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
THE MISSION.

30. A Mission as constituted for the transaction of business, consists of all foreign missionaries under appointment by the Board within specified territorial limits. The women of the Mission who are actively engaged in mission work (the Mission to determine when this condition is met) are entitled to vote on what is known as Woman's Work. No missionary shall have a right to vote until after one year of service in connection with the Mission.

[Talaguaga] Diary
July 1890

July Saturday 19th } On the 19th, sent the canoe out,
" Sabbath 20th } and crew, to Agoma, to
bring thatch. The absence of st.,
this crew leaves me weak-handed, with only
the household servant. Writing up memo-
randa, &c, of the late journey, and entering
acts.

On Sabbath, the attendance was
small, only a few Fan. A very quiet day
on the river. Mary is recovering her
memory of the lessons, which had been
forgotten, during the irregularities of the
journey.

Monday July 21st } I think it was on the 21st,
Tuesday " 22nd } for a canoe of Galars,
Wed. " 23rd } going down river, Etarto,
Thursday " 24th } with his one hand, wanted to
to hear, but I did not

gave permission, as we are so few at Talaguaga now:- On Tuesday, I began to write a letter to son Will & his wife, & but, felt foolish, in the evening:- On Wednesday, had to lie down all day, with a sore boil inside my nostril, that, by sympathy, made my teeth & eye & even whole head, on this side, ache. Also felt much nausea. An unusual supply of iguana & plantains have been coming this week:- On Thursday morning came a canoe from Orgán, at Abraí, with 40 plantains for sale. I did not need even one; but I bought 20, so as not to make him hesitate to send again. The "Jean-Louis" passed up one day this week, and went down again on Thursday. Also, on Thursday, passed up 2 Frenchmen, agents of Gravier of Galson, about to start a trading-house at Acarape. They stopped

to buy some hardware, for house-building.

Friday, July 25th

On the 25th, sent the canoe & crew, to

Njornu, for thatch: - On the 26th, went,

with 6 of the company, to Mayo's

Oyige; &, after lunch there, went,

with 4, to Deemas Home, at

Thursday " 31st

a few months ago; On the way to

the Oyige, was much annoyed at Ngaur's forgetfulness to bring along utensils for cooking: had to turn back for them. In our absence, canoes had come from Galwa, with plantains to sell, of which I have a super-abundance: - Heard at the 4 towns, I had sent by "Oka", had been delivered safely to the administrator at Lembarano: but, had they had escaped from his hands.

On Sabbath, Impaga was over to church. Many were not well, and did not come to church on Sat.-Sch.

On the 28th, began to transcribe the M.S. S. of the

Minutes of the 3^d above church: On Tuesday, and Wednesday, not much work on the premises, most of my few people being disabled, - Mānla with a lame back, - Londo with toothache, - Etendo still with his sore-hand, - Rembundanga with his sore foot: - The river very low & the season very dry: - No steamers, nor mails: - Heard that Etenda was detained in town sick, and that the wife of Akendanga had born a child.

Thursday, the bamboo work of the new bamboo-house, was completed, and paid the monthly wages. Fired Ngāur, for his neglect of duty, and, at night, suspected he was sucking; for, he left the kitchen open all night.

Friday Aug 1 } Ngāur left in anger, going in
Sat. 2 } the canoe of Okendo, who
Sabbath " 3" } had come last evening, for his
monthly wages. Felt how ungrateful Ngāur
was, for the doctoring Argentinas had done

him, and the clothing I had given, when his
box was lost:- Advanced the wages of Roco &
Tupanga, to do Aguir's work besides their ~~own~~

On Saturday, sent Miñola & Monkami, to
itinerate in the villages at Yema & Tongo-
najau came, from Ajumba, to sell dried
fish, & stayed over Sabbath. At church
on Sabbath, there were 6 "nationalities", - 10
Indians, - 5 Ajumba, - 5 Fair, - 2 Tapayu,
2 whites, - 1 Isangas.

Had the usual washing and
ironing on Monday & Tuesday.
Then it was Tuesday the 5th,
that Lika and Antunes came
to buy some things, and I
gave Lika a present of
stationery, for his aid against
the thieving, brigands, &c., for
which he seemed very grateful.

Bitaga Lagoon (August 1890)

Journey

On Wednesday, after loading the canoes "Agonjo", with a crew of 4, & the small canoe with Monkāmī alone, and leaving Rembundambys & Etendo, to keep the premises, we all went, on the Annual Fishing Excursion, to Bitaga Lagoon. Took dinner at Antiquan, at 2 p.m., & then, with his wife Pāpā added, went to the Lagoon. Found a good place, though most places were taken up by many Fān, & sent out Londo & Kew, at once, with one net. Kept the other 3 at setting up tent etc. Londo returned, at dusk, with some 40 fish.

Thursday, I was not feeling well. Read Maria Monk's "Awful Disclosures" of Convent Life. In the morning, Monkāmī & Māmbi went out with the other net, while Londo mended his. Many Fān came, to stare at us.

On Friday, my headache was no better. The two pairs of fishermen went out after

water, morning and afternoon, buying each time from 30 to 40 fish. Was much annoyed by the starting of the Fair. On Thursday night, there was a rain, & the crowd & I got wet. The women & children in the tent were dry. Expected rain on Friday night; but, it did not come.

On Saturday, after a late breakfast, all started back. At dinner, at Agoma. On the way thence to Salagaya, were overtaken by a shower of rain. The Fair were sure ^{that} I had caused the rain of the previous day. (At Agoma, on Wednesday, they had acted as if to go to the Lagoon, but I should cause rain to come.) Reached Salagaya, at 4.30 P.M.; put all things away in their places.

On Sabbath, rose with a headache; and it increased with nausea all day. At 7 P.M. the "Brazza" came, with Dr. Bacon. He had expected to arrive at Saty night; but, the engine was out of order, and

so brought him here late. He brought a mail,
a ^a blood letter from brother William!

On Monday, I had to give up, & was sick, in
the afternoon:- Much food brought for sale, &
Galvin canoes. Mr. Bacon also sick.

On Tuesday 12^o, the strange craft, built by the
Greenans, stopped here, with Capt. Uzanski;
on its way to Njoli; and the "Brigge"
passed down. Both Mr. Bacon & I better.

Wed'y Aug. 13^o. Mr. Bacon not all well; but,
he attempted to get up, but not to do any
work:- Many canoes of Galvins, with food to
sell:- Felt well myself; and began to answer
some of the letters of the mail that came
on Sabbath.

Thursday Aug. 14^o } Mr. Bacon was not entirely
Friday " 15^o } well, but, he went to
Orange, in my crew & canoe,
in the morning & did not return till after

dark: - About 3.30 P.M., Mr Smith, of H.C.C., Lembaere, with his loaded Kongouys, on way to Seange, stopped, for the night.

Next morning the 15th, he, after breakfast, went on to Seange; and, about 10 A.M., Mr Eaton returned to Kangwe, in my canoe & 3 canoes, - besides his own little servant. A shiny day: chilly, and none of us felt well. And, the absence of the crew left us fewer here than we have been for years.

some palaver & about a stolen woman.

Wrote a letter, on Monday: may end if the

On Tuesday, Impala & Bigman called here,
and I got the aid of their crews, to help
overturn the boat, so that Monkami could
explore a broken place in the bottom.

On Wednesday, I had a headache; still, was able,
in afternoon, to make out, from the Bill, the
exact values, per tin, of all the Provision
I got last year from America and England.

On Thursday, still some headache. The last
2 weeks have been showery, even rainy,
making the Fever think the rainy-season
has come. It has not: for, the river, ^{which} ~~is~~ ahead
of low, is still slowly going down. Mambai came

Kangue just a year ago) to enter my service again; and 2 men of Mr. Gacos', to work with me, till I shall go down, in 2 weeks & let them all at work building a scaffolding to the house on the Hill, preparatory to re-roofing it.

On Saturday, sent Wanta & Makomi, intimate
to the villages up river & wrote a letter to Dr. J.
Billephi.

On Sabbath, felt well. There
were 3 of Sita's people, and some Fair. The
river is still slowly going down, - lower than I
have seen it for years. Since the rain began, a
week ago, the August showers have ceased.

On Monday, the men still
at work on the scaffolding of
the Hill-house, preparatory to
its re-roofing.

On Tuesday, started them at
taking off the old thatch, from one side of the
roof; and, in the afternoon, I went myself, and

personally superintended the tying on of the new
thatch! May came to be with me a while.
On Wednesday, went to work the same way, and
completed the one side. In afternoon, 2 of
Mangai's people, for whom I had asked, came
with me. Some delay, on the second side,
putting up fallen posts, and inserting new
rafts; which had not all been done on
Monday. On Thursday, all at
a Tagau, as yesterday. May & Iga came
to see me. Finished all, even to putting on
the already prepared eathing & roof-sticks,
at 4 P.M. Then, I returned to the water-
side, leaving the men to clear up the
thatch. Was not pleased to see how
Mankani had neglected and abused the
men for other work of the Hill-house.
On Friday, Mankani giving the boat a
second coat of paint; and the others

still clearing up the rubbish on the hill.

On Sat., sent Mānūlā on the usual itinerating, to the villages up river: - Then Reddow & Corkishab came, and took dinner with me. Only a few fair at church, on Sabbath: - On Monday, began the changing of the logs, from the boat-landing, to a new spot, for dragging the boat to the boat-holes: worked hard myself. - Paid the month wages, in the afternoon: - On Tuesday, Reddow came, for his month wages, and aided very much with dragging of the logs: - again, I worked hard: - On Wednesday, the large logs were all in position; so, I sent Mānūlā on the usual itinerating to Ajion.

Ogili was sick for 2 days, - and Reddow for 3 days: & Mānūlā fell sick on Thursday.

14. Totagaya (September 1890)

On Friday, had washing, instead of next Monday. Mānāmā working at the boat-landing gridiron: - On Saturday, sent the crew with Mānāmā, to Njōmū, for thatch. And, after dinner, Anyeetyewa, & the children went to Njōmū, for her to have her hair braided: - When the crew returned with Mānāmā, hauled it up into the boat-house, - a hard job, as hands were few; had to use block & tackle. On Sabbath, only a few present. At close of Sabbath, there came storms of wind, rain, & lightning. This looked like the beginning of Rainy-season, though I think it too early. The river began clearly to rise 3 days ago. ^{journey to the camp} On Monday, leaving Mānāmā, Londo, Etando, & Saunay started.

Njoma: Okendos (September 1893) Ovimbando (15)
on joining down river, with Monkamé, Kew,
Kibembawby, Impengi, & the Gacoré 2 miles,
Ogélé & Rebute. but, Monkamé had a
bare hand & Impengi was too small. At
Njoma, was Mr Whittaker's canoe, of H. &
Co. did not reach Okendos, till after sun-
set.

On Tuesday, up by 5.30 A.M., and off by
7 A.M. The boat grounded badly, before reaching
Maboni, and again, before stopping opposite
the - ~~St~~ ^{*}Katya ogé, for dinner at 11.30 A.M.
As the river was so low, passed down, by
the Imanys side, & reached Kängwe, just
at sun-set. Mr Gacoré's water welcome.
On Wednesday, rearranging boxes, for the ~~five~~
days.

Thursday Sept. 11th { Started, from Andende, at 7 1/2 A.M.
Friday " 12th { Arrived at Ovimbando,
Sat. " 13th { reaching there at 11.30 A.M..
Sabbath " 14th { Stayed a hour, & passed on

down river. On the way, met with strong wind
and some rain; but, kept dry under the house.
Reached Igenja, at 6. P.M.; At the prege-
-g-e-Eranga, had met with the new French
trading steam-launch. Was annoyed, at first,
that Wra had not built a bed-frame in the
new house; but, became satisfied. - Welcomes:-
Abumba well.

On Friday, had no session-
meeting, because so few people had gathered
in. Many enjoyed playing on the little sand-
bank, and putting fish in the boat.

On Sat.y, had session-meetings; - Orondo
making hair-pins (i.e.) for Argentyna.

On Sabbath, a quiet day, in the town;
2 persons baptised, at Communion.

On Monday, the church com-
pany had scattered; but, I
remained, for the day; wrote
off minutes of session; in the

"Liverpool" (Sept. 1890) Oregon (17)
afternoon, had a bad headache; bought way hair
pins of Orondo. On Tuesday, bought, in the
confusion of boat-loading, eggs &c., & was imposed
on with bad eggs. Had, as passengers, a little boy
of the Kāngūe Shōmō, & an elder brother of
Onspeige going to Nippon, for service with Army;
wa:- Ste at. Remondes, & caught a fish
class. - On to "Liverpool" early in afternoon: bought
a squirrel, which Monkāmī^{had} caught.

On Wedg, started late, and pushed along: - Past
Azāge, near the fair town of his old Mandi-
Po site; & arranged to stay with him that
night. He is the man, taking time very
leisurely. At Ngom, waiting for Azāge; -
when he came, he located us in rooms in a
big house; but, some women annoyed us, &
claiming the rooms, & by suspecting Hōmō
had taken their pillow. He has a large okamōbi
skin for me.

On Thursday, was engaged

by the crowding of people, to sell potatoes, &c., &c.,
and were not wanting : few ate a
handful for Agazi's new site : started, with
the horses, around the Orange & Aranda
& Antigosans sands ; ate, in the first, at
the five ukko where, for the last 3 quarterly
journeys, we have eaten . Pulled on well, to
Ovumbians, by 3.30 P.M. Was annoyed, at
night, by hearing Mr. Newbold ^{employed} had not
divided the food, for the household ~~boys~~. Went to
a feeling uncomf. talk, after a long act of
contingence, of the unwise & often unjust
punishments at Banks School, of the ^{friends,} [These appear in my "Tales out of School"]
missionaries there, of her school days &

Saturday " 20 " } on Friday : - In the after-
Sabbath .. 21 .. } noon, late, Agonjo came,
to tell one about his trouble
with Mr. Eaton, of which Okewo had also

told me, at midnight before. Was very much troubled, about the matter. On Friday also the "Orio" & "Oka" passed down: I think it was the same night also, Mr. H. L. Louis passed up (perhaps it was Saturday).^{""}

On Saturday night, came after a boat, with the white engineer of the "Dualla"; on his way up river, with news of the wreck of the "Dualla", at Aspinwall: - Today came

On Sabbath morning, arrived Tabra, from down river, with news of the death of Anyentjans' son-in, Agonjégo, at Gobm. - A pleasant Sabbath: But, at

7. P.M., came the astounding news, that Mr. Bacon had had Agonjo arrested! I feel ~~at~~ sure Agonjo is innocent. I am exceedingly cast down, at this doing of Mr. Bacon.

20) Ovintiano (Sept. 1890)

{ Monday Sept. 22^c} After a restless night, &
Tuesday " 23^c} anxiety about the ill news
from Kangwe, rose at 6. A. M. and hurried
the loading of the boat, so as to hasten to the
relief of Agonjo: The crew pulled slowly; and I
had to bid them to pull faster. Four new canoes,
ubomas, - Adakas, - facitis, - a Nyanga, -
Ate in one forest camp: sharply rebuked Tero
& Rebuka, for laughing at me; int., was told
afterward that they were laughing at a monkey
I had caught. When near the factories, went
on one, a canoe, to go to the Post. Landed
at H. & C., - asked Mr. Smith for the use of
his interpreter, to go with me, to the Post. Had a
long discussion with the Administrator, Dr.
Real, & he released Agonjo at the ^{young men} ~~25 days~~
unconditionally; but said Dr., as Agonjo was
seized, as a ^{I much wish. get him to} ~~cause of~~ offender,
Recently ^{I much wish. get him to} to jail. Great relief.

to my mind, and noticing, when Agorio entered
the boat. Reached Kangar, after dark. Thanks
given me, by the crowd ashore of Nyanga, &
by, and evident increased respect for me, for
my influence with the Administrator. Took
Agorio, at once, to Mr. Bacon. I expected
Mr. E. w.d. be displeased, as I had released
him. He was not, but ^{had} told Agorio
and Roraima. Had a somewhat excited
talk, in the evening:

On Tuesday, paid

subsoe, for 6 months: paid Begman, ~~Gipps~~,
only $\frac{1}{2}$, for his lost time: he made difficulty,
but I would not accept his complaint.
Had a talk with Agorio & Nyanga, & sent
them to get Roraima. Had another somewhat
excited talk about Agorio, the end of which
was a better understanding, though Mr. Bacon
at all doubts Agorio; but he sees as I am
trying to be just to both. Had a headache.

22) Kangri (Sept. 1890)

Wrote an order, for Mr. Bacon, in the afternoon,
to Handi, Rs 200., to pay the Sciptine Raders.

The boils on my back & shoulders are painful.

Wed. Sept. 24 } On Wed. 24, Anyanya & the
Thursday " 25 } 5 employes went on to the Hill
to brush up the house, in expectation of the
coming of Mr. Good. I remained & wrote up the
minutes of the ~~the~~ 3rd church. Durbar left the
day, to go down river to his unk.

On Thursday, the house on the Hill was being
washed; I remained here, & wrote a letter to
Mr. Good. Enjoyed the igewa of wild pig &
puri which Mr. Bacon brought yesterday.

In the afternoon late, Anyanya & Aponjo
returned, having Receptyols with them; the
people of "England" village had given him
up. Mr. Bacon did not show a magnan-
imous spirit, & crowded small M. and G.
his undignified conduct to the prison. Then

Elder (Sept. 1890)

came also Tongwe a Ogala, & the "little wife" of Ogala of Luywa. Felt degradoe, about Dr Bacon's treatment of the prisoner, with whom he had gone to the Post. Was received, on his return, to find the prisoner had not been beaten.

Friday Sept. 26^c. Hear of a cruel crime:- An A-yimba man, angry at one of his wives, tied her feet, also her hands behind her back, threw her down, & with a plane to hold her head, cut away the skin & flesh of all her face below her eyes, & then, releasing her, ordered her to go away to her father's town. This was in the morning. She went. Her father's people were horrified, & saying, "This is a dead person!", told her to go back to her husband, & let him kill her, & then they would kill him. He threatened to shoot any one who should bring her. Then, her mother's people, in pity, took her ^{into their village}, - but it was then evening, & the having stood all day, at the

end of the village. His relatives demanded
the man's life; then, ^{after discussion} they said, "give us a
substitute who shall be treated as you
treated our sister"; he sent a little clan;
they sent the clan back, saying they wanted
the blood of a Freeman; and demanded a
sister of his, who was the mother of 5 children.
~~The referred~~, - and the matter is still being
talked. Held session-meeting, in the after-
noon.

meetings; and paid orders
to the Scripture-Reader, for

Difficultly to pay them, for
the store had little goods,
and a separate order,
on Harts, for \$200., could
not get more than \$200.;
Elder Wora stupidly made a

mistake in selecting a lot of goods, at the factory, without inquiring the price; & then disputing the price with Mr. Bacon.

On Sabbath, my 2 boils burst one very much; but, I managed to dress myself for church. Two young men baptised.

On Monday, May was sick, and I could not begin packing the native curiosities, ^{which} Mr. Bacon had bought for me. Wrote up the 1st Church Record:- Remanded myself at working.

On Tuesday the 30th, May still sick; but, she lay on rugs, in the baggage-room, while I worked at my packings. Mr. Bacon putting everything on the Andamole frame to rights, in expectation of Mr. Gord's coming.

On that day (I think it was) did I paid Remandamby his year's wages ^{even} after he had finished ironing; and he left, with Younger, with whom also I sent away Okaribago, for her misbehavior of Sabbath night.

Kangwe (Oct. 1890)

On Wedg Oct. 1st, May was better; and, after packing in the morning, went to Wädens, - saw Mr. Hertz & engaged 20 planks; was introduced to Mr. Faist, Dr. Kutz's successor; called on Dr. Reel, the French Administrator; &, at Halle & Cottori.

No steamer, the "Fahra" not yet come; the "Dania" loaded; the "Faetti" sunk; the "Orion" disabled. On the 2nd, finished the painting of addresses on my boxes of collections, & D. Pepper; and, late in the afternoon, though the weather was changey, sent my 5 boxes to H. & C., to be forwarded to Galon.

^{fourth} On Friday 3rd, loaded up, and was off, by 7.30 A.M. Good-bye to Mr. Gacon, who is sick, and who will return to Switzerland, as soon as Mr. Ford returns. Mr. Gacon was very earnest, in planning for me to visit Switzerland, on my way to America. The river has been rising; so that the boat had

not much difficulty in getting around old Agawa island. Stopped, on range - Khangā, to eat; a good dinner was prepared; but, spoiled by a heavy shower of rain, - my hasty eating over we reached : - Reached Island Factory by 5., or a little later, came the Supongas, who be yondo, is, who received us kindly. but the coming rain, caused to look for emerries, annoyed me. We no supper; and went to bed early. Built hot fire.

Saturday. No rain last night, nor any today, though signs of rain as far as passed through. Reached Okendo's before 6. P.M. - a very good run. Discharged the boat, - and arranged for Sabbath rest. News of the bad Njigas serious sickness.

On Sabbath the 5th, was annoyed to discover ~~the~~ some of the food for the cow was missing. A false report the Njiga was dead.

28 Tgalata (Oct. 1890) Ajoum

Rikangé, Ibala², and others, came to Mystery. Was disgusted at Rikangé's fishing and vanity, and hair-pulled in the middle of his head. A quiet afternoon. No rain last night, nor today. Mr. Wheeler called, bade me, on his way down to Turon.

Tuesday 6th. Left early, felt well, started at 7.30, - the crew failed admirably; at 11 found, near Bere-Volo Beach. Enjoyed a jambal of fish, which Orgay had given to us, as he overtook us, on the way, in passing his house; By 4.30 P.M., was at Ajoum! An admirable run! Did not feel ill, and went to bed early.

On Tuesday, rose rather late. It heavy rain at night. Iga was sick. But, we enjoyed the dance, on Ozégi-Traïadi. And were at Talagaia by 3.00 o'clock. At first, the children were disappointed as "Ferd" had

not come to meet us, though he was left.
But he soon came. Putting all things to rights
before night.

On Wednesday, sent
Guamá & Mandarim, to Víjoli, with a letter

It stopped at Upagai, to try and recoup the last anchor of the gun boat of a few days ago.^{the "} I went off, & arranged to send some baggage. Hurried exceedingly, and sent 3 pieces, (one of them the Wardian case) Also, finally sent a little canoe, to stop Mary's chest just in the nick of time!

Very tired from my exertions. The "Eclaire" passed down the evening, about 7. o'clock.

Playing "Word Talking"; in the saloon with Argentinos:- Natives coming to sell fancy mats & baskets:- Many not well, with cold & feverish, & discomfort of not being able to go on deck:- At night, in the

Saloon, music:- Steward Evans at the piano, the Scotchman with his banjo, - another with violin, - & steward Molyneux with conchetsina. My guitar was asked for, but, required too much time to put ~~in~~ in tune.

Tuesday April 7th} Left Bonny on Wednesday,
Wed'g " 8th} about 3. P. M. steamed
Thursday " 9th} out to sea. Rather rough
water on the bar, & all of us slightly
nauseated. Went on, all that night, and,
about 9. A. M. of Thursday, at Jellah
Coffee. Steward brought corn for soup &
panots:- On, in afternoon, for Accra.
Expected to get there at 8. P. M.
But, at night, was signaled with flag
lights and guns, off by an English man
who turned to it, & an officer came
on board, I do not know what, perhaps
news. Had a bad headache all day.

Sabbath April 12th. A fine clear day. - Out of
sign of land. On consultation with Mr. Beadle,
concluded I did not feel able to preach
no public religious services. - An enormous
school of porpoises, just before 1. P. M.
Came in sight of land, & reached it all
afternoon, beyond Cape Three Points. - Heard
many sea birds. Catechism, in the
morning; then a boy, assisting the sailors
braiding my hair in afternoon; About
4 P.M., passed the "Calabar", coming from
the north; the vessels were very close to-
gether, so to west. - sighted Cape Point
in evening.

Monday April 13th } By day, - steamer fired
Tuesday " 14th } gun for canvas to come
and land Kromer; had been plowing &
backing off of roundabouts all day. Indeed,
on Sabbath evening, while we all were

seizing it, & in the saloon, at religious services, to which I had invited some of the passengers, there was a sudden stopping & backing of the vessel, which alarmed some of the passengers.) Exciting disembarkation of the Koo passengers, at Grand Castine, 2 other places, which occupied 3/4 of the day. At night, the vessel put into

On Tuesday, at noon, we were opposite Cape Mowmow; a thin view of it, from the freed, free at sea. In the afternoon, about 5 P.M., a boatswain, who had been sick for several weeks, died, and was buried at sea. The fact of the death was kept very quiet; & some of the passengers did not know of the death, till the very moment of burial - a lonely burial at sea!! and, it quite red all, as it was near sun-down.

124 Sierra Leone (April 1820). H.R.

Mrs Reed had, during the afternoon, seen
the last of Liberia, - Cape Mount, in the
distance.

Wednesday April 15. Up early, & steamer
going, from out at sea, into direction
of Sierra Leone: - sighted it, in morning: -
wrote letter to the Gaull, before we came
to the harbor. But, on arrival there, about
1 P.M., were put in quarantine, for the death
yesterday. Indignation of the Capt. & passengers.
A very rainy day: cold storm: - In afternoon,
mails, having been forwarded, were rec'd.
And fresh meat & vegetables came on board;
many poor cattle left on board by their
masters. No man allowed to land, after
dusk. And then, the Capt. steamed out
of harbor! 3 male passengers sold.
No women or children.

Thursday April 16. Out at sea. The passes




