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



Hawthorne

Thursday Nov. 14th. Went to the station, to take 11.05 train, to Hawthorne south, to visit a Dr. ^{McGinnies} ~~the~~ ^{effort} whose intent, Rev. J. K. Wight had written me, was the chief sustaining aid, in the little Presb. ch. at that place. Ticket 80. etc. Train an hour late. While waiting, Mr. Turby saw me, from his house, & came over, to see me about ch. matters. At Waldo, some injury to the engine made a delay so long that I saw I w^t have no time at Hawthorne, to accomplish anything; abandoned the ^{Waldo} train, & stayed at Waldo. Registered at the hotel. Inquired, of the proprietor, for Mr. E. L. Babbitt, an Elder of the Presb. ch. "Yes, he's an old bachelor; lives alone $\frac{1}{2}$ mile out in the country". Walked about the town. Saw Presb., Meth, Bap., & Episc. churches; & 2 Negro Meth., & 2 negro Bap., All, in a town of 800 inhabitants! Again inquired route to Mr. Babbitt, of a man on street, who said it was 2 miles. He directed me; & I started at 3.15^{A.M.}. On the way, a Negro directed me another route; and, later, another Negro, another way; subsequently, & I asked a Negro lad, & a little boy. Reached Mr. B^s, in 45 minutes. His countenance, but himself an interesting man; his faults & faults

and flowers; tea-plants, Castor-oil, cassava, cocoas, &c. By 4.30, he had hitched up his old horse, & drove me back to town. His pronounced interest in Negroes. Drove through the town, out $\frac{1}{4}$ mile, to pine forest, to Elder Stevens. They were at supper in the parlor, & discussing the church. After a while, Mrs Stevens and a young man came in. Arranged for Dr. S. to attend Preaching, next week, at St. Augustine. Returned to the town, & Mr. B. dropped me at the "Waldo". A good supper. The proprietor showed me into a well-furnished Parlor, where were 2 ladies, & 2 children. Pleasant conversation. Was tired with my walk, & went early to bed.

Friday Nov. 15,

Was up by 7. A.M., and down to a good breakfast by 7.30. A.M. The proprietor charged me only $\frac{1}{2}$ rates. and his wife, knowing I was a Preb., said she was a Preb., & hoped I would come to preach. The train for 8.40. A.M. was late 2 hours. At Stark, the sun warm again. Spent afternoon on my porcency, and on writing "Mays Childhood". In evening, went, by invitation of Mr. Sherman, to his Moving Picture Show, pictures of Child Slavery in Factories, & Japanese customs.

and "Red Spectre"; a some humorous views.. Sat up
late reading my diary of 1885, for ~~and~~ daughter's bday.
Saturday Nov. 16th. Very cold morning. Went to ask
Mr. Trulley for a hymn-book, in order to select hymns
for to-morrow. He was not in; but, the church was
open, & I took a book. On the way back, met him in
a wagon, & I rode back with him, & had a talk
in his office. The electric wire at the ^{Rev. Fred. Higdon.} church, not
yet repaired. Came back; A visitor, a Presb.
minister, of South Presb. ch., called on my Principal
of School, at Hampton near here, Very cordial,
& invited me to address his school. Went with
my list of hymns to Mr. Knight, at his store,
I found that he did not know I had been in
Africa. He introduced me to his father. I asked
the way to Miss Hubbard's, in order to give her the
hymns. The evening was cold; I had asked the Negro
servant for wood, for 2 days, & he had not brought
any. So I had to ask both men for a tree-ton,
before the servant, after dark, brought one any.
Letters from son William & sister Lizzie. Went over
my service, as I sat by the fire; and read over parts
for my diary of 1884.

Sabbath Nov. 17: Weather somewhat moderated, went to Sab. Sch. & taught Miss Eddon's class, though she herself was there. Sermon on, Isaiah 63.9. "The Angel of His Presence". Felt free in uttering it, at the close, Elder Trebil commended the sermon. A lady, Mrs. Rising, who said she was from W. Phila., spending the winter here at their home, 4 miles out of the city. Two young ladies, Misses ~~Rising~~. The Ruhl family. Announced Service for the evening, as Mr. Trebil said the electionaries had been fixed. In afternoon, said over my sermon for the night, & read. While at supper, Mr. Jones told me that Mr. Trebil had sent word, that the votes were enough, & there would be no service. Nevertheless, I went at 7 P.M. Found the church dark, and 8 persons waiting on the door-step, among them Rev. Mr. Higdon & a lady, & 2 of the Ruhl family & others. I was very much disappointed, some of them went to the Baptist ch. I sat & read over parts of my Diary of 1886. The evening did not need a fire.

Monday Nov. 18: After breakfast, to Post office, & found letter from Council High, with cheque for \$50., & a letter from S.C. of Phil., with clerical order for one to St. Augustine. Came back, & immediately acknowledged

the cheques I made up my laundry & took it to the Laundry. On the way, met young Mr. Jones, who told me that my boarding w^t be \$15. per month (a reduction). Went to Mr. Knight's store, & asked him to identify me at a bank. Went to one, but, they said they were not paying out money. Went to the other, & they cashed it, with a discount of 15 ct on the entire \$50. Went to Mrs. Johns', and definitely engaged my room there. Came back, had chat with young Mr. Jones, on the veranda. Writing on "Many's Childhood". The evening clouded, but, it was comfortably warm enough to sit out on the veranda.

Tuesday Nov. 19th. Very very cloudy: looks like rain. Disappointed that the mail brought me no word about the M. S. of my "In an Elephant Corral", from Scribner. Preparing bags to ship, at St. Augustine. Left on 9.07 A.M. train. At Jacksonville, had to wait until 5.30 P.M., for train south. Sat in the Station house, which was in great disorder, with lathing, & plastering, & extensive repairs. Met Mr. Herreler, of Stark. Walked about the town. Not particularly, on the street, Mrs. ^{de} Grayne, of Queen Lane, Fernandina. Observed

Negro women, with very long straight hair. Dined at a restaurant. Came back to station, & met Rev. J. K. Wright there, talking about the situation at St. Augustine. Arrived at St. Augustine 6.30^{P.M.} Met by Rev. J. C. Stout, Pastor of the Pres. ch., &, with Elder Bishop, of Eustis, were entertained at Mrs. Stout's. Mrs. Stout a lovely woman. An elegant man, & a magnificent church, memorial of a daughter of Mr. Flagler. In evening service, sermon by Rev. Dr. W. Farris of Miami, Prayer by Rev. H. Keigley, & reading by myself. Very kind need of members of Phig. Mrs. Leonard, wife of the Elder; Mrs. Burgess; Mrs. West, wife of Rev. West; she says her grandmother was a Hamill.

On Wednesday the 20th: Phig all day. Rev. Stevens reminded me of old Mrs. Walker of Eustis; Rev. Hartley recommended one of Rev. Dr. Jack, formerly of Warrington, & Rev. J. C. Dornward, formerly a missionary of A.B.C.F.M. in South Africa, and my predecessor here, looked a little like Dr. Dulles of Princeton. I was first on Prof. Mar. Com., with Mr. Wright, & on Freedmen with Mr. Dornward. The splendid, treated, beautiful Park, & fine residences. Evening popular services, presided over by State ch. Rev. Dr. Kinly, and

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address by Rev. Wight, Elder Bishop, & Rev. Keayman. Kind expressions of the members toward A walk, into Mr. Stark & Mr. Bishop, to the Y. M. C. A., and their bowling-room. Walk with Mrs. S. past the 3 splendid hotels of Mrs. Fletcher. The splendid moonlight; the delicious odors of flowers.

On Thursday 21, with Mr. Bishop, to the sights of the town; the narrow Spanish streets; portion of the old wall; the Fort (Marion); and the tour through the dungeons, guarded by the U. S. soldiers, Sergeant Brown. Back to Mr. Stark, a good-bye, and to the station, most of the members of Pby waiting there, for trains south. With Mr. Bishop, train about 10.40 A. M., to Jacksonville. He was very kind, & bore my expenses at the "Aragon" hotel, to dinner. And then, about 2.40 P. M., train for Stark. Very slow. Incident of a man & wife on the train; he never sitting still, & apparently intoxicated, & she seeming afraid of him. At Stark, located to the hotel, & put down my luggage, & went to post office for letters. After supper, called on Mrs. Hull. Mr. H. not at home. The day had been uncomfortably warm, Friday Nov. 22: Bright & warm. Went to New Johns-

to notify her that I would come to her room, to-morrow, but, no one answered the door-bell. Writing letters, began to pack my trunk, for removal to-morrow to Mrs. Johns'. In evening, Mr. Sherman gave me a couple of matinee season-tickets, to the Moving-Picture Show, I went, and was introduced, at the door, to Mr. Matthews, Editor of the local paper. Retired early; for, I was tired, having gone on Walnut St. to call on Dr. Francis, one of the 3 Elders, in order to see the church-Register, which is in his hands. He was out of town. Then, I engaged the way to Elder Tyson's, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles out of town; was misdirected, & came back, the direction having been to another Mr. Tyson. Had written letters to Waldo, & Hawthorne, & to Mr. Pierson of Nashua.

Sat., Nov. 23rd. Young Mr. Jones told me that Mrs. Johns had telephoned yesterday that she was ready for me. I asked him to phone for a wagon, to take my baggage; & I went ahead with my hand-bag, & Mrs. Johns received me. Trucks came; & I opened them, to take out a few needed things. Went to Mr. Tracy's office; the old ^{W.M. Wall} place, where I saw at my former ^{W.M. Wall} journey yesterday afternoon, was awaiting me; but, Mr. Tracy was away. Went to the house,

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Miss Truly came to the door; while giving her a message to her father, he came up, in his wagon to his office. Told him my errands from Philo. Went to a house near the Park, to order a load of fire-wood. Came on, through the Park, to Mrs. Jones'. Wrote up Drury and prepared sermon. The scavenger buzzards, the variety of flowers, violets & dead leaves falling from some tree, but not from the waterworks. The dogs mostly of the hunting kind, pointers, setters, & mongrels. The load, of 100 billets of wood, came in afternoon, cost \$1.00. I piled them in Mrs. Jones' back-yard. Night dark. Reading in my room.

Sabbath Nov. 24. Morning cool. Thermometer at 60°. Did not feel free in my speaking, in the morning service, pit, on Justice 20. 3, "Not our City of Refuge." Only 20 present. Service also in the evening, on New. 11. 20, "Going back to Egypt". 20 present. Mrs. Hanford

Monday Nov. 25. Cold night. A lady at the hotel, saluted me, saying that Rev. J. K. Wright, at her home, in Green Cove Springs, had spoken of me, A letter from Miss Gurnineer. News of death of Rev. Dr. A. H. Brown, on Nov. 4. Letter also from Elder Stevens, of Valdosta, naming the 3d Sabbath of each month the day for Service there.

Writing a long letter to the families at home. Went to call on Mrs. Liddell. Her married daughter from Jacksonville, visiting her, invited me to stay at her home, if I shd. be in Jacksonville. Sat up late writing.

Tuesday Nov. 26. Wrote to Dr. Gummere; also the long circular ^{letter} was finished & sent. A letter from Sir H. H. Johnston of England, about my Benga Grammar of Taay Toesbekey, which I at once replied to. And remittance, of a portion of my Honorarium, received from Prof. Agnew, of the Relief Fund. In evening, went to call on the Trebil family. Mr. T. & daughter were out. Mrs. T. was in; & Mr. T. soon returned. Obtained, from her, the names of the 40 members of the Starke ch.

Came back, & sat by the wood-fire on the beach, reading copies of the Phil. papers sent me by Mr. Moore.

Wednesday. Troubled with a bilious diarrhea, it made me very sleepy and tired. Did not do much all day. After supper, attempted to go a visit Mr. Hopkins. But the way was long, night dark, & my diarrhea still troubled me. Went to bed early.

Thursday 28. The morning dull & cloudy. On my return, at 9. A. M., from breakfast, my room was not

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yet made up. Still felt some discomfort of my bowels; but, I dressed and went to Thanksgiving Service, at 11 A.M., in the Methodist ch. It was supposed to be a Union Service: but, the Episcopal rector was not present, & had a separate Service in the evening. At the ch. door, the Mett. Pastor, Rev. Mr. ^(Inman?) ~~Gordon~~, met me. Mr. Tracy also introduced me to a lady. ^{laptop} Mr. ^(Inman?) ~~Gordon~~ showed me up front; but, I sat half-way. Rev. Mr. Higdon came from the pulpit, & invited me to sit there; I declined. After Services began, Mr. ^(Inman?) ~~Gordon~~ came to me, & asked, being in front seat with him, & make first prayer. I did so. Afterwards, I was told there were 5 other clergymen present, Mett., Bapt., & Congregational ("Unit"). At the door, Mr. Hull took me to dinner, where were present, besides Mr. Hull, Miss Kuhl, Miss Frost, & a brother of his nephew, Sternes, & Lester S. Wrote & read in afternoon; did not need a fire. In evening, went to Baptist church, to hear a Baptist evangelist, a Rev. Mr. Reed. He really was able intellectually; but, like Rev. Sam. Jones, he spoiled the Service, for me, by witty stories. Came home in a rain.

(Stark) Nov. 1907) Hawthorne

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Friday Nov. 27. Rained heavily last night. Dark morning. Letters from Brunette, May, Mrs C. Lourde, & the Ogoov "Ngeki-Ndwa". Wrote to M^r F. Faure, of the Ogoov, & to President Warfield. Mr. Harrold introduced me, today, to Rev. Dr. Hyatt, the Episcopal Minister: & to a dentist. A rainy day. Did not make any visit. In evening, went to the Morning-Picture Show: and came back, & wrote on May's "defects".

Saturday Nov. 30. Cold misty morning. Bought a one-gallon can, & had it filled at Dr. Knight's store. Prepared my suit case, for the journey to Hawthorne, on the 11.05 A. M. train. The Episcopal minister, Hyatt, & the Campbellite, White, on train, Mr. Hyatt left at Baldwin probably for Gainesville. Mr. White & his wife, at Hawthorne. Went to Mr. Moore's hotel, & found that he was an attendant on the Presb., of his wife, for a daughter were members. At the table, was a Mr. Connor, of Freeport, N. J. His wife was sick in her room. After dinner, went to a Presb. member, Mr. Stock, a Barber: and, while arranging with him, Miss McGinnis, & Miss Reddick, 2 Presb.^{ans}, came in, to find me. My letter to Mrs. McGinnis had been

received. Chatting in the office with Miss Moore and her brother. In the evening, a Miss Bergstrasser, called to see Miss Moore.

On Sunday Dec. 1st, cold weather, the church windows frozen, & the church very drafty. I went to the Sab. Sch., Miss Reddick conducted. Preached to about 40 people, of several denominations. No resident minister of any of the 4 churches, Bapt., Meth., Presb., & R. Catholic. A bright cold day. Spent afternoon in my room, with a fire. Mrs. Moore had returned at noon. In church, met a Baptist, a Mr. Christie, a Dr. Lowning, who wishes to join us. Service again in the evening, to about the same number. Talking Africa with Mrs.

Monday Dec. 2^d. Still very cold, but clear. Sat in office, and read. Went out, & walked about the town: the pretty late; the signs of the desolation of "the freeze": the abundance of the Spanish moss. The Bermuda grass, like as at Batanga^{in Africa}. Mr. Moore would not take pay for my entertainment. Had met Mr. Stock on the street, & talked about finance, & the burned ~~out~~ outside, & the old-bell church. Left at 2.45. P.M.. At

Starkie, went, at once, to post office. Letter from Cousin Hugh, & complimentary ticket from Dr. Waidman, of Phil., for his Historical Address. My laundry was not at the hotel. In evening, went to call on Mrs. Fernández, but was uncertain of her house. Came back, & wrote on this diary. Can not see the constellation of the Great Bear, over the north-star. Cold clear night.

Tuesday Dec. 32. Very cold, last night of this month, in fact; but, it did not seem to kill the young vegetables, only the lily leaves. Paid my washing bill, at the laundry for last week, 63 ct. Went to Mr. Knight's, to inquire about getting some Japanese persimmons, to express, as curiosities, to Philad'l & Trenton. Went to Livingston's store, to inquire about hiring a writing-table for 6 months. They had none. Went to Johns store, & bought one for \$2.00. Wrote letter to Rev. J. K. Wright, about Hawthorne. Called at house of Mrs. Fernández, but, my knock was not heard. Went to call on the widow Hopkins, and met her on the way. Spent evening, in writing up rolls of the Starkie and Hawthorne clunches.

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Wednesday Dec. 4. Chilly day, but grew to be clear & cold. Preparing sermons, for Sabbath. Wrote to Elder Stevens of Waldo, son William, and Rev. Dr. Stonecipher of Easton.^{Pa} Midday warm. On this John's roses garden, I did a little trudging. Went out, to call on Mrs. Miller, mother of Mrs. Fernandez, but did not see people about the house. At Mr. Knight's store, met Mr. Riesing. Called on Editor Matthews, of the local "Telegraph". Again, in Mr. Knight's, met the Baptist minister, Rev. Mr. Odem. Called at Livingston's store, to enquire of his sister, about the family. On the street, met to Rev. Mr. Duran, the Methodist minister. Very cold evening. At night, writing on Mary's "Infancy".

Thursday Dec. 5. Bitterly cold, last night. At 10.30, on Mrs. Hauford's invitation, rode, with her, into the country about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile, to see sugar-cane ground. At Mr. Bevan's, Mrs. B., and her son, and her parents, Mr. & Mrs. Wall. While looking at the boiling of the juice, a Mrs. Haskins,^{Pa} her pretty little widowed sister, Mrs. Lane, came for some syrup.

Returning, Mr. Hawford drove around through the town. In afternoon, called on Mr. & Mrs. Von Remy & while there, a few folks came in. Little school-girls wearing academic caps is daily scene.

Friday Dec. 6th. Preparing sermon, for Sabbath evening. Had rec'd. 5 letters from Prof. Waifield, Prof. Erdman, little Howard's sister Tillie; and Mr. Hull of El Paso. In afternoon, went, with list of hymns, to Mr. Knight; to newspaper office, a subscriber. Walked out to the Reinhardt family. In evening, went to the moving picture show.

Saturday Dec. 7th: At my sermon. At noon, paid my monthly bill at the hotel. Writing & reading. At 3.30 P.M., went to 5 different stores, to find pantaloons buttons; to Mr. Knight, to enquire about the pensiveness ^{which} I want to send next; to law office of Mr. Long; to Dr. Francis' office. Called at Mrs. DeLinggator (my knock not heard). Called at Rev. Mr. Inman; he was out; but, Mrs. Inman was at home. Again, at the office, but neither was in. Went to Dr.

Francis home; no one there. Crowd in the street, coming in from the country.

Sabbath, Dec. 8th. A comfortably warm day, did not need to wear overcoat. Went early to the Sab. Sch., to consult, with Elder Tauly, about 10 time Lord's Supper (2) introduction of Responsive Readings. (3) beginning a weekly Prayer meeting. At end of Sab. Sch., spoke to them about their things; at close of service, called a Congregational meeting to discuss them, & the people agreed: 25 present. In evening, 10 present, announced the beginning of Prayer meeting next Wed. evening. Felt encouraged. Very dark night. Walked, on the way home, with Mr. & Mrs. Hull & Lester.

Monday, Dec. 9th. A warm rainy day, did not need any fire. Went to the Laundry, to get my week's wash. At Mr. Knight's, not much hope of getting the specimens I wished to send with.

Spent the whole day, in carefully reading my diary for 1883-'85, for the story of daughter Mary's "Childhood." To night, writing letters. Thunder, the first I have heard here.

Tuesday, Dec. 10th. Heavy rain last night.

The day pleasantly warm. Spent all morning on my bicircular letter to the family. At noon, a letter from Miss Guernsey I immediately replied to it. In the afternoon, went to office of Mr. J. V. Long, & told him of our church plans. And, to office of Dr. Francis, and told him. And then, walked out into the country, past the big saw mill, to the Kuehl family, and inquiries the way to the Uglow family. Found Mrs. U. & daughter Caroline; before I left, daughter Grace came from school. Mrs. U. showing me their sugar-mill. Mr. Kuehl happened to be there, & he took me in his wagon, as far as his home, by dark; and I rapidly walked the rest of the way, to the hotel to supper. A quarter-moon, clear cool night.

Wed. Dec. 11. Prepared for Prayer-meeting, for the evening. Wrote on "Mary's Childhood." In afternoon, called on Fred Fernández & his mother, Mrs. Miller, & found them both at home. While in their parlor, Mrs. Gaskins came in. At Mr. Knight's store, was given some specimens, which Mr. Rasing had left there for me. At Prayer-meeting: thanks to God! There were not only my expected 5; there were 8. Elders Taiby & Francis,

Mrs Kuhl & her 2 daughters, and Lester Stearns,
Miss Frank, & young Mr. Truly. I was very glad.
Walked home with Dr. Francis. Bright clear night,
with moon bright full.

Thursday, Dec. 12th. Went to bed last night unassisted
by 2 overripe Japanese persimmons, which, at Mr.
Knight's store, had been left there for me, by Mr.
Rising. Rose this morning with a headache. Ate
no breakfast. At Mr. Knight's, packed the 3 unripe
persimmons, with the "Bessie" I had brought here
from Wanawati, to express it to Miss Beemer.
Letters from my native friends at Batanga.
Tried to write, with my headache. Wrote to Edna,
and a note of thanks to Mrs Kuhl for her presence
at the paroxysm meeting. No scarcely any dinner or
supper. Went to bed early.

Friday 13th. Still some headache. Only a slight
breakfast. At the table, Mr. Episcopalian Archdeacon,
Goodwin, and the new rector for this place, ^{Rev. Dr.}
Hedrick, who has come in place of Mr. Hyatt.
Paid the expense of the box I sent yesterday, &
got two \$1.00 money-orders, to send to May
& Bessie, for Xmas, for the children. The

afternoon & evening a warm rain, heavy at night. Did not need fire to-day.

Saturday Dec. 14th } On the 14th. Put together my things,
Sabbath " 15th } having first gone down to the
Monday " 16th } Express-Office, to see whether the
 things ^{expressed} to me, by May, from
 Hermantown, had arrived - they had not. At the
 11.05 train, to Wales. To the house kept by Mr. Higgin.
 Was introduced to Mr. Coffin, an old resident, &
 Prof. O'Neil, principal of the Public School, &
 Mr. Pettit, Mayor of the town. In afternoon, Eddie
 Bablitt came to see me, & took me to introduce
 me to Mrs. Jally, & Mrs. Strickland living near the
 ch. He had first taken me to the R. R. Station, &
 introduced ^{me} to Mr. Hughes, the Agent, & Mr. Blakely,
 the assistant; also Mrs. Blakely.

On Sabbath. Rain, early in morning; but, it
 cleared off nicely for church. A country old man,
 member of Episc. ch., Mr. Hatchie's, met also
 a Mr. Todd, of the Baptist ch. People seemed cordial.
 Evening the afternoon, called at Mrs. Andrew, to
 see her sister Miss Thompson. A daughter of
 Mrs. A., a teacher in Stark. Also, at Mrs. Hughes,

a lovely lady & her interest in Missions in Africa. At night, a fine audience, larger than the morning. Sat a long while, after audience had gone, pleasurening with Elder Babbitt. A warm balmy day; very pleasant. Sunday, & a moonlight night. The R.R. freight trains accumulating all day. At night in the parlor, an interesting lady, of the Episc. ch., with a very charming laugh, who was quite cordial about my person, & she made me talk about Africa, & telling elephant story; and, for the 2 boys of Mr. & Mrs. Higgin, who were present, I told them the "Courtship" of the Prince Gorilla.

On Monday, the air quite cool, said goodbye to Mr. Blakely at the station. At Stanke, at once deposited my suit-case, at this house; & went for my mail; & then went to the Express-office; came back, & mended my clothes, & read mail. Took clothes to hotel, &, & after dinner, took them to Laundry, & got last week's wash. And, from the hotel, took my box arrived from Germanton. Rested, & wrote, & read. After supper, bought apples & got more mail. Wrote 2 leaves of a Calendar Autograph news, for a Miss Kelton, at Miss Treadall's.

Tuesday Dec. 17. Cold & A heavy white frost. Wrote a long letter to Mr. C. B. Newton, of Lawrenceville School; also to Rev. Mr. Higden, & Rev. J. K. Wright, & cousin Hugh. In afternoon, went to order a load of wood. Found the young man, of whom I order, making tea for his sick wife. Selected texts for next Sabbath. In evening, called on Mrs. Livingston, & her daughter Miss Kate. Moonlight, but not clear.

Wednesday Dec. 18. Cold morning; warm afternoon; rainy evening; cold night. Preparing sermon for Sabbath morning; put the notice in the paper. Bought some hair-tonic, at basketins, Called at Mrs. Von Kien. Felt feverish, & lay down. Prepared for Prayer-meeting, did not go to supper. The rain and the story of "Ten Nights in a Bar-room" kept people from church; only Elder Taft & myself. Waiting on "Mary's childhood," late at night.

Thursday Dec. 19. Cold morning. Last night, was troubled with diarrhoea. A letter from Rev. J. C. Stout, of St. Augustine, about Home Board matters. So, I went to show the letter to Mr. Freely, as he was not at home, I took it to Mr. Knight. Wrote letter, & prepared sermon for Sabbath evening.

The man & woman who have been lodgings here, removed to their own house. In evening, I went to call on Mr. Livingston. By mistake, knocked at their next door; did not hear the name well, he said they were Presbyterians. At Mr. S. Livingston's, was very kindly received; their 2 little children, Maria, & the baby, who is to be baptised. A pleasant evening: perhaps, "a little child shall lead them."

Friday Dec. 20th. A chilly day, with showers, which prevented me making any calls in the afternoon or evening. A strawberry palette in bloom, and some ripe. Wrote some letters, and wrote on "Mang's Childhood."

Saturday, Dec. 21st. Saw Mrs. John's Negro servant bring from my wood-pile. A cold rainy day. Went into Mitchell's drug-store, & got acquainted with him. Mrs. M. is of a Presbyterian family, the Sheffer family. Wrote to Rev. Mr. Stort, of St. Augustine, about the finance of this church. In afternoon, gave Mr. Knight the hymns, for tomorrow, & he handed me the Application to the Home Board. At supper, talked with the new Episcopal Rector, Rev.

Rev. Mr. Hedrick, Mr. F. W. Sherman, the Shomway has been sick. Went to his room, at the hotel, to see him. Writing on "Mary's Childhood."

Sabbath Dec. 22. Cloudy and showers all day. A good attendance at church; some strangers, a daughter of the Meth. Minister, Rev. Mr. Brown, he being sick, and no service in his church. Also, another Miss Reinhol. After dinner, went to see Mr. Sherman, in his sick-room. At the table, & Mr. & Mrs. Reigle, from Ohio, visitors of Mr. Hercules. Quite tired, in afternoon, Reigle, in the evening, but, I had a usual service to the few there - a daughter of Mrs. Lidden was born with three.

Monday Dec. 23. Last night, very heavy rain, thunder and lightning. To the Laundry. Paid Mrs. Johns lodging for one month. Wrote to Umbagoh, in Georgia, to Mrs. Brown, of Hawthorne. At the hotel, Mr. Sherman better, but, Mr. Hercules and Mrs. Stanford still sick. In afternoon, wrote. And, the weather, beautifully clear. Walked on the wet road, and called on Mrs. Hopkins and her sister, Mrs. Thompson. Back, to call on Mrs. Lidden, but saw that they were cleaning house. Called

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at Rev. Mr. Odem; he was out, but his wife and little daughter were there. Came back, and wrote. Tuesday Dec. 24'. Cold bright day. Spent morning in writing the bi-monthly Circular-letter to the family. At the hotel, Messrs Sherman & Hercules and Mrs. Hauford convalescing. In afternoon, walked, to meet the Christmas crowd on the street. Met Mr. & Mrs. Uglow & their 2 daughters. The boys with their fire-crackers. At night, wrote to Miss Hemmings.

Wednesday Dec. 25'. Cold bright day. Preparing sermons for Sabbath, in the morning, in afternoon, preparing Lecture, for Preparatory Service this evening. Had a good dinner at hotel. At the table there, met Mrs. Rising. The day did not seem like Christmas. Fire-crackers exploding all day, did not go to supper. At church, the 3 Elders, & the others.

Thursday, Dec. 26. Very cold last night, clear and cold this morning. Warm in afternoon. Spent morning on my perambulator. And, acknowledged Mrs. Guernsey's Christmas gift; and sent mine to Elizabeth Nasau, or to Prof Libby. In afternoon, went and called on the Reynolds family: the 2 daughters, ^{Sophia and Eliza}, who were teachers, at home on vacation. The guinea-pigs, and flowers. And the children playing croquet. The creek flooded. Returned, and called on Mrs. Liddell, her 2 daughters also at home, on vacation. A Methodist lady, Mrs. Ray, was making a call there also. After supper, knocked at the house of Dr. Long, but, apparently, no one was in. Came to my room.

Friday Dec. 27 } On Friday rose with a headache. After

coffee at dinner, & more at supper. And, went to call at Mr. Knight's. A guest there, a Mr. Healey. My bowels troublesome, and I made only a short call.

[On Friday afternoon, in seeking to call on Mr. Shaffee, mistook house of Mr. Livingston. Stayed only a few minutes; and then went to Mr. Griffins'. They were all out, except Mrs. S.'s sister.]

Sabbath Dec. 29th. The day threatening, but it did not rain. Bright sun, in afternoon. At morning service, the Lord's Supper; a $\frac{2}{3}$ congregation, with members of other denominations. Rested all afternoon, my bowels still troublesome. At night, was surprised by a house full, as (I heard afterward) that the 2 other ministers were sick. A pleasant talk with Mr. Knight, on the way home.

Monday 30th. Warm clear day, except a shower, shortly after noon. No fire. Sat with window open. A call from cousin Hugh. Saw a lad picking strawberries. This is the 4th consecutive day without fire.

Friday Jan'y 3. Clear bracing day; but, did not need fire, until afternoon. At 8 A.M., while we were at breakfast, a son was born to W. Rodman Jones. Documents from the Home Board. Paid the expressage of the box to son William. Writing letters on the Board's documents; handed the Stark papers to Dr. Knight, a quiet day.

Saturday Jan'y 4) Clear bright warm day. Went to the Sabbath "sc" tailor's, and got my suit that had been pressed. The 11.05 train south was 45 minutes late. "Judge" Malphas on the train with me. An hour, late at Hawthorne, & I got a head-ache, for the late dinner. At the hotel, Mr. & Mrs. Connor, Mr. Budd of Chicago, Mr. & Mrs. Knight and Mr. & Mrs. Broadman(?) of Bridgeport, Conn. Went to the Stock, & had my hair cut. The result, is the

On Monday. The half a dozen valuable dogs. Went to drug-store, for laxative pills. Met Mr. Stark, called on his family; his son sick. Called at Mrs. McElhinney. Called at the First Methodist preacher. Train at 3.38 P.M. On the train, Rev. W. Hilton of Hampton, & "Judge" Malphay, & young Mrs. Moore going to Jacksonville. At Stark's, went at once to post office for letters. Rain began to fall. Read letters. To supper: a returning meal; for, the rain was damp with rain.

Tuesday Jan'y 7th. Cold, wintry-looking sky with dark clouds, in the morning, making melancholy, after I had fruit gone to the window, and then to Mr. Knight's store, for newspaper &c. Began my journal-letter, & finished it in afternoon. Afternoon

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bright and clear. The night clear, cold, & still, with a new moon. Wrote to Miss Gunnaré.

Met Miss Sternberg & Miss Frank on the street. Also, Mrs. and Miss Rising. Called at Mr. Von Kien; they were not at home. Called at Mrs. Ray, & had pleasant chat with Mrs. Ray. At prayer-meeting, there were present a dozen people, cold, clear, night.

Thursday 9. Very cold last night. At breakfast, Mr. Jones said there had been ice; but, I did not see it. The sun bright all day; but, it did not moderate the cold. At my sermon; and at the "Story of her Childhood." At dinner, was delighted to meet a Mr. & Mrs. Allison of Lawley, who came from New Jersey, and knew of Lawrenceville School, & Nassau Hall, &c. In afternoon, stepped into Mr. Long's office, and engaged to call at his house on Friday evening. Writing, in evening. The night quite cold.

Friday Jan'y 10th. Very cold; but, clear morning. At breakfast, Mr. DeWitt Jones, showed me, in a basin, a little film of ice. During the day, it became warmer. Completing my sermon for Sab. morning. After supper, at his hotel, a stranger (whose father had been a Colonel in the Federal Army) talked in full southern opposition to Negroes; & an unpleasant talk with me. Went to Lawyer Long's, met Mrs. Long. Read, and did a variety of jobs. Lave out the hymns. Miss Kuhl asked for the ~~stamp~~ ^{stamp}. Late in afternoon, went to Wintchell's Drug-store, & got pantomines, to send to Africa. A chat with Dr. Francis, at the store.

Sabbath Jan'y 12. A very variable day. Rain, just before day-light. At breakfast, cold and clear. Later, was threatening; or tempestuous all day. Miss Helen Reinisch's bouquet of violets on the pulpit. Rev. W. M. Gibson, of Roxborough, Phil^a, a nephew of Mrs. Livingston, present, & assisting me in the pulpit. A good audience. In the evening, fewer present; and Miss Kuhl was not here to play the melodeon.

Monday 13. Weather, but the coldest day yet; for, the sun, though bright, had little effect. Observed the process of putting hay about strawberry plants. The large ice made of turnip tops as greens. The peach-trees in bloom, but no new leaves. Reading over the Minute-Book & Register of the church. In afternoon, went, to call for another load of wood. The young man has painted his house, as I advised him to do. Called at the Von Keri house, but the door seemed fastened. In the evening, called at Mrs. Livingston (senior), to see the Rev. Mr. Gibson. In the morning, I had mailed the violets of yesterday to Miss Lechner, & some sentonius to Batanga^{Africa} for E. Kotter.

Mrs. John's pa-
pearing 2 rooms, for some new lodges. Bright moonlight night, with a little fog.

Wednesday 15'. Very cold last night; did not sleep well, my feet cold. Heavy frost has killed some of the strawberries. Wrote letters all morning. At dinner, a number of lawyers, who had come over to plead their cases, before a judge. In the afternoon, prepared for evening Lecture. Was sleepy, & fell asleep, even with a fire. At Prayer meeting, & besides myself. Beautiful moonlight. A talk with Mr. Knight, about his Sab. Sch. Class, as we walked home together.

Thursday 16'. Weather moderated. A document from Librarian of Princeton Sem'y, calling for particulars of my life, for the Catalogue. Late in afternoon, went to Alvarez store, to make acquaintance of

Saturday Jan 18 } By the 11.10, n. m. train, to Waldo, on

Went to absentee church-members and chose subjects for next Sabbath's sermons. At supper, there were strawberries, the first I have had. Mr. Tracy complaining of the robins eating the ripe berries. Target practice attended over 9.

Thursday 23. A strawberry for breakfast. An alteration, of some man on the street, just Mr. Hall. Preparing sermons. In afternoon, called on Mrs. Lamkin: her gossip about the other church-bells. Went to Mr. Kiddon; but heard she had removed. At the Stockade, asked for Dr. Smith; but, he was

very bad blowing cold. My cold in the head becoming more distinct. In evening called on Mr. W. Q. Morris; he is real ill, his wife mortal ill.

Friday Aug 24, Last night and today, the coldest of the season. At noon, a fire at the hotel & in evening, written. Hot sun, and very fine moon, from Coney, Pa.

Saturday 25. Last night very cold; could not get my feet warm. Over-draped myself until near 8. A. M. felt dull all morning. The cold I caught at Waldo, is gradually going from my head to my stomach; but, I think, it is only a cold, not a grippa. Kept up a warm fire all day. By express, came a package of magazines from Beside; and a pretty lamp-shade from May. My appetite good these days. Have taken to coffee, in the evenings also, and no longer eat the poorly-baked hot biscuits to see served 3 times a day, at the hotel. It is a bright, in the afternoons, cold, to-night & Sabbath 26. A bright day, and warmer. The tickling in my throat troubled me, & my

Was very tired this afternoon, and lay on my bed most of the time. The night dark and threatening, with a little rain.

Monday Jan'y 27. Warm pleasant morning; did not need my coat, nor fire in my room. Saw the first automobile at Stark, Dr. G. C. Ferguson in it. Wrote letter to Mrs. Gould and Mr. A. E. Flann. In afternoon, visited Mrs. Kiddon, who is boarding at Mrs. Bent, New Wills. In evening, went to the Treasury, to see the Volunteer bill; but, the door was closed, as they were having a meeting, & I waited in vain.

Tuesday 28. Wrote notes, to be given to Miss Beaumere, for the week's voyage to Tangier. Read. In afternoon, called on Mrs. E. L. Livingston, and Mrs. Bent; and, at Dr. Bent's, at his drug-store. And, after supper, at Mrs. Bentley's, all of these successful visits.

Wednesday Jan'y 29th. A warm day, not needing fire in morning, except for some dampness of the outer shades. Strawberries on the table. Waiting on the "Childhood of Jesus". At Prayer meeting, there was a
Thursday Jan'y 30th. Weather variable. Did not feel energetic. Wrote and read. Called at office of Dr. Francis, and also at Mitchell's drug-store, to see the Doctor about my cold, as it has been hanging on now for 10 days. Weather much colder, as night came on.

Friday 31st. Weather moderated during night. It was raining, sleet, and blinding rain; but, scarcely any fell. Fell very dull. Read a copy from my Diary of 1892. In afternoon, called at Mr. Livingston's, to tell Mrs. L. that I could not make Marie to Sat. Sch., only on the 2nd and 4th Sabbath, as I was going to Hawthorn tomorrow. Called at Mrs. Steinberg's, to see the friend of Mrs. S., Miss Davidson, from Chicago, who was at Prayer meeting last Wed'y. Had tried, yesterday a h-day, to see Dr. Francis, to get medicine for my cold. Found him at Mitchell's drug-store, after supper, and, he

empty my room vessels. He did so once, & I gave him a dinner. Dr. Francis came, & he saw that some change was necessary for me. Mrs. John, & her little grandchild "Willie", & Mr. Maloney were helpful. Miss Truly & Knight came, in afternoon, & said they would send a man to sit up at night. My food came from the hotel, at noon & night. At night, came a Negro man, to watch with me,

and to give me my medicine, at the house. But, the night was cold; he had come without an over coat; &, though he sat by the fire all night, he frequently shivered at the cold; And, twice he was asleep when I called for medicine, & I could not wake him then. And, he helped me with medicine only 4 times.

On Sabbath, 2nd., was sorry I had had to send word on Friday that I would not be able to go to Hawthorne. At breakfast time, one after another came, almost at same time, Dr. Francis, Mr. Truly, Mrs. Knight, and Mr. Hadmen Jones & his son, Mrs. Hanford, came, she carrying my basket of food, & saying I must come to the hotel. It was an immense relief! For, I had thought of asking Dr. Francis to send me to Jacksonville, to a hospital; & Mrs. Knight, who would have liked to take me to his home, had thought of sending for a trained nurse from Jacksonville. Dr. F. conjectured, if the weather, which was clear & cold, should not

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got worse. Mr. Knight, called again, during the morning. About 1.30 P.M., Mr. Delw. Jones came, in a 2-horse closed carriage, dressed me, bundled me up, & with a few things, in my suitcase, took me to the hotel. At the gate, a strong man lifted me out of the carriage; and Mrs. Jones met me in the hall; and, I was helped up stairs. The room was warm with a fire; the bed warm; & Mrs. Hanford was there to receive me. That evening was a M. Wall, one of our visiting church-members.

- During the week, I was kindly visited by (1) the 3 Elders, Francis, Tracy, & Ticon; (2) by Mr. and Mrs. Hall, and Mrs. Livingston, & Mrs. Uglow. (3). Rev. Dr. Inman and Odem. (4). Others called at the house, & left their names, among others, Mrs. Liddon. (5). The fellow-brader, Mr. McElhenry, came in daily. and (6) the hotel girls were coming in frequently.

From the first, I have hoped to be well, so as to preach on Sabbath 9th. But, on Thursday^{6th Dr. Francis said I could not be; for, besides the la-grippe, the case was complicated by an African malarial chill, and, with my right lung, weak from 3 former pneumonia's, the cough was tracheal, & sore, and there was a slight pleurisy, aggravated, probably by too much talking with my visitors. My}

right side had to be painted with color.
I did it, at first, by swabbing with my hand-
kerchief; but, afterward, Mrs. Jones and Mrs.
Hawford did it for me, with a feather.

I was troubled at the thought of the church being
closed on Sabbath, Dr. Francis said to Rev. R.H.
Morris, formerly of Stark, now of Germanton,
was in Waldo, & was coming here, as his
guest. I asked the Doctor to phone them,
mentioning him, as my name, to come and
preach for me. Later in the day, he
said he had done so. But, I do not know
at whose invitation, whether of the Dr., or of
Rev. Durman, or of some adherents of Dr. Morris,
the matter was turned into, the occupying
by the latter, of the West. pulpit, as a
"union service", for the morning only, as he
w^t came by rail, & left by rail. And
it was so announced in the Friday^{th?} local
"Telegraph." I think it was a disconcerting
ministerial to me. And also, Mr. Morris,
& Elder Francis ought to have thought more
of the regularity of our Presb. Service,

than of giving Mr. Morris the personal honor of a large audience, at the Meth. ch., thus closing the Presb. ch.; for, there was no real "union" service, because the Bapt. & Episc. still held their usual services. In the end, Mr. Morris had that word on Sat^g⁸, that he was still detained, and could not come, for the morning service, but would arrive for the evening. He did so; but, he sent me no word of regret, or in any way communicated with me; and left, at night.

On Sat^g⁸ afternoon, D. F. Reed said that I might dress on Sab. afternoon, and be discharged on Monday¹⁰. After some difficulty, my laundry came, on Sat^g afternoon.

I rose and dressed myself on Sab^l, afternoon, the 9th, and intended to go down to supper; but supper was brought to me.

On Monday the 10th, I came down to breakfast; but felt very weak. After breakfast, walked to my wood-man, Mr. Bores, and ordered a load of wood. Walked back to the hotel, packed my suitcases, and came to this

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lodging. Made up a fire; carried up wood, from my pile. Rested; and, near noon, carried my soiled clothes to the laundry; & came back, having forgotten my sets of tarts. Rested, & read all afternoon, except that I piled up the load of billets, ^{that} Bores brought. was very tired at supper. After supper, sat and read by the fire, until 9. P. M., and went to bed.

Tuesday Feb'y ^{11th. A damp, but not cold day. Did not stay out in the air more than my going & coming from meals required. The blooming foyards had not been injured by last week's 26°. Incident of the torn wrapper of daughter Mary's Columbia hat-ager, & her markings in it. Paid my bill, at the hotel. But, at the drug-store, Mr. Mitchell did not have his acct. ready. Met Rev. Mr. Odom, & Mr. Knight. Was very tired at noon, & lay down most of the afternoon. Finally, after waiting 3 months, I am acquainted with Mrs. Rodman Jones. Just before supper, Mrs. Thorpe invited me into the parlor, where the baby was.}

Wednesday Feb 12, slept a long tired sleep, last night. This morning ~~exceeding~~ heavy fog. but, by noon, it was clear and warm. Went to Mr. Tracy's, to see whether he would be on hand, for prayer meeting. Went to Dr. Francis, to report myself, as I felt so weak. Rested, most of the afternoon, on bed. Supper was late, and I got only a hasty meal before going to prayer meeting; present, Mrs. Bell, Rev. Tracy, & Miss Florence, & Miss Kirby, & Rev. Dr. Lindy. Big snowfall last night.

Thursday 13. A warm day, with thermometer over 70°. The juncos, and peach blossom. Wrote a short letter. Very tired, and no energy. Dozed a good deal, this evening, until the call on Mr. Alvarez, by 7.30, but think it was too late; one light down stairs. Mr. Maloney gave me Phila paper to read.

Friday 14. Another pleasantly warm day. Felt slightly better. Called at Dr. Francis, & at midday, drug-store, for more medicine. Wrote a few letters. Planning for my going to Walla tomorrow.

On Sab. morning. Sat in my room, and rested. Went in time for Sab. Sch.; but took no part in it, as I wanted to save my voice. A good audience present, but, my voice was weak. After dinner, sat with a fire in my room, and lay on my bed, & thought for the evening. At night, the air much cooler; but, I buttoned up my coat. Had felt tired, after each Service, but rested between times. At supper, Mr. Moore, of Hawthorne, was present.

On Monday. Slept well & warm last night, though the air was colder. Left, on the 8.45. A. M. train for ^{Stearke} Dallas. Felt strong; stopped at post-office, on the way to this house. Read. Bundled clothing; and, in the

Thursday 20'. Wrote several letters. Clear, but very cold weather. Took a note of thanks, for the attention I received while sick, to the local newspaper, to have it appear tomorrow.

Felt chilly, & faint sickness, &c., did not go out to meet Capt. St. John in my room, by a hot fire.

Friday Feb'y 21. Weather still cold & frosty, thermometer down to 30°. Sun bright; but, I wore my heavy clothing, & muffled my throat. At Mr. Knight's store, Mitchell's drug store; Dr. Francis' office; & Horne's photog. place; found none open. At my sermon. Had note Report to the Home Board.

Saturday 22. Weather still bright and cold. The "Telegraph" had in it my card of thanks for the attention received during my illness. I sent away 10 copies of it. Busy at my sermons for tomorrow, in afternoon, met, in the street, Mrs. Riving, and Mrs. Taylor; and

Sabbath Feby 23. Still clear and cool. Went to

their 2 little children also. A good company at
church. Read a read, in afternoon, & prepared
my sermon for night. Supper late: had to

Sunday, Mar. 8th. Warm and clear. Felt dull in prospect of preaching, as my voice was hoarse; but, I was helped. Mrs. Brownlee, Mrs. Logay, & Mr. Long at church. St. A. until 2. P. M. Welcomed by Rev. & Mrs. Stoudt, & Mr. Stoudt's parents. A late lunch. I was tired, and rested for 2 hours in my room. At 4. P. M., the Specie President, Rev. Mr. Heidig came, with his electric machine, to arrange in the stone opticon views of our W. Africa Mission, in the church. I spent more than an hour, in arranging the slides, in proper order. A large company of 200 people, in the Tabernacle room, all talked for 1½ hours. And, when they dispersed, a company kept me telling stories of Africa for 1½ hours more. (In afternoon, I had time a little walk on the streets.)

Rev. Dr. W. E. Jones, of Phila, present: A lady asked me about Rev. Dr. J. A. Wilson, & his connection with Africa; a lady said she had gone to school

at father's Lawrenceville School, (maiden name, Browning?) Mrs Moore particularly enjoyed & told the character of native African Christian life. Still talking, in Mr. Starks parlor. Felt quite hoarse.

On Friday. Walked out, bid, perhaps th^{is}, Mr. Starks' father took me through the hotel "Fleiger" (met Rev. Mr. Campion & daughter), and "Pond de Leon". Mrs Burgess came to announce for another lecture to-night. Rested, in afternoon; walked to the H.H. Station. At night, talked, for over an hour, to 50 people, about African Natural History. Went to bed very tired.

Saturday. Was awaked, at 6. A. M., by wind. At a slight break, by 6.30; and, to the Station, by 7. A. M. Train late a slow. Mr. Sherman in the car. At Larkinsville, just in time to get ticket. After supper, went to call on Mrs. Long; Col. L. was not at home, a pleasant chat with her & the 2 children. On returning to Mrs. Jones, Mr. & Mrs. Elkins came on the veranda, & had a pleasant chat with them. A huffy day, bright ed., and stars bright.

Saturday, 28th. Warm day, At my sermons; but, felt rather dull. In afternoon, went to station, & saw the hundreds of bushels of strawberries being prepared for market! Met Capt. Heidinger, who showed me the ice-boxes. Mrs. & Mrs. & Miss Truby, and Mrs. & Miss Sternberg, & Miss Frank. Mrs. Truby

gave me a quart of fine berries to eat. Recited
Mrs Greeley to her house, came home & ate some
of the berries. Felt tired, after working sermon, &
laid on the bed. After supper, sat on the veranda,

came from faintness at the late breakfast at the hotel.
Went to Mr. Livingston's, to meet little Marie, with

Monday, March 30th. Was very tired and exhausted by the physical exertions of yesterday. Read a little; wrote a little; added a little to the "Story of her Childhood"; wrote a few letters; and lay on the bed a good deal. Thought there were signs of rain, to lay the thick dust. In evening, went to the Methodist ch., to hear a Miss Hollister, a lecturer of the W. C. T. U., could bear. But little did she say; & was not pleased by the way she called for votes of the women & of the men; nor could I agree with all of her extreme positions on the Temperance question.

Tuesday 31st. Warm day. Wrote my semi-monthly circular letter, & some other letters. Made no calls to-day. Some music in the hotel parlor, while waiting for supper, by two men. After supper, a patent medicine man was making a long speech, by flaring lights, in the street; bought some apples to-day. To-night is slightly clouded; rain is needed.

- Wednesday April 1st. Another warm day. Changed suit of clothing & shoes, & did not make any calls. Wrote. In afternoon, 2 ladies, widows Johnson,

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called to see Mrs. Jones, & asked to see me, to converse about Africa. One of them, whom I had met before, at Mrs. Von Koenig's, proved to be a Universalist. In evening, a very small Congregational meeting, no larger than the one of 2 weeks ago. Not encouraging. After meeting was over, a talk with the trustees about my salary.

Thursday Apr. 2. Another warm day, was disappointed that the clouds of last night brought no rain. Writing; and some alterations & additions to the "Childhood Story". Was an hour late at dinner, my watch not having been wound up. Mending etc. A new moon to-night, & minstrel-show and dance on a street platform.

Friday Apr. 3. Thermometer marked quite a change during the night. Quite cool. Wrote some letters. Prepared for going to Hawthorne, to-morrow.

In afternoon, called on Mrs. Journeay, Capt Von Koenig, Mrs. Fernandez, and Mrs. Liddon, and, in evening, on the Sternberg family.

Saturday Apr. 4 To the tailors, after breakfast. On Sunday .. 5 my way to Station, on Walnut st., ^{at 11 A.M.} met Mr. Jones, who introduced

On Sabbath, met a large audience. The bouquet of amaryllis, Mrs. Hammond, sister of Mrs. McQuiness. In town, a temperance lecture. At night, music unperfected, Mrs. Old Stott at the melodeon.

On Monday, the Principal of the School, Mr. Overholt(?), (himself a Baptist preacher), asked me to conduct the devotional exercises of Public School. I did. And then, I told them of "Dude Sets", & my elephant escape. A new station master, Mr. Chaseney(?).

Retired, on afternoon train; Mrs Carrie Nation on the train. Walked from the station with Rev. Mr. Malphrus. (Rev Hilton also had been on the train.) At Starkie, got letters, bought envelopes & sugar, & strawberries. At the hotel, found that Mrs. Hatford had returned. I was in the parlor, & she played some brilliant pieces. After supper went to call on Mr. J. H. Jones, & found him knighted.

Tuesday Apr. 7. Wrote some letters. Many articles to put in order in my trunk. Made further alterations in the "Childhood"; dividing it into Chapters. Heard that Mrs. Hanford is engaged? to I am afraid.

Wednesday April 8. A very warm day. Wrote a little. At dinner time, was much indignant to, though my place at table was not occupied, there was no chair there, nor did the waiter get me any. I had to wait until some one else was done.

In afternoon, called on Rev. Mr. Malphurs; but, my knock was not heard; then to Mrs. Hanford; but, she was resting, & I would not have her disturbed; then to Miss Ray's. Signs of rain, as I came home; but, the clouds passed. Prayer Meeting; Miss Kuhl gave me a basket of very fine strawberries. On the way back, Mr. J. H. Jones hailed me, & I sat on his veranda, and chatted of affairs.

Thursday 9th. Had a headache all day; did very

Friday, April 10. Worked on my sermons. In afternoon, at 3 P.M., went to call on the Reinach family; on the way, overtook Miss Reynolds, & walked with her to her home. She had a headache, & I did not stay long. The dry bed of affluents of Alligator Creek, the deserted Lover's Lane, fell well, and decided to walk to the Kubel family. It was overcast,

Saturday Apr. 11. Was very tired, from yesterday's walking. Then, I ran to the Station, where Mr. Truly was very busy, & inquired after Mrs. J., who had been quite sick. At the hotel supper, sat at the table with Mrs. Hulford. Before this, however, in the late afternoon, I bought, at one of the Alvaro stores, a sweater undechis; for today, to be the warmest day of the year.

Sunday Apr. 12. Last night was cold, & I resumed my cardigan, which I had laid aside 2 weeks ago. As usual, went for Marie Livingston, for Sab. Sch. The attendance today, less, last morning

and evening, than any day since I have been here. Most of the steamer commercial men left today. Mrs Fernandez ^{put} _{1/2} large bouquets of sweet-peas on the pulpit. This evening, the Stark militia were recommended to go to the street railway riots in Pensacola. Walked from church with Mr. Knight, and ^{were} quartered at his residence for the night.

Monday April 13th. Large list of letters from my native Batanga friends. Gov. (of New York) Hughes' secretary acknowledged my letter to him, concerning him for not pardoning the young murderer, Charles Gillette. Wrote my circular family-letter; also letter to Miss Scammell. A heavy shower came up, in the afternoon, which cooled the air. In evening, went, by appointment, to the Post-office, to receive of the church, Hull, for my salary due on April 1st; but, only half of it was ready. Preparing for the journey to East tomorrow.

At 8h again, in afternoon; but, left, after having had an unsatisfactory interview with the Home Mission Com., and rested in my room, for the evening. At night, after the Report, by Rev. J. R. Wright, I spoke for 30 minutes, and met many pleasant people afterward. Elder & Mrs Leonard were there, with Rev. J. C. Stent, from St Augustine.

On Thursday, again at 8h;

but left before it adjourned, at 11 A.M., to ride, with Dr. McDowell, to his country home, was entertained by him M.D., on my homeward way. His large acquaintance with Missionary enterprises, constant conversation. In afternoon, Dr. M.D. drove me to see his Orange farm, showing of his losses by freezing. Left. After supper, he drove me, (notwithstanding his having been unhealthily) his horse upsetting the wagon during the morning, in Eustis) to Eustis, to church, & he immediately returned. Regretful good by.

Waited an hour for the train. Sunitten-plant, & many wild flowers. The boat-ride made me think of the Ogooué Lakes^{of Africa}, & the herons, & some trees. At Leesburg, the conductor politely started my ticket, & at Waldo, bought a sandwich; & did not eat at Ocala. Cold wind from the north. Dr. Hunter on the train. At Staats, rode in carriage to New Johns. Went to Post office. Letter from New Baldwin. Wald afternoon. After supper, went, to call on Rev. Hinsdale. Cold night. Built my wood-fire in the evening. A delightful visit at last; & a "removal" into, on the Lake.

Saturday April 18th By the new schedule, 9.47 A.M.; to Sabbath .. 19th Waldo. Had not slept well at Monday .. 20th night, & was sleepy, & lay in my

room; and looked over for noon, about 4:00 P.M., went and called on Mrs. Strickland, and on Mrs. Jolly. Came down again to hotel, & found the Baptist lady, from the country, Mrs. Milliken, on the hotel veranda, & chatted with her; & went on, and called on Miss Thompson. (had met her sister, Miss Thurber, on the street.) Then, saw Mr. Blackslag, at the Station, & Mrs. Renault, at the Restaurant. In the evening, took the 2 little boys of Mr. Thigpen home African Folk-lore.

On Sunday, a good company in church; and, on Mrs. Jolly's invitation, I took dinner with them. Rested in afternoon, prepared sermon; & again met Mrs. Milliken, on the hotel veranda. A large company at church, in the evening. Dark night.

On Monday. — Returned to Stark, by morning train, day very warm. Did little but arrange odds and ends. Went to Minor's store, to buy a spool, with which to eat the grapefruit Mr. Bishop gave me at Eustis; but, Mr. Minor did not break sets. Got 2 common ones at Whiting. On the stairs, met the lady who is lodging here, & found that she is married, & her husband, and

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his brother are here also. And, in the evening, after supper, found new folks on the veranda, with a young English lady, a Miss Cooley, very well educated, & fine conversational powers.

Tuesday Apr. 21st. Sent 3 photographs to Eastis, & a copy of "Festusheim" to Eastis College. Mr. Knight came to see me, with invitation, from Mrs K., on part of the Daughters of the Confederacy, to omit my Service on Sunday, & join in a Memorial Service, in the Mett. church. I declined. At dinner, was introduced to Mrs Bifford, the music-teacher. Late in afternoon, at 3.40, came word, from Mrs Liddon, for me to come to the Church & Park, for an Easter play with the Sab. Sch. children. It was Sunday, as I knew of no such places. I went, and had a pleasant time; the ladies in charge were Mrs Liddon, Mrs Uglow, & Mrs Kuehl. With Mrs Miller, I wheeled the carriage of her baby grand daughter, child of Mrs Fernandez, back to her home. At supper, met Mr Williamson, the fiance of Mrs Hanford, for whom a Reception had been held, in the afternoon. In evening, went with Mr. Knight, to hear Representative LaCoste make a speech, candidates for the U. S. Senate.

Wednesday April 22. A very slight shower. Had to get up at 5. A. M., with a diarrhoea. Clouds during the day, but no rain. At breakfast, Mr. De Witt Jones said Dr. West Harford wanted me on the phone. He wanted me to be at the Episcopal church at 9.15 A. M. I knew it was for his wedding. I went, in my very best suit, & with a few white roses. The little church was almost full. The ceremony, by Bishop Weed, & Rev. Mr. Holman. I threw the roses at his feet, & they sailed out, after the ceremony. And, at the carriage, said good-bye. At sermon, and reading papers. In afternoon, went to see Dr. Francis; but, he was not in his office; I was told about Mrs. Williamson's (Mrs. Harford's) unhappy life with her first husband. Mrs. Beecher at table, at the hotel, a very bright companion, making one think of "The Lady of the Decoration". At evening Prayer-meeting, Mr. Greeley still favoring closing the church, on Sunday morning, for the daughters of the Confederacy; but, I can not consent.

Thursday 23. Pleasant chat, on the veranda, during the day, with Mrs. Cooley. Went twice, during the day, to Dr. Francis, to consult with him for Elder,

about the confederacy matter: but, he was not in.
At about , at the Post Office, with Mrs. Bierce. Went
to Capt. Long's office, and he introduced the confed-
eracy matter, & I was pleased to be endorsed one,
in my objecting to using the churches for that

After supper, called at Mr. J. H. Jones, & presently
Mrs. Mitchell came also, & I had a pleasant
evening.

Friday Apr. 24. Did not do much all day, besides
completing my sermon. But, I marked out the
Chapters of my proposed "Tale of Sappas", a thought
that came to me a few weeks ago. Went to office
of Dr. Francis twice, to consult about the Senior
Records, but, he was not in. Went to Mr. Knight's
store, and inquired about going with him to the
decoration of the Confederate grave on Sabbath
afternoon; being willing to make no concession, for the
dead, though I had refused to give up my church
Service. Mrs. Bierce very cordial. Also Miss Cooley.
After supper, went to call on the Hull family, and
explained about my refusal of Mrs. Knight's
invitation, & my decision to preach on Sabbath.

Saturday April 25. Went again to Dr. Francis' office, found him, and corrected some entries in his church Session Minutes, & told him about my refusal to give up my church-service for tomorrow; and, he entirely commended me. At the printing-office, bought some extra copies of the "Telegraph". After lunch, accompanied Mrs. B. Pearce to her studio, & heard her play piano to young Mr. Coover's violin. In afternoon, went to hunt for Mr. Wright's horses, but none were at home. Back to town, to Capt. Van Kerkel's; and told him about the church-affair; & he entirely justified me. A chat with Miss Cooley, on the veranda. After supper, went to the School-room, to hear the ^{Stereopticon} Lecture on "Panama", Mrs. Freeman, the promoter. A shamefully small number of people present; and the young Starkie man, who ran the electric machine, was consulting, and gave up his work & left the room. I was indignant. To-day, had come a papa, from Tanton, telling the marriage of Col. Roebbling to a Charleston lady.

Sabbath April 26. A very warm day. Went for Maria Livingston, on way to Sab. Sch.; but, her father, just starting in an automobile, said

that she was out at the Lake Kinglys. At Sub. Sch., the discussion, by Mr. Hardy, as to Rock Sovereignty & our Free Will, in the case of Jesus Christ. Conducted the morning Service, to a good audience. On way home, Mr. Hull's mother asked me to dinner. I went. Then returned to my room. At 3 P.M., went to the Mett. ch., on way, met Mr. Knight coming in his carriage, & he took me to the Courtney, for the decoration of Easter. Mr. Peck asked me to open with prayer, & close with benediction. Capt. Long's Speech. Met Mrs. Browne, Mrs. Beasant, Mrs. Chew, Miss Adkins, Mrs. Riving, Mrs. Livingston, & others. In evening, at Publ. ch. again, & walked home with Mr. Knight. So, what I feared, as a day of trouble, turned out a day of pleasure.

Monday April 26th. Last night so warm that I slept outside the covers, & woke late & unrefreshed. Wrote some letters. Went, for laundry. Went to Dr. Francis, - he not in. The street crowded, for session of the Bradford Co. Court. At Mr. Stockton, a candidate for Governor, at my table, at dinner; he made a speech in Courthouse, at 1. P.M., I recd the long, & was out there. In afternoon, again at Dr. Francis,

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but, again, he was out. Clouds all the day, & some thunder, & hopes of rain, but, none came. Bought a small brush ^{for strawberries} at W. Livingston's. At supper, Gov. Broward was at table, & was to make address at 8. P.M. In afternoon, I had gone to call, for farewell, on the Baptist Minister, Rev. Odorn, & found there was to be Reception at night. So I left, and, after supper, on the way, I stopped at Mrs J. H. Jones', where Mrs Knight was. But, she soon left, & went to her, Broward, with Mr. & Mrs Long. And I went on to Mr. Odorn's. Met Mr. Hatch, & others. sudden reduction of temperature, & cold wind.

Tuesday April 28. Weather turned cold last night, & a little rain; some cold rain this morning.

Felt very sleepy to-day. Writing odds & ends. The County concert still in session. At night, went to the School house, for the first effort of the Stark Bros Band, at a public concert. A concert and all off.

Wednesday April 29. Warm morning. Felt dull and sleepy. Writing out names of my Talaga natives of the Ogova. In afternoon, wrote my semi-monthly circular letter. Small Prayer meeting. Good evening.

Thursday Apr 30th. Heavy rain, early in morning. I missed one of my umbrellas, & went out to various places, not remembering where I had left it, - at the hotel, - at church, - at Mrs J. H. Jones, - at W. Knight's store, - at Lexington's stage store, - but, did not find it. At noon, a heavy pain over my pubis, as if a spasm in the bladder; it increased after dinner, making me to lie down more than 2 hours, & then it passed away, I do not think it was in my bowels. Put up & pasted 2 photographs, to Ombaglio, in the Eggers. In the evening, Open Air Concert by the Brass Band, I had met Mr. Bissell on the street, & engaged to call there to-morrow evening a light wind from N.W.; clear sky.

Friday May 1st. A very cold morning. Started my file again. Wrote some letters. In afternoon, went to call on Miss Atkins, not at home; on Mrs. Emily, not at home. To Mrs. Richards. In the evening a pleasant visit at Mr. Bissell's. ^{Mrs. Hawt.} L. ^{other} Wheeler,

Saturday May 2nd Morning train to Hawthorne, Rev. Mr. Abbott 113rd Malplains, the Bapt. minister, a fellow passenger. At Hawthorne, Mrs. Moore Haunday 4th just leaving, on a visit to Petersburgh.

Felt very tired & sleepy, went to Barber's, called at Mrs. McElhinney. Dr. & Mrs Channing called, in evening, & remained until 10 P.M.

On Sabbath, did not feel energetic; a small audience, & measles were epidemic, & a prominent man, a Deacon, out in the country had died. Stayed in house most of the day. Prof Oberholster came to attend the funeral. A better audience at night.

On Monday, very eyes very tired from yesterday. Called at the Littledale home, & saw Mrs L., also at Mrs. McElhinney, to say good-bye. Pleasant expressions of satisfaction. Two Southern Presb. clergymen, Rev. Mr. Huston, & Rev. Lunt (?) arrived, for purpose of organizing a colored Presb. ch. Called on Mrs. Stock at her store, & on Mrs. Stock at her house, to say good-bye. Left in afternoon, Rev. Mr. Hilton, the Baptist of Hampton, being on train. At Staats, rode in cab., saw Mrs. Babcock in another cab, & Mrs. & Atkins in the crowd. Took a suit to the tailor, to be cleaned. Went to Huber, to get my Payday photo, & to gain a paper with notice of El Paso church, & overtook Mr. & Mrs. Knight, who

Looked very weak. After supper, bought strawberries. The young moon darkened by dark clouds.

On Tuesday, a very warm day. Wrote several letters, went to the laundry. Slept some, in the afternoon. In morning, Rev. Mr. Duncan, the Meth. Pastor had told me he intended to bring his people to my final church service. When I went, about 6. P.M., to mail letters, at Post office, met Mrs. Bradloe, & walked with her to her home, & took supper with her & her mother. A very eventful and traveled life of her mother Mrs Hawley = Bradloe.

Wednesday May 6: The entire day rainy, with heavy clouds. Wrote several letters, and selected texts for sermons. At prayer meeting, at night, told the trustees to get extra seats for the Methodist visitors for the evening of May 24: & also warned them that my salary was only partly paid.

Thursday May 7. An ideal day, clear, & not too warm, blue sky & white fleecy clouds. Took another suit to be cleaned, at the tailor's. Some letters. At my sermons. Felt very sleepy. In the evening exhibition, after the rains which were threatening long enough, a tolerably long Address, by a Dr. Yocom, a School Principal. Dr. Russell was so disengaged as to forget to call on me, for the invocation, for which he had asked.

Saturday 9. Another cool day. The prevalence of the broad-brimmed peak-topee Mexican straw hats worn by women & girls. In afternoon, met Mrs. Rivington on the street, & we went to call on Mrs. Boggs; saw only her mother, Mrs. Wheeler. Then, I went to call on Mrs. Williamson, her husband, & another lady.

Then, I called to see Mrs. Fernandez, & saw only her mother.
Cool, clear, moonlight night.

The Evening Procession into the Gymnasium. My Address for half-an-hour, was complimented. Felt pleased, and thankful.

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Battle Creek (June 1908)

Sky dull in morning of 18th; but, bright, in afternoon. Took a walk across the creek, to other side of town. Dr. Douton & Kellogg, left, at noon, saying nothing about payment of my expenses. So, I spoke to Dr. D. about it, & he told me to make a list. Read, & recited. Spoke, at Crittenden, afternoon prayer-meeting. After dinner, took Rev. Woodside to the cream Saloon. In evening, in parlor, Dr. Reed's Lecture on "Medical Friends." Went to bed very sleepy.

On 19th. Mr. Woodside led morning-prayers. At the College, spoke to W. Tenney, about my expenses. Went down street, at noon, to drug-store, & inquired for papers & magazines. Met Miss France, E. Balton, L., as a reporter, she engaged me for an interview. Heavy rain, at dinner-time. Interview from 3. P. M. to 6. P. M. At 7.30 (beginning of Sanitorium "Sabbath") gospel songs, in the Lobby. At 8. P. M. Captain McCay led Prayer-service in the Chapel. Went to bed late, being anxious about my pay, as Treasurer Stewart had not called on me.

Battle Creek (June 1908)

On the 20th. The Sanitarium (71 day Baptist) "Sabbath" in the Chapel, in pulpit with Chaplain McCay. In afternoon, on the lawn, Rev. Woodside talked on Africa. (Had found, at Clark's dock, a check from Dr. Stewart for \$75. Expenses \$43, a honorarium \$32.) Walked, with Miss Bolton, down into the town, & to her home. Her efforts to have me invited to preach, by Rev. Mr. Potter, in his Presb. pulpit in the town.

On the 21st. Heavy thunder & lightning last night, went, with Rev. Mr. Johnson, to Rev. Potter's church, & there met Rev. Potter, who, at late hour, asked me into his pulpit. I declined. The afternoon appointment, for a brief lecture, by me, on the lawn, for 4. P.M., was mixed up with an appointment of Mr. Citterton, for 3. P.M., I spoke for 25 minutes, ^{at 8 o'clock}; and he followed. And, in evening ^{in the parlor}, I spoke for 1 hour. And then, I said good-bye, from church; in the morning, I had walked home with Miss Bolton; and she told me of the persecution and injustice she had been subjected to by the Sanitarium authorities.
