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

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

March.

Friday, Mar. 23<sup>r</sup>. To-day, the Government observes "Good Friday"; there was no work at the Custom and other offices. The "Môre" did not leave. Spent the morning in reading German, and copying minutes of Pauleyton, to send to S'nd. Rain, in afternoon. Mrs Baumeran sick, was find hardly all day, by the Government. Skundukku of Rumbé came, in a native boat, about some capture of a Kanta chief by the French. He wanted me to employ him. Argentynus came to say good-bye, & expecting the "Môre" to go to-morrow.

Sat. Mar. 24. Woke with 5.30 A.M. government guns; and arose at our 5.45. A.M. first bell. At 6. A.M., went to the pier of H & C, to see Argentynus embark on the "Môre", but she had already left, in the first boat, I followed in the second, saw her for a few minutes on the "Môre"; the Capt. called us to a cup of coffee; and I returned ashore with him. Vessel left shortly after 7. A.M., I wrote and finished the copy for S'nd. of Pauleyton minutes.

Read in Jougees' "Fools Errand". Mrs Baumeran not well. Wondering that the Portuguese mail did not come today. At 9. P.M., in moonlight, waited an hour, on the pier, hoping to see Mrs Baumeran come from Agonim; in vain.

(March 1894)

Sabbath, Mar. 25<sup>th</sup>. A rainy morning, then made a small assembly at church; but, it ceased before ch. closed, Mr. Trieman had sent for men to carry him, but I had none, and he walked up himself. Beautiful afternoon. The steamer, with Portuguese mail, came in, Mr. Baumer was sick, and I went in to her room, as friend and to aid, but not as medical adviser, A good attendance in the evening at church.

Monday, Mar. 26<sup>th</sup>. A rainy day. Fresh meat to-day, Socke had come, with 16 mullets, before breakfast, and, after breakfast, came a manatee shoulder, for wh. I paid \$1.50. (goods). The mail came, a letter from Tracy, did not do much all day, i felt furnish with the cold wind. The "Letter-Rains" are evidently falling: may count ~~at~~ they date from the Equinox, when the moon happened to be full. Harold Baumer's Prayer-meetings.

Tuesday Mar. 27<sup>th</sup>. A bright clear day. After breakfast, went to Plateau, to pay a small <sup>bill</sup>, at Treasury, stopped at Holt's, to get mustard, - they had none. At tailor Johnson's, to inquire about my suit of clothing. Alida has come, for my washing. A letter from Talagauga, from Mr. Allegut about their sick baby, and about Aziza. In afternoon, trimming trees, in the yard. Walked with Mrs. Ford to the Brook back of the premises, where the school-boys wash their clothes weekly. In Steveng., consulting about the

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letter Mr. Goddard had sent, by boat from Batanga, and about business terms to make with the traders, especially with Halton & Cooksons.

Wednesday Mar. 28<sup>th</sup>. Rose with a headache, wh. increased all day. Could not write or read. Attended, as usual, to Inquiry class, in afternoon, & to Prayer-meeting, in evening. Death of Wam, widow of a former ch. elder, Okota, yesterday. And death of another old woman, sister Mrs. Joagai, hence, to-day. Account of Rembendawiyas being beaten, for so visiting Tambawali's wife.

Thursday Mar. 29<sup>th</sup>. Head still aching, but better. Went to work with 2 men, to cut the outline of the prairie, on the N.W. side of the ground, toward the ravine. A French steamer came in, P.W. Bawrahan about 4. P.M. Mr. Ford beginning to pack up for his Batanga journey. Retired early.

Friday Mar. 30<sup>th</sup>. Still with some headache. Did not do much, in the morning. Went to N. & C., for some cheese and tumbler. In afternoon, a Church Union-meeting, of almost 3 hours: 5 persons were accepted for baptism; but I did not join the last 2 of the 5 - the two Elders outvoted me. Had expected Mr. Wood to call and see me this evening; but, he did not come.

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Baraka (March 1894)

Saturday Mar. 31<sup>st</sup>. Out almost all morning, directing the cutting of the path near the spring. In the afternoon, from 1.30 P.M., till 2.8 P.M., meeting with the baptized children. At 3.0 P.M., Preparatory service. Rain in evening. Quantities of parrots in the village for sale. Wonder do I am not sleepy to-day; for I was awake last night till 2nd. m. The noisy idiotic boy at Openda's house, turning night into day, and vice versa.

Sabbath April 1<sup>st</sup>. A rainy morning & preached in response. A very heavy downfall of rain during Sat. Nite. <sup>Rev.</sup> Dr. Lovell my rubber-coat to Julia Green, my umbrella to <sup>Rev.</sup> Mr. Truman, & my trawling blanket to Mrs. Lark. Communion, in afternoon. Baptized 5 (4 men & 1 woman); an affecting service. <sup>Rev.</sup> Mr. Truman assisted me, in the distribution of the elements. The blank page on Daily Mem. Calendar. "Fool."

Monday April 2<sup>nd</sup>. A clear day. A variety of jobs. Paying wages. I gave from Openda. A Liberian young man asking for a Bible, wh. he did not want to pay for. With a man, making straight the property line near the spring. A confidential talk with Mr. Bannerman, about the Mission's letter to me of a year ago, & about Mr. Ford's interference with my church-meetings.

Wacaka (April 3<sup>rd</sup>)

Tuesday April 3<sup>rd</sup>. The steamer "Ville de Maranhao" came in, I took charge of paying at the store. Went in mat, to the steamer, for onions and potatoes. In afternoon, cut through the path of the mission property line more betwixt village, this is a quantity of native lilies along the line of the joint fence.

Wednesday April 4<sup>th</sup>. At the store paying, and at the out line of the mission property I and, in afternoon, at singing class & and packed box of export food for Mr. Allegret. In evening, wrote letter to Messrs. Allegret & Tocino, and notes to Bryantman and Afziga.

Thursday April 5<sup>th</sup> } Came the English mail "Galaxy" &  
Friday " " } day late, I was off to the steamer  
aboard to obtain for Permit's returned & got a box of  
Tang Parrotas & a quantity of breadfruit & other supplies.  
This being at Bequia, Read mail, in evening  
met Present sick <sup>Mr. Fisher</sup>. General steamer  
coming in & Mrs. Present still sick. Expected the  
French surveyor & went to property outline, in rear  
& Wacaka, to complete it in time. Buried with paying  
bages, & getting provisions for my table at the sick  
Mrs. Present, & buying a quantity of dried fish  
from an Ongan man. Out on the property line,  
in afternoon. Was surprised and indignant, in the  
evening Mr. Tang asked for man here. Kangai little girl

wandered here, about 5 P.M., and did not find any  
original playmate.

After April 7<sup>th</sup>. Rainy, in morning; Rose left, as I  
had had a sleepless night.<sup>1</sup> Wrote letter to editor  
Bella, planning for a jocular address over on Tuesday,  
rectified the prospect line that I had sent first, a  
week or more ago.<sup>1</sup> Went, in evening, to Myago, to  
engage a crew for Tuesday's journey. Called at  
old Skandar, to inquire where young Skandar  
is, as Mrs. Baumeran wanted to see her.

Feb. 8th April 8<sup>th</sup>. Bright clear day. Small audience, at  
A.M. ch. and Feb. 8th. In afternoon, went to the police  
office, to ask them to stop the drumming in the foreign  
villages; they did. Mr. Baumeran preached in English.  
Signs of rain, in evening; but none came. Preached  
in Empouque, Loking, every day, for the return of the  
"wire", and the coming of the <sup>"May"</sup> <sup>St. Lucia</sup>.

Monday April 9<sup>th</sup>. A rainy morning; could not carry  
out the plan, for excursion across the river. At  
8. A.M., while rain was still falling, the French  
overenger came, & in my rubber-coat and old Ford  
rubber boots, he & I went out to the property line, only  
went alone through the marsh, back of the house.  
Silly weather all morning. Tired to write letters; so  
as; Mrs. Dwyer, with her 18-months old Edmina,

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called, the ~~old~~ <sup>new</sup> ~~old~~ <sup>new</sup> ~~old~~ <sup>new</sup> ~~old~~ <sup>new</sup> car to.  
Grandpa's wages with room for journey tomorrow.  
Grand Duke's little lake was attractive to me, so  
crossed river and thought of dinner.

Tuesday April 10<sup>th</sup>. Had nightmare black night. Rose  
early, Breakfast before prayers. Immediately after prayers,  
went to back of the 2 boats ready & the "Lafayette" <sup>the</sup>  
with Mr. Prent, and all the school boys; and the  
"Mississ" with its passengers &c. off except  
J. A. H. & myself arrived at Mirea, by 10.30.  
But a few people there. Mr. B. went with Atayago,  
to a distant village, & did not return till  
several hours, late before he came. Tide ran  
in a muddy track, through wh. the boat passed  
a canoe with us in it, to the boats, by about  
1.30 P.M. Against tide, reached Mirea about  
4. P.M. Had found Mr. Prent had had no dinner,  
as the King had entertained him. He left immediately  
with the "Lafayette". We followed an hour later.  
Reached our ride just 2 hours later. <sup>we</sup> ~~had~~  
an hour later. Skidded on the boats, the "Mississ"  
with some <sup>difficulty</sup> got ashore. All well at Baaka.  
Wednesday April 11<sup>th</sup>. Began taking stock with Mr. Ford  
in the iron store, but he left at 1/2 past nine, so I  
sat with teacher meeting. Then in afternoon, I had to

leave at 5 P.M., or noonday. <sup>May</sup> 1864  
in morning early in the morning, Bremen station.  
The wind was fair, it lay still  
at anchor, but subsequently came up, but not in  
time to land passengers. <sup>May</sup> 1864  
delay. Heavy land winds.

Sunday April 15. Last night, very heavy rain and  
storm, too noisy for Dr. Baumerman to start to Auguas.  
<sup>May</sup> "Stassan" came in. It had lost its anchor. taking  
stock all day, in the store. Rain intermitted, but  
again again in afternoon, and heavy in evening.  
Arrived, in evening, for the Baumerman to go tohorn  
in the <sup>May</sup> "Stassan". Mr. Meekel's store <sup>May</sup> his daughter  
Coly. Very tired with my day's work. <sup>May</sup>

Friday April 13<sup>e</sup>. Confusion about getting the "Stassan"  
to take the Baumermans up the river, to their station.  
It waited, waiting in the store, at the <sup>the house</sup> ~~house~~  
Finally <sup>May</sup> Dr. & Mrs. B. left <sup>at</sup> 3.00 P.M.,  
and the "Stassan" finally started, with wind and  
tide, at 5.30 P.M. On coming, made a long visit  
... shot with Dr. Hudson, agent of H.A.C.

Saturday April 14. The "Möre" does not go to town.  
not up in bed, with bad headache and nausea.  
At no breakfast. Vomited a bay, all morning on sofa,  
took soap at dinner, fell better, recovered.

Barakas (April 1894)

Sabbath April 15<sup>th</sup>. News of the death of a young man  
"Loebbie" son of 2 former church members. Teka came  
ask for his burial in our cemetery. Fine clear ,  
2. P.M. put a lead down-spout, which contained at  
intervals, the funeral, immediately after the  
ceremony. Rain ceased, in evening. Preached in reference  
to the death, expressing the Montreal view.

Monday April 16<sup>th</sup>. The French steamer coming in with  
various goods, during the morning. Was gladdened  
by hearing that Egaliza, a poor old woman and  
a member, was recovering, and would return to  
the flock, 3 of the school-boys were  
this to give their heart to Jesus. All afternoon,  
at the store, taking inventory . . & took, in all,  
in 72. Ford along his Endevor Society.

Tuesday April 17<sup>th</sup>. Bright clear day. At the store -  
Taking, The "Magazine" came in, from up river.  
Payed for a great lot of fish. Bought 2 duck  
and 5 chickens. Finished the inventory. Heard  
yesterday, from Mr. Allegret, that "Tyengu-Sané" had  
arrived at Saigon, . . . . another  
letter by, Tyengu-Sané, asked told me he wanted  
to "change his heart". Glad for these boys, to day.

Wednesday April 18<sup>th</sup>. Rainy, in morning; but, cleared  
about 11. Dolk. Began to write for the mail.

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local place, in afternoon, giving a few there, & paid the  
man of the church-membership, an old man, requested to put  
down his wife, for insufficient cause. Went to Ambo, to  
pay a bill. And, in to tailor Johnson's, to pay a  
bill there. At the weekly Prayer-meeting, asked Mr.  
Ford to conduct the meeting, as a "Farewell Service"  
before his expected leaving for Batavia.

Tuesday April 19. 10<sup>th</sup> twelve little girls. Had  
scarcely any sleep last night. Enjoyed a walk  
in the park. Quite a number of people coming  
to me, for medicine. And, 3 former school-girls,  
Egelinga, "Lattice", and Agnes. Rose, in afternoon,  
visiting the "Jasmin", with Mr. Ford, etc.

Friday April 20. Was writing most all day. When the mail  
arrived at 10.15 a.m., the Fortnightly mail, I had not quite  
finished letter to Dr. Pothier, French steamer came in  
finished Mr. P's letter, & sent it to French mail, in after-  
noon. Finished Mary's at night. Mr. Ford being, to  
be ready for his & Mrs. Ogden's journey.

Saturday April 21. English steamer came in. Mr. Ford  
arranging to get ready, to go in afternoon. Mr. Ogden  
left on the "Mayflower", about 10.15 a.m.; escorted her to  
the beach. About 3 P.M. went with Mr. Ford to the  
dock, to say good-bye; his complimentary recognition of  
our country being, during our stay together. Retained

Wednesday

April 21<sup>st</sup>

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for a few hours. At noon, I came into the  
Market, where a few Chinese had gathered up, counting  
over the card paper money.

Sabbath April 22<sup>nd</sup>. Mr. Ford came ashore, to meet that, as  
the steamer did not leave yesterday, if we were taking  
produce for H. & C. Mr. F. stayed to examine chicken  
& quiet pleasant Sabbath. After afternoon Service,  
heard Mr. Young Stark had suddenly fallen with  
vertigo. The "Mure" came in, about 5 P.M., but no  
& the 5 hours over he was brought to hospital.  
Kreutzberg and Ongarano ~~had~~ were still in the  
Ogowe. Felt doleful, in evening.

Monday April 23<sup>rd</sup>. At work, clearing away the lumber &  
rubbish, from under the school-house, - from around the  
2 storehouses, - and stowing away yesterday lumber that  
was brought by the "May Hassau", more than a week ago. Some  
Georg man came with cloth, to exchange for 2 machines.  
Bushnell wrote me a note, asking to buy a machine.  
Akande came, to tell me about a letter she had  
rec'd. from Germaner, about her son there, that possibly  
he was in want. At supper time, she brought me  
some cooked fish, and, though I knew they were her  
gift, she gracefully thought of the absent Walkister,  
Kreutzberg, and said Mr. C. had not the "It's  
indignant at Maurice being drunk on the premises."

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Tuesday April 24. Rebuked Marica for her drunkenness & disorder, started the men at the village day after the organ was in the mission store and Charles said "I object it is, as it cut off a part of the water their people built from, Charlie was not satisfied in his answer. Went to Mr. C. ~~Cooley~~ for the passage of the men and came back to Kaituna, or the "vines", at noon. Old Mr. Bishop, the missionophagous, in the drawers of the book shelf in his study. Mr. Floryman (?) the late elder of Cape Deshay, called to see me. Concerning my old school-days. At dusk threatening my two Engaged bantams, for the fence of Bushnell, today.

Wednesday April 25. Containing the building of the fence, & hastening it, as the cow, this has done to much expense. Our Pressets' garden, comes in, while the space is open. Women & elders murmuring at the closure of the old path, and threatening, even though I have made them a new way. Many calls of business on Wednesday evening, announced the finger meeting, the Saturday afternoon. On Thursday, still at the fence, Friday evening I made calls in the villages, on Mrs. Sarah Lewis and Queen Everette. Friday April 27. The "Helen Wittenauer" coming in. It

10. A.M., a small mail came; a manifest of some 40 cases of kerosene and some 6 cases of tobacco. Doctor is in a recent-written formula & few mistakes, with the Customs officer in the office, it was making me think went to have the "nafyot" - I laid the water; and, at 11.30, started for the steamer. One of the mates in charge of the hold, where was the kerosene, was rude and disobliging, the other, who was in charge of the hold where was the fish, was polite. Reached shore by 2 P.M., landed the goods - case 1/2, by 2.30, was at my dinner, my hunger, his kind consent to let Berthe go to Mr. Barakoff. began to read Emin Pasha's book of natural history observations.

Saturday April 28<sup>th</sup>. Orgân came to my room, & had satisfactory talk with him, about his disrespectful words concerning the fence I had been building, and the rights of the Mission thereto. In afternoon, late, the Portuguese mail was seen coming in front Oveng, for the Postoffice. In evening, had first meeting of singing meetings, for singing English hymns. By 8.30 P.M., the mail came, & nice letter from Mary, with news of her progress in music & her pronunciation schools.

Sabbath April 29<sup>th</sup>. Bright clear day. "Mire" left the town, will not be back till 3 weeks. In afternoon, English & Mr. Galt Wood, of H.A.C., played the organ for me.

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(May 1894)

Wednesday May 30. Fine scene, with a very fit the morning  
to go to town & do some work until I expect that  
a cool afternoon will be the best time. Then the tide  
for higher up. 2 of them did so, - the other 2 (members  
of class) did not. Finally, found another man & they  
volunteered. Sending the paper to plateau. Finally, got  
11.4 m<sup>3</sup> back. Met Louis in S., to Angouges  
teacher. Employed Macarie & his men while they are  
waiting for steamer. Finished the fence, on the NW side  
of the premises. May perhaps have some difficulty with  
Maurice about the difficult of the marshes.

Thursday May 31. Gave Claude another talk. Pay day, -  
had quite a list of employees for an hour, and spent  
the rest of the morning, in the wooden storehouse, re-  
ceiving the boxes of kerosene, from the boat-shanty.  
In the afternoon, starting another section of fence, about  
the premises on the western side. Bright clear day. Claude  
had come to see me yesterday; & I went to the evening, to  
see him. Julia Green told me, to-day, that he had  
come to the station to conduct, and when they, said  
Lucina's little children having family prayers.

Wednesday May 2 } English steamer "Cameron" came in &  
Thursday May 3 } mail came & bill of lading for a lot  
of Provisions for me. Went off in afternoon  
tide hindered office, where I knew last night, on the

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steamer, quite agreeable, & the 2<sup>d</sup> steward called me in to take a cup of tea. met Mr. Brown, of the firm, Po, Motts, Mission. Heavy work landing & carrying of passengers. Had then,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hrs spent in getting the boat up to its house. Heavy rain. Mr. Alia had just arrived, as I was leaving, in the afternoon. To rainy for Weekly Prayer meeting till to be rescheduled supper, with Dr. Present. Because I was tired, didn't tea, wh. kept me awake till long after midnight. On Friday, busy most of the day, with Mr. Alia, in the store, getting him several hundred dollars of goods. Alia drunk today will dismiss him tomorrow. Had sandwiches made, wh. had been obtained, at night, after trouncing the boat.

Friday May 4. Dismissed Alia. Dr. Present wrote out declaration &c for me to the Eastern House, for our Alia, making many entries per my acct. books. About noon, Alphonse came back from Tucson, with the "Minnesota", having left the "Pacific" at Tucson. All the afternoon, at the boat-house, sending up the goods, wh. had been landed from the "Minnesota". French mail-steamer came in, on its way to San. The headache I have had for 2 or 3 days disappeared this afternoon.

On Saturday night, I was so tired with the business of getting

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M. Flot's boat is in the morning, - praying for the journey  
to town, and setting out in the afternoon.  
After the evening Service, I made no entry here, and  
went to bed.

Wednesday May 1<sup>st</sup>. At noon, at T. Dider, saw the Gaumer,  
French and his wife, who were to be  
here to-day. We had the insurance  
of people there as we were going, & M. Flot's  
told him my troubles, but he was willing to get the  
"Minnesota" out, & I hurried the two off to the steamer  
at Batanga. A large attendance at Evening Service.  
A beautiful, quiet day. Mr. Wood again at the organ  
in afternoon services. Dr. Wood came in evening,  
M. Shé assisted.

Wednesday May 2<sup>nd</sup>. Several of the workmen absent. Sent  
F. Rigo across the river, to King Edouard, to make  
arrangements about locating him there. He returned  
reporting not having been well-received by the  
people, & Edouard himself away. Sent letter by French  
mail, & little boat expected, but it did not come.  
Katy visited me in the afternoon, to get medicine,  
and told me of Katy's death: arrangements for funeral;  
Katy, friend of the agone, visited me.

Tuesday May 8<sup>th</sup>. The burial of Katy at 9. A.M.  
Paid Mission bill for the passage of Maxima

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and the 5 others to Batanga. A beautiful, clear day. Showed Mr. Leake's corrections to his report. Tidie and Handi looking at my descriptions. Dr. Alba's boat arrived from Corisco. Music, in evening, with Mr. Puccetti and his violin & my flute. The new moon 3 days old. Looking for the corisco, I went to Aldeia. Mr. Alba began to load his boat while I sent the papers to Plateau; the steamer came back later, with no paper, and would come in afternoon. The boat had to wait. In afternoon, all tremors in water and tree near the river, directing Alba to make his line of fence near the first village, still digging. Very exceedingly ignorant members. Dark, dark clouds, strong wind. Cool night.

Tuesday May 10. Mr. Alba and his company finally off to Corisco, Native W. F. M. S., in afternoon. In evening, my flute with Mr. Puccetti violin. Young man singing. Very nice, early in the evening; and then, after going to bed, did not sleep; got up, dressed and read for an hour.

Friday May 10. Getting off the "Lafayette" with Mr. Puccetti and his school, on excursion to Parat island; late in their starting; feared they wd have difficulty with the tide. After they were gone, I walked to Arriondo, to see sick Handi. The way back, stopping at

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three factories, where I obtained the wide black binding I wanted. At Hotel "Papouet", who remembered my being fellow-passenger of 1881 with Mrs. Nassau. At Hollis, to enquire about sending letter to Mr. Banneker. At Akera however, was a child who had gotten a bead in its ear, & the French doctor had failed to get it out.

A very quiet afternoon, looking for the "Mine", watching for the return of the "Lafayette". In evening, after waiting for the boat till after 8 P.M., & it did not come, went to visit Akera. returned at 11 P.M. Present night air. Mrs. Prescot has returned & had gone to bed.

Wednesday May 12<sup>th</sup>. Brought the "Lafayette" up into the boat-house. Hired a new man, "Kienben", a Native, Rani, in afternoon, sent a few letters, for Mr. Bannerman, to Hollis, Transplanted some trees, with Mr. Prescot's aid. English singing-school, in evening. Dr. Prescot declined to play with us the Supongwe hymns, because I used the old Supongwe book, instead of the new. Sat up late, reading.

Thursday May 13<sup>th</sup>. Rose late. Saw the "Mine" coming in, soon! Drags & Keno to Nyango, & take the boat, etc. I have been leaving in the water, ready for the emergency & won't also myself, to the bank, to prepare the way for the Customhouse officials for receiving the baggage of the 6 passengers, folklor & his wife, together

and Oyonguno, Ewax & another young man. They  
deserted at "these Sabbath irregularities", necessita-  
ting the labor of the boat, back in time for church.  
No instrument of music with the "Superior hymns". Rain in  
afternoon. Joktan & Ewax came, to see me. Mr.  
Wood sent and he &c. will come today to  
play the organ. Mr. French consented to play with  
for English and Congregational services, in after-  
noon & will continue at English Service. Rain  
also, in evening.

Monday May 14: Started Joktan, at repairing the rooms. I  
have given him, making out an order for goods, to  
America. In afternoon, put the "Minnesota" into the <sup>boat</sup> dock-  
house. Went, with 3 men, to start the line of the  
fence toward the spring, was indignant to see that the  
French Senegal soldiers had made a path to their to-  
ground very near our houses. Rain, in afternoon. Mwenanga,  
Joktan's wife, and Argutyan & Oyonguno, visited me, in  
afternoon, to tell Ogo news, and the latter two stayed  
to supper.

Tuesday May 15: A rainy day, scarcely an hour without  
a shower. At various jobs - at the cemetery &c. & broke  
decorating the church chairs, annoyed, in the  
store-house, at Itoo Deric's contemptuous words -  
his <sup>letter</sup> page, writing recently to the Reward <sup>A. J. G.</sup> Committee

Consultation with Mrs. Julia Finch & Rev. Frank Lewis, about their evangelistic work, in the villages of Gold coast & Takoradi, at St. P. M. during chilly night.

Wednesday May 16<sup>th</sup> My foot was sore with a bruise on the Thursday May 17<sup>th</sup> heel all day, clearing two rooms, and putting them in order, for the expected arrival of Uncle Jacob & Forget, on their way to the Colony, via Takoradi, Kepha, whom I met on the steamer a few days ago, came ashore, in afternoon, from the steamer, as it returned from Accra. He stayed all night & was present at Prayer-Meeting & Raisin night.

On Thursday my foot quite sore & had to sit a good deal. Mr. Brown left, on "Pawnee", in afternoon. Prepared a set of 8 iron hair-spikes, to send to Uncle Jacob & Kepha, and began to write for the mail.

Friday May 18<sup>th</sup> sending notes to Mr. S., about the "Natives", going to Agoro & Ado Akanda, to get ready; and a trunk to send to Agatye up Agoro. Wrote a few letters. Agabo, one of my former Conico School girls, came to see me, with 2 of her children, - one of them "Willie", namesake of brother-in-law Susan. Agatye came with the bags, clothes and wine, and to make up the beds, for the expected guests of tomorrow. Wrote a letter to Mrs. McComb.

Saturday May 19<sup>th</sup>. Two students coming in - both French. Beddin, Mrs. Present went off, in the boat, and

did not go. At 2.30 P.M., my guest left, for the French  
steamer. Showy weather, small attendance at English  
sermon, no organ music, Mr. Wood being occupied  
with the "Möre"; and Mr. Present had gone to the steamer  
with the guests, Augentym & Organo at supper with  
and Mr. Present, Rain night, my foot not well yet;  
very tired and sleepy, and went to bed early.

Monday, May 20<sup>th</sup>, Variable weather, "Möre" went early.  
Making entries and memoranda. Mervanga, Jokelan's  
wife, began her matron work with the School-boys.  
In afternoon, Augentym came and looked over my

other workmen lazy, and disrespectful to Mr.  
Present, summoned Otaudi & dismissed him for the

Wednesday May 23<sup>rd</sup> } Swoke loosening the frame of my  
washstand (a desk). On Wednesday, found one of the  
workmen cooking dinner during work time, I threw the

Ernest said that his wife, Michalji, had deserted him for another man. Also, heard that Eudore & Stakey of the Class, had joined the Romanists. A bright day.

Thursday May 24 } The German steamer, "Marie Wacew,"  
Friday " 25 } came in the afternoon, I went off  
Saturday " 26 } with the surf-boat, to discharge  
some lumber.

Had had quite a confusion, in the morning, about putting the boat in the water, Oigo not made a mistake, and yet lost both oars. Small mail from Batanga, also, large mail, by Portuguese mail. On Friday, my cold in the head was a little better. Carrying up the lumber from the boat-house. The men slow to come to work, in afternoon, did not allow some 3 of them to work, as they came a  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour late. Agonge new village, near the mission premises.

On Saturday, went to funeral of widow Eringi. Had work putting the "Lafayette" into the boat-house. In afternoon, with Agonge's aid, putting up pictures in the large sitting-room. Strong cold wind at night.

Sabbath May 27. A clear, cool, beautiful day. At large audience, both morning and evening, the largest number present at Lab. Sch., since my return here to Africa. Heard that Mrs. Pierre Dajaux was stricken with paralysis.

Monday May 28<sup>th</sup>. The incoming steamer was, at first, thought to be the English, with possibly Mrs Ogden on board. Men with different work waiting to <sup>be</sup> shown their places. A long time, in the morning, at Port-aux-Bancs. In afternoon, went to the funeral of the French trader, Pierre Lajeunes.

Tuesday May 29<sup>th</sup> } Have not been well for 2 days.  
Wednesday May 30<sup>th</sup> } Troubles with Attyangs, Kame & Coopers  
on Tuesday afternoon. Sick on Wednesday.

Attyangs came to ask for grace. The painting of the church remained. We not able to attend to digging class or Prayer meeting.

Thursday May 31<sup>st</sup>

Friday June 1<sup>st</sup>

Saturday " 2<sup>nd</sup>

Sabbath " 3<sup>rd</sup>

Sunday " 4<sup>th</sup>

On Thursday, was still sick; made no entry; do not remember if I did anything. Attyangz came to spend the day with us, helping her sewing. Just after dinner, at 1. P.M., the steamer "Rouelle" was seen far out. When the 4.30 bell rang, Mrs. Prescot put the boat in the tidal water by 2. P.M., I did not go; a Nat. P. was needed to oversee the bays a man at their work. Last word for Attyangz, to go in boat and meet Mrs. Ogden. This delayed the boat, who did not reach the steamer till an hour after it anchored; still it was the first boat at the steamer side.

In the evening, consulting with Mrs. Ogden, about her

In Friday, buried a crew of 6, with three off in  
the "Minnesota", to Mr. Brewster at Auguia.  
In Saturday, will again, at 6 P.M. receive Post mail,  
to German Stoever, to Batanga. On Sabbath,

 Two steamer in to-day, an English & a French,  
 Argentini came, to tell me about her formal  
 discussion with Mad. Becht; and about Mr. C. having  
 given her their washing & beautiful moonlight.  
Saturday June 16: Was annoyed yesterday afternoon, by the  
 interference of Lucia a French Léone, in the matter of a  
 suspension <sup>of the man</sup> of Charles, from the singing class. Käthe  
 and Styrene resumed their work this morning, painting  
 the Boys sleeping-house. Had to send to Mr. C. for rice,  
 for food for tomorrow. Burned the dried grass. Finished  
 the addition to the forehouse, for storage of thatch,  
 felt foreish, in afternoon & evening, but nevertheless,  
 conducted the class singing; an unusual number  
 of Lucia Léone young men present. Beautiful moon-  
 light. Went to bed early, foreish a trifle.

Sabbath June 17: Rose foreish; ate no breakfast. Lay on  
 lounge till ch. time, with effort, went through morning  
 services, with Rev. Mr. Freeman & Sab. Sch. Was lounge, at  
 dinner, & ate; but lay on lounge most of after-  
 noon, till Mr. Wood came at 3.00 p.m. for organ playing  
 in afternoon service; felt chilly, in evening. Argentini  
 & Oyoungus stayed, after afternoon ch., & took tea.  
 Capt. Davis called in evening & obtained Mrs  
 Eggers from coming to church. Retired early, foreish.

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# Baraka (June 1894)

Monday June 18<sup>th</sup>. Dark cold morning & a slight rain-fall, during the morning. Wrote my statistical Report to Govt. in afternoon, Tugentzim with Oyongoro came, expecting to fix up my room for me; but, I deferred it till Wed., & she remained to do my laundry, in the morning. The 4 new Kanga workers dropped the good style of working, and invited Kave(h), whom they were working with, I bade them not to work, in afternoon; but, as they had been sitting down, to continue setting. Mr. Wood was at dinner, and explained about a defuncted bill of Mr. Barnardus. The school boys becoming disorderly and noisy.

Tuesday June 19<sup>th</sup>. A steamer came in, wh. at first, I thought, was the German; but, it was a French. A small mail came, letter from Dr. Norton, and the Board's appropriations, for the coming year. Kaur (c) still at the mounting of the Bayz-Dormitory, paid out the last of the hand-sewing-machines, to Lee-Storek, in exchange for cotton. Johnson the tailor came to get lining, for a coat for the German Agent, sent the mail for French steamer also, mail for Hagan, for the "Mure" going tomorrow morning. Tugentzim came, at dusk, with my last week's clothes, and stayed to supper; and, after supper, I escorted her to her house. During the afternoon, had several men trimming the Bonaccaus, palm-tree.

Wednesday June 20<sup>th</sup>. another French steamer, with mail. The "wire" not gone yet. At afternoon Dr. George Clark, was not pleased with Rev. Mr. Travers's assumptions, about admitting members to the Socy., after Meeting, went to Lacau's house, and reminded Mary Walter (Madame Bigot) of her promise to refund me the \$150.00 I had paid, for her return to Africa from Liverpool. She paid part of it (\$66.) at once (evidently under great excitement) & I gave her a receipt. I feel that with her pride & vanity, she will now hate me, and will try to injure me.

Thursday June 21<sup>st</sup>. Augustinus came with Oyongmo, to clean my room; sent Origo, Ovenga, & Okomba, to move out the furniture &c. Mrs Ogden went to Nsukka, to the women's meeting. Near noon, dismissed one of the 4 men I hired 3 weeks ago, for idleness in his work. Madame (C) finished painting the Boys' house. Mrs Ogden was displeased that I had gone on with my work, about the cleaning of my room without her, and at the tea-table there were some unpleasant explanations.

Augustinus went to Rev. Mr. Travers's to have a discussion with Madame Bigot, about the necessity of the latter separating from her, and leaving the house. The Govt called officially Friday June 22<sup>nd</sup>. Had Iwke make 2 large boxes, for hiding the plantains and fruit from the <sup>native</sup> ~~native~~ Madam out a partial list of my Furniture & its value.

Saturday, June 23<sup>rd</sup> away the early part of afternoon, & I superintended the boys clearing away rubbish, and burning it. A woman, Akana, came for consultation into the Ingaing Class.

Sat. June 23<sup>rd</sup>. A <sup>very</sup> urgent <sup>case</sup>, to be point for Lassau's house. I wrote a draft of a disposition of my goods here, in case of my death. Have cleared out the panthe pots from the food-house, & put them in the adjacent room, where salt is kept. In afternoon, 10 men at the sat. evening English singing. Dark night, unusually noisy dancing, in the adjacent villages.

Sabbath, June 24<sup>th</sup>. A clear bright day. <sup>Rev.</sup> Mr. Freeman preached a sermon on Forgiveness, aiming it at me, for having suspended the man Charles from the Ingaing side; I bore it quietly and said or did nothing. Attendance good all day. In evening, went to see Agoutyari, who was not well; and she told me of <sup>Rev.</sup> Mr. Freeman's talking against me publicly before the heathen, and his leading a suspicion to drive me away; some of the women (Bible-worshippers among them) are active in the matter, I have tried so hard to do my duty to this church, and here the native minister himself tries to make confusion! Went to bed very late, disturbed with the thoughts of what will be best for me to do in this matter.

Monday June 25<sup>th</sup>. Face unrefreshed and tired. ate nothing at breakfast, & Mrs. Odger observed it, & I told her I was anxious about some ch. matter, and my lack of faith in Mr. Freeman. At noon dinner, asked Mrs Odger to be present, as a witness, at a conference I intended to have with Mr. Freeman, at 2.30 P.M. At 2.0. m. Hession was a seated Islands, & gave his word to Mrs. Beechwell. After adjournment, with Mrs Odger, Islands & Odger, represented to Mr. Freeman his evil attack on me, in the jutifit; he tried to evade it. After he was gone, I explained to the 2 Elders the origin of the difficulty, about the man Charles, & they justified me, in every respect. Felt quite exhausted over the talk. Walked to the photographs, and engaged in a sitting towards afternoon. The "wine", in the Harbor, had exploded last night.

Tues. Day June 26<sup>th</sup>. Augusteum came, for medicine; & I recollected to her the events of yesterday, Augusteum Boardman helping Mrs Odger, at her packing. I invited him to remain to dinner, but Mrs O. did not need him for afternoon. In afternoon, went to the appointment at photographs, but the day was too dark. Appointed again for tomorrow. On way home, stopped at German Factory, to ask why their flag was at "Mourast", heard by telegram had come yesterday Dr. Gust. Garnot, of France, was murdered by an Anarchist. The German steamer in the

number. A cold evening. I retired early, very tired.  
Wednesday June 27<sup>th</sup>. The German steamer still here, the English steamer coming in. Post for mail; 3 letters came, disappointingly short. Dr. Bellafair is going to send Rev. Mr. Clark back to Africa. Went to photographer, and was my pictures taken. In afternoon, at 2 P.M., the meeting of baptized children of the church. At 3 P.M., the singing class; a full attendance; but, as they have been so poor in their study of the catechism, I told them that more need come to finish the examination; except that, after they were dismissed, I told the woman Agundaga, who lives up the river, and with her means of instruction, seemed to have a good beginning, to go on.

Thursday June 28<sup>th</sup> } Feverish both of those days. In  
Friday " 29<sup>th</sup> } afternoon of the 28<sup>th</sup>, went to the

funeral of the 5-year old daughter of a French gentleman, at the Platina. On the way back, stopped at Izewa village, to see Agundaga, who has been sick. On the 29<sup>th</sup>, I lay down a good deal during the day, but there were an unusual number of calls at my door. It made me get up. In afternoon, at 4 P.M., meeting of Session of Church. Rev. Mr. Trickey, in the name of the recent assumption by him, was at the door of the church uncalled (he is not a member of the

Sesin), I told him to return to his house, - that he did not need me. Invitations came from the Governor, & the Memorial Services for the murdered President Carnot, on July 3<sup>d</sup>.

Sat. June 30. Still felt feebish today. The mason, Edwards, finished his job, at the foundation for the little store-honey, & began work at stones for Edwards-Taylor's grave. Stevens, a mulatto was not at preparation services. I fear he is for the visiting compatriots. At evening English singing, a young Sierra Leone man, from the Govt. printing-office attempted to play the organ for us, but failed to keep any time.

Sabbath July 1. Had somewhat of a headache, but it disappeared during the day. Preached upon John in N. T., A large alt. Oct. Communion of Lord's Table in afternoon; 3 women added by certificate, 2 restored from excommunication, and 1 woman (Ogandaga) baptized. Augustus Boardman not present at all. The "Möre" came from Akim Reing, the morning. Begun saluting at Platina, for the murdered Pres. Carnot, - one man injured in the firing.

Monday July 2. A variety of people on hand, - Ozeune for medicine; - Kenga, about a new marriage; - food to give out; - food to buy; - clothes to send to be washed; Pay day: <sup>25</sup> Qu. Truman the quiet one, - his good for many, promptly on hand. Lent

In the Wind & rain, I wondered there was no news from Argon of the "Nore". Letters came in afternoon. Waiting in afternoon. Disappointed that Mr. Prestet did not come; the school-boys are being very wild and irregular. The dry-season wind very cold this evening.

Wednesday At 8:30 A.M., went to Blatcar, to the  
Memorial Services for the late Prestet.

Carnot<sup>st church</sup> was there at 9 A.M., but just too late; the services were over, and the battery of guns just finished their salute. Returned, & stopped at the goldsmith's Lecture, at Jezecké, - she still at Caverone; at Akra Governor, she still sick. At Izmer village, & Lassau's house; Paul, Augeray was about washing <sup>Clothes</sup> at the brook; at the fisher-Station, to get postage stamps. The school-boys were wild and neglectful. Capt. Baus & Lieut. Engerer, M. Structuring, called to see us;

On Wednesday. Many jobs, my photographs came. Dr. Handelmann called, to say good-bye. In afternoon, Origo objected to doing a certain additional work, and suddenly deserted my service. Orenza also was absent (by permission) for 2 weeks across river, and to light the evening Soculie and using the <sup>old</sup>, and light church myself. The night was dark, & after Lecture, I escorted Augustin home, as she was alone.

Luzon

Wednesday July 5<sup>th</sup>. Went to bed early, after writing a letter to Sister Isabella. Had on my mind the necessity of getting up early, in order to run the fruit mill, I slept uneasily. Drove home several times. Got up, as fine & young at 5:45 A.M. After breakfast, the new employee, Domingo came for directions in the business of sample &c. Writing up the stone crop Concord - Kendall grapes. Acacia " " Iglesia sewing machine. In the afternoon, Mr. W. F. M., a layman was present, and seemed well of health. A new moon last night.

Friday July 6<sup>th</sup> A German & an English steamer came in.  
Saturday " 7<sup>th</sup> The German left at 4 P.M., & I sent  
Sabbath " 8<sup>th</sup> mail by it to Batanga. Mr. Hardeman  
 left on the steamer.

On Saturday, very unexpectedly, Prese Mr. Baumer & Harold & Mr. Preest came from Baguio. Finished my letter for Mr. Lynde, & sent it with a number of other letters, in what I thought was time; but, for some reason they were not mailed by the Postmaster.

At evening English singing, very few present.  
On Sabbath, woke unrefreshed & fat, I had had a sleepless night. Preached in morning, Mr. Baumerman preached in afternoon, I was seized with fever & "Benguela" came in from South. I preached in evening under an effort.

Monday July 9<sup>th</sup>. Rose weak & fee from fever. Many jobs at once; started 2 men at cutting up the turtle I had bought lot of afternoon. Sent Joktan with to Custom House, for permit to embark Mrs. Ogden's freight. Mr. England a American, Mr. Bauman was helping mark Mrs. Ogden's boxes. The permit was returned requiring weight & valuation. I hurried to weigh, & get Del. Permit to re-issue the Permit. After dinner, Mr. Bauman took the 6 pieces of freight to the "Bengal". On his return, I inquired how many had turtle to day. I sent some also to Argentina; and she & Argentina were here together for tea; first moonlight night.

Tuesday July 10<sup>th</sup>. Did not feel bright or well. Packed a box of books to send to America to May, also a box of stuffed animals and birds. On looking for my traveling bedding, wh. I had loaned Mr. Preseet, for his Argon journey, I found only the <sup>thin</sup> mosquito net & matress (the latter very dirty). On inquiry, found a blanket, etc. one of the members of the boat's crew had appropriated for his own use, & still later, found the pillow & another blanket also in use by the men. Felt quite annoyed at Mr. Preseet's neglect of my property. In evening, Rev. P. & Mrs. Bauman had an organ & violin duett; they did not ask me to join them with my flute. Long talk with Mr. B., about various matters.

Wednesday July 11<sup>th</sup>. Bought back, for \$15., from Mr. Baumewar, the matress I had sold him in 1891. Finished packing & marking the boxes for Dray and Dr. Foster. In afternoon, Mr. Foster & Mr. Baumewar went to Plosteria. Searched among all the boxes of the wooden store-haus & found my missing box of Laura-novels. At 5. P. M., found Kere (<sup>h</sup>) had lied to Kero saying I had given him liberty to gather red-fruit; he secreted himself, when I went to search in him & the bamboo pole he had taken, for putting the fruit. In evening, after church, Mrs. Lewis made an excited report of the condition Akera-subenbe was in. Went with her & Augustini & Aug. Bradman, to Mapoko's house & found her quiet & spoke to her of the condition; she went into an ecstatic rhapsody of religious fervor, & she prayed! I prayed a song: "do not know what to make of the call," a remarkable scene. Returned late. Beautiful moonlight night.

Thursday July 12<sup>th</sup>. Whitewashing the food-house: several women helping Mrs. Ogden & Mrs. Baumewar, seen for their journey. Scarcity of food, of native supply. In the evening, James Mapoko & Akera-subenbe came to see me, & I had a \$1.00 dollars talk with them, about their duty of marriage.

Friday, July 13<sup>th</sup>. Cleaning up odd pieces of lumber, and selecting pieces of lengths of boards, with which

To build proposed small Provision-house. Augustinus, Kenya, & Akeda have sewing for Mrs. Baumerman, wrote a few letters. Davis not writing to-day. Sent a bundle of mail to Det. Shā. In the evening Mr. Purset's big bon-fie. Beautiful night, moon half full.

Saturday July 14<sup>th</sup>. Gave out rice for the native household, and, shortly afterward, quite a supply of iguana cauce. Preparing for Sabbath preaching. Akeda and Mrs. Gordon Boardman's acct., found we had no rice for our Baumerman, & I had her stay for dinner. Another big bon-fie of Mr. Purset, knowing the man, was the rice eaten accumulated - it's o'clock now, arranging to send Aug. Boardman up, next Tuesday, to Angon, disorderly Sierra Leone people of Singing.

Sabbath July 15<sup>th</sup>. A bright clear day, I preached, in Mr. Mr. Baumerman, in English, in afternoon, Mr. Wood, after leading the organ in church, stayed to supper. Was annoyed all day, and especially in the afternoon, by Harold Baumerman's parents allowing him to be rude and noisy, preventing conversation by older people. Beautiful moonlight night.

Monday July 16<sup>th</sup>. Buying meat, and arranging for the boat to go to Angon tomorrow, to take Augustus Boardman, and, Hene, wife of Hengye. In afternoon,

went, with Mrs. Bannerman, Dr. Prestet & little Harold, to the Fransinet steamer Co. office, to pay \$450, for tickets to Marseilles. Mr. Mouat, the agent was not <sup>well</sup> & told us to come tomorrow. I conducted the evening Prayer Meeting.

Tuesday July 17<sup>th</sup>. Making final arr't with Mrs. Bannerman, and Mrs. Ogden. In afternoon, went again to Mr. Mouat, agent of steamer Co., & paid \$447.75 for 3 & half fares to Marseilles. Mr. Mouat, was still sick, but came to attend to business. Cold dark day. Augustin <sup>old</sup> Stearns King, for Mrs. Bannerman's <sup>step</sup> son, from across the Bay, came to see about our locating a Bible-Reader with them, & seemed surprised at my account of chief Alcalde's neglect of my letter to him, 2 months ago on that subject.

Wednesday July 18<sup>th</sup>. Steamer "Tibet" came in, in A.M. Sent for mail, but messenger was sent back. Sent him again in afternoon, & mail came while I was in English Class. Just before it, Mrs. Bacon came, on their way to Spain. Contained a specimen of letters, an article, & going. In evening Prayer Meeting had some few well & welcome visitors, with Mrs. Bannerman & Dr. Ogden.

Thursday July 19<sup>th</sup>. Rose with a headache, wh. increased all day & did very little work. Mrs. Ogden made a coconut cake for Mrs. Bacon, asking my permission.

to do so; and, then, she went on to cook other things in the kitchen, wh. annoyed me. Then, she, was displeased, because I put on the table also a plum-pudding. At 2 P.M., Mrs. a Mrs. Gaoon went to their steamer "Tibet", & Mrs. Present escorted them, and Mr. Bannerman went along, with his and Mrs. Ogden's baggage; they had a little difficulty at the border, in the examination of their baggage by the Chinese officer. The boat returned, at 5.30 P.M., my headache still continued.

Friday July 20 } On Friday, was cold again. Asked Mrs.  
Sat. " 21 " } Ogden to go to the store, & help me re-  
Sabbath " 22 " } cognise the names & values of some  
words on the currency; but, when we got there, she said she did not know their names, & could not help me; and, when we left the store, she never looked at me & did not come to dinner, she did not make any explanation, & there was no private moment, on the way, to the steamer "Peking", with ~~Mr.~~ her & Mr. Mrs. Bannerman & Harold, to ask for explanation, Mrs. Present & Augentius were with us also.

On Saturday, the "Christine" returned from Tugou. Looking over the books, in the old Mission Library, and trying to save some of them, in the evening, was very much depressed, of the lateness of Augentius

bringing back the boys' washing, and my washing,  
and her neglect of the mending of my clothes.  
Sabbath. Was a cold dark day, small attendance  
at Sab. Sch., I had made some changes in the  
classes, in the previous Dept., wh. I thought Mr.  
Prescot favored, and, after I had done  
it, some of the boys objected, & I found Mr.  
Prescot did not sustain me in evening. The  
Service, some well-dressed young men sat near  
the door, & did not behave well.

Monday July 23. Abundance of plantains & iguana coming  
in purchase, Collecting the books of the Mission Library  
that are being ruined, in the wooden store, and clean-  
ing them up, In afternoon, wrote letters for America,  
dry varying, - much of it cold and dark, A very  
dry dry season. Annoyed, in evening, by the school-  
boys being given, by Mr. Prescot, my lantern, which I  
had forbidden them.

Tuesday July 24. Looked over bills and accounts. In the  
afternoon, examined Presbyterian records, to find out about  
the status of Candidate Ngande, A German steamer came  
in. And, about 5 P.M., the "Möre". A bright clear  
day.

Wednesday July 25. Mail came from "Madras", with letter  
from Dr. Allegut, about Akande not being

satisfaction in the Salasaga & I., the author of the  
river's life, will expect up in as a pupil of his  
school, to assist in the Bey-shoos at Salasaga.

At noon Pearce came in, post mail from Batanga,  
sent a back mail to us. Found Exposition ticket  
bought and 4<sup>th</sup> cabin of English steamer, the "Aurora",  
arranged to come & fit the guest-quarters in order.  
Just as I was starting to prayer-meeting, Capt.  
John of the "<sup>1<sup>st</sup></sup> Thore", a his engineer, 1st. Mate, & others  
to see me.

Thursday July 24 On the 25<sup>th</sup> A French man-of-war came  
Friday " 27 in.

Early on the 27<sup>th</sup>, 2 steamers were seen. I had a headache  
but, at 8. A. M., went off in "Minette", to French "Tribut",  
expecting to see a Mrs. Jasius, Mrs. Bonon, & Mr. Anduado?,  
Adaka & other Galans were on board, & said Mr. M. A.  
had remained in Ogoor, & the Mrs. B. was dead, at  
Cape Lopez, & Mr. & Mrs. J. had come, & had already  
gone ashore. Also, that all steel boxes of the French com-  
m'd. were to remain for the boat. Left, & went to the English  
"Galoon". Water rough, Mr. Laffin, & sister <sup>Belle</sup> both sick, &  
no one to look for me, they concluded to keep  
on their journey south, my permit for landing was  
not quite complete & hurried ashore, to complete it.  
Arrived at the house, but a Mrs. Jasius had already

come. Put the "Lafayette" in the water. In afternoon, Mr. Prent & Mr. Tissieres went in "Minnesota", with the larger school-boys, to the plateau a "Tibet", & I went with some of my people, a 3 hired for the occasion, to the "Balcon", & got the 1 cases of goods ordered last Feb'y, & Mr. Laffai & Sister Bella concluded to come ashore. Native woman came to welcome; & Auguryané had been on land all afternoon, mending our clothes & attending to the visitors.

The "Como" also came in, from Ft. Knob, & brought a mail, additional to what the "Balcon" had brought.

Sat. July 28<sup>th</sup> } Bringing up, to the shore, the boxes Mr.  
Sabbath Aug. 29<sup>th</sup> } had been landed yesterday, & which had  
Monday Aug. 30<sup>th</sup> } been left at the beach. In afternoon, obtained a dozen Kerosene from H. & C., & hoisted both the boats, - a job of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hour. The 3 men here yesterday acted suspiciously, in declining to take the pay I offered, they thinking it too small. In evening, a fine Singing of English, with an unusual number of German Echo Gentlemen.

On Sabbath, a chilly day, Preached in Imponger, in A.M., At Sat. Oct., 4<sup>th</sup> teachers absent, Sister Bella took one class, Clara another, & I conducted 2 other classes, I observed that the men, who are learning to read Imponger, seem to refuse to be taught by the native women Aguli. Enjoyed the afternoon service as did

the 1<sup>st</sup> Sister Bella. A pleasant series of services.

On Monday, opening some of the newly-arrived boxes. An inspector from the Custom House had come in the day preceding, to enquire about the milk, a winter provision. Busy in the store most of morning, & at noon, had a call from Mr. Teissens who showed me a copy of our minute of Judgment of N.J., with penciled notes, wh. had been sent him by some one, misinterpreting our work, its character, and presenting a criticism of James's treatment of Fian. In afternoon, went with for.

At 2 P.M. draft (Bill of Exchange) to buy gold, at H. & C.; they had none. But, at Wölfenau, obtained gold & silver (German) for two of the Bills. At 5 P.M., a violent fall of rain for an hour, wh. prevented people coming to the usual Monday Prayer-meeting.

Tuesday July 21<sup>st</sup>. Was occupied, most of the morning, in getting goods from the store, - in filling an order, for Mr. Teissens & and, in starting back, at putting the pack into the school-house window. In afternoon, found the kitchen stove so broken, that I turned it out, and put, in its place, the little one I had bought with, one a year ago. Most of the guests retired early, and I was left alone.

Wednesday Aug 1<sup>st</sup>. Busy all morning, paying wages. As some of the men had been very negligent in work, I had charged their days, & 2 of them, Malongen & Daniels,

were out of humor about it, and did not return to work. After buying shoes, in afternoon, I went to town, & tried to buy gold, for Mr. Ford, or Mr. Dutches with exchange. Hall could not supply me any; at McCormick, they said they could let me have, in a week. After evening Prayer meeting, Mr. Pentwyn and Mrs. Lewis came, with washing, & to see about Mrs. A. J. son's cure. I gave them a lunch; & then escorted them home, sat up late reading.

Tuesday Aug. 2. Two new men came to work, in place of the two who left yesterday; and, George returned, in afternoon, from his month's absence; and, immediately sent him, in boat with Mr. Teissier, to the fresh steamer, wh. has come, in the morning. It brought a small snail, letter from Mrs. Baumerman, & <sup>daughter</sup> today. Kero and Okonka sick, and talking about mounting to go, on steamer to the Igbo, for medicine.

Friday Aug. 5. Writing letters, and making accounts with Mr. Teissier. Julia been consulting, with Dr. Leffin, about having ovariotomy performed on her, & long chat with sister Isabella, in the evening.

Sat. Aug. 6 } Writing letters, to go to Beaufort & Igbo.  
Sat. Aug. 6 } getting goods of Dr. Leffin, & of the  
 Teissier family in order. In afternoon, the letter started at 3 P.M., to walk to Platina, & the "Meingota"

with Mrs. Prent & Dr. Laffin & the baggage, started to  
the French cutter, this going to Bequia, to leave the Ad's  
baggage on it; - thence to the pier, to take the steamer  
going to the French steamer. At 3.30 P.M., I received  
Dr. Laffin had forgotten to hand Dr. L. £50. for Mrs. Ford. I  
started to the Plateau, - to Lajoux's, - to the pier, - to the  
Chargear's Room, - but did not see any of them.  
Retumed to the house by 6. P.M. Dr. L. had returned also,  
earlier than I had the night on the cutter. At the  
evening singing, only 2 women. We were much  
surprised the Auger typhus took my watch after dark, &  
did not send the boy's clothes at all. Have  
an eye-worm, wh. prevented me sleeping, till after  
midnight.

On the 5<sup>th</sup>, was awakened,  
at 5.25 A.M., by Mr. Prent who had waked Dr. L. at  
4.30. The Dr. ~~had~~ had to hurry, with scarcely an opportunity  
to the plateau, for the cutter, due to go at 6.15, but it  
did not really start till 8. A.M. Moral services.  
At 9. A.M., came word of death of Mr. Paton of H.C.C.  
The grave was prepared, in afternoon, and funeral was  
at 6. P.M. At the afternoon English service, some  
stranger, native ladies of Bequia. Strong wind all day.  
Monday Aug. 6<sup>th</sup>. Bright warm day, opened the date of  
mosquito netting, to get it ready for people anxious to  
buy. Kao still unable to assist in the kitchen, - Dranga

in working place. Okomba also not well. Burridge neglectful of his business. Went to Argentyne's, to see about the neglect in her washing last week, on returning, went into sister Adelicia's, to H. & S's, for her to buy some things. Mr. Pearce went to his room early, and sister went to hers shortly after I returned from Prayer Meeting.

Tuesday Aug. 7<sup>th</sup> In afternoon of 7<sup>th</sup>, went to Holl's & Fajouw Wednesday " 8<sup>th</sup> and Kettencourt. Had risen with a headache, and it lasted all day. Argentyne came in the evening, to return a paint-brush & some medicine. This is the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Mary's birthday.

On the 8<sup>th</sup>. Anniversary of Mary's mother's death, Went with Julia Green & little Agnes Mpong'o, to Plateau, for Permit & Julia to go to Batanga. Bought coffee at Dauwas. Writing letters, expecting steamer (English) from South; Both Pero & Ekomba, who seemed to sick a week ago, are almost well again.

Thursday Aug. 9<sup>th</sup>. No steamer yet in sight. Argentyne came to spend the day, mending our clothes and the school-boys' clothing. After the W. F. M. Socy meeting in afternoon, I began to lay out the new mosque meeting, Paid first to Mrs. Lewis a guinea.

Friday Aug. 10<sup>th</sup>. Kave (Shikani) came to begin carpentry. Was annoyed at Mr. Busalt's demand for spades, for sole use of the school, when there were already 3 belonging to

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the station & in sufficiently good order. Talking with Mr. L. directing the carpenter, in afternoon, was like my house-building in fence days, waiting for and expecting your answers.

Saturday Aug. 11<sup>th</sup> A steamer was seen coming in at 7. A. M., Sab. " 12<sup>th</sup> } or it was English, & we assumed it was the "Galton", from the south, sent off to Platian, for permit to land embark my 3 boxes, & went in "Minnesota" to steamer, & found it was "Ecuador" from north. Retained, & planned with little better, whether ship would go on Sabbath, if steamer came, or wait chance for some other steamer. In afternoon, went walking with her to hotel, & to the Jardine d' Essai. In evening, Mr. Hudson called, & gave assurance that, even if "Galton" came tomorrow it would not leave; for, he had a day's work for it, & - having along, on evening English singing, the - telephone took office because, I did not let a person he chose, & asked him to choose another.

On Sabbath. Glad the red steamer was in sight. Allowed Mr. Freeman to preach, in morning. In afternoon, 2 of H. & C.'s new clerks were present, & - church.

Monday Aug. 13<sup>th</sup>. Early in morning, the "Galton" was seen coming in. Immediately after breakfast, went to Platian, to Custom House, to get permit to embark the

3 boxes I have ready, for air-pore, & to pay some duties to the Treasurer. Returns, & stopped, on the way, to inquire at H. & C's, about the steamer's time of leaving. In afternoon at 3. o'clock, began to get boat ready; & by 4. P.M., left the pier, with sister Bella, & Julia, going to Batango. In morning, had gone to the steamer, with my 3 boxes, & I'd seen one of my chamber-kegs by Custom Office on the ship, for loading the law. We were at his associate fleeing for refuge by boat: ordered them out. Ship was aground, anchored too near shore.

Arrived at steamer, found it was not going till tomorrow. Returns to the house, with sister, & Julia, & little Agalo. Was quite tired at night, & went to bed early.

Tuesday Aug. 14<sup>th</sup>. Ordered a specially good dinner for Sister Isabella, for her good-bye. But, at 10.30 A.M., a note came from Doctor Fenwick, of the "Eulon", for me to bring sister off between 11. & 12 o'clock. We left the pier at 11.30s on the steamer, as Mr. Fildes going home to England, and a number of young clerks there, drinking good-byes. Returned, in time for dinner; and the steamer was soon leaving, about 1. P.M. A boy at town came up, to tell me about her leaving H. & C's laundry work, as the men are expecting in their work, and small in their pay. Have caught a heavy cold yesterday.

Wednesday, Aug. 15<sup>th</sup>: Felt very heavy, with my cold all through my system. Kaur (Shik) getting on well, with the house for provisions & laundry class as usual. Shortened the weekly Lecture, as I felt so heavy and dull. Wrote letter to <sup>for</sup> Charles <sup>Saturday, Aug. 16<sup>th</sup></sup> } About 5.30 P.M., a French steamer was <sup>for</sup> Friday " 17<sup>th</sup> } seen coming in. Suspecting Dr. Dr. <sup>for</sup> Addeond (?), from the Ogata, might be there, Mr. Prent went off with the "Minnesota" & crew, to meet him. They had considerable going back & forth, at the Custom House, to get Mr. A.S. baggage, & did not return till 10. P.M. We too late then to call the cook, & we able to give the guest only a cold meal. <sup>On Friday,</sup> tried to write some, but we occupied with superintending the building of the <sup>little</sup> Provision-House. Ogata wrote me, asking for a loan of 1812.00. This seemed very strange, <sup>in</sup> as evening I <sup>went</sup> ~~wrote~~ to Argutung, to advise with her about it.

Saturday, Aug. 18<sup>th</sup>. By food - <sup>lamb</sup> - iguana coming in quantity. Begun a letter to <sup>for</sup> Mary. In afternoon, sent boat and crew, with Mr. Prent & Mr. Addeond, to visit the Command of the Guard-Ship. Was annoyed with the work of the carpenter Kaur; and with blindness of Bwanga. I gave singing of English, at night: after wh., I felt hungry, as I had eaten nothing at supper: & I called Argutung, Akawde, & Cyagnes, to come <sup>and</sup> eat with me.

Sabbath Aug. 19<sup>th</sup> } A chilly day. steamer came in.  
Monday " 20<sup>th</sup> } In afternoon, immediately after church,  
 went, with Mrs. Wood, to funeral of Dr. Moulton,  
 Agent of Franseret. On Monday, wrote letters, and  
 closed the mail, & sent them. Then, in afternoon, Mr. Adeout, R.  
 went with Mr. Presset to steamer; but, it was not to go  
 until tomorrow. Bought firewood from the slave Charles.  
 The Monday Study-meeting has grown so small; At now I  
 have it in the school-house.

Tuesday Aug. 21<sup>st</sup>. After breakfast, went to steamer, to try to  
 exchange some \$10. of copper & silver coins, of some 13  
 different nationalities, which have accumulated in  
 Sabbath collections: & exchange more, except Italian.  
 Had a deck prepared, for goodbye dinner to Mr. Adeout,  
 who left about 2 P.M., to go on steamer for Franseret.  
 Was quite vexed at seeing some work of Mr. Presset's  
 assumption of authority, in cutting down trees, - but refrain-  
 ed from saying anything to him about it. Have been  
 building the little Pension-House to economy, so  
 all the boards in it, are old boxes broken up, and pieces  
 of boards that were lying around. A quiet evening  
 all alone by myself.

Wed'g Aug. 22<sup>nd</sup>. A German steamer came in. Counted up  
 the value of the uncirculated coins on hand, more than  
 \$10.. Very small number at Inquiry Clas. Letters

from Sister Bellas, Mr. Ford & Dr. Laffin & the almost fatal sickness of the latter, Letters of thanks, from Edna & Divine for Mary's birth - sent a little box of tins of milk to Salter, to be forwarded to Hyango at Hymen. At Weekly Lecture, told of Dr. Laffin's sickness, and asked for prayers. Thank you for his recovery. Armentyuk & Georgewo made one a short call, after meeting.

Thursday Aug. 23<sup>rd</sup>. Entering up accounts, tried to unite, but have no energy or interest in any work or effort. Am weary of this position, Keno & the other servants neglectful. Redhouse (Charles Green) came to ask for his boy to be a boarder, while he lies near enough to come as a day-scholar - also, to beg for medicine, when he has money enough to buy. - & to talk about the dying claims of the Romish ch, who, though he professed to disbelieve, seemed to have some influence on him. All ~~at~~ alone, this evening: Mr. Preest kept very much to himself.

Friday Aug. 24<sup>th</sup>. Had the men working early, to get the "Minnesota" ready, for Mr. Preest's Excursion to Owend Point, with the boys. Armentyuk came, with Georgewo a companion playmate, a child of Buckwell, & spent the day, sewing, and sweeping out the rooms. Mr. Preest returned about 3. P.M., having reached only Mourka. Akanda came, in afternoon, & I played the "Minnesota"

(Aug. 1894)

for her, put away the bedding, wh. had been brought from my truck, in the recent quest. Am so annoyed and out of patience with Buanga's noisy voice, all alone again this evening.

Fri. Aug. 25<sup>th</sup>. Recovered the small lumber shed, & joined it to the baye kitchen. Put up the "Minnesota"; wh. has been in the water for more than 2 weeks. Buanga rebellious, about carrying water for the filter. Argentyn spent the morning here, sewing on the baye clothes. A warm day. Mr. Wood came, to arrange about the ceremony & erecting a cross, on Mrs. Paton's grave, tomorrow afternoon. At evening singing there were 7 women, but no men.

Sabbath Aug. 26<sup>th</sup>. A good audience in morning; at Lab. Sch., - was glad to see the adult women beginning to learn to read. After church, Argentyn extracted a deep-seated chigoe from the sole of my foot; I am trying now a lunch of oat-meal porridge & ayili & ingundu caue for pantomine medicine. After afternoon service, had a ceremony of placing a cross <sup>on</sup> Mrs. Paton's grave, by the employees of Hatton & Cokton. About a dozen white men present. Changes in wind & temperature indicate the coming of the rainy season.

Monday Aug. 27<sup>th</sup>. Two colored soldiers came, to ask for the use of an iron-pot, to cook with, out on the prairie, where they were preparing their targets. I thought it a

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A strange request, at least it was, when they refused it, because they thought the pot small: - <sup>Regd.</sup> The French bought a trap for wild beasts, to pay for it in instalments. (Note to Mr. Hudson, of N.Y., offering him use of our spring, for drinking-water in the day time. At noon, some goats and a mule breaking through its fence, were found by my people. Shortly afterwards, Bushell sent a letter complaining of the assault on his goat. Mail came, in afternoon; letters from <sup>daughter</sup> home, & news of new miscomands: - Very small attendance, at evening Prayer-meeting.

Tuesday Aug. 28. At noon, a small clearing, for a little garden in Retiga's village, was set on fire by the 2 Fang men the owner (a female church-member) in a very absurd & unskillful manner, & it spread to our mission premises, & we had some difficulty in checking it. A very dark night. Clouds gathering for the coming rainy season. Felt so lonesome, all by myself, that I went and spent an hour, in the evening, with Tugentghau and Dzongenou.

Wed'y Aug. 29. Began to make a gate to close, at Thursday .. 30 night, the road into the premises opposite the school-houses. At about 8.30, A.M., came the 3 French Inspectors of Schools, on their annual inspection; - the Postmaster, the Doctor, & one wh. I did not

recognise. Dr. Prent conducted the examination well, & the Inspector seemed pleased, though it was known that, at least one of them, had not been favorably inclined toward our School. At noon, came word, by message from the "Moor", that had anchored during the morning. His mother, Mrs. Deaderick (of Ticon) was on board, & asking aid to carry her luggage. Went to the beach, to get out the boat, but met Capt. Baens, who said he w<sup>t</sup>. back to his family, as soon as Permit came from Platten. After dinner, I went to the pier, & met her & her family, Mr. Deaderick & wife, sent her a bunch; a shortly after, two of food for the family. When the man even returned with the wagon, late in afternoon, they brought me from her a present of 10 eggs, 1 duck, & some forest potatoes. Only a small meal stage at evening lecture.

S. Hunder, called a company, and carried the Carpenter-shop bodily to a new site; away from it, kitchen. One of the men who came was Shaka, - he a bad boy, but not (I think) from a kindly nature. He gate frequently. The new Provision-house slow, - have, the carpenter, disputed the election. A goat was chased from the yard; a shortly afterward Augom (ch. member) came to complain. I claimed the right to authority,

(as it happened) tree passing accounts. A sudden rain, in evening, the first for 3 months; but, no thunder or lightning as yet.

Friday Aug. 31, Showery all day. Finished the gate, & began to put rafters over the new Provision House. Argentino's came, to spend the day, mending the Boys' clothes. Strangely to send some boxes to Xangao, for the French missionaries. In the evening, Capt. Beers a engineer Armstrong, of the "Niore," called on us.

Sat. Aug. Sept. 1. A busy day; all moving in the store, making monthly payments. And large orders, from Mr. Allegret, for his carpenter, & for Mrs. Anstey. Dismissed Skata. No dried native fish, & the cod-fish I was giving, some of the people objected to. A sheep wandered into the premises, and the boys pursued it and injured it, and Mr. Present made some difficulty about it. Beware carried the keys of the spring-house away to town, and then lied about it, and then was impertinent. I dismissed him, & changed Ovege's work, giving him Beware's duties. After evening English singing, Mrs. Anstey and Argentino's came, and told me about the state of affairs at Palaguga.

Sabbath Sept. 2. An unfortunate day. It began badly, with drumming of native village, which kept up till

After S. G. M., After church I asked Bryantman why she was not in her usual seat. She said she sat near the school-boys, to hinder them from playing during prayer. That they had been tickling pine in each other, and putting stuff up their noses, she said she saw them and knew their names. At dinner I said to Mr. Pauset, "I wish we could do something to make the boys keep order in church." "Has there been disorder?" (this in an offended manner, as if he did not want "his" boys spoken against.) "Yes, they were laughing and playing". "Did you see them?" "No," my eyes were shut in prayer. He paused, waiting for me to give my authority; and I detailed about what Bryantman had said and done. He, intensely angry, said, "I wish she would let it alone!" "What do you mean Mr. Pauset? That no one shall rebuke us when we are in error?" "Yes! that is my work alone." I replied, very loud & decided, "Mr. Pauset, it is not. If you think so, there will need to be a settlement between us." He jumped up, in extreme anger, and left the table, and went to his room. A few minutes later, I heard him leave and go to the boys' house. An hour later, he came to my room, and said, "You spoke of a settlement; I have come to speak about it!" "Yes, Mr. Pauset, it is time I spoke too: I want to understand what you think of my

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faction in relation to the school". He I spoke about a number of acts of his, in which I felt he had transcended his authority, and had contravened mine. To test matter, I said, "Mr. Pressey, whose is the school?" "Mine". "To Sir, I am its Superintendent, and you're the Teacher". "Yes, you are the Superintendent, but —". I interrupted him, "You admit I am Super't; what right have? How far does my authority extend? Can I enter the school room and inspect its work?" "No, not except blame you for not coming, you have no concern. You had no care or interest in it". "Mr. Pressey, had enough other work, had, & was satisfied to have confidence in your work.", he intimated a doubt, I went on, "If I enter the school room, have I authority to make criticism or advise to you?" (hesitating) "Yes, to a certain extent; I will accept the advice only if I see fit;" "Has I any authority, out of school, to call a boy on an errand?" "Yes, but I require them to come to me, after you give the order, to let me know where they are going." Seeing it be thus limited my authority, on such days, both in and out of school, I asked another test, "In Sabbath, Mr. Pressey, I do not know you or the school as persons. You are all part of our audience, and I will be pleased to see good man or woman acting in expression."

Code it is man. And you, Sir, ought to be ashamed; I state, being displeased at the irreverence at the interview in Church, you are angry at a good woman for trying to stop it!" He answered, intense, "I hate her! I hate her! And the boys doing do they did anything?" "Then, without asking me first, you ride, against her, with boys who you know have lied to you, in other investigations?" "Yes, I know what to think of us." "Yes, with your suspicions. But I know they have been misbehaving; for, myself saw them on other Sabbath's." "Add," added he, "I knew you did not like her; but, I never knew you carried your dislike to such a height. And then no one to speak to the boys? Not even Mr. Kalinda?" "To me the discipline is mine alone." "So, you are distinct and special; our difference is radical. I claim Dr., as Pastor, I may rebuke any one, and even delegate that authority to any one I am more superior, I may ask any Master to stop a disorderly boy. I thank thy entry. She had a right to do 'as' she did, - as any one should, and she especially, as an Assistant, in the School, in charge of the Boys' clothes, in place of Mrs. Eggers; and as a teacher, in our Sabbath School." "Then, we will not agree; and I will not be willing to remain. I am not here in contract, and can leave,

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will you bear my passage, on next Monday's afternoons?" "Yes; for, with the radical difference of action, there will be no school for your teach, I will close it; if you insist in your position that I have no authority in church over the School boys." "My decision is already taken, I have told the boys I am going & that they cried; who makes one think I have done something for them?" "I am willing for you to go; though only recently you intended to stay several months longer."

And I recollect him of the difference in trouble & care he had received from Mrs. Readings, - has he submitted to all the rough treatment of her; and at what a mean return he was giving ~~to~~ me, who had treated him as friend, brother, & companion, and who had accorded him the widest of liberty & honorable treatment. And he left the room, saying he was not angry at me, but indignant at Mr. Huntington, and radically changing my claim over "his" boys in church. <sup>He did not come to church</sup> <sub>for not coming to church</sub> After evening service, Mr. Huntington, having heard, in town of his going "in her account", came to see him about 4. But he was in bed; and he did not see her in the morning.

Monday Sept. 3 } I started promptly to morning prayer,  
Tuesday " 4 } & Mr. Purcell joined me at the door.

& I asked him if he w<sup>t</sup> conduct morning prayer. He declined any further service. After Prayers, I told the boys to bring their clothes & I w<sup>t</sup> have them washed instead of their doing it. ~~One~~<sup>but</sup> some of them brought. They had ~~some~~ some pieces as their own, was a good, in addition to the suits they already had on. I then gave them food for one meal, and told them to go to their homes, for 2 weeks, till I should let them have and ~~as~~ until ~~it~~ is done about the school. They all stayed and helped out. Present parts, & about noon all left, but only 2 of them noticed me, or said good bye to me. Putting up on the new Parsonage-House. Late in afternoon Mr. Ferguson came, to talk with Mrs. Present, about his being indisposed at her trying to keep the boys in order last Sabbath. Mrs. & Mrs. Daniels also came. I gave all three a small luncheon at night, & had prayer-meeting.

On Tuesday, only 2 or 3 days about the former, yesterday, I had locked up the school-book, plates, &c, with the boys had left. At the Precision Have now been sent <sup>Mr. Daniels</sup> to sell a bill of exchange, for £25. each German gold. Mr. Hebecker was away, but he sent his assistant, with the money in afternoon, Mrs. Lewis a Lusina (for her mother Julie) came

in a treason, for this year. Okonkwa becoming restless in his work, and complaining of his pay, etc. These accumulated discontent, went on a walk to Augsutine's, & found only Mrs. Ainsley at home, just after supper, called Oveaga, and warned him not to join in the general discontent.

Wednesday Sept. 5. Went with Mr. Present to the Plateau, to get his ticket to France; but, on the way, met the Agent of the steamer Co., who was on an errand to the Etienne house; and we turned back, he saying it will be his business at the dinner, he will come on to Balska. But he did not come, in the afternoon, as the steamer was seen coming in. So after my usual Jigging place, Mr. P. & I again went to Plateau, to Chagnon's office, - Paid \$126.

In his passage, went on to Domme, & bought cigar, returned late, to Sophie. During the day had talked to Okonkwa decidedly, & bunt his dissatisfaction, and required him to do better, or leave our service. Mr. P. remained away from Prayer-meeting. Neither Augstine nor his master were at meeting.

Thursday Sept. 6: Last night, about 1.30, Mr. Augstine knocked at my door, saying there was a snake at her house! I hastened, and dressed, & went to

on our houses, to call assistance; they were very scared  
indeed, & I recollect, a python was coiled about  
a duck, & could not see it distinctly, in the kitchen,  
and could not stir at 't either, for fear.

I went back for my telephone; and, when I  
returned, the smoke had released the duck, & had  
gone off in the bushes. Deadapt myself, as the  
heavy morning rain made the road well more than  
an hour late. This made breakfast half hour late.  
Waiting on the roof of the new Garrison-house.

My stage came to work for me, in the noon.

The reason that Bryant & Co. were not at meet-  
ing, last night, was this, just, as they were ready  
to come, she heard that Bryant's pig had been  
killed, and it had <sup>to be</sup> hunted up and killed.  
I bought a leg of it. In afternoon, sent the  
cat, with Mrs. Bryant's things, to strange.  
The W. F. M. lady met unnecessarily early, in the  
evening. Again, alone in the evening, Mr. Broad-  
bent kept it twice, and attended more of the religious  
things.

Friday Sept. 21. After 8. A. M. store-house pay-  
ments, I went, at 9. A. M., to meet the carpenter  
I had engaged, for mending the boats, but, he  
did not keep his appointment. At 9.30. A. M.

sent Dr. George, with letter to the manager, Mr. S. W. H. ... Mr. Present's com., & paid him \$100. He had demanded for traveling expense in Europe; & I told him Dr. Morgan was <sup>on</sup> a delicate, & the bill was right; but, would not guarantee. And thus we parted. I supposed he was jealous. In half-hour later, he came to my room, - asked to explain, - did not wish to leave me with bad impressions etc. We went over the fab. afternoon talk & and, to my sincere surprise & gratification, he yielded to all my claims, and retreated all his demands! He still felt ill to journey. This reduced his plea for leaving, to a small personal spite. And even this, he regretted it said he had chosen another aepcior, & anger. So, we both left happily, in the restoration of mutual confidence. It was a long talk, the noon bell rang, we went to the door, & were amazed to see this steamer going. After dinner, we went to Chayear's Room, to claim back his passage money, - had to search for the agent, waited for him at Dawson, - came back to Brandon, who telephoned for me. We went back to Chayear's, met the Agent, & he refunded the \$126., very politely. Stopped at

Better - t, to receive strange visitors, for Dr. Dusset's chance to overtake his baggage, which had gone in the afternoon of arrival. The boat was lost, at the result of affairs. How much trouble and of real evil, he might have saved, if he had acted less hasty on a hunch, if he had made his retraction sooner!

Saturday, Sept. 8<sup>th</sup>. Dr. Present resuming some work, the rose-bed, making hundreds of cuttings. For a short time, I feared the "Minnesota", which was at anchor, had dragged, and perhaps run ashore. She had dragged from her anchorage, in the safe. Putting ~~Boat~~ across the window of the new cabin - b., Augantym came to spend the day in sewing & mending. A leg of a full-grown dog was brought for sale, - it was not very fresh. In afternoon, Okonka, who has been fractions and rollers for a week, neglected the carrying of water for the ducks, - and would not do it, unless I would give him a shovel to bail out the water. I called him, demanded instant obedience, & he did not yield; I dismissed him. I immediately put Ongange in his place. At evening Engan - ging, myself 3 people present. Clear night. Strong wind.

\* abbatts Sept. 9<sup>th</sup>. Cold wind in morning, but day beautifully bright. A quiet day. Mrs. Asbury at church, in morning, bath, she & her husband; & Asbury went, in afternoon. Felt very sleepy to-day, as I was disturbed by cats last night. Lucy is doing well in Chambers place, a waiter &c.

Monday, Sept. 10<sup>th</sup> } The "Camerons", on its way to England,  
Tuesday, " 11<sup>th</sup> } came in early, and Mr. Fressel decided to give up the journey to Osgoode, and go at once to Liverpool. He went, on business, to the Plateau, and, in the afternoon, we went to the steamer, but the Purser was not on board, & we returned. At good Prayer-meetings, in the evening. On Tuesday, various jobs, - completing the change of the carriage, at the spring, to a lower place, - were putting finishing touches on the provision-house. I observed that the Keducus is going unusually fast, in Osgoode's hands. At 3.30 A.M., I went with Mr. Fressel, to the steamer, - bought his ticket, several of the little boys were with us, to see him off. Bade him finally good-bye. The "Mure" came in, from Osgoode. Completing the job at the spring, felt lonely all by myself. In evening, went to call on Mrs. Asbury, but found that some noisy Sioux some people had taken possession of the house, & I refused to enter,

Wednesday Sept. 12<sup>th</sup>. A clear evening. Repairing roof and other jobs. Cleared out the Girls' School house (that has been used as a Boys' school house). Near noon, Mrs. Hinde and son, Sybil came to see me. They knew I was disciplined, about the affair of last night, the failure to receive me properly, and I expected them to express some regrets; but they did not. This made me feel more heat & their visit was no pleasant one. In the afternoon, Mr. Hinde came to see me, and made some apology. A small number at Prayer-meeting, among them, were 2 new faces, a daughter & niece of Anna Moore.

Thursday Sept. 13<sup>th</sup>, A steamer was seen coming right, was supposed to be the "Nabia"; it was sent off the boat, thinking possibly Mr. Mailey might be there. The boat returned with Rev. <sup>R.H.</sup> Fulligan from Tutuenga, on his way to America; and, bringing news from Dr. Ford, Dr. Loffin and sister Bella, of the death of Mrs. Julia Green, 24 hours after the operation for ovariotomy. Sudden attack of swooning. Mrs. Sara Lewis came to enquire the news, - there were three letters for her, telling of the circumstances of the death. In the afternoon, went off to the "Nabia", to pick up a small package. The Doctor

was McBryde, of the "Cameroun" a year ago. And the Person was Mr. Tindall (?) whom I had seen a year ago, when I came back from "Cameroun" at Liverpool. On my landing, I met Standi, sent by Rev. Mrs. Freeman, to ask Mr. Fletcher, for meeting memorial of Julian Smith, a had called the church members, for that purpose. At first there was an assumption on his part, and preparation, for it was in my province to hold such a Service, at a suitable time, I declined. In the evening of Mr. & Mrs. Hinckley came, to make preparatory to his going away to the Ogowe tomorrow.

Friday Sept 14<sup>th</sup>. Before I was dressed, Antonio came to tell me that the "Pucuioota" had parted her chain, & drifted ashore, & was lying on the beach. At 6 A.M., I started out of the house with the keys, & Rev. Mrs. Freeman, at the front door, stopped me to ask a question. I told him, if he would call it short, I would wait. He began in a roundabout way, & I was anxious for the boat, & left him. Found the boat stranded, & the tide going out; the boat was not then being beaten by waves. Came back; was time for prayers. Mr. Freeman still waiting; bade him say what he wanted. He began again, this roundabout way. And I refused to listen, & I knew it was about holding a memorial-meeting, & that was our business, in charge of the church; thus I did not

used to be directed by him : I rebuked him thus, because he has been very presuming. After breakfast, went to the beach, & put the boat in house. Mr. Hinsley seeking for a boat going to the "Tabia". Met Mrs. Kaaaka Leine, and ~~she~~ rebuked him, for the part she was taking with Mr. Treador. Miyangé came to do his regular Friday evening, and spent the day. Miyangé did not care to be unk, in the ~~evening~~ afternoon. Hinsley had failed to get off the steamer. His master came to tell me for her having rebuked Mr. Treador, for his conduct to me.

Sat. Sept. 15<sup>th</sup>. Started Miyangé, at painting the boy's teacher's house, done a window. And repairing its roof. Went to Mr. Wood's, to ask for Rice, & for Koomen to put up the boat. In afternoon, moved all of my provisions, from the lower wooden-store, to the new Promised-house. Miyangé is absent, sick. Began with Ovenga, to keep the Kerosene under lock, & the key in my possession. Some headache all day. In evening Singing, the only person present were Miyangé & Ongongmo, Akando, & Iwete.

Sun. 16<sup>th</sup>. Miyangé appeared for his work, in the morning; but was sick again in the afternoon, perhaps, for he was <sup>Mr.</sup> the village people

Wednesday Sept. 17<sup>th</sup> A shower morning. Went to beach,  
to look for plantains, for food for my people. To H. & C.,  
to enquire about declaring, at Custom House, two  
black books, wh. came by last steamer. During  
noon rest, heard that Overage, while at work at the  
Customhouse, had been arrested, on some charge of  
theft of a cloth. At clear afternoon. Augutym  
a Beyogunes came, and brushed my rooms, and the  
house of the teacher of French. As Overage is  
very ill in coming, he took a lad of atskar's to  
wash dishes, some fresh fish came, Augutym &  
Beyogunes <sup>remained</sup> ~~dates~~ to supper, & came to evening Prayer.

Tuesday, Sept. 18<sup>th</sup>. Clear day. Some plantains came.  
Went to H. & C., & Mr. Hudson made out my Declara-  
tion of the 2 black books I had rec'd from Liverpool.  
With Dr. H. Milligan, went to Fransue & Co., to get a  
passage & the tempor. agent preferred not to take  
a Bill of exchange, or way to get it cashed, and  
my messenger with the Declaration returned, for  
more definite description, had to wait in time,

to reach the Custom House, before it closed, at 11. A.M., Mr. Brandon politely cashed Mr. Milligan's Bill of Exchange. The French steamer came in during the afternoon.

Tuesday Sept. 19<sup>th</sup>. The German steamer came in, & went to Leidemann's, to leave a package of mail for Batang. On the way back, met a little boy, with pieces of a box, which I recognised as one I had, at the French Teacher's house, where Nyâne was painting for me, saw the boy go into Augor's house, & went to Augor's new house: saw more pieces of boards lying there: went to Nyâne, & he denied any knowledge of the box, & went to Augor, - he said Nyâne had given him. Charged Nyâne with the theft, and his denial broke down. Ordered the remainder of the boards returned, and dismissed Nyâne. Finished painting the new Providence-house, & roofing of the Ford-house. After Augor's class, went to resort, & paid passage for Mr. Milligan, Went to Post-office, & posted letters. On returning home, found Mr. Wood had returned from Tali, leaving the "Moor" at Tengeney.

Thursday Sept. 20<sup>th</sup>. Went to H. & C. for a bag of rice, and he asks for bag of their boat, at 1.30 P.M., for Mr. Milligan, & seeing last arrangements for Mr.

Mulligan. Leaving Johnston's house, in afternoon, took  
the C. & G. train, with Mr. M., I did not go to the tea room  
to have, as I could not speak French. Mr. Mulligan  
gave the hotel manager a letter, in which he said with the  
workmen, concerning a boat fishy - I have none, and they  
refuse the old fish. The conductor in the train, Mr.  
Maurice, with the mail, <sup>arrived at 7. A. M.</sup>, did not  
send for mail, as the hour was so late. After again  
at night, can be called in the head days.

Friday, Sept. 21. A shadowy morning in Abyssinia, with  
Eunice and Orgay, came on a dispute of Eunice leaving  
her service, because Orgay has said some told him the  
latter had slandered her, & Orgay tried to cover it, &  
she refused to name her witness. She was properly  
indignant, and I endorsed her, & denounced him.

The L. Orgayans returned to dinner & supper. The  
mail was very small, but a very nice letter from  
Miss Madeline <sup>J. H. Newell R. F. D.</sup> <sup>1</sup> <sub>St. John's Falls, etc.</sub> <sup>etc.</sup>  
French steamer went out the harbor, in company, at  
5:30, P. M. Dismissed the little boy Eduardo, in  
standing.

Sat. Sept. 22 } A letter from Abyssinia: sent  
Fabi. 25 } to Mr. Ward a box of soap & tin of perfume  
to be forwarded to Fabi, for Abyssinia. Sonie came to  
give account of his work at Orange, & went to

plateau, with Orgueil's Alridi; a Augerius, thinking  
 there were public games, or the defense celebration  
 of the French national day July 14<sup>th</sup>. But, found them  
 was to be only at night, fireworks &c. At  
 Augerius', heard Mrs Orgueil had been having  
 an consulting time with her & Mrs Audley, calling  
 them bad names. In evening, again went  
 with children, a Augerius & few friends, &  
 illumination: 2 other children joined us, one was,  
 in terror of the rockets & bombs &c. Went to  
 the illumination in Kireli, but left soon, because  
 of the dancing. In daylight, shorn, but  
 cleaned off nicely. After dinner, Mr. Audley came  
 to tell of some quarrel between himself & wife  
 drumming in Retigas village; went back then  
 to stop at inviolate, Bebedi's husband. Said they  
 w'd not, I called the police, and he declined  
 to stop them, I was much humiliated.  
 After afternoon service, Augerius ate dinner.

It was

Monday, Sept. 24<sup>th</sup>. Showy all morning. Paid Sonie, for  
 his nine months scriptio-reader work at Augerius.  
 Rocke was working today. In the afternoon, sent  
 the man & wagon to Augerius', to remove her  
 things, on account of Orgueil's anti-yours treatment

me. Went to the Telegraph office, to consult with Mr. Ebley, about the law on "dante disorder", and then went to the Governor, about yesterday's matter, in Riga's village. I had no interpreter, & am not sure that I understood ~~that~~ he w<sup>t</sup> see that the things were not reprinted. On way back, stopped at Augutyni<sup>'s</sup>, - only Mrs. Amisly was there; but, the prince soon returned. Musters are getting worse; for, Amisly now is angry with both the women, & he has left the house. I was negligent at Ougan's, coming in to spy my conversation, and I left. Was also annoyed to find that Amisly was neglecting his work on the boat, & using the man I had given him for carrying his boxes from Augutyni's house. Was depressed at the confusing of the day. Ovanga also told me that Styáns, the thief of the boards of last week, was the thief of the leopard-trap, ~~that~~ has been missing for some months. Thunder to-day.

Tuesday Sept. 25<sup>th</sup>. Told Amisly to omit work at the boat, till I was satisfied about his quarrel with Augutyni. Ovanga resumed work, & tried to overcome my depression, & wrote to niece, Mrs. Dr. Lusk of Warsaw. The weather still sultry, & bad food; I have no fish but cod-fish, & they are such that. During the afternoon, Mr. Stria came from Czerni-

Tuesday Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> Went to the Shalean, to pay a small bill at the Treasury; - the real bill had not reached me, I had only the Stotter for Lantau. Had to return, to get the Bill at Commissary, - and he was not at his office. Plenty of fish at the Shalean, but none up this way. Dismissed a man, for trouble about food. Wrote to Adensley, about the boat-work awaiting him, & received a disrespectful reply. Sent a quantity of goods ready for Mr. Ibia. He assisted me at Prayer-meeting.

Wednesday Sept. 27<sup>th</sup>. Spent most of the morning in getting goods for Mr. Ibia. Doyutzin & Oyongmo came, on their usual weekly visit, to see & clean up. Made out paper, for Mr. Ibia's journey tomorrow. A Fong was caught, by 2 of my people, cutting my India Bamboos, they brought him to me, I furnished him with a leather strap, invited Adande, & his wife Opara, to take him with me, as Mr. Ibia w'd be leaving tomorrow. Dark night. Heavy wind.

Friday Sept. 28<sup>th</sup>} Mr. Ibia got off for Comiso, with good Sat. " 29<sup>th</sup>} wind and tide. The man Lanson, (Lanton?), began work on the boat: sent him to all the factories for nails. In the evening, came into the harbour a French & a German steamer.

Koro came, to speak to me about leaving in three months: also, about an advance in

wages. Had hoped to write letters, but did not get up our interest. On Saturday, went to H. & C's, to get translated a letter sent from the Director of the Interior. In afternoon, went to the Plateau, to the Bureau, & answered some inquiries, about the Transfer of Kanguwe & Talagaga to the French Prov. Soc'y. Akawda & Kuyantum visited me, after English Piping, in the evening. Unusual drumming in the villages.

Sabbath Sept. 30<sup>th</sup>. Morning rather dark. Ongouge not on board, to-day, for his work at table. The German steamer still in the Harbor. Weather cleared nicely. But drumming & dancing in villages, all afternoon. Mr. Ward was present, at afternoon Service to the organ, some Sierra Leone young men had been practicing on it, just before church. Very few at evening Service; just at its close, a sharp shower of rain.

Monday Oct. 1<sup>st</sup>. Paying last month's wages. Dismissed one man, for his intemperate drunkenness. Those others I declined to feed, offering them the food equivalent, in minute packages. - But, only one seems to have accepted; so, only he came to work the remainder, of the day. Engaged 5 Kiosmen. Had session-meeting, in afternoon. Clear day. Observed the new moon. Expect heavy rains within very small alterations at "Mayo" meeting.

Tuesday Oct. 21. Showy morning. Everybody late; saw a steamer come in, about 7.30, and went Ortega, to inquire who it was, & it was a French ship steamer. I have no memory that he brought me answer (though he says he did). All the morning the wife of the wooden store, while so occupied, about 10. A. M., got Periniague out suddenly. came. I had not met expected him till later in the month. Hurriedly arranging his room, in the teacher's house. After dinner, sent the canoe to Plateau, to await us there at the pier; and, with the wagon, went with Mrs. P., to Post Office & get mail, & to office of Chargé de Régie des Bateaux - a canoe had not come, & got passage in one of the boats of the ship, & was waiting 2 hours in the steamer, for passage back. Came in one of Bettencourt's boat, & passed Custom House, - late for supper, & slight shadow between Mr. Periniague & myself, - will it grow? - he observed that he was placed in a separate room from the large darüber, & enquired whether Mr. Russel had lived there or here. What made him ask, I do not know, & whether he had been given information. Perhaps he thinks I give him inferior place; but, the house he occupies is the

little ducks.

day. Native food began to come for sale, the workmen,  
who had left on Monday, because of my arrangement  
about fish, returned to work. Shavery. Several of the  
young ducks have died with the continued wet. Went,  
in afternoon, to see about the repair of the boat, was  
indignant to hear that the chest-worker, Kave, and the  
chief Styare, were in mission canoe, without permission.  
Cook Kero asleep & came late for cooking supper, - Draga,  
the assistant, was late & negligent about work, at  
the wood-house. & the little boy Engaige came late from  
school; so, supper was late & hurried. After I returned  
from & evening prayers, found the odor of tobacco in

M., a waiting in Auga's shop, his son George was dead, & he had selected a site for his grave. Many coming, in afternoon, to see about time of funeral. Other visitors, a French trader of dawis, to buy a red deer, & bought head more & teeth, & medicine, etc.

In the morning, Makiko had bought her child,  
Mayando, to return to school, as a boarder.  
She disturbed at the frequent use of liquor  
by the cork factory. All alone at night; the  
fremmies very quiet; but I did not sleep well,  
thinking of the probable liquor on my premises.

Wednesday, Oct. 10<sup>th</sup>. The "Como" entered the harbor. I do  
not know from where; but, I suppose from Cape Arigay,  
as it is now late, & a little canoe with two men.

was invited to see me, to consult about

Since beginning I gave a lunch, dinner & supper for the men hungry. Also, the latter remained to dinner & supper, with the women, I had a headache all day, and ate very little.

Saturday, Oct. 15<sup>th</sup>. A rainy morning. I lay, & a continuation was late. I ate a small meal & said my prayers, till 7 A.M., or breakfast till 7.30. After 6 a horse came till 10. A.M., & I rode 6 hours, to the Lake, & had a long walk. Help Osga uncle flours, for I have no flour now. Went to a river, & after 4 hours, at night, went to the Gorda de Medi, then again, in evening, with Big Hill Indians.

Sunday Oct. 16<sup>th</sup>. Rained & a clear day. I ate, & went to the lake, had a walk, had 18 miles to the south west, then a walk around the lake, then a walk along the road against wind, & the long afternoon, & the

Cloudy now & the wind is blowing from  
the S. E. but except the gale has stopped.  
Tuesday Oct. 15<sup>th</sup>. A clear beautiful day, a good  
wind & the temperature seems a degree or  
two higher, & I venture to check back, but  
I think it is still about 60° F. The  
temperature seems a little higher, & the  
wind has stopped, so a very cool day,  
but a good day for walking, & I have  
had a walk along the beach with my  
camera, there may be a lot of fun to  
be in the days, at Tuleguy.

Tuesday Oct. 16<sup>th</sup>. The morning threatening, but weather  
cleared off, went back to beach for native food. Myself  
went to Plateau, to pay subscription to the Carnet  
monument, got John Jones to buy some fish, for me.  
Returned, at Tupia's village, saw a quantity of native  
food being landed from canoes. Hired horse, and sent  
2 men with three dollar goods, to buy at Tupia's.  
Sent one of the fish, (compañi) to Argentino, for him to  
make iguanas for man. And invited him a Cuyonano  
to come to supper, to help eat it, wrote letters, in  
afternoon. In evening, Capt. Barnes a engineer Almuday  
called to see me.

Wednesday Oct. 17<sup>th</sup>. Showy in morning. Beautiful clear

afternoon. Began a letter to Mary. After buying bread, went to see sick Seda. Was indignant at her being left as a miserable hutt, - with insufficient clothing, and no medicine, who c. be bought, & yet her people are well off, & they expect me to give them for nothing! Mr. Pennington is so late, in coming to meals, that I sat down at supper without him, and he came while I was eating, & he apologized for his lateness.

Tuesday Oct. 18<sup>th</sup>. Rain all day. Seda died P.M., and I grieve at once can do by a mere little cover the coffin. He borrowed the money from Kuo & Sekao! I was envious of the "rich", a tree is early, his an umbrella, & yet wanted to rain to help bury his master! His body was N.g. and began one to his Wagner, my favorite. The funeral was at 9. P.M. the evening before to pay off.

Sunday Oct. 21<sup>st</sup>. The "Vidua" went out Monday, and a  
French mail arrived, bringing a small parcel, which  
did not send for, the postmaster sent it up. A  
clear day, quite clear in the morning, & quite  
atmospheric, in the noon, & up at 3 P.M. Mr. Adler  
teacher's cabin, believing his room to be taken, at-  
tended to it, & I had to inform him that the  
owner of the room was not in it.

Monday Oct. 22<sup>nd</sup>. The French mail went out of the harbor.  
A beautifully bright clear day, Argentine came, with an old  
woman, to get medicine, to check diarrhea. Dr. Peniguel  
was not at home, so I gave him, & went to knock at his  
door, no answer, we were asleep. He did not come to  
breakfast. I went again. He was slightly febrile, but rasa

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Tula, her supplies of canned milk having given out, I went to Seruru factory, to inquire & receive tins a Tuesday Oct. 23d. Showed all day & finished my letter to my Newark church, through Miss Madeline Wagner. Wrote also to Nyango, at Angon. Looked over and arranged old letters. Dark cloudy night. Mr. Perriagat did not return to this house after prayers & so I am all alone, and the village very quiet. Kave (ch. member) came in-day, to say he had tried in vain, to prevent the Lueath relatives of Sida holding a dance for her memory.

Wed. 7 Oct. 24. A bright morning. Left, in our boat, about 8 A.M., on our way to the Boat House, about the repairs of boats. Bought fresh fish. Mr. Perriagat preparing for coffee-planting. He went to the Platian, sent a lot of American stamp to the foreman, by him. At evening Prayer-Meeting, spoke against the evils of native roaming customs. The insulting soldiers.

Thursday, Oct. 25th. Showed, during the day, with Rabinda & Okoko absent from their work, seeking to buy fish, during my work time. Began a letter to Rev. Mr. Baumgardner. The French soldiers passed, on way to their target practice, & I sent wire to the officer, asking to stop, on his return. He did so, & I complained about their behavior yesterday afternoon, while I was in ch. with Inquiry Class.

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Sunday (Oct. 1894)

Friday Oct. 26. A few showers, not bright in morning. Went to H & C, in pursuit of Rice, now staying here, two usual anodizing & house-clearings. Had a very ugly alteration with Bataafs, just before breakfast. He was a man of 77 or 80, for many years past used to open our valaing & bali, had a little account for him, - and, asserting that his wife was a member of the Dutch East, selected, as an insulting manner, that she was, when I knew perfectly that she was not, in afternoon, one of the Dutch caught me a packet <sup>sandwich</sup> letter, by Portuguese mail; a rough photo <sup>from</sup> Jenny besides engagement of good news from Will & his wife, at Germanborg.

Saturday Oct. 27. The day was spoiled by Dr. R. who at assumption & opinion is, is attempting, again, my wife or for a long time now, stop Cannabis. She again gave me a headache, & I ate no breakfast, in fact I eat any dinner; had a bad headache all day. The German steamer came in; some letters from Bataafs, some which advised by me later to the Mission, notifying them that they must change my position and residence: Rev. Goods, who were on board, mail arrived at 4.30.,  
& I began to make Declaration, looking up words in

Frensh dictionary, too late to send to Post, for peasant today. Mr. Decmin, formerly of the Agout & a Mr. Thorndale, some 20 years ago of Loanda, called to see Reditary. Mr. T. enquired to see if there was a grave of a friend of his, in our Cemetery. Mr. Decmin promised to help me, about hastening Mr. Marcellis goods tomorrow.

Thursday Nov 1<sup>st</sup>: Had sat up late last night reading, but rose in good time well, slightly shivery. Mr. Hale came by 6.30 A.M., from Mr. Decmin, that I <sup>had</sup> to have Holt's big canoe. After breakfast, & by 7.15<sup>A.M.</sup>, with Mr. Pernigrayent, & 5 men, went to Holt, - found the Post was open, at the Post, by 7.45. The clock was striking, notwithstanding it being a very great Fete day, to grant a Permit; but, first, an application had to be written. Then back to Holt, & in the big canoe, & I went in it rather than in a boat of the steamer, this was all at the beach, in order to hasten my crew. At the ship where all <sup>their</sup> work was done, & they waiting for their Pay, got Mr. Marcellis 15 pieces of Baggage & Goods, & left before 10. A.M. Steamer left immediately, however, by 11. A.M. A negro named w. who have hindered the goods being landed, because it was a great Sanit. say's best, - discharged them

into the first house. Presently I sent the canoe back to Holts. The white dove's canoe, & was surprised I had been given permission to do the work to day.

Spent some time for his pay: & wanted to continue his study for ministry. Mrs. Treasurer came for her pay.

Spent the afternoon in paying my employees, & beautified clear afternoon. It was now 3 days old, but soon obscured. All alone, as usual, at night.

Friday Nov. 2<sup>nd</sup>. Weather variable of course, & again beautiful clear. Entomis last month left. In afternoon went to see Mr. Brown, who is still quite sick, also

Saturday Nov. 3<sup>rd</sup>. Rainy all morning, bright afternoon. In afternoon, sent Ongas, to Holts, with thanks for the canoe of 10<sup>th</sup>, Augsburg at my usual weeks mending. While we were at supper, Azza (Sic!) (sic)

came, with torn dress & in great excitement, that her husband, Fristy, had been beating her. I went with her to the police-office, for her to enter complaint against him. She went with the officer to have him arrested, & I returned home, to have evening-prayers. Did not have the usual half hour English singing, as so few come to it.

Wednesday Nov. 4<sup>th</sup>. A wonderful clear day. A German steamer came in, & got <sup>wanted</sup> native passenger <sup>for</sup> 200 rupees, as trader, who was to be buried at night after a day of feasting, with the people; so the passengers were entertained. The factory flags all at half-mast, to the honor of Kandahar's death, news of who comes by telegram last night. A quiet day. But, in the evening, a large crowd gathered, & all the men & their wife had had 2 or 3 cups of beer, & it looked as if they were condoning his offenses. Big moonlight.

Monday Nov. 5<sup>th</sup>. Rain, in morning. Went to German house; for oakum to <sup>caulk</sup> the boat. Heard that the reason the entry of the steamer yesterday was to bring to the hospital a passenger burned with steam, by an explosion, board. Wrote long letter to Mrs. W. L. Ward. Had a headache all day, & a little, threatening rain, in evening & my small Prayer-meeting.

(Nov. 1894)

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Tuesday Nov. 6. Rainy morning, went to N. & Co's, to wait for a boat going to the "Bequia", which had just come in, to take a package for Mr. Ford. While waiting for the boat, the boat started for steamer with the "Bequia", Rev. Dr. Clegg, made arrangements with him about taking the package if a steamer came in, and the same doctor Clegg, of the steamer, & a day's messenger of the Alliance Mission, from the "Bequia", then accepted my invitation to dinner. After dinner came in & was handed, with regretfully, & the Doctor said it was present had a long talk however as well all along the route of last night, being at 8.30, unwell. He left, & I waited the 2 hours to supper. Three of the 4 boys of the school were away, to-day at noon. All alone this evening.

Wednesday Nov. 7. Showed all day, heavy rain, in afternoon took inventory of copies of the books of the Bible, handled, on stocks in the store, & wrote to Dr. Liffen a report of them, in afternoon, sent a few letters, for the French mail; & so dug up some flowers for Dr. Clegg of the steamer "Bequia". Went off to "Bequia", with Mr. Ward, & took the package of money for Mr. Ford, Rev. Dr. Clegg, the steamer, Rev. Walter, of Cameron, & myself had of the George & the American, Mr. Smith, who had called here a month ago. Heavy rain on returning.

Wednesday, Nov. 8<sup>th</sup>, brought Rev. Dr. Marlight goods from Hutton & Corkins, ready for his expected coming, in the morn.  
 Surgeon came for medicine, for Rev. Mr. Truman attorney  
 and to be ready for W. F. M. S. Meeting, at 2 P.M.  
 After meeting, she cut my hair, the report of Gladys  
 first of the meeting, assigning work for the various  
 members. Rec'd. of some inside history of the quarrel  
 between Hinsley & his wife, showing he is not  
 entirely to blame. In the evening, came Capt. Bales  
 and engineer Armstrong of the "Guineo", & stayed the  
 entire evening.

Friday, Nov. 10<sup>th</sup>. A beautifully clear day, I was asked to  
 go to one of the villages, to hear news from Coquio,  
 and stayed away all day. Began a letter to Miss  
 Emma Adams. In afternoon, when Owaya came, the  
 1.30 P.M. Bell, I told him to await me, to go to the  
 Plateau, he went off somewhere, & after waiting for  
 him 1/2 hour, I left. Went to Adams & C., & purchased  
 several boxes of fresh orders, & took coffee, fruit &  
 other things. Had Adura & Gondo with me. Called at  
 the office of Director of the Interior, but as he  
 was out, left my card & stopped at the Post Office,  
 for a few papers. Back to Baraka. When Owaya  
 came, I would not allow him to enter; the remainder  
 of h-day. Tired with my walk. Beautiful moonlight.

(Nov. 1894)

Saturday Nov. 10<sup>th</sup>. Showy, at intervals all day. Augustyin  
came late, for his week's marching, sent to Director of  
Interior, application for plants from Botanical Garden  
opening to me, or tomorrow. At noon, came word  
of death of a man, Akanda, in Miamani village;  
and Augustyin went there, accompanied by night-  
ing her services, and did not return till near  
7 P.M. Then, I had, at that late hour, to get food  
and prepared for her for next day, and the evening  
was spoiled for me, no English singing, - no people  
came.

Sabbath Nov. 11<sup>th</sup>. A bright clear day. A small audience.  
People away at the burial of the man Akanda, &  
at the hospital, for the accident of yesterday to  
the Baron Horwitz. Hjor at <sup>Rev.</sup> School; but, waiting  
as usual at church all day. In afternoon, I  
went to see <sup>Rev.</sup> Mrs. Toman, & to read and pray with  
him; do not think he will live more than a month.  
Augustyin & Cyngars at supper. Dr. Periniqau  
with a bad attack of indigestion. Rain, in evening,  
only 7 persons at church in evening.

Sunday Nov. 12<sup>th</sup>. Rose with headache, which increased all  
day. Dr. Periniqau not well. Johnstone & Lieke also  
reported sick. Clear day, with occasional showers. Had to  
rebook orange twice, about his lamp and bellringing.

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Tolerably good attendance, in Evening. Prayers; but very few took part; so, I closed it before the time was up. Standi came, from his Platian work, late, & seemed to desire instruction in his reading; but, when I asked him if his work were selling liquor, I warned him that he w<sup>t</sup>. be suspended from Class.

Tuesday, Nov. 13<sup>th</sup>. Showed no morning, but, beautifully clear, in afternoon. Neither Locke nor Joktan at work to-day, sick. Wrote a letter to Mr. Guest, at Lette-Cauana, & to Mrs. McComb, Philadelphia. Am going in good health, tonight.

Wednesday, Nov. 14<sup>th</sup>. Generally clear to-day. Joktan and Locke again at work. Iguana, plantains, & dried fish on hand to-day. Of the two remaining boarding-school boys, Young Locke, on a professed sickness, got permission to go to his village; & the other "Bellay" ran away, in the evening, Mr. Pernijagnet planting coffee and cacao trees, during the afternoon. I wrote a letter to Mr. Guest of Lette-Cauana.

Thursday, Nov. 15<sup>th</sup>. Very variable weather to-day. Finished the letter to <sup>daughter</sup> May. Made out an order of Goods & Supplies, to be sent by H. & C., who damaged all some of the large bags, from time, previous to School with their cigarettes. Mr. Pernijagnet does not know how to ring the bell; & in attempting to do it, the

afternoon, he got the rope mixed up and left it so, without telling me, so, when I was trying to S. P. M. bell, 1/4 hour was consumed in disengaging the rope. Some girls came for the child "Betsey" this afternoon; but, I regretted to tell them you. But, in evening, I think he must have run away, as I did not see him at evening Prayers.

Fridas, Nov. 16<sup>th</sup>. Prepared persons for Sat., Augentyn came to prepare the rooms for coming of Mr. & Mrs. Bailey. At the Boat-house, arranging the anchor & chains, Two new men began work to-day. Heavy rain & wind all day, so no work to-day. Worked in noon, made out bill for some £ 2, and also in evening English Singing, which I did not see much of, mostly singing alone. Something.

Satay, Nov. 17<sup>th</sup>. Went to Boat-house to see about fastening & fixing anchor & chain. To the C., to make more definite my order of yesterday, Completed my serum for tomorrow. Augentyn superintending my 2 house-boys, in cleaning Pantry & Dining room. Mr. Ward came up in afternoon, from H. & C., to make still more definite my Order. In evening English Singing, there were present - nine persons. I felt encouraged, after the absence of the Exercise for 2 weeks.

Saturday Nov. 18<sup>th</sup>. A meeting was held at 9 o'clock in the morning at the hall also. But, as a train had begun to pass, it was adjourned to the hall of the late Rev. Mr. Ward on Park St.,  
Boston, where it was held till 1 P.M. The meeting was opened, and after the singing of a hymn, the service began. It did not continue till 6.30, after which, singing over, we were dismissed as a crowd; but, it was too late for us to go to Mr. Parker's home, so we went to Mr. Brewster's.

Monday Nov. 19<sup>th</sup>. Sent off the boat early to the French steamer for Mr. & Mrs. Marling. Another French steamer came in from South Africa, also, a small steamer, also, later in the day, a German gun-boat. Word that Rev. Mr. Trevor was dying, Mrs. Marling & I went there, sent for mail, letter from Mr. Brewster, Dr. Ormiston, & the Bishop. In afternoon, word that Rev. Trevor was dead; went again to see the remains, & to arrange for the burial. Bells in the church, & Mr. Perini's agents effort to get them out.

Tuesday Nov. 20<sup>th</sup>. Buried Rev. Trevor, at 11.30 A.M., assisted in the services by Rev. A.W. Marling. Large audience present. Invited to dinner Mrs. Sarah Lewis and Dr. Huntington had prepared a special dinner. Lent letters for Rev. Trevor. Consultation with Mr. & Mrs. Marling, about plans for the southern part of our mission.

Wednesday, Nov. 21<sup>st</sup>. Mrs & Mrs Mairling went to the steamer, to see the Governor; I arranged the wagon, for Mrs Mairling to ride on it; Dismissed Akande, as he declines to do certain works. The sun was still warm day, A good attendance at Agency-class, Mrs Mairling gave me five rots (flags, - blue, white, and mixed) from England. A tornado came up, at 7. P. M., just as we were going to Prayer meeting. After meeting, discovered that Oseaga was neglecting his work of his. Perejaguek had a room.

Thursday, Nov. 22<sup>nd</sup>. A German steamer coming in, letter from Sister Bella and Mr. Ford, about the death of Mrs Laffing. A long talk with Mrs Mairling, about Augustyn, Read the Balanga letters to Mrs Mairling, A beautifully clear day, did not do much, in afternoon, & felt depressed about mission place.

Friday, Nov. 23<sup>rd</sup>. An English steamer came in, Mr. S., at first, thought was the "Cavendish", from the north. But, it was the "Galton", from the south. A Mr. Sheldon, of the Alliance Socy in the Congo, came ashore, & spent the day. Went to German factory, & to H. C., to make about time of journey to Batanga at close of day, the German is also the English steamer went out, in afternoon, leaving

Saturday Nov. 24<sup>th</sup>. Cloudy snowing. Mr. Maraling busy at the Custom House; and S. Tracy packing his Maraling's boxes, Augustynus did not come, or was much serving errands, but until afternoon; as, in the morning, she went to seek the washing of the Frasinet Co. steamer's clothing. Heavy rain, at noon, Westhaven unexcited idly, good singing, in the evening.

Sabbath Nov. 25<sup>th</sup>. Mrs. with a headache, etc., increased all day. Rev. Maraling preached, in morning & the "Nove" came in from Ogoe, early in the morning. In afternoon, Mr. Maraling went to speak in three villages, & I preached usual English service. Mrs. Cleveland remained with us to tea, I felt as if a chill was coming, but it passed off before evening service.

Sunday Nov. 26<sup>th</sup>. A busy day, with Mrs. Maraling, & sending the men with him, on his errands. The mail (Portobello) who had arrived on Sat., sent for, a rec'd. a number of letters; & among the rest, from Rev. Had a good dinner of duck, for Mrs. Maraling. Augustynus came to see for her. Had also Okavole to tea, at 4 p.m. It had a fine big fish. Had been over Tracy's in afternoon, packing a trunk for Rev. Maraling, & getting his suit boxes off, for his journey tomorrow.

Tuesday Nov. 27<sup>th</sup>. A rainy morning; but, rain ceased at about 10<sup>o</sup>. A. M.; and then, at 1.30, P. M., began

very heavily, and so continued till 5. P. M., the  
little "Galion" was to have gone at 6.30 A.M.,  
and everything was sent down by the time & a few  
hours had passed, when announced one, as I expected  
so much by leaving things to the last. Mr. Burdett  
will be ~~an~~ <sup>the</sup> next to superintend things; and, at  
10. A. M., came word that the little steamer was  
coming. I ascended back up to the beach. In the  
noon, at 4. P. M., I went to Woodwards, & we sold  
a Bill of Exchange ~~for~~ <sup>to</sup> \$250.  
I bought \$500. worth dollars.  
Came back late, and Leo had not got supper  
ready. I asked our Periagent, after supper, to  
write a note in French for me; he seemed to  
hesitate, - I do not know why so, I sat up for  
an hour and more, <sup>long</sup> looking it out of a  
dictionary.

Wednesday Nov. 28<sup>th</sup>. Somewhat cloudy morning; bright  
afternoon. In morning, I went to Plateau, to call on  
Commissioner-General de Brazza; I saw his Secretary, Dr.  
Blum; but, de Brazza himself was engaged in a council.  
Went into the Hospital, and saw the carpenter Thomas,  
prayed with him, & encouraged him against the  
priests, who as accusers his party. At noon, Nancy  
Lynn came to ask for a spot, in wh. to bury one of  
her female relatives; I hesitated, as the deceased

had had no connection with our congregation; but, I consented, & and then, I am independent at the time, who dug the grave, stealing my coco-nuts, the burial was at, 4. P. M., The French stranger, of the 20<sup>th</sup>, returned, somewhat clouded night & so will.

Thursday Nov. 29<sup>th</sup>. Clear day. It began very badly in the kitchen. This was not true, but, Ovega had neglected to grind coffee yesterday & had the coffee-mill in the kitchen, etc. I had forbidden, I took it from him, & put it in the Pantry, & shortly afterward, Ovega sent Clara here to grind some for breakfast; this also I had forbidden, as I require it to be prepared in time before I finished Clara, we had no coffee for breakfast. Ovega submitted his work properly, Vassar job, on the premises. The carpenter, Lawson, is becoming troublesome, A letter came from Mr. Goss, denying allegations against Augustan. At noon, came the Customs House bill, for Mr. Marley's goods; &, at 2. P. M., came a notice to pay promptly, "a, at 2 o'clock time, came a notice to be sure to pay tomorrow morning, Mr. Ferguson's table-manners quite interfere with my enjoyment of my food. The daily sorting for coming of "Cameons" from England. Spent 2 hours, in afternoon, in counting my

station stock of cash on hand; and, it was most noticeable, that, during that time (a time usually quiet) there were 8 or 10 calls at my door! Bought 400 pieces of wood; but, as they were all small, doubled them all. Also, bought some 20 fresh māna fish. Cool pleasant evening wind, not too strong for the door to be open.

Friday Nov. 30. Immediately after breakfast, went to Platseen, to pay Customs Dues & on Mr. Muselius' goods. On return, had Mr. Perrin agent's room cleaned out. Bright clear day. Reno still sick, & unable to attend to his work. Went to Gersten-Homes to receive some of the money I had obtained from him yesterday. Mr. Perrin agent's relishing, and picking of his teeth, and wiping his tooth-picks on the table-cloth, so disgusted me at supper ~~that~~, for fear of saying something sharp to him, I left the table.

Saturday Dec. 1. Spoke to Mr. Tis, nowing, as kindly as the unpleasant subject could be put, about his table-madness. The English steamer "Camerons" comes in, next to H. & C., to see whether they had prepared for discharging our expected 83 boxes to New York. Mr. Prentiss came to get the pay, due for Mr. Tis & myself before he died, wh. I paid in full presence of witness. Paying wages all morning. At noon,

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went again to the beach, to denounce my goods not to be landed at my beach, but at the pier, the afternoon, had to detain Ovenga, who was neglecting his work, entering upa acts. At about 4 P.M., came letter from Batanga, news of sickness of several of the missionaries. At evening singing, we met in the home-parlor, the church was so dimly lighted.

Sabbath Dec. 22. The expected French mail <sup>strange</sup> did not come to day, weather variable, Ovenga & Sorke were not here all day, the former had neglected his lamp "Three teachers absent ~~at~~ from Sab. Schy, I need to make some rearrangements there & At afternoon Service, Mr. Wood was absent up river, with the "Möre". Small meeting, at evening Monthly Concert.

Monday, Dec. 23. Was not awake till 6.15 A.M. Everybody had overslept, with still the early morning heavy rain, jumped out of bed so suddenly, only half awake, as I had a headache most of the rest of the day, French steamer did not come in. The "Möre" had arrived late last night, Ovenga still absent, I supposed in ill-health & sent for him; he did not come so, I arranged to call some one in his place. He came, late in afternoon, & said he was sick. Beautifully clear day & Anisley came with a man, a mason for Dr. Allegret, but I int.

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not consent to make any advance payment, Was very much vexed at the rude manners of the carpenter, Lawson. Had 4 supports fastened to the belfry frame. Paid Mr. Gode two young men part of their wages, Beautifully clear young men.

Tuesday Dec. 4. Cold threatening wind, in morning; but it soon passed, and the day was beautifully clear. Sent Jocke all day searching for plantains & iguana, but obtained none. Ovenga returned to his work today.

In afternoon, spent 3 hours with the Douars, at Hallion & Cookson's, examining goods landed from "Cameroon" last week. At suppertime, Waye was going to the Guili kitchen with plates, & I forbade him; till I knew by what arrangement, when I returned to the table, he secretly ate passed, and went to the kitchen, I followed & broke his plates, & punished him & as the plates happened to be Lawsons, the latter & Fero came to me, in the evening, to see one about N.  
& most beautiful moonlight night.

Wednesday Dec. 5: The Bordeaux steamer came in early, & I sent the "Minicota" boat, with Mr. Perrinjagat, to get his baggage, left at Bordeaux more than 2 months ago. It was low down in the hold, and can not be obtained until Friday. Engaged 2 Fang to work, dismissed Waye, for the affair of last night. Fine clear day.

good attendance at Queen's class. Hensley came, to see me, about getting back to his work at Allegan with Mr. Allegret, on "Möre", next Sat., planted out some gladiolas. Hael came to-day, invoices of a consignment of goods, the completion of what I had ordered last May, very quiet premises to-night.

Thursday Dec. 6. Clear day. Went to Boat-house, & looked at work, and found the carpenter was away. Took the key, and locked the house. Went to Marshall, and engaged plantains, wh. had just landed, & tele H. & C. S., to arrange about four passengers to the Agone on Sat., by the "Möre". Hensley at his usual weekly work of mending & cleaning. The 2 Tays, whom I engaged yesterday, at work to-day, in afternoon, the W. F. M. S. meeting. In end of the day, I planted, from the nursery, some 20 rose seedlings. Just after supper, found Wm. walking on the premises, he had been harbored by Kao, in his room. Very lonely evenings.

Friday Dec. 7. Early sent some of the workers, to the beach, to house the "Minnesota." Was annoyed by the absence of Locke, when I went, 2 hours later, to superintend the work. Causes of plantains, & Drungia cannae with you is the. Obtained, from Marshall, bush-

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rope and plautains, & racing in this with the  
boat on the "mône", for "watering" the afternoon, and  
the carpenter, Sandy, \$15. advance pay; he had diffi-

returning to the Oregon. Mr. Perreigagnet was disap-  
pointed ~~that~~ he did not get the money-box from the  
freight steamer today.

Saturday Dec. 7<sup>th</sup>. I slept well, was awaked  
early, by hearing Kere & his company going off  
7. A.M., when the steamer did not leave until an  
hour & a half, I met Capt. Ward staying about  
in kitchen, so drunk was he from a night's de-  
vouch. Led him out of the yard, & sent Ovens &  
show him the path to the factory, 6 mi. Woods across.

A half-hour later, the steamer started, with Capt. on  
board in drunken sleep, & the native pilot in charge.  
During the morning, sent to H. & C. for our boxes; Mr.  
Wood delayed the men so long, till I went and  
told Mr. Ward & we came later, in afternoon,  
Hired Ira, one of Texas sons, for temporary cook,  
during Kere's absence. He wagon busy all afternoon,  
bringin', from H. & C.'s, the 35 cases and boxes.  
Only a few at evening being in.  
Sabbath Dec. 8<sup>th</sup>. Weather threatening all day. The morning

Sonice, showed Augustin a Cymruus hair writing  
brush that had opened on Saty, from the "Cymruus" lot  
of boxes. They were very much pleased at this "British"  
gift. They did not take possession of them, but waited  
till tomorrow. It was heavy rain; in afternoon, at beginning  
of English service; small attendance. French steamer  
went out, about 4. P.M., and having landed her,  
Permitagent's case.

Tuesday Dec. 10. Clear, bright day. Went to the Saarauk,  
to, ~~for~~ done small duties, on Mr. Quaile's goods.  
In afternoon, all the employes, except Joktan, were  
late & I wd. not let them work. Cenka-Katâ,  
from Stomla, came for flowers last out at his house.  
I was pleased with the taste on her part. Augustin  
came & also Sia (the cook) how to make yeast, &  
evening Prayer-meeting, people very slow to take part.

Tuesday Dec. 11. It rains morning. At the storehouse,  
opened several boxes; among the rest of sewing  
machines. Mr. Johnson, the tailor, came to get flowers  
to plant. In afternoon, weather was clear, went to  
<sup>Eldon</sup> see Tabinda; & on the way, stopped at his daughter  
Luria. Tabinda was sick. The old man "Johnson"  
cried, spoke of returning to the communion of  
the church. Engaged a new Bacala man, for work,  
& damp day; I feel it in my bones.

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Tuesday Dec. 12<sup>th</sup>. A clear bright day. Went to N. & C. to look after acc'ts, & I found it was about \$1000 short, so I sent back the two by road, and did the unbalanced. Collected up the goods etc. in hand, of my own & the miners, tried to make out a balance of Statistics of this Station, but was hindered by absence of Corico Statistics. At 2 P.M. went to the Indian village, to a meeting starting at 3 P.M., to the Indian place meeting. Had brought a large feed, in the morning; but, it was not cooked in time, & it spoiled, so it was no afternoon.

Wednesday Dec. 13<sup>th</sup>. A clear bright day, with occasional small showers. Two men from Chalchihuitán came, sent Adams to Orendo, to arrange about Iguru to come here, & leave Orendo vacant, till I can find some one else. London finished his work, & I paid him in full. Looked over my clothing, in afternoon, to get some new parts, for going to Calanga. Worked over the Ch. miners' acc'ts, began writing on Annual Report.

Friday, Dec. 14<sup>th</sup>. Three Bassas cutting grass, and I clearing paths. Took out all day, cutting plantains, for our food, & have, for several days,

been giving them rations in rice. They return here, at the end of each month. Bought a large piece of manioc (manioc) in the rice of 2000. Also, at noon, came some rice large pieces fresh. Late in afternoon, came François - found the Brazza, & made a sketch of his plan about extension of the Boulevard past Baaka, - the building of a new Hospital, - and the introduction of fresh meat in agriculture, especially on the steamer. He promises very quiet now, for a week, since Akro is away.

Sabbath Dec. 16<sup>th</sup> } Rising, on Sat'g morning; In evening,  
Saturday .. 5 } went to the Soirée of the Commandeur-Général de Brazza " arrived there at 8.30 P.M.  
Was the first guest present. He told one of his recent journeys, in the far interior, toward Lake Ichad. It was probably the first to leave the Soirée, at 10.30 P.M.

On Sabbath, clouds threatening; but, rain did not fall till evening. The Fjembé Society beating their signals, for initiation of 2 women, all these days. Good audience all day. The new class at Sab. Sch., under Xucina, for teaching adults to read; had 12 present.

Monday, Dec. 17<sup>th</sup>. Fine clear day; but, I did not feel energetic. Mrs. Shirley came to see me. Took, for

work, a fourth fang. In afternoon, finished a letter to  
Mrs. W. H. Bassett; and, wrote one to Dr. Johnson.  
in the afternoon I dined at Mr. Bushnell's, & I brought  
them, my two or three good apples & some tea.

Tuesday Dec. 18<sup>th</sup>. Clear this morning. Work of the  
3 Balas & 4 fangs over in afternoon, to  
Socorro, the "poor," for next day, a little & un-  
equal quantity, to go to the market. Had a  
head-ache, most of the day, as I had eat up  
last night eating, Mr. Persimmon's supper  
without, at the "poor," by mistake  
afternoon, from the south, with the evening tea.

Wednesday Dec. 19<sup>th</sup>. Beautiful day, Mr. H. H. Stetson,  
and paid Customs duties, on the account we had  
brought, France 406.07, & large additional the  
Mexican taxes. Re-writing and rewriting of  
Annual Report. While at supper, there was a  
knock at the door, & a man spoke it was to  
necessarily that I thought it was Yezuri, "one  
of the native women;" & I intended to let her  
wait till I ate supper; but, looking out the  
door, found it was Mr. Wren, come with our  
long expected doc't. He had made a mistake  
of a day (who have been here yesterday) &  
I had to go back over some hills, and leave him,

to go to Prayer meeting, & good letter from Agathe.  
And news from Mr. De Heer, that Gertrude was  
married to a nice young man.

Tuesday, Dec. 20<sup>th</sup>. Did not sleep well last night, &  
am with a headache, & steamed all night. French  
Mr. Perriagout turned to the beach, to go in the boat  
to Walleney, but as a steamer came along it was the  
time to go, so he returned. Soon, another steamer  
was seen, & he went off to it, supposing it to be a  
French. But, it was Freeman. I went to Plateau, to  
get Permit, for the boat, for tomorrow to Stula,  
which came. News of death of Mr. <sup>Rev.</sup> Ford, at Ba-  
tanga Interior. Went to Plateau to send telegram  
of the death, to New York. Getting food & ready for  
the even, or tomorrow. Agathe had promised to be  
here, with Mrs. Marliss' dress, by noon; but, she  
did not come till 6 P.M., and <sup>it</sup> was not finished  
until 8.30 P.M. Was damaged at the procrustations.  
Have fixed Capt. Perriagout's box of pictures, in the  
forever.

Wednesday, Dec. 21<sup>st</sup>. Bloody morning, but cleared about  
7. A. M. completing the preparations, about 7. A. M. Perri-  
agout's boat. He left, at 8.30 A. M. Wrote a  
letter to Major. In afternoon, young Joseph came  
& talk about coming to the Session, in

examination for Baptism; but I knew that most were unprepared, and told them not to come. Of the 5 who did come, only one - C. gave the perfect answer about the meaning of the Sacraments, & only she was accepted. In evening, other prayers & give made a demand for increase of wages. The demand was so preposterous that it made me indignant.

Saturday Dec. 22<sup>nd</sup>. Looking over H. & C's acct with myself the last 6 months, had a talk with him, not entirely satisfactory. The French mail, from south came in, with letters from M<sup>r</sup> Forget of Salagua, and from one of Bp. Taylor's missionaries, south of Manabi, offering back their mission books. Preparations for service at 5 P.M., for Communion tomorrow. Many people asking for breadfruit, at this hungry time. Dark rainy night.

Sabbath, Dec. 23<sup>rd</sup>. Rain, early in morning; but, it soon cleared off. The "Moje" comes from the Agoye, Santa, Moxo, Forget, - Agino, - Manabi, & has dried up. Made announcement of our expected arrival on next Sat. - A young woman Father Koor, Baptized - Orange-Johnson restored, - Figueredo's ~~Koor~~ <sup>in</sup> ~~reunited~~ <sup>reunited</sup>. Communion in afternoon. Monk Corant in evening, - Squaws conducted. Heavy rain.

Monday Dec. 24<sup>th</sup>. A fine day. Clear & bright. In the middle of morning, found one of the Fang had left his work, was collecting, I threw the food away, and dismissed the men. Elder Claude brought G. M. C. Gwara and his wife Ambonka, to join the digging place. In the afternoon, a Mohammedan merchant, with 2 attendants, came to our clock & they were our place in their inspection, he is trying to sell his books, and some like, at H. & C., in afternoon & was detained some time by Mr. Wood. A very lonely position we, & conclude I remember having, for years.

Tuesday Dec. 25<sup>th</sup>. Rose with a headache, wh. continued all day, ate nothing all day, took no notice of the day, & labored at work, as usual. The "Lafayette" arrived, about 11. A.M., with Dr. Darling. Making up acts & memoranda, about 5 P.M., Capt. Burns, and American Armstrong, of the "Minn.", & Mr. Whittaker, Capt. Dawson, came to pass our horses, call, & in our Christmas-like knives.

Wednesday Dec. 26<sup>th</sup>. Headache continued. But, made a special dinner, & had Augentum & Oryzuma as guests. The packed our valises, for the expected journey. A German & trumper came, from south, late in afternoon, I showed the "Lafayette", and engaged Myungs to go, & Captain to Fula, with the "Minnesota," on Friday, to take me

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Evening to be companion with Mrs. ... . Afternoon, my headache still persisting, I asked Mr. Marling to take the evening Lecture; I was not present; but, heard it to be a strong one. Thursday, Dec. 27<sup>th</sup>, Clear day. Still with headache. Afternoon came in started up, as ~~that~~ was not yet quite ready; but, it proved to be the farewell steamer, for St. Thomas, with the Portuguese mail. Many letters, & news of the death of Canon H. G. Todd & of Mr. Todd resigning the Princeton church. Many important letters. In afternoon, Father Riley had come, & with a due bill, from Mr. Deemeran, who had been paid before Mr. B. went away; it made up the difference between her & Deemeran's bill, & it up late reading the paper.

On Sat. 17, the "Cavacous" came in & went to H. & C.  
to see Capt. delgarro, to inquire sailing-time,  
Closing up arrangements all day. At 5 P.M., sent  
down my and Mrs. Darling's baggage, to the  
pier, and sent it off to "Cavacous" in one of H. & C.'s  
boats. The 48 remaining boxes for me were landed  
from the steamer. Very few at Evening Service.

On Sabbath 30<sup>th</sup>, I conducted Service, in Portuguese,  
and the Sab. Feb. 1., made explanation about my  
having allowed a certain woman, a month ago,  
to be buried in my graveyard. and a woman,  
Ajué (Azura), rose and made a slight scene,  
by trying to controvert what I had said.

Expecting the steamer to leave at 4 P.M., I held  
our afternoon Service. Augentzwe came, at 2 P.M.,  
to receive final directions; and Mrs. Darling  
had the impertinence, at the late hour, to object  
to our placing the keys in her care. I answered  
him more sharply than I have ever answered  
any missionary. We were at the pier, at  
3 P.M., but had to wait there till 5 P.M.  
In meanwhile, I had a long talk with Sena  
Scoré Davis, about the confusion Azura & others

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were working in the church, On the steamer, met the following missionaries from the Congo, Rev. Foster, M.D. & his layman brother; a Peris lay missj., Rev Davies (nigro), and Miss Howard (colored) all of the Am. Bap. Church; and a Swedish <sup>missionary</sup> ~~missionary~~, Westling and his wife & child. On Saturday Jan'y 31, started early, and, by 2. P.M., was at Slob's. Two other passengers I had not named, Mr. & Mrs. Peacock, from Rabinda, trading agent, a good man, & total abstainer. On Tuesday Jan'y 1<sup>st</sup>, steamer "Tobia" came, in afternoon, & I went off to it. Went a mile to Galon. "Cameran" left at 4. P.M.

Wednesday Jan'y 2<sup>nd</sup>. anchored at Batango, at 6.30. Minin boat, with Dr. Munktel, Mrs. Lee & Rev. Tracy, came off. I went ashore in Halle boat, with Elder <sup>Isabella</sup> Adande, to Bonyahile, to sister; and, was welcomed there. Had a bad headache all day. Talk with sister, about Mission matters. Small number at prayer-meeting, in evening.

Thursday Jan'y 3<sup>rd</sup> } On Thursday, at 10.30, A.M., went Friday " " } to Elikchile, to dinner, at Dr. Gault. And in the afternoon, presided at the Prayer meeting preceding the Mission-meeting. But, without any notice to me, all the others had decided to begin, by organizing the Mission. This I objected to; &

(Jan'y 1895)

they being overruled, the others elected me Chairman, I refused. Had already met Rev. Frazer, on the steamer; and Dr. & Mrs. Johnson, Mr. Roberts, Rev. Schnatz, and Miss Christensen. Also, Mrs. De Heer, whom I had not met for 8 years. Remained till after evening service, to which Sister Bella had come; & with her walked home along the beach.

On Friday, still had a slight headache, but went to Shikibiki, to take part in the Prayer-meetings, morning and afternoon. The afternoon became oppressive, with the number of papers read; and I did not remain till evening; but, came back to Shikibiki Bongaheli.

Saturday, Jan'y 5<sup>th</sup>. On the 5<sup>th</sup>, no meetings. Wrote out Sabbath "6" my Annual Report; - planted some of Monday "7" the flowers I had brought from Galon. Was annoyed, in the afternoon, by hearing that the other white missionaries except Sister Bella, were to have a Lord's Supper by themselves, to the exclusion of any natives. I refused to attend.

On Sabbath, Rev. Ibia preached; and after church, he & Mr. Ford tried to induce Sister & me to join the colored communion Table, in the afternoon. We refused. I attended the Sabbath School, the large number of men

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present at Deb. School. On Monday. At mission-meeting, both morning and afternoon, Revd., in evening, at Poultry. Rev. Tuyango presided; and Mr. Gault was elected moderator.

Tuesday, Jan'y 8<sup>th</sup>. A warm day. At morning Mission Meeting, a full talk about location of new missionaries. The Chairman, Mr. Martin, made a most straightforward remark, about Dr. Laffin expecting to die & Mr. Mantel broke out into a brutal laugh.

At afternoon Poultry, a long discussion, about teaching of Candidates for ministry, and about enrolling a young man from Benita, as a Candidate.

Wednesday, Jan'y 9<sup>th</sup>. Clear day. Promptly, at the Mission meeting. Not a pleasant time; soon found ~~that~~ my opinion was not wanted, as the men had arranged all things for themselves. At afternoon Poultry, Ngande was examined during 2 hours, & was found to preach the gospel. In the evening, was seized with cramps in my bowels, - one of the signs of fever, as I had it in Agour, before I last went to America.

Thursday, Jan'y 10<sup>th</sup>. No meetings to-day; spent the morning in writing up Poultry documents. Rested in afternoon. Tongalo's strange ignorance of

arithmetrie. In evening, went with Sister to conduct the Prayer meeting, at Elikelik (Agitayete) Friday Jan'y 11<sup>th</sup>. On the way, along the beach, saw the launchies, with songs & dance, of the barge canoe of Malolo, going for a race to waterfall & back, while at the meeting of Division, the canoe came by the Station, halting the house. In afternoon, Presbytery meeting, and a long discussion about the course of induction of Candidates, in which I had to oppose Dr. Marting, and defend the native brethren. Preparatory service in Evening, with Rev. Miyongo.

Saturday, Jan'y 12<sup>th</sup>. To revision meeting early. Long slow talk, and not much progress. It remained to dinner, with Mrs. Gault; and, after dinner, Dr Laffin helped me make out our Estimates. Returned to Sister's house, and wrote up minutes. Felt very tired and sleepy, and went to bed early.

Sabbath, Jan'y 13<sup>th</sup>. Preached the sermon, and assisted in the Communion Service. A heavy rain a rain came up just at the close, wh. alarmed the audience, who began to be excited, & some of the women started to go out; but, the Elder restrained them. Lunch at Sister's house

for Rev. & Mrs. Gaunt, Rev. Schatz, Miss Dekker, Mrs. Bentlinger,  
Miss Christensen, Miss Babe, Afternoon Service Missionary  
Conference. Rev. Beyongo, Lecturist Ngaoko, & Edema.  
In evening, Beyongo & others. A pleasant day, but  
the many exercises were somewhat exhausting;  
and the cold storm was bad, cutt<sup>t</sup> off its lowering  
of temperature.

Monday Jan'y 14.} Busy at Mission Meetings, in  
Tuesday .. 15.} the mornings; & Preaching, in  
Wednesday .. 16'} afternoons. On Tuesday afternoon,  
a long discussion, in wh. I tried to have Dr.  
Schatz made Instructor of Candidates; but, Rev.  
Gaunt was appointed. ~~At Wednesday~~ And Rev.  
Schatz was made Supply of the Batanga church.  
On Wednesday afternoon, Dr. Schatz's appointment was  
reconsidered; but, was again confirmed, after  
a long discussion.

Thursday Jan'y 17. Spent the whole day at  
Mission Meeting, both morning and afternoon.  
In the afternoon, I opposed Miss Babe's being  
placed at Bongabule with Sister Leabell. Had  
a game of logomachy with Miss Dekker, Mrs. Gaunt,  
Mrs. Bentlinger, and I gained the victory. Retired  
to Bongabule, early in evening with sister and  
her 3 little native girls. Read. Hesil at night.

Friday Jan'y 18<sup>th</sup>. Mrs. Ford came early to breakfast, to see Sister about the arbitration notice for Mrs. Steffens. I wrote Poughkeepsie documents all morning; and rain hindered me from going to Union Meeting. Went, in afternoon; and, with Mrs. Kerr and Mrs. Gault and Miss Babe, walked to Labi River Falls, a delightful tramp; and returned in 2 hours. Stayed to evening prayers; and returned late to Sister's house; part of the way was dark on the forest path, & the crossing on one log bridge was dangerous.

Saturday Jan'y 19<sup>th</sup>. Went to Union-Meeting; and had the matter settled, with Mrs. Decker, Mrs. Moloko shd go with me to Gabon, & shd not be detained at Batauga. Many long discussions, so the meeting was not finished, & went over to the afternoon. I left, and returned to Sister's, and did not go back in afternoon. Felt very tired; and, after writing some Poughkeepsie matter, took a nap. About 4 P.M., Mrs. Decker, Mrs. Renthijger & Miss Christensen with Mrs. Kerr, came to tea, in Sister's invitation. I sat up late reading, & did not fall asleep till midnight.

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Sabbath Jan'y 20<sup>th</sup>. A bright clear day. I felt somewhat heavy, with a slight cold. Preached, In the pulpit were Rev. Messrs Schmitz and Hria. Present also were Messrs Ford and Mankel, and Miss Babe. After church, Mr. Ford brought up a matter ~~that~~ I thought unnecessary, in proposing that I assist in a memorial service for <sup>Rev.</sup> Mr. Good. This has already been done in the Mission Obituary Resolutions. And, while I will keep silent about Mr. Good's faults, I can not (after all I endured from him) truthfully eulogize him. A large Sab. Sch., wh. I was pleased to see Mr. Schmitz began to re-organise. No stranger came in to spoil our quiet, Am expecting both the German and English teacher, Rev. Hria preached in evening.

Monday Jan'y 21<sup>st</sup>. Did not go to Mission all day, waiting all day. In afternoon, Sister Bella went to a medical conference, at the Mission; but I stayed here and wrote an article for Dr. Dennis, for the next issue number of "Ch. at Home & Abroad". In evening, went to the Mission, to visit Rev. Mr. Fraser, & said good bye to all the missionaries here. Played logomachy with Mrs De Heer, Mr Bentlage, Miss Babe, a Mr. Gruell, & the amusing incident of Miss Christensen mistaking my

at the front door, and demanding who I was, & I jokingly shouted, "Only a tramp!" Retained at night to Bongashile.

<u>Tuesday</u>	<u>Jan'y 22<sup>nd</sup></u>	{	the steamer was visible all
<u>Wednesday</u>	<u>23<sup>rd</sup></u>		day, at Taibé. I got all my
<u>Thursday</u>	<u>24<sup>th</sup></u>		provisions ready & about 4. P.M.
<u>Friday</u>	<u>25<sup>th</sup></u>		the steamer "Gracie Woermann".

Capt. Meekerty came, I went off, in the Boughain (?) Hall's agent, boat, & found the steamer w. to go the night. Retained, ate a hasty supper, & with Mrs. Maia and Adande a few baggage, Hall's boat kindly took us off again. Mrs. Ford was there, And, soon, Mr. Kerr came, with Mrs. DeHeer, Mrs. Bentinger, & Miss Christensen, & Kombe file. The steamer was working discharging cargo, late at night.

On Wednesday. Steamer started <sup>about</sup> <sup>5 miles</sup> S. S. W., and reaching Pungo River before 8. A. M., and discharged cargo there, until about 4. P.M., when we started south again. I had spent the whole day-time reading a book called "Jeze"! Went on, all night, and at the anchorage, was near Bata. On Thursday, early came to anchor (changed anchorage) near the Bata

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factors. The Beaufort boat "Willie" was there,  
& the 3 ladies & 2 children left in it. And,  
in afternoon, Mr. Brae & his boy left, in a  
trader's boat. About 4 P.M. of Thursday,  
started again, & going slowly all night, was  
in sight of Cape Esterias, at 5.30 A.M., anchored  
in Godron, at 8.30. Arrived, and ashore by <sup>of Friday</sup> 10. A.M.  
Took with the Mission about care for us.  
Anyantyari had the house open, and ready for us,  
some mail awaiting us. And, Mr. Marling  
& I went to Platam, in afternoon, and got  
more mail. Called on the Governor, went to  
Mayers Reunis, to see about Mr. Perini's <sup>agente</sup>  
box, which he had expected. It had been carried  
back to Havre! Mr. Wood called, to see us  
in the evening.

Friday Jan'y 26: Rose with a headache, which con-  
tinued all day. Busy, all the morning, opening  
boxes from the goods that came from America, while  
I was away at Batanga. In the afternoon, had a  
conference, for 2 hours, with Elders Habinda, Adande,  
a Myang (Alicentiate Igwe being also present)  
about Myang's insinuations against me. And,  
I told them now, at Orlitay, I had refused to  
take any part in the services of this church. Myang

second abhorred; but, he made no apology. And, though the other Elders begged me, I refused to take any part in the church, the while, it was uncontadicted by Nyango, that very many of the church-members were against me. In the morning also, the crazy Pwese-Staké had come, to talk about his claims for marriage, for his niece. Hugantum! And, in the late afternoon, she came and told me of Pwese's frightful pursuit of her. Went to bed early & but, did not sleep, my headache still continued.

Sabbath, Janj. 27. Weather rather threatening, in the morning, I went to church, and part with the audience, a Mr. Trueling finished, after church, saluted a few of the Sierra Leone gentlemen; then went out, leading the Sab. Sch., and took no part in the services. In the afternoon, Mr. Wood came, in time for church at 3.30, so supposing. But there was English service; I had forgotten it - to begin that there was to be none. And, the master Batchelor also came, bring his certificate of church-membership, & expecting an afternoon church service. I told them there would be none. After, the engineer Davis came, & was disappointed. The

There was no meeting; I went with him to the front gate, and told him the reason & there being no meeting, Nyango's slander against me, Mr. Marling came, to have a talk about the matter, & I found that Kalindla also was mixed with Nyango, in this matter.

Monday Jan<sup>o</sup> 28: Two steamers viz., the English "Benguela", & the French "Tanguete", went to plateau to pay \$160. of Customs duties. In evening joined the Mr. Strick people had waited, in order to get food for their journey. Two missionaries, on their way to the Congo, spent 2 hours at Batoka, the Frenchman, of a month ago, & a Mr. White, an Englishman, and I gave the latter a number of young trees & a selection of old native books & a copy of "Mawendo". In afternoon, bought some "udala" & many fish, memorandum; & prepared to write to Marling in evening, at Prayer meeting, Nyango was there & he had brought people who have abominated themselves ever since I have been in charge.

Wednesday " 30

Has kept no records three days, uncomfortable, with Mr. Marling's preserves, and indig-

raub at the prospect of his leaving himself & a  
uninvited guest upon. Had a very decided talk  
with him, on the subject, one evening. He went  
in the "Minisata", on Wednesday afternoon, & mail  
had come the day before. And the Portuguese  
mail arrived, a few hours after he was gone.  
The "Marie Woermann" came in, Thursday noon, and  
left in the afternoon. I spent a long morning, in  
the storehouse, on Thursday, opening boxes of new  
goods. Can not find time to write letters.

The "Möve" came in to-day, and Capt. Baars came  
to visit me, in the evening.

Friday, Feb. 2<sup>nd</sup> } No entry on Friday. Osukas  
Saturday " 3<sup>rd</sup> } Tongue made me a present of  
Jack Fish. His call was a gratifying one,  
at this time most people are so unfriendly.  
On Saturday, a warm day. I had paid the  
employees, on Friday; but some still came for  
more, & fragment of odds. Mr. Preijer's agent  
unexpectedly returned, on Saturday afternoon, a short  
time, with letters from Mr. Hartenberg.

Sabbath, Feb. 3<sup>rd</sup> } A clear Sabbath day. Iguru passed,  
Monday " 4<sup>th</sup> } but with slight encounter. After  
church, Agathe & Adande came to visit me; I  
had before heard Mr. Agathe had left Kangu.

Baneker.

(February 1895)

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Was very sleepy all afternoon, much drawing in the villages. A <sup>French</sup> steamer comes in, at noon, and brought me a letter from Charles, telling of his engagement of marriage to Miss Green.

On Monday, Ioke was absent. Also Keuge, Seumau had come, Saturday evening, from the French judge, for the disposal of three Galaxys, without my giving them good a passage home to Ogoave. Very busy just after breakfast, - reading to Post, - drawing Celua's child's portrait, & paying orders from Mr. Marling. Sent to the tailor Johnson to come & get his singer machine, which had arrived. Went to H. & C., back side of his interpreter for tomorrow morning at the plateau. Interpreter was here 4 hours assisting Johnson with the machine, & putting it together. Very warm day. Capt. Balua came to get water from our spring, for his vessel. Ioka-joyce called again, on her way home, my orange friend, Ogandaya, returned from her visit to the plateau, where her relatives are. In Prayer-meeting, Idengal's good progress, - a great improvement on his stumbling prayer of 6 months ago.

Tuesday, Feb. 5.: Rose with a headache. Oweaga had neglected to grind coffee yesterday; so, I would not allow it to be ground while breakfast waited. I ate

or dark nothing. Went to H. & C's, & Mr. Hudson gave me his clerk, James Pickhault, to assist in interpreting for me, at the Judge's, where I went, to decide <sup>the</sup> damages of Sat'g night. Was at the court-room, at 7 a.m. S. E. m., only 2 of those who summoned me were there. The judge disposed of the case in a few minutes, as the 2 plaintiffs had no papers to prove their case. On the way back, I stopped to see Mary for a few minutes. When the 2 plaintiffs returned here, I ordered them off, with their goods, from the premises. Examined all three port-holes, for Mr. McLevy's ch-bell, & found it among his boxes in the depot-store. Mary came to see me, about changing some Ogooue paper-money, & to tell me the story of her dismissal from <sup>Hanfors</sup> Mr. Teeius. For her / act, she had been given no opportunity ~~to defend~~ herself. Mr. Galloen sent me 1200 francs, for Mr. Ford, from Mr. Kidderling, of Bata. Mr. Perini agent presented, for payment, an excess baggage bill, for his luggage from France, - I did not like the fact that he had suppressed the word of its very large size, before I had promised to get the Mission to pay it. <sup>Mr. Galloen</sup> It is Perini's neglect of attention to Mr. Perini agent's com. Waiting Bl'g minutes into the Minto dock.

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Wednesday Feb 6<sup>th</sup>. Early morning rather threatening, but it cleared off. Many people at the 8. A.M. store-opening, buying door-locks. Made up entries from the stone-book, and continued at writing up the Feby account-book. All the Basa men away to day, at a funeral, w/ account-book, in afternoon. Paid Mr. Penyagut excessive freight-bill. Had meeting of singing class. Very warm day. Cengia doing better to-day, but I suspect him of stealing from my laundry-trice.

Thursday Feb 7<sup>th</sup>. The "Kubia" was early in sight; but, aground, & did not reach anchor till late in the afternoon. Was annoyed at the mistake of a certain child, about buying some cloth. Offered Mr. Penyagut some matting for the floor of his room, but he did not take it. At noon, recd the permission, from the Elder Zoungu, even, to the tribunal, for next Sat. Went to B.A.C., to have it explained. Penyagut, after the W.F.M.S. meeting, remained here, to do my sewing, & stayed to supper. We passed over quiet to night.

Friday, Feb 8<sup>th</sup>. Cold storm last night, chilly morning. Could not find, from any one, whether ~~the~~ the "Kubia" would be going to Katanga. Finished writing up Poultry Receipts. In the afternoon, found

the crazy Efuaue-Mata, entering one of the rooms of this house, I ordered him out; but he delayed at the foot of the steps. When I went away to work in the yard, he again attempted to enter. I ordered him away, & he delayed outside the gate. As he would not leave, I sent Dooke to call his people. As they delayed, I sent Orange, for the police. But his people then came, & he left, - and I sent Dooke to countermand the coming of the police. A beautifully clear afternoon. At P.M., I went to H. & C., and met Capt Button & Pierce Lindap, of the "Hubid" & made arrangements for sending some boxes to Mr. Ford tomorrow.

Saturday Feby 9<sup>th</sup>. Busy, as soon as I rose. Immediately after breakfast, went to store, to get out the 11 boxes for Mr. Ford, - got my copies, for Permit to embark them on the "Hubid"; - ate breakfast hasty, Went to H. & C.; and, in company with Mr. Hudson, Mr. Ford, Mrs. Johnson, and Mrs. Pickhardt, to the Court-Room, after the trial of H. & C.S. case, mine was soon called. I was shown consideration, & was allowed to sit; & Mrs. Pickhardt was allowed to speak for me, the case was decided for me & in my favor. I felt quite relieved, as it involved \$100. of Union money. But, the

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two plantiffs had told a monstrous string of lies. Came back, & on the way, at the Custom House, got the Permit signed. Came on to H. & C's & left the Permit <sup>very</sup> ~~very~~. Up to the Division <sup>which</sup> house, a hasty finished <sup>my</sup> permit & Mr. Ford <sup>left</sup>, whom I had written last night. Sent them, with a package for sister <sup>details</sup> & a box of liquors, for Parrot Landap, to H. & C., to be sent to the steamer. Hasted to seal up 1250 francs for Mr. Ford, & went with it to H. & C. Mr. Wood said he <sup>would</sup> go with me in his house. I hastened back to Bantha, & ate hasty dinner, & went again to H. & C's, & was delayed there an hour. Capt. Burton came ashore, & we chatted. Then, he & Wood & I went on board steamer. Saw Dr. McBrayde, & sick engineer Armstrong of the "Moore". We all returned ashore, & I meted, during afternoon, from the specimens of the day. In evening, came the interpreter - Akanda, with a report from the Subs<sup>t</sup> of Police, that I w<sup>t</sup>, for his sake, four of my plantiffs of the morning, by paying their passage on "Moore", a suspicious vessel, & will be obliging him, as I was shown fair in the morning. Also, surprisingly, a citation put into my hand, from another plaintiff, Keo.

Baraka (Feby 1895)

Sabbath, Feb 10. A very warm day, after church Service, three came, back one, Tugantung, Akanda, Festie, Sobe, Skawo, and Koro. Some drumming & singing, in the Oranga village. A very quiet afternoon, by myself in the house, Joklou's wife gave me a bottle of prepared lime-juice & sugar, probably in expectation of her going back soon to Ogowe.

Monday, Feb. 11. A dark chilly rainy morning: rain soon passed over; but, the day remained cloudy. Went to H. & C., to consult about what I <sup>do</sup> let <sup>do</sup> for the citation, for trial, tomorrow morning; but Mr. Hudson was not at home. At noon, came my three contestants at law, to ask for the passage to the <sup>1</sup>goa, saying the Judge interpreter Akanda had said I should. I refused to give them any reply, till after tomorrow trial. In afternoon, again went to H. & C., and consulted with Mr. Hudson, caught - died subsequently and remained. In the evening, the interpreter, Akanda, came with the 4 defendants, & said they had been to the Chief Police, & had told him I had refused to respect his word. I told him I would see the Chief of Police myself, tomorrow, and explain to him.

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Tuesday Feb 12<sup>th</sup>. Rose early, ate my usual breakfast, at 7.15. Mr. M. went to Mr. Bas, Mr. Pichault, to accompany me. He was not quite ready & I went on. Reached the Plateau just at 8.00 A.M. With the native, Akanda, as interpreter, explained to the ~~Chief~~ of Police, that I had not regard his request, but were waiting <sup>to see</sup> the result of Mr. M's trial. At the trial, on Bas's citation, the Judge, though he knew the case well, the ~~way~~ <sup>way</sup> he said, satirizing Mr. M. who had decided that I was not responsible, seemed to take the part of the plaintiffs, & said he had read somewhere that I was the chief, in authority, for our entire American Mission. And he put me on oath to that. Then, he decided I was not responsible for the Batanga affair; but, he showed his sympathy for the plaintiffs by asking that I not pay their passage up the Ogowe, — that I was not bound to, but, as a matter of charity, I said I would pay, in respect to his wish. Then, I went with Mr. M. Pichault again to the Chief of Police, & told him I wd. pay the passage, but wanted some assurance it shd. not be persecuted again in the future.

On the way back, stopped <sup>at</sup> the joiner Le Feuvre, for some work for Mrs. de Heer, but, his charges were too high. Near noon, came the 4 plaintiffs, for the passage. I gave them the order, after rebuking them for their id.

Bauaha.

(Feby 1895)

About 4 P.M., came Mr. Itba, with Elder Shika, & the 2 Emba boys, Bajedi & Ejanga.

Wed Feby 13<sup>c</sup>. Sharp rain at prayer-time; but, it cleared off soon. In the wooden store, found several tins of flour spoiled. Had a duck killed, for dinner. In afternoon, from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M., busy with Mr. Itba getting hair goods, from 3. to 4., with Dr. Clegg's Class. And, from 4. to 5., again with Mr. Itba. The C's class came suddenly, with word of death of Mr. Stofford, who only yesterday had been taken to the Hospital, and who three days ago, was well. Was annoyed to find Ejanga already regarding Mr. Pennington's authority more than once, in gathering breadfruit at Mr. Itba's direction, & not asking my permission.

Thursday, Feby 14<sup>c</sup>. The "mōre" not off early, - was delayed for Permit, for the launch it was to take. I sat up early, in the storehouse, with Mr. Itba's goods. At 9 A.M. came ~~the~~<sup>a</sup> company of some 20 white men, for Mr. Stofford's funeral. They came, in advance of time, & the ropes to fix the grave were not quite ready, & there was an annoying confusion at the grave. Spent most of the morning at Mr. Itba's & Shika's goods. Mrs. Pennington had left the breakfast-table, before we were done eating, & he did not appear at dinner. In afternoon, I was

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slept, from the loss of sleep last night. Next, I weighed Mr. Thibaut's goods, ready for uniting Remond, and sent them on wagon to the beach. Mr. Pérignon went to Plateau, I do not know what for. He appeared late at supper, but seemed to be in a somewhat cordial spirit. He excused himself from evening prayers, saying he had a headache.

Friday Feby 15<sup>th</sup>. Rose early, but had not slept well for, the temperature had changed suddenly in the night, & I must have had a chill. Gave out food for Mr. Thibaut now, sent the Custom House papers by Shiba, and, immediately after breakfast, went to Plateau, to pay a bill at Treasury. On the way, found Shiba waiting at the Custom House, - something wrong about the papers. While they were being arranged, I went on to the Treasury. His room was not yet ready, & he told me to come on Monday. Saw the woman, Nepomuk, there. Went to the Post-office for the ticket to Boate. I was surprised at the postmaster willing to make the boat take the mail to Elobi! After some slight difficulty, again at the Custom-House, got papers, a ticket had been neglected, & gave paper to Mr. Thibaut, & we boat was off by 9.30. Felt very tired a while, the afternoon, entered Shiba's account; went to H. & C., & paid their bill of 100, on account with it received,

and examining it more closely, found he had broken an distinct bargain with him, & he had still no room on my orders. Had an unusually good appetite, at supper, & enjoyed the chicken piccared with a little ham. Dark night and rain at nights.

Saturday, Feb. 16. Mr. Wood came to buy Axes, Cook-  
kicks, & some machans, - \$100., Bewaga began  
again to work. Set to work to put together the  
detached pieces of the wheel-barrows. Rained  
at his usual weeks during. Heavy rain came  
on, at about 8 P.M., difficulty with Mr. Perri-  
jaquet, about a misunderstanding caused by  
misstatement, ~~made~~ <sup>made</sup> by Osseng'a. Being in the  
impressions Mr. which Osseng'a said was true, I  
found fault with Mr. P., but I, broken hearted, &  
apologized for this. Mr. P. was quite exected  
and angry.

Sabbath, Feb. 17. A bright pleasant day. Mr. Perri-  
jaquet was not at prayers or breakfast. After church  
Péda stopped to salute me, & Agia from Nombay, & other  
women. And Skandee came to the house & chatted a  
while. Mr. Johnson came for his <sup>the</sup> newspaper.  
Mr. Perrijaquet was not at dinner & so, after dinner,  
I went to see him, & found he was willing to eat.

Tarata

(Feby 1895)

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Made their traps of beef-tea, & coffee, & put them with other things nicely in little caps &c. & sent Aurora with them. Later on, I went down to see him (had also sent some medicine) & found him up & duced. He came to supper. Stayed tonight over night.

Tuesday Feb 18<sup>th</sup>. Two steamers, "Frederick", "Pelion", & Chayón. "Peruanduco". Many jobs quickly attended to. refused to take back some tickets & cloths I had sold to one of the police & rec'd. 15 plantains from him instead. on acc't sent off my week's worth of cloths. At 8 A.M., started to plateau, to pass a Custom-house, at the Treasury. Posted some letters. Visited our Schenck, Agent of Frederick, a required steamer twice, for our letters. On reaching Baraká, found that Mr. & Mrs. Gacon had come, for a visit from Talagigua. News of the theft & other misdeeds of the Galva employes at Talagigua, & the dismissal of them all. In afternoon, wrote letter to Mr. Anthony Cornstalk, in reply to one of his & letter from May & also word from Mr. Bonnevier, in Scotland.

Tuesday, Feby 19<sup>th</sup>. A cloudy raining day. Waiting idly for the mail, both morning & afternoon, during the morning found one of the rear Bassas man absent from his work, & cooking food. One of the steamers went out very early in the morning.

Wednesday Feb'y 20<sup>th</sup> } On Wednesday afternoon, sent my last  
Thursday " 21<sup>st</sup> } letter to the post, for French mail.  
 Late in afternoon, came Mr. H. H. Mc's boat. Very  
 heavy rain, during Prayer-Meeting. On Thursday came  
 in the "Tenneiffe", Capt. Smith, I went off in rain,  
 to engage him to stop, in March, on homeward way,  
 for Mrs. DeKee, at Bala, settling Mr. Mc's good  
 ready, & making out his acct. Cold rain almost  
 all day. The Middle-Dy is done, & the latter  
 Rain I have begun.

Friday Feb'y 22<sup>nd</sup> } Sent the papers for Mr. Mc's boat, at  
Saturday " 23<sup>rd</sup> } 7.45, A.M.; but they did not come  
 till 12.30. noon, the Postmaster had delayed my  
 messenger Orenge. I was rather absent it, and  
 did not eat till the papers arrived. Very fine  
 here, as usual, for Friday is clear, & he had a talk  
 with Mr. Bacon, about the suspicious of 2 years ago,  
 Mr. W. E. denied he had made, as Mr. Ford &  
 Mr. Pusset had charged it fine weather day.

On Saturday also clear weather; (Mr. Cacment,  
 or the British Govt. Service, in the Nigga, called to  
 see me, from the steamer, Tenneiffe "yesterday").  
 About 10.30 A.M., James Mapata & others  
 came, in great style, from their Civil marriage,  
 & I married them in the church. She had a white

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bridal veil and train, have engaged at the slaves  
of 2 of the Basco men, in their work. Bought 15 chick-  
ens, to day; also, for copper, a large piece of mabago  
fish. Mr. & Mrs. Bacon seem to be enjoying themselves, &  
I am enjoying theirs.

Sabbath, Feb'y 24. } Made no entries. The day was poor-  
Monday, " 25" } what anxious for Mr. Bacon, lest the  
German steamer "Pho" come in, Mr. Bacon  
not very well. On Monday early, came in the  
"Benguela", from South, and "Gentoo Waitman" from  
North. Mr. Periniaget not well, went to factories, to  
inquire, & found that the "Benguela" w<sup>t</sup> stop at Batayo,  
& "Gentoo" w<sup>t</sup> probably leave <sup>the</sup> day for Cape Lopez,  
to connect with "Eclaireur" up the Ogooue. I malik &  
wife Simela came, by "Gentoo", from Bato. "Moore" came  
in, about noon; its negro 2d-engineer dead. Keo,  
our cook, returned, Locke & the workmen, in morn-  
ing, carrying various parts, from Bushells. Augen-  
teins came to do house-cleaning. In afternoon, Locke,  
our boat late in coming, had to hurry out  
the boat, with aid of only 5 men, to get Mr. &  
Mrs. Bacon off, by 3 P.M., to the "Gentoo"; & then they  
found at the vessel w<sup>t</sup> not leave till 7 A.M. of  
Tuesday, expecting still to meet the "Eclaireur";  
much regret at their having to go. At night rain.

Tuesday Feb'y 26. The day opened warm, & became very warm. I feasted, went on the prairie, about 9. A. M., to a Roma, & of the Sioux Leone Her engineer of the "Sioux", at 10. A. M., in old cemetery. The bones are much decomposed. He was carrying the remains to all morning. In afternoon, a heavy rain storm, mail from St. Louis, - a letter from Belle Coeur, about Uncle (the brother's) wedding & settling up accounts, for Mr. Marshall & and arranging for Uncle's work.

Wednesday Feb'y 27. A very cool morning, after a cold night. Had one of the <sup>old</sup> pickings in the house dug up, & replanted. Many native visitors during the day. Went back to repair my broken fence, near Ogallala; however making up accounts. Only a few at Ingalls Saloon. Mr. Pennington not very well to-day. Very warm, & very cool night.

Thursday Feb'y 28. Beautifully clear day; but it was cold, & I felt twinges of rheumatism, in fingers & elbow & knees. In afternoon, sent George on an errand, and he stayed all afternoon, making out accounts & wrote letter to Capt. Holt, thanks for his fruitcake at Christmas. Spoke with Holt on the path again, with his crazy epistles. Has the fresh man now something to do with the excavations? His case?

Friday Mar. 1. Fine clear day. Very dry. Temperature

tree clearing up, the front was a <sup>very</sup> exceedingly occupied at Docks's neglect of my directions, about putting the little everlasting bushes, along the fence outline. Arranging for a boat-journey, for the school-children, for Saturday, to the other side of the river. All of us in position.

Sat. Mar. 2 } Had arranged for an excursion, for  
Sab. " 3 } the school-children, with Mr Perrigant,  
to the other side of the Bay. But, he was sick in  
bed all day, & the excursion failed. Finished most  
of the accounts, whose calamities & figures I have been  
adding up.. Capt. De Souza & his successor Capt.  
The Father, called here me. Heavy rain & storm,  
at night, & tornado near midnight. Sabbath  
was clear, but, not bright. Mr. Perrigant still  
sick. After morning service, carpenter Mr. Thomas  
called here me, & urged me to resume afternoon  
English preaching. Very few at evening monthly-  
Concert meeting. Very threatening sky.

Monday Mar. 4. A cloudy day, & occasional small  
rain. In morning, went to H. C., and spent an  
hour settling accts. Docks did not come all morn-  
ing. In afternoon, went to Plateau, to collect money  
in due-bills from Holt, and Hartman of the Customs,  
& Bonfim of the 3<sup>o</sup> Barras, overage, whom I had told to  
follow me, did not come. Stopped at Augartown, on the

was back, for a few minutes, the photographer sent the completed pictures of Mr. & Mrs. Bacon. Mr. Perriagut still sick. Few rain during, no Prayer-meeting. After evening-prayer, the 5 on my premises received, and looked at stereoscope, album-picture, & Illustrated Bibl. at 8.30, as the rain, I went to give Mr. Perriagut, some medicine.

Tuesday, Mar. 5<sup>th</sup>. Chilly, cloudy & showy; Mr. Perriagut still in bed, & <sup>he</sup> thinking he needed the French doctor! I told him I thought he was not sick, and ought to get up & exercise. Did not feel very well myself, & did not do much all morning, in afternoon, till at accounts, sent Guohlo to Aurora, to pay a bill. To our surprise, Mr. Perriagut appeared, about 3.30 <sup>pm</sup> being stronger; & I had some soup made for him, weather still unsettled. Was very much annoyed at Aurora's abuse of some of my new ceramic kitchen utensils.

Wednesday, Mar. 6<sup>th</sup>. A French mail, of Chagnon Reunie, came in. Day showy and uncertain, Mr. Perriagut still keeping his bed, but I did not believe he was sick. I really think he was "shamming"; I became weary of going back and forth to his house, & told him we might come & live in this house, to care on looking after him.

Thursday, Mar. 7<sup>th</sup>: Wrote a few letters to Agone River <sup>at Frank's  
Robbo's</sup>. 10. A. M., Nyango came from Angon, with the ~~broken~~  
broken in its rotten heel, some very annoying letters  
from Mr. Masling, about the Golon ch. matter.

The W. F. M. Soc'y met its usual monthly meeting  
in the church. Amongst a dozen were at dinner  
with me; and, after Soc'y meeting, I read Mr. Masling's  
letters to her, & counseled with her what to do about it.  
Was very much annoyed. And, particularly, about  
some statements in regard to Dr. Percival.

Friday, Mar. 8<sup>th</sup>. A bright clear day. Nyango came, for  
toole, to bix a man who had died yesterday. And,  
in afternoon, he came, for a long explanation of his  
course against me, and made acknowledgement  
and apologies. Making exterior improvements in Motile's  
house. One of the Bassai was impertinent, and I told  
him to leave. In evening, told <sup>Adelaide</sup> of what  
Elder Nyango had acknowledged. Beautiful moonlight.

A strange sailing-vessel came, in the evening.  
Saturday, Mar. 9<sup>th</sup>. "Nöre" left, at 6. A. M., for the Agone.  
At work on the underpinning of Motile's house. A  
bright beautiful day. Oyongens are not able to come  
to school, having cut her foot. Getting goods ready;  
for Nyango's return journey to Agon on Monday.

Sabbath, Mar. 10. A bright & pleasant day & just after breakfast, we arrived at Aurora, for attempting to use Mrs Ogden's former room & its furniture, without my permission. After church, there came back one, a number of people besides Augustus & his wife, Adande, Mr Thomas, - Agathe's mother, Bigourne's mother, and several other women. The towns were quiet to-day, except for the foreign drums. I was going from place to place. I am not quite satisfied about Moloko to-day, - his whereabouts. After evening service, when I was saluting Adande, a Myungs came up, & was agreeably surprised that Augustus & the rest of Agathe's supporters pressed forward to greet me. His look as if he has been trying to counteract some of the evil he has been doing here.

Monday Mar. 11. A very busy morning. Rainy, - but, immediately after morning-prayers, went with Agungs, to get the boxes, for Mr. Rawlings, out of the wooden store & some fowls waiting to sell & chickens & sent Ovanga with papers to the Custom House. - A large quantity of dried fish came, wh. occupied one more than 2 hours to count. Rain finally ceased, at 11. A. M., &

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the "Sea-Bird" finally left with Mtangas, David Becht had come, to see me, to pay the balance of the money due for my having paid her passage here 3 years ago. She paid me \$84. Neither Socke, Bewanga, Becht, nor Joe were here to-day at work. Was very much displeased at Moliko, for having hidden from me about the broken key of my door, which looks on Satay.

Attendance at Friday Prayer-meeting improved.

Tuesday, Mar. 12. A cloudy & somewhat showery day. Moliko made acknowledgement of his fault of yesterday. And, I found that Ossuga had lied about the key. Socke, with a boil, unable to attend work. Went to the Plateau, & collected \$10., in gold & silver, from each Muia Beaufond & Kenton, for sewing-machines they had gotten from the store, & for which they had given me orders for \$20. each, & in merchandise. Cipanda made me a call, in afternoon, Adande has gone up river, to some funeral ceremonies. Also, Adana-Gorwer made a long call, who would ~~not~~ be up after dark, moon does not rise till late.

Wed. Mar. 13. Bright clear day. Tried to write some; but, did not feel energetic. London came, to see about repairing the "Robbie"; but, I hesitated, at the cost of the job. In afternoon, began to hear Moliko his lessons, 1<sup>st</sup> class 2. P.M. till 3. P.M. Then Geography Class till 4. P.M.

Thursday Mar. 14<sup>th</sup>. A clear bright day. Wrote a letter to you Charles, enclosing a note of welcome to Miss Jessie Green, the lady he is engaged to marry. Am still a little illish, & cold through me. Heard Moloko his lesson from 2. P.M. till about 3. P.M., & then I gave for a half hour, till near 4. P.M. Drangos beginning to ripen, and imperfect fruit falling. Mrs. Henderson came about 6.15 P.M., while I was at supper, to return what I had a cheese-board to loan her, dark night.

Friday Mar. 15<sup>th</sup>. Bright clear day. Rebuked Moloko for being afraid to work in the sun. Argentum here some change from 6. room, one room a week, - to-day the dining-room, - not many people at the storehouse to-day. Wrote a letter to Mrs. Morrison of Freehold. Had "butter-butter" to-day - the first for a very long time.

Saturday Mar. 16<sup>th</sup>. The morning a bright clear day, but in the afternoon, came heavy wind and rain. Wrote a letter to Rev. W. H. Clark, of Park College. A few plantains came, also some paring. A dark cloudy night. The Southern Cross is now visible, above the horizon.

Sabbath Mar. 17<sup>th</sup>. A bright beautiful day. The morning quiet. After church, several men & women came to see me; among the rest, Sjuti, who has not been here for a very long while. She made some weak

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excuses, for absence from Prayer-Meetings <sup>during</sup> for the last 10 months. The afternoons are spoiled, by the drumming and singing in the Oceaga village. Stars very clear this night.

Monday, Mar. 18<sup>th</sup>: Drawings dark; and, about 8. A.M., a cold east wind and rain. I rose with a headache, and it continued all day. Beautifully bright and clear afternoon. Did very little all day, except have Moliks & Igweve their lessons.

Tuesday, Mar. 19<sup>th</sup>: Beautifully clear morning. A French steamer entered, supposed it was from Manilles. Sent mail, & also for mail. Oceaga stayed very long, & at noon came back saying no mail had been handed. After dinner, signs of rain; but, none fell. Sent Oceaga again, & he returned, in an hour, saying there was no mail. I do not believe it, and sent him back. He did not return till 6. P.M., still saying there was no mail. Very much disappointed. But a quantity of plantains to-day.

Wednesday, Mar. 20<sup>th</sup>: The English steamer "Bona" came in, during a heavy rain, which stopped about 9. A.M.; the day cleared beautifully, in afternoon. Mail came, - a letter from Father Belloc at Balangio; one from Rev. Dr. Heer, again stating his determination, & desiring to go to Europe, by way of Liverpool, in steamer "Empire"; also, photo of

Our good a Butie, from French. Change my anxious  
expect - ice sick bed.

Thursday Mar. 21<sup>st</sup>. A clear day, but not very bright. So  
wind "the Bay wonderfully smooth. The "Bona" went  
out, & at the same moment, came in a German  
steamer. Mr. Tildes had come early, to see about  
some articles I had ordered. Sent to H. & C., for  
planks, to begin to complete one of the partition walls  
in the Teacher's house. Munguram came, in morning,  
"out 8. o'clock, to change money; & afterwards sent  
to, Fang man to buy food here. Cleaned out the  
front-house. At supper, Mr. Perriagant left the

table, apparently sick, & died, night,

Friday Mar. 22<sup>nd</sup>. A clear bright day. A French steamer  
supposed to be from Marseilles, coming in, got aground  
on the bar. In the afternoon, the "Bellon" went out to  
try & assist at high tide: but, in vain, & the  
"Bellon" returned, at 6. P.M. Early in afternoon, the  
German steamer went out. And, at about 5. P.M.,  
an English steamer, - supposed to be "Tenniffe", was  
coming in, but anchored, for the night, near the  
grounded steamer. Began to make the com-  
pletion of the divisions in our walls of the teacher's  
house. During these alternate days, I am venturing

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to leave off my trees.

Saturday, Mar. 23<sup>rd</sup>. A clear day. The large French steamer still aground. The "Pelion" went out again, to its assistance. Do not know what has become of the other large steamer that was at anchor last night; - it is not in sight. If it was the "Toussainte" perhaps it went on to Etolo. Anyentzur came late to her housekeeping, & Ovenga had already begun. Oyongano with her lame foot. In the afternoon, found the Bassa "Béa" smoking in work time, he lied about it, till I found him actually setting on his pipe! Dismissed him. In evening, all 5 Bassas & the 2 Fays off without permission. Am annoyed again at Mr. Periniagard allowing the school-boys to destroy my orders about the premises.

Sabbath, Mar. 24<sup>th</sup>. Clear, very warm day. The "Pelion" still working at discharging the stranded steamer on the bar. After church, when Skanda and others came to see me, I gave her, Mrs. Ford's recently-arrived photo. The postmaster sent up my mail, who had been <sup>daughter</sup> landed from the stranded steamer. Good letter from Dean; & good news that the Baumwais wd. probably be back here in April.

Monday, Mar. 25<sup>th</sup>. The stranded French steamer floated in the morning, & came in. Sent for the newspaper portion of its mail; most of what was sent me was for the

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(March, 1895)

Roman Catholic Mission. The "Como" came in, from St Thomas, with mail, etc. I sent for, in afternoon, the teacher, I found one of the school-boys up an orange tree plucking the fruit. I ordered him down, & when he went into the school-room, I followed - sent him away to his village. (I did not know then Mr Perrinjaget had told him to climb the tree; & in the evening, we had a mutual explanation). The Basca "Bau", whom I dismissed on Sat., attempted to walk to day, I paid him off, but he would not take the pay, demanding more; & he left threatening to sue me. Heard there was a meeting at Rabindra today of some of the church-members, about getting a granite-stone for Rev. Truman's grave.

Tuesday, Mar. 26. Showy, in the morning; but, it cleared off during the day. Sent a quantity of oranges to H. A.; after gathering the orange crop. The Basca man Bau, came & took his pay. Another portion of mail, (newspapers) came, in afternoon, from the post-office; & another in the evening, sent a quantity of oranges to W. W. W.'s house, last night.

Wednesday, Mar. 27. A day of showers. Still gathering the orange crop. Sent a box full to Mr. Stohm; - a tin full to Oponds; & later a tin to Kaya; & also some to Oyongomo; & to his cousin. Finished the fruit draft

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of my Sociological letter to Rev. Dr. Dennis. Rainy night,-  
was few at evening-prayers.

Thursday, May 28. A succession of showers all day. Sent  
oranges and medicine to Jessie, - & to George. Still  
wondering whether the "Emirillo" does not return from the  
south, - or whether, possibly, it has passed without  
stopping here. Copying the draft of my letter to Dr. Dennis,  
on Sociology in Mission-work. Two women, from  
Nouma, visited me, - one a Nyangondambo.

Friday, May, 29. Beautifully clear day. Headache all day.  
Finished the letter for Dr. Dennis. In afternoon, my few  
of the workers came. A steamer came in, viz. the English  
"Emirillo", & I got out the boat, & started  
to go off, but turned back, when I saw it was a  
General steamer. Sent a mail to Batato, for Rev. Detcheh  
& to Batanga, for Rev. Ford. Very high tide, - now more.

Saturday, May, 30. A showery day, - very warm, during the morning,  
Oyongomo limped here, to spend the day with her mother.  
The German steamer still in the harbor. In the  
afternoon, Elder Rabinda & Holande came to see me, about  
resuming preaching. I made a condition that Oyili  
& should first make acknowledgement for her visit, in  
talking back home in church, last December. In evening,  
sent Oyongomo home, in the wheelbarrow. Dismissed  
Sepaun from work to-day.

Sabbath March 31: A clear & very warm day. Just before church, I went down to ask about denouncing Communion Day; but, I told him I w<sup>t</sup>. take no part, till Guli had rectified her public insult to me in the church last Sat. After service, after I had left the church & he was in Sab. Sch., he announced what I had said. (He shd. not have done so). She came, after several other visitors, - Seda, Agatze & her mother, - Akande, M. Thomas & others. Guli then acknowledged her wrong & offered to make a public statement next Sat. At 4 P.M., I went to visitation, for funeral of a Frenchman recently from the Islands, who came as passenger <sup>on</sup> the steamer <sup>the</sup> steamer. The steamer also brought news of death of Stegusweng who had been exiled south some months ago, for theft, at time of Arthur-Kikka's marriage.

Monday April 1: A French steamer coming in, very dark clouds sea-wound; but, day cleared hot. Paid all the employes, cutting the wages of many, for their neglect during the month. Mr. Keringagent went to theatesway to get his last box of 6 months ago. Heavy signs of rain. I burned the cut grass on the grass-field, in out of the house. Hanu came to notify of her expected absence, of a few days, at Ovens-Point. It

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Prayer-meeting this evening, the rain so threatening, have been giving out many orange dots we begin to spoil.

Tuesday Apr. 2<sup>d</sup>. Somewhat threatening sky; but, it cleared off, and was a warm day. Found the Basa men had carried food to their working place; I took it, and threw it away. An hour later, they came and laid down their tools, and left my service, - without discussion or quarrel. In afternoon, sent all the remaining rice on the premises, in the boat, with Mr. Perriaguet, & the steamer, for the morning box. After hearing the lecture of Molito & Iguru, - and paying Mrs. Lewis one month's wages, & receiving her Report, - send her in Osaka-Kâkâ's account of affairs at Norita, & went off part of the grass-field front against. Then Mr. Perriaguet returned with his long-wished-for-leave coming; no evening-prayers.

Wednesday Apr. 3<sup>e</sup>. Rainy day. A Fang, Singe, came to work. Put up the boat in boat-house. Bought oupaye fish, got a barrel of table-bricant from H. & C. Bought quantity of iguru. Fired another man, Edambo. Small number of injuring cases, because of the rain. Cleared out the middle room, in the Ford-house. At dinner time, had conversation to Mr. Perriaguet to be do not give his holiday on Wednesday, but this teacher he did not wish to break, & objected, dismissed him.

for falsehood, about some message from Perryman, Henry  
rain'd, at intervals, all day; about 5.30, P.M., a steamer  
seen on the horizon, in the west.

Thursday Apr. 4. The steamer was the French, of a few  
days ago. It brought letter from Mrs. Allegret & Mrs. Quincy,  
of the Ogars; &, from Mrs. Ford, & Mrs. Decker, came letter by  
small boat, from Bata. Rainy day, off & on. The class-  
ingam, Orangefield, working, this one day, for a Japanese  
Primer-book. Wrote a letter to Rev. W. P. White ~~Did~~, Editor  
of "Prob. Faust," Phila do. Oranga working, in Aurora's  
place, to-day. This evening, the "Mer" came in. In  
evening-prayers, I had suddenly to leave, with loose bushy-  
and, going out, discovered I ~~Wakker~~, the Salva, stealing  
oranges, - he fled. And, I found the Salva, Wora, in  
Kira's house, who said ~~Wakker~~ had come in his  
company, a few minutes before.

Friday, Apr. 5. A beautifully bright day. Eliza Boardman  
came, to enquire about her wages from Mrs. Forget, of  
wh. Mr. F. had written me a letter, but we ~~were~~ my enthusiastic  
like, & wh. I c<sup>t</sup> not understand. Went to H. & C<sup>s</sup>, for  
their French-speaking clerk to explain it to me. Went  
to Wäemann's, to get a 1000 f bank note changed. Recd.  
g'd a room over a table-boy, R - i, by name. Letters  
from Mrs. Jacob & Teissier, & from Mr. J., about  
the misconduct of their 4 Salva from Batango,

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two of whom were his church members, Shika from Dr. Leissner. In evening, stand, with the "Christian" & mail from Dr. Marling of Angoumois.

Saturday, Apr. 6<sup>th</sup>. A clear, very warm day. Felt the heat, & have perspired more than any other day. A bunch came for sale, from Cape Estuary people, sent a portion to some of our friends, still gathering oranges. Ango-utyan & Oyongomo came late, just before dinner. In afternoon, sent Dr. Moltko, with Dr. Marling's letter, to Part-piece. Helping Igwee with the analysis of his sermon, for tomorrow. All the kitchen people were busy in cooking, & I made supper very late. In afternoon Fang came, for Beongomo & took her home in the wheelbarrow. Beautiful cedar moonlight. Arrived and another man began work to-day.

Sabbath, Apr. 7<sup>th</sup>. Clear, bright, very warm day. A streaker entering from the south, I had dinner with a headache, & it increased all day. In church, after services, & just before the collection, Igwee read Jieki's confession & apology for her wrong doing to me: and, then, I handed him a short paper, consenting to resume charge of church funds. Was indignant at the goldsmith, Le Ferre, for his loud whispering in church. Dr. Moltko came asking recommendation to some Trading House; but, I refused, as I never give such certificates.

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(April 1895)

Monday, Apr. 8<sup>th</sup> } Sent to H. & C., for cutlery & other  
Tuesday " 9<sup>th</sup> } things, for Rev. Marling, in afternoon. In  
 morning, ~~extortion~~ also had gone to the steamer,  
 "Minneapolis", to assure that the Capt. w<sup>d</sup> stop at Bala,  
 for the Baraka ladies. Took him some oranges. Bought  
 a piece of munga meat, & sent a portion to  
 Ayentyan; but, she was not at home; so I sent  
 it also to her Aunt, old Akande. During the  
 afternoon, I had paid Ngatje, \$11.60, in goods, on the  
 acct. of Rev. Tessiers.

Tuesday a very busy day.

Akande, who had failed, yesterday, to return to  
 Oregon, to-day, said he w<sup>d</sup> go. So I had to hurry  
 with the town-hall papers, & weighing the 2 boxes,  
 for the journey, sent also oranges. Hasted through  
 the station-hall bazaar. Then (before 8), had attended  
 a tailor Johnson's debt to me, for sewing machine,

\$18.;) Sent Johnson oranges. Had business  
 & meeting. Sent Mr. Ward oranges. Closed my  
 letter, for Rev. Marling, at 11. A. M.; but, his car  
 did not get off till 1. P. M. In afternoon, got  
 out "Minnesota", and took Turik & his wife to the  
 "Minneapolis", for them to go to their home at Tombe. Took  
 more oranges, for Capt Smith of the steamer, &  
 leaves and grass, and flowers. Returned, at  
 4. P. M. my man & Harry & Mrs Lewis & Mrs Turner

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waiting for medicine & oranges. Am annoyed at the little children knocking down fruit, the while I am willing to give them on application. Am annoyed at Mr. Pennington being so irregular in school, - going  $\frac{1}{2}$  holidays on Wed., & Sat., & taking excursions at other times also. Beautiful bright night, full moonlight, it very warm, and very busy day.

Wednesday Apr. 10. Still gathering oranges. Many small jobs that kept me from letter-writing. In afternoon, the "Cameo" came in, from St. Horne, with newspaper, but no letters. Oveugai's father & mother visited me. Mr. Voss brought me the bill of the order I made, through H. & C., last Nov., sent more oranges to H. & C., & some for the "Moore", & some to go, by "Moore", to Mr. Marshall at Angon.

Thursday Apr. 11: Dark, cloudy, & somewhat raining day. Spent all morning at running out values of the Bill of Goods & Provisions that Hudson sent me yesterday. At the W.F.M.S., in afternoon, I went in, for a few minutes, and suggested to the women that they come next week, & wash out & clean the church-building. Mrs. Tupper & other women came to see me afterwards, & she remained to tea, a total one, of the birth of Alidie's child. Some ten of the school-children came to ask for cocoanuts; & I went with them, & Thomas Lewis gathered 2 dozen nuts.

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Friday Apr. 12<sup>th</sup>. Sent to Mr. Ward, for the boxes &c of the last Nov. order of goods &c. He came to see me, about some items of the bill. Each day, I pick over all the oranges that have been gathered, & wh. are spread out on the floor of the provision cellar, & find a  $\frac{1}{2}$  bushel of spoiled ones, and about a dozen spoiled ones. Opened the box of Augustynis clothing, wh. she had ordered last Nov. Wrote a short note and memo of acts, to send by "Moore" tomorrow, with a small mail to Mr. Marling.

Sat. Apr. 13<sup>th</sup>. Cloudy in morning, but cleared by noon.

Showed Augustyn the goods, wh. had arrived for her, from England, - very good quality. The "Moore" finally started up river, about 7.30 A.M., dark rain coming.

Sabbath Apr. 14<sup>th</sup>. A notable day! A bright clear day. Took no notice of it as Easter. Resumed preaching after

more than 3 months' repose. Began again, now that the churchgoers are quieting down. Preached in Nyengen, from 1. Cor. 2.1, last clause. Conducted Sab. School. Several teachers absent, & their classes. Two of them were, Juli & Lucia. After church, Augustyn, Mandala, & Oyongwo took launch &c. in afternoon, preached from 1. Cor. 2.2, last clause.

In evening, I gave preached. Very dark night; cloudy & signs of rain. Thanks to God, for opening the way again, ~~the way again~~ to the hearts of the people of this church.

Monday Apr. 15: Clear, during morning; but, raining in afternoon. Very unsatisfactory work of Amiva and the other two young men. Wrote letter to niece Belle Dawson. In afternoon, a Faxy, from near the Commissary House, came to see, to ask me to help him buy one of his people, who was dead! He if the mission was to feed & clothe & bury all these idle people! The fat woman, Alida, from Akanda's village, came to beg for medicine: she is fully able to buy, and I refused. Oyongens again able to come to school, though she still limps. Planning for an Excursion, school-children, on Wed., across the river. At morning Prayer-meeting, Igwe, at my suggestion, had asked the other natives to leave and Lucia had consented. A pleasant meeting.

Tuesday, Apr. 16: A bright warm day. Sat out the "Lafayette" for tomorrow's proposed excursion, for the school. Contained in a letter to niece Belle, & Dr Dawson. In afternoon, discussed the new employee, Fox, brother of Khawangs. A very pleasing incident, - the coming of Mbang, to congratulate me on my resuming preaching, & her encouraging words. Getting things ready for the ~~journey~~, - food &c.

Wed., Apr. 17: The weather dubious; but, started promptly, after an early breakfast. At 7.20 A.M., went to the pier, having sent everything in advance. Mrs Lewis & Hazelton were waiting; but, only 10 school children had come. These

& the company embarked in the "Lafayette", and were off by 7.35 A.M. Very warm. Fierce wind, northward. Dark clouds on the horizon. I watched the boat at intervals, till 9.30, - at which time it had not yet reached the other side. Finished letter to Dr. Easwar, Attyuanadka called to see me. Rain in afternoon, & at Inguru class time, after the meeting, brought the members to this house, showed them pictures, gave them music on my mandoline, & oranges. Storm increased: I felt anxious lest the company should attempt to return in the storm. At that moment of writing, 8.30 P.M., they have not arrived, & I hope they determined to spend the night with Rai Dennis.

Thursday Apr. 18<sup>th</sup>. I had just written those words last night, when, my ears, who had been nervously attentive all the evening, heard the crew voices at the pier! I hastened with a lantern (the rain was almost done), & found the company just landed on the pier, all wet and cold.. I was annoyed at their having attempted to return. Started the boys off, each with a burden, - went with the light with me and a lamp, as far as the boat-house, - heard from them part of the story of the crew's miserable neglect, & Jack's inefficiency. Mr. Perijagab went to the house, with the remainder of the boys, & I stayed on shore, while the crew fixed the boat; & then, when I wrote the

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He was done, sent him back, to bring the sails he had left in the boat. Then, I went <sup>to</sup> Augustin, to understand the facts exactly. The exonerated Steele, but blamed several of the crew. Returned, & found Mr. J. had not eaten! Got him some food, and returned at 11. P.M., exceedingly annoyed at the disastrous journey. This morning, the German steamer came in, sent off the "Lafayette", supposing Mr. Ford was on board, & expecting also Mr. & Mrs. Roberts, and began to prepare a room. But, no one came. Put the "Lafayette" into the boat-house, at 11. A.M. Bucknell lent me 8 or ten Taungs, to help. In afternoon, came a letter from sister Beatilla, copying Prebley's minutes, for Sneed. I gave her time to copy his lecture, though he was only a passenger yesterday, & had done no work. Eight of the baptized children came, on my invitation, for prayer and conversation. German steamer went out, clear cool air, etc.

Friday Apr. 19<sup>th</sup>. Eight of the church women were promptly on hand, at morning prayers, ready for the annual church-cleaning, and 16 others came at intervals, so that, by noon, there were 2 dozen. They went to work busily, with aid of 3 men, who carried water, to carry out furniture, - take up matting, and scrub, and wash walls and windows. & benches. Clear warm day. I finished copying Prebley's minutes for Sneed. Had expected Augustin to aid me, in planning for the noon-meal of the women, but when she

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did come, she went to work with the women, & aided me, at the last, only in the distribution of the food, - I provided 4 lbs. Irish Stew, 4 lbs Mutton & tea dried fish, 60 hard biscuits, 50 plantain fingers, 1 bread-pudding, 3 lbs Rice, 2 tins condensed milk, 1 lb sugar, 2 udika gravy, and tea. In afternoon, ~~the~~ some of the women remained, and put back the furniture & matting again, - and Rapoonda washed up all the dishes, & I had Session-meeting, from 2. P.M. to 5 P.M., Discipline 3, record 3, deferred 3. A busy day. Am tired tonight.

Sat. Apr. 20<sup>th</sup>. Clear, bright day. Did not sit down, even for 5 minutes, to read newspaper or novelties, from 7.30 A.M. to 12. noon. A great many little jobs, - finishing up of odds & ends. No mail steamer, - two due, the French & the English.. Augustin & Oyongos came late, for the usual Sat. 7 mending, Preparatory Service at 3. P.M., and, at its close, at 4. P.M., <sup>had</sup> adjourned Session-meeting, from yesterday, till 4.45 P.M. Sent 2 letters to the post-office, for Dr. Easman & niece Belle Easman. Bought a fine lot of plantains, to-day. At this present moment (8. P.M.) I hear the whistle of the "Mure", returning from up the river.

Sabbath, Apr. 21<sup>st</sup>, clear, warm day, Ovenga absent all day. I rang bells myself. The Sab. Sch. a little larger than last Sab. Lucira, who I thought had deserted

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Last Sabbath, was in her place & teaching. A few letters were sent up from the "line", from Mr. & Mrs. Masling. At 3 P.M., the Communion Table: many absentees, a but few spectators. But, the Services were pleasant, a little over 3 hours. By baptism, - 2 adult women, Lydia, Teko, & Ya. I preached also in the evening. A very quiet day, in the villages. Very quiet evening & no wind.

Monday Apr. 22. Clear, warm day. A French steamer, from north, came in, with a very small mail. Augustin came to get the \$10., Mr. Allegret had ordered on Augustin's acct., for Abidi, and also, to show our Augusta Boardman letter of offer of marriage, - wh. she has no desire to accept. The very first thing in the morning, I had sharply rebuked Kajander, for leaving the gruelings of the coffee till it was actually needed for breakfast. And, then, I rebuked Ongor, whose fault it was. He left, without saying anything to me, & did not appear all day. At 8 P.M., in the afternoon, I suspected Kete of hiding something under his coat, and asked him about it, but did not actually accuse him. He, too, left without saying anything to me. So, I suppose the two have left me. Wrote to mean forget & Allegret, in the Ogowe.

Tuesday, Apr. 23. An English steamer came in, wh. I supposed was from north, & would <sup>have on board</sup> Mr. Ford and perhaps Mr. & Mrs. Roberts. Sent off the "Minnesota".

but it returned empty the steamer being the "Boma," from the coast, A letter from Dr. Siméon of Rongo, asking for further seeds. Ovenga returned to work. But, Socke is still away. Near noon, a stranger, who gave his name as "Woodcock", of Rev. Simpson's Alliance Mission in the Congo, made a call, & stayed to dinner. He left, in a hurry, at 1. P.M. At the steamer's guns, I gave him oranges and flowers. But, the steamer did not leave till near four o'clock. Aurora, covered with small-pox, came to the foot of the steps today, to get us pray! I sent him away in a hurry. Wrote after 6 hours Forget, Allegret, and Seccius. Very heavy wind and rain, at 6.30, P.M. A native man, whom I did not know, came to see Mr. Pennington. Also a Rapondi, looking <sup>at</sup> the stereopticon.

Wednesday Apr. 24<sup>th</sup>. Clear, warm day. The English steamer, of yesterday, was discovered at anchor, on the other side of the river (for what reason, I do not know) & it did not finally leave till 7.30 A.M. The German steamer, of last week, came in. Socke was at prayers, but did not come to work. I began stock-taking at 8. A.M., at 10. A.M. I rested a while, & Socke came to settle about the difficulty of Monday, - and he began work again. While we were at dinner, came Mr. H. Neihue, of Mayumba, of Bp. Taylor's late Mambé Mission;

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and, when he left at 2 P.M., I sent oranges and flowers with him. Went to H. & C's, to inquire about the movements of the "Möre". Large audience at Duging Blar. Was annoyed at little children, whom I had given permission to pick peppers on certain bushes, stealing from bushes I had not permitted. Stars very clear to-night.

Thursday Apr. 25<sup>th</sup>. Stormy in morning; but, it cleared off by noon. German steamer had hesitated to go out last night. It went out this morning. At the stock-taking all day. Was very tired. Stugutiger, Ogoune, & Ingundel's sister Augutiger, called at tea-time, & at 4 P.M., Capt. Buene & engineer Whitchy called, & spent the evening.

Friday Apr. 26<sup>th</sup> { The English steamer "Kubla" was seen  
Sat. 7 " 27<sup>th</sup> } coming in. Sent off the "Minnesota", & it returned with Mr. Ford. He reported <sup>that</sup> a Mr. & Mrs. Biggs, Kongo missionaries, were on board. When he returned to the steamer, I asked him to bring the strangers with him; he did so. Also, had the "Evangeline" boat. I dropped work, & devoted myself to my guests. At 4 P.M., they returned to the steamer; but, finding it was not going, returned here for the night. Music singing, with Mr. Biggs at Mr. Perring's little harmonium. Sat up till after 11 P.M., talking business with Mr. Ford. On Sat. 7<sup>th</sup> A. M. rose tired & sleepy. Had gathered plants and flowers

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and oranges for the Biggs; and, to-day, added more plants, & oranges for the ship's doctor, Dr. McBride. Resumed work in the storehouse, at stock-taking. Payantyam came, for his usual week's mending. Busy, in afternoon, at my sermons. Mr. Ford away at the Plateau. The Biggs had gone at 9. A.M.; but, the steamer did not leave till 11. A.M. Dark night, bright distant lightning.

Sabbath April 28<sup>th</sup> } Clear bright day. Preached, Impugne in  
Monday " 29<sup>th</sup> } morning. Increase in Sab. Sch. Preached English, in afternoon. Small audience, caused by sign of rain, wh. came heavily during service. Mr. Penningagent sick. Mr. Ford taught in his place. On Monday, threatening rain, wh. came heavily about 6. P.M., Mr. Ford at the Plateau; I at the store, taking stock & finished the enumeration of the 2 stores, "a few items still remaining outside." Cold rain. A pleasant Prayer-meeting, in evening.

Tuesday Apr 30<sup>th</sup>. Threatening weather; but, Mr. Ford went on with his arrangements for his journey to Angon, & I with completing the packing of boxes to go Sab. Morning. An early dinner was prepared for Mr. Ford; but, he did not actually get away from the pier till near 1. P.M., wind and tide against him. Also, in afternoon, sky eastward looked very threatening; but, it cleared at night. I spent the afternoon editing up acct. Was very much annoyed & surprised at Mr. Penningagent's impropriety, in trying to employ me of

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my servants to catch butterflies for him.

Wednesday May 1<sup>st</sup>. A clear morning, but showery afternoon. Paid almost all the employees, promised Bwanga for stealing oranges, - I discovered him in a remarkable way, seeing the end of a bamboo move, across the line of sight of a window, among the branches of an orange tree. Investigated stealing of breadfruit, on Sabbath, by Ovenga & Kapandi, a finer than . All acts still, in the afternoon. And singing class at 3 P.M., Paid Mr. Pennigagnet his monthly salary. Rain in evening, which prevented people from coming to Prayer-Meeting.

Thursday May 2<sup>nd</sup>. A clear, bright day. Went to Halton & Cookson's, to enquire about the document, wh. the Govt. sent on Tuesday, in reference to our mission premises and taxes. Mr. Hudson had gone on "Nôre", to Ogowe. Mr. Fildes sent Mrs. Richault up, in afternoon, to explain for me. The Bassa boy came to return to work, but I did not receive him, as he had deserted a month ago, with the other Bassas. All day at office, running out values on the stock-list.

Friday May 3<sup>rd</sup>. Clear, warm day. Went to Plateau, & obtained the 1250 francs subscription, from the Govt., for the School. Busy all day, at counting up stock values. Sent to H. & C., & brought a hundred 50 cases of Kerosene recently rec'd. to me. Beautiful moonlight night.

Saturday May 4<sup>th</sup>. A clear morning, but rained somewhat in the afternoon. Mr. Ford's crew returned, in the "Christine",

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leaving Mr. Ford, with the "Evangeline", at Augon., busy all day at Accts., transcribing Stock from my memorandum of last week. Augentum co. not come till late in afternoon, but the sent her Fany man for food; I was vexed at his stupidity, she remained to tea. Spent, in the evening, at Mr. Perrin-jacques' music-pupil lessons in his room.

Sabbath May 5<sup>th</sup>. Clear, quiet day. Good attendance in morning, but very few at afternoon English, monthly concert at night, about 500.

Monday 6<sup>th</sup>. Dry season mist! The first. But, by 9. A.M., it turned to rain. Very threatening clouds east, but there was no storm, - only rain at intervals all day, till it cleared at 4. P.M. Most beautiful moonlight.

Pleasant incident, for wh. I thank God: - Yesterday I was disengaged, & thought the small attendance was personally against me; then, this morning, the mother of the young man Willie, whom I buried a year ago, & she a former church-member, came to say she wanted to return to the church. I was encouraged! Tempted, at evening prayer-meeting, I was looking over the difficulties against me here, & my feeling had again fallen. On emerging from meeting, Mrs. Léonie a Belgian protest., who I had felt were against us, stayed to finally, & Léonie told me of her husband removing his name from our premises, & I spoke about her little daughter Béa. I had thought of writing to the Board w. A

would give up the work here. But I will not write it now.

Tuesday May 7. Cool weather resembling Dry Season, At acite all day, adding up columns. People coming to beg for bread-fruit. Engaged Elder Adande to reconnoitre his work of Bible-reading & arranged for him and licentiate Igware to make short journeys for Friday-meetings at twice a week. Very beautifully clear sun-light night.

Wednesday May 8. Completed the footing up of all the columns of figures of the Inventory of Goods on hand in the Mission Store. Distributed a number of breadfruit to several of my female friends, Ngwedonge and her daughter Ogukka, and Ifalo, called to see me. In afternoon, Agauji & Isalamb took advantage of my being in class, to go off on a bathing. I took away & hid their cutlasses, while they were absent, so that they did not work. Beautifully clear afternoon. Rainy night. Mr. Periniagaut consulted me about his planning for marriage.

Thursday May 9. Went to H. & Co's, and paid some of the bills I was owing there. Did not feel energetic, and did but little work to-day. The W. F. M. S. had its meeting, and some of its members came to see me, at its close. They and other women asking for bread-fruit. My headache increased. The "mōne" came from Ogone. Igware

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began today his weekly iterations, with Elder Adams. Fine clear moonlight night.

Friday May 10. A clear fine day. Tried to commence writing letters, but had a great many interruptions, from people coming for medicine & bread-fruit. Am annoyed at the number of applications from all sorts of people; Adams & Green returned with their report from Noura. Augustyn will make complaint to Mr. Perrinjaguet, against some unjust doings of his toward Oyongoro. My headache of yesterday is not gone yet. Was very much annoyed, just before supper, at Sotki's deceiving me about the number of bread-fruit he was gathering for him self. The school-boys asked for coco-nuts, & I allowed 2 to climb and gather over 40, 25 of wh. I gave to them. The incident of little Marie ~~going~~ with disappointment, and I gave her one.

Saturday May 11 } Mr. Ford returned from Angon, unexpectedly,  
Sabt. " 12 } and fatigued with exposure to the last  
Monday " 13 } night's storm. Preparation for Sabbath. I

was very tired, and went to bed early. Sabbath was clear and warm. I enjoyed my morning and afternoon Services, Sab. Sch. also was a larger attendance than usual. Mr. Perrinjaguet had been sick on Sat'y, but was well again. On Monday, after store hours, began with Dr. Ford the examination of my acet., &

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Kept at it all day, till 5. P.M., with various interruptions, from the carpenter, Mr. Sandy, coming to see about repairing the "Rabbie"; and Mr. Rapato, coming for cloth, for a suit for Mr. Strohm; & and women coming for oranges and bread-fruit. Made good progress in my acct.

In the afternoon, Mr. Schimpff, of Finisit & Co., and the French pharmacist came, ex Committee, to invite me to Music & a Lottery, for the Society of the Women of France, for the wounded in War.

Tuesday, May 14<sup>th</sup>. Started Mr. Sandy on the repair of the "Rabbie". Mr. Ford still on my acct. He had been to the Plateau, in the morning, and had found that the Governor had not rec'd some documents he had left with me to send, some 2 weeks ago, and wh. I had promptly sent by Ovenga. Called Ovenga to account, who asserted he had delivered it to a subordinate clerk. Bade him to be ready to go with Mr. Ford in afternoon, to investigate the matter; but, he did not come all the afternoon. Contined the acct. with Mr. Ford, and found some errors. Dark night, Mr. Periniaguet led evening-prayer, and read the psalms very poorly.

Wednesday, May 15<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Ford went to the Plateau with Ovenga, to continue the investigation of yesterday. I went to Mr. Periniaguet, about the matter of last Friday, in regard to Oyongoro. He did not accept my rebuke; and

I left the room in anger. He remained in his room, & w<sup>t</sup> not teach school, nor w<sup>t</sup> come to his meals. He did not come to Prayer Meeting; & after service, I found a letter on my table, saying he thought he better leave Banaka. Had a consultation with Mr. Ford on the subject, sat up late, trying to close my acts.

Thursday May 16. After my 8. a.m. payment, at no store, Mr. Ford called for Mr. Ferriaggen, & we spent more than 2 hours in the study, going over the difficulties of yesterday. The result was not very satisfactory, I made no retraction, & Mr. P. still justified himself. He held no school in the morning. In the afternoon I went to pay H. a C. a large bill & Mr. Hudson had a long while to arrange, a while doing so, there came a R.C. friend, for whom Mr. H. left me & stayed so long with him in another room that I began to put my money together at ~~the~~ 6 o'clock away, while this occupied, Mr. H. came back, & saw he had erred in courtesy to me, he then attended to me. Mr. Ford has almost completed my acts, my personal act is finished, & I am some \$120. in debt. Mr. P. came to dinner and to supper.

Friday May 17. A bright clear day, until about 6. P.M., when it began to rain. Sent many oranges & breadfruit to the villages, to my female friends. And a box of oranges to Mr.

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Stotius, Adande & Igoue reported their itinerations to Sebange & Lalala. Mr. Ford started to go to the Guard-ship Hospital, to see sick Mr. Johnson, clerk of N. & C., & found he was well & at work again ashore. Mr. F. finished finally my acts for the year 1894-95 (May 1). Looking for an English and a French steamer.

Sat. May 18. Some final settlements with Mr. Ford.

Augantywe came, on her usual Saty mending and sweeping. Proposed to Mr. F. that he question her, on the matter of her complaint against Mr. Perruq'agae; but, he preferred not to continue the subject. At dinner-time, I spread plates also for her and Oyongano. But, she declined to come. plenty of plantains and cassava. At 3 P.M., she left, to prepare to go to the Plateau music. I went at 3.30 P.M. At the Garden, the music of the R.C. boys instrumental band. Herde our contribution of \$1.00 to the object of the Fair, but refused to join in the Lottery. Queen Kien deon Bonfond left at 5.30 P.M., - a small affair musically, a far the aid of the war in Madagascar, for which I have no sympathy.

Sabbath, May 19. A clear day of Sabbath. Igoue spoke, in Monday, ... 2<sup>o</sup> the morning. Mr. Ford went to Noruba, to hold a meeting, and returned in time for dinner late, but with a headache, so that he did not

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attend afternoon English Service; but was present at morning Service, but had to leave, sick. In the morning, a French steamer, from South, had entered the harbor. I thought Mrs. Allegret & Jeising might be on board; but, as there was no one come ashore, I assumed they had not yet left the Agave. On Tuesday May 21., another French steamer also entered, from the north. Mr. Ford was sick, and did not start to Angou, in afternoon, came a recruit for the Agave, a Mr. Haug<sup>2</sup> also, after making a short visit, left for the steamer, with Mr. Pennington, missing his chance to return to the steamer, he came back here to tea a for the night. Mr. Ford being sick in bed, I did not go to prayer meeting. Mission letter came, cutting down our Estimates. Mary came from the Treasurer of the Fair Society, to pay Mrs. Allegret acc<sup>2</sup> with me. And, a letter from Mary, telling of her having left Worcester, in the removal of Mr. Ford to Dorne St. J.

Tuesday, May 21. A clear warm day. The English steamer "Bengala" came in. A mail by it. Mr. Ford still sick, sent for the French doctor. Started the "Evangelie", and stayed with his crew back to Angou. The French steamer for the Agave, Mons. Haug<sup>2</sup>, returned to his steamer, which went on south, in the afternoon. Mr. Ford is better now. Dark night, and heavy wind.

Wednesday May 22. A rainy day. At the storehouse, at 8. A.M., Malombra had sent John for thread, - John got the wrong kind, & Malombra came & demanded I should take it back. - I w<sup>t</sup>. not do, as I was done, told him to leave the house. He would not, & pushed him out; & then he seized the door to prevent me shutting it. We had a struggle. I closed & locked the door. And he remained in the yard a while, cursing me. Agertyan came, on his week's work, & prepared part of the room, for Mrs. Gauntt, who came, on the German steamer. Akera-subumba began to come to begin class. Very small number at Prayer Meeting.

Thursday, May 23. A rainy day, at intervals. A French vessel, "Ville du Maranhao", came in, from the south, having been at Madagascar. Mrs. Gaultt was at the storehouse, to make purchases, in the morning. Made change in Mrs. Gaultt's room, for Harry; putting up the crib, in wh. Harry had formerly slept, & with Mary's little mosquito-net. In the afternoon, when looking after the workers, found that Tere was off, stealing palm-nuts on our premises. I called to him, he heard me, for he stopped cutting, but he, being hidden in the bushes, did not answer, or come. I sent Goke for him, & took away his outlay, and dismissed him. He begged to stay, - but, I have had so much trouble with stealing & I w<sup>t</sup>. not relent. At 4.50,

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went, with Mrs. Gault and Harry, to call on Miss May 16.  
Kingsley, an English scientist, at Walton and Cookson.

Tuesday May 24' } The 24<sup>th</sup> a rainy day. Early, in afternoon,  
Wednesday " 25' } there suddenly came Rev. Allegut and Rob.  
Thursday " 26' } Stevens. They had arrived by French steamer,  
2 days ago, & had been unable to get a boat to  
bring them ashore. They spent the afternoon at closing  
acts with Mr. Ford and myself: and, at 5.30 P.M., the  
rain having ceased, they went, in our "Minnesota", back  
to the steamer. On Sat. A.M., Mr. Ford, with Mrs. Gault,  
went to steamer, to visit Rev. Allegut & Rev. Stevens.  
Mr. Ford, on returning, went to the chief of Police, and obtained  
Eisengas release, - seized last Sabbath by the soldiers.  
Hauptmann here, at her work, & Oyongens staying to play  
with Harry Gault.

On Sabbath, a bright clear day.  
Both Mr. Ford and Mrs. Pennington unable to be present  
at Sch. Schol. Several vacancies in the teachers. A  
pleasant profitable day.

Monday May 27<sup>th</sup>. A clear day & in afternoon bright. Mr. Ford delayed  
his journey to Angon, in order to take along Rev. Macleod's  
goods, wh. were still in Custom House. The steamer for  
St. Thomas came in, in afternoon, the Portuguese mail, & a  
letter from Belvidere N.Y. from May. The "avis" came from George.  
Was displeased at noon, with Oyongens visiting here,  
instead of promptly going home to her mother. Was also

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annoyed at Boge's stupidity, in endeavoring to run over  
he did not understand, felt foolish; ate no supper, nor  
went to Prayer-Meeting.

Tuesday May 28. A day-Season day, but clear, walking in  
Mr. Ford's planting, waiting for Mr. MacLain's goods. He  
finally got off, about 4. P.M., Oto di, one of the crew,  
failed to go with him, ran well again to day.  
Very quiet this night, - no noise in town, nor on the  
picnics, and Mr. Peinjaget, & Mrs. Gaull and Nancy  
retired early.

Wednesday May 29. Vanoss job prevented me writing letter to  
America. A French steamer in the harbor, two mislaid  
letters of Mr. MacLain came from the post-office. Real day-  
Season wind. In afternoon, felt some foolishness, - the return  
from Monday, Mrs. Gaull went shopping to Holtz, &  
while she was away, Miss Kingsley came to call  
on her. Had a nice fancy shopping session.

Thursday May 30. Had headache all day. Wrote a letter to  
Mrs. Ogden, in the morning, Mrs. Gaull went to one  
of the Women's Prayer-Meetings, taking with her  
Miss Kingsley. Sent invitations to Mr. Hudson & Miss Kingsley  
for dinner to-morrow evening. Capt. Barnes & wife likely  
called in the evening.

Friday May 31  
Saturday .. 1<sup>st</sup>  
Sabbath .. 2<sup>nd</sup>  
Monday .. 3<sup>rd</sup>

Was occupied, most of the day, in  
preparation for the Feast in the

Saturday.

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Evening of Friday. Mrs Faubt assisted, in directing the cork; and Augustus came, about 5.0. P.M., to receive her, when it was time for her to receive the guests, who came shortly before 6.0. Had an ample table, and cut the second of the 2 fruit-cakes Capt. Hall sent me for present last Saturday. Augustus waited on table. George has gone away, without notice, & I employed, for the occasion, Tom, a free-slave of Raphaël. At second table, I told Augustus to call in its other assistants, & they feasted too. George, a great music on the mandoline, and on the flute, & intended the guitar, - but the strings were broken.

On Saturday, still had headache, - it was gone. Drank a quantity of tepid water, vomited; but, no bile. Felt better in evening, & though weak, had singing, receiving the Exercise directed a few months ago. Six men, & one lady there, besides Mrs Faubt.

On Sabbath, I was up in morning, and I in afternoon. Miss Digby was present. Martha Corcoran, in the evening.

Monday. A French mail had come in yesterday. And the "Julia" came in to day. Went up to it, Capt. Cawthron, the doctor McBrige, steamer was not going to Batangas, so we think stay, probably for 3 weeks yet. Mr Peirce, going changing school house & dissatisfaction, some of the wackiness continuing.

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Tuesday June 4) made no entry on Tuesday, the "Noire".  
Wednesday "5" did not start up 5 P.M., as it had in-  
Thursday "6" tended. Do not remember distinctly the  
events of Wed.. Was too tired, after Prayer-Meeting, to  
make entry here. Many women have come these days,  
or water-medicine; and I have given away many  
blood-fruit to them, was much annoyed, during the  
noon in afternoon Singing-Class, by the sign manual  
ignorance of the Class Teacher, & by people waiting  
outside, who wanted spades, with <sup>6</sup> a. to bury some  
one who had died. To-day<sup>6</sup> the "Noire" finally  
started at 10. A.M., Have been annoyed all day, by  
various misdeeds & faults of my employees and the  
school-boys; - Rapandise in the morning, - Carpenter Samson,-  
the little school-children persisting in remaining absent  
after school, while some older ones used to be given  
coco-nut, and Ejanga, Bajedje, Stata, trespassing on  
my bananas. Auyentym with Oyongemo here to do  
as her usual house-cleaning.

Friday June 7. A bright clear day. Had headache. Sent Socke  
to Plateau, to get fish, & a jombe, for his fault.  
Did not feel like writing letters, went down to the beach,  
to see how the French-expedition was coming on with his  
work. After school, gave coco-nut and breadfruit  
to the school-children. Evening fall, or Bouga, with 2nd fruit.

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Saturday June 8<sup>th</sup>  
 Sabbath " 9<sup>th</sup>  
 Monday " 10<sup>th</sup>  
 Tuesday " 11<sup>th</sup>  
 Wednesday " 12<sup>th</sup>
}
 did not feel well on Saturday; in afternoon, had a disposition to chill; but, it passed away, & had a good English-leisure, in the evening, with the ladies alone going home.

Wednesday, felt better; a clear, beautiful day. Preached in morning and <sup>afternoon</sup> reading <sup>reading</sup>. Got up late at night, finishing <sup>reading</sup> Marion Monroe's "Royal Road".

Monday, did not feel well again; and, in afternoon, chills. Could not attend Prayer-Meeting in evening.

Tuesday, rose with nausea, vomited several times, in morning. Did no work. Mrs Gaull had her meeting & singing with the women, in afternoon. Felt better, in evening.

Wednesday, well again; but, weak. In afternoon, about 4 P.M., immediately after dinner-time, went off to the "Teneriffe", who had just arrived, from north. A bundle of letters for Mr. Ford. On the Teneriffe were 3 American male missionaries going to the Kongs, for the "Alliance".

Thursday, June 13<sup>th</sup>. Am well again, except that I do not feel like writing letter, which ought to be written. Went back to the plateau, to buy fish; but, causes come no longer, as the Govt. & compels the fishermen to sell at too high a price. The 2 streams, yesterday went out late this evening. Mrs Erny was here, all morning, preparing for Mrs Gaull. Hayenburger also

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here, with Ayongwe & Leucia's daughter Ogundaga. Had them all to dinner and supper. Had friend read native pudding, for dinner. In afternoon, after 5 P.M., complained to police against Ngwanga's throwing the sweepings of his kitchen on my premises. In evening, a game of tagore-dohi, with Mrs. Gaunt & Ayungun.

Friday, June 14<sup>th</sup> } Made no entry on Friday.

Saturday, " 15<sup>th</sup> } Sat'y, the usual service of Ayungun.

Sabbath, " 16<sup>th</sup> } Little Ogundaga, Leucia's daughter, is visiting

Ayungun & comes here with her, & is at my table. Have not felt energetic for work. Mr. Remondgeet becoming more & more absent from table, with small picknickers, - no fever, indigestion & dyspepsia, - result of his earlygine eating when he arrived here last Oct. A good English-service, on Sat'y night, with increased attendance.

Sabbath a beautifully clear day, & quiet, no dreams, & good, though not large attendance. Preached, in afternoon and evening.

Monday, June 17<sup>th</sup>. Clear, bright, cool day. Wrote a letter to Miss E. T. Moore, the Newark, N. J. Fensmire Co.

In the afternoon, did not feel energetic, read some papers. Mrs. Gaunt slightly feverish, A very small number, at evening. Prayer-meeting. Clear starlight night.

Tuesday, June 18<sup>th</sup> } On Tuesday, the Marcellus steamer came in,  
Wednesday, " 19<sup>th</sup> } and a mail. A letter from Miss Jessie Green,

to whom son Charles is engaged to be married. Went to May, & to Mrs. Todd, on Wed'y, lost the best time for writing, by spending 2 hours, in the morning, in the store-house, looking over Porcelain. Bought Fowls, & a quantity of fish. Mrs. East was not quite well yesterday, but better to-day, small attendance at Prayer meetings.

Thursday, June 20<sup>th</sup>. Sent mail for Marseilles steamer, as the boat was to leave at 11 A.M. At 9. A.M., went to the creek, to the boat-house; dissatisfied with the long expensive job Sandy was making of the mending of the "Rabbie"; At 10. A.M., came 5 men, from Neugenoorge, from Mr. Ford, with news of birth of Mr. Marling little daughter, on the 10<sup>th</sup>. Handed, a bag of the Bailey & Oat-meal they wanted for his marlins, & Mr. M's mail, and started them back again.

At 1.30 P.M., with all the men, went and charged the places of the boats, and told Sandy to stop work. Tomel Adams & Agauji were absent from their work, and charged to me for the 1<sup>st</sup> day. At 3. P.M., found Mr. F. & his men had not yet gone. All three away now make me feel feverish, & I had no appetite for supper.

Friday, June 21<sup>st</sup>. At 7. A.M., a steamer was seen coming in by 7.30; it was recognised as an English, or the "Benguela". I went off, & inquired of Capt Everfield what time the vessel would leave for La Tanga; Mr. East, a passenger from the south;

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the Steamer "Tome" of my journal on "Benguela", in June 1891,  
Two German missionaries from Cameroun, whom I visited  
to go ashore, - also 2 Frenchmen on the Kongo. The two  
Germans stayed to dinner. Little Ogandaga, child of Lurina,  
crying, because she did not wish to return to her mother's  
house. Augustynus saying for his health.

Sat. June 22 } Augustynus here again, finishing his faults  
Sabbath " 23 } dinner, late P.M. In afternoon, gathering together  
the boxes sent him & for the steamer, and plants, & other things.  
At 3 P.M., sent back a the men, to pack up the "Evangelists",  
which was too small, & got out the "Minnesota". At 3.30,  
it can be send down the boxes, & and, at 4.15, started  
down for the pier, with his faults & Harry, & Mr. Enright  
On the way, met a messenger, from H.A.C., bidding us  
hurry. By appointment, Augustynus went as on the  
pier, the waiting to see the "Benguela" we had journeyed  
on, in April 1870, to Liverpool. On the pier, Mr. Whitaker,  
a clerk of H.A.C., acted passage for himself & boxes, as  
he saw the H.A.C.'s boats were slow in getting ready.  
Started, at 4.30. When half-way to the steamer, it whistled  
& fired its gun. We saw the steamer's boats being  
hoisted on board, & we hastened, & were there by 5. P.M.  
Mr. Whitaker, & his faults, Harry & Augustynus descended, &  
remained, to pack up the many boxes, when about  
half were packed up, James Fothergill's boat, with a freight

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passenger, from Hail's, Mr. Champion. My boat had to get out of the way; so that, when I got aboard, it was just 5.15. The Capt., Everard, was very angry at the delay of H.A.C.S., & vented his anger on me, saying he would not stop at Batanga. I saw to our Agent's arrangements, in the saloon; - the Steward Toner, & Purser Fothergill were polite; but, the Capt. told me to leave, as he wanted to take up anchor a hour before H.A.C.S. & boat could reach him. I left, with the 2. Customs Officer, & instantly the steamer started, & refused to take the goods from H.A.C.S. boats. Brought 2 boxes ashore, for Miss Kingley's & Co. & pp., usual English singing. And Adjutzini stayed, with Cengano & Ogundaga, to finish some sewing.

Sabbath. Weather lowering. Moral Services, just near close of Sab. Sch. a woman, - the slave Njaco, I think, came into the ch., shrieking, & screaming, there was much excitement, - and many people went out, the Services were broken up. It was outrageous. Then, we heard that Elder Rabindra was dead. In the afternoon, came men to dig the grave. Went to Rabindra's house, to arrange with his daughter, Sona, about the time of the funeral. Moral afternoon English Service. After evening Service, the Permit to bury was given me, for 6.30 of Monday morning. While hunting, have been much annoyed

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by the order of tobacco, wh. I suspect, comes from Mr. Perre-jacquet's room.

Monday June 24. Was up, and ready for the burial service for 6.30 A.M., but, the grave was not finished being dug. Took a slight breakfast, & had the bell tolled, at 7. o'clock; and, shortly afterward, the corpse was brought. The Mission wagon had been asked for, but I refused: I am wearied with the dependence of this people on Mission-aid, especially as there were numerous slaves who c<sup>o</sup> carry the coffin here. The corpse, evidently, was decomposed; for, the odor of the coffin was offensive. All was finished by 8. A.M., when the bell was rung for opening storehouse, — none came to buy or sell. No one of my people work, except the 2 Fang, and R.—.

Spent the day in reading the records of the Tabernacle, from 1843 to 1871 (when it was changed from a Congregational ch. to a Presbyterian), to gather information about Rabinda's life. A sad record! After a ch.-membership for 9 years, during most of wh. he was a "Committee-man" (Elder), there were 2 years of dallying with Liguron-selling; & then finally a break into polygamy. And, he was cut off, & stayed outside for 33 years, & getting what he seemed for, wealth, & power, a position, and gratification of lust. When old, & alone accepted, & his women died off, he professed to repent, & was restored, & almost immediately honored with election to Eldership! He lived only 3 years longer. No time to make up

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he had done during his regular three years! Mr. Ford, however, glumly, to buy some hardware, & we sympathised with each other about Capt. Dugay's ill-treatment of him on Sat., & new snow to-night.

Tuesday June 25: Quite cold morning, and unusually foggy, the air season mist, was furnish last night, - was still at 7 A.M., did not do any efficient work, in evening, Capt. Burns and engineer Whately made a visit. Bought 7 chickens & 2 ducks to-day, & a quantity of plantains & iguana.

Wednesday June 26 } At 11. a.m., I saw come in the small  
Thursday " 27 } French steamer, from St. Thomas. And, just after dinner, Mr. Ford came from Anguilla. The mail came about 4.30 P.M., after singing class, at wh. only 5 were present. After Prayer-meeting, Mr. Ford soon went to bed, & I sat up opening newspapers.

Friday June 28, weather chill and damp. Bought a large lot of bacon from <sup>from</sup> Bushell. Did not feel energetic, and did not do much work to-day. Yesterday, the German steamer loaded produce from the C. & went out. I rec'd. a letter from Mr. Roberts, of Batanga. Also, the French gun-boat, "Heron", came in; &, in afternoon went up river.

Saturday June 29: Rose early, to wake Mr. Perriagent, see see to his cup of coffee, before he shd. start for

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the "Moore", wh. was due to leave at 5:30 A.M., & wh. did leave at 6. A.M. Got together a few things, for the journey of the creek back to Mr. MacLing's. In afternoon, busy with Mr. Ford, at the rectification of my acc'ts, wh. were supposed settled on May 1<sup>st</sup>; but, as to wh., some errors were since found. Was very much humiliated by the revelation of my inability to understand acc'ts.

Sat. June 29<sup>th</sup> } Made no entry on Sat., In the afternoon,   
Sabbath " 30<sup>th</sup> } read, for 2 hours, to "Argentina", while she  
Monday July 1<sup>st</sup> } was sewing, out of "Uncle Tom's Cabin", wh.  
came to me, by mail, a few days ago, with a copy of "Trilby".  
Usual evening English singing. , Sabbath, a cool day.  
Sore with a headache, but it passed off before afternoon.  
A small audience of many away still at Kala-ida; meetings,

On Monday, pay-day. Annoyed at men coming to take  
their bar from some of my feed-store workers.  
Mr. Leinenkugel, a palaver with the table-bar, Agua, for  
ooking Doctor fish in my kitchen. It very unpleasant  
situation, in the evening, from Beckwith (Charles Green) who is  
attempting to get back to church-membership, but who was  
very unchristian, some 8 months ago, and has never  
made reparation.

Tuesday July 2<sup>nd</sup> } On Tuesday, some closing acc'ts. with  
Wednesday " 3<sup>rd</sup> } Mr. Ford's and, wrote to Mrs. Roberts, at  
Balanga. On Wednesday, the German steamer was expected,

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on who Mr. Ford was to go to Batanga, but, it did not come. Lijasó came yesterday to beg pardon for her outrageous noise, in church, the day of the announcement of Rabinda's death]. Reading Dr. Maria's note "Tilly", Required the school to be held in the afternoon, as Mr. Pennington's half-holiday on Wednesday afternoons (being given principally for his own health); there was no need to give it during his absence.

Thursday July 4. have somehow taken cold, - heavy in my head, and a sore mouth, that prevents me enjoying food. No notice of July 4<sup>th</sup>, except Mr. Ford reminded me that it was the anniversary of his arrival at Balou in 1891.

Near noon, the German steamer came in, from the south. The early part of afternoon we spent in arranging Mr. Ford's departure. The boat girl took his luggage, at 3 P.M., still, when it returned, he left at 5 P.M. Steamer laid at anchor all night. Augustin & Oyongos remained to supper, and, after supper & prayers, I read to ~~the~~ her from "Uncle Tom's Cabin". It is very interesting to read to her: she so joins in the excitement of the story, and appreciates the points of the plot so promptly, a interject exclamations, showing she understands it all. Had a palava, about stealing today. At first, suspected Kew, Ogulu, & Raspanda; finally, fixed on Raspanda, - he still denied. I demanded, as condition of his staying, that he pay for the stolen tin of

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meat, As he did not do this, he left.

Friday July 5<sup>th</sup>. I had to rise earlier than usual, in order to ring the first bells. The German steamer was disappearing over the bar. Rapanda came for his pay, calling 4 days five days! I retained the wages of 5 days for his theft, & gave him one franc, with warning that he might be arrested for theft. Started back at completing what Carpenter Sandy had left undone, of his work to the "Rabbit". Felt terrible, in afternoon. All alone at table, my sore mouth prevents me enjoying food. At night, a fire on the adjacent prairie wakes me anxious. (Yesterday Basca Joe acted to return to work, & I agreed; & he began to day, in afternoon Basca Basca, the outrageous liar, dared to come & act to return, I ordered him off.)

Sat. July 6<sup>th</sup> Felt very heavy all day with this unusual (ab. "7") subacute inflammation of the mucous membranes of my nose, head, & mouth. The French steamer had come last night. Read a good deal to myself, from "Uncle Tom's Cabin". While I was at supper, Ogden was smoking near the door; this I discovered, the source of the smell of tobacco, wh. I, some 3 weeks ago, had suspected came from Mr. Pennington's room. At the evening, English singing, none came, except those who were already on the premises,

2. 10. m.

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a good attendance at church. A cool, pleasant day. Have to ring the bell myself, in afternoon, exactly at 3 P.M., as I was about to ring the first bell for ch., came a French govt. officer & his wife. I have seen his face in the Bureaus, but do not know his name. Showed them my flowers, & gave the lady a bouquet. Rang first bell at time of second (3.30). After that, came 3 dressed-up Balors, to visit Koko & he gave them food, (as there was no time to eat). By the when, in 15 minutes of ringing second bell, I had to tell him to die; then to go, & waited till they went. They angry at being deprived of eating, entered the church, stayed a little while, disorderly & a went out very disorderly. After Service, & rebuked him for having such visitors. A small audience at Monthly concert. All alone, by myself now at night.

Monday, July 8. Two letters from Del. Shie, - one of them, for Dr. MacMillan in America. Mr. Carpenter from Plateau came, to buy a barrel, & I opened the store for his pack, before going to Plateau to pay the year's taxes, for this station, - \$34. His bill for Mr. Perrin's agent, passage to Ogowe. The Acra mason, Joseph, came to engage service at Batanga. Madame Rijt sent me a piece of ice, wh. I shared with Inko and school children, who had never seen

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it. In afternoon, visited, tired with my morning's walk & Iguru's small lesson, & his complaint of having too much to do. The Shadiani corpse, & the people carrying it left the coffin standing in the path, expecting one to furnish spades with wh. to dig the grave. A good prayer-meeting in the evening.

Tuesday, July 9. Had to ring the quiet bell myself, going out with only my bathing-gown on., dismissed "Kangata", for smoking in work time. The mason, Josef, came to show me some of his certificates. Horro, my ~~late~~ disengaged stable-assistant of some weeks ago, came to beg to be taken back. A bill from the plateau for Registering, (I do not know what), wrote a long letter to Brother Wells, this afternoon.

Wednesday, July 10. Just after morning-prayers, discovered the Central ch-moulder, Ogundaga, stealing firewood from my premises. At 8. A. M. stonehouse, the mason, Faleti, troublesome trying to return an ax he had bought yesterday, I went to plateau, to pay a small bill to the Govt. That morn. had beset men to watch the approach of fire from the burning prairie, fired by the Govt. soldiers. Fell exhausted after cleaning, & did nothing till 3. P.M., saw the English steamer coming, from north, taught singing-class. At 4. P.M., had the "Lafayette" housed. (It had come with Atungs, from Agon in the morning.) At 5. P.M., came Mrs. Stra, from N.J. A delightful letter from Mrs. R.P. Scantlebury about May.

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Thursday, July 11. Every body was late. At 8. o'clock store time, Mr. Marling's people, Kaya, Styango, and others came with large orders from him. The English steamer, of yesterday, the "Balanga", still here. And, in afternoon, came in another in W.F.M.S. meeting, Argentini, its Secy., present; but, looking quite sick. Paid Shika his wages, for the last five months, arranged w<sup>t</sup>. Ibra's acc'ts,

Friday, July 12. } On Friday M<sup>r</sup> d<sup>y</sup>, paid w<sup>t</sup>. Ibra his wages, for  
cat<sup>e</sup> } May - July, and goods for Elongs Station.

In afternoon, at 2. o'clock, Session-meeting; was disappointed that the only two person I thought worthy, - the women Anne and Maria, - failed to show understanding of the Sacraments. Preparatory Service, - sermon by Dr. Ibra. After-service, Session continued. Restored Dan<sup>s</sup> Emry, from suspension. Argentini at the service, she remained, after supper, & I read "Uncle Tom's Cabin", went, after breakfast, to H.A.C., to act for his French clerk, Mr. Richardt, & write me a note of request to the French Governor, excusing me from his Reception tomorrow night. Mr. Hodson promised it shd be done. Went with him & Mr. Fildes, at 8<sup>1/2</sup> o'clock, to the Target-shooting at the Plateau, along walk. Not very interesting. Returned by 11. A.M. The workmen, neglecting their work. All the school-children were Oyongos, instead of going promptly to their homes, & the school at noon, went to the swing, wh. I had

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forbidden. Packing Mr. Abrah's goods, in the afternoon. Lectured. Various jobs of acts, & writing session-meetings. Had to write my letter of excuse to the Governor, in English, as Mr. Hudson failed to send the French translation he had promised. Good English-singing, in the evening, - though but few present.

Sabbath, July 14<sup>th</sup>. The National Anniversary of France. The day opened with salute of cannon, & a Regatta about 9. A.M., - amazing Races in afternoon, fireworks ~~at night~~<sup>in evening</sup>, and a Reception & dance ~~at~~ later on. All this took people to the Plateau, & was a temptation to even to church-goers. I gave preached in morning to Mrs. Alia, in afternoon at Communion, & and I in evening.

Monday, July 15<sup>th</sup>. Hurried to write out the copies of the Declarations &c, for Mrs. Alia; and, after breakfast, went to the Custom-House. Had expected some difficulty, but there was none. Was tired when I returned. In school, warned the children, about going home at noon immediately on school-closing. Mrs. Alia finally off, about 11. A.M. In afternoon, wrote up accounts. At night, a good prayer-meeting. Organ, in answering objection made by others, about coming to night-meetings because of darkness, said "Is it darker than the darkness of the grave, and then you will have to go alone?". A small fan, a member of Argon ch., spoke. Some people had deplored him, "because of his youth," & he had said "Padre Jesus die for our old?"

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Tuesday July 16<sup>th</sup>. Some one left the gate open last night, & a number of cows were in the yard. After breakfast, Mr. Fildes came with a bill for payment, from Mr. Marling. And Styango went with him, to get some goods ordered by Mr. Marling. Hurried to get the papers ready for the "Evening Line", to go up river, to Mr. Marling. Had some difficulty to induce Styango to pay a debt of \$10-, he had contracted with me some months ago. Augertray came to do the work omitted last Friday. Finally, after 2 P.M., the "Evangeline" got away, on her journey, Read in "Uncle Tom's Cabin" to Augertray, A dark night. Very quiet, and all alone.

Wednesday July 17<sup>th</sup>. Cattle in the yard, and the workmen so absurd in their mode of driving them out - heading them off and sending them the wrong way, so that the cattle tore through a piece of the fence. Writing out an order, for goods and supplies from England and America. Only a small number at Prayer-meeting.

A goodly number at Prayer-meeting, - Osangani finally, after 3 months talking about it, - stood up before meeting and declared his marriage. Dark, but starry night, & very, very dry, Dry season this! No rain for almost 2 months.

Thursday July 18<sup>th</sup>. Cut down a bread-fruit tree that was crowding orange trees. Made out my order for goods & supplies, & took it to N.Y.P. for corrections. In afternoon sent the

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men to H. & C., for 40 boxes of American Map recently arrived.  
Began to stake out the line of the fence to be built, along  
the S.E. side of the premises.

Friday, July 19<sup>th</sup> At sun-down, a French steamer was seen on the  
Sat<sup>h</sup> " 20<sup>th</sup> horizon. Read in "Uncle Tom's Cabin" to Agustyn,  
Sabbath " 21<sup>st</sup> at her sewing in the evening, & in the morning,


Keya had complained that the monitor, Bojedi, in the  
school, had struck her grandchild twice. I rebuked him  
sharply.

On Sat<sup>h</sup>, sent a mail, and rec'd. a very  
small one. Another steamer came in; and the "Comus"<sup>the</sup>  
went out for the Portuguese mail. Had a headache all  
day, but was able to read in evening, & hold the usual  
English Singing, an unusually good number. Sent 2 Orders  
through H. & C., one to America, and one to England.  
On Sabbath, still with my headache, but, was able to preach;  
Hercutyn & Ignatius received to do. After dinner,  
Ignatius was looking at the picture in "Uncle Tom's Cabin",  
accusing the death of little Eva, broke into tears. How  
have I slept over this beautiful character!

Monday July 22<sup>nd</sup>. Rose with a headache, but it began to  
disappear after breakfast. At the store-house, an upper-  
Coast man very annoying, about trying to make me  
take back some needles he had bought several days ago.  
Spent the morning at H. & C's Bill., In afternoon, after  
Ignatius' lesson, went to Wiesman's to sell a Bill of Exchange.

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Tuesday, July 23<sup>rd</sup>. After 8 A.M. storehouse, went to Hatoeau, to call on the Governor. He was not in & I left my card. Called in at Hatto, on the way back, I found getting ready for market. There were a great many in the market & at Baraka, was awaiting me a messenger, from Mons L. de Beaupré, of the Government, sending cash, with which to buy a sewing machine. Also, Dr. Golani, sent his check with money, for the purchase of two £.50. Bills of Exchange. In afternoon, went to Hatoeau, & paid them over \$8300. I met them. Then, went into the village, & called on Tito, Odanga-Bella, Agatze, with his夫人, who have come to send money, but in fact was absent, & I came back. Few more to night.,



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
