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PREFACE

The compilation of this book has been a labor of love. While it is perhaps as complete as any genealogy of a similar family of old Puritan stock, it has been impossible to find every descendant. I regret that many failed to send data, but it must be remembered that a genealogy cannot be complete; that the endless procession of births and deaths goes on, even while a book is in press. The Puffer descendants during the next century will find little difficulty, however, in tracing their ancestry. Those who are not mentioned may find in this book their fathers or grandfathers.

The foundation for this genealogy was laid more than a generation ago by the late William Sumner Appleton of Boston, a scholarly and gifted descendant of George Puffer, in a genealogical sketch published in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register in 1868. A revised edition of this sketch was printed in a

pamphlet of ten pages in 1882.

For more than forty years, Dr. Loring W. Puffer of Brockton has been collecting material for a Puffer genealogy. In 1907 he placed at my disposal his notes, letters and records collected from descendants of George Puffer, and at that time I arranged the material, hoping to be able sometime to complete the work. But for his efforts much of the material in this family history would be lacking. To him, more than to any other person, the family owes its gratitude for the thoroughness of the work. Only those who have taken part in compiling a genealogy can fully appreciate the time, expense and energy that Dr. Puffer has contributed to these pages.

In October, 1914, Charles C. Puffer of Rochester encouraged me to resume work on the book by offering a handsome contribution to the printing fund. I have made all possible haste in the work in order that Dr. Puffer himself might see it completed. To other members of the family who have given financial assistance, especially to Herbert and Edward C. Wesby, who con-

tributed the binding, Luther W. Puffer of Boston, and Alvin D. Puffer of Concord, I wish to express my thanks.

I have given my time and labor in memory of my mother. If there were other mothers in this family as self-sacrificing, as loving, as devoted and lovable as she, there are other sons who will appreciate how freely I have given my time to this work.

The vital records of every town in Massachusetts and of every town in New Hampshire have been searched from the beginning to the present time, and, wherever Puffers have lived, an effort has been made to get the public records. All information relating to the family history to be obtained in deeds and probate records of the Massachusetts counties has been gathered and incorporated in the history. The colonial war and Revolutionary war archives of the New England states have been searched and the military service given in the accounts of the individuals. The records in the pension office at Washington have furnished some interesting data. I have attempted to get original public or private records as authority for every date and statement. I have given references when they seemed to me necessary.

From the directories of some 500 towns and cities I obtained a list of addresses of members of the family and from correspondence I added to that list until I now have names of more than a thousand persons to whom the prospectus and information blanks have been sent. Every reasonable effort has been made to get a report

from every person of the Puffer name or blood.

It is interesting to note that some of the reports sent thirty or forty years ago to Dr. Puffer were compiled by persons, who, if now living, would be more than a hundred years old. Some of them have no living descendants. Some of the records in this book could not be obtained now. The report sent by Lewis Puffer of Mt. Palatine, Ill., born in 1798, for instance, states that his father told him that he attended the funeral of Samuel Puffer, born in 1707, died at Sudbury in 1776. Many reports were dated as early as 1876.

ORIGIN OF THE FAMILY

We know nothing of the origin of George Puffer of Braintree. He certainly was with English pioneers in Boston in 1639, though his name is German in origin. We presume he was English in speech as he appears to have been in religion.

While the surname Puffer is common in Germany an extensive search of English parish records and archives reveals no definite trace of the name, Poffer, Pougher or Puffer. The name Purffey is found in Wormsley, Herts., about 1600, and George Pureffey was at Wadley, Berkshire, about the same time. John Pufford married, March 30, 1714, Mary Sexton at St. James, Clerkenwell, London.

THE GERMAN FAMILY

Evidence of the German origin of the Puffer family is given in the following letter:

Elm Place, Avon, N. Y., Dec. 6, 1905.

Dr. Loring W. Puffer, Brockton, Mass.

Dear Dr. Puffer:

Sometime ago my father sent us the enclosed letter from Carl Puffer, the coat-of-arms with description, three photographs, and two memorial cards, which he asked us to send one to you with the request that you return them to us after perusing them at your leisure. In explanation of the enclosures, I will copy what he wrote us about the family, for you will doubtless be as interested as we are in knowing of them. He says: "When in Vienna I looked in the directory and found several Puffers, on one of whom I called and found his father had been burgomaster of Floridsdorp, a large suburb, for nine years. The family came from Hesse, in Germany, originally, and sent some pictures, a pencil copy and description of the family coat-of-arms, etc. It

seems that the family was ennobled in 1569 for civic services. It seems that in 1759 or thereabouts, one of the family was a theologian and author in North America, but I do not know where (perhaps this reference is meant

for Rev. Reuben Puffer of Berlin, Mass.).

Joseph Puffer was a General and Baron in Austria of recent creation and his son also was in the army. His widow, Frau Jenny Baronin Puffer is living in fine style in Vienna." I infer that these two families are quite separate. My father called several times on this Baroness Puffer, but never succeeding in finding her at home, so he has not met her, but had quite a visit with members of the other family, and found them pleasant and hospitable. We may possibly trace relationship to one of these families, but as yet we have not opportunity of attempting it. I expect my father home again in two or three weeks and I am sure he will be glad to hear from you.

A search in various American directories reveals many families of the names Puff, Poff, Pulfer, Peffer, Puffert, Puffe, Pufford, Prueffer, and Pfeiffer. Some of these are doubtless of German ancestry and some are emi-

grants from Germany.

Kaiser Puffer, a laborer, a native of Germany, died at Bridgewater May 4, 1886, aged 40 years.

Henry Puffer, a native of Germany, died Feb. 5, 1884, aged 42 years, at Danvers, a son of John G. and Wilhelmina Puffer.

Henry Puffer, a native of Prussia, settled in Lee, Mass., before 1874.

Bulder and Katherine (Keating) Puffer were, according to the vital records of the town, living in Deerfield, Mass., in 1868.

None of the Puffers born in Germany have been good enough to reply to the author's request for information relating to their ancestry.

ABBREVIATIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

The style of this genealogy has become a standard. It has been used by the New England Historic Genealogical Society in its publications for many years and found the most simple and satisfactory arrangement for a family history. Even those who have never seen a genealogy will find no difficulty in understanding it. Each head of a family has in brackets his line of ancestry indicated, thus: (Jabez*, Jabez*, James*, George¹). The small figures show the generations, viz: Jabez* was son of Jabez*, grandson of James* and great-grandson of George¹. The number in black type above a head of family may be found at the left of the name of the same person, in the preceding generation, where he appears as a child. In tracing a line, one works backward through the various generations, using the numbers.

When towns are mentioned without giving the state, Massachusetts is the state. The customary abbreviations are used, such as: b. for born; d., died; m., married; g. s., gravestone; int., intention of marriage; M. D., Middlesex Deeds; n. s., new style; o. s., old style; s. p., without issue; S. D., Suffolk Deeds; unm., unmarried; Reg., New England Historic Genealogical Register; W. D., Worcester Deeds.

The proprietors of a town in colonial and provincial days were the grantees or patentees, virtually the owners and governors. While custom and conditions varied somewhat, it was the rule to have periodic divisions of the common lands among the proprietors or owners of "rights," some townships were granted for military service in the Indian wars; some were purchased outright, and others apparently given on petition.

The baptismal records of the early church are used when available, if the birth records are lacking. It was a custom of the early settlers to have infants baptized as soon as possible after birth, generally on the following Sunday in church. One of the parents, at least, had to be in good standing in the church to permit of a baptism.

"Admitted a freeman" is a phrase that may need some explanation. Freeman were admitted by vote of the legislature or General Court. Membership in the Puritan Church was a prerequisite. The electorate was composed of this body of freemen. It was intended to exclude those of other religious faith from having a share in the government.

On account of changes in the calendar, it is necessary in a work of this kind to use the "double-dating" in the months of January, February and March before 1752. Until that year the first day of the year was March 25. For example, the date Feb. 11, 1720-1 shows that the year was 1720 "old style"; 1721 "new style." To change old-style dates to conform to the present calendar, allowance must be made for the number of days in which the English calendar reckoning was in error. It is not our purpose to explain the calendar, but simply to call attention to the double-dating, which might be construed by some readers to mean doubt as to the year. It should be noted, too, that in old records, when March was the first month, all the months were numbered accordingly. In the old records, for instance, 2-10-1675 means December 2, 1675, and 1-2-1690 means April 1, 1690.

George Puffer, the first of the family in this country and the pioneer ancestor, lived but a few years after coming to New England, and we know very little about him. He was one of the residents of Boston to whom land was granted at Mount Wollaston, which was afterwards the town of Braintree, now the city of Quincy. The record shows that he was granted twenty acres and that there were five in his family, indicating that he had three children, February 24, 1639. His homestead was located about two miles east of the railroad station of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad (formerly the Old Colony Railroad) at Quincy. It is the site of the present Fore River shipvards. In the early records the name is often spelled Poffer. The Widow Puffer died at Braintree, February 18, 1676. He was born as early as 1600, died at Braintree, Sept. 27, 1639. (See Pother in records.) (J. W. Porter, Bangor, Me., 1882.)

He had sons James and Matthias The records show that Matthias married Rachel Farnsworth. According to the Farnsworth genealogy and public records, Ruth Farnsworth, born June 3, 1642, married William Puffer. In his account of the Puffer family, Mr. Appleton finds no further trace of William Puffer, and the compiler of this work has also failed. A Thomas Puttne of R. I. died in Wrentham, July 11, 1702. This name was printed "Puffer" in the Register, owing to an error in transcribing. Mary Puffer, who died at Braintree, July 22, 1700, was probably widow of James. It may still be questioned whether George had a son William.

James Puffer (George¹) was born about 1624, probably in England. He succeeded to his father's homestead in Braintree and lived there to the end of his life. His farm was at Ship Cove, now called Quincy Neck, and he also owned land in what is now the town of Randolph. Though he followed farming, he is also described as a boatman. He was elected constable in place of John Bass, Mch., 1679-80. He died at Braintree, July 25, 1692, aged about sixty-eight years. He married at Braintree, February 14, 1656, Mary Ludden, who was born at Weymouth, December 17, 1636, daughter of James Ludden, a pioneer of the town of Weymouth, corporal of the military company and town officer. She died at Braintree July 22, 1700.

In the will of John Saunders of Braintree, 1684, he describes his land as "Next the sea" adjoining James Puffer's. (Suffolk, XVI, p. 207.)

Matthias Puffer (George¹) was born about 1635. He lived in Mendon until after the birth of his second son. About 1666, he made his home in Mendon, Worcester County, Massachusetts.

Matthias Puffer was one of the thirteen persons ordered to be settled at the plantation of Nipmug, later called Mendon, in September, 1663, and in 1671-2 he was a selectman of Mendon. He was one of a committee "Deputed by the towns of Dedham and Mendon to Run the Lyne between them" in 1669. At a town meeting Oct. 18, 1674, the town of Mendon chose Puffer "to goe to Natick to fech Asnawaket up for to shew us the bounds of the land that he sold to Moses Paine and Peter Brackett and all so gave him full power to act in the behalf of the Town as if themselves were present."

At a general town meeting May 6, 1675, the town sold to Matthias Puffer a tract of land lying between John Bartlett's house lot and the mill, and also twenty acres of land in some other place where he shall choose, "and for the said tracts of Land Mathias pufer doth Ingage to carry one and to manigge the work of the towne In settelling the bounds and preambulations of the said town att the generall Court or Courts as ned may Require untill it be seteled unto us by the honered Court and all so to pay and bare all the Charges that may be demanded or may be nedfull or necessary upon the said town from all dewes or demands upon the said Acount."

"Granted to Mathyas Puffer Tenn Acores of land and twenty five more of acores on the south side of the runlett that Runs downe at the End of his house lott on

the right hand or side of the old fotte path."

His home lot was about one mile south of the present post office in Mendon. On what part of it his buildings stood no records or reliable traditions indicate. It is positively certain, however, that the Swandale Cemetery is situated on what was once part of the Puffer house lot. As the valuable and attractive spring, now or lately owned by W. S. Wilcox, was near by, it is quite possible that the Puffer house stood on a spot now included in the cemetery. Dr. Metcalf thought that the location of the Puffer house was marked by an old cellar hole, which had been pointed out to him forty years before he published his book. But Dr. Loring Puffer and

others who have studied the matter since then are satisfied that this was not the location, though it is a spot of historic interest, for it is now understood to be the place where the first murder was committed in Mendon. The victim was Mrs. Thomas Sanford and the house stood in the pasture now or lately owned by Willard S. Wilcox a little southeast of the Daniel Thurber house, now or lately occupied by C. Austin Fletcher. Thomas Sanford formerly owned the Austin A. Taft place, buying it about 1713 of Deacon Peter Holbrook, but he sold it a long time before the murder and bought the place first mentioned. Tradition also has it that the second house of Matthias Puffer was built on this site. The first house was destroyed by the Indians at the beginning of King Philip's War.

"M. M. A." writes in the Milford Journal, Aug. 19, "Mr. Puffer's house-lot extended from the now Providence and Worcester road to this spring (on the Wilcox place) and as no other house-lot extended farther than Muddy Brook and the Puffer house-lot only in a narrow strip of land just to reach the spring, it would seem that the object of Mr. Puffer in asking to have this special piece of land set off to him was that he might enjoy this beautiful spring of running water for his family use. This would not be convenient if his house was at the west end of his house-lot across Muddy Brook with a third of a mile to travel and a swelling brook to ford. Our records, so far as found, make mention of Matthias Puffer's house in two different places. In both it is more probable that its location was at or near the spring than at the extreme west end of his house-lot, where, evidently, his second house was built, he perhaps not feeling that he could again locate where the blood of his wife and son had been so ruthlessly spilled.

"That Matthias Puffer did return to Mendon after King Philip's War is shown by an agreement made by him with the town of Mendon Jan. 9, 1684, to rebuild the Benjamin Albee corn mill (which stood near where Lewis B. Gaskill now lives) and maintain said mill and provide it with a miller for the term of twenty years."

The first victims of King Philip's war in Massachusetts were the wife and son of Matthias Puffer, killed by Indians at Mendon July 10 or 14, 1675. The event has been commemorated by a suitable monument at Mendon, inscribed with a list of the victims. After this massacre the inhabitants returned to Braintree, Weymouth and other older towns and the Indians burned Mendon the following winter. After the war, about 1780, when some of the inhabitants had returned to the desolate village, a complaint was made to the General Court because Puffer had not returned to help build up the settlement again. To the Court he made answer: "To the Honored Council Now Sittinge in Boston, The humble petition of Matthias Puffer Humbly sheweth That whereas your petitioner hath been Complained of for being absent from Mendon to ve discouragement of those that remaine, my answer is that I at first departed with ye consent of the Town, provided I carried away the Widow Gurney (whose husband is thought to have been another victim of the massacre) at my own charge which I accordingly performed and since the Majors warrant to summon me and the rest thither againe I have returned thither againe and have been helpful to them by procuring them ammunition and otherwise. Indeed I have been forced to return to Braintree to take care of my children that are left.

"My wife was slaine by the barbarous Indians and my eldest son; severall of the best of my cattell killed; to maintain the garrison many more of them, I have left; my estate is lost; my condition is desolate and I am not in ye capacity that others are whose families are not broken, I humbly beseech the Honored Councill to consider my case & not expose my poore children to ruin for I have not estate to maintain my children without my labour and care, to him that is in affliction pitty should be showed.

"I think my case is the case of the widow if not

worse. My humble petition is that I may be suffered to remaine at Braintree that I may be a succor to my children which else will be exposed to ruin and your petitioner shall ever pray,

Matthias Puffer."

After living at Dedham for a time, he finally settled in Dorchester. His farm was in that part of the town afterwards incorporated as Stoughton. He was surveyor of highways at Dorchester in 1702 and tythingman in 1705. He joined the church at Milton Nov. 12, 1693. He deeded 120 acres of the 340 acres that he bought in 1696 of James Foster to his son John.

His house was the next north of the Doty tavern. It was enlarged and repaired about 1810 by John Davenport. In 1879 it was the oldest house in Canton. He deeded it to his son Jonathan Puffer.

He died at Dorchester, May 9, 1717. His will was dated April 23, 1714, proved June 24, 1717. He left to his wife Mary a third of the real estate and ten pounds in money and bequeathed also to his sons John, James, Jonathan and Eleazer and daughters Hester Sumner and Abigail Crane. Jonathan was executor. In the will the name is spelled Puffar. He signed by mark, which was an old English or German capital "M."

"In the Name of God Amen April the Twenty Third One Thousand Seven hundred and fourteen I Matthias Puffar of Dorchester in the County of Suffolk in Her Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England yeoman having by the Goodness and patience of God lived to Old age—but being in perfect mind and memory thanks be to god for it, therefore calling to mind the Mortality of Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to dye Doe make this my Last Will and Testament That is to Say Principally and first of all I Give and recommend my Soul into the hands of God that give it and my Body I recommend to the Earth to be

buried in Decent and Christian manner at the Discretion of my Executor nothing Doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the Almighty Power of God, and as touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God for to Bless me in this life I Give Demise and Dispose of the Same in the following manner & form Imprimis I Give and bequeath unto Mary Puffar my dearly beloved wife after my Decease the income of one Third of my Estate and Ten pounds in money to be paid to her by my Executors out of my moveable Estate Item I give and bequeath unto my well beloved son John Puffar one halfe of my Meadow lying in the foul meadows and no more because he has had Sufficient portion already. Item I give to my beloved son James Puffar besides what I have given him already out of my Estate the one halfe of my Salt meadow lying in Dorchester which is three acres. Item I give to my beloved Daughter Hester Sumnar the one halfe of my fresh meadow in the foul Meadows. Item I give unto my wel beloved Son Jonathan Puffar whom I Constitute and appoint one of my Executors of this my last will and Testament one halfe of my Salt meadow in Milton and fifty Acres of Land lying on the North Side of the Indian line and one halfe of my Six score Acres of Land in Dedham near to Wrentham Item I give to my beloved son Eliazar Puffer whom I also Constitute to be one of my Executors all my housing and the Land thereunto Adjoyning which I have not already Disposed of to my Son James and Jonathan & also one halfe of my salt meadow in Milton Item I give to my well beloved Daughter Abigall Crane one halfe of my lot of Land in Dedham near Wrentham & I Do hereby Utterly Disallow all other wills and Testaments Confirming this and no other to be my Last Will & Testament In Witness whereof I have Set to my hand and seal this Day and vear above written

Richard Puffer³ (James², George¹) was born at Braintree, March 14, 1657. He settled in Wrentham. He was a soldier in King Philip's War in Capt. John Holbrook's company. Captain Jabez Puffer³ (James², George¹) was born at Braintree, Feb. 4, 1672, and bapt. there Feb. 22, 1673-4. He and his wife joined the Braintree church, May 21, 1704. He was a boatman, resided at Ship Cove, now Quincy Neck. Jabez Puffer, boatman, for £ 20 7s, sold to John Ruggles 4 acres of upland and meadow called the "great fence field" near the house of Ruggles.

Bounded westerly on land of Samuel Newcome, deceased, easterly and northwesterly on land of Ruggles, southerly on the creek called the Sheep Cove." Deed signed by Jabez and wife Mary, May 29, 1712. Lieutenant John Puffer³ (Matthias², George¹) was born at Braintree, October 10, 1665. He was an early settler in Canton, receiving from his father in 1691 the deed of 120 acres of land, bounded northeast by what is now the Milton line and northwest by the Great Blue Hills. This farm was in that part of Dorchester incorporated as Stoughton in 1726 and later as Canton. He was lieutenant of the military company; served on the committee to seat the meeting house, November 15, 1717; was assessor in 1719. In 1705 he was constable at Ponkapoag. John Puffer and Benjamin Blackman took the deed of the oldest cemetery in Canton, March 7, 1741, of Thomas Shepard. "Old Lieutenant Puffer" died January 16, 1750-1. The Canton history describes his headstone as "in sad condition"; it is broken so as to be almost illegible and some kind hand has set it up against

the wall. It reads: "—ried the — uffer who die— (1)750 aged 85— —onths and 6 days."

Captain Jabez Puffer⁴ (Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Braintree in 1705. He went to Sudbury with his father, and became a substantial citizen. He joined the Sudbury church July 12, 1727. He served in the French and Indian Wars, as private in Capt. Josiah Brown's Co. in 1739 and as ensign in Capt. Josiah Richardson's Co., in 1757. Later he was captain of a Sudbury company. He was on a town committee to widen the causeway at Ironworks meadow in 1771. He lived in the house, built by his father, enlarged by himself, and still standing in 1900. He and his brother Ephraim of Sudbury deeded to Ephraim Keith of Bridgewater land at Petersham, July 21, 1738 (W. D. 10-526) and also land bought of Thomas Baldwin at Petersham (Nichewaug) March 5, 1743-4 (W. D. 29-355). He deeded land to his son Jacob at Templeton, April 13, 1764 (W. D. 55-379). He died at Sudbury, June 21, 1789, in his 85th year. His gravestone is in the burying ground at Sudbury Center. In his will dated April 8, 1785, he bequeaths to wife Sarah: children James, Jacob, Daniel, Reuben, Rebecca Gibson and grandchildren Nahum and Reuben Rice.

This eighteenth Day of March Anno Domini One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventy Nine and in the third year of American Independence, I Jabez Puffer of Sudbury, in the county of Middlesex and State of the Massachusetts Bay, New England, Gentleman, being indisposed in Body, but of good and perfect mind and memory (thanks to Almighty God) and calling to remembrance the uncertain State of this transitory Life, and that all flesh must yield to death when it shall please God to call; do make and declare this my last will and Testament in manner and form following: -Being penitent and sorry for all my sins, and most humbly imploring forgiveness for the same I commend my soul unto Almighty God my saviour and Redeemer in whom and by whose merits I trust and believe assuredly to be saved, to receive a full remission of all my sins, and inherit the Kingdom of God; and my body I commit to the Earth to be decently interred at the discretion of my Executor hereafter named; and for the settling of my temporal estate, and such Goods, Chattels and Debts as shall be found at my decease, all lawful demands on the same being satisfied, I appoint and order to be done in the following manner:-First-I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife Sarah Puffer, the income of all my Lande lying in Sudbury, she being at the charge of all the Labor for said income. Also I give her a good steady Horse and Chaise to use at her election; also the use of that part of the dwelling house and Sellar which I now possess, together with the free use of all other buildings on the Premises; also I bequeath unto her my loving wife two Cows, and all the Household furniture she brought with her, to dispose of as she shall think proper, the income of said Lands, and the use of Horse, Chaise, House, Sellar and other bulidings to be hers so long as she remains my widow.

Also I give and bequeath to my four dutiful and well

beloved sons (viz) James Puffer, whom I have settled in Sudbury, Josiah Puffer whom I have settled in Westminster in the county of Worcester, Jacob Puffer whom I have settled in Ashby in the county of Middlesex and Daniel Puffer whom I have settled with myself in Sudbury, to them and each of them five shillings to be paid to them by my Executor in one year after my decease.

To each of them I have given good farms or settlements and my son Daniel Puffer is to have the refusal of my Homestead at the apprisal after my Decease if he pleases and agrees with his mother in law (stepmother), and pays to my Executor the remainder of what it shall be apprised at, otherwise it shall be free for the purchase

of any other person.

Also I give and bequeath to my dutiful and well beloved son Reuben Puffer having already given him an education at Harvard College twenty six Pounds thirteen shillings and four pence to be paid him by my Executor in one year after the beginning to settle my estate. Also I give to the said Reuben Puffer a Bed, with the furniture thereto."

(Charles Nutt has another will dated Feb. 21, 1774.) Epitaph: "Here rests in hope of a resurrection the mortal part of Capt. Jabez Puffer who departed this life June 21 A. D. 1789 in the 85th year of his age.

> "My flesh shall slumber in the ground Till the last trumpet's joyful sound Then burst the chains without surprise And in my Saviour's image rise."

He married, first, at Sudbury, July 24, 1731, Thankful Haynes, born April 22, 1708, died June 24, 1737, daughter of Deacon James and Sarah (Noyes) Haynes, granddaughter of John and Dorothy Haynes and great granddaughter of the pioneer Walter Haynes. Her gravestone is standing beside her husband's.

He married, second, Oct. 18, 1738, at Framingham, Hannah Treadway, born March 19, 1715, died at Sudbury, July 28, 1777, aged 62 years (gravestone), daughter of Benjamin and Mary (Maynard) Treadway of Framingham. For eighteen months, she was kept a captive by the Indians. She was taken when eighteen years old, and finally ransomed.

Captain Samuel Puffer⁴ (Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Braintree, Oct. 12, 1707, and came in his boyhood to Sudbury, where he spent the rest of his life. He was a "slay-maker" by trade and also a farmer. He was a member of the church, active in town and church and captain of the Sudbury company, as shown by the town records. He joined the church at Sudbury June 10, 1733.

He married, at Sudbury, Dec. 12, 1732, Dorothy Haynes, daughter of Deacon James Haynes of Sudbury, descendant of various first settlers of that town. Samuel and Dorothy Puffer, James Haynes, Abijah Haynes, the heirs of Deacon James Haynes, confirmed the title of David Bugbee to land at Shrewsbury sold by their father, giving a deed dated Feb. 13, 1737-8 (W. D. 10-493) to replace the original deed, which was burned when Bugbee's house was destroyed.

Captain Samuel Puffer's will was dated March 4, 1773, proved in 1776, bequeathing to son Samuel; son Phineas; daughter Susanna Haynes, wife of Joshua Haynes; to grandson Nathan Puffer, son of Nathan, deceased, land at Gulf Neck, Sudbury; to wife Dorothy his personal estate and ample supplies from the homestead during her life. Jonathan Puffer⁴ (Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Braintree Oct. 22, 1711. He lived in Concord and Carlisle. He was a soldier in the French and Indian war in the first Concord regt., Col. James Minott, in 1757. He was selectman of Carlisle in 1754 and 1756 and moderator of the town meeting May 26, 1777. He was third on a committee of five to prepare a letter instructing the representative to the General Court. He was of Concord, April 22, 1771, when he bought land at Harvard of Joseph Atherton of Harvard (W. D. 66-433). He removed in 1771 to Harvard and died there Nov. 1, 1782. His gravestone inscription reads: "In memory of Mr. Jonathan Puffer who died Nov. 1, 1782, aged 71 years." He and wife Mary deeded land to their daughter Sarah Merriam at Harvard in 1778 (W. D. 117-458).

Matthias Puffer⁴ (Eleazer³, Matthias², George¹) was born at Dorchester, Feb. 5, 1715-6. He lived at Stoughtonham, now the town of Sharon. He was a soldier in the French and Indian War, Oct. 5, 1755, at Roxbury, in Colonel Samuel Miller's regiment; also in 1757 in Captain Benjamin Johnson's company, Col. Miller's regiment. The census of 1790 shows that he, his wife and

one daughter were then living in Sharon. He died in 1806.

James Puffer⁴ (Eleazer³, Matthias², George¹) was born at Stoughton, Feb. 26, 1722-3; died Sept. 21, 1756, in the service. He was a soldier from Stoughton in the French and Indian War in Capt. Nathaniel Blake's company, Col. Janathan Bagley's regt. in the expedition against Crown Point; also in Capt. Johnson's company, Col. Miller's regt. He lost his life at Camp William Henry in the Crown Point Expedition.

There was also a James Puffer in the French and Indian War from the vicinity of Stonington, Conn., where his brother Lazarus settled, and the record is believed to belong to this James. A James Puffer served from April 7 to Nov. 15, 1755, in third company, first regiment, Capt. Robert Dennison (Conn. Hist. Soc., IX,

Lazarus Puffer⁴ (Eleazer³, Matthias², George¹) was born at Stoughton, June 1, 1729. He settled at Hebron, Conn. He was a soldier from Hebron in the French and

Indian War. He served in Capt. Charles Dewey's company in 1757. He was in Capt. Edmond Wells's company (fifth), Col. Whitney's regt. (second), April 3 to Oct. 26, 1758, and in the same command in 1759. From April 5 to Dec. 22, 1759, he was in Capt. Ichabod Phelps's company of Hebron and he served also in this company in 1760, 1761 and 1762. (See Conn. Hist. Society, Vol. IX, pp. 38, 39, 40, 135, 202, 340.) He was also a soldier in the Revolution. A Lazarus Puffer enlisted for three years in the eighth Connecticut Line, under Colonels John Chandler and Giles Russell. Timothy Puffer⁵ (William⁴, Richard³, James², George¹) was born at Wrentham, Mass., Jan. 17, 1713-4. He settled at Canterbury, Conn. He married Esther Clark, born March 1, 1716, died August 21, 1805, aged 90 years. The grave of Timothy is not marked. In one old grave-yard, where tradition says Puffers were buried, there are perhaps twenty graves with common field stones at the head and foot, unmarked, and only four stones inscribed, two of these being illegible. Miss Hannah B. Baldwin states that Timothy died in 1781, and is buried at Shaftsbury, Vermont, where he was living with his son Timothy.

Timothy Puffer was one of the original proprietors of Upper Ashuelot (Keene) and one of the six who held the first meeting in Keene in Sept., 1734. He had lot 22. He was an assessor in Feb., 1738; on a committee on the town line in 1739. He was last mentioned at Keene in

the town records in 1742.

Thomas Puffer⁵ (Ebenezer⁴, James³, James², George¹) was born at Sudbury, Aug. 13, 1741; died there June 20, 1796. He was a soldier in the Revolution, a private in Capt. Aaron Haynes's Co. 1775. In 1790, the census shows that there were two males over sixteen and two females in his family. But there is no record of his marriage. Joel Puffer was executor of his will, proved May 28, 1796. His homestead contained about sixty acres, and he had a lot of twenty acres at what was known as Pantry. His property was left to brothers and sisters — Mary, James and Isaac, and nephews Asa and Joel. Asa Puffer received the real estate and gave bonds to support the mother of the deceased.

Josiah Richardson's company, April 25, 1757; also an ensign in Capt. Aaron Haynes's company (second Sudbury), Col. Elisha Jones's regt., list of offi-

cers, third regt., in 1771, and second lieut. on the Lexington alarm in the Revolution, in Capt. Aaron Haynes's company. He died in 1810. Josiah Puffer⁵ (Jabez⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Sudbury, Mass., March 21, 1735-6; died July 9, 1806. He married Nov. 29, 1759, Mary Read, daughter of Jacob and Experience Read; great granddaughter of Dr. Philip Read of Concord, Mass. She died July 19, 1831, at Westminster, aged 90 years. Puffer settled in Westminster about the time of the incorporation, 1759, on Lot No. 62, in the south part of the town, on the farm lately owned by Cephas W. Bush. In early youth he lost a thumb by the explosion of a gun in his hands and was

disqualified for military service. When he enlisted, it is said that he passed the examination by wearing gloves of which the thumb of one was filled with wood. He was in the French War, as the following letter to his father at Sudbury shows:

"Halfway Brook, July ye 23, 1758.

Honored father and mother

I hope these few lines may find you and all my Brothers and Sisters well and in good health as I am at this time after my Duty to you my father and mother and Love to my Brothers and sisters and friends and neighbors I will inform you that we have been met with a vary poor Stroke in the loss of Captain Daken and Leftene Curtis and thre privets, william grout Jonathan Patson Nathaniel Molton all of Sudbury and in the fight we lost three Captens and two Leftenants and one Ensine and two Sargnts and one Corporal and thirteen privets all out of our Regiment * * * and I will inform you that I-Received your Letter this Day Dated June ye 29, and I Desier you would Send me a Letter as Sun as you Can and I also Desier prayers for me and I hope that I shall Return to you in Due time—Know more at present So I Remain Your Dutifull Son

JOSIAH PUFFER."

He was sergeant in Captain Dakin's Co., Col. Nichols' regt. at Worcester (list Jan. 4, 1759). He was in Captain Noah Miles' company, Colonel John Whitcomb's regiment Apr. 19, 1775, and took part in the Battle of Bunker Hill; also in Capt. Elisha Jackson's company to reinforce the northern army, 1777.

He was an active, influential citizen, of good judgment, able and upright. He was Representative to the General Court in 1787, 1790 and 1791. He was the best educated man in town, except perhaps the minister. He retained his health to the day of his death. He mowed an acre of heavy grass the day before he died, and, indeed, died in the hayfield next day, while making his hay, pitchfork in hand, and was found dead by a neighbor.

He deeded land to his son Samuel in 1805 (W. D. 163, 452). His will was dated Jan. 10, 1806. In 1790 the census shows he was living in Westminster, head of a family of nine.

Jacob Puffer⁵ (Jabez⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Sudbury, April 10, 1743, and died there, April 20, 1777, aged 34 years (gravestone).

He settled early at Ashby, and became a very prominent citizen. He was elected assessor at the first town meeting and was selectman for many years. He lived for a time in Templeton before his marriage, and sold land there Oct. 25, 1765, to Abel Hunt and, June 19, 1766, to Jonathan Baldwin and, April 11, 1766, to Thomas Sawyer (W. D. 54-642; 55-376, 642). He was in Fitchburg in 1766. He was a soldier in the French and Indian War in the Canadian Expedition, 1758, in Capt. Cobb's company, Col. Preble's regt., as shown by Capt. Ezekiel How's bill for victualling the company; How kept the Wayside Inn. He was also a soldier in the Revolution, enlisting Jan. 29, 1776, for two months. His will was dated in 1774, bequeathing to wife Sarah and children. His wife was guardian of children Jacob, Sarah and Lucy, Sept. 19, 1780, and Samuel Gibson, her brother, was appointed their guardian afterwards.

Daniel Puffer⁵ (Jabez⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Sudbury, Jan. 2, 1745-6, and died there March 13, 1829, aged 83 years (g. s.). He joined the Sudbury church, Nov. 1, 1770. He resided in what is known as the old Maynard house. He was a soldier in the Revolution in Capt. Asahel Wheeler's company, 1778. In his will he bequeathed to his children Ezra, Jacob, Achsah Gibson, Anne Balcom and Daniel.

Rev. Reuben Puffer⁵ (Jabez⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Sudbury, Jan. 5, 1756, and died at Berlin, April 9, 1829. He graduated from Harvard College in 1778. In 1810 he received from Harvard the honorary degree of D.D. He joined the church in Sudbury June 27, 1779. He was ordained at Berlin, November 26, 1781, the first minister, and continued pastor of the Congregational church there to the end of his life. He was a very useful and able minister. He delivered the Dudleian lecture at Harvard College, May 11, 1808, and preached a sermon at the annual convention of Congregational ministers at Boston, May 30, 1811. Both these sermons were published in pamphlets.

The late Rev. Dr. Allen of Northboro in an article in the Boston Advertiser gives the following incident among his Cambridge reminiscences of 1810.

"Quite a sensation was occasioned in June of this year by the delivery of the Dudleian lecture by a country minister, with whom many years afterwards I had pleasant intercourse as a neighbor and friend, Rev. Reuben Puffer, afterwards D.D., of Berlin. He had previously delivered the election sermon in Boston which first introduced him to notice, and probably led to his appointment as lecturer. We were given to understand that he was a poor country minister, with small salary and a large family, and our expectations on entering the Chapel and seeing an ordinary-looking man in the pulpit were not raised to a high pitch. But we were disappointed and we listened to the discourse with intense interest from first to last.

His text was "Can any good thing come out of Nazareth? Philip saith to him, come and see." And so we found that a very sensible, rational, eloquent discourse could come from the minister of the obscure little town of Berlin. The result was that a meeting of the Students was called, a Committee chosen to request a copy for the press, and the profits of the pamphlet, amounting to about one hundred dollars, was given to the poor country minister."

Rev. Dr. Puffer left a large estate for his day. He made special bequests of Scott's Family Bible, Brown's Dictionary of the Bible; Burder's Village Sermons; Cowper's Poems; Newton's Letters; Memoirs of Mrs. Ramsay and some of his manuscripts. He had a large library. He gave his watch to his son Oliver and his clock to his

son Henry; a gold necklace of his deceased daughter Sarah to his granddaughter Sarah Puffer Fay. Edward Baker was executor. His will was dated Sept. 3, 1828.

The widow Phebe Puffer remembered each of her husband's children in her will, which was dated March, 1851, and allowed February 5, 1856. She gave to Phebe Goodnow, granddaughter of her husband, her gold necklace. She gave Scott's Family Bible to Oliver Puffer; Barley's English Dictionary to Thomas Stone's wife; \$30 each to her own sons, Truman, Freeman and William Stowe. Among other legacies to her granddaughters, Eugenia Stowe Gilbert and Phebe Morse Stowe, daughter of Truman Stowe, was "a large chest with one drawer" that "came from her ancestors," also wearing apparel, household goods, desk, papers, etc.

ton May 20, 1813 (g. s. Old Canton). He owned half a pew in the Canton meeting house. He was a physician at Canton. He was a soldier in the French and Indian War in Major Stephen Miller's company, Col. Miller's regt. on the train band list May 3, 1757.

He was also in the Revolution.

He left no issue.

His will, dated April 16, 1810, was identical with that of his brother and partner, Lt. John. The Court appointed a committee to divide his estate, Apr. 2, 1816. His homestead was on Ponkapog Pond, Canton.

In an almanac for 1771, was found the following:

"A sure and certain cure for the bite of a Rattle-Snake made public by Abel Puffer of Stoughton.

As soon as may be after the Person is bit, cut a Gash or Split in the Place where the Bite is, as the Teeth went in, and fill it full of fine Salt. Take common Plantain and pund it, add a little Water to it, then squeeze out the juice, and mix it with clean Water; then make a strong Brine with fine Salt and the Juice, till it will not dissolve the salt; then make a Swath or bandage with Linnen cloth, and bind it around just above the swelling (but not too tight); then wet the Bandage with the beforementioned Brine-and keep it constantly wet with Brine for it will dry very fast-and keep stroking the Part with your Hands as hard as the patient can bear, towards the Cut you made, and you will soon see the poison and virulent Matter flow out of the Cut; and it will often flow so fast that it will swell below the Cut, and, if it should, you must cut below the swelling to let out the virulent matter, and it will not leave running till it is discharged. You must keep the bandage moving downwards as the Swelling abates. It is proper to give the Patient something to defend the Stomack, as Sweet Oil, Safron or Snake Root. It often bleeds after the Poison is out; but be not surprised at that—it is Good for it. It will run some time after the poison is out; there must be Care taken that none of the poison that runs out gets to any sore, or raw Flesh, for it will poison the Person.

I expect that some will slight this publication, for the Remedies being so simple a Thing; but I hope no one will so slight it, if he is bit, as to neglect trying the Experiment, and the Effect will prove what I have said to be true. I should not have published this had I not been certain of its performing the Cure by my own Experience; for I have cured two Persons dangerously bit, and a Horse and Dog, with no other Thing but what is mentioned in the before Direction, and make this Public for the Benefit of Mankind, tho I have been offer'd a considerable Sum by some Persons to make it known to them, but then it must be kept as a secret.

He served in the French and Indian War in Capt. Stephen Millers's company from April 8, 1757 to 1759, and in Capt. Moses Curtis's company 14 months, 1759-'60, and was at Lake George April 6, 1759. The records show that he was aged 18 years in 1759, and that his father was

John. He fought through the Revolution.

At the Lexington Alarm, he was in Capt. James Endicott's company, Col. Lemuel Robinson's regiment, and later in 1775 in Capt. William Bent's company, Col. John Greaton's regiment. In 1776 he was in Capt. James Endicott's company, Col. Benj. Gill's regiment (the 36th), and later in Capt. John Gill's company (sixth), Col. Thomas Craft's regiment (artillery) and is called a matross, June 6 to Nov. 1, 1776. He was in Capt. Abner Crane's company, Col. John Robinson's regt., enlisting July 4, 1777, in the Rhode Island campaign. He enlisted July 1, 1778, and served the rest of that year in Capt. Jeremiah Putnam's company, Col. Nathaniel Wade's regiment. He enlisted in July, 1779, in the Continental Army, Capt. Endicott's company, then aged 39 years; 5 ft. 8½ or 9 in. in height; dark hair; dark eyes. He was corporal Feb. 3, 1779, in Capt. Abner Crane's company of body guards at Boston, and from May 19 to July 1, 1779, was at Tiverton, R. I., in Capt. Job Cushing's company, Col. Samuel Pierce's regiment; and corporal in Capt. Caleb Champney's company, Maj. Nathaniel Heath's regiment, May 15 to July 8, 1780.

A guardian was appointed July 7, 1817. John Endicott of Dedham was appointed administrator, Aug. 4, 1818. His sister, Abigail Endicott, was one of his heirs, showing that he left no children. His other brothers and sisters petitioned for a division of property, Aug. 6, 1818. The heirs were Hannah Baker, Mary Farrington, Seth Puffer. Sarah Wentworth and Bathsheba Shepard.

The inventory, May 1, 1821, amounted to \$1,260. The census of 1790 shows that he had no family.

Matthias Puffer⁵ (Matthias⁴, Eleazer³, Matthias², George¹) was born at Stoughton, March 8, 1744, bapt. March 11, 1744. He was a soldier in the French War, 1762, at Halifax, Capt. Tim. Hamant's company. He was also a soldier in the Revolution in Capt. Samuel Cowell's company, Col. Haws's regiment in 1778; also in Captain Jeremiah Smith's company, Col. John Smith's regiment. The federal census of 1790 shows that Matthias Puffer was at Society Land, Hillsboro County, and had in his family two males over sixteen, two under that age and two females. He died Sept. 13, 1806.

The history of Weare, N. H., relates a story of an encounter with a bear. Matthias was splitting oars when a bear came into view. He struck the bear which retaliated with a blow that broke Puffer's arm. The bear escaped. The same work states that he was a shingle "weaver" by trade, and also calls him a blacksmith, having a shop on Sugar Hill. He was sued in 1787 by Nathaniel Fifield, and the town voted to defend the suit.

He must have gone to Maine soon afterward.

He was a soldier in the French and Indian War in Major George Leonard's company, train band list, Apr. 9, 1757; corporal, April 30 to Nov. 25 in the Crown Point Expedition; also in Capt. Simeon Wetherell's company of Norton (list dated April 6, 1757). He served also in the Revolution in Capt. Lemuel Kellock's company, Col. John Smith's regiment, April 19, 1775. He or his son of the same name (of whom nothing is known) served in Capt. Samuel Fisher's company, Major Seth Bullard's regiment, 1780.

Dr. Elijah Baldwin when a boy did not like brown bread and milk and when he finally declined to eat a meal of it, his mother said: "Very well, I will set it away till you are hungry." When he asked for food again, she brought the same brown bread and milk and he again refused to eat it. She put it away again and placed it before him next morning. The milk was sour and he turned away from his breakfast in disgust, but it was kept for him and served again until the poor child finally had to eat the stuff before his mother would allow him to eat anything else.

D. 103-231) Nov. 17, 1784. He was in Westminster Jan. 30, 1789, when he and wife Sally deeded land there to Benjamin Flint of Reading (W. D. 120-581). He removed in 1789 or 1790 to Louisville, N. Y. The census of 1790 shows that he was living then at Canajoharie, Montgomery Co., N. Y., and had six in his family (two males over 16). He and his wife Sally, Jan. 15, 1822, then of Brownsville, Jefferson Co., N. Y., deeded to Jonas Merriam land late of Thomas Merriam in Westminster.

Rev. Stephen Puffer⁷ (Jonas⁶, James⁵, Jabez⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Westminster, Feb. 21, 1796; died at Lunenburg, April 23 (21, W. hist.), 1867. He began to preach in 1822, was admitted to the New England Conference in 1823, and preached for 44 years. He had pastorates in Hingham in 1823 and North Cohasset, Hull and in other towns in this section.

During the time the Rev. Stephen Puffer was settled at North Cohasset, and the society among which he labored being poor and weak, he supplemented his church work by some kind of manual labor, the receipts from which thus enabled him to live among a people he loved. He had a very strong feeling of attachment for the people of the Hingham society, which he was largely instrumental in establishing, and after his death in 1882 his widow gave the First Methodist Episcopal Society \$1,000 for the purpose of building them a parsonage. It is nearly half a century since Mr. Puffer preached in the ancient town of Hingham, yet the aroma of his work is fragrant to this day.

only by a valley that modern engineering might bridge and in distinct view the bold Wachusett reared its lofty head; often hid in the clouds, the wind roaring in its forests, the precursor of the coming storm; or, when milder weather prevailed, far up its green slopes might be seen flocks and herds peacefully grazing upon its sides, the first light of morning gilding it and the parting rays of sunset playing upon its summit; from whose top could be seen rivers and lakes, mountains and meadows, giddy heights and gloomy hollows; villages and valleys, fields and forests, farms and firesides; towns built for purposes of trade, and temples erected to the worship of the Most High. Also in full view and at the foot of Wachusett could be seen a placid lake of the same name, better known, perhaps, as Foskett's 'Pork Barrel.' This was stocked with fish of various kinds, horn pouts predominating. These as you know are induced to come in schools to the shore by building fires near the water, and thus become the easy prey to the angler. Here on fish forever fresh, near groves forever green, lived Daniel Foskett, and he was a good man and a Baptist, or as he expressed it, 'a burning and shining light in that part of the town, a candle of the Lord.' An unregenerate neighbor of his who lived on the opposite side of the lake said of him in connection with his burning and striking light, that he was so in pout-time, and as to his being a candle of the Lord: 'I suppose that he might be called a dipt candle.' "

Alvin Davis Puffer⁷ (Jacob⁶, Daniel⁵, Jabez⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Stow, Nov. 14, 1819. He was raised on a farm and attended the district schools, completing his education in the old Framingham academy, which he attended for two years. In his youth he spent much of his spare time in reading and study and early in life demonstrated natural ability as a mechanic

and marked inventive genius. He followed the trade of blacksmith for a time and in 1842 started in the plumbing business on Water Street, Boston. Soon afterward he began to manufacture soda fountains. This business grew rapidly and he secured many valuable patents used in soda fountains, giving him a substantial lead over his competitors. After a few years he moved to new quarters on Portland Street, Boston. Year by year the demand for the fountains and devices manufactured by Mr. Puffer grew amazingly and his business became very large and profitable. A factory was built at Winchester but the offices remained at 44-8 Portland Street. He was granted more than a hundred patents. His three sons were associated with him in business in later years under the firm name of A. D. Puffer & Sons Manufacturing Company. This firm continued until 1891, when it was consolidated with three other concerns in the same line of business under the name of the American Soda Fountain Company, of which Mr. Puffer became vice-president.

During the last fifteen years of his life, Mr. Puffer devoted his attention mainly to his real estate and other investments. He was fond of travel and made many trips abroad. He was well read, broad of mind, kindly, gentle and modest, equipped with a wide knowledge of men and affairs gathered from books and experience, a veritable cyclopedia of information. During his business career he employed many thousands, all of whom held him in the highest esteem and affection. He had a fine physique, good health and great energy of mind and body. In politics he was a Republican, but he took no very active part in public affairs and declined public

honors.

After living in Boston a few years he made his home in Somerville for a period of fourteen years, removing thence to Medford. The section near his home is known as Puffer corner. During his last years his legal residence was at Derry, N. H.

He died at Medford, Dec. 22, 1906, after an illness of a few hours. The interment was in Oak Grove Cemetery, Medford. The funeral was at his late residence, 203 High Street. His will, dated March 15, 1897, was proved at Exeter, N. H. His legal residence was in West Derry, N. H., where he had a summer home. In his will he bequeathed to his children, to his half-brother Jonas L. Whitney, the daughters of his half-sister Abigail Hewitt and his half-sister Hannah C. Felton.

"Brother Puffer was born in Boston, Massachusetts, February 26th, 1837, where he received a liberal education at the High School, and at an early age developed a love for literary

pursuits.

"In 1856, at the age of nineteen, he came to New York, where he soon engaged in mercantile life, traveling extensively through the Southern States as a representative of the dry goods and silk trade of this city; during this time he found opportunities to indulge in his literary labors, contributing articles of interest to many popular periodicals, those to the Atlantic Monthly being the most frequent.

"In the early part of 1862 he received an appointment from the New York Herald as War Correspondent, and was assigned to accompany General Butler's expedition to New Orleans. His abilities and gentlemanly deportment so attracted the attention of the General that he invited him to accept a position on his personal staff, first with the rank of Lieutenant, and afterwards as Captain, and thus he continued with the General until the close of the war, occupying many positions of confidence and trust. He then engaged in business at Mobile, but the commerical interests of that city not reviving as he had anticipated his venture proved unsuccessful. Returning to New York, he was appointed Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue for the 32d District, which position he held until 1870, when he received an appointment as entry clerk in the Custom House, and in October, 1873, he was selected by Collector Chester A. Arthur as one of his Deputies.

"Brother Puffer connected himself with the Masonic Fraternity in 1867, being initiated March 7, passed June 7, and raised June 20 of that year, in this lodge. His abilities were soon recognized; he was elected Senior Deacon in 1869, and

Junior Warden in 1870. In 1872 and the two succeeding years he was elected Secretary, he declined a re-election this year as his public duties were of such a character as to prevent his accepting the position for another term. The Lodge records for these years are referred to with satisfaction as elegant in style and complete in character.

"In conclusion, I desire to add my tribute to his worth, and I know that I feebly reflect your own thoughts in saying that I cannot but feel that his record was pure and untarnished; that he was a courteous gentleman, ever affable and genial, noble minded, generous and forgiving—always faithful to life's duties; he was an honest man, a good Mason, and as such we deplore his loss, not only to our Lodge and the Fraternity, but the business and social community in which he moved."

The lodge adopted the following:

"Resolved, That in his death this Lodge has lost one of its foremost and most valued members, whose skill and untiring energies were devoted to its welfare and prosperity, and whose deportment and character gave dignity to our professions and marked him a "perfect ashlar" in our masonic edifice."

Nathan Puffer⁷ (Nathan⁶, Jabez⁵, William⁴, Jabez⁵, James², George¹) was born in Westmoreland, Cheshire County, N. H., Nov. 25, 1809, and died at Bloomfield, Iowa, March 3, 1878. The following abstract is from a newspaper obituary. He died at the residence of John Frody. "He had made his home with John Frody and the elder Frody during the greater part of the time for several years. The remainder of his time had been spent mostly on his farm in Wyacondah township, six miles

southwest of Bloomfield. His disease was cancer. He had been afflicted with it for a great many years, but concealed the fact from his friends until it had so completely mastered him that he was compelled to call on the aid of physicians, when it was too late. * * * His strength and balance of mind enabled him to bear his suffering with remarkable fortitude and equanimity, never murmuring and never finding fault with those who attended him. * * He received an academic education in his native state. About 1834 he came as far west as Indiana, and shortly afterward returned to New Hampshire. A few years later he determined to settle in the West and, talking of this period of his life, in his last days, he remarked that New Hampshire was a good place to be born in, but should be left early.

"He started on his long journey, as he said, on foot with eight dollars in his pocket and with no companion but the ague. About 1839 he settled in the American bottom in Illinois near St. Louis. In 1840 he visited Missouri and returned. He removed to Missouri in 1842. remaining several years in Boone and Howard counties. In 1849 he came to Davis County, Iowa, where he spent the remainder of his life. From the time he left New Hampshire until several years after he came to Iowa his occupation was teaching school. He taught his first school in Bartholomew County, Indiana; his last in Darnell school house, Union Township, Davis County, somewhere from 1850 to 1855. Mr. Puffer accumulated considerable money by teaching and loaning money. He bought his Wyacondah farm in 1860 and at the time of his death had several thousand dollars in money and notes. * * * He was a very liberal man in his dealings. He loaned only where he thought the loan would be of real benefit to the recipient. * * * Mr. Puffer was a man of fine mind, delicate tastes and studious habits. possessed a considerable store of classical and scientific knowledge and a large fund of general information. During the middle and latter part of his life, he devoted a large share of his attention to scientific studies. Mathematics, astronomy, botany and geology were his favorite studies, particularly the last. In his journeys he was in the habit of studying the geological formations. Of late years his farm occupied the larger share of his attention in the growing season. He planted and reared an orchard in which he took great delight. He applied his scientific knowledge to its culture. It is now one of the finest orchards in southern Iowa. It contains 150 varieties carefully selected and adapted to the climate and the soil. He delighted also in shrubs and flowers, with which his premises were planted in great profusion and variety. Friends who visited him were always welcome to everything that his grounds and orchard afforded." Interment in Odd Fellows cemetery.

John Puffer (Elijah⁶, Seth⁵, John⁴, John³, Mathias², George¹) was born at Canton, Nov. 29, 1793. He followed the sea when a boy and was in Gloucester when the War of 1812 broke out. He served three months in the militia. He did not like the service on land, and, when the privateer Basilisk was fitted out, he enlisted and went to sea. After taking some prizes, he and five others were put aboard one of them, but they were captured by a British man-of-war. An Irishman swore that he knew John Puffer as an Irishman. John was asked to pronounce the name Blair. His accent was decided to prove that he was Irish and he was impressed in the British navy. He had his "protection" and kept it secreted until he reached Halifax, when he appealed to the authorities, and proved that he was an American. He was then made a prisoner of war and later transferred to the war prison at Dartmoor, England. While there he kept a diary, which is now in possession of one of his grandchildren, while another has the "protection box." Another grandson has a chest which John had when he moved to Maine, and a copy of the will of Robert Redman (dated 1760), an ancestor of his mother. In 1822 he was living at 29 Pleasant St., Boston. About 1823 he moved from Boston

to Frankfort on the Penobscot River, 13 miles below Bangor, but a year later moved to Columbia, Me., where most of his children lived. He was a carpenter by trade, and a lumberman in the forests of eastern Maine at the time when ship-building was a prominent industry in the coast towns. He was living in 1876.

At the expiration of the time for which the amalgamation was made, the Puffer interests withdrew and established the Puffer Manufacturing Company, of which Daniel J. Puffer was the president to the end of his life. The new company has been successful from the beginning. The offices are now at 51 Portland Street, Boston. In 1906 a tract of 16 acres was acquired at Winchester and the present manufacturing plant was built there. The buildings have an aggregate floor space of four acres. It is the largest plant for the manufacture of soda water apparatus in the world. Luther W. Puffer was treasurer of the new corporation and his son Luther W. Puffer, Jr., secretary.

From an obituary in the June, 1911, number of "Soda Fountain" we quote: "He had spent his whole life in the soda fountain business, entering upon a business career as a boy of 18, and continuing actively in it for more than a third of a century, almost up to the day of his death. He had seen the soda water fountain business develop from small proportions to its present greatness, and he had had no inconsiderable part in its development. He was a man of original and practical ideas and of marked executive ability. Mr. Puffer's death occurred most unexpectedly. But a few days before he had returned from a fishing trip in Maine, and he looked and felt in excellent health. He was stricken with heart failure on the afternoon of Saturday, May 20, at his home. He had spent the fore-

noon at his office in Boston, apparently as well as usual."

James Needham, and then down into the British Dominion. The same fall, he started away with Capt. Josiah Gorum and went to Savannah and then Newburyport(?) and back to Savannah and then to lesser ports(?), then to New York and Boston and home and stayed ten days. He then sailed from Boston in the ship Levant to Batavia and from Batavia to Lintin(?) and from Linton to Batavia, from Batavia to Canton, Canton to Melville Island (La.) and to the Philippine Islands and from there to St. Helena and after a passage of 148 days arrived in New York and then shipped on board the ship Yazoo for New Orleans, and back to New York and Boston. Then stayed at home a fortnight and sailed in the Plato to Charleston, S. C., and then shipped on board the ship Lafayette for New York and back to Charleston and then shipped as second mate of the brig Arabeau for Liverpool, Eng., and back to Charleston and Boston and then shipped in the brig Tyke(?) as second mate again for Savannah and here I am among the mosquitos up to my eyes. Making in all that I can recollect 32 ports that he has been to in short space of four years and ten months, 13 days." (It is possible that this is copied from a letter of Josiah P. Puffer.)

His death was announced in the following letter to his father:

"Dear Brother:

I am sorry to be obliged to communicate the sad news of your son's death. In looking over the papers, I saw it and have cut it out and send it to you. I do not know any of the particulars more than you. He had considerable money in his chest, but has a month's wages in advance and I should think that there was nothing due to him. As to his clothes, I should not think it would be safe to have them brought on, for if he died of any contagious disorder, it would be exposing your family for the same. I hope you will be resigned to your loss and think it is all for the best. In haste. A. Johnson."

The father of Samuel and the first of the family in this country, was William Nutt, who was among the Scotch-Irish settlers at Londonderry, N. H., in 1719.

In 1852, Col. William Nutt came to Natick and learned the trade of shoemaker, and was associated intimately in business and politics with Henry Wilson, vice-president of the United States. In 1857 he took part in the struggle to keep Kansas a free state and was a squatter at Lawrence, Kansas. He cast his first vote for the Free Soil ticket and was one of the organizers of the Republican party. When the Civil War broke out, he was a member of Company C, Mechanics Rifles, Ninth Regiment, Natick, but left that organization to enlist

in Company I, Second Regiment, May 15, 1861. was made a corporal and, Aug. 11, 1861, sergeant. was a very capable drill-master, and was detailed early in the service to instruct officers and men of the 27th Indiana Regiment. His first skirmish was Oct. 22, 1861, at Conrad's Ferry, Va. After the Battle of Ball's Bluff, in which he was engaged, he was in the hospital sick for several weeks, and when convalescent was detailed in December, 1861, to recruiting service at Springfield, Mass. He returned to his regiment in June at Martinsburg, Va., after being assigned to the 12th Mass. Regt. from April to June. His regiment lost nearly half its men and more than half its officers in a battle, Aug. 9, 1862, and from that time until March, 1863, he was acting first sergeant. At the Battle of Antietam a third of the regiment was killed or wounded. He was commissioned March 5, 1863, second lieutenant, and in May, first lieutenant, in the 54th regiment under Col. Robert G. Shaw, to whom the memorial opposite the state house was erected in later He was transferred to the 55th Regt. and commissioned captain. He was provost marshal of Jacksonville, Fla., in Feb., 1864; commissioned major, Nov., 1864; lieutenant colonel, June, 1865, and brevet colonel at the close of the war. He served with his regiment at the siege of Charleston. He was mustered out in September, 1865.

He became a partner in the firm of Davis & Plummer, shoe manufacturers of Natick, after the war, but finding that business uncongenial, began to study law in the office of Walter N. Mason of Natick, in 1866. In February, 1868, he was appointed agent of the Freedmen's Bureau, Halifax and Lunenburg counties, Va. Here he continued to study law. He was admitted to the bar in Middlesex County August 9, 1868, and opened an office in Natick. He entered actively into public affairs and was during the rest of his life a leader in the Republican party, serving as chairman of the town committee and frequently as delegate to state and other nominating conventions. He was elected moderator of the town in 1870

and from that time to 1896 often served in that office, for which he was well fitted. He was collector of taxes in 1869, 1870 and 1871; representative to the general court in 1871 and 1872, serving on the committee on labor in 1871 and on probate and insolvency and on woman suffrage in 1872. He was chairman of the board of selectmen in 1874, 1876 and 1881; member of the board of health in 1874; overseer of the poor three years; member of the school committee in 1873; on many important town committees; deputy sheriff from 1877 to 1886 inclusive; trial justice of the Natick court, 1886 to 1892. He was elected state senator by a vote of 7,328 to 4,204, in a district that had elected a Democrat the year previous. He served on the committee on constitutional amendments, military affairs and was chairman of the committee on taxation. He was also on the recess committee which revised the public statutes. He was justice of the peace from 1867 and notary public from 1874 until the end of his life. Colonel Nutt made a specialty of probate practice and settled many large estates. He did much of the pension business in this section. In later years most of his practice was as attorney of the Natick Five Cents Savings Bank. He was on its investing board from May 1, 1869, and chairman and vice-president until May 1, 1909, when he resigned on account of ill health.

He was a life member of Meridian Lodge, Free Masons; member of the Grand Army and Union Veterans Union; former president of the Officers' Association of the Fifty-fifth Regiment and also of the Second Regt.; member of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion and of the Vermont Association of Boston. He was active in all kinds of temperance work and on the day Fort Sumter was bombarded was elected R. S. of Neal Dow division, Sons of Temperance. He was an able public speaker and frequently heard in Natick. He was on the legislative committee that attended the dedication of the monument to Union soldiers who died in the rebel prison at Andersonville. He commanded the survivors of the 54th and 55th regiments at the dedication of the Shaw memorial,

Boston. He died at Natick, Aug. 31, 1909. Interment at Dell Park cemetery in that town.

Josiah Marshall Puffer⁸ (Josiah⁷, John⁶, Samuel⁵, Samuel⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born in Sudbury, June 29, 1843. He attended the middle district school in his native town until he was thirteen years old, when his father died and his mother moved to Saxonville, where he attended the grammar school one year and then went to work in the Simpson blanket and yarn mill there. His health suffered from the mill work and in April, 1859, he entered the employ of the Thompson Sewing Machine Company, Worcester, as office boy; in September following he went to work in a gun and locksmith shop in that city. After the war he was in the employ of the Ballard Rifle works and when that concern moved to Newburyport, he moved to that town and continued in its employ under the new name of Merrimac Arms Co. After his marriage, he returned to Worcester and worked at his trade as machinist. He entered the employ of the Brown & Sharp Mfg. Co. of Providence, Nov. 25, 1872, and was with that concern 32 years, engaged in making small tools and fixtures. Residence, 42 Common Street, Providence, R. I. He served Aug. 20, 1862 to July 27, 1863 in Co. C. 51st Mass. regt.

She married, Oct. 21, 1847 (Rev. E. E. Hale, officiating), Joseph Shellengsforth Wesby, who was born at Philadelphia, Penn., Feb. 18, 1818, and died at Worcester Nov. 3, 1886, son of John and Elizabeth Wesby. 

He prepared for college in Franklin Academy at Shelburne, Mass., and was graduated from Rochester University in 1860. He engaged in educational work in the autumn following as principal of the public schools at Winchester, Ill., and for many years was superintendent of schools of Scott County, Ill. He read law and was admitted to the bar in Illinois in 1863. He was a student in the offices of Major N. M. Knapp and Henry

Case. But instead of following his profession, he engaged in business and for many years was a prominent dealer in lumber. In 1888 he disposed of his business in Illinois and in 1891 bought a controlling interest in the Champion Drill Co. of Rochester, N. Y. Afterward he was interested in the Columbian Separator Co. and during the last years of his life he was connected with the Pfaudler Co. In religion he was a Baptist. Charles Chenery Puffers (Chenery, John, Samuel, Samuel, Jabez, James, George, was born at Coleraine, June 15, 1841. He attended the public schools of his native town, and Shelburne Falls Academy, and entered Rochester University, from which he was graduated in 1863 with the degree of bachelor of arts. He became a member of the Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity and was poet at national conventions of the fraternity at Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., and at Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Me. He was also poet of the literary societies at Asbury University, Greencastle, Ind., at Commencement, 1870.

His business career began in 1864 at Shelburne Falls, where he was cashier of the Shelburne Falls Bank. Subsequently he had a banking house at 16 Nassau St., New York. In 1868 he went to South Carolina, and edited the Columbia Union-Herald, the only Republican daily in the state, and in partnership with Governor Chamberlain was the owner of the newspaper. In 1873-4 he was receiver of the Bank of the State. He was active and prominent in politics and was a prime factor in the nomination and election of Governor D. H. Chamberlain. Naturally he shared with the administration indiscriminate and unstinted condemnation from Democratic sources. He has always been a Republican, but in later years has not been active in party affairs.

Having disposed of his newspaper interests in 1875, he engaged in mining operations in Colorado, and subsequently in 1884 engaged in the manufacture of glass enamelled steel tanks at Rochester. Later the business was incorporated under the name of the Pfaudler Company, of which he is now chairman. In connection with its subsidiary companies in Detroit, Mich., Schwetzingen, Baden, Germany, and in London, Eng. This concern is the largest in the world in this line of business. On account of the foreign business and especially the plant in Germany, Mr. Puffer has spent much of his time abroad.

He is a director of the Central Bank of Rochester and a member of the University Club, the Genesee Valley Club of that city and of the Chamber of Commerce.

In partnership with his brother-in-law, William G. Markham, Mr. Puffer owns a model dairy farm of 400 acres at Rush, N. Y. "Elm Place," as the farm is known, is the old Markham homestead. From a herd of seventy Holstein cows, a high grade of certified milk is produced.

He married, May 1, 1865, at Avon, N. Y., Susan Emma Markham, born at Rush, N. Y., Feb. 2, 1843, died Oct. 15, 1894, daughter of Guy and Eliza Emma (Williams) Markham. Her father was a farmer. She had one brother, William Guy, and two sisters, Mary Elizabeth and Isabelle Mercy Markham.

Dr. Loring William Puffers (Loring, Nathans, Nathan⁵, Samuel⁴, Jabez³, James², George¹) was born at Stoughton, Sept. 17, 1828. His general education was acquired in common and private schools, which he attended until he reached the age of eighteen years, and he graduated from the Boston Dental College March 17, 1870. From 18 to 25 years of age he was engaged in machine shop work and the manufacturing of pegging awls, but ill health obliged him to change his occupation and the three years following were devoted to the study of medicine and dentistry. He began the practice of dentistry in 1854, and for nearly fifty-five years followed the profession, actively, mainly in North Bridgewater, which afterwards became Brockton. Since 1858 he has been engaged in life and fire insurance business, and now (1915) represents a number of the old-line companies of England and America. This business in connection with real estate in time almost entirely displaced his profession. Dr. Puffer is a great reader, and for over sixty years has devoted an average of five hours in each twenty-four to reading.

Quite early in life Dr. Puffer became a copious correspondent for various newspapers, and later was editor of the Brockton Advance for one year, and editor and proprietor of the Brockton Eagle in 1884-85. Other literary work, especially in historical and biographical lines, has widened his reputation. In 1871-72 he was adjunct professor of operative and clinical dentistry in the Boston Dental College, and professor in the institute of dentistry and dental therapeutics in 1872-73. Previous to 1880 he had been secretary, treasurer and president of the Old Colony Dental Association and was a frequent essayist at its meetings. He has at two periods during his residence in North Bridgewater, or Brockton, been a member of the school committee (1875-1885); and for over a third of a century he has been one of the trustees of the public library, of which he is known as the "father," having served as president of the board. He was one of the number of citizens who originally purchased the library, and some years later gave it to the town. He was appointed a justice of the peace in 1855, and is now holding a commission, one of the oldest in the State; in 1883 he was appointed a notary public, and also holds a commission to perform marriages in Brockton. Since its incorporation he has been a trustee of the Brockton Savings Bank.

Originally an anti-slavery man, he was among the first to help form the Republican party, and has been steadfastly devoted to its cause. Outspoken and frank with tongue and pen, he is counted one of the most efficient, honorable and successful political workers in Massachusetts. He has been on the Republican city committee of Brockton for many years, and has served as chairman.

The Brockton Eagle is given credit for presenting Benjamin Harrison as a candidate for president in a very appreciative article, Feb. 6, 1885, when Dr. Puffer was the editor. This article was reprinted in an Iowa newspaper, the editor of which was afterward appointed private secretary by President Harrison.

Dr. Puffer had a personal friendship through political and lyceum work with Lowell, Whittier, Sumner, John D. Long, and cherishes many interesting letters

from famous men of his acquaintance.

In 1856 he became an active member of the Plymouth County Agricultural Society; was a trustee for many years, and has been vice-president. In 1860 Dr. Puffer built the first greenhouse ever constructed in North Bridgewater; and from that date to the present he has been an ardent horticulturist, florist and frequent contributor to agricultural, horticultural and floricultural publications. Dr. Puffer was one of the most active originators of the Brockton Agricultural Society founded in 1874, which was a success from the start. Its opening exhibition, held in a tent for ten days, received an income of \$7,400; and now its annual income exceeds \$100,000.

He is also a member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society; of the Natural History Society of Boston; of the Old Bridgewater Historical Society, of which he has served as president, and now president-emeritus; of the Stoughton Historical Society, of which he is a trustee; of the Old Colony Historical Society (honorary member), of Taunton; and of the Massachusetts and Suburban Press Association; and a charter member of Paul Revere Lodge, A. F. & A. M. and of Satucket Chapter, R. A. M., of Brockton.

A Plymouth County editor wrote: "Loring W. Puffer's long life has been one of useful activity along many lines. As a town and city official he instituted reforms and progressive ideas in the health and school departments and public library. As a writer on political and civic subjects he has been vigorous and outspoken. Always a busy worker upon whom his private concerns made large demands he never hesitated to give his time and talents freely to further any community cause that appealed to him as being right and worthy. A keen and kindly observer, his periods of recreation or travel have been made to add to his knowledge of men, matters and manners. His remarkable memory has been a storehouse of things worth while, and a wide acquaintance among people of note and achievement has been fostered by his fondness for the now too uncommon art of personal correspondence. Rich in historical and genealogical lore, he has been a recognized authority, a voluminous writer and a frequent public speaker along these lines, and his estimates of his fellowmen have been characterized by a spirit of broad charity and of appreciation of the best that was in them.

While never hesitating to let it be known where he stood on any public issue, to assail a wrong or champion a right in plain and unmistakable English, Dr. Puffer has loved friendships, flowers and all the finer things of life that blossom and bloom in the sunshine of the passing years."

They scampered off, crying and yelping, but his fun was turned to dismay by the old mother bear, which heard the cries. Mr. Puffer seized a dead branch, as he took to his heels and sought safety in a tree. For four hours the cubs yelped and he made ineffectual attempts to scare the bear away.

In addition to farming, Mr. Puffer engaged in lum-

bering and met with reasonable success in life. In 1888 a large barn was built, and in 1890 a frame dwelling took the place of the cabin. In politics he is a Republican and he has held the important offices in the township; clerk four years; supervisor four years and highway commissioner two years. Descendants of William Puffer or Pougher of Warwickshire, Eng.

The only Puffer families found in the United States other than the descendants of George Puffer of Braintree and a few German-born Puffers, are those in New York and vicinity descended from George Puffer, born in London, 1777, mentioned below.

- (I) William Pougher was born about 1690; died at Hart's Hill, Atherstone, Warwickshire, England. His ancestry has not been traced. No earlier record of the surname is found in England, and it is possible that he was of the German stock.
- (II) Peter Pougher, son of William Pougher (I), was born at Hart's Hill, Warwickshire, England, and died about 1785.
- (III) George Puffer, son of Peter Pougher (II), was born probably at Hart's Hill, Warwickshire. He lived in London and at Knightsbridge, Middlesex County. His will was dated July 22, 1799. He was of St. George parish, Hanover Square, London, when he was licensed, April 7, 1775, to marry Mary Hitchener. Charles Poughfer, probably a brother, of the same parish, married May 9, 1771, Sarah Winwood of St. Margaret, Westminster. George Puffer died in 1800; his widow in 1837.
