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

Saturday Sept 4^c. In the morning, wrote letters. In afternoon, a Rev. Allen called. Went with Mrs Swan, to call on Judge Pringle, at the St James Hotel. Met the Episcopal minister, Rev. Everett, there. Went to Leroy. At the depot, was met by young Edward Parsons. Rev & Mrs. Miss Parsons. Chatting; walked with Mr & Mrs Parsons.

Sabbath 5^c. Communion Sabbath; assisted Mr. P. in the distribution of the elements. At S. A. Schaefer, spoke a few remarks. Met a Rev. Clarke, & Elder Gillett. Sang hymns in afternoon. Mr. P. on bass, Rev. P. on, Miss P. alto, & I the tenor. Spoke on Africa, in the evening. Met Prof Stanton & Mrs Stanton.

Monday 6^c. Walked with Rev. Parsons to the Lyceum University, - into the Conservatory; met Prof Wiles & a Miss Chapin. At Mrs Stanton's Cottage; Henry, & Mrs Hayes, & Mr Taylor from Montana. Mrs J. read, from the Bible, many texts to prove her idea that we & the English are the last 10 tribes. Went with her to the Conservatory again, after dinner. At dinner, had met Miss Chapin, & her son & step-daughter,

Mrs Prof. Staunton, and two Misses Chapin.
Returned to Mrs Parsons, and enjoyed some music
from Miss Parsons. Had to hurry to the depot just
in time for the 6 P.M. train. At Batavia. In the
evening, called on Mrs Taggart with Mrs Swan
a sister Emma.

Tuesday Sept 7th. Rode, with Mrs Swan's carriage
& his horse "Puss", out to Mr. Jacks; had a
pleasant chat with Miss Julia Jacks, - played a
game of croquet with her. Returned to dinner.
In afternoon, Mrs Jacks, on her way to sewing
Society, called at Mrs Swan's, & Miss J. & I
rode for 2 hours out in the country. Then,
on returning, went on to Society. I went to
Miss Jones' at 5. P.M., & walked with her to
Mount Lucy. Weather quite cool. Miss Jones
surprised me by approving of dancing & cards.
Met carriage returning from the society,-
Judge & Mrs Taggart, - Squine Cowdin, etc.
While we stood on the top of Mt. Lucy, Mr.
Walker, riding at a distance, recognized us,
& shouted "Hip! hip! hoorah!" in a very
amusing way. Returned at dusk; on the

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way to the post-office, met Mrs. Walker, & joked over our view on Nat. Lucy.

Wed. of Sept 8th. Went to Mrs. Judge Taggart, & showed her a Miss Clark my African picture, talked with her about a small 2-oval box for Africa. In afternoon, at 5.11, left on the Erie R.R., for ~~Warren~~^{Teran}; waited there till 6.55, on State Line for Warsaw; 10 minutes break, & 20 minutes delay at W. junction. Did not reach Warsaw till 8.20^{p.m.} Left my bag at brother's, & hastened down to prayer-meeting: reached there in time for the last remarks & hymn. After meeting, met Miss Phillips.

Thursday 9th.

Waiting in morning, & went, in Mr. Dudley's horse & carriage, to Martinville, on the way to South Warsaw, with Mrs. Nassau & her African wood, to the turning mill. A mill for turning rollers for attics, one of the only 3 in the U.S. Handsome inlaid wood-work of boxes, tables, & frames. Many people in Warsaw at the County Fair. In the afternoon, went to Mrs. Patterson's with flute: played flute & piano with Miss Jenny Patterson, &

tuned the guitar. Returned to brother's, in the evening, visited at Mr. Fisher's, on the way, stopping at Mrs. Patterson's to get the case of her guitar. At Mrs. Fr's, during the evening, Mr. Cook & Mr. Walker, young men, called. After they went, I played on the guitar some. Left about 10. P. M., - on the way, returned the guitar, & sang a little while at Mrs. Patterson's.

Friday Sept 10th. Preparing for the afternoon Preparatory Service. At 2. P. M., made the preparatory lecture. Met Mrs. Dr. Gates of Niagara. Returned home. At tea, were Mr. Aug. Frank, & Mr. & Mrs. Wash. Frank. Miss Phillips & Mrs. Warren rode out horseback, - Miss P. soon returned, Mr. W. having been thrown from his horse. Mrs. Phillips called, to make a pic-nic party for tomorrow morning; but, I have to go to Rochester tomorrow. In evening, I called with brother & Mrs. Nassau at Mr. Duddly's, & said good-bye. Just ten years ago my wife died.

Saturday 11th. Bade good-bye to brother's family, & left, on the morning train, for Rochester. On the train, was a man of the Bob. Ingalls

type, who was talking his infidelity, in a very bad manner, to be heard throughout the car. Took a tick on the train for transfer omnibus; rode to Powers Block, & thence took car to pasted Gibbs so, where, at No 20, Mr. Piggs lived. Found the way easily. He welcomed me. We walked out for an errand, & to Dr. Campbell's, to arrange for tomorrow. Returned to dinner, & met Mrs. Piggs. In afternoon, went to Mr. Leech's. Incident of the way of a woman, in the cars, dropping by mistake a dollar (for 50c) in the car fare box. This cash came to the door, - from Miss Sally, & afterward the father. Saw the ^{African} parrot. Rode back & found Rev. & Mrs. Thorburn awaiting me. From there came also Major & Mrs. Gill, & Miss Ward. While we were at tea, Mr. & Mrs. Alling came. I showed my African pictures. A very pleasant evening.

Sabbath Sept 12th. Preached in Mr. Piggs' ch. in the morning. Met a Mr. & Mrs. H. M., Mr. Merriman, Miss Hopkins, & Miss Hayes. Felt very sleepy after dinner, & dozed all afternoon. Spoke at Dr. Campbell's ch., in the evening, to a large

congregation. A collection was taken up for
steering a boat for Mrs Smith.

Monday Sept 13rd. Went with Mr. Riggs to the Ministers
meeting. First Rev. D. Robinson, Rev. Dr. Page ("Young"),
Rev. Dr. Sartorius (friend of Miss Cameron's pastor); Rev Mr.
Gaylord. Stopped in the Savery's Institution offices, to
see Prof. Wilkins, organist of St Peter's ch.: he gave
me some of Beethoven's Sonatas. Saw, from the window,
the marble fountain at the reservoir. Stopped at
a fire-engine house, & saw their rooms, & the horses,
& the mechanics. In afternoon, went to see
Miss Laura Hopkins, on Exchange st., & then
to Edinborough st., to 10 Jaemont Place. Came
back with her to 74 Bath Fitzlough st., at 4.30
P.M. where was a collection of more than 30
ladies, friends of missionaries. Shared my pictures,
& talked for an hour. Mrs Nichols, Mrs Agard,
Mrs Parry (a her niece Miss Hamilton & Ogleby³,
2 of the Young Lush Band), Mrs Rev. Dr. Robinson.
After the ladies had gone, I remained at Mrs
Allings to tea with Dr. & Mrs Campbell. Retired
to Mrs Riggs with Mrs Parsons, on the way toward the
home of Mrs P.

Rochester

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Tuesday Sept 14th. Mr Riggs took me a carriage-dinner through some of the finest streets, Mr Powers', Mr. Sibley's, Prof. Swift's, the Rochester University, elegant residences a grounds; the many little parks like private streets: a street with the ~~the~~ railway on each side of the street ~~and~~ in the middle. The water-works, - reservoir; the fountain, can throw 110 ft high - but to day only 60 ft., a magnificent sight. In Mt. Hope Cemetery. Returned a lower part of the way; the horse, "Rosa", suddenly fell slipping on the iron rail-way, but as suddenly picked herself up. At Mrs Riggs', his son Clarence, paints, has a taste for wood scroll-work & also writes writing. In afternoon, went to Powers' Gallery with Clarence, where Mr. Riggs was awaiting me; thence to the bookstores of Steele & Avery, where I left my traveling bag &c, with only my bundle, left Rochester, at 5 P.M. in Charlotte. Made immediate connection, at Rome, Waterloo & Ogdensburg R.R., for Wolcott, where I reached on time at 7.25. Hasted from the train up the village to the Presbyterian Ch., where a Rev. Bates was preaching. In the automobile, asked for Rev. Eaton:

The usher did not know her, but pointed out Mr. Eaton, who took me to the pulpit. After Mr. Babes' sermon, & a hymn, I spoke on Africa. I & pre & enjoyed it. Rev. & Mrs. Rice; Mrs. Wilson. was entertained at Dr. Wilson's house.

Wednesday Sept 15th. Attended Presbyterian meeting, prayer meeting at 8. A.M. At 9. A.M., P. B. G. as was invited a Con. Mee. At 10. A.M., the Ladies F. W. S. in the session-room, to which I was called at 11.15. Spoke until noon.

At Dr. Wilson's, they kept me talking constantly. An old lady, Mrs. London, had bought Jenny Hamilton's brads for Mission, for \$2.00. In the afternoon, with the ladies-meeting, for over an hour. They & P. B. G. adjourned. I stayed still, on Mrs. Wilson's invitation. Butree, ^{In the} ~~and~~ evening, called at Rev. Mrs. Rice & chatted about Africa.

day Sept 16th. All during the morning, ladies were coming in, calling on Mrs. Wilson, to hear me tell about African scenes. Young Mr. Leavenworth called, to invite me, in his vacation, down; but, Mrs. Wilson wd not have me go. At 2 P.M., Dr. W. drove me to the depot. Had to wait there $\frac{3}{4}$ hour for the train. Reached Rochester with 20 minutes to spare, to go to Steele & Avery & get my handbag. Met Rev. Dr. Robinson. The train was an hour late, started at 6.30. Reached Batavia comfortably. Excitement about Maine election.

Friday 17th: Writing letters &c. in the evening, wd have liked to go to teachers' meeting, but had to stay & write. Felt dispirited. Did not meet any one on the streets whom I knew, except Mr. Walker. Left my watch to be repaired.

Saturday 18th: Felt very tired but kept at the pen & ink & finished $\frac{1}{2}$ hour, ready for the Bible Soc. In the afternoon, Mr. Swan drove me a long ride of 8 miles down the Tuscarora. The street full of wagons. met no one whom I knew, except Miss Haywood. Played in the parl. & piano with Sister Emma. In the evening, Miss

was called to see sister. Accompanied them with the flute or a piano duett; etc. her to see home.

Sabbath Sept. 19th. At church, morning & evening;
in afternoon, at Sab. Sch. Convocation, in evg., at
the close, I was called on for a ^{short} speech in
Prayer meeting, where I spoke a few moments.
Next in the Convocation, Mrs. Weaver of the Quaker
church.; Mrs. Towne's tribute in the prayer meeting.
Monday 20th.

Packing & writing. Called on Miss Jones, diff.,
at 3.30, with ^{sister} Lizzie, on the A.Y. Central R.R., via
Rochester & Albany; on a Wagner sleeping car.
At Poughkeepsie, changed to a very good section.
At Syracuse, stopped to eat. Did not sleep
well at night.

Tuesday 21st. Reached New York at 6.45 A.M.
Cars to Deshous St., via 4th Av. Caven, &
change at Grand St. Waited at the Jersey for
luggage & ate lunch there. Caught cars, at
evening City, on the 9. A.M. cars. At Trenton, left
with bundles in luggage-room, & Lizzie stayed
at the depot. I went shopping. A young Mr.

Kittie. The stage door kept one of my brushes.
At Lawrenceville. Returned to Trenton ~~late~~ ⁱⁿ for Dr. Bowman, at the Tri-Kliff Celebration. Got

in a flat house for evening meeting: could not
recognize Cousin Hughes there, in the dark.
Went to a. at 9th. Ch. told us by Dr. Wood
for Smith. This by Dr. Campbell.

Wednesday 22nd. Rode to Princeton with Mr. E. G.
to the U.S. At concert may woods. Done later
by Rev. Prof. Fleist. D.D. of Scotland. In Whig
Hall. In College Prayers. At the foot-ball practice.
In evening, at Reception, at "Mrs. Morris".

Thursday 23rd. At Will's room. At the Museum.
Scott & my manis also. Called at Mr.
Miller. In the Gym room. Called also is
Hegemann; Mrs. Jaurin of India. Rode
to Lawrenceville with Dr. Bowman. Festival
at the Central School-house, for a Sat. Sch.
library.

Friday 24th. Writing. Walked to the High school;
between 11 & 12, addressed the pupils on African
Education. Afternoon with Dr. Hamill & Claude.

Returned to the Parsonage. Wrote letters. Charlie Rosman ^{son} & wife came from Princeton in the evening. Music of flute, piano & voice, in the evening. Sat. eve. and night.

At night, visited Mrs Henderson; and went to hear Cousin Hugh Hamill make a Republican speech at the village inn.

Sabbath eve. Stayed at the High School to dinner. Addressed the Sab. Sch. assembly, at Lawrenceville church. After church, rode to Pennington, with Mr. Forney, & discussed his church.

Munday 27th. Returned from Pennington to the Parsonage; & packed my valise for a month's absence.

Tuesday 28th. Went to Philada, - I, at 133 1/4 Chestnut St., at full price, to the Council of the Pub. Alliance. Went to the Council in the evening with Mrs. Fetter.

Wednesday 29th. Did not go to the Council, but did shopping & bought friends, for a picnic. Went to Council in the evening.

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Thursday Sept 30th. Attended Council, in the morning; and, in the afternoon, went to Honeybrook, for Chester Co., to speak at a Ladies Meeting meeting. Miss Long had been holding a meeting in the afternoon. met a Miss Dampman, who sat alongside on the train, - a niece of Miss Buchanan. Staid at Rev. Mr. Tokers, - Mrs T, & her mother, Mrs King. Addressed the meeting, & walked home with Miss Dampman.

Friday Oct 1st. Spent the morning at Mr. Tokers, & dined at Miss Buchanan's. Returned to the city & to the Council. Came to see about going meeting with Charley Brown. Charley created confusion, by running off by the road. I went to tea, at Mrs Malone's. And then, went to Kensington train, for 8.20 P.M., to Tacony & walked from Tacony to Mr. Kershaw's, at Latta's Lane, very rapidly. Was anxious to find Charley there. Sang with Mrs Brooks.

Saturday 2nd. Start 9.30 A.M., 9 o'clock. Mrs & Mrs Goegler, - Mr Kershaw, & Mrs Brooks. -

Charley & I, & Reuben top, & young Barnes, rode all, in one one-horse wagon, to the woods, to gather chestnuts. ship she deemed not correct. At Mrs. ^{Mrs.} Temples Malone's, to tea, & preached
to her in the evening. Rev. Dr. E. D. Weston,

To Fennell & Hopper, the last builders on South St. Up town in rain, to Mrs J. H. Miller. Music room at night. Mr. Miller - Mrs Mr., - & Miss Julia Frost.

Tuesday 5th.

Rain: to sack a flax factory. Mrs Smith & Keogh & Co.: to White Star Spice: to Equitable building: to Tract Society. Wrote till after 5. o'clock; & then went to Erie depot, Janes City, & at 7.25 P.M., left on train for Elmira.

Wednesday 6th. Reached Elmira at 5.35 A.M., & changed to station Central at Cor. Penn Yan. At Penn Yan by S. & W., to Mrs Dr. W. Mills, corner Liberty & Court Sts. Rev. Dr. Hopkins. Mrs Mills step-mother. At 10. A.M., to ladies meeting presided over by Mrs House of Fairim, & Mrs Rev. Dr. Huntington. Addressed the meeting. Mrs Mrs Eaton, - Mrs Lewis, - Mrs Gould, - Mrs

Rev. Skinner Syracuse, - & Rev. Stewart of Auburn. Mrs. West with me to Mrs. Mills', & got a map. Sang with Miss Vassberg. Left, at about 7.45 in the evening, in a sleeping-car of Northern Central R. R.

Thursday Oct 7th.

Reached Philad. stat f. A. M. To Mr. Patten, but Prof. S. F. Clarke Ph. D. of Johns Hopkins University Baltimore. Left my slippers & tied & head-ache. At 3.30, P. M. to Salem N. J.: stayed at Corrin Thomas Craven's, - Mrs. Annie Sweeney, Mrs. Garner. The Craven children. Dr. Barnard called, also Mrs. Ware, anxious lest I had not come. At night, addressed the church with the story of Grando. Met many persons afterward, - Miss Marshall, - Mrs Cooper-Teiter & Mother of Miss Paul, - Miss Noble

of Utah, - Mrs (Miss Best), walked with Miss Kuhl & Brazil, to Mrs Hall's (sister of Charity Boyd's wife), who was Miss Mary B. Foster, of Benezet A. J. (Had met ^{Miss F.} ~~Dr Edward~~ in '72 at Burlington, N. J., at Rev. Hodge's,) Mrs ex-Eov. Parker, - Mrs Peers - & Miss Cleaver. Friday Oct 8th. Went early to Mrs Hall's & rode in omnibus to escort Miss Kuhl & Miss Foster to the depo^rt. Rode back with cousin Annie Avery to Mrs. Craven's glass-works. At Mrs. Craven's, Rev. Dr. Mather, & Mr. Hubbard called to see me, & so did Dr. Barnard. Left in afternoon, & returned to Philadelphia. Went to ticket-office & got ticket, & ordered express baggage. Mr. Shay & Elder Ripley 9 miles, to Lake George - past the Williams' Monument, - Fort George, Bloody Pond, - to Crassy side, & Caldarlli, & on the other side to Col. Pages residence. Most beautiful view of the lake, under the autumn surroundings. A perfectly clear beautiful day: cool. Rode back with the rapid horse to Glens Falls, In the Synod, a motion to pay my expenses to & from Synod was voted down: but, 3 private individuals, Adelicia & Herat, paid it for us. Addressed the Synod in the evening: not an attentive audience. A Republican parade at night, &c. as expected by the news of the Republican success in Indiana & Ohio.

Thursday 14^c. Rose early: cold morning. Cast my hat in the car with Elder Stone of Waterford - N.Y. Good-bye to Mr. Hawkin, & in the car to East Albany, where I was met

Friday Oct 15th. Wrote with Mr P. in his office; wrote letters: Called, in the afternoon, at Mrs Jones's, 48 Willett St., near the Park. Mrs J., 2 Misses J., Mrs Garrison, - Mrs (Miss?) Strong(?), - 2 Misses T. (Miss Fauny). Walked with these two ladies part of way to Rev. Dr Darling's, 771 Broadway; where I took tea & spoke for him, at his prayer meeting. One of these days, - I think it was the 15', was a pleasant day & I sat on deck, covered with coats & shanks, & studied French with Grady.

In the 16'. The pastor, Mrs. Williams, proposed having religious services; &, as the other two brethren were not very well, I conducted service. After this, I was too unwell, & the sea

was too rough for me to read or write. Spared days, shut in, sitting at the top of the companion-way. A succession of storms & gales. ~~There~~ ^{After} ~~the~~ ^{the} 17', 3 sails were torn away, & 2 boats were slightly damaged. &, for several hours one day, we "lay to"; &, part of the time, we went out of our way toward the S.E. to escape the force of the waves. There was no opportunity given for religious service on the second Sabbath, tho'

23rd, it was so unsatisfactory a day, that, in the evening, my wife & I & the other musicians, got together around the piano in the Saloon & sang hymns. Miss Harrap, Mrs Blau, Mrs Hutchinson & the French lady joined in. Just as a cloud, about 10 P. M., the vessel suddenly slowed, & the fog whistle blew. We thought a vessel had been sighted & had collision. I went to bed, but cautiously put a life-preserver where I could conveniently snatched it up. After a while, the vessel stopped the whistle, & went at full speed: & I felt assured that Farolet lighthouse had been sighted.

On the 24th Monday, when I rose, we were at the mouth of Queenstown Haven. A very winday day. On anchoring, we first heard that, during the past week a hurricane greater than had been known for years. Then we understood with gratitude when we had been delayed out in mid-ocean from reaching land sooner, & had thus been

Prevented from meeting the severity of the storm. We had been kept on its outer edges. Capt Morrison called us on to the bridge, to see the view of the rough sea. View of the light house on Rockie Point. On up the Channel, rough & rainy.

On the '25' Tuesday, at day break, we were near ing the Mersey & by 7. A.M., were anchored at its mouth, waiting for the tide. By 9. A.M. we were steaming up; & by 10 o'clock, the tender was alongside. As I went on deck, a note was handed me from Mr. Robertson, of Alexander & Christie, 64 South Castle St., Liverpool, giving me the address of Miss Cory, at Mrs Head's, No 10 Grenville St South, near Great George Square, as our lodging place. This he had sent in advance to the Company's Office, of puchase we had come in during the night. I had just read it, when Mr. Robertson himself came along. I am very glad to meet him, & he at once took charge of us. I was sorry for his information that the steamer "Concord" the next one due for our return coast,

was announced to sail on the following Saturday the 29th. This will prevent my taking my wife to see the sights of London. I had waited till the custom house officer was ready to examine our boxes, wh. they did with as little trouble as possible. They examined our silverware somewhat closely. Mr. Robertson helped us very much. Left most of our goods at Simpson's Restaurant Rooms, on the dock. Rode, for 2 shillings, to 10 Green with Mr. Cool day. The fire felt good. ate a very hearty dinner. After dinner, went out, & bought tickets for all the company, \$2.00 a-piece, for the Philharmonic Concert. returned; went out again to get flowers for Mary, in the evening. Started late. Fine music, & a fashionable audience at the Philharmonic Hall.

On the 26th. Wed^{ng}. Went with ^{Rev} Mr. Robinson to Mr. Robertson's, first leaving shore at Sharman's, went to see about Estimates for a steamer. Returned & made

Got back late to supper. Cold days & nights & quite cold away from Jin.

On the 27th, Thursday. After breakfast, went, with Mrs. Gaunt & Mary, to Vandefelt's, went out twice for her, once to buy a pair of stockings, & once for flowers. Had to stay a long time for the setting, - the weather was foggy. Had to hault down to the Prince's Landing, to meet appointment. Went with Mrs. Gaunt & Robertsons, to cross to Belknap's to Chester. Vandyke's, made some errands to Pennington's, the watchmaker, & found Mr. Gaul at the barbers, with a number of letters from me from Africa & America. On Nov. 5th, Sat., very early in the morning,
we anchored in Funchal Bay; excited
shoutings of the Portuguese sailors on the

small reefs & boats in the Bay, as the steamer came dangerously near them in an-
steering. Watched the sun rise over the hills
a valleys of Madeira. A boy diving for six-
pences. Went ashore with Mr Reed, of the
Edinburgh Hotel. Left Mary at the hotel, &
went to have all my Grand stand off, leaving
only one watch. Breakfasted with an other
clerical passenger. Walked about shopping,-
the narrow streets, - bustling cities, - beggars.
Not many fruits, - it was not the season. Came
off about noon. Miss Dabney, daughter of
the American consul at Funchal, aboard.

On Nov. 6th. Sabbath. Sighted Teneriffe early.
Had morning religious service. Rev. Mr. Lane of
Bathurst preached. Watching the Peak of
Teneriffe. Anchored at 3. P. M. Some of
the company went ashore. My wife & I did
not.

On Nov. 7th. Monday. The steamer had started
at between 1. & 2. M. A. by daylight, was
nearing Grand Canary. Mrs. Calveray was
my guest, a thought of leaving us & returning

142 pts "Lanceo" (Nov. 1881) Grand Banks
to Maderia by a steamer. It was being at anchor there; but, after consultation with the doctors, finally concluded not to. We came to action.) for the Capt said we would leave at 10 A.M. But, as might have done so, we were delayed by the doctors; & did not actually leave till noon.

On Nov. 8, Tuesday

" 9th Wednesday, saw, & the steamer passed through, a great field of tens of thousands of "skip-jacks", a fish somewhat like a small horse-mackerel.

On Nov. 10th Thursday, In the fit, abounding flying-fish, on this journey. Was sick with a sick, stomach; & a severe head-ache, in the afternoon. Did not eat any lunch or dinner. Went to bed feeling bad.

St. "Leonico" (Nov. 1861)

Bathurst

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Nov. 11th. Friday. Had a miserable night, with bad dreams & fitful sleep. Tried to dismiss them, & tried. Rose & saw that we were passing Cape Verde. Have been writing up the outline of the past few days in the diary; but do not feel well or happy.

In the afternoon, after dinner, felt better, & went on the bridge with Mrs. Massau; & the Captain was looking out for the buoys at the entrance to the Gambia river. A long while steaming in, & throwing the lead in sounding. Met a pilot, but Capt. Hamilton refused to take him; the pilot gave a letter to the Capt. from Capt. Griffiths of the steamer "Gibraltar" who we had passed very early in the morning. The wide mouth of the Gambia; the red sand bank setting in evening mist; the lights of Bathurst on St. Mary's island. Head church bells ringing above. The Wesleyan brother went ashore. Pleasantly cool quiet evening; sat with many a long time on deck.

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"St. leonisco" (Nov. 1881) Bathurst

Nov. 12th Sat. Rose early, for Mr. Patten was to come to take us all ashore to breakfast. Recovery were off early & the Sierra Leone clerks followed later; & boats came off with natives. About 7.30 A.M., our Father came & all on Langyana & Missourians came ashore. Mrs. Nasau interested to observe the new sights. The brig carried ashore from the boat in the arms of the Boatmen: native flowers; large cottonwood trees; Jollof & Mandingo men & women; monkeys for sale; children carried in a cloth on their mother's backs; oranges, lemons, sweet potatoes & other fruits for sale along the street side; swallows; hanging plants on the walls; coco-nut trees; banana trees; lime trees; papaya trees; Mandingo dervishes; At the Wesleyan Mission House. Rev. Mr. Dixon. A horse came for sale, young & not very strong for £18. A Mr. Jones sent another, rather odd, & not very lively, for £15.; & a third, from a Mr. Pratt, came for £18. After

Breakfast we examined the 3 horses & had the owners try their speed : the first one was not strong enough, & the owner put his price down to £15. : the second was not strong, & seemed sick, & I declined it : the third we all liked & its owner came & voluntarily reduced it to £15., & I took it. We had all gone into the church, into the borse-yard, at Mr. Patten's sick house, to the garden. After dinner we went to the school-house, & sang hymns, & were saluted by some of the people & church-members who came to see us. Sang a long while. Morning-read bee. Recited in the home. Lunched. Waited for a barber to come & shave us, & finally shaved ourselves. Went out through the market : kola nuts, - & vegetables & fruits. Scavenger bazaar. Buying a few things. At the agents', Mr. Brown, to see about the freight of the base : to Mr. Lewis (?), - Mr. Brown being sick, Capt. Hamilton was there. To Mr. Adams,

to buy straw & makin straw & grain for food for the horses on the way. Went back again to the Store (?) to see about the horses' freight. The clerk was gone. Was disappointed; for I wanted to finish up the matter ^{before Sunday} at once. The steamer & all the rest of the company had gone off before, or might be coming. The boat did not take them, on its return, went back with me. Reached the steamer just in time to sit down to the steamer's dinner. Went to the Purser to change some money, with whom to pay for the horse & etc. tomorrow.

Nov. 13th Sabbath. Rose early. Was not like Sabbath. Goods were being discharged, & the deck was crowded with makin. After breakfast, a lighter came off with the news, I had brought yesterday, lying on its dead. In lowering it in a sling, at the wharf, into a lighter, the sling had broken & he had been killed instantaneously. Capt. Hamilton & Mr. Calver remained ~~dead~~ ^{therefore}.

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Mr. "Corisco" (Nov. 1881) Bathurst.

Saying that the agent ^(But he was not) above was responsible & ought to pay some. Mr. Pulten & Mr. other Wesleyans claim; he said that Mr. Evans had refused to pay anything ^(He was right), of course, at one paid Mr. Pulten for Mr. Pratt & wrote a letter of claims on the agent, ^{Mr. Pulten} ^(Waiting time of it) was to prosecute for me & confused troubled. Cptt Hamilton gave his missal for service in the afternoon. Mr Baxter read Prayers; Mr Gault played a gam out a hymn, & Mrs Williamson preached. A few colored women on board, with a great show of dress. Dances with the native deck hands. Mr Gault not well. Nov 3.

Nov. 14th. Monday. At sea. Roads no entry. Mr Gault sick with symptoms of pneumonia.

Nov. 15th. Tuesday, sighted Sierra Leone early. Recd. Freedom harbor before noon. Mr J. A. Lewis came off to the steamer, expecting to meet Rev. Dr. H. H. Garnet

the recently appointed Minister to Liberia.
He stayed to lunch, as the ladies were attending
themselves, & then took Mrs. Nana & myself,
Mrs. Robison & Mrs. Gault ashore. Mr. G.
on took sick to go. At Convil Lewis,-
Mr. Yates, & the other minister from the steamer
came with Mr. Williams, & we all went
to the Wesleyan High School. Our Duty
the Principal: Mr. Clancy, Algebra class;
boys sang: one boy made a speech: we
made speeches. Left, & parted com-
pany with the Wesleyan brethren, & we 4
went back to Convil Lewis: visited: read;
note: ate supper at 5 o'clock. After supper,
Mr. Robison escorted Mrs. Gault to the
steamer & Mr. Lewis & Mr. Yates went with
Mrs. Nana (is a Bath chaise) & myself, to
the French Native Memorial Fun. Fair¹.
Mr. & Mrs. Briston. Tea, & colored tea in
present, - one Quaker, played a song
to the piano. Delightful school fungi-
puayer! so delightful to sleep in a quiet
room away from the sea.

Nov. 16th. Wed. F. Rose early. Sailed in our row. The garden & grounds of the hotel. Rode in Bally-ohans to a store, to buy some ~~old~~ ^{old} crepe (tulle) lace. On to the steamer, met Mr. Ward White, who had been writing to Mr. Wallyan's to send him over to the "mine" (Agona). Off to the steamer. The steamer delayed, hunting for D. Haal's large case, which eventually was found ashore. Two passengers, - Frenchmen for Monrovia. A pleasant day.

Nov. 17th. Thursday.

Paid Cape Mount, during the morning. Reached Cape Messarado, about 1 P.M. Went ashore with the 3^d officer & Mr. Elliott. Walked up, from Koro beach to the British Mission, Miss Sharp's. On the way, had been accosted by General Smythe, of America, who took us to Miss Sharp's, & there took me to eat at Mr. Berg's. Andrews, who are not at home. Hence to Mr. Moore's, with whom I talked about Mrs. Reed, & where I saw Hilary Johnson.

I also bought them 1/2 dozen callies & a little
box of crackers. Went to Post Office. Met
Rev. Mr. Gibson, the Librarian being on State,
& he promised to try to send me a fruit
I wanted. Went to Mrs. Sharpe again,
& thence, to Mrs. Sherman's, & talked about
Mrs. Freed. Then, to the Ross boat. Miss
Sharpe & Mr. Elliott came. In starting
from the boat, the crew were slow &
three successive waves dashed us.

On the steamer, cleaned clothes & Mrs.
Nason attended to Miss Sharpe's feet
& I attended to her fingers.

Three Librarian young men on board, as
salom passengers. Signs of heavy rain,
& I did not sleep on deck.

Friday Nov. 18: Slept admirably; woke
late. "feel very well. One of the young
Librarians, Mr. G. D. Moore, said he would
try to get me the African fruit I wanted.

Mrs. Sherman & 3 other Librarian ladies
came on board, at Bassa; &, being dis-
satisfied that they did not have the

ladies' salon to themselves, returned to the shore in dredgeon. The "Senegal" was lying at anchor, on her way to England, & I sent a letter to Mr. Robinson, ordering 3 bats, & to Mr. Malone, ordering drawing materials for our Bassan. At length, Mr. Galman gave vent to some outrageous opinions against the negro race. Two canaries by the "Senegal"; too Mrs. Sutherland at Calabar were dead, & Mrs. Anderson sick of dysentery.

In the evening, on deck, a heavy rain-storm drove us down stairs. Had seen in the evening, the north star. Fear it is the last view I may have of it.

Saturday Nov. 19.th Early this morning, steamer slowed, - fired her gun, - whistled, & called for Kow-tay^{men} at a place north of Ward Cess; only a few came. Slowed, - fired, & whistled, at Ward Cess, - more Kows came off. At Cape Palwas, in the afternoon, crowds of Kowmen came. Stood with Mrs. Bassan, & witnessed the mustering of the Kows by the French.

Mrs. Pearce was interested in the new lights of the causes & paddles & natives. We went on to the bridge, & then, with one of the officers, went to the very end of the bow, to see the anchor taken up. A joke was passed around, about my escaping being "chalked" by the sailors, for coming to the bow, because of the presence of the officer who was with me. Off again at 6. P. M., & on our way into the Gulf of Guinea.

Sabbath Nov. 20. At sea, & not near any port, so, our morning religious services were not interfered with, by discharge of or exception of cargo. Mr. Baxter read Prayers, Mrs. Robertson prayed & gave out a hymn, a Mr. Elliott preached. In the afternoon, at Cape Xabu; & in the evening, at Half Jack. Stories now every afternoon, or evening. Sang hymns with Mrs. Pearce during the day; & with one ministerial company during the night. The cleaner last at anchor until long after midnight.

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Grand Bassam (Nov. 1881) Elmina

Monday Nov. 21st. After breakfast, reached Grand Bassam. One young French passenger left us there: a very sick mulatto man came on board, to go to Accra, to hospital. Grand Bassam very hot, - bad surf, - a bad place. In afternoon, at Accra. The "Banguela" came homeward, anchored near us, & I wrote a letter to Dr. Sonie by it. A heavy rain-storm came up. We sat in shawls & coats under the canopy, a damp evening, but I sat on deck with Capt. Hansen. Have changed my stateroom to the one vacated by the Frenchman.

Tuesday 22nd

By breakfast, at Accra: the coast more elevated: rocky islands near shore like breakwaters: good landing. Mr. R. B. N. Walker (now in England) is engaged in gold-mining at this part of the coast. Came on as far as Elmina & anchored at 6.30^{A.M.} Mr. Elliott bears Timorran warning. did not enjoy the afternoon: evening, & we very unhappy at night.

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Cape Coast Castle (Nov. 1881)

Acrea

Wednesday 23: Steamer was early off from Elmina, & in an hour, was at Cape Coast Castle. Massive buildings ashore. Warm morning! Mr Elliott left for his work, & Misses Baxter, Williamson, & Marshall went ashore to spend the day. Felt better in the afternoon. About 4³⁰ ^{P.M.} steamer started again & ran on to Winnebah: arrived there in the evening, & found the "Galvin" aground there, where Capt. Monroe, came on to the "Conice", & I went into the Capt. office, to ask for news about Galvin. There were no news, & I was disappointed. Felt ashamed to have gone into the room uninvited.

Thursday 24: Handed Mrs Pearce a little Thanksgiving letter, for the memory of her son. Some of the company went off ashore at Acrea. After lunch, Mr Robinson, & Mrs Pearce & I went ashore in an ordinary surf-boat: walked through the streets of Acrea to the trading-house of the Bank German trading Union-house. Went to

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Accra (Nov. 1881) *jilla Coffee.*

Mr Rottmann's home, who, with Mrs R. & Rev. & Mrs Schmidt, entertained us till the messes Marshall, Williamson & Baxter came, & we all went ~~back~~^{by boat} in a surf boat, skilfully handled, through the surf to the steamer. Mr Hassan had a headache, & sat up on deck in the cool air to relieve it.

Friday Nov. 25th. This morning, at Adadu, near the mouth of the Volta; thence on, in the afternoon, to Pruita, just beyond *jilla Coffee*, where the steamer bought quantities of ducks & turkeys & fowls. I bought some *eschalots*^(onions). Had had a slight headache during the day, but, it disappeared: Mr Hassan affectionately taking to relieve it. Off again this evening, on a course to ~~the~~ Lagos. The dry season "smokes", of this part of the coast, are quite thick.

Saturday Nov. 26th. Early in the morning, arrived at Lagos, in a dense dry season haze. The "Volta" was lying in the roads. Mr Baxter went ashore, to his mission.

156 - - - - - (Nov. 1881)

The fair-steamer "Opelio." The var-brats. & very warm now. Coolish in the afternoon. Capt. Hamilton sick. No chance for us to go ashore.

Wednesday Nov. 27th. Work going on in the steamer discharging the cargo to the French steamer "Fureodo"; nevertheless, we had religious services in the morning; Mr. Marshall preached & I assisted him with the performing services. Dr O'Reilly & the ship's doctor drink up to excess. Early in the afternoon, the steamer ^{its work} got done, & we started rapidly for Boulogne. Ran rapidly all night.

Thursday Nov. 28th. In haze much less than yesterday: sun became visible. Passed the mouth of the Rhine. In the afternoon, I went ashore toward Boulogne & anchor taut at dusk. Part of the evening, on deck, with guitar singing for the crew. On 7th ultimo, our manager left.

T. J. (Nov. 1881)

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Tuesday Nov. 29^c. Went, after breakfast, in the Captain's boat, to the "Surf-boat", which had just arrived from Balon. Heard of the death of Mrs. Bechler & her baby.

Returned to the "Concise"; with a few bags & messes Marshall & Johnson, went ashore in the Capt's boat, & a small crew of 6, and 2 extra barrels. Dined at Harrison's first; a man waiting for Lempster's goods to the home of the trader; a crowd was of galvanized iron; children playing on the track. Saw a garden of fruit trees, bananas, plantains, papaya, bread-fruit, ^{green} avocados, pomelos. The large dark ones were deeply digitated bread-fruit tree lvs., & the light green perfect leaf of a banana plant expanded a little like flowers of the Amomum: large yellow trumpet-shaped flowers. A strange musical instrument. Newgrass swamp. Through a native village. Young unexpanded palm-leaves drying, with a stick to make

baskets & mats. Price, for frames of houses,
wood spreading on, & thatched with
bamboo-leaves. Corrugated iron, from abun-
dant bubbles, utilized on native roofs.
Native dirt always - goats, small
yellow native dogs, naked babies ter-
rified at white faces; half-clad girls,
clothed women. Old cannon from
wrecked vessels, - eddo plants with
their broad leaves (*Calladenium*, etc., native
car gardens). Much bacon a great
curiosity with the women, - some 2
men wanted to shake hands. A black-
smith's shop, with an old cannon for
anvil. Trees covered with parasites & other
air-plants; ferns; oil-palms trees
with their trunks covered with ferns
orchids. People ~~washing~~ ^{Eng. washing} in the river-
or swamk. "Mission House," oil-
palm tree & young bunches of rice. -
"the Castle." - native women carrying
little dogs, - infant Johnson: a dog &
third twin found by its own parents -.

Sorong (Nov. 1871)

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In the Captain's garden, a flower, in odor
like incognitite; fine apple; hibiscus;
Ranunculus; fever-bush; jasmin vine.
Padilla & grenadilla: cape jicama.
^{larch} "Inquisitor" declination - 20°: Preso-
room, - "Kwakwip, Kwakwip, no i Kwee".
Handsome deer-colored cattle. While out
at Stephen's ch.- wooden, low roof,-
curved; special seats on either.
Red lilies; pitanga bushes, & many
^{near} apple trees. Back through the native
village, with a mission school - top
in a gable, is the jin jin house,
A desecrated ^{house} with a pyramid
of hundreds of skulls, & scores of
crudely-carved idols. People stand
wondering. They had been told, by their
priests, that we were missionaries.
Peeped into the narrow dens of the
small mud houses. Mr. Robeson -
gaining for oranges & bananas. Small
& other shells in the paths. Small
water market of beans, corn, - meat, -.

16th Boring (Nov. 1881)

Plantains. Coal air, - seen no longer
smelling; & evening dampness gathering.
Small land-crabs fleeing to their holes
on the beach. Mr. Hanson's 3 dogs; one,
"Bess", a black spaniel, most demon-
iacal to Mrs. Hanson, mistaking her for
the English mistress. Down the road
again; our crew prompt - away
off to the steamer again, by 6 P.M.

Thanks to Capt. Hamilton, &
with time for dinner, with shar-
pened appetite. A reitful chat &
click, with loving memories of "Keweenaw"
and counsels on native customs &
interesting reminders of our shared
"an African scene".

End Nov. 30th. & by very overcast; & rain-
ing. Went on to the hulk "Admiral",
& examined it. Capt. Baker, nephew of
old Sam'l Baker. Steamer started in
the afternoon, & landed early tomorrow
the Calabar river.

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Calabar. (Dec. 1811)

Thursday Dec 1st. At daybreak, were proceeding up
prosecuting the mouth of the Calabar river.
Passed the buoys; passed through a
fleet of almost 100 fishing canoes. A
short sharp blast of wind & rain. Passin-
g along the mangrove banks; their won-
derful variety of forms & pendants.
On approaching Duke's river, fired a gun.
Duke's town - Yellow Duke's fine houses,
Prince Edwards. The Duke. Rev. Mrs.
Ross came off, to meet messrs Williamson
& Marshall. He gave us invitation to go
ashore. just after lunch, the drum was
heard supposed to be Egbo, but it
proved to be King Eyo. November 3rd, in
his boat, with his large entourage.
The boat was a 6-oared gig with flags
& streamers, - awning, & flag; & gaudy
umbrella. The canoe was about 60
long, flags, - drums, - rackets & rounds &
cannon in the bow. Mr. Mr. Edgar
was in the King's waiting canoe & 6 or
2 members of the Scotch Deputation.

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waged with Mr. Ross to exceed me; &
I went with Mr. Edgely, Mr. Robinson &
Mr. Gaunt and called into Mr. Rose.
King Eyo took the 2 Scotch brothers in
charge & now have me. I went in my
boat with Mr. Edgely. The excellent
opp., flags, display & honor. The
opinion of King Eyo of the value of the
expedition: Lect. of Mr. Edgely; con-
versation & the action of Dr. McKenzie
& of King Eyo. The King's politeness in
waiting for Mrs. Rose to land from
Calabar leaves superfluous to Rem. Salutes
some of the women. Wide walk about
up to Mr. Edgely's, Rev. Mr. Goldie
met us. At Mr. Edgely's: - Was &
miss E. Strange trees, - bread fruit, - man-
y goat, - coffee, - cacao, - cinnamon
pork, - cabbage. At supper, a heat &
a leave. After supper, at Mr. Edgely,
& walk around the hill, a quiet
soil among various tropical trees.
In the house, & visited Miss

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pick room. Heard that Miss Walker, of our mission, is to be married to Mr. Hay in America. Retained to Mr. Edgerly's, chatted, Mrs. Parker playing puzzles. Retired early. Was surprised that so little noise was heard from the native villages.

Dec. 2^d. A very mushy morning. The excellent sunrise. Mr & Mrs Goldie to breakfast. Had had morning prayers with the Epiphany household (presumably), & the carillon bells. Examined the Kristen home. The church, a handsome iron building. At King Eyo's, - his child-like reception of us. - his parlor, - crowns, - mirrors, - chairs, - carving, clocks, table, - swords, &c, &c. His autograph. Brass rods & wire in the door-yard. Elaborate paintings on the mud walls. Sausage plant. Dried out. Came to the boat provided by King Eyo. Darn with the tide to the "Conseco" & the "Mareca-ta"; &, then, on to the Rossi.

16th October (Dec. 1881)

Up the Dakelam hill, very steep. Mr. Ross
in his dispensary, & Mrs. Lutherford's
old residence. Then Rose. Trees, citrus,
peacock owl tree. - At Mr. Andrews', - Mrs.
C. sick. At Mr. Peebles & saw Mrs P.
next to Mrs. Ross; Mrs. Pearce cop-
ied room of Mrs. Lutherford's house.
Dinner Elizabeth & another chief came
here as while we are doing this
sojourning, Mr. Faust, Dr. Robinson, &c.,
with Mr. & Mrs. Rose, the steamer gun
and. Mr. Ross left a handsome
bag in the steamer, to be taken on
the first African trading venture.
Started at 2. P. M. By friend in
company of Miss Williamson & Marshall.
The cool breeze as we approached the
island. At 7. P. M., anchored outside
of the river mouth. Fine moonlight.

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Fernando I. (Dec. 1081)

At 6 A.M. Dec. 3; Had anchor cast eight o'clock, about 1. A.M., resumed the journey & reached Fernando Po, by 7. A.M. The "Mayumba" & the gun-boat "Foam" were at anchor. Wrote notes to Dr. Goemann & to Dr. Lomé. View of Fernando Po peak. Admired the wooded shores of Fern. Po. island. Left at 11. A.M. Steaming south, between the island & the mainland. A fine sea-wind. At night, a clear moonlight. The lion "Rock" enjoying himself going around the ship with Capt. Hamilton. Thinking of one old Penita mission, as the steamer, late in the evening, got as far south as (as I supposed) to opposite Batanga.

Sabbath Dec 4. - daylight, steamed opposite Cape St John. Recalling the memories connected with Cireo Bay; & especially with my first wife death in the bay near Cape St John. Anchored at 8.30 A.M. The 8 missionaries had a "Bible Read",

in lead of a preaching service. Boats on the shore. We need. The Princess & all bulk gone. Left Elobi, at 2. P. M. at night of Intangur. Took Edoga's familiar sights in the bay. Anchored, at night, outside the Gabon bar.

Day 5. Early morning up the river. Anchored at 7. A. M. Mr. & Mrs. W. Campbell & Dr. Baekeler came for us. Gladly welcomed. Above 4.10. A. M. arrived at Mrs. Campbell's, to see the baby & Mrs. Baekeler. Welcomed a Upper Baraka. Mrs. Baekeler & Mr. Campbell opened some trunks, to show some of new things. Pleasant prayer meeting in the ^{evening} ~~morning~~. Ready to go at night.

Day 6. Rested, & met native friends, & looked over boxes. Prayer meeting in the evening, at Mrs. Campbell's led by Rev. Walker. After the meeting singing.

Gaboon

(cc. 1880)

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Wednesday 7th. Reading & conversing with fellow missionaries. Church prayer-meeting in the evening, led by ^{new} Mr. C. Brown. Mr. James Lyon, formerly of Beaufort & of Gabon, now of Old Calabar, had come from the P.S. "Ethiopia"; in the afternoon he spent the night at Mr. Campbell's. Had pleasure duell with Mr. Bachelor, in the afternoon evening, at a prayer-meeting.

Thursday 8th. In the morning, early morning Mrs. Lyon, who was departing with the "Ethiopia" shou'd go. In the afternoon, there was a meeting in the Kanta female Mission. After this meeting, Mr. Campbell took Mrs. Tassay, Mr. Mc Gault, & Messrs. Robinin, Master, & Bracke, in the "men's boat", to the place of the barker & I am told were & is all seated on the Conundant, who has with him his wife & children.

160 La Bona (Dec. 1881)

Friday Dec 9^c. Made no entry - located at Mr. Scholze's trading-house.

Saturday 10^c. All went to Mr. Campbell's, & were weighed. Mrs. Farren weighed 130 lbs., & 144 lbs. The united weight of 12 men remains was 1500 lbs. The largest was 5 ft 9 in.

Saturday 11^c. Mrs. Garrett preached.

Mrs. Tackeler was not at church, being somewhat sick. I made remarks at the evening service. A pleasant change w^t marking in the evening.

Laid out. Recognized the long
time ago of the night remark, m
delivered us, long ago, an
& etc, when I first went there.

Monday 12^c. Waiting for Mr. DeKer to come. Mr. Hbia came in the evening
during a heavy storm. He came into
evening prayer-meeting, just after its
close, at Mr. Campbell's house. Had
painted the "Swan" in the morning.

Gaboon (Dec. 1881)

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Tuesday 13th 1881. Began Mission meetings: not much progress, as Mr. Setters had not come. He came in the evening, just before sun-down; went down to welcome him. Mr. Martin led the evening meeting.

Wednesday 14th. Mission meeting in the morning. Mr. Walker not very pleased in his manner to Mr. Campbell & myself. No meeting in the afternoon: had private talks with Messrs. Campbell & Robinson; also with Mr. Martin; also with Mr. Campbell. Preacher in the evening.

Thursday 15th. Mission meetings during the day; & Party in the evening.

Friday 16th. Mission in morning & part of afternoon. Party in the afternoon evening, & an unpleasant discussion with Mr. Walker about his, as a Congregationalist, acting ^{without appointment} as a stated Supply of a Presb. ch.

Salon (Acco 681)

Saturday 17th. Mission meeting in the morning. In afternoon, Payne photographed a group of all missionaries present, and bathing in the salt river with Mrs. Gault, Robeson, & Campbell. Waiting in the evening.

Sunday 18th. Mrs. Campbell preached in the morning. Card supper in the afternoon. Me and Melvin & Ibra presided at a pleasant service. Mrs. Moran not very well.

Monday 19th. Mission meeting in the morning: important matters, but not uncharming. The photographer was about all day, taking various views. Making out estimates from station accounts in the afternoon. Mrs. Moran still at noon & sick in the evening. She was quite better at night.

Gabon. (Dec. 1881)

Have made no entry all these days.
On the 20th & 21st Mrs Nansen still was ailing.
On Thursday 22nd, we were all surprised, in the morning, to find that Mrs Hartig had arrived in the night from Langenenge, there having been a difficulty between the Faro, & the Ispougon traders.

About noon, suddenly came word, from Mr. & Mrs. Hartig, that the "Ispougon" was going to the Ogden, at 4 P.M.. Hartig decided to take Mrs Nansen from the sick-bed and " " from Campbell, Raoul & Ogden assistant in packing her trunks. Left at 3 P.M., waited an hour, in the steamer, till the Capt. came. At 5 P.M., steamed across the river, & anchored for the night near the Point Bourgogne.

172 At Sea (Dec. 1881) Ogar River

On the 23rd, early in the morning, started around the Point, and steamed for Nazar's Bar. Entered the ^{Ogaray} river at 4. o'clock; and, at night, went on to Argala, & anchored about 8. P.M.

On the 24th, early,

King Georgi came off to see me, & made me a warm native welcome. Went ashore with the ^(I stored there) steamer, & got all the done for the Ogar houses, & brought them to the steamer. Passed familiar points of the river all day, & anchored in sunset, opposite Avanga. The insects from shore, attracted by the lights, came in such numbers as to drive us from the cabin: put out the cabin light; Captain helped us arrange the room for a mosquito-net for the ladies.

On the 25th, started early; passed Siberka. Comparing this Christmas with ~~of~~ our friends elsewhere - No opportunity for religious services. At 3.30 P.M. anchored at the German trading-post ^{old Lembowane}. Received with 10 guns from

Rangoon

(Dec. 18. 1)

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The trading hour, & the "Balaya" & "Pionee" steamers: a exhibition of flags. Mr. Schiff gave the use of his boat, & Mrs. Bassan, Mrs. Bachelor, & I went ashore, towing the "Swan". Mr. Eugenio, transferred Mrs. Bassan to the "Swan", & rowed her to Adelade, where we were welcomed by Mr. & Mrs. Readay. The church bell was rung to welcome us, at our approach. Glad to sit down in a Christian wine. Prayers & tea ^{at} Mrs. Readay's, & spent the night there. Many thoughts about the expected changes at Rangoon.

On the 26th, woke with headache: went to the Hill, & walked around the premises looking ^{at} the new houses, & the old ones going to ruin. Returned to Adelade, & remained during the afternoon. Mr. Readay had sent word to his Tawar friends, & they came with guns, & fired a salute for us. At night, he had an illumination, a fire work. After it, I left Mrs. Bassan at Adelade, & went & stayed all night at the upper house.

874 Rangiora (Dec. 1881)

On the 27th, returned to Ardendre, & brought Mrs. Taranu to the Hill, & began to arrange with Mrs. Bacheler, about packing up her things.

On the 28th, busy packing Mrs. Bacheler's boxes. On the 30th, in the afternoon, met with Mr. Reading, en route with Mrs. Bacheler's goods. Called at Mrs. Schiff's. Went to Mr. Finlay's; he was not there, nor was Mr. Gibson: a new man, Mr. White, was there, just arrived. Saw Miss & her child. Returned to tea at Ardendre; &, night, came with Mrs. Taranu to the Hill, leaving Mrs. Reading at Ardendre. Pleasant moonlight night.

On the 31st, there had been a heavy rain, & wind last night. Went to see Mr. Finlay & Mrs. Bacheler. Started work in the paths. Catching goats & a goat for Mrs. Bacheler. A damp unpleasant morning. Writing up this diary. Went to the factories, in the afternoon: was taken with a Jewish attack, & went to bed feeling very bad.

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Ranger (January 1882)

Sabbath Janst 1st. Rose feeling weak, but conducted public services in the church; about 60 or 70 people present. Enjoyed the services. Held Sat. Sch., in the afternoon. Rain fell, in the evening; but, we held Monthly Concert, & there was unusual interest & much freedom in prayer & remarks by the visitors, & a collection of almost \$5.00. Still had some fever, & a chill on going to bed.

Monday 2^d. Felt better from the operation of medicine. Went to Irenya to see Ranoki, & tried to get people from him to take me up the river, to Okanda. After several hours, came away unsuccessful. Hippopotami on the way. Stopped at Bankonki's on the way back, & engaged positively with him, for him to take me to Okota & Okanda. Retired in good health. Akendenge came to say he wanted to accompany me, as cook and as assistant.

176 Kāngar (January 1882)

Tuesday Jan'y 3rd. In morning, went with Mr. Readling, in his canoe, & stopped at Rankin's town, took him up, & went to Mr Schiff's. - Mrs. Bache was sick; on to Mr. Fickett's, & made out a list of things, to be taken up to Okanaka. Had a talk with Jo Klein about his arrangement in coming to the Mission-house. Mr. Readling stayed, to go up to John Birney's. Stopped at Mr. Schiff's, on the way back, & got rice & shipbread. Stopped to interview Mrs Readling; late to dinner.

The 2 girls talked about their kitchen. Only a few at prayer-meeting in the evening. A bright moonlight.

Wednesday 4th.

Mrs Bache was sick with fever, gave her various remedies; & Mr Readling came over, & attended to the baby, who also seemed sick. The 2 girls again troublesome about the mother & their food. Took little Nbara in this place

Kangar. (January 1882)

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Thursday Jan' 95'. Last night the girls
being still rebellious, asked again to
visit with the Babe Otis, - so Mrs
Bachelder might have a quiet rest: &
thus I was an invited. I slept a little
and longer, was up several times.
Arrose early, & starting work. "M."
Beauchamp came, & with news of the
"Mpongwe" was fast on a sand-bank
in the Nguembe. Talk about taking
back the goods Mr. had been sent to
Mr. Schiffs. trading house. Looking at
the site of the house it is to be built
on the top of the hill. The Frenchman,
who has charge of the Adama
people, came with a large company
of men, carrying logs for the new
house. Mrs. Bachelder left in
health. In the evening, the 2
girls came to confess, & Dr. Gor-
gwin, for their disobedience of the
past two days. Again again with
us, for the night.

170. Tanganyika (January 1882).

Tuesday Jan 6th. Went canoe to the trading-houses; word came back that Mr. Schiff was going to Gabon. Wrote letters, & send to him. But, he left, without notifying us, in the afternoon.

Wednesday Jan 7th. Went, in the morning, again to the factors. Saw Mrs. Sinclair. Sent the 2 goats, from German-house, to Mrs. Sinclair. Talking & arranging about my journey up river. Came back, with a letter to Mr. Backeler, from Mrs. Sinclair urging her to go on the "Pioneer". Busy all the afternoons, for her to go on "Pioneer".

Thursday Jan 8th. After the morning service, heard the guns of the "Pioneer" starting on its journey. Renkombe came with the people, for each of the journeys to Okanda, to have me arrange with him, but I refused to do any thing of the kind on Sabbath.

Friday Jan 9th. Renkombe came with 6 people; but, I engaged only 5, Ogula, Etenda, Auyimbozo, Nyangi, & Kasangai. ^{which I borrowed of Mr. Rusing} we packed boxes, & put them in the canoe;

In the afternoon, was busy getting together clothes, & food & medicine for the Okanda journey.

Journey to Okola & Okande

Jan. 10th Tuesday. Last night, after going to bed, we expect for the talk I had posted in the canoe at Andende, Mr. I now, & with Tjera & the watchmen walked over to where Akantia & Nambu are taking care of the canoe, & they worked for over an hour to clean things away carefully. But, the threatening rain did not come. Rose early &, after good bye to Mrs. Meau, went to Axim; my crew joined me. Bought plantains; had an unpleasant talk with : : Reading; started about 9. A.M. canoe was pretty heavy laden, but, not as much as I had feared. Had 9 ft. for a crew. Dunched in the river, near the Tjengen. Renkombe came with his 2 canoes & their crews, while we were eating. At Mr. J. Erny's, P. M. 10. P. M., & welcomed by him. Mrs. & their baby Gertris.

Wed. 11th. Woke early, & anxious about the journeys. While Renkombe was getting his goods from Mr. Erny, I sent my crew to get ngoroja leaves in the forest, with who to tie up my salt. They

stayed so long till I went after them. Busy at the salt all day. In afternoon, Messrs Sinclair & McKeown and a French priest came partly about, the "Ewaffa" having broken down. An interesting discussion at supper, between Messrs Erny & McKeown.

Wednesday Jan 12: Rose early; breakfasted with Mr. Erny & the other white men. Started about 7.30 A.M. On the way, my crew found a nest of gambé (a very large turtle) eggs on a sand-bar. Scorching hot frost, & the crew murmured, because I had really selected for them the old rather than new plantains. As we approached Belaukila, a "war" had just broken out, between the villages of Apelwe & Welingia. Heavy rain. Stopped at Hambis town, for the night. A rainy night. Wrote a letter to Mrs Nassau, to be taken by a mpongo calling himself "Mistool".

Friday 13th. Started very early. At "Mistools", stopped to buy food, but there was none. Went hippo-fishing. Stopped at Isème's village, where Rankoube went ashore to see him. Passed the ^{of Njagu-dembé} Farine long, or R.B., called Aguilaka: stopped to eat, at Isoda Point,

where the Bakéle, on hearing our name, recognized ^{there} me as "Nasi", the friend of Kasa. An Akéle, named Akatiyani, gave me a fowl; but, as soon afterward, he begged for tobacco, I gave him back his ^{A lange} part. Passed the mouth of the Obangé, a river opposite a long sand-bar (in dry season) on R.B.; was told it leads toward the Rémié.

In the afternoon, passed the mouth of a lagoon or lake, called Nkog, on L.B. A half-hour later, passed, on R.B., a high Point, somewhat like Kāngwe, called Ere-wo, with 2 Farmer towns on it. Opposite to it, on the L.B., is a little creek, Ijé. ^{Entered in the forest, in the night, shortly beyond} ^{at an ulako; Emanuelbo} ^{ijé, within sound of the Farmer villages.}

Saturday Jan 14th. Slept well. Took coffee, instead of tea. Started early, & passed a small creek, on R.B., called Bangangé; and, a mile or so beyond, a second mouth, connecting through a lagoon, with the lower ... Exactly opposite, on L.B., was a fine ulako. About 8:30^{A.M.}, came to a Point, an Akéle town, Yēna, friends of Kasa, who welcomed me as their ... Land on the opposite R.B. somewhat high. Beyond Yēna, was the Point Eduganomé, where, in

the racing on, the water rushes with violence.
And, just beyond the point, is a small creek,
the L.B., going into a lake or lagoon.
The river soon narrowed to about 600 yds., with
high ground on both sides. Passed a creek, on
L.B., it and the stretch of land, for some short
distance, is called Opoconjonga. Between Yeria
& Opoconjonga, is the ^{former} site of the ^{now} place (it
had man's name Akokijana). A mile or less
in front was the beginning of the Hills, ^{which} I have
often seen, when looking up the river from the

Aguwe with a long beard. Admired the 3 fine
 hibbe^{Ihoke} on the R.B. Stayed all day, as Renkoube
 wanted to buy Ford of the Faime. Some of
 them came over, in the afternoon, to see us,
 & to sell some corn, but they brought no plantain.
Saturday Jan 15: Rested all day. The Faime
 came with a little Ford, wh. I ^{didn't} ^(and) not buy on
 the Gabette. Last night, an insect entered
 my ear & I cd. not get it out; poured melted
 butter in the ear. Akendenge took. Talked with
 the Bakile about God. Wrote a letter, of my
 mission work, to the "Prob. Journal". A dead
 place thrown into the river. Many thoughts, &
 singing hymns. The Faime came again, & Re-
 nkoube bought a few plantains of them. At night,
 Naumbo wanted to go fishing, as if Gabette was
 over; but I forbade him. Put cotton in my ears,
 for fear of more insects, when I went to bed.

Monday 16. Left letters with Olimbo, to be
 sent by first chance. Cloudy misty morning.
 Akendenge still unable to work
 with paddle. Fine row of hills. Slow paddling.
 A little sand-bar on L.B., at the end of a point.

creek, Okume. A little cove & rivulet, Olende, on L.B., wh. is a good ulakor. Fine pile, on opposite side of river, where Anumba, a ^{Nkam} ~~Nkonge~~ man, working for Idumba, at a Fairer town on R.B., crossed over its fine fish, to say that trade shd. not go up the river to Okota. This w^t seem to be a bar in my way, wh. I shall have to pass, on my return. Both sides of the river are high continually, no sides, - farms on both banks. All the ^{very large} district is called Olende. Passed the ~~xx~~^{xx} rock, Talajuga, in the water on R.B. Passed, on R.B., a creek called Lebo. At 10. A.M., came to the island Ngoli, occupied by DeBrazza as a depot; crossing to it, landed on its upper end. Some bad paddling, after we started, during wh., BenKoube's people in 3 of their paddles. We found a floating barrel, probably by the Frenchman's people. No villages above Ngoli, on either side, for a long distance. Crossing rough water near the 2 islands Benzé. Piling among rocks & swift water. In spots, a black or dark blue stone a gritty mineral, I do not know what. First distant view of Okota mountains. Cool

pleasant afternoon, about 3.30 P.M., with breezes from the west. Osange, the island, on wh. Mr. Smith was living for a short time; also, a small creek, on R.B., of the same name, the district also called by this same name. The Faure living only on R.B. ^{about 40 P.M.} on L.B., where the crew gathered ~~wood~~ ^{where the crew gathered wood}, & fine rocky ravine & spring-water.

A row of rocks on R.B., one of them a projecting ledge called Yabe: opposite to it, we stopped to gather bush-rope. Adeke, an island, the farthest point reached by the "Delta", of Mr. R.B. N. Walker, on his second ascent of the Ogowe. Slept on a sand-bank on L.B., a short distance above Adeke, the river noisy with the water rushing against the rocks standing in the channel.

Tuesday 17th Janth. River rose slightly during the night, & we have floated the canoe, had it not been well tied. No rain for the last 3 nights. A slight misty rain this morning. An island, ^{with} ~~by~~ ^{with} small narrow channel about it. A series of islands, Pendambi, with rough poling. A dry island, Nengembwanji, with a few

Okota fishing houses. Stopped to lunch, at Elia-mjënge, there is a lagoon ^{opposite} on R.B. Three islands called Agewa-na-imbanda, Okota hills seen yesterday were in nearer sight. A Fairwater village, on L.B., the only one seen thus far to-day, - beyond the sandy islands Ageler parang, & Kamptu ^{on river side} long Island, on L.B. called Ilé-kâ. Two small sandy islands, Ikâ-hâ-sina, the confines of inhabited Okota. An Okota canoe crossing the river to their fishing-camp. Tried to buy a terrapin from them. An island called Okumba, with young palm-trees on it, - the first I have seen days. It was set in our left bank, i.e. we were going south. Stopped at Ilangahadi, the Okota villages of an old man Mbanga He and Afanga each gave me a foot. A very high hill (say 800 ft) just behind the village. The people said elephants were numerous.

Wednesday Jan 18th. A strong cold wind last night. Shortly after starting, began to drag canoes. A back-bone of rock, running from top of a hill down to the water-side, on L.B.

with a cave, Eboka boke, wh. is said to run
far in & up the hill. In island, Ondongo,
where lived a former King Edibe but Akinda
now is chief man. A hill ^{on R.B.}, about three or
high as Kangor & of the famous many opposite

up into many channels. Stopped to eat
nearly opposite the mouth of the Oho-o river,
wh. enters on R.B. A most beautiful picture
of mountains, hills, river, lake-like enclosures,
islands, blue sky, fleecy clouds, fine N.E. breeze,
varied colors of green; beautiful! beautiful!!.
Then struck, walked overland, while the canoe
dragged over some hard places. The mouth of
the Omo, from wh. the Omenga tribe came.
A few bare places on hill-sides on R.B., the rest

mud. After alighting 2 or 3 times, in a bad

ation of Janina. Tried to bargain with an Okota for a paddle.

Wednesday Jan 19th. Slept later than I expected; but, none of us started in very good spirits. Almost at once, came to a bad place, & failing to overtake it, dragged the canoe solidly up over rocks. Benito & co. came & helped us. Ode je rapids, & Ipatyi prairie hill-side on R.B. Stopped, all afternoon, at Mbutumba island, a village, & dry the goods wet yesterday. The Frenchman seems now sick, gave him medicine & milk, & wrote a letter by him to my wife.

Friday 20. A heavy rain last night (connected with the new moon). Passed a mile or two. Then I was sick, & thought of giving up the journey. Started late in morning, after the morning meal, & after buying some sweet potatoes. At once, met with a bad place, Agari-manganga, near the Mbutumba island. This island, Ngogo, opposite to the Ikobo rocks in the channel. Ikota prairie hill-sides increasing in number and size. The extremities of the canoes, in calculating no. being pointed.

Yalimboanâ (January 1882) Elanga

A small creek, Atoka, on L.B. A prominent rock in the water, Njaku-ja-jomba, on R.B. Rapids & small islands both called Elanga. A fine site for a building on the open prairie side, in front of Elanga. The R.B. banks occupied by Okota; b.t., the wide drum area by the Osbyeba. A low rocky sandy island, Okengwe, near to an Okota village, where Awuronjago, a Galwa, was trading. A man came to other villages, in district Elanga, where was an old man, Ampelangs, & a young man, Elandé. Buying plantains. Elande in settled a guard for me. An old man, Ajila, gave me a fork & plantain, wh. I soon returned to him, because of his disgusting manner, for tobacco. Left Jaria with Awuronjago. A woman, wife of Ajila, Ogula's friend, gave me some things as Ajila. Okota a men, conversation, prayers. Friend of Okota is Bakota.

Saturday Jan 21

Had a good sleep last night. Ascended a hill top, - finest views I have had in Africa. Just after

January 1861.

startling, saw where the spring of water, Makok, emerged. A house with a ~~good~~^{good} sized cistern of fresh water, Ipongé, on L.B. Passed on a hot distance; but had to wait for Rankombé, who was after a trade debt at Ipongé, & who finally got me to wait here over the best part of his rubber. So, late in the afternoon, he came back, about a mile, & stay with him, at the Okota village, the last on the river. Osgeba & Apingé are beyond. Fine houses at Ipongé than I had expected; but people not as polite as at Ilozo.

Sabbath Jan'y 22. Slept very well last night. Village more quiet than I had expected. Held meeting. In afternoon, some Bakola came, from their trade down river, & there was great welcoming & firing of guns, & eating of pâ. Reading, writing, & conversing. Rankombé's second Salwa canoe came. Walked to the top^b of a hill & had an extensive view. Five miles of Mt. Otondo, a few miles eastward, which is reported to have a lake on its top, & usually has a bank of cloud lying on it. The Osgeba are living near it.

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Iponge (January 1882)

(Monday Jan 25th). Weared with Renkorbi's delays. Took council, & determined to return to Kangu. Because (1). The water is going down so rapidly that if I go on to Okanda, immediate return will become more difficult, & perhaps impossible, & I will be a prisoner at Okanda for a month. (2) Because the stage of water is unfortunate. I shd. have come earlier (in Dec) before it fell so low, or later (Feb) when it will be somewhat risen. (3) Because my goods are too much for a canoe of this size; the canoe itself is not too small. But I have over \$150. in trade^{good}; \$50. w^t. have been sufficient. Thus far, I have had call only for cloths, tobacco, perfume, mirrors, caps, dishes, knives. (4). Because the real object of the journey (the seeking a site for a station) is already accomplished, by what I can see near Nisipi, & by what I see here at Okota. (5) To go on to Okanda is simply to gratify curiosity & I will not do it while Mrs. Hanson is so alone. I w^t. her not alone for dat, but not for any other reason. Got rid of part of the weight of my goods, by trusting Lebekouka with a lot of them. He is to

2 files, .40; 6 kettles farina, 1.20, Total \$45.50.

Took a parting view of Mt. Otombo; & started down river. Stopped at Elande's village, & saw his father; & went with people of ~~the~~ village to examine a hill near by, for a ^{Possible} mission-station; & a fine site between the excellent mills of water, Abeka, on the west, & Nyam on the east. Stopped at Awaronijago to get my Farina. Passed Imbweke's place. Passed in safety Agasinganga rapids, where, the crew said, ~~it~~ in the dry season, there was a hollow, into wh. if stones were thrown, there would come a sound like copper kettles, & the water at ^{island} boil up. At, at lower end of Subembay, & then crossed to the Farina side, to find a safe descent. Succeeded safely. At the

Alembé (January 1882) Injoli 193

spot, at Alembé, where the canoe had piled up according the river, I went ashore with Nando & Skenderje, & walked as far as Davis & Jocke. They were absent. (my cold, with M. I had risen yesterday, surprised me, was in a poor state of perspiration). Fine view of the Kangué Mountain.

Wed Jan 25. Surprised, on rising, to find Mr Davis & Jocke had come, during the night. When I left, gave them part of my jambu. Came on to Spangaladi, & saw Ndama there riding. Came on, & ate luncheon at the sandy beach where, on ascending, I had tried to buy a specimen of an Okota. Stopped again to drink at the spot where the canoes had gathered Kuda nuts. Met Xaseni with 5 or 6 heavily laden canoes, at the head of Spang island. He handed me a letter from my wife, of date Jan 14: how glad it made me, & came on in rejoicing. Xaseni warned us not to stop at the Famine town near Talaguga rock. Slept on ^{island} Nejoli; bats very noisy.

114 Manyakas (January 1882)

Thursday Jan 26th. The crew, warned by Tassani yesterday, feared to go to the Fazur side; so I had to pass by the point I wanted to inspect for a site, & we went to Manyaka's town, where Ameuba was trading, to enquire of the report of assault by Fazur on the Frenchmen. It was true, but not of these French. (Before doing this, I had inspected a hill on the Akeli side, opposite Njoli, at a deserted Akeli village, Malaka.) Manyaka is called Mbeake-maloba. Had a talk, though trumba, with the Fazur, who wanted to compel me to live with them, at their place. Stayed to eat. Killed, for the crew, the goat Renkombe had given me. Was much perplexed at their sloveness in cooking. In afternoon, went up river with Ameuba, who pointed out several ^{for sites} places; but, I did not stop to look, until at "little" Talaguga, a rock ^{rock} good place. Went on to Lobs, not a good place. Slept at Njoli; felt sick from the cold I had taken. The French house at Njoli was plundered, by Njololandba's people, of its

flag or part of its roofing.

Friday Jan 27. Examined, at once, a hill of
soil Kajoli, on E.B. A fine site for building,
water, ascent, but slightly objectionable because
the hill was only a ridge & not much width for
building a house, but I liked it. Next, stopped
at a place with good water, while a farm
town on E.B. Next, at good water, at Tala
juga rock. Next, at just above Tala
juga town. Just as good as at Kajoli site, except
that the ascent was not so good, but the hill
top wider for a site for house. Stopped to
see a Dyak. Examined another place.
At Manayake's, a long talk about the site.
Made medicine for his sore toe. Held
evening prayers &c, as the crew did not
want to stay there, yielded to their wish
to cross the river, to an ulako, &, then,
yielded to their wish to go on down to
Okume beach. Did so, at night; but, wearied
with the long pull, & suspecting them of
desire & intention to go to Olinbos,
ordered suddenly a stop in the forest, &

little creek, wh. proms a good ulato; but, a heavy rain came on. We were very much displeased with all the company, excepting Ogulu for their murmurings during the day.

Sat., Jan'y 28^c. Rained wet & stiff, but had managed, with my coat, to keep my breast warm. Some Fairu' fishermen passed early in a canoe.

Stopped at Olimba's trading-place, to speak about his getting me thatch & bamboo, at \$1.00 per sqd of each, counting two by two: I gave him goods, on trust, as follows:-

Cloth 3.50; cloth 2.00; 5 kins & 5 jaks 2.00; 1 keg powder 1.00; 2 1/2 lbs soap 1.00; 8 heads tob. 1.00; 4 butcher kins .80; 1 razor .20; 3 mirrors .60; 2 caps .40,

making a total of \$12.50 in trade. I did not promise exactly how much I will give him but expect to pay him not less than \$3.00. I asked him tentatively & he suggested a white shirt & felt hat. Came on down, without incident, to the hand-back opposite Erevo-lo, & dried my clothing, & ate there. A hawking division of my old cotton umbrella hath gone to pieces last night!

Sabbath Jan' 29: Rested at Mr. Erway's, & had meeting, in the morning. A little tornado, in the afternoon. Some Farmer came to see me, in the evening.

Monday 30th. Skinned down river; passing Adalatatalaga, heard ^{of} the engineer of the "Tugayor" was dead. Welcome, on approaching Tanguay, with bills, & shots of a little way, & Mr. Readling on her porch, was passing at the landing. Saw the "Mr. Howard", & knew ^{therefore} Mr. Robinson had come. The boys who had come from Dr. Bachler rebellion. Story of the arrival of the odds from Antigata. Letter arrived from America: Cousin Lotte Isaac, of date Oct. 10th; Mrs. E. W. Crane, Oct 17th '81; Rev. J. S. Malone Oct. 17th; Rev. Dr. Esenwein Oct 17th '81, & also Oct 25th '81 & note from M^r. Ozanne. Also, 2 letters from Bagot, 1 each from Mr. DeKee, Mr. Gaunt, Mr. Welke, Mr. Campbell, & young Harrington. Mrs. Isaac had a full supply of letters also.

Nyare to-morrow. Paid Adougo 6 days
wage, 1 dollar of cloth. Paid Adonabata 1 dollar
for bush-rope. Sent Nyare forward canoe & 4
of people to Agaririjanda's town, for lumber.

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Saturday March 25th. Busy at the Water-side from the afternoon, sent for Nyare, who came with his people, & I gave him a gun, in addition to the other things of yesterday, & he was satisfied with the Winchester rifle, to let them see it wonder. Francis, the Gorey, came, but I might see nothing; not even a line from Langer. Feel disappointed.

Sabbath 26th. A clear bright pleasant day. One farmer at morning service. He said the Bakete threatened quarrel with them, because of their having sold our sweet potatoes from the deserted White gardens. Read & sang. No noise of cutting in the bush, to disturb me. Heavy thunder & signs of rain, wh. did not come till evening. The Rock, etc. was again uncovered in the morning almost covered by rising water in the evening.

Monday 27th. Loring & Harvey. Mac. ex the men clearing at the "big-way" house. Had Ogula cut down several large trees. Maryaffe came with Ndongo, gave me a foul & stayed a long while. Incident of the mistake of a old page & a knife for

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some bush-like tree had got to another one.
Regretted, in the evening, yielding a gift of
one of Nyane's people, under a mistake
but he had been asking me for a gift
just after he had made me his present.

Tuesday March 28th. Letter from my wife to-day!
Went out this morning, with half of the men,
at Nyane's town, called him to come & see where
the line shd. go - premises: there was some
misunderstanding about the cassava & plantains
wh. were growing on the ground I had bought.
Ogula getting sticks for windows & door-frames. Three
others clearing the path back of the premises.
The boy who gave me some wild fruits
last evening, & whom I had told to get
me mushrooms today, brought & gave me
some this evening. Sitting under the trees
in the moonlight. The setting sun had
been fine in its shades across the river.
Wednesday 29th. With Ogula, cutting door-frames all
morning. Went out in afternoon to see how
the men were cutting the ^{borders} path. Very heavy
rain & wind at night.

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Thursday March 30. Sun clear & a drying wind blowing. My people used to come to prayers. Just after prayers, Agambantigua, professed a ^{fever} & so did the entire company & complained of being sick, & that I compelled them to rest, & they all wanted to rest. All the others, except Rogombe, disclaimed, & said he was not their spokesman. This left only 2 complainants & the rest rebuked them. Drying frame, & removing ^{from the tent} to the "Water-side" house. After dinner, sent Ogula, & Kevorge, Akawire, & Otambi to Mungaga's, & to Clunies for plantains. Spent the afternoon in arranging my boxes or fixing up the house. A fine bright day. Beautiful light of setting sun, on the other side. Scorpions are probably numerous & large here. The 4 came back, at night, with several plantains, & we had a hearty.

Friday 31. Rose with a sick-headache. Had slept in the Water-side house for the first, & night. Did not do much ^{little} all day. Had a large tree cut down on the island, for a bridge, I suppose it would fall across the stream &

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is said so. Bought a good deal of bush-
wool. Kogonbo again ailing. Much
disappointed at RenKwob did not
arrive 4 days as I had expected, from
Mpeumbopolow's statement last Tuesday, &
he w'd have been here yesterday. Am
much disappointed, for my letters &c have
been here a week ago. Mourning is
going on in Nyare's town.

Sat. April 11.. Akawbie, & Manley ^{to interpret} at
cutting the large copal tree. Ndongo came
for the talk with Nyare, but Nyare was
not at home. Agonjo came for more tools
for thatch, small measure of Atile, - the poor
fife. They left. Ndongo's news about the
Farmer who was shot by mistake. Nyare
came to see me, with a gift of plantain, which
proved to be a sale. Tid up a little boy's
some leg. Dinner. Soon came a father ~~with~~
his little child, with sore foot. Soon, a
Mpongwe trader, from the town of the shot
Farmer; dreadful surgery. Bush-wool bought
with soap. The copal ^{tree} cut down. The little



a lesson; for, he had forgotten even his
letters. Amazing, how the chickens come to pass.

Monday 3: Two canoes, Akingâ & Nyembâ,
came last evening, from Oklo, with note from
Laseri, & I sent letters to Rangoon. Rainy again.
Adago came to inspect: Ngae came, late, in
afternoon, but was unwilling to remove the plantains
from the ground I brought of him. Beautiful sun-set.
Anxious for the arrival of RenKombé.

Station (April 1882)

Tuesday April 4th. Showey morning. In afternoon, sent the longongs to get logs from down a widow flames. No 2 at the great tree finished & it fell with a great crash. Bought a ntori & a ntamboni at a high price for the antunes. Bay ~~was~~ a shot in his skull, in the crew of Agila - Kukulau & 3 other canoes; quite an excitement at their arrival. Sent letter to Mr. Patten. Has, these far, lost by Runkumba, - Renondo, - Ficucori, Josef the young Galvez, - the 2 Imergas, & now there 4 more longongs. Saw, in their company, my young Okota friend Elandi. Aganta - atjera wanting to desert.
