensign of the 1st Company, 5th Regiment, May, 1771; lieutenant, same, October, 1772; captain, same, May, 1773; with other residents of Windham petitioned for a bridge, 1771; was administrator of the estate of Thomas Warner of Ashford, 1759; and was recorded in the 1790 Census of Windham. (Conn. Col. Records, vol. 11, 13, 14, etc.) His will bears the date of December 29, 1797.

On March 4, 1770, Eleazer Warner and his wife were received into the Congregational Church at Ashford and he was dismissed to the Second Church at Mansfield, July 3, 1791. He had purchased land in Mansfield as early as 1769, but did not remove until 1785-90. He was residing in Otsego County, N. Y., as early as 1813, as is shown by deeds recorded in Cooperstown, N. Y.

During the Revolution he rendered the following service: April, 1775, Lexington Alarm, marched from Ashford for the relief of Boston, junior ensign, served 8 days; commissioned captain, January 1, 1777, 7th Regiment, Connecticut line, resigned September 1, 1777, or retired because of ill-health, November 1, 1777; was one of the short levies, June 27, 1780, to December

13, 1780, under Col. Heman Swift, 7th Regiment.

Eleazer Warner married (1) in Ashford, Conn., April 20, 1762. JOANNA HALE, born in Ashford, August 24, 1740, probably died there about 1791. She was the daughter of James4, Jr., and Elizabeth (Bucknell) Hale and her line of ancestry is as follows: Robert¹ Hale, arrived in Boston, 1632, was one of those who were set off from the first church in Boston to the first church in Charleston, became a deacon in that church, married Jane Rev. ICHABOD5 WARNER; 3d, son of Ichabod4 Warner, Ir., and Mary (Mapes) Goldsmith, born March 1, 1738, at Southold, L. I., N. Y.; died in Bolton, Conn., November 16, 1815. Dr. Ichabod Warner went from Scotland, Conn., to Bolton, about 1761. He and his wife were admitted to the church in Bolton. September 27, 1761. He was the best known and most highly respected physician of his time in the territory now occupied by Bolton, Andover, Coventry, Hebron, Glastonbury, Manchester, East Hartford and Vernon. For many years he was justice of the peace and was a member of the convention in Connecticut that ratified the United States Constitution. He was one of the charter members of the Connecticut State Medical Association. Physically he was a man of unusual size and strength. His first home in Bolton was on West Street, about a mile and a quarter from Bolton Center. After the marriage of his son, he gave this place to him and moved to Bolton Center on the place now owned by his great-great-grandson, Samuel M. Alvord. Dr. Warner died on this place.

163 NATHAN⁵ WARNER, son of Daniel⁴ and Bethia (Gining) Warner, born June 6, 1744 (Windham, Conn., town record), or June 17 (family record); died in Gnadenhütten, Northampton Co., Pa., August 26, 1802. He removed with his family from Connecticut to the Moravian settlement in Dutchess County. New York, known as Sichem, and from there to the Moravian settlement at Gnadenhütten, Northampton Co., Pa., about 1766. With others of his family and of that religious body, he suffered more or less persecution in Revolutionary times for refusing to serve in the army. On December 12, 1777, he and his brother Daniel, "both heads of large families, were forcibly taken to Allentown, and, being unwilling to serve in the militia for two months, and unable to pay £108 ransom, they were forced to cut fifty cords of wood each in the neighborhood of Allentown, for the use of the soldiery." They completed their task and returned to their homes in February with the promise of four pence per cord for their services. Nathan Warner's family is recorded in the 1790 Census of Penn township, Northampton County, two males over 16, one under 16, four females.

Married, probably in Hopewell, Dutchess Co., N. Y., MARY SILVERNAIL or SILBERNAGEL, born March 13, 1746; died June, 1817, in Ohio, whither she had removed to join her children about a year after her husband's death, arriving at Gnadenhütten, Ohio, October 19, 1803. After her son Daniel came to Ohio, she resided with him until her death at the age of 71 years.

WILL OF NATHAN WARNER

In the name of God, Amen,

I, Nathan Warner of Gnadenhutten, Penn township, County of Northampton and State of Pensylvania, yeoman; being at present in a weekly state of body but in sound mind and memory, thanks be to God for the same; but calling to mind the certain dissolution from my body and the uncertain hour when, I do hereby for peace and good order's sake make and ordain my last will and testament in manner following:

First I resign my soul into the merciful hands of my dear Savior and Redeemer Jesus Christ, who through his holy offering and blood-shedding

purchased and procured grace for me and all mankind, and-

Next my body to be buried in a decent and orderly manner as my executrix and executors shall think fit.

And, after my just debts and funeral expenses be duly paid out of my personal estate I do ordain that after my death my estate and all what belongs thereto shall be praized by two judicious men and be sold or disposed of, and then the half of the amount of that sum of my estate and yearly property what it may amount to I bequeath the interest thereof to my dearly beloved wife, Mary Warner, born Silbernagel, during her natural life, and after her death I bequeath then the capital to my then living children, and that in equal divided sums.

The other half of the amount of my property I bequeath in the following manner:—I first bequeath to my two sons Nathan Warner and Peter Warner: both of them now living on the Muskingum at Gnadenhutten: each of them two hundred dollars, or £75; out of which sum their due to me must be deducted; and then the remaining part of the half sum of my property I ordain to my children, and that it be divided to them by my

executrix and executors in equal sums.

And, lastly, I do hereby nominate, constitute, and appoint, to my executrix and executors my beloved wife Mary Warner, and my dear, beloved brother-in-law Nils Tilloson and my beloved, confidential friend Joseph Rhoads of this my last will and testament, hereby disannulling all former will and testaments by me made, and gratifying and confirming this to be my last.

In witness whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seal this twenty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and two.

The following letter was written by Mary (Silvernail) Warner to her children on the Muskingum before coming herself. This letter was written in the spring after her husband's death.

My dear children: Nathan, Peter, and Catherine: the latter now Walton:

Gnadenhutten on the Mahony, May 3d-1803.

As I understand from my brother and sister-in-law N. and Hannah Tilleson that there is now next week an opportunity to convey letters to you, I cannot omit to write you some lines how your now widow mother do. First of all, I with my other executors have had a great deal of pleasure, and also great deal of trouble. The pleasure we have had consists in this: that we act with one another in love and harmony and seek to do the best for you and the other heirs, without seeking our own interests, and this shall be no concern till all things shall be settled. (Details of settlement of estate, selling the property, etc.) . . . I will if it please our Savior come to you and live with you next autumn; and I wish that one of you would come and help me on my journey, or perhaps Assa Walton. I have been spoken with one man who intends to pay a visit on the Muskingum but I would not like to go with him alone. I long much for to see you, and will be glad when that once shall be the case. I live now in the school-house near my br. and sister Tilloson's, your uncle and aunt's who loves you most tenderly, and sends their kind love to you, to Ezra's family, to Jonathan's, to your minister and his wife, to Heckewalder's and Peter's. Give our love to all. We, I and your uncle

and aunt desire to give our love to brother and sister Mortimer. Be you all my tender children tenderly saluted from your most affectionate mother.

P.S. Young Boaz Walton has yesterday bought Joseph Rakestraw's place which contains 150 acres for 450 pounds and he pays 70 punds cash and then the other in terms. Where Nathan lived formerly that place is gone through many hands, at present one Martin Wagner lives on it who bought it for five weeks ago. There is here now great call for land. Be pleased to write as soon as possible. Br. & sister Tilloson wonder much that Ezra and Lenel [Magdalena] do not write, neither do Jonathan. They speak often of them.

the Moravian settlement at Gnadenhütten, Pa. He was taxed in lower Saucon township, Northumberland County, Pa., in 1786; in 1700 was noted as the ferryman in Bethlehem, Pa. He was also a carpenter and conducted the saw mill. The ancient ferry at Bethlehem was a rope ferry so contrived and fastened on both banks of the river, that a flatboat, large enough to hold a team of six horses, could be conveyed across the river backwards and forwards by the mere force of the stream, the flatboat always being put in an oblique direction with its foremost end verging towards the line described by the rope. After this was replaced by a bridge, Massah Warner was the toll-keeper.

Married May 31, 1781, MARIA DOROTHEA MIKSCH, born October 10, 1755, in Gnadenthal, near Nazareth, Pa., died August 20, 1826, in Bethlehem, Pa., daughter of Michael Miksch, born in Kunewalde, Moravia, 1710, married 1741, Johanna Rosina Kuhn. Both she and her husband are buried in the old Mora-. vian Cemetery in Bethlehem. She left three sons and three daughters at her death, and fifteen grandchildren.

John Christian Warner, was probably one of these children. He was born in Bethlehem, Pa., in 1786; died June 30, 1858; married in 1810, Martha McGilton or McJilton of Philadelphia, b. 1794, d. 1854. They joined the church in Philadelphia in 1812; removed to Christianspring in 1836 and to Bethlehem in 1850. They had five sons and five daughters, one son and three daughters surviving her. One of the daughters was Maria Dorothea, b. in Philadelphia, Feb. 5, 1818, d. in Nazareth, Pa., Apr. 24, 1837, not married. She removed to Bethlehem in her 6th year; was confirmed April 4, 1833, was assistant teacher of small girls in Bethlehem until, on account of illness and melancholy, she was obliged to go to her parents in Christianspring. (Moravian records.)

Catharine Warner, b. Apr. 15, 1789, in Bethlehem, Pa., d. there Apr. 25, 1855. She was for a number of years engaged in the Sisters' House in Bethlehem as kitchen and waiting maid in the Old Boarding School dining hall; then served as sick nurse to the inmates of the Sisters' House for twenty years. During the summer of 1842 she visited her relatives in Ohio, and in 1850, her friends in Salem, N. C. (From Church Books of the Moravian Congregation at Beth-

lehem, Pa.)

David Warner, b. Aug. 17, 1791, in Bethlehem, Pa.; d. Aug. 27, 1881; m. Apr. 5, 1818, Esther Miller, who died Jan. 8, 1882, daughter of G. and Salome (-----) Miller. They removed to Nazareth in 1832 and resided there for forty-eight years. Their married life together was of sixty-three years. They had three children, all of whom died in childhood: James N., b. in Bethlehem, 1828, d. there 1831; and a child b. and d. 1832. (Moravian Historical Society publications.)

Warner, born September 2, 1762, probably in the Moravian settlement in Dutchess Co., N. Y., where his family had lived a few years previous. He cleared a few acres of land west of the river opposite Gnadenhütten and returned to Pennsylvania for his family in the autumn of the same year. He was a Moravian, was mentioned among communicants in Gnadenhütten, July 13, 1799, and later was steward for the west side of the river. He served in the Revolution eight days during the Lexington Alarm, from the town of Windham, and was a corporal in Capt. Clarke's Company, Col. Johnson's Regiment, 1778. The Census of 1800 recorded his family consisting of two males and one female over 45, one female between 26 and 45, one male and

one female between 16 and 26, two girls between 10 and 16, and

a boy and a girl under 10.

The inventory of his estate was taken by Amos D. Allen and Jesse Spafford, October 12, 1827, 113 acres of land and dwelling house valued at \$1,813.10, with 15 acres on the east side of the Shetucket River, valued at \$105.00. The distribution was made March 17, 1828, to the heirs: heirs of Elizabeth Eells, deceased; Sarah Warner; Lucy Segur; Charlotte Warner; Lydia Burchard; Huldah Warner; Charles Warner. The tax lists of Scotland contained his name in 1782, 1785, 1786, as a resident of "Lower Scotland" in 1785. He purchased land in Pomfret with house and barn in 1785, was a physician in the Abington district of Pomfret for many years and was highly respected. Dr. Warner was a man of great size, six feet seven inches tall. He was stricken with typhoid fever during an epidemic and was carried on a litter to the bedside of his patients until he died from exhaustion. His epitaph at Abington reads as follows:

"Stop ye, my friends and weep, for Warner's gone. See here, his glass of time doth cease to run. No more his liberal hand shall help the poor, Relieve distress, and scatter joy no more. While he from death did others seek to save, Death threw a dart and plunged him in the grave!"

Dr. Warner was a member of the Masonic Lodge organized in Canterbury in 1790, which was composed of the leading men

of Windham County.

The original copy of Center Church records in the Connecticut Historical Society Library corrects the mistake in his age as it appears in the published records of the Church, by the following entry:

He was the son of Samuel and Elizabeth (Winter) Cady, and a descendant of Nicholas Cady, who was an early settler in Watertown, and of John Winter, who came to Watertown in 1633. Samuel Cady removed his family from Killingly to Shutesbury, Mass., in 1764. At the age of 21, Jeremiah Cady made a visit to Boston and chanced to attend the memorable meeting held in Old South Church in December, 1773. He accepted the invitation to attend the immortal tea-party on the night of December 16, 1773. In later years he often recited the story of the party, and, although his name does not occur in the imperfect published list of participants, his character was such that his story was to be believed, and his name was doubtless concealed, like many others, for political reasons.

On one occasion when the Cadys, among others, had erected a liberty pole in Shutesbury, the Tory minister of the town ordered the rebels to disperse. They, in turn, ordered him to go home, and upon his refusal, young Jeremiah Cady, who had the strength of a giant, seized him and threw him a rod or so on his way, whereupon he prudently obeyed the order. Jeremiah was early enlisted in the defense of his country and was at the battle of Bunker Hill.

About 1800 he removed with his family to Friendship, Allegany County, N. Y., and later to Henrietta, Monroe County. After their log house had been erected, Mrs. Cady, who with her husband was deeply religious, suggested to the neighbors holding services there on Sunday. This was done, and, with Mr. and Mrs. Cady as leaders, the custom was continued until the Congregational Church was organized in 1818, with them among its members. They later removed to Cuba, to live with one of the children, but after his wife's death he returned to Massachusetts to live with his daughter in Hadley. A full account of his family is found in the Cady Genealogy (1910) by Orrin Peer Allen.

An interesting light on the expenses of the day is shown in two of the items of the inventory: for digging the grave, \$1.50; for coffin, \$3.00.

He is called Reuben Warner, Jr. or 2d, in New Milford records, doubtless to distinguish him from another Reuben Warner of the same date, who was descended from an entirely different line of Warners. He attained considerable military distinction and held the post of colonel. He was justice of the peace for many years. Mr. Stanley L. Warner has his old account book with lists of the marriages he performed. The usual fee was a dollar, although occasionally a man gave a dollar and a half, thinking, as Mr. Warner says, the wife was worth the extra amount. His children, John Carrington, Oliver, Harriet, Sally Maria, Cornelia and Horace, were all baptized February 5, 1798 (New Milford Church records).

Married January 1, 1781, EUNICE CARRINGTON of Danbury, born in New Milford, about 1762, died February 5, 1839, aged 76, buried in Gallows Hill Cemetery. She was the daugh-

ter of Dr. John and Susannah (Noble) Carrington.

He was a Revolutionary soldier from New Milford: removed to Bainbridge about 1802-3 and settled on a farm where he remained until his sons were grown up. He gave this homestead to his sons Robert and Lemuel and removed to another farm. With his wife Rachel he made deeds in Chenango County in 1812, 1820, 1829, and 1830. In 1812 he is described as of Inico, Chenango County. Solomon Warner was one of the organizers of St. Peter's Church, Bainbridge, in 1825, and in 1827 bought a pew and was one of the two church wardens. His will mentioned his children: Athelia Warner; Sally Newell, deceased; Mercy, wife of Arad Stowell; Zeruiah, wife of Joseph Landers; Cornelia, wife of Ezra Hutchinson; Asa; Robert B.; Lemuel; Solomon, Jr. (Norwich, N. Married in New Milford, November 13, 1796, A D E N STEVENS, born April 20, 1770; died July 28, 1858. He was the son of Peter Stevens, a Revolutionary soldier who was wounded at the capture of Danbury, did not fully recover and died about a year later in 1779, at the age of 48. Five of his sons settled in Pike, Bradford County, Pa. One son, Nathan, married Hannah Warner, sister of Annice, and settled in Stevensville with Aden. Another son, Samuel, was a tanner, shoemaker and currier, and was the first to carry on the manufacture of leather on the Wyalusing.

Nathan and Aden Stevens reached the present site of Stevensville in the spring of 1794 and purchased a farm. Nathan returned to New Milford for his family while Aden chopped a fallow and put in a piece of grain. For the first two winters Aden returned to Connecticut and taught school, returning in the spring to work on the new clearing. After his marriage he settled in Pennsylvania, and in 1809 built a framed house on the property. The early years were full of excitement and trials due to the wild conditions by which they were surrounded. Aden Stevens was commissioned on September 9, 1805, as colonel of the 129th Regiment, Pennsylvania militia, 2d Brigade, 9th Division, composed of companies from Northumberland, Lycoming and Luzerne. During the War of 1812 he was ordered to Northumberland, but peace was declared before he took part in any engagement. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church for over fifty years and was a deacon in that church.

His second wife was Rebecca Purda Somers, by whom he had children, Philena, m. Elisha Lewis; Louis, d. in infancy; Peter, d. in Kansas.

Numerous references to this family and the active part they have taken in the life of Bradford County are found in the History of Bradford County.

In the spring of 1793, Elisha Keeler, with his wife and three children and his aged father, left Brookfield, Conn., and went to Wilkesbarre, Pa., from which settlement they traveled by canoe up the Wyalusing to the territory that is now the southern part of Pike County. On this part of the journey their canoe upset, drenching all their goods, but after drying them out they proceeded to the property they, with others, had arranged to purchase, and some of the family have remained on the original farm for generations.

The old Bible of John Keeler was one of the articles that was immersed in the river, but he was a tailor by trade and carefully ironed it out leaf by leaf on his goose. It is still in the family, a highly prized memento of the hardships of the pioneers in the

wild country, covered by a tangled and unbroken forest.

Elisha Keeler was not a man of robust constitution and could not do the heavy work of clearing heavily timbered land. He had learned the tailor's trade from his father, but it was a profession little needed here, so in 1804 he purchased a stock of goods and for a few years conducted a store in his house. He later purchased, with a partner, the first wool-carding machine in that section of the country and continued in that business until his death, drawing customers from all parts of the country.

Many references to this family will be found in the History of Bradford County, Pa., and many of the descendants reside in

Pike, Wyalusing, Herrick and Warren, in that county.



Ebenezer Roberts was appointed guardian for Lucy and Mary Warner, minors, and Samuel Galpin, for John Warner (Middletown probate records, 9:158). The estate was distributed September 24, 1810, to the following: eldest son William; heir of Abigail Hough, late wife of Samuel H. Hough; Patience, wife of Asa Roberts; Dolley; Mary and Lucy; John; David (9:261).

In her volume, "An American Ancestry," Mrs. Anne Warner French gives interesting lights on the personality of Ebenezer Warner. The following is from a letter written by his grandson, Seth W. Houghton of Winchester, Tenn., about 1894:

"I lived with grandfather and went to school in Skaneateles. Grandfather was a man of but few words, inflexible in his purpose without being harsh. Strictly honorable in all his dealings with his fellow men, Puritanical in his religion, Saturday at sundown all secular matters were suspended until Sunday at sundown. During that time all had to read the Bible or study their Sunday School lessons, and all had to load into the farm wagon Sunday morning and go to church,—rain or snow,—hot or cold. Family prayers were as certain as the day came. To me they were an awful nuisance, as they were always long, and I generally got very hungry. Although he was a perfect autocrat, he was kind to all who tried to do right, but woe to him who stepped aside. I loved him though he kept me straight as a shingle. He was known to everybody as 'that good old Deacon Warner,' and was a thrifty, intelligent farmer."

Among the possessions of the family are silhouettes of Dr. John Warner and his son James Ward Warner; his extensive library, including volumes of law, medicine, history, and standard literature; a copy of his surgeon's commission in the War of 1812; an old ledger, bearing among its items a visit to a patient nine miles from home in the dead of winter, for which he charged 75 cents.

Franklin Warner, b. Sept. 16, 1818; died in Oakland, Calif., Jan. 14, 1901. He was educated in Middlebury College and engaged in teaching in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Mississippi. During his residence in the latter state, he enlisted upon the breaking out of the Mexican War. To the Mexican veterans it was but a step into California, which had been brought so forcibly to their minds during the struggle, and after receiving an honorable discharge, Mr. Warner went on to the Pacific Coast. Here he engaged in mining for some time with little success. He then went to Oakland and taught in the first school in Oakland from 1854-6, in the Durant Collegiate School, 1856-6c,

then again in the public school. At the beginning of the movement to found the University of California, Mr. Warner devoted months in advocating the necessity of such an institution as the Durant Collegiate School, the foundation of the present institution. All of his work was of the highest standard and for the uplift of the young people. In 1857 he purchased a tract of land, called the Warner tract, and erected many houses in the hope of inducing a certain class of homeseekers to settle there. He was so successful in this line of business that he followed the real estate business until the time of his death. He was a charter member of Live Oak Lodge, No. 61, F. and A. M., of Oakland. Mr. Warner married in 1856, Sarah Hinds Walker, b. in Boston, Mass., daughter of Barzillai and Nancy French (Hinds) Walker. She came to California in 1853 with friends from Taunton, coming by way of the Isthmus. She was educated at Warren Ladies' Seminary in Rhode Island and taught school from the age of 15. After coming to Oakland she continued teaching and was the third teacher in the Oakland schools. Mrs. Warner survived her husband. They had no children.

216 LEVI6 WARNER, son of Jonathan⁵ and Mary (Griffin) Warner, born September 11, 1795, in Pittsford, Vt., twin with Judith: died May 18, 1879. At the age of 21 he started on foot on a tour of observation for the purpose of seeing the country; went as far west as Missouri, then through the southern states, on foot and alone, keeping a daily journal of where he went and what he had seen. He returned in the fall, having walked 4,000 miles. The following year he went to Bond County, Ill., then south to New Orleans. He was in Galena during the Black Hawk War. In 1832 he went to Elkhorn Grove, Ill., and made the first claim on the south side of the Grove. He surveyed the state road from Peoria to Galena, and the county road to Mt. Carroll; was the first county surveyor of Ogle County, elected April 8, 1839; was the first town clerk and served until 1866: held the office of justice of the peace and examined teachers. He lived to a good old age and was the oldest settler in the Grove if not in the county.

Artemas Howe was in October, 1786, appointed as an aide-de-camp of Gen. Jonathan Warner, his father-in-law.

Susanna Warner Howe married (2) MOSES ROBINSON, born in Hardwick, Mass., March 20, 1741, son of Samuel and Mercy (Leonard) Robinson; died May 26, 1813. There were no children by this marriage. Moses Robinson was educated at Dartmouth College and removed to Bennington, Vt., with his father about 1761. He was chosen the first clerk of the town in 1762, and held the office for about twenty years. In the early part of 1777, he was a colonel of militia and was at the head of his regiment on Mount Independence when Ticonderoga was evacuated. He was a member of the Council of Safety, and on the Governor's Council for eight years until 1785. Upon the organization of the state he was appointed chief justice, a position which he held, with the exception of one year, until 1789, when he was elected Governor. In 1782 he was sent to the Continental Congress as one of the agents of the states, and he was one of the commissioners that finally adjusted the controversy with New York State. He was chosen to Congress in 1701, but resigned in 1796. He also served a term in the General Assembly in 1802.

Governor Robinson was a man of profound piety and democracy, and may be called the father of the Congregational Church at Bennington. He was a deacon of that church from 1789 up to his death. It is related that when people came to Bennington in the early days to purchase land, he would invite them to his home overnight, contrive to learn their religious opinions, and, if they were not good Congregationalists, he would persuade them to settle in Shaftsbury or Pownal, where he also had land holdings. So strong a bent did he and his associates give to the religious opinion of the community, that up to 1830 there was only the one house of public worship in the town.

Governor Robinson's first wife was Mary Fay, daughter of Stephen Fay. They had six sons; the eldest, Moses, was in 1814 a member of the Council and was repeatedly a member of the General Assembly; Aaron, Samuel and Nathan were also prominent in local affairs, and Nathan's son John S. Robinson was later Governor of his state; Fay married Seraph Howe, a daughter of his step-mother.

223 ABEL⁶ WARNER, son of Elijah⁵ and Submit (Wells) Warner, born in Hardwick, Mass., April 20, 1763; died in Plainfield, Mass., February 12, 1837. His name first appears on the roll of Captain Timothy Paige's Company, Col. John Rand's Regiment, enlisting at the age of seventeen, July 5, 1780, and serving until October 10, 1780. This company was raised by act of June 22, 1780, for three months, and did duty at West Point. N. Y. (Mass. Archives). March 15, 1785, Plainfield was set off from the north part of Cummington and incorporated as the District of Plainfield. It was here that Abel Warner first settled after his marriage. He lived on the farm that was later owned by his grandson, Francis Joy, and kept a tavern there. There was no church there for a time and they attended the church in Cummington, where some of the children were baptized. He was given in the Census of 1790 and later ones. His name is found on various committees to divide the town into school districts and other public duties. On September 9, 1800, the town of Plainfield voted to make provision for training soldiers at the general muster at Northampton. Mr. Abel Warner was allowed five shillings for conveying and taking care of the provisions which were to be collected by Mr. Elijah Warner. Among the provisions allowed the company were twenty-five pounds of cheese, one hundred and twenty pounds of wheat, and one hundred pounds of mutton.

On October 1, 1828, Abel Warner, yeoman, sold to Justus Warner, yeoman, his farm in Plainfield, consisting of one hundred and sixty acres, consideration two thousand dollars. His

will was dated March 31, 1836.

Abel Warner married at Kingston, Mass., February 15, 1786 (or March 2, 1786, family record of Abel P. Warner), SARAH COOK, born December 13, 1764 (or 1765, family record of Abel P. At the time of the Embargo Act, Guilford, like all New England, disapproved, and on September 19, 1808, a petition, dated August 29th, presented from New Haven to the President of the United States praying for a suspension of the embargo, was read in town meeting at Guilford. The town voted its approval and on February 17, 1809, the town took original action in resolutions embodying their complaints. These were prepared by a committee of eleven men (among them Chapman Warner) noted as composed of the prominent men of the town. (Steiner's History of Guilford and Madison, Conn.)

Alanson Warner, d. in Evansville about 1853; was married three times but had no children who grew to maturity. He was living in Evansville before 1817, was known as Major Warner and was called a "man well and favorably known in every branch of the county's early history." He advanced cash for the use of the county in 1818; was trustee of the village in 1819 and later, and its president for several terms; was coroner in 1819 and 1825; sheriff in 1824 and 1827; county treasurer in 1820, 1831-3, 1836-41. He was one of the three trustees of the Presbyterian Church elected at a meeting held at his home to arrange for the building of a Presbyterian Church, and gave fifty dollars to the building. He kept a hotel, pretentious for those days, in a two-story brick building, had a livery stable and was the owner of stage lines. The old Warner home was standing not many years ago and was still a dignified and substantial residence, with a keystone arch over its colonial entrance. The walls were built over two feet in thickness, intended, it is said, as a defense against earthquakes as well as against hostile enemies. He had an

adopted daughter, Nellie Nevins Warner (daughter of his wife by a former marriage), who was married first to Guilford Eggleston and. after his death, to a Mr. Culbertson of New Albany.

Alfred O. Warner, was a voter at town election in Evansville in 1817, and was elected to an office; was granted permission to keep hotel in his house in 1819, and town meetings were held there.

255 SETH ANDREW LE MOYNE⁶ WARNER, son of Seth⁵ and Hannah (Le Moyne-De Angelis) Warner, born in Say-

brook, Conn., February 12, 1786; died in Farmington, Mich., March 5, 1846. He resided when a youth with Paschal De Angelis in Trenton, N. Y. He joined the First United Presbyterian Church of Cambridge, N. Y., January 26, 1810. 1817 he purchased land in Hector, at that time a part of Tompkins County, N. Y. He studied law and made his first appearance in the courts of Tompkins County in 1819. In 1825 he went to Michigan and located in what was later organized into the township of Farmington. In March, 1830, he was admitted to the practice of law in Oakland County. Although the town was not a favorable one in which to acquire an extensive law practice, he secured his share of business, and was prominent in legal and political circles. He was one of the first justices of the peace, appointed in Farmington by the Governor, and a member of the first Constitutional Convention of Michigan. Always a zealous Presbyterian, he was deacon of the church and otherwise active in its work, honored and respected by all.

During the winter of 1817-8, at a time of deep religious interest, a movement towards temperance was started in the town of Hector. On the 28th of March, 1818, the preliminary meeting was held in the bar-room of Richard Ely, Jr., and it was resolved to organize a temperance society. A committee, consisting of S. A. L. Warner, Richard Smith, and Dr. A. M. Comstock, was appointed to draw up a constitution, and the society was fully organized a few weeks later with S. A. L. Warner as its secretary. One of the clauses in the constitution reads:

"We also pledge ourselves that when called to visit our neighbors in raising buildings, or any kind of business, we will not expect to be provided with liquor to drink, nor will we furnish them ourselves when we invite our neighbors to assist us, and we will use our influence to prevent their being provided by others on similar occasions."

The first cold-water raising was an important event. The Peach Orchard Church was raised without ardent spirits, and a lunch of biscuit, pie and cake was served in place of the usual supply of whiskey. The builder hesitated to undertake it under such conditions but the trustees were firm and the task was completed without difficulties.

He removed with his parents to the town of Phelps, Ontario County, N. Y., in 1796, and settled on the first hill east of the village of Orleans. About 1833 he removed to Michigan and settled in York. His standing in the

new community was high, as he was a delegate to the Second Convention of Assent (Constitutional Convention) in 1836.

The following account of his thrilling adventures in the army was written by his youngest daughter, Margaret Warner Kellogg:

"When my father grew to manhood he joined the 71st Regiment, New York Militia (Philetus Swift's). He was married and had two children when the War of 1812 began and his regiment was called to the front. He shouldered his gun and on December 24th, 1813, marched to Buffalo, or Black Rock, as it was then called. On December 30th a battle took place and, owing to some mistake, they were surrounded in a woods by hostile Indians, defeated, and forced to retreat. The woods were full of Indians hiding behind the trees and many of our brave men were killed or wounded. Father was wounded in the hip and, as the bullet could not be removed, he carried it as long as he lived.

"As he was painfully limping along, the blood filling his boot, he came suddenly into a small clearing and there he saw to his horror, his brave commander, Col. Broughton, breathing his last; the Indians had shot him and were just scalping him. Father was seen by the Indians before he could escape, and being so badly wounded he knew escape was impossible. An Indian approached him and said, 'Me no hurt you,' and took his gun and uniform from him, giving him in place a tattered old Indian coat. He picked up an old hat which was shaped like a sugar loaf. This hat was worn by him when he afterward escaped and was kept as a souvenir for many vears.

"After a long and painful trip he and a fellow prisoner, Mr. Barker, arrived at a Canadian block house not far from the Niagara River on the Canadian side. Here they were confined in a small cell in the upper story. They decided that they would die from the wretched treatment and food if they waited to be exchanged or sent around by Quebec, as others were sent, for the cold was intense and there was no heat and little clothing.

"They made a rope of a blanket and when the guard had passed on his hourly inspection, they let themselves down from the window and ran to the river. Here they tore the other blanket into strips and tied some rails together making a raft which they soon got into the water. Large cakes of ice were floating down the great Niagara River and it was a very dangerous undertaking. But, after many narrow escapes and perilous moments, they were near the shore, and by getting on the ice near the bank, were able to reach land. I think the crossing was made at a point about eight miles below the falls, and in crossing they drifted down stream over two miles.

"It seems that the guards soon discovered their escape and the Indians were told to take them, dead or alive. No one thought they would attempt to cross the river, and so the Indians searched the woods first, then went to the river, where they saw the men afloat not very far down the stream. Father heard their yells of disappointment and, if I remember rightly, the Indians fired their guns at them, but none had the courage to try to follow them on the river. Had the Indians captured them, they would have been tortured and killed, as escaped prisoners were given up to the Indians.

"They reached home and found they had been given up as dead. My father's brother, Oliver, was in the same battle, but escaped unhurt. He heard from his comrades that his brother Jesse was wounded and so he and all the family believed the Indians had scalped and killed him. When he got home, a man got on a horse and rode up and down the village streets shouting, 'Glory to God, Jess has got home,' and all the neighbors gathered together to hear his story."

A descendant says that the Warners as a family were all Democrats and Universalists, except two sisters who married into Orthodox families and were even then noted for their liberality in thought.

"My mother was much beloved by all who knew her and I well remember the old home in the Michigan woods, the big fireplace with brick oven, the dozens of loaves of bread, pies and cakes that came out of it, and my mother's sweet face. The deer often ran across the clearing and one day a little spotted fawn jumped into my sister Elizabeth's arms for protection from the dogs."

300 NATHAN6 WARNER, son of Nathan5 and Mary (Silvernail) Warner, born in Hopewell, Dutchess County, N. Y., October 31, 1765; died in Wooster township, Wayne Co., Ohio, May 12, 1844. When a child his parents removed to the Moravian settlement at Gnadenhütten, Northampton Co., Pa., where he resided until 1799. His name was in the census of 1790 in Penn township, with his wife and two children. He arrived at Gnadenhütten, the Moravian mission on the Tuscarawas, in Ohio, November 6, 1799, probably travelling with the family of his uncle Jonathan. He assisted in the building of the Beersheba Moravian church in 1805. In the church record it is stated that Nathan Warner completed the chimney October 15th and built the bake oven. Although a member of the Moravian church in early life, he joined the Methodists sometime after his removal to Wayne County, about 1811, and for twenty years his house was a preaching place. The first Methodist Society in Wayne County was formed there in 1812, and meetings were kept up until the old log church was built.

At the time of his location in Ohio the nearest mill was seventy-five miles distant, but by learning the use of the hominy block, and with the wild meat procured by hunting or from the Indians, the family were kept fed. In 1810 he entered on lands

three miles west of Wooster, built a cabin and made some improvements, and the family was established there in the fall of 1811. The following spring came the war with England, and when the news of Hull's surrender came, he packed his goods and with his family started for their old settlement in Tuscarawas. After stopping for a night and consulting with those in the block house at Wooster he decided to return to his cabin and prepare to meet the situation.

The cabin, a solid structure of hewed logs 24 x 30 feet, was easily converted into a fort or block-house by cutting port holes for the guns and splitting heavy puncheons for the door and window shutters. All the farm implements were gathered in for weapons, and a large quantity of stones were taken upstairs to be used in case of an attack. There were but nine guns in the neighborhood, of which four belonged to Mr. Warner and his sons. They never had occasion to make a test of their equipment, although alarms were numerous and the neighbors gathered there at night. Later Beall's army camped on the farm and were met with every courtesy by the owner. The old block house was remodelled and used for years as a residence by the family. The Pioneer Cemetery was located on a part of this farm donated by Nathan Warner, and is now under the control of the Oak Chapel Methodist Church.

Nathan Warner married in Penn township, Pa., August 10, 1784, ANN ADELIA DAVIS, born April 22, 1761, died 1850, aged 88. A family record states that she was born in "Franklin, Danbury County, New York." It is also said that her sister married Ebenezer⁶ Warner, number 302.

305 DANIEL6 WARNER, son of Nathan5 and Mary (Silvernail) Warner, born in East Penn township, Northampton Co., Pa., November 6, 1782; died in Tuscarawas County, Ohio. August 8, 1835; buried in Yankeetown. When a young man of about twenty he removed to Gnadenhütten, Ohio, having crossed the mountains on foot. He and his mother kept house there together until her death in 1817. He was a day laborer working at any kind of work that offered itself, although his principal occupation was shingle making. In 1805, with a Mr. Tracy, he sawed logs with a whip-saw for the flooring of the Beersheba Moravian Church at Gnadenhütten. This was a slow and arduous task. In the first place posts were set in the ground on the hillside, then skids were laid out from the hill upon these posts making them level. A log was then rolled upon these skids and with one man standing on the log, the other below on the ground, the saw was pulled up and down, cutting one way only. The saw had a handle on each end resembling an auger handle.

In 1810 Daniel Warner united with the Methodist church. During the War of 1812 he was drafted to go to the Maumee in the defense of Ft. Meigs. He borrowed of his mother the \$60.00 to pay a substitute, who, by the way, never arrived at the fort. The siege was broken before the recruits arrived at the fort and

they were sent home.

After his marriage he resided in Gnadenhütten, Fry's Valley, Wooster, and again in Fry's Valley, where he was living, at the time of his death, in a cabin on a small farm which he had cleared some years before and built upon. He was buried in Yankeetown Graveyard, one and one-half miles from Gnaden-

hütten, but no stone marks his grave.

Daniel Warner married in Fry's Valley, February 26, 1818, MARY ANN SIMMERS, born at Painted Post, N. Y., July 28, 1798; died at the residence of her son Jonas, in Tuscarawas County, Ohio, August 5, 1876, buried in Trenton Cemetery. After his death she married a stroller named Jackson. She was the daughter of William and Esther Simmers. Her parents moved in 1800 to Canada and settled near Dover on Lake Erie opposite Long Point, across the lake from Erie. Many stories are told in the family of their experience with the Indians, especially during the War of 1812. William Simmers was born in the United States and was hostile to the British Crown. Having harbored a British spy and being summoned for trial, he thought best to return to the United States, left his land with

no one to care for it, and never received a cent for it. They spent ten weeks making the trip from Canada, led only by the search for some relatives whom they knew lived somewhere on the Muskingum. They travelled in a boat which he had built himself, taking it by portage from Lake Erie to Lake Chautaugua, then through that to one of the head waters of the Allegany River, down that river to the Ohio at Pittsburg, then to the Marietta and up the Muskingum to Coshocton, and finally to a point below Gnadenhütten where their relatives were located.

Robert Linthal, the first minister of Weymouth, Mass. Their youngest son, Nathaniel3, born February 4, 1710, was graduated from Harvard in 1728, settled as pastor in Stonington, Conn., and remained there until his death in 1786. He was appointed chaplain of a regiment raised and stationed at New London. He married Mercy Cushing, daughter of Hon. John

Cushing. Their son Nathaniel*, born July 16, 1749, resided at North Coventry and died at Bolton, Conn., December 20, 1799, married Hannah North, was father of Joseph⁵.

Cushing Eells is one of the heroic characters of American missions. He was educated at East Granville, Monson Academy, and Williams College, graduating in 1834. While at college he usually walked the forty-five miles between his home and the college on the occasions of his rare vacations, many of which were spent in teaching in Holden. He then took a course in the East Windsor Theological Seminary (later the Hartford Seminary) and was a member of the second class. There he became interested in missions and in 1838 was designated by the American Board as a missionary to the Zulus of Africa. The need of workers in Oregon was so great, however, that he was sent there as one of the followers of Marcus Whitman. He was married Mar. 5, 1838, to Myra Fairbank, born in Holden, Mass., May 26, 1805, daughter of Deacon Joshua and Sally H. Fairbank. The young couple immediately started on a wedding trip across the continent and a year later completed it. The little party of missionaries traveled much of the way with representatives of the Hudson Bay Fur Company and encountered obstacles sufficient to discourage many a man, but the women of the party accomplished the journey to Walla Walla in three hundred and six days. The story of his long and useful life is well told in the volume written by his son Myron Eells (Boston and Chicago, 1894), "Father Eells or the results of fifty five years of missionary labors in Washington and Oregon." He assisted in the

organization of many of the early churches of Washington and Oregon, and was a general missionary teacher. In 1866 he founded Whitman Seminary near the Columbia River in Washington Territory, at the mission station where Dr. Whitman had been massacred in 1847. The seminary was soon moved to Walla Walla, six miles distant, and in 1882 a college charter was granted. Dr. Eells put into its endowment much money and an untold amount of labor without salary. He left but few writings, mainly reports to the missionary organizations, but his name remains, beside those of Whitman and Walker, as the founders of great communities, influences that preserved Oregon to the United States, and factors whose efforts among the Indians saw rich fruit in later years.

Dr. Eells died Feb. 16, 1893, on his 83d birthday. His wife died in Skokomish, Aug. 9, 1878. They had two sons: Edwin and Myron. Edwin Eells was born July 27, 1841, in Tshimakain Mission Station, Walker's Prairie, Wash. He was Indian Agent in charge of the Puyallup Indian Agency in Washington for twenty years until it was abolished in 1894, and was known as the model agent. He married July 3, 1871, Abigail A. Foster, and had seven children: Ida Myra, Eva Alice, Gertie Fairbank, Grace Foster, Abbie May, Edna and

Edwin.

Myron Eells was born at Tshimakain Station, Oct. 7, 1843; died in 1907. He was graduated from Pacific University, Oregon, in 1866; Hartford Seminary, 1871; was ordained in Hartford and preached in Boisé City, Idaho, 1871-4; was then called to Skokomish, Wash., as missionary to the Indians and made that the scene of his life work, organizing various churches. He was a trustee of Pacific University and of Whitman College, which conferred upon him the degree of D.D. in 1890, and the following year extended an invitation to become its president, which, however, he declined. Dr. Eells was well known as an authority upon ethnology and anthropology and was a member of many learned societies. He was the author of several books on the Twana, Chinook and other Indian languages, the biography of his father, and many works of historical and missionary interest, among which is the History of Indian missions on the Pacific Coast (Philadelphia, 1882). Myron Eells married Jan. 18, 1874, Sarah Maria Crosby, and had five children: Edwin Fayette, Arthur Heman, Chester Cushing, Walter Crosby, and Roy Whitman.

He had a large trade; a large portion was for copper work for the steamboats. In early days Mr. Dickinson was fire warden and always kept his staff of office and his black leather hat-band with "fire-warden" in white letters, near his bed. He was a careful, punctilious business man, square and honest in all his engagements, bought property and improved it until he acquired a comfortable fortune. He was punctual in collecting rents but was far from being a hard landlord, kind and accommodating to his friends; his two-wheeled cart, and later his carriage were always in use, picking up neighbors and, in inclement weather, looking after the welfare of the teachers in the school near his home. He was a regular attendant of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and, for a time, vestryman in St. Peter's Church. In 1850 he built a fine country home in what was then Springwell township, and removed there. He was justice of the peace, took an active interest in school affairs, was one of the promoters of the street car lines, served on the board of commissioners on the plan of the city, 1869-71. His wife, who died June 17, 1887, was a devout woman and for many years trustee of St. Luke's Hospital. She was survived by five of their thirteen children: William Cutler, proprietor of the Ft. The household goods, with the mother and her two little daughters and the new baby, were taken in canoes as far as they could go, then she rode on horseback, carrying the baby in her arms, while the men carried the other two children and the goods were hauled in a two-wheeled cart through the dense woods. Their granddaughter remembers there was a few years ago on the Horton farm an old gnarled apple orchard that the children proudly pointed out as "the orchard that grandpa carried miles and miles on his back."

At one time Isaac Horton had the government contract for carrying the mail, and most of the traveling was done by his sons, with thrilling experiences, meeting wild animals and Indians, heroic work for little fellows. The father became one of the foremost residents of Elk County, was Judge for a number of years and was highly honored and respected.

His nephew, Seth W. Houghton, wrote of him:

"I have heard mother speak of Uncle Eben. She said after he had aspirations above driving oxen, he spoke to grandfather of wishing to study a profession. Upon which grandfather objected and told him to go and hang the scythe and cut the meadow. Uncle Eben hung the scythe on an apple tree, packed his grip and went to Skaneateles, where he entered the office of a prominent physician and taught school through the winter to pay expenses. After he completed his studies he went to Western N. Y., and practiced his profession with success which made grandfather very proud."

346 Rev. JUNIA⁷ WARNER, JR., son of Junia⁶ and Elizabeth (Wilcox) Warner, born in Litchfield, N. Y., February 19, 1802; died in Paw Paw, Mich., December 31, 1846. The following account of his life was written by his youngest son, Wilbur Fisk Warner:

At your request I will give you a brief history of my father's, Junia Warner, Jr., short life as well as the hardships he and his family had to endure

after moving into a new country.

He was a Methodist minister at Litchfield, N. Y., and in those days ministers were very poorly paid; thinking to better his condition, he decided to go West, consequently in the year 1833 he, together with his father, Junia Warner, Sr. (my grandfather), started for Kalamazoo, Mich. (then a territory), where his sister, Mrs. Martin Heydenburk, lived. After a brief rest there, they started on foot westward through the wilderness, to locate on land suitable for dairy purposes; 18 miles west, in Almena township, they found land with a spring of pure water with a brook flowing through it. They bought from the government 1/4 section at \$1.25 per acre and on a rise of ground up from that brook, they at once built a shanty and named it Shanty Knoll and had as their neighbors, Indians, wolves, bears, deer and other wild animals. The following year they planted on land cleared by themselves and commenced the erection of a double log house, with nothing to heat or light it except a monstrous fireplace that would take in logs six feet long. All of their cooking and baking was done there. They returned to Nov York state and the following spring, 1835, the two families left Utility Y., via canal to Buffalo, N. Y., thence by boat to Detroit. There they purchased an ox team and covered lumber wagon and put their belongings and four grown persons and four children into it and started through the woods with no road, the only guide being blazed trees occasionally where some one had preceded them. Thus they journeyed, sleeping, eating in the wagon for the long distance of 165 miles to their new home in Almena, which you can imagine would look mighty good to them. .

Then the struggle of clearing timber land for crops began. Two and a half miles away was a little hamlet called Paw Paw. There my father started the first Methodist church, which before his death (11 years later) had become quite a good sized congregation. He, being the only minister for miles each way, was called for weddings and funerals for long distances. It was at one of these funerals, 18 miles away, that he attended on a cold December day in 1846, that he contracted pneumonia and drove home that

distance and only lived three days.

One other instance of the hardships they had to endure: they hewed shingles from pine trees and with an ox team took them to Little Prairie Round, 20 miles, and exchanged them for wheat, then drove 30 miles in another direction to Comstock to have the wheat ground into flour and then home another 24 miles. It took him four days to make the trip. My

grandfather died 6 years after they came and my father only lived 11 years. Thus you see my mother was left with 6 children, the oldest 20 and the youngest (myself) 31/2 years old. She kept the family together. We all struggled to clear the land and build a new frame house. The old log house was used for a school house where I first attended school. The hardships we endured there would fill a book. I will relate a few of my own experiences which are still vivid in my memory. Rattlesnakes were very plentiful. On one occasion, when I was about 10 and my brother 21/2 years older, we were gathering hay that had been cut with a scythe and raked by hand, I was loading and he pitching up to me. In the hay was a big rattler and when he landed on top of that load of hay, he at once notified me with his rattle. I, being barefoot, at once leaped to the ground. We captured him and found 10 rattles on him. Also many a day did this brother and I break up land with a span of horses hitched ahead of one or more yoke of oxen and attached to a big breaking plow that would cut off roots 3 to 4 inches in diameter and all this when we were mere lads-I cite these to show how different our early life was then to what most of the sons have it now.

Gradually, as the children grew to womanhood and manhood, they left the old home and made homes of their own. Out of the two families, 4 grown ups and 9 children, I am the only one now living (1916).

He was educated in Paw Paw and Grand Rapids, Mich.; Michigan Agricultural College, B.S., 1882; Columbia University Law School, 1889; A.M., University of Denver, 1901; admitted to the bar in 1889; associate professor, 1892-3,

professor of law, after 1893; dean of the law department of Denver University, after 1902. Lucius W. Hoyt was married in Elora, Ont., Aug. 27, 1889, to Catharine Connal Potter.

The family migrated to Spencer, Columbia County, N. Y., in 1802, and in 1816 Martin went to Skaneateles, Onondaga County, where he completed his education, and was in 1824 appointed teacher to the mission at Mackinac, Mich. After three years' service he returned to marry, and took his bride back to Mackinac and to six years more service among the Indians. The school was under the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions and had from 70 to 100 boarding pupils and from 30 to 50 day pupils. The only remuneration he received or expected was his selection from the barrels of second-hand clothing sent by friends of the Mission, and whatever food he and his Indian boys could raise or secure from the surrounding country. As he had in boyhood been indentured to a carpenter, he was able to build the church and school-house at the mission himself.

In 1833, leaving his wife and two children to follow him later, he proceeded to White Pigeon. For three years he worked as a carpenter here and at Kalamazoo, building the

Presbyterian Church at White Pigeon, one at Gull River, the Receiver's office at Kalamazoo and other buildings. He purchased a farm at Kalamazoo which he conducted until 1864, when he again took up religious work in Sabbath school and Bible classes. He united with the Presbyterian Church in Skaneateles in 1820, and was ever devoted to the work of God and the helping of his fellow-men. The latter part of his life was spent in Marshall. He married (2) Mrs. Lucy (Whittlesey) Chisholm, widow of Peter Chisholm of Marshall. In Michigan Pioneer and Historical Society Publications of 1879 may be found interesting articles by Mr. Heydenburk on the Mackinac Mission and the early days. Miss Lizzie Harrison of West Winfield has some most interesting letters written to her family by Huldah Warner Heydenburk, portraying the severity of life in pioneer days and showing the beautiful Christian spirit with which they met their problems.

ELY WARNER, son of Jonathan⁶, Jr., and Hepsibah (Ely) Warner, born May 22, 1785, in Chester, Conn., which was at that time a parish of Saybrook; died there, October 21, 1872. He was the fifth generation to own and live upon the homestead his great-great-grandfather bought in 1697. The following is copied from the account of Judge Warner published in the "Commemorative biographical record of Middlesex County, Conn.":

Hon. Ely Warner, one of the most prominent and able representatives of the Bar in Middlesex County, was a native of Chester. After graduating from Yale in 1807 he taught school for a year or more, then entered a law school at Litchfield, Conn., and was admitted to the bar at Middletown, Conn., about 1811. So untiring was his industry while pursuing his professional studies, he wrote from his notes the entire course of lectures, in three manuscript volumes, said to be the only correct copy of the lectures of Judges Reeves and Gould now extant. Settling in Haddam in 1816, he represented the town in the State Legislature for two sessions, in 1825 and 1831; and in 1828, he was appointed Chief Judge of Middlesex County Court, being reappointed for several terms. Subsequently he became cashier of the East Haddam Bank. In 1837 he removed to his farm in Chester and there resided during the remainder of his life. In 1855 he was appointed county commissioner and held the office for two terms. For more than fifty years he was actively engaged as county surveyor. His death, due to paralysis, occurred at his home, Oct. 23, 1872, when in his eighty-eighth year, and at that time he was the oldest lawyer in the state.

He was graduated from Yale in 1812, A.B.; A.M., 1815; studied medicine in Middletown and New Haven; practiced medicine in the west parish of Colchester and the north parish of Saybrook: removed to Haddam in 1820. He died after an illness of only about a week from fever, leaving a son only a week old. There was published a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Marsh, entitled, "The Beloved Physician," occasioned by the death of Dr. Warner, in which are fittingly expressed the affection and high esteem in which he was held by his community.

Married in Westchester, Conn., November 4, 1817, LUCIN-

THIA CONE, who died in Haddam, October 1, 1846, aged 50 years. She was the daughter of Deacon Cephas and Sarah (Gates) Cone of Colchester and married (2) March 16, 1826, Ira C. Hutchinson, M.D., by whom she had seven children: Lucinthia C., Leverett, Eveline (who married Cephas Brainerd, Jr., of Haddam, a prominent lawyer, greatly interested in Sunday School and Y. M. C. A. work, and in the Prison Association), John Ira, Sarah Ann, Augustus C., and Frances M. Mrs. Warner joined the Congregational Church at Haddam by letter from the Westchester Church, May 5, 1821, and the three younger Warner children were baptized there.

Andrew Ferdinando Warner, Jr., b. Dec. 26, 1820, in Haddam; d. July 26, 1857, in Cromwell, Conn., not married. He resided for some years with his uncle, Dr. Richard Warner. His health was so poor as to prevent his engaging actively in business and he took up the collection of historical records, with particular reference to the genealogy of his family. His notes on the family were brought together in 1878 and copied systematically in a large note book, which is now in the possession of Mr. Selden Waite Warner of Orange, N. J. This book was used in 1892 for the pamphlet on the Warner family which was published in Hartford. These records, while incomplete in many places, have been of invaluable assistance in the preparation of this volume and have been largely used as a foundation from which to start. Mr. Warner was a member of the New England Genealogical and Historical Society, which said of him (Register, 12: 186), "a gentleman much respected for his intelligence, enterprise and public spirit, qualities which led him to enter warmly into plans for the improvement, material, moral and intellectual."

He was a member of the Hadlyme Congregational Church and in 1832 he and his wife were members of the choir of that church which had a reputation in those days for the high character of its music.

401 DR. RICHARD⁷ WARNER, son of Selden⁶ and Dorothy (Selden) Warner of Hadlyme, Conn., was born October 19, 1794. He entered Yale College in 1813, and was graduated "with a good reputation for scholarship" in 1817. In 1821, he received the degree of M.D. from Yale Medical College. For several years he practiced medicine in his native place and adjoining towns, removing in 1823 to East Haddam. In 1825, on the death of his brother Dr. Andrew Warner of Haddam, "he received an invitation signed by over one hundred citizens of that place to remove there and another in 1829 from Lyme, numerously signed," but he declined both. In 1831, however, he removed to Cromwell where he settled permanently and practiced until his death, September 29, 1853.

The following quotation from the Proceedings of the Connecticut Medical Society, May, 1854, by William B. Casey, one of the committee to nominate professors in the Medical Institute of Yale College, gives some insight into his life and interests:

"At college Dr. Warner was in the classics a fair scholar but the natural sciences, botany, geology, mineralogy, and conchology were his favorite pursuits and he devoted much time to them. . . . His power of observation was strong, his name is mentioned several times in Silliman's Scientific Publications as a discoverer of the localities of different minerals. . . . He was intensely interested in the early discovery of propagating fish and so confident was he of its success that he made application to congress for the appointment of a committee to visit Europe to obtain such information as would be necessary to establish fish-breeding in this country."

In the Biographical Sketches of Eminent Members of the Middlesex County Medical Society of Fifty Years Ago, by

Rufus W. Mathewson, in the Proceedings of the Connecticut Medical Society, 1882, we find the following account of Dr. Warner:

"A good citizen he gave his time and effort to the advancement of the place in which he lived. . . . He held successively all the offices of the church society and the town. He was a prime mover in setting the town of Cromwell off from Middletown. . . . He selected the name of the new town, the fine elms of which bear testimony to his interest in village improvement. . . . In the movement for an academy and a new church edifice he was persistently successful. With the anti-slavery and temperance movements he was early and warmly engaged. . . . In 1829, during his clerkship to the Middlesex County Medical Society he ordered the decanters from the table at the annual dinner . . . where on motion of Dr. Woodward it was resolved that the thanks of the society be presented for his compliment to their good sense."

"Dr. Warner was a man of strong character and on that account had warm friends and bitter enemies. . . . He was born a quarter of a century too early for his own comfort and gained ridicule and the title of a visionary for pushing innovations which have since become established successes. That he practiced his profession acceptably and successfully is attested by the number of offices of trust and honor which he filled in his town and in the medical societies to which he belonged. He was often Fellow of the Middlesex County Society, at one time its president. At one time, he delivered the Annual Address to the Medical Institute of Yale College and at the time of his death was President of the Connecticut State Medical Society."

404 JONATHAN TRUMBULL⁷ WARNER, son of Selden⁶ and Dorothy (Selden) Warner, born in Hadlyme, Conn., November 20, 1807; died in Los Angeles, Cal., April 11, 1805.

He was better known in later life as Colonel JUAN JOSE WARNER, a name which he adopted during his residence among Spanish-speaking people who had no equivalent in their language for Jonathan or Trumbull. By his physician's advice in 1830 he decided to seek a milder climate and went west, reaching St. Louis in November. While he was in that town, the arrival of a wagon train of furs from the Yellowstone country caused quite a sensation and gave an impetus to fur trapping and trading. The following spring he joined an expedition to Santa Fe, consisting of 85 men and 23 wagons, under the employ of the famous hunter and trapper, Captain Jedediah S. Smith, who was killed by the Indians on this expedition. He reached Santa Fe, July 4, 1831. In September he left for California, in the employ of Jackson, Sublette and Ewing Young, who, with a party of eleven men, were going there to buy mules for the St. Louis market. They had with them five pack mules laden with Mexican silver dollars, and reached Los Angeles, December 5, 1831. Here Mr. Warner remained with one other man, while the others went on to make their purchases of mules. The speculation proved a failure. Jackson returned in March with 500 horses and only 100 mules. Mr. Warner assisted in driving the stock to the Colorado River where they experienced considerable difficulty and no little loss in forcing the stock to swim across the high water.

With three of the party Mr. Warner returned to Los Angeles, and, during 1832-33, with a party of fourteen under Young, he trapped and hunted in northern California and Oregon. In 1834 he settled in Los Angeles and engaged in merchandise. In 1840-1 he visited the Atlantic states and delivered a lecture at Rochester, N. Y., in which he urged the building of a railroad to the Pacific, the first time the project was presented to the public. He spoke on the same topic at other places, during this visit.

In 1843 he moved to San Diego, on what has since been known as Warner's ranch, a large and valuable tract of some 26,600 acres, devoted almost exclusively to sheep and cattle raising, with a yearly wool-clip larger than that of any other single section of the county. At the eastern end of the valley is the pass known as Warner's Pass, leading through the mountains to the Colorado desert. The ranch was the scene of an exciting Indian raid in 1851. Mr. Warner had been warned that the Calmilla Indians from nearby villages were planning the attack, and, although discrediting the report, took the pre-

caution to send his family under safe escort to San Diego. Early the second morning after their departure he was awakened by cries of Indians who had surrounded the house. was customary at the Mexican ranchos, several horses were standing near, saddled and ready for instant mounting, and loaded weapons were in profusion. As Colonel Warner stepped to the door to look for his horses, he was greeted by a shower of arrows from some 200 Indians; all of his horses were gone save one, and that was just being untethered by an Indian. With three skilful shots the marauder and two of his companions were killed. During the temporary panic that ensued and in which the Indians withdrew to some outbuildings, Colonel Warner escaped with the single horse, carrying with him a mulatto boy, servant of an army officer at San Diego, a helpless cripple from rheumatism who had been sent to the ranch to try the beneficial waters of a spring there. With this boy he reached a friendly village of Indians, gathered a few of his own herdsmen and went back to the rancho. The party was so outnumbered by the Indians that the men fled precipitately and Colonel Warner was obliged to go back to San Diego, and abandon to the Indians the stock of merchandise, which, as was customary, was kept at large ranches. The family later returned under military escort from San Diego and were unmolested as long as they made their home there, until 1857.

After the American occupancy of California, Colonel Warner took an active part in politics and public affairs. He was Senator from San Diego County, 1851-2. From March, 1858, to June, 1860, he published the "Los Angeles Southern Vineyard." In 1860, he was elected to the Assembly from Los Angeles. In 1876 he was appointed U. S. register in bankruptcy for the southern district, an office he held until his eyes failed him. He was joint author of the "Centennial Historical Sketch of Los Angeles County," treating the part from 1771 to 1847. In 1883 he was the first president of the newly organized Historical

Society of Southern California.

His home for many years was in Los Angeles, after 1887 in the university district southwest of the city, with his daughter

and grandchildren.

Colonel Warner married at the Mission of San Luis Key, February, 1837, ANITA GALE, who died April 22, 1859. She was the daughter of William A. Gale of Boston and had been brought to California by her father when she was five years

old. Until her marriage she lived in the home of Mrs. Eustaquia Pico, mother of Don Pio Pico, last Spanish governor of California, as daughter and sister. Close relations between the two families were maintained and in his later years Don Pio Pico was befriended by Colonel Warner who maintained him in a house adjacent to his own.

Much interesting information about Colonel Warner is found in the "Historical and biographical record of Los Angeles and vicinity," and "Illustrated history of Southern California."

He was proprietor of the old Eagle Hotel on Woodbridge Street, in 1837 of the Franklin House on the corner of Bates and Larned Streets, and later of the Yankee Boarding House. In 1843 he created quite a stir by his decision to have no bar in his hotel, as a bar was at that time considered an indispensable adjunct to a hotel. He was Constable in 1837; member of the Board of Education from 1856 to 1861; member of the Board of Review from 1866 to 1872; was one of the earliest members of the Baptist Church of Detroit. He was always affable and courteous, highly esteemed and was known as "Uncle Warner" by his associates.

406 PHINEAS⁷ WARNER, JR., son of Phineas⁶ and Eunice (Church) Warner, born in Saybrook (Chester), Conn., 1777; died in 1824, in Montrose, Pa. In 1809 he removed with his own family and his brothers Samuel and Timothy and their families to Susquehanna County, Pennsylvania, traveling with

their ox-teams, droves of cattle and household goods, through the primeval wilderness. The first night in their new neighborhood was spent at the hospitable home of Elder Davis Dimock, a famous Baptist preacher, in Bridgewater township. The next day the brothers set to work to clear up farms adjacent to the Dimock farm. These are still in the possession of their descendants. Phineas Warner's home was on what is called the North Road, Montrose. He was a member of the Congregational-Presbyterian Church which was established at the house of Jehiel Warner in Rush township, Susquehanna County, December 12, 1811. His name occurs on an early tax list of Bridgewater, 1823.

Married in Chester, Conn., October 7 (or 17, Conn. marriage records), 1799, LYDIA CLARKE of Chester, who died 1840, aged 56, buried in Montrose Cemetery. She received property at the distribution of the estate of Jared Clarke of Saybrook in

1804.

Nathan Warner was a born mechanic and could make anything he undertook, from a leather boot-jack to a threshing machine. He designed from his own conceptions and manufactured the first fanning mill for winnowing wheat that was ever made or used in Wayne County, and after half a century

of use it was still in service and pronounced in no way inferior to many of the more improved mills of later date. His son preserved many mementos of his father's pioneer days: a copper-mounted powder horn over a foot long, on which was carved N. Warner and the date 1800, probably made for his father; a pouch of coonskin with the hair all worn off; a fine silver-mounted rifle; a coat belonging to his great-grandfather and descending to him as the third Nathan Warner in succession; a flax heckle which he made for his wife; books, all inscribed, "Nathan Warner, his book," with the date.

. In public affairs he took an active part; was one of the earliest tax-collectors; the receiver of public funds to make material improvements; one of the trustees of the township in

1835; on the first jury impanelled in Wayne County.

Nathan Warner married in Wayne County, Ohio, May 4, 1815, MARY RATHBUN, born April 4, 1794, in Saratoga County, N. 502 MASSAH MIKSCH⁷ WARNER, son of Benjamin⁶ and Anna Louisa (Stotz) Warner, born in Salem, N. C., January 9, 1836: died in Philadelphia, Pa., December 21, 1900. He served a year in Salem as apprentice to the printing trade, then took up the study of music, especially the piano. He spent a year in Philadelphia, then three years in Leipzig, Germany, studying under Hans von Bülow and other German masters. Returning to Philadelphia, he took up music as a profession, was organist at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Germantown, and later of the Woodland Church. As a man he was universally esteemed, as a teacher much beloved, and as a member of the Moravian Church, faithful and devoted. On the occasion of his death an article appeared in "City and State," written by Philip H. Goepp, a Philadelphia composer and teacher of wide reputation. who is still active in the musical life of that city, and from that the following appreciation is taken:

Massah M. Warner was one of those men who represent the highest aim, without any pretense, without the talent for earning applause which so many lesser men have, in all phases of life. So when he goes those who knew him feel a certain fault in not having acclaimed his worth while he was here. Now it seems almost too late to say that he was the best teacher of the piano in Philadelphia. He was not recognized sufficiently, because in these days technical instruction is valued beyond true musical teaching. The real teaching of music to the heart and mind is surprisingly rare. It was here that Massah Warner was eminent, and herein lay the charm of his teaching-and more, it earned the affection of his pupils, so that he probably taught no one who was not his friend. But with it all he had the most thorough grasp of finger technique. Like many of the best musicians of the world he was not fitted for public playing, being hindered by his very anxiety for excellence. But at home with his friends his playing seemed all the greater delight in the absolute perfection of its clearness, together with the warm musical feeling. . . . One of the greatest of his traits was a pervading simplicity, as well of character as of manner. With strong and deep religious convictions, he led the most quietly regular life, and thus stood opposed to the false notion that a good musician must be a Bohemian. In a sense he was musically a conservative, that is, one of the brave figures who must stand out of the fashion, for the great principles of clearness, thoroughness and sincerity. . . . In few cases does death seem so hard and inexplicable—not of the author who leaves his books, or the composer of songs, as of the man whose personal equipment and personal character and influence which make for the best equally with books and songs, are suddenly snatched and lost from our midst.

Later on he became assistant Chief of the New Haven Volunteer Fire Department. He was prominently identified with everything pertaining to the growth and improvement of New Haven, and could always be counted on to do his share when called on. A silver trumpet and chief's fire hat with silver plate attached to same, both of which were presented him at different times by admiring associates of the Fire Department, are now in possession of the New Haven Colony Historical Society. He retired from the New Haven Fire Department at the time it became a pay department.

After leaving the employ of Lyman Treadway, he engaged in the same line of business in New Haven with his brother John. Sometime after that his brother John went West and Sherman eventually went into company with Lyman Treadway, from whom he learned his trade, furnishing most of the capital necessary to start the business, Mr. Treadway having met with some reverses in business prior to that. He remained in company with Mr. Treadway under the name of Treadway and Warner until within a few years of his death.

He was an inventor and held valuable patents on various steamfitting appliances, and the firm of Treadway and Warner equipped many factories throughout the eastern and southern part of the United States with Sherman R. Warner's patent steam heating system, which was a system well ahead of the time in which it was invented and installed by Sherman R. Warner and Treadway & Warner.

Mr. Warner died very suddenly at the age of forty-nine, being engaged at that time in the same line of business under

his own name without partner.

He later passed into the service of the American Express Company as agent at St. Paul, became superintendent of a division in 1879, resigning in 1882. Few expressmen saw such varied changes in the business as did Mr. Warner. During his experience dog-trains, Red River carts, stages, steamboats, and railroads were the means of transportation. During the Civil War General Fremont made a requisition on General Pope, then stationed in St. Paul, for three million dollars, and the funds were forwarded to him by express, with seventeen hundred dollars charges. During the time that Mr. Warner was manager of the Northwestern Express Company not a package was lost. Some money was missed but was recovered.

In 1882 he commenced dealing in furs, but the following year

Alonzo Franklin Warner spent his childhood and early manhood at home, attending the district school and assisting in the work of the farm. After reaching manhood, he taught school for one or more terms. He remained at home helping on the farm for several years after he was of age, and in return for his services, his father gave him a farm of about 100 acres situated in the town of Lincklaen, one mile south of the old homestead. This he occupied from the time of his marriage until a few months after his father's death, when he and his uncle, Theodore Warner, were appointed executors of his father's estate, and he removed to the old homestead that he might keep up the home for his younger brothers and sisters.

About three years later, he removed to Macedon, N. Y., and took charge of a farm owned by his great-aunt, the widow of David Warner. Here he remained until the spring of 1846, when he bought a farm in the town of Union, very near the shores of

Lake Ontario, and about ten miles north of Spencerport, N. Y. This was a new, undeveloped country filled with malaria, from which the whole family suffered, so that at times they were all sick together. He accepted it all bravely, as he was happy to again have a home of his own. The following winter he was taken with pneumonia, and died after a few days' sickness.

Mr. Warner was an upright, hard-working and thrifty man. He was so conscientious himself that it was difficult for him to realize that others were not the same, and for this reason he was not always successful in dealing with other men. He was a strong abolitionist and was one of the first two to vote the abolition ticket in the town where he resided. The same sturdy principles made him a strictly temperate man, and an earnest supporter of the temperance movement which first swept over the country during the early part of the nineteenth century. He was a man of medium height, weighed 160 pounds, and

stooped a little, the result, probably, of hard work.

Married at Lincklaen, N. Y., December 24, 1838, LYDIA ANN CONVERSE, born at Butternuts, N. Y., December 25, 1815; died at Union Valley, N. Y., March 5, 1886. She was the daughter of Calvin and Harriet (Fuller) Converse, and a descendant of Deacon Edward¹ Converse, who was born in England, came to Massachusetts in 1630, died in Woburn, Mass., August 10, 1663. The line of descent from Deacon Edward Converse is as follows:—Samuel², Samuel³, Ensign Edward⁴, Captain Edward⁵, Sergeant Edward⁶, Calvin⁻. (For further particulars, see "The Converse Family," published in 1905 by Chas. Allen Converse.) Mrs. Warner's mother, Harriet (Fuller) Converse, born April 14, 1790, died August 20, 1831, was a descendant of Captain Matthew Fuller, the first regular physician to settle in Barnstable, Mass.

Mrs. Warner was a woman of marked ability and strong personality; self-reliant and a natural leader among her associates. She possessed a good education for her time, and taught school for several years before her marriage. She was industrious and thrifty, a good manager, and devoted to the care of her family. She also found time for public service and was ever ready to support any good cause, to nurse the sick, to help the poor and to comfort the distressed. After her husband's death, she removed to Lincklaen, N. Y., where she resided during the childhood of her two sons. Mrs. Warner was married (2) in 1861 to William Breed of DeRuyter, N. Y. Soon after this marriage, she removed to Union Valley, N. Y., where she afterwards resided.



Married in Syracuse, N. Y., October 8, 1856, SUSAN SOPHIA LEE, daughter of William Elliott and Susan (Smythe) Lee. She resides in Hartford, Conn. They had no children.

The early years of one who was destined to become a conspicuous figure in the annals of American literature, were spent at the ancestral Warner homestead in the hills of Plainfield, Mass. His father died when he was but five years of age, and his brother, three. The mother kept her little family together for three years more, then, at the death of the grandfather, Abel Warner, she removed to the neighboring village of Charlemont, where Charles was to reside with his relative and guardian, Jonas K. Patch. The latter was a man of prominence in the community and the owner of a large farm, upon which his ward lived and worked until he was about twelve years of age. It was here that he experienced the incidents and lived among the scenes that he afterward depicted in "Being a Boy."

When he was about twelve years of age, his mother removed with her children to Cazenovia, N. Y., where her father, Samuel Hitchcock, resided. During the next seven years he attended school in Cazenovia at the Oneida Conference Seminary, except that for about a year he lived in De Ruyter, N. Y., with a Quaker uncle, Theodore Warner, and attended the De Ruyter Academy. In 1848 he entered the Sophomore class of Hamilton College, graduating in 1851 with the highest honors of his

class. After graduating he was undecided as to his career. He was always fond of reading, and while still in college he contributed to "Putnam's" and "The Knickerbocker" magazines. He prepared a "Book of Eloquence" which was published in Cazenovia in 1853, and spent some time in New York and in Detroit as the editor of a Detroit magazine. His health was not very good at this time, and having secured a position as a member of a surveying party engaged on a railway in Missouri, he spent the years 1853-4 with them, returning fully restored to health.

Still with no definite profession in mind, but with an inclination towards the law, he lived for some time with his uncle, Hon. Simeon Cooley Hitchcock of Binghamton, N. Y., and commenced the study of law. Later he went to Philadelphia and entered the law department of the University of Pennsylvania, where he was graduated in 1858 with the degree of LL.B. After that he settled in Chicago and spent two years in the practice of law.

Fortunately for the world, the legal profession was not to be his life work. Among his classmates and intimate friends in Hamilton College was Joseph R. Hawley, who had now settled in Hartford, Conn. In 1860 he induced Mr. Warner to become the associate editor of the Hartford Press. A little later the Press and the Hartford Courant were united, and he became a co-editor, with General Hawley, of this important paper. Here he found his permanent work and at the time of his death he was still one of the editors and owners. About this time the civil war broke out, General Hawley entered the military service of the country, and during all the period of the war, the management of the paper was left largely in Mr. Warner's hands. He edited it with indefatigable energy, and gave it the reputation it has maintained as an exponent of affairs and as a moulder of opinion. Its literary fame is largely due to his connection with it.

In 1868-9 Mr. Warner spent fourteen months abroad and gained considerable reputation by a series of foreign letters to the "Courant" that were widely copied. During 1870 he decided to divert his readers from the grim topics of the day and published a series of articles on his amateur gardening experiences. Henry Ward Beecher was visiting his sister, Harriet Beecher Stowe, in Hartford, and was so much impressed by these articles that he urged their publication by James T. Fields, who consented on the condition that Mr. Beecher should write the introduction. This was done and the volume "My Summer in a Garden" was published. Its instantaneous success made it evident that a new American writer of distinction had appeared.

From this start, book after book was given to the public from his pen; essays, travel sketches, papers on important questions of social and political reform, novels, etc. In them all Charles Dudley Warner maintained and steadily developed the brilliant

name he had made by his first volume.

In his early literary career he contributed largely to the Atlantic Monthly, but later became associated with Harper's Monthly. In 1884, he became the editor of "The Editor's Drawer," and in 1894 he succeeded William Dean Howells as editor of "The Editor's Study." His last contribution to that department appeared in the number for July, 1898.

As a traveller and in describing travel, Mr. Warner especially excelled. Among his travel works are these: "Saunterings," 1872; "Baddeck, and That Sort of Thing," 1874; "My Winter on the Nile," 1876; "In the Levant," 1878; "A Roundabout Journey," 1883; "Their Pilgrimage," 1886, and numerous

articles in magazines.

Some of his most important work in "Harper's" was in a

series of papers, beginning with "Studies in the South," followed by "Mexican Papers" and "Studies in the Great West." In these he discussed the educational, political and social conditions of these regions. Indeed, one of the most marked features of Mr. Warner's career was his warm interest in philanthropic, educational and sociological questions. He was for many years a member of the State Commission on Prisons of Connecticut and of the National Prison Association. He spent many weeks in the study of the State Reformatory School at Elmira, N. Y., and both by his voice and pen he contributed largely to the introduction of reform methods in the construction of prisons and the treatment of prisoners.

He delivered many lectures before educational and other societies, which have for the most part been pleas for higher individual and national culture, for an enlargement of our collegiate courses and for an improvement in their methods. He was an ardent Abolitionist during the anti-slavery agitation, and was a Republican from the formation of that party, though not a strong partisan. He was frequently called to perform civic duties and his pen and voice were untiring in efforts to better the conditions of the negro, to elevate the standards of schools and hospitals, and to improve the conditions of society.

Mr. Warner was active in the municipal and social life of Hartford, and as a member of the Park Commission had a large share in developing the fine park system of that city. The part that he bore in his civic and social duties in Hartford, as a citizen, a neighbor and a friend was a very great matter in his life. The foundation of the Home and Training School for Nurses in connection with the city hospital was chiefly due to his labors. His own private charities, beneficence, and kindly offices were constant.

Mr. Warner was one of the best members of the distinguished literary circle in Hartford. Mrs. Harriet Beecher Stowe lived next door on one side of his home, while his brother George lived on the other, with Mark Twain just around the corner. At the back of the generous grounds of all these homes is the stream known to the children of Hartford as "Mark Twain's River." His home was within easy walking distance of the "Courant" office. Mr. Warner loved out-of-door life and spent as much of his time as he could gain from his literary duties about his grounds, and in walking in all seasons and in all kinds of weather. He used to take prolonged summer vacations in the Adirondacks and other mountain resorts, and one of his

most delightful books, "In the Wilderness," was the outcome of such experiences.

Mr. Warner was a fine-looking man. He was tall, spare and erect in frame, with a face indicative of thought and refinement. His head was large, his forehead high, his eyes clear and kindly. He would be marked anywhere as a person of striking appearance. He was a man of great personal as well as literary charm, loyal to his friends, generous in recognition, kindly and broadminded, courteous in manner to all. Three years after his death, his old paper, the "Courant," said in an editorial:

"His life was a full and helpful and happy life. He went through this world with an alert interest in everything to be seen in the journey—observing, comprehending, and interpreting. He did what he could, and not by any means in his books alone, to make the world a saner, wholesomer world for men, even the most unfortunate of them, to live in."

Mr. Warner belonged to many organizations of all kinds. He was a member of the Players, the Authors, the University and the Century Clubs of New York and whether at Hartford, New York or elsewhere, he was a favorite social figure. As early as 1872 he received the honorary degree of A.M. from Yale, and Dartmouth paid him the same honor in 1884.

Mr. Warner was the general editor of "The American Men of Letters" series, and in 1895 undertook the managing editorship of "A Library of the World's Best Literature," published in thirty volumes. His writings, in addition to those already mentioned, are as follows: "Backlog Studies" (1872), "Being a Boy" (1877), "In the Wilderness" (1878), "The American Newspaper; An Essay" (1881), "Captain John Smith" (1881), "Washington Irving" (1881), "On Horseback; A Tour of Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee" (1888), "A Little Journey in the World" (1889), "Our Italy" (1891)—relates to Southern California,—"As We Were Saying" (1891), "The Work of Washington Irving" (1893), "The Golden House" (1894), "As We Go" (1894), "The Relation of Life to Literature" (1896), "The People for Whom Shakespeare Wrote" (1897). He also wrote in collaboration with Mark Twain, "The Gilded Age," published in 1873. With William Cullen Bryant and George P. Putnam he published in 1880, "Studies of Washington Irving."

His last work was a novel, "That Fortune," of which he was revising the proofs at the time of his fatal illness.

The finest appreciations of his life and works are to be found

in the little volume by Mrs. James T. Fields, "Charles Dudley Warner," New York, 1904; and the introduction to the uniform edition of his collected works, written by Thomas R. Lounsbury, Hartford, 1905.

569 GEORGE HENRY⁸ WARNER, son of Justus⁷ and Sylvia Russell (Hitchcock) Warner, born in Plainfield, Mass., December 21, 1833; resides in Hartford, Conn. He was educated at the Cazenovia Seminary, and in early manhood was engaged in mercantile business in Nunda, N. Y., and in gas lighting companies in Rochester, N. Y., and Cincinnati, Ohio. In 1866 he removed from Cincinnati to Hartford and has since resided there. Until 1892 he was in a law corporation, but since then has been in literary occupations, notably with his brother, Charles Dudley Warner, on the "Library of the World's best literature." Among his published works are, "The Jewish Spectre," 1905, and essays and reviews on various subjects. Mr. Warner is a member of the Players' Club of New York City.

Married in Hartford, Conn., September 20, 1864, ELIZA-BETH HOOKER GILLETTE, born in Bloomfield, Conn., December 7, 1835; died September, 1915, buried in Farmington. She was the daughter of Hon. 
He is a well-known mechanical engineer and manufacturer,

After learning the machinist's trade in Boston and Exeter, N. H., he was with the Pratt and Whitney Company of Hartford from 1870 to 1880, at the same time prosecuting his studies in astronomy and other scientific lines and experimenting in telescope building as a recreation.

In 1881 Mr. Warner formed a partnership with Ambrose Swasey for the manufacture of machine-tools, wherein they quickly achieved a reputation second to none in America.

Later his interest in such matters led the firm into the making, also, of instruments of precision, including range-finders, gunsights, field-telescopes, binoculars, etc., for the government, as well as astronomical instruments. In this latter field The

Warner & Swasey Company stands pre-eminent, having designed and constructed the mountings for the largest refracting telescopes in the world, including those at the Washington Naval, the Lick and Yerkes Observatories, others as notable for the Canadian government and many lesser equipments for college observatories generally.

Mr. Warner is a leading figure in the business, financial and general community life of Cleveland. In that connection he is vice-president of the Society for Savings, director of the Guardian Trust Company, member of the Advisory Board of the Citizens Savings & Loan Company, trustee of Case School of Applied Science, Adelbert College, Western Reserve University and the Cleveland School of Art; member of the Advisory Board of the Art Museum and past president of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce. Also he is a charter member and past president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, member of the British Astronomical Society and the American Astronomical and Astro-physical Society and Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He has received the unusual degree of Doctor of Mechanical Science, is a Republican in politics and an elder in the Second Presbyterian Church of Cleveland. His clubs are the Union, University, Rowfant and Engineers', of Cleveland, and the Engineers' and Sleepy Hollow Country, of New York.

Mr. Warner has traveled extensively and, in 1916, endowed the Worcester R. Warner Collection of Oriental Art in the Art Museum of Cleveland.

He inherited the tall stature, large physique and sturdy health typical of the descendants of Andrew Warner. In 1871 he was one of the Counsel of the United States before the Tribunal of Arbitration at Geneva, under the treaty of Washington for the settlement of claims for depredations by the Confederate cruiser "Alabama"; in 1873 was unanimously elected by both parties as a member of the Convention to amend the Constitution of Ohio, and was made its president; in January, 1874, was nominated and confirmed as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, taking the oath of office on March 4th. In 1875, when some of his friends in Ohio proposed that he should consent to be a candidate for the Presidency, he wrote a letter declining the honor and his opinions on the subject were universally applauded throughout the country. He was distinguished during his whole career for his strict probity and integrity of character.



In April, 1837, he went with his father's family from Vernon and settled on the "Warner cross road" in the western part of the town of Sandy Creek, Oswego County on the farm which later he owned and tilled during the rest of his lifetime.

He was a student at Mexico Academy, and for a time was teacher in the public schools. As he was the oldest son he assumed the responsibility of caring for the large family after the death of his father in 1843, and through his self-denial and assistance a brother and sister were enabled to complete their college education. In those early days much of the land was still covered with a dense forest and with tireless energy he cleared the land, built many farm buildings and increased the acreage of the large homestead.

Andrew S. Warner was a progressive farmer. He had the first mowing machine in his section. His large orchards were noted for the variety of fruit. His live stock and the products of the loom were awarded many prizes at the local fairs. In politics he was originally a Whig and was one of the organizers

of the Republican party in Oswego County. He was a member of the New York State Assembly in the years 1855 and 1856 and was State Senator in 1860 and 1861. During the Civil War he was active in recruiting several regiments and served as Colonel of the 147th Regiment, New York State Volunteers. It is related that as this newly organized regiment was about to entrain for the front, several of the volunteers decided they would not go, whereupon Colonel Warner quickly drew his sword and firmly enforced discipline. While Colonel Warner was a strict disciplinarian he was indefatigable in his efforts to provide the necessary comforts for his men and was popular with the soldiers of his command. Due to his arduous work under unfavorable conditions his health failed and he received an honorable discharge. He held many other offices of trust and "enjoyed the distinction of wielding a greater political influence for twenty years than any other Republican in his district. Few men in Oswego county led a more active life and none were more closely identified with all interests which conserve the prosperity of a community. He was a man of large and powerful physique, untiring energy, exceedingly good judgment and jovial nature." He never used liquor or tobacco in any form. He was a member of the F. & A. M. and attended the Congregational Church. He died December 26, 1887, and lies in the cemetery at Sandy Creek, N. Y. A. S. Warner Camp S. of V. of Pulaski, N. Y., was named in memory of him.

In the History of the Minnesota Valley it is stated, "It is due to the memory of T. D. Smith and Charles A. Warner to state that much of the business prosperity

of Chaska was due to their enterprise, when in the early days of competition the weight of one man's character often decides the prestige of a town."

We have here reproduced some of the letters written by Mr. Warner to his father in 1849, feeling that they will be of interest to many of our readers for the light they throw upon the early

days of gold mining.

Charles A. Warner was married in Easthampton, Mass., September 5, 1851, to CATHERINE KNIGHT, born in Stafford, Conn., April 25, 1829, died in South Hadley, Mass., February 19, 1902, daughter of Milo and Mary (Ingalls) Knight. She was descended from David¹ and Sarah (Backus) Knight, who were married March 17, 1691-2 and resided in Norwich, Conn.; Benjamin² Knight, who was wounded at the falling of a bridge across the Shetucket in 1728, an accident in which many lives were lost, and his wife, Mary Adams; Asher³ and Mary (Clark) Knight; Milo⁴ Knight and his wife, Mary Ingalls, the daughter of Calvin and Mary (Horton) Ingalls.

SHIP REGULUS AT SEA LAT 2, 20 SOUTH LON 29, 40 April 5th 1849

Dear Father.

As business is not very driving at present I thought I would sit down & let you know how we get along we hauled out into the Stream from Tea Wharf the first day of March same day sailed down to Nantasket roads about 10 miles below Boston where we laid waiting for the wind the Pilot came on board the S about 9 oclock in the morning we sailed out with a fair wind which did(not) leave us until we crossed the Gulf stream when we was becalmed about 2 hours when we took the South East Trade wind which carried to within 7 degrees of the line in 3 weeks since then we have calms & light baffing winds until this morning when a fine breeze sprang up which promices to carry us into Rio in a few days We expect to be in Rio but 3 days long enough to get what vegitables & water we want each one has 2 days on shore 2/3 on shore at time the other third having to stay on board to do duty & carry those that go on ashore off & bring them back, there is no sickness on board nor has there been any for 3 weeks we have had but 3 cases besides sea Sickness one of the mumps & 2 of the measles since we came out we clean out between Decks evry day have a wind sail at evry hatch which makes it very airy & comfortable It has been very pleasant most of the time we had one gale which carried

away the main sail but it did not last long we have spoke 2 ships both foreign one French man from Havere, to St Domingo there was but one man who speak English at all & he but little the Other was a Swede's ship she lay becalmed about 10 miles off the Captain went on board in one of the boats he started about 3, oclock P M soon after he started a squall came up the ship was hove aback to wait for him we waited until evening the boat did not come it was very dark. we began to feel very much alarmed for her safty we burnt torches hoisted lights to the mast head fired guns rung the bells anything to make a noise until about 11 when they got back they had heard us & seen our lights but they was very buisy drinking wine &c with the jolly old Scotch captin as they called him that they could not leave. . . . 18th Spoke the ship Morrison from N. Y. with 130 passengers had been out 70 days the 2nd day out she was in a gale that carried the Fore Main & Mizen Top Masts stove her bulworks & washed off all the water they had on deck so that they was put on allowance they gambled drinked one man had 40 barrells of brandy on board they had one man in irons for drawing a knife upon a person who he was playing cards with for money quite a number was going back from Rio 20th spoke the Bark Lenark for California she sailed 2 or 3 weeks before we did April 25th We arrived in Rio yesterday having made the passage 50 days we lay off Cape Frio 60 miles from Rio 6 days there is 19 California ships here . . . There is between 2 & 3000 Californin on shore now Oranges 5,00,00 for 1,00,00 Limes 125 a bushell Watermelons Pine Apples & all kinds of Tropical fruits in abundance.

Californin are all the go here you go on shore & the natives although they cannot speak english they have learnt to say Californyans & it is the only thing that you can here that you can understand several ships put into St Catherines they had some trouble with the natives & went on shore & took the island the Briy Perey left here yesterday morning to quell the riot the store ship Lexington left here a few days ago for Boston she had 300,000 in gold dust a rumor reached here yesterday that the Ship Florida from New Orleans was lost off the river La Platte & 201 lives lost out of 205 she had on board I should write more but a yessel sails

tomorrow for Baltimore.

SAN FRANCISCO Sept. 29, 49

Dear Father

We anchored here about an hour ago 4, oclock this afternoon the Mail Steamer leaves here in the morning for Panama, all letters must be aboard by 9 tonight the news is very good gold a plenty to be had by digging for it it is very healthy here there is over 300 sail here now, & more scattered along up the river, labourers get here common \$5 to 8 per day machanics from 12 to 18, cotton goods & provisions about as cheap as at home Woolen goods very high building lots one was sold a day or two ago 40 feet square for 10,000 all kinds of lumber very high Board from 10 to 15 dollars per day a great many vessels are deserted & all hands gone to the mine the Ed Everett which cost 40,000 at home was sold for 12,000, what we shall do I do not know but the companies if I can get good wages this winter here or at Stockton about 3 miles father up the river I think that I shall not go to the mines till spring . . . there

is nearly 300 sail here and 200 more scattered along up the river and bay Flour will not bring but 7 to 8 dollars per barrell here but if you want to buy you have to give a good price for it pork 25 beef 15 to 20, Potatoes very scarce and worth 50c per lb Onions from 60 to 70c per lb eggs 25c apiece hens \$25, each Meats & game plenty good beef 12c per lb all kinds of lumber very high Most of the people here live in tents property is safe anywhere Chests Trunks & boxes of goods are piled up along the shore & nobuddy touches them Judge Lynch presides if anything is stolen & if a person is caught stealing no matter how trifling he loses one ear if any amount over 300 dollar he is strung up at once & there is not the least disturbanc of any kind I was on shore last night & this fornoon & have not seen a drunken man all kinds of Liqur & beer 25c a glass there is a great deal of gambling here & risk it all at one throw of the dice if they lose go back and get some more

but little attention is paid the Sabbath I saw a man to day just from the mines he showed me 90,00 of gold which he had been 7 weeks getting he had one lot of 9,00 which he got out of one hole in about 2 hours with nothing to wash the earth in but a tin pail he says says that tin pans and Cradles (such as you have read about) are used more than anything else to wash gold it is healthy at the mines now people go in small companies the smaller the better no one will molest them no one goes armed

MARTENEZ. RED Woods. Dec 6th 49

Dear Father

Once more I take my pen to address a few lines to you hoping that you will answer them as soon as possible. I have received but one letter yet from home & that from Asa & Kate when I first arrived, last week I sent to San Francisco with 3 others bearing a persons expences down & back on purpose to get Letters his expences were about \$40 & I did not get any letter at that I do not know but evry one has forgotten me but I hope that I shall have some coming along by & by my health now is very good I have been sick about six week we lay in San Francis harbor about 4 weeks before we came to Benicia I was taken sick there the last week we lay there but kept around until we came up to Benicia there was about 30 sick with the Dysentery 2 of the company had died I took but little medicine mostly Opium & ocasionly physic but did not get any better I had no confidence in the Doctor that came out with us I kept around as much as I could I could get nothing to eat but ship fare without paying an enormous price at last I had a chance to get across the bay & I went out about 9 miles to a Spanish Ranche & staid a few days living on milk at 50 cts a quart & soon got better & went back on board the ship expecting to go to the mines this fall I belonged to a company of four & had drawn my share of such things as were divided with them but I saw a great many coming down from the mines & it was so late & bad getting provisions hauled to the mines that I gave it up I was offered \$20 a thousand to come out about 20 miles from Benicia & make shingles this winter & thought that I would accept it as soon as the company affairs were settled I came out here I have been here now about 3 weeks & shall stay until spring before I try the mines the rainy season commenced about 4 weeks ago & rained 5 or 6 days that is all the rain we have had until yesterday it rained in the fornoon & in the afternoon snowed this morning it is pleasant but the snow is 3 inches deep the natives say that they

hardly ever knew it to snow before the Yankee came here last season & that they will be the ruin of the country The Bunker Hill Co is now among the things that was, the last kick was given about 3 weeks ago evrything of consquence has either been divided or sold (with the exception of the ship,) & the enormous Thirty One Dollars & Seventy Five cts has been distributed among each of the lucky share holders & the Co. that old Father Taylor praised up so much has mutually dissolved by a vote of 105 yeas & 1, Nay most of them formed in small companies & went to the mines . . . Provisions very high. Flour 50 dollars a barell Pork about the same sugar 50 cts a lb but I do not think that they will hold up so long you cannot get a meale of vituels any where for less than from one to two dollars the poorest board 20 dollars a week Boots & Shoes very high last week I was offered 50 dollars for my long Boots but would not sell them Boots such as I could buy at home for 20.00 have rose within 2 weeks from 10,00 to 70 & 80 dollars a pair There is 5 or 6 Steamers on the river now the principal one is the Lenaton which came around the horn this year she goes up one day & comes back the next & hardly ever has less than 2 or 300 passengers fare from San Francisco to Saramento City \$30, the place where I am at work is 20 miles from Benicia 12 from San Francisco there is about 10 acres in the woods & there is 150 men to work here among the rest is 2 Ministers & 4 Doctors all have to work here the trees are very large there is one here that measures 21 feet across the stump 6 feet from the ground many of the trees make from 50 to 100,000 shingles we have beef Cattle brought in to the woods by the Spainyards for 25 dollars each deer are plenty there was 11 killed last sunday that I know of Potatoes are 25 cts a lb and hard to get at that price Pumpkins 50cts each & very small at that our principal living is bread & meat with rice & some other small articles that I received from the ship I have enough now to last me until spring when I shall try the mines .

SALMON FALLS July 25th 50

. . . My health is very good & has been nearly all of the time since I came into the mines in March last I am now on the south Fork of the American River 35 miles from Sacramento City the mines here have been very good but at present are pretty well worked out Salmon Falls is one of the pleasantest vilages that I have seen in the mines it got its name from the Indians who resort here in large numbers at this season of the year to catch Salmon they catch them in nets & by spearing them their nets are small like our scoop nets they will sit on the banks by the falls where the water pours over some 8 or 10 feet the Salmon try to go up through the current to get up as high as the water pours over perpindicular when the force of the water will throw them out the Indians stand by with the nets & dart it under him as he falls back into the water I have seen them catch them that would weigh 20 lbs. The Indians here are the most miserable beings I ever saw they go almost naked 2-3 of them do not have more than a cotton shirt I have seen a dozen of them sitting around gambling with one another for the shirts one of them would win them all then they would go off home naked. There has been but few dipredatin committed by them around here lately they begin to find that it is no use contending with the American in the Spring there was about 3000 at one time encamped within five miles of this place holding Council jerking beef &c preparing themselves to fight they sent their

squaes off to the mountains some depredation were committed over on the North Fork but the miner turned out killed several wounded more & frightened the rest into a treaty, they have been pretty civil since. When I first came to Salmon Falls there was but a few tents here now the place is laid out in building lots & there is six large framed buildings and stores & II boarding houses & I should think a population of about 500, there is two bridges across the river within thirty rods of each other one of which cost 12,000 the other 27,000 & they are runing opposition crossing for nothing on one, & on the other they give a man a drink of Liquor to cross it is a very healthy place & I doupt not that in time it will be a large town I shall leave here to morrow & go about five miles father up the river near the mouth of the Weaver Creek

654 LUCIEN 8 WARNER, son of Park and Joanna (Adams) Warner, born February 22, 1837, in Granby, Mass.; died November 20, 1907. He studied mathematics at Amherst and Nashua, N. H., and practiced as civil engineer in Nashua. In 1857 he went to Chicago, and later to Davenport, Iowa, where he was for some time assistant city engineer. In February, 1865, he located in Minnesota where his older brother, Charles Adams Warner, had already located at Chaska. Lucien Warner became editor and proprietor of the Valley Herald, the official and only paper published in the county. After his brother's death in 1867 he continued his business in the store and post-office. He later began the manufacture of bricks and removed to St. Paul, where he entered the contracting business. He was a perpetual member of the Chamber of Commerce, director of the St. Paul National Bank, member of the executive committee of the Relief Society, director of the American Home Missionary Society for Minnesota, and a member and senior deacon of Plymouth Congregational Church.



656 CLEMENT EDSON⁸ WARNER, son of Samuel Allen⁷ and Martha Eliza Brintnall (Simonds) Warner, born near Batavia, N. Y., February 23, 1836; died May 22, 1916, at his home in Windsor, Wis. With his parents he came to Windsor in 1852; was educated in the public schools and at the Sun Prairie Seminary and the University of Wisconsin; taught school for a number of terms, but loved farm life and turned to that as his life vocation. He assisted his father on the old homestead until his marriage, when he settled on an adjacent farm. Here all of his children were born and both he and his wife died. The farm is still in the possession of his children.

In March, 1864, he raised a company for the 36th Regiment, Wisconsin Infantry, and was mustered in as a captain. This regiment joined the army of the Potomac in May and within one hundred days was nearly annihilated in the battles around Richmond and Petersburg. During this time Captain Warner was rapidly promoted to major and to lieutenant-colonel, then to colonel. He lost an arm August 14, 1864, while in command of the regiment at Deep Bottom, Va., but returned to his regiment in November and was in command until the close of the war. His regiment participated in various battles in Virginia, was in the final charge at Petersburg, was present at the surrender of Lee at Appomattox Court House, April 9, 1865, and, under command of Colonel Warner, was in the final Grand Review at Washington, May 22 and 23, 1865. The regiment then returned to Wisconsin and was disbanded, July 12, 1865. Of all the

regiments in the war, only five suffered more in battle than the 36th Wisconsin, and considering the length of its service, its loss was greater than any other.

Colonel Warner was a member of the Lucius Fairchild Post of Madison, Wis., and of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States, Commandery of the State of Wisconsin. Upon nomination by the Republican party he was elected in 1866 to the state senate where he served in 1867-8, and again, in 1882, to the assembly where he served in 1883. He held many positions of trust and honor in church, town and county, as well as state affairs. After his death the numerous tributes to his character were gathered and published by Fanny Warner and Lathrop Ezra Smith, together with a genealogical account of the family by his son, Ernest Noble Warner (Madison, Wis., 1917, 71 pp.).

Clement E. Warner married in the town of Turtle, near Beloit, Wis., February 7, 1867, ELIZA IRENE NOBLE, born June 19, 1842; died in Windsor, Wis., March 30, 1916. She was educated at Rockford Seminary and Fox Lake (now the Milwaukee-Downer) College, graduating with the first class in 1865. Her ancestry is traced to Thomas¹ Noble, born in England about 1633, removed to America 1655, to Boston, Springfield, finally settled in Westfield, married Elizabeth Dewey: Mark² and Mary (Marshall) Noble; Noah³ and Sarah (Barber) Noble; Zenas4 and Hannah (Jones) Noble, Zenas a Revolutionary soldier and delegate to the first Massachusetts Constitutional Convention; Saul⁵ and Margaret Lee, Saul a Revolutionary soldier, born in Pittsfield, Mass., removed to Paris, Rome and Floyd, N. Y.: Alanson⁶ and Eliza (Hannahs) Noble, removed to Beloit, Wis.; Eliza Irene. See Noble Genealogy by Boltwood for further details of this family.

Ernest Noble Warner, b. July 23, 1868; was graduated from the University of Wisconsin, B.L., 1889, LL.B., 1892; is practising law in Madison, Wis. He resides at Merrill Springs Farm a few miles out of Madison, where he operates his home farm and an adjoining one which he owns. Here his children have been reared; he has been a leader in the movement for better country living, better country schools and community undertakings. He has served as Clerk of the District School Board and is a member of the Committee on Common Schools for Dane County; president of the Wisconsin Country Life Conference Association since 1914; president of the Madison Park and Pleasure Drive Association since 1912; life member of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin; presi-

dent, director and chairman of the finance committee of the Northwestern Securities Company and director of the Windsor State Bank. He is a member of the Madison Club and Madison Association of Commerce.

In political affairs Mr. Warner is a Republican and a leader in the Wisconsin progressive program. He was law examiner in the office of the Attorney General from 1899 to 1903; member of Assembly in 1905, and author of the Wisconsin Civil Service Act passed at that session; member of the publication committee of the Wisconsin State Bar Association from 1899 to 1909 and had personal supervision of volumes 1 to 8 of its reports; has written articles for newspapers and magazines and is in much demand as a speaker on public occasions. He is a member of the Dane County Council of Defense and is an active participant in all the current war drives and activities. He is a deacon in the First Congregational Church; member of the Board of Directors and Ministerial Relief Committee of the Wisconsin Congregational Association; moderator of the Madison District Congregational Convention, 1917; delegate to the National Congregational Council, 1917-1921; presi-

dent of the Wisconsin Congregational Club of Madison.

Mr. Warner married July 5, 1894, Lillian Dale Baker, daughter of Rev. John Uglow and Elizabeth (Dale) Baker of Edmund, Iowa County, Wis. Both Mr. and Mrs. Baker were born in Cornwall, England. Mrs. Warner was a classmate of her husband at the Madison High School and at the University of Wisconsin, B.A., 1889, and a member of Phi Beta Kappa (honorary). Children, b. in Madison: i. He was born and lived on his father's farm adjoining the little town of Jefferson, Plain township, Wayne Co., Ohio, until after the births of his children. He was, for his time, an unusually well educated and well read man, with literary inclinations. He wrote many poems of real merit. On September 13, 1868, he was ordained as a minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church in the North Ohio Conference, convened at Wooster, Ohio, and from that time did much local preaching and evangelistic work in Ohio and Kansas. He removed with his family to Meriden, Kans., in September, 1879. Joshua Warner was an ardent abolitionist. These were sold to the settlers and in company with a number of friends he took an elk hunt on the then unsettled valleys of the Logan and Elkhorn north of the present Norfolk, not a solitary white man to be seen in the region. On some high rocks near Dakota City, Neb., is engraved "G. Warner, July 22, 1858." 672 COL. JESSE F.8 WARNER, son of Moses7 and Mary (Sheridan) Warner, born in Wooster, Ohio, September 24, 1824; died in Dakota City, Neb., March 26, 1890. At an early age he removed to Richland, Iowa, where he resided until 1857. Piloting a prairie schooner, he conveyed his family to Nebraska and located May 17, 1857, on a farm one-half mile south of Logan. In the fall of 1857 he returned to Iowa for a herd of cows, and the following year brought a drove of hogs. This stock originated a large part of the stock of early days in Dakota County. Mr. Warner was admitted to the bar in 1857. From early manhood he had taken an active interest in politics, and when the Whig party was dissolved he threw all his energies into the struggle over slavery. He participated in the campaigns of 1854 and 1856, and in 1860 was a delegate to the convention at Chicago which nominated Abraham Lincoln. One of his most valued treasures, his certificate signed by John M. Thayer, chairman Republican Territorial Committee, is cherished by the family. The day the news of the fall of Fort Sumter reached him, he started for his old home in Iowa to raise men for the service, and entered the army at once as Second Lieutenant, 7th Iowa Infantry; was promoted to a captaincy, and after three years was compelled to resign on account of injuries and broken health. He commanded his company in the charge that carried the works at Fort Donaldson and there received the injury that caused him many years of suffering and finally resulted in his death. Soon after his return to Iowa he was chosen Colonel of one of the Border State Regiments for home defense, but it was never called for duty.

In 1867 Colonel Warner located in Dakota City, Neb., and was closely identified with the life of the country from that time; established a land office; surveyed and selected claims for many of the first settlers of his own and adjoining counties; practiced law from 1868 to 1878; was a presidential elector in 1868 and cast Nebraska's maiden vote; in 1869 purchased a farm eight miles from Dakota City and in connection with it raised fruit and burned the lime that was used in the construction of most of the buildings of the time, including the court house, churches and schools; represented his county in the state legislature, 1879-80; was U. S. Indian Agent of the Omaha and Winnebago agencies from 1886 to 1889, with the farming and general behavior of the Indians a credit to his administration. He held many public offices and was a leader in G. A. R. circles. As a public speaker he excelled and was in great demand for public gatherings of all kinds.

The father of Ira DeVer Warner died when he was six years old, and a few months later his mother bought a farm of twenty acres in the hamlet of Lincklaen, Chenango Co., N. Y., and here he spent his childhood and youth. He was educated in public school and in a select school taught by the local minister, Rev. Shubael Carver. When he was sixteen years old he taught school in the town of Lincklaen and again the following winter in the adjoining town of Cuyler.

At the age of nineteen, he went to McGrawville (now McGraw), N. Y., and commenced the study of medicine with Dr. Kingman of that place. In the fall of 1861, he entered Geneva Medical College at Geneva, N. Y., from which he was graduated in 1863, and was the valedictorian of his class. He then commenced the practice of medicine at Nineveh, Delaware Co., N. Y., but in 1864 he bought out the practice of Dr. Kingman and settled in McGrawville. Here he built up a fine practice and was highly esteemed as a physician and as a citizen.

In 1867 he joined with his brother, Lucien C. Warner, recently graduated from New York University Medical College, in giving courses of lectures upon physiology and hygiene. This he continued for about ten years, visiting several hundred cities and towns in New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan,

and nearly all of the New England states. He was an easy, fluent speaker with a good fund of humor, and was very popular and successful as a lecturer.

In 1874, he formed a partnership with his brother, who was now residing in New York City, for the manufacture of a health corset. At first the goods were made in McGrawville, but in the fall of 1876 he removed with the business to Bridgeport, Conn., where he afterwards resided. The business was very prosperous from the first and was soon extended to include a full line of all styles of corsets, waists and hose supporters. In 1894 the partnership was changed to a corporation and the "Warner Brothers Company" took its place among the leading industries of Bridgeport, their sales at this time being over two million dollars a year.

Dr. Warner was active in many enterprises outside of his immediate business interests. In 1886, in company with his brother and Hon. P. T. Barnum, he organized the Citizens Water Company of Bridgeport. This was later consolidated with the Bridgeport Hydraulic Company, and Dr. Warner became the president of the Company and a large owner of its stock. At the time of his death, he was President of The Warner Bros. Company, the Bridgeport Hydraulic Company and the Bridgeport Gas Light Company. He was also for many years a director in the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad.

Dr. Warner took a prominent interest in the First Presbyterian Church, of which he was a member, and in all the philanthropic enterprises of the city. In 1883 he helped to organize the Bridgeport Y. M. C. A., and in 1888 he gave the Association the lot on the northwest corner of Main and Gilbert Streets and was active in raising the \$150,000.00 used to erect a building on that spot. He was President of the Association until 1906 when he retired and was made honorary president until the time of his death. He was also for several years chairman of the State Committee of the Y. M. C. A. and frequently visited the different Associations of the State, making public addresses and assisting them in their local work.

He was a member of the Bridgeport Chamber of Commerce, of the Black Rock Yacht Club, the Brooklawn Country Club, the Seaside Club, the Union League Club of New York and the Country Club of Augusta, Ga.

In his will, he divided among the members of his family an estate valued at over three million dollars.

Dr. Warner married (1) September 24, 1862, LUCETTA MARIA GREENMAN of McGrawville, N. Y., daughter of David Waterbury and Maria (McGraw) Greenman, born January 19, 1839; died October 31, 1895, at Bridgeport, Conn. She was a woman of lovely spirit and rare personal charm. Her health was never robust, yet she was active in helping the sick and needy and in every effort to better the conditions of society. She was especially interested in Seaside Institute which was established for the girls who worked in the factory of the Warner Brothers Company.

Married (2) September 14, 1897, EVA FOLLETT of Wrentham, Mass., daughter of Alonzo and Tryphena Collins (Doane) Follett, born September 4, 1871. Mrs. Warner was a generous supporter and worker in the Red Cross and other agencies for helping the soldiers and aiding those made destitute in the late

684 LUCIEN CALVINº WARNER, son of Alonzo Franklin⁸ and Lydia Ann (Converse) Warner, born at his grand-father's homestead in Cuyler, N. Y., October 26, 1841; resides in New York City. Left fatherless at the age of five, he lived with his mother and brother on a small farm in Lincklaen, Chenango Co., N. Y., during his boyhood and attended district school there. In the spring of 1858, when 16 years of age, he taught his first district school at Cuyler, N. Y. He prepared for college at the De Ruyter Academy, teaching school winters. In 1860, he went to Oberlin College, graduating in 1865, with the degree of A.B., having paid the entire expenses of the course by work of various kinds during the college year, and by teaching school during the three months' winter vacation. On May 5, 1864, he enlisted in a company formed of Oberlin men, which became Company K, 150th Regiment, Ohio Volunteers, on duty at forts in and around Washington. During his service he was in Fort Stevens in command of a cannon when General Early


attacked that Fort in his raid on Washington. On August 23, 1864, he was mustered out of service and returned to his college work. After graduation he entered the Medical Department of New York University, graduating with the degree of M.D. in 1867. He also received from Oberlin College A.M. for graduate work in 1870, LL.D. in 1900, and from New York University LL.D. in 1917.

For six years after completing his studies, Dr. Warner travelled and lectured throughout the country on health subjects. at first with his brother and after 1872 alone. He wrote and published two popular medical books: The Functions and Diseases of Women, 1872, and Man in Health and Disease, in 1873. In the fall of 1873, he settled in New York City in the practice of medicine, but after one year a strong inclination for business pursuits led him to give up the practice of medicine, and in 1874 he formed a partnership with his brother in the manufacture of a newly designed health corset. This business was incorporated in 1894 under the name of the Warner Brothers Company, of which he became Vice-President until 1913, and since then President. In 1900 Dr. Warner organized the Warner Chemical Company, of which he is President, and his son Franklin, Treasurer. He is also director of the Home Insurance Company, the Warner-Klipstein Chemical Company, and the Monarch Chemical Company. He was one of the organizers and first President of the Hamilton Bank of New York, and the Woman's Hotel Company.

From 1880 to 1895, the family resided in Harlem, and the Warner home was a favorite place for public gatherings of a philanthropic and benevolent nature. Dr. Warner was deeply interested in the Harlem Y. M. C. A., of which he was President 1881-1892, during which time it erected its first building and toward which he contributed largely both in time and money.

In 1895, Dr. Warner built a beautiful residence at Irvington, where the family resided until 1902. The children having all married and settled in homes of their own, Dr. and Mrs. Warner decided to give up the care of a large establishment, and they have since resided in an apartment hotel, being free to travel at will. Always fond of travel, they have visited Europe sixteen times since their first trip in 1880, have made trips to all parts of their own country, and Canada, Mexico, South America, Australia and twice around the world.

Dr. Warner joined the Congregational Church in Lincklaen, N. Y., when he was seventeen years old, and since then he has

been active in religious work. On his removal to New York City, he joined the Broadway Tabernacle Congregational Church, in which he has been an active worker in all the church activities, and a deacon since 1802. He has also taken an active part in the national denominational societies; a corporate member of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions: President of the Congregational Church Building Society 1897-1917; member of the Executive Committee of the American Missionary Association since 1892, and its Chairman since 1913; member of the Congregational Board of Ministerial Relief and Chairman of the Finance Committee of this and other societies. He has been a leader in the affairs of the Congregational Council, as a member of the Commission of Nineteen. which was instrumental in bringing the Council into closer relations with the benevolent societies of the denomination, and has served on other important commissions and boards. In 1910 he was a delegate to the World's Missionary Conference at Edinburgh.

Dr. Warner has been especially interested in religious and philanthropic work of an interdenominational character. He was chairman of the New York State Committee of the Y. M. C. A., 1893-5, and of the International Committee, 1895-1910. During this time he travelled extensively over the country in promoting the interests of the Associations. He has been a trustee of Oberlin College for over forty years, and has given to it two large buildings, one for the Conservatory of Music and one for a gymnasium. With his brother he built the Seaside Institute at Bridgeport for the use of their

employees.

Dr. Warner is a member of the University Club of New York, the Adirondack League Club, the Scarsdale Golf Club, the New York Chamber of Commerce, the New England Society, Society of Mayflower Descendants, Metropolitan Museum of Art. American Museum of Natural History, Congregational Club (of which he was President 1889-94); National Geographic Society.

In 1914 he published an autobiographical volume, The Story

of My Life during Seventy Eventful Years, 1841-1911.

Lucien C. Warner married in McGrawville, N. Y., April 12, 1868, KEREN SARAH THIRZA OSBORNE, who was born October 15, 1849, at East Scott, near Homer, N. Y., the daughter of Judge Noah Humphrey Osborne, who was born at Goshen, Conn., August 26, 1802, died in New York City, July

26, 1894, and his wife, Eliza Azubah Thompson, born at Farmington, Conn., July 31, 1805, died at McGrawville, N. Y., July 5, 1881. Judge Osborne was descended through his mother, Sarah Marshall Humphrey, from Michael Humphrey, who settled in Windsor, Conn., about 1643. When Keren was six months old, the family removed to the hamlet of Scott, and four years later, to the village of McGrawville, which was her home until her marriage, with the exception of three years on a farm northwest of McGrawville. She was educated by her brother, at private schools, and at the New York Central Academy, later studying music at Friendship, N. Y.

Mrs. Warner has been in close sympathy and co-operation with her husband in all his benevolent and philanthropic work. She was the first President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Harlem Young Men's Christian Association, and managed a large fair in aid of its building fund; a charter member and the first President of the Harlem Relief Society; a member of the first Board of Directors of the Harlem Young Women's Christian Association, and was elected its first President, but the pressure of other duties prevented her acceptance. In 1890 she joined Sorosis, the first chartered woman's club ever organized, and has served five times as chairman of its Executive Committee. She has been active in social matters, but she has been more interested in welfare work, especially in efforts to better the condition of women and children. She has not favored the extension of suffrage to women, as she has believed that women could accomplish more for good government without the vote than with it. During the great world war, she has devoted most of her time to work for the Red Cross. In 1902 she received from Oberlin College the honorary degree of A.M., in recognition of her services in benevolent and philanthropic work.

On April 12, 1918, Dr. and Mrs. Warner celebrated their Golden Wedding at their home in New York. There were present their four children with their wives and husbands and six of the seven grandchildren. The oldest grandson, Lucien Hynes Warner, was absent, attending Pomona College, California. Speeches were made, toasts were given, and presents exchanged, and altogether it was a rare and delightful occasion to those concerned.



Amateur photography has also claimed considerable of his attention, and he has made many fine autochrome plates for use with the lantern. He is active in all sports, is fond of hunting and is a member of the Scarsdale Golf and Country Club, of the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York, of the New York Chemical Club, and of the Congregational Club of New York and Vicinity.

Married April 25, 1899, at Los Angeles, Cal., ESTELLE DUNN HYNES, daughter of Samuel Burke and Ellen Magelen (Anderson) Hynes (Samuel Burke⁵, Rev. Thomas Woodruff⁴, William Rose³, Thomas², William¹). William Hynes came from Londonderry, in the extreme North of Ireland, sometime before December 7, 1745, as a record left by him shows that on that date he entered the service of Benjamin Franklin of Philadelphia for one year. In 1916, Mr. and Mrs. Warner made a trip of seven months in Japan, China, Ceylon and India, visiting the mission stations as members of a deputation sent out by the American Board. On this trip they made a careful study of the field, taking a large number of autochrome photographs. Since their return, both Mr. and Mrs. Warner have spent a large amount of time

In the fall of 1901, he removed to Bridgeport, Conn., and entered the business of The Warner Brothers Company, established by his father and uncle in 1874. At first he was employed in the advertising department, but in 1903 he was made secretary of the company, and his responsibilities were enlarged to include the export business, and still later to include the entire selling organization. In addition to his duties with the Warner Brothers Company he is a director of the Bridgeport Hydraulic Co., and the Bridgeport Gas Light Company, and trustee of the Bridgeport Savings Bank,

Mr. Warner has taken an active part in the religious, social and philanthropic interests of Bridgeport. He is a director of the Bridgeport Young Men's Christian Association, and served four years as its President. He was active in bringing about the union of the two oldest Congregational churches, under the name of The United Church. He was a member of the original committee that founded the Boy Scouts of America of the United States, and was President of the Bridgeport Council from its formation until 1917. In 1915-1916 he served on the Vice Commission appointed by the Mayor of Bridgeport, which

spent many weeks in investigating the moral conditions and brought in a report which did much to clean up the city. In 1916 and 1917 he served on two commissions that prepared commission and commission manager forms of City Government for Bridgeport, which were later defeated at the polls. LINES WHOSE CONNECTION IS UNCERTAIN

CHARLES WARNER is believed to have been a descendant of Andrew Warner, although his connection with recorded branches of the family is not established. He was born in Windham, Conn., November, 1762; resided for a time in Coventry; died in Geddes, Onondaga County, N. Y., November 26, 1837, buried in Geddes, now a part of Syracuse. He enlisted at Windham, Conn., July 15, 1779, in Captain Williams' Company of Colonel Durkee's Regiment, Connecticut Troops, and remained in service until January 10, 1780, when he was honorably discharged.
