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P R E F A C E .

The senior proprietor of this establishment was one of the firm of PARSONS & CO., (now dissolved,) and his half of the plants of that collection have been removed to these grounds. Having been so removed and grown a year, their roots are full of fibres, and they are additionally valuable for transplanting.

These grounds are about a mile from the Flushing Depot, and easily accessible thence by any of the vehicles standing there, whom visitors should request to drive to the Kissena Nurseries. Those, however, who wish to visit the grounds, will find it most convenient to take the Central Rail-Road from Hunter's Point, thus reaching Kissena Station, near the grounds, in half an hour. They should notify the Conductor, however, of their intention. Cars stopping at Kissena, leave Hunter's Point at 9.30 and 11.30 A. M., and 5.30 P. M. Returning, leave Kissena at 10 A. M., and 1.59 and 4.57 P. M.

Ferry boats leave James Slip, New-York, half an hour, and 34th Street a quarter of an hour before the departure of the trains.

Deciduous Trees and Shrubs, unless grown in pots, cannot be transplanted safely between May 10th and October 20th. All in this Catalogue can be safely transplanted until June 1st.

It is very desirable that all orders should be sent very early in the season, that the Proprietors may have as much notice as possible, and send the trees to their destination at an early period after the opening of the season of transplanting. For want of care on this head, many orders arrive when it is no longer safe to take up trees, and are necessarily left over until the next season. They would urge upon the attention of southern and western purchasers, the great importance of sending their orders *early* in the fall. In the spring, vegetation is often far advanced at the South and West, before the frost will allow trees to be taken up at the East, and if sent at that season, they frequently vegetate on the passage, and cause great loss to the purchaser. In the fall and winter, no difficulty of this kind will occur, and trees are annually sent to the Far Western States and California, at that season, with entire success.

The utmost care is taken to label distinctly, according to the invoice sent, every variety of tree or plant ordered; they are packed in matted bundles or boxes, according to the distance and probable exposure, for which a charge will be made, sufficient only to cover the cost, and they

will be delivered in New-York, free of freight; if desired, they will be properly directed and shipped to any port the purchaser may designate. No care will be wanting, on the part of the Proprietors, to pack them in such a manner as may cause them to arrive safely; *but it should be expressly understood, that after being thus delivered or shipped at New-York, they are wholly at the risk of the purchaser.*

The annexed prices are for trees of moderate size; for larger trees, a proportionately higher price will be charged. For a large quantity, and also to Nurserymen, Agents and Venders, a liberal discount will be made.

Purchasers who wish their orders speedily executed, will ensure it by complying with the following rules:

For all amounts less than fifty dollars, CASH to accompany the order.

For all amounts more than fifty dollars, either cash, with the order, or a suitable reference in New-York.

Remittances can be made by mail by a check to order whenever practicable, or when not, by bank bills and currency or money orders. Where a number of persons in one locality wish to purchase, they can unite in an order, and thus save some expense in packing, &c.

The prices annexed do not include the packing, for which a charge will be made of as small amount as possible, and designed only to cover the cost.

Purchasers are desired to notify us at once of any errors in executing their orders, as we are always ready to rectify mistakes, *though we cannot guarantee that the plants shall live*, as we do not attend to their planting and culture.

Those who wish to buy to sell again, can communicate with the Proprietors, who are disposed to make liberal arrangements with such. Letters requiring information will meet with prompt attention.

This hedge plant, **CRATÆGUS PYRACANTHA ALBA**, or **Evergreen Thorn**, although new in its present application, has been the subject of experiment for fifteen years. During that time it has endured every test of its merits, and we feel safe in recommending it as the *best impervious hedge plant known*, either for garden or farm purposes.

Its leaf is narrow and oval, about one quarter the size of that of the *Pyrus Japonica* or Japan Quince, whose scarlet flowers are well known, and which in general appearance this plant somewhat resembles. It can be readily distinguished from the old *Cratægus Pyracantha*, which has large and round leaves and is not hardy. It belongs to the same family with the apple, and will grow wherever the apple will grow. It is hardy, and has endured, unharmed, a cold 14° below zero. It has been equally patient under the most severe drought we have ever known.

The glossy bright green of its summer foliage changes to a bronzed green during the winter; but no Pine or Spruce more persistently holds its leaves

during cold weather. This quality makes it very valuable for ornamental purposes.

It is clothed with strong thorns, which grow so close as to be impervious even to chickens. They are, moreover, so strong, and the branches thus armed so stout, that cattle could make no impression upon a full grown hedge. The first attack would wound so severely that a second one would be avoided. It grows rapidly, and a strong plant will make growths of 1½ to 2 ft. each season.

Its roots do not spread widely like those of the Osage Orange, and one of its most valuable qualities is, that if a hedge is neglected several years and allowed to go untrimmed, it can in two years be brought again into its perfect shape.

This cannot be done with any of the well known hedge plants, and with them neglect is irreparable. With attention when young it can be kept down to a foot for borders. For the front of a house it can be kept three or four feet high, and where high fences are wanted for farm purposes it can be formed into a hedge six feet high. Its flowers are small, like those of the elder, and grow in clusters about the size of a dollar. These flowers cover the hedge in June, while in autumn they are succeeded by showy orange berries the size of peas.

Its strong and rapid growth has thus far been the probable cause of its exemption from insects, and there is reason to hope that this exemption will always prevail. This, however, does not include exemption from birds, for they are very fond of its berries.

Like the *Pyrus Japonica* and others of its family, it is very excitable, and if the sap has at all ascended when transplanted in the Spring, it will die. The remedy for this is Fall planting; and all who wish to succeed should transplant between the middle of October and the closing of the ground by frost. On account of this same excitability it is better to use small plants. They should be not over two years old, while one year old would be preferable. We would also advise to cut in half the top before planting.

MODE OF PLANTING AND PRUNING.

Let the soil be mellow, friable and moderately rich. Use no manure in the holes where the plants are placed. Plant two feet apart, and no deeper than the mark showing the depth at which they stood before.

They will, if moderately cultivated, make a compact fence in four and a high one in five years. No pruning will be needed until after the second year, and it should then be light and only sufficient to form its shape, until after its fourth year, when its sides and top can be kept as even and smooth as the surface of a wall.

When used for farm purposes a mowing machine with knives working vertically could be used, and miles of hedge could thus be rapidly trimmed.

Having tested this plant in various ways for fifteen years, we feel entirely safe in asserting that when successfully planted it will meet all the requirements for a perfect hedge.

For ornamental purposes it far surpasses the *Arbor Vitæ*, and for farm purposes no other plant will compare with it.

In beauty and great superiority in strength, and cheapness to either wooden or wire fences, it is eminently adapted for rail-road lines, for vagrants will neither climb it nor steal it for burning.

COST.

One thousand plants will cost \$100. These will plant two thousand running feet, and will cost five cents per foot. This is cheaper than even a common post and rail fence for farming purposes, is far handsomer, cannot be burnt up by stragglers, and will not decay for generations.

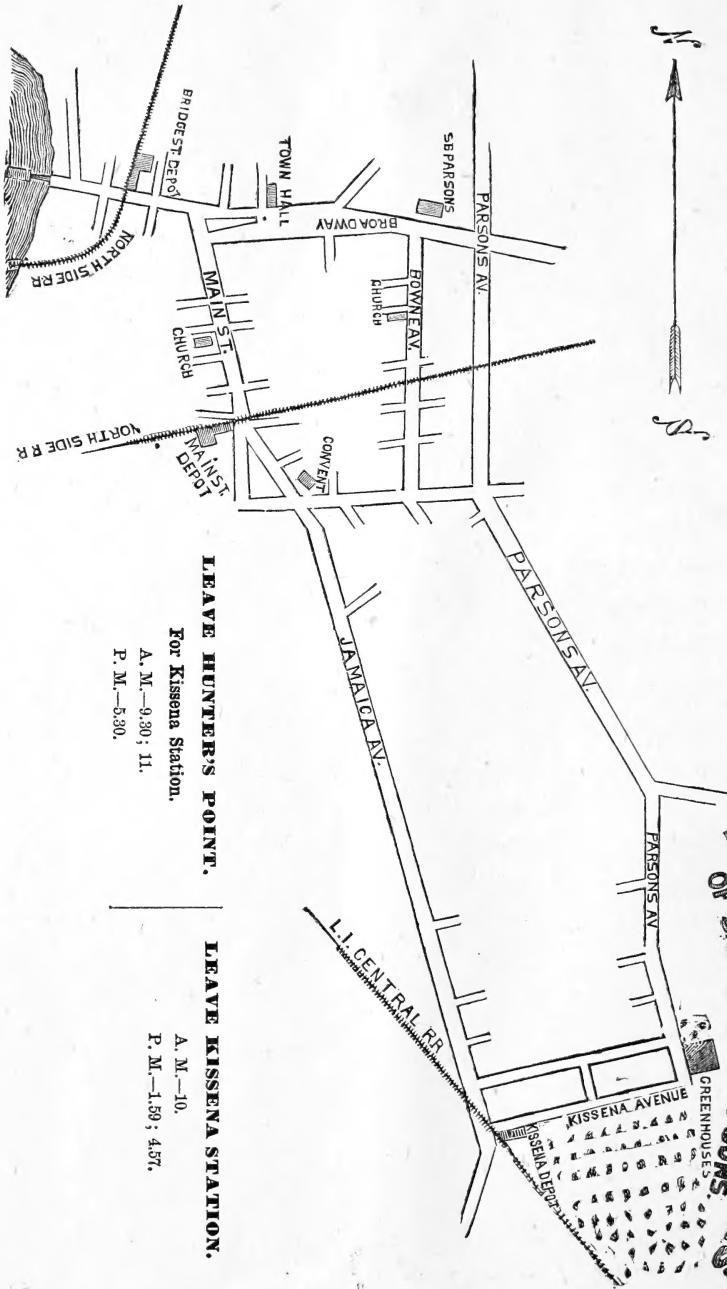
