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

On Tuesday 23'. Rose tired; but, after breakfast, left the house of Mrs. Charles; went to the Waterhouse Building. Asked Mr. Bracebridge to cash my masterly check of the Relief Board. His assistants, Mr. Colby and Miss Houston. They, to May, Lane & Scott, a park & bill rose. To Grumbel, & bought 3 shirts. To Terminal, & mailed postal money-orders to Mrs Kelly, to Prof. George. Day, & to Lafayette Alumni. Was very tired at restaurant. On 12 noon train, with Mr. & Mrs. Devereux. At Ambler, waiting for cab. At the Home by 1.30 P.M. Extremely tired. Rested all afternoon, & went to bed at 8. P.M.

Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup>

Completed the M.S. of my Retirement from the W. Africa Mission.

Thursday 25. Rain all day  
yesterday & last night. This  
morning, cold & cloudy.  
Miss Hannah Flocemaster, who  
has been visiting her sister, for  
the past 2 weeks, went away.  
Writing letters.

Friday 26

Very cold last night & this  
morning. After lunch, cash  
came at 2. P.M. Went into city  
at 2.30. P.M., trams. To With-  
ington building, to a stamp-  
cutter, Miss Cooper, & I sub-  
mitted to her the M.S. of my  
Retirement from the W. Africa  
Mission; spent some time in  
arranging the pages for her.

Then to poor Charles home.  
Left there for the 4.30. P.M.  
train for the Princeton Bazaar,  
at Belleville-Stafford. A number  
of gentlemen came to salute  
me, some whose names I did  
not know. Others, Mr. Matthews,  
Rev. Dr. Rendall, Mr. Henry,

Two Scotch bagpipes, & a man  
doing the Highland fling. At  
the table, I was placed at Prof.  
Hibben's right hand, as guest of

Left at 10.30, before the close.  
At Penn Charles by 11. P.M. A  
chat, & went to bed at 11.30.

Saturday 27'

After breakfast, to the Terminal,  
for the 9.30. A.M. train to  
Amblee. Intensely cold, & clear.  
In the cab to the Home by 10.30.  
Important letters awaiting me.

Sunday 28'

Beautifully clear & very cold.  
As a new step in the church,  
instead of Mr. Crist reading  
from its announcements, the  
printed notices, commonly  
used elsewhere, were introduced  
to day.

in cab, for 9.15 A.M. train to Phila. To Witherspoon Building, to Miss Cooper, to examine the typed copy she was making of the M.S. of my Retirement from the Mission. Then to the Minister meeting; but, I left early, in order to take the 12 noon train to Ambler. Cab was promptly at hand, & I was at the Hotel at 1. P.M., just in time for lunch. Mr. Mundy insists in opening a parlor window, making the air too cool for the other members of the family. When I required the window be closed, he railed at me, & threatened me with violence. He also insulted Mr. Gillespie, so Mr. G. & I complained to Miss Shaeffer against Mr. Mundy's doing. A very unpleasant evening.

Tuesday 2.

Cloudy & cloudy like snow after morning prayers, I spoke to Mr. Mundy about his conduct, & he apologized. Miss Shaeffer,

Beautifully clear, but bitterly cold.

Thursday 4<sup>th</sup>

Wrote an account of how I began, more than 30 years ago, to make effort for an Industrial School in the Mission, & how over years we the money for what is now the James Memorial School at Elat.

Friday 5<sup>th</sup>

Weather moderated. Began to write an article, telling of the benefit to my life & work that I derived from my having studied medicine. Appearance of snow.

Saturday 6<sup>th</sup>; 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>

Heavy snow-fall last night, which continued all day. Got snow at 2 P.M., Went to post office, & was there a long time, sending packages by parcel post, and <sup>three</sup> money-orders. About 4 P.M.

on train to Phila. The snow partly turned to rain. To Wallace st., & left my hand-bag there. Mrs Chas. Nassau was absent, at Atlantic City with young Charles Went, by 6. P.M., to Bellmore - Stately, for the Lafayette Alumni Banquet, incl. Rev. Drs. Eckerd, Mr. Kenzie & French; Mr. Scheibley; & others. At the table, at my side, were Dr. Robinson, a friend of Mrs. Charles, & Rev. Dr. <sup>friend</sup> Kirkpatrick. Was introduced to Dr. Herriott, a Past Grace Crayton, also Mr. Brumbaugh. Left at 11. P.M., after, a speaker, giving a history of the College, had mentioned my father, & referred to my being present. There was applause, & I arose & bowed to it. At 11 o'clock, a to bed before midnight.

On Sunday 7<sup>th</sup>. Went to the Congregational church, with Miss Nelly Green & grand daughter

Very fine. Introduced Rev. Dr.  
Stanton to Mrs Hazard. Then,

Very cold last night, &

the M.S. "A Medical Course that  
was Worth-while", for the monthly  
publication of the Univ. of Pa.

Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup>

Continued clear & cold.  
Resumed the writing of my life,  
(on which I had done nothing  
during the last 3 months). Proceeded  
as far as my 6<sup>th</sup> year.

Sunday 14

Clear, & not very cold. Many birds about. The cab came too late for Miss Shoemaker to catch her trolley, for her Friends Meeting; she had to wait  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour for the next. At church, I regretted to find that Mr. Cuth was attempting to indoctrinate the evangelist Sunday.

Monday 15

Cab came at 8.30 A.M. Rode to post, & mailed some packages.

Last night a very cold wind. Today clear & very cold. All day writing letters. In the evening, the 2 other men, who require silence in the parlor while they are reading, being absent at Prayer-meeting, I had a pleasant chat with Miss Shoemaker.

Thursday 18

Clear, bright, & not very cold. Enclosed and addressed the 8 packages of the copies of "My Retirement from the West Africa Mission".

Friday 19.

A Spring-like day in the morning; but, fog & rain in afternoon. Writing on my Life.

Bright, windy & cold. In

Look came out 9. A.M. Went to

School, on Fairmount Ave above  
12:; got my bound copy of the  
"Retirement". To Fox Charles  
for lunch. To Terminal, for the  
3. P.M. train. At Ambler, to  
post office for stamp, & at drug-  
store for complex clothes tablets

Tuesday 23: Some little snow last night. Received a number of letters. Resumed the writing of My Life.

Wednesday 24:  
A Spring-like day. The trees being blossomed, and coverings rained from the flower beds. Writing on My Life.

Busy on My Life, and writing letters. Very tired at night.

Friday 26:  
Spring like day. Farmers plowing their fields. My Life.

Saturday 27:  
A very gratifying letter from my friend Prof. Libby in regard to "My Retirement from the West Africa Mission". Weather clear & very cold.

Sunday 28:  
Bright, & not cold. Changed my seat in church.

walk with Mr. Hembree. Continued  
the chronological arrangement  
of old letters & other documents.

Saturday 3<sup>e</sup>. A snow-storm, which presented my going into the city, to attend the annual Meeting of the Soc'y of the Sons of the Revolution. Completed the chronological arrangement of all my old letters & documents, & stored them in one of my trunks.

Sunday 4<sup>e</sup>

Bright & cool. An unusual Easter day, with snow on the ground. Mr. Hembree made an unpleasant time at the table in forcing his admiration for Mr. Sunday on to us. At night, an automobile stalled in a snow-bank near the house, & the lady in it came for help.

Monday 5<sup>e</sup>

After breakfast, cab came for me for 4.15. A.m. train. Went to dentist, to have my brother's tooth in front plate repaired. To Son Charles, for lunch.

Glad news, that grand daughter  
Katherine had united with the  
church. To Terminal for 3. P.M.  
train to Anubis, to post office;

Mrs Hazen's by 4.30 P.M.

Swarthmore 1915 Philada (17)

In the evening, came Miss Burroughs, the Pres. of the Negro Manual Training School, of Washington, D.C., with a Mrs. Beeson (almost white) wife of a colored minister of Chester, Pa., stood, we 4 rode to Pratt's ch., where, in one of the smaller rooms, Miss Burroughs gave an admirable talk on the Training for Service of Negro girls.

The next day, the 8<sup>th</sup>  
I remained at Mrs. Hazards. (At the meeting, I had met, the Smith family, Mrs. Barber, & Mrs. Hall.) Walked with Mrs. Hazard to the Negro quarter of Swarthmore, and made a call on Mrs. Davis, widow of a minister, mother of a Miss, to Cressie, & her daughter, a worker in Phila. Settlement. After lunch, Mrs. Hazard took me in cab. to station for 1.34 P.M. train. To Phila. and to the Terminal, for train to Anthracite.

Friday. In Amble, to Copis  
for shoes; and to tailors, for  
my vest. At this Home again  
about 5. P.M. Very tired.

Friday 9<sup>th</sup>

Busy reading letters of dates  
1850 - 56, for my Life.

Saturday 10<sup>th</sup>

A comfortable Spring-day.  
Busy at the old letters, and  
writing new ones.

Sunday 11<sup>th</sup>

Rain last night, & it continued  
all day with showers, a some  
thunder. Rode to church with  
Messrs. Meandy & Hembree.  
A regular April-day.

Monday 12<sup>th</sup>

Beautifully clear, & not very  
cool. Without my over-coat, I  
walked with Mr. Hembree.  
Prepared for a journey to town.

Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> } Rain at 6. A.M.  
Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> } Breakfast by  
myself at 6.30. Expected the  
cab at 7. A.M.; it did not come
