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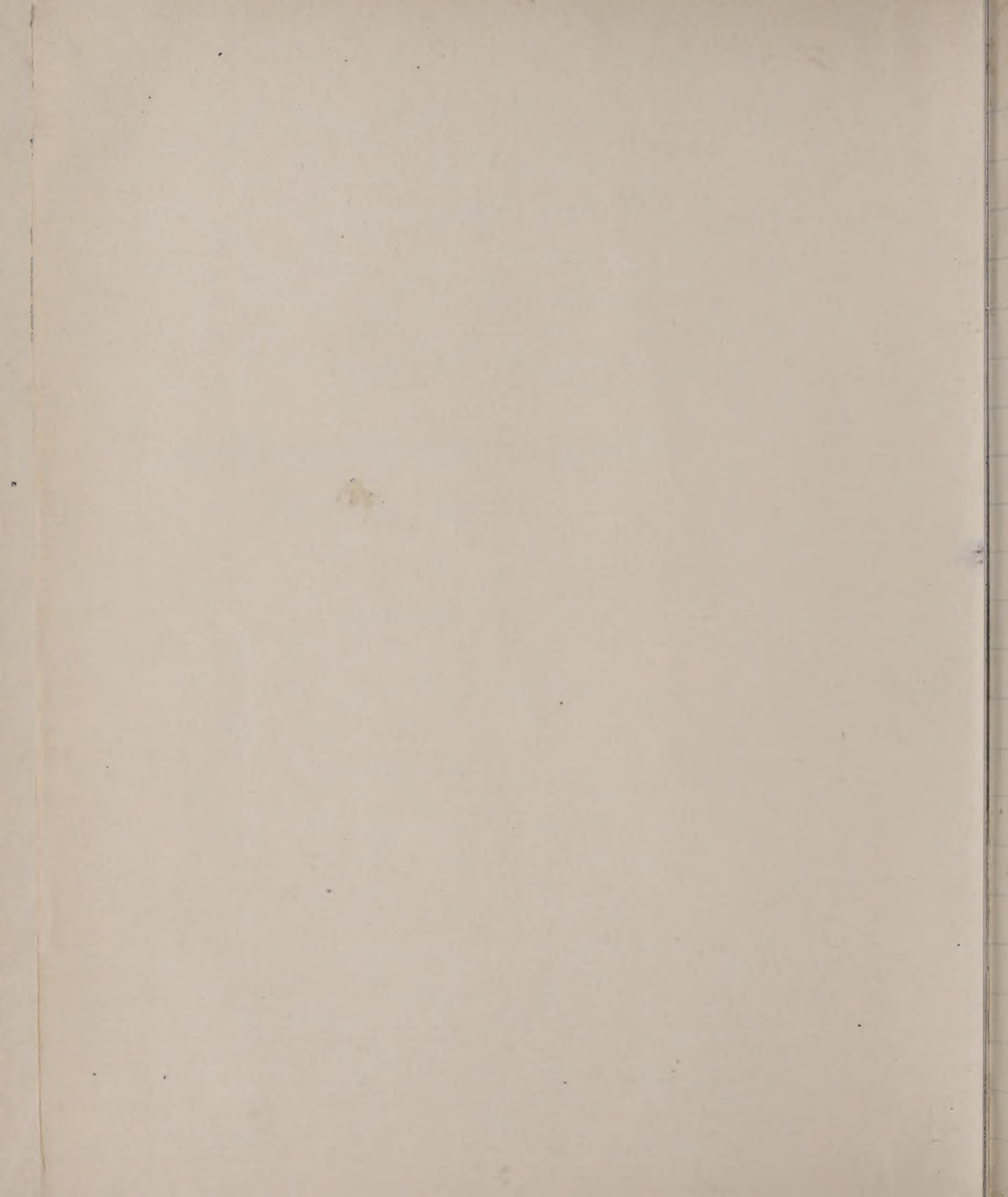

Saturday Sept 4th. In the morning, wrote letters. In afternoon, a Rev. Allen called. Went with Bro Swan, to call on Judge Pringle, at the St James Hotel. Met the Episcopal minister, Rev. Everest, there. Went to Le Roy. At the depot, was met by young Edward Parsons. Rev & Mrs & Miss Parsons. Chatting, walked with Mr & Mrs Parsons.

Sabbath 5th. Communion Sabbath; assisted Mr. P. in the distribution of the elements. At Sab. Sch., spoke a few remarks. Met a Rev. Clarke, & Elder Gillett - Sang hymns in afternoon. Mr. P. on base, Mrs P. aid, Miss P. alto, & I the tenor. Spoke on Africa, in the evening. Met Prof Staunton & Mrs Staunton.

Monday 6th. Walked with Rev. Parsons to the Dryham University, - into the Conservatory; met Prof Wiles & a Miss Chapin. At Mrs Staunton's Cottage; herself, & Mrs Stays, & Mrs Taylor from Montana. Mrs S. read, from the Bible, many texts to prove her idea that we & the English are the last 10 tribes. Went with her to the Conservatory again, after dinner. At dinner, had met Mrs Chapin, & her son & step-daughter.

Mrs Prof. Stanton, and two Misses Chapin.

Returned to Mr Parsons, and enjoyed some music from Miss Parsons. Had to hurry to the depot just in time for the 6 P. M. train. At Batesville. In the evening, called on Mrs Taggart with Bro Swan & sister Emma.

Tuesday Sept 7th. Rode, with Bro Swan's carriage & his horse "Puss", out to Mr. Jacks; had a pleasant chat with Miss Julia Jacks, - played 2 games of croquet with her. Returned to dinner. In afternoon, Mrs Jacks, on her way to Sewing Society, called at Bro Swans, & Miss J. & I rode for 2 hours out in the country. Then, on returning, went on to Social. I went to Miss Jones' at 5. P. M., & walked with her to Mount Lucy. Weather quite cool. Miss Jones surprised me by approving of dancing & cards. Met carriages returning from the Society, - Judge & Mrs Taggart; - Aquie Corbin, &c. While we stood on the top of Mt. Lucy, Mr. Walker, riding at a distance, recognized us, & shouted "Hip! hip! hooray!" in a very answering way. Returned at dusk; on the

way to the post-office, met Mrs. Walker, & joked
over our view on Mt. Leary.

Wed of Sept 8^c. Went to Mrs Judge Taggart's, &
showed her & Miss Clark my African pictures,
& ~~showed~~ ^{talked with} her about a small 2- oared boat
for Africa. In afternoon, at 5:11, left on the
Erie R.R., for ^{Leray} Batavia; waited there till 6:55,-
on State Line for Warsaw; 10 minutes launch, &
20 minutes delay at Wagonia. Did not
reach Warsaw till 8:20 ^{p.m.}; Left my bag at
brother's, & hasted down to prayer-meeting;
reached there in time for the last remarks
& hymn. After meeting, met Mrs Phillips.

Thursday 9^c.

Waking in morning, & went, in Mr. Dudley's horse
& carriage, to Martinville, on the way to South
Warsaw, with Mrs Nassau & her African wood, to
the turning mill. A mill for turning rollers
for attaces, one of the only 3 in the U. S. Handsome
wilted wood-work of boxes, tables, & frames. Many
people in Warsaw at the County Fair. In the
afternoon, went to Mrs Patterson's with flute;
played flute & piano with Miss Jenny Patterson, &

tuned the guitar. Returned to brother's, in the evening, visited at Mr. Fisher's, on the way, stopping at Mrs Patterson's to get the use of her guitar. At Mrs. F's, during the evening, Mr Cook & Mr Walker, young men, called. After they went, I played on the guitar some. Left about 10. P. M., - on the way, returned the guitar, & sang a little while at Mrs Patterson's.

Friday Sept 10th. Preparing for the afternoon Preparatory service. At 2. P. M., made the preparatory lecture. Met Mrs Dr. Gates of Niagara. Returned home. At tea, were Mr. Aug. Frank, & Mr & Mrs Wash. Frank. Miss Phillips & Mr. Warren rode out horseback, - Miss P. soon returned, Mr. W. having been thrown from his horse. Mr. Phillips called, to make a picnic party for tomorrow morning, but, I have to go to Rochester tomorrow. In evening, I called with brother & Mrs Nassau at Mr. Dudley's, & said good-bye. Just ten years ago my wife died. Saturday 11th. Bade good-bye to brother's family, & left, on the morning train, for Rochester. On the train, was a man of the Bob. Lugsoll

type, who was talking his infidelity, in a very loud
manner, to be heard throughout the car. Took a
ticket on the train for transfer omnibus; rode to
Powell's block, & then took car ~~to~~ passed Gibbs
so, where, at No 20, Mrs. Riggs lived. Found the
way easily. He welcomed me. We walked out for
an errand, & to Dr. Campbell's, to arrange for
tomorrow. Returned to dinner, & met Mrs. Riggs.
In afternoon, went to Mr. Lusk's. Incident ^{on} the
way of a woman, in the car, dropping by mistake
a dollar (for 50c) in the car fare box. Mrs
Lusk came to the door, - soon Mrs. Latty, &
afterward the father, saw the ^{African} parrot. Rode
back & found Rev. & Mrs. Thorburn awaiting me.
From there came also Major & Mrs. Hill, & Mrs
Ward. While we were at tea, Mr. & Mrs. Alling
came. Showed my African pictures. A very
pleasant evening.

Sabbath Sept 12. P. Preached in Mr. Riggs' ch. in
the morning. Met a Mr. & Mrs. ~~Smith~~, Mr. Merriam,
Mrs. Hopkins, & Mrs. Hayes. Felt very sleepy
after dinner, & dozed all afternoon. Spoke at
Dr. Campbell's ch., in the evening, to a large

congregation. A collection was taken up for getting a boat for Mrs Smith.

Monday Sept 13th. Went with Mrs. Riggs to the Minister meeting. Met Rev. D. Robinson, Rev. D. Page ("Wyanig"), Rev. D. Sanky (grandfather Mrs Cameron's pastor); Rev. Mr. Gayford. Stopped in the Savings Institution office, to see Prof. Wilkins, organist of St Peter's ch.; he gave me some of Beethoven's Sonatas. Saw, from the window, the minnow fountain at the reservoir. Stopped at a fire-engine house, & saw their rooms, & the harness, & the mechanics. In afternoon, went to see Mrs Laura Hopkins, on Exchange st, & then ^{to} Edinboro' st, to 10 Talcott Place. Came back with her to 74 South Fitzhugh st, ^{Mrs Allie's} at 4.30 P. M., where was a collection of more than 30 ladies, friends of musicians. Showed my pictures, & talked for an hour. Mrs Nichols, Mrs. Agriuk, Mrs Temple (a her niece Mrs Hamilton & Oglesby³, 2 of the Young Lush Band), Mrs Rev. D. Robinson. After the ladies had gone, I remained at Mrs Allie's to tea with Dr. & Mrs Campbell, ^{& Mrs Parsons.} Returned to Mrs Riggs with Mrs Parsons, on the way toward the home of Mrs P.

Tuesday Sept 14th. Mr Riggs took me a carriage-drive through some of the finest streets, Mr Powers, Mr. Sibley's, Prof. Swift's, the Rochester University, elegant residences & grounds; the many little parks like private streets; a street with the car-railway on each side of the street, not in the middle. The water-works, - reservoir; the fountain, can than 110 ft high - but to-day only 60 ft., a magnificent sight. In Mt Hope Cemetery. Returned, a drove part of the way; the horse, "Pete", suddenly fell slipping on the iron rail-way, but as suddenly picked herself up. At Mr Riggs, his son Clarence, paints, has a taste for wood & scroll-work & also likes riding. In afternoon, went to Powers Gallery with Clarence, where Mr. Riggs was awaiting me; then to the book-store of Steele & Avery, where I left my traveling bag; & with only my bundle, left Rochester, at 5 P.M. In Charlotte, made immediate connection, on Rome, Watertown & Ogdensburg R.R., for Wolcott, where I reached on time at 7.25. Hasted from the train up ^{to} the village to the Presbyterian Ch., where a Rev. Bates was preaching. In the vestibule, asked for Mrs Eaton.

The usher did not know her, but pointed out
Dr. Eaton, who took me to the pulpit. After
Mrs. Babes' sermon, & a hymn, I spoke on Africa.
Her presence & enjoyed it. Rev. & Mrs. Rice; Mrs
Wilson. Was entertained at Dr. ^B Wilson's house.
Wed Sept 15. Attended Presbyterian morning,
prayer meeting at 8. A.M. At 9. A.M., Phog,
& I was invited a Con. Mee. At 10. A.M., the
Ladies F. M. S. in the parson-room, to which
I was called at 11.15. Spoke until noon.

At Dr. Wilson's, they kept me talking con-
stantly. An old lady, Mrs. Landon, had
bought Jenny Harrieth's books for Missions, for
\$2.00. In the afternoon, met the Ladies-
meeting, for over an hour. They & Phog
adjourned. I stayed still, on Mrs Wilson's
invitation. Parted. In the evening, called
at Rev. Mrs. Rice's & chatted about Africa.
Boys playing with fire-works "jack-o-lanterns".
Had met Rev. Messrs. Tripp, Landon, Chaceman,
Dada, & Spencer; & Miss Leavenworth.

day Sept 16. All during the morning, ladies were coming in, calling on Mrs Wilson, to hear me tell about African scenes. Young Mr Leavenworth called, to invite me, in his suit & dinner, but Mrs Wilson wd not have me go. At 2. P. M., Dr. W. drove me to the depot. Had to wait there 3/4 hour for the train. Reached Rochester with 20 minutes to spare, to go to Steele & Avery & get my traveling-bag. Met Rev Dr Robinson. The train was an hour late, started at 6.30. Reached Batavia comfortably. Excitement about Maine election.

Friday 17. Writing letters &c. In the evening, wd have liked to go to teachers' meeting, but had to stay & write. Felt disappointed. Did not meet any one on the streets whom I knew, except Mr. Walker. Left my watch to be repaired.

Sat. 18. Felt very tired, but kept at the pen & ink & finished ^{translation of} them, ready for the Bible Soc. In the afternoon, Mr. Swan drove me a long ride of 8 miles down the Town road. The street full of wagons. met no one whom I knew, except Miss Haywood. Played on the flute & piano with sister Emma. In the evening, Miss

Mary called to see sister. Accompanied them
with the flute on a piano duett; escorted her
to her home.

Sabbath Sept. 19th. At church, morning & evening, &
in afternoon, at Sab. Sch. Convention, in which, at
the close, I was called on for a ^{short} speech; & in
Prayer meeting, where I spoke a few minutes.
Met in the Convention, Mrs Weaver of the Dutch
church; Mrs Towne's tirade in the prayer meeting,
Monday 20th.

Packing & writing. Called on Miss Jones. Left
at 3.30, with ^{sister} Lizzie, on the N.Y. Central R.R., via
Rochester & Albany; on a Wagner sleeping car.
At Palmyra, changed to a very good section.
At Geneva, stopped to eat. Did not sleep
well at night.

Tuesday 21st. Reached New York at 6.45 ^{A.M.} ^{at}
cars to Des Moines St, via 4 Av. Cars, &
change at Grand St. Waited at No Jersey for
luggage & ate lunch there. Changed cars, at
young City, on the 9. 4. 1. cars. At Trenton, left
with bundles in baggage-room, & Lizzie stayed
at the depot. I went shopping. At young N.Y.

Wed. Sept 22^d. Rode to Penitton with Dr. G. to

In evening, at Reception, at Mrs. Norris's.

Hegamans; Mrs. Jannin of India. Rode
back to Lawrenceville with Dr. Cozeman. Festival
at the district school-house, for a Sab. Sch.

Friday 24^d. Writing. Walked to the High school; &
between 11 & 12, addressed the pupils on African
Adventure. Afternoon with Dr. Hamill & Maude.

to hear Cousin Hugh Hamill make a Repub-
lican speech at the village inn.

Sabbath 26th. Stayed at the High School
to dinner. Addressed the Sab. Sch. am-
ping, at Laurensville church. After church,
rode to Pennington, with Mr. Fournier, & ad-
dressed his church.

Monday 27th. Returned from Pennington to
the Parsonage; & packed my valise
for a month's absence.

Tuesday 28th. Went to Philada. - & at
1334 Chestnut St, at full privilege, to the
Council of the Pub. Alliance. Went to the
Council in the evening with Mrs Patten.

Wed. 29th. Did not go to the Council,
but did shopping, & bought fireworks, for
Africa. Went to Council in the evening.

Thursday Sept 30. Attended Council, in the morning, and, in the afternoon, went to Honeybrook, in Chester Co, to speak at a Ladies' meeting. Miss Long had been holding a meeting in the afternoon. Met a Miss Dampman, who all alighted on the train, - a niece of Miss Buchanan. Staid at Rev. Mr. Torkuth, - Mrs T, & her mother, Mrs King. Addressed the meeting, & walked home with Miss Dampman.

Friday Oct 1. Spent the morning at Mr. Torkuth's & dined at Miss Buchanan's. Returned to the City ^{Philadelphia} & to the Council. Came to see about going meeting with Charley Brown. Charley created confusion, by turning off by the road. I went to tea, at Mr Malore's. And then, went to Kensington train, for 8.20. P.M., to Tacony, & walked, from Tacony to Mr. Kenson's, at Satter's Lane, very rapidly. It was intended to find Charley there! Sang with Mrs Brooks.

Saturday 2. Start 9.30 A.M., 9 of us. - Mr & Mrs Giegler, - Mr Kenson, & Mrs Brooks. -

Charley & I, 2 Keweenaw boys, & young Barnes,
rode all, in one one-horse wagon, to the

Addressed the Synod in the evening; not an attentive audience. A Republican parade at night, '80. was excited by the news of the Republican successes in Indiana & Ohio.

There was no opportunity given for religious service on the second Sabbath, the

23^d, it was so unsatisfactory a day,
for, in the evening, my wife & I & the three

its fog whistle blew. We thought a vessel

It was too late in the day to sit & so, made appointments for tomorrow. Went shopping afoot, with the 2 ladies. At a ladies goods shop, & Mary bought gloves & ribbons, &c; & at another shop, bought shoes. Got back late to supper. Cold days & nights & quite cold evening from fire.

On the 24th, Thursday. After breakfast, went, with Mrs Gault & Mary, to Vandyk's, went out twice for her, once to buy a pair of stockings & once for gloves. Had to stay a long time for the sitting, - the weather was foggy. Had to haste down to the Prince's Landing, to meet appointment with Mrs Gault & Robinson, to cross to Birkenhead to Chester. Had, as the morning, while the ladies were at

Vandyke's, made some excursions to Pen-
nington, the watchmaker, & found Mr Gault
at the barber's, with a number of letters for
me from Africa & America. In crossing to

Small vessels & boats in the Bay, as the steamer came dangerously near them in anchoring. Watched the mountain over the hills & valleys of Madeira. A boy diving for sponges. Went ashore with Mr Reed, of the Edinburgh Hotel. Left Mary at the hotel, & went to have all my Grand stand off, leaving only overstacks. Breakfasted with our other clerical passengers. Walked about shopping, - the narrow streets, - looked sleds, - buggies. Not many fruits, - it was not the season. Came off about noon. Miss Debnay, daughter of the American Consul at Funchal, aboard.

On Nov. 6: Sabbath. Sighted Funchal early. Had morning religious service. Rev. ^{Mr. Lane} of Bathurst preached. Watching the Peak of Funchal. Anchored at 3. P. M. Some of the company went ashore. My wife & I did not.

On Nov. 7: Monday. The steamer had started at between 1 & 2. A. M. & by daylight, was nearing Grand Canary. Mrs. Calman was my sick, & thought of leaving us & returning

to Madeira by a steamer that was being at
another time; but, after consultation with the
doctors, finally concluded not to. We could
go ashore, for the Capt said he wd. leave

went on the bridge with Mrs Massan; &

him: the pilot gave a letter to the Capt
from Capt Griffiths of the steamer "Squalodon"
wh. we had passed very early in the

the red sand from settling in sailing suit;

Heard church bells ringing ashore: the
Weelogan cutter went ashore. Pleasantly
cool quiet evening: sat with Mary

a cloth on their mother's backs; oranges,
lemons, sweet potatoes & other fruits for sale
along the street side; peawallows; parasit-
ic plants on the walls; coco-nut trees;
Banana trees; lime trees; papaya trees;
Mandingo dwellers; At the Wesleyan
Mission House. Rev. Mr. Dixon. A horse came
for sale, young & not very strong for £18.
A Mr. Jones sent another, rather old, &
not very high, for £15.; & a third, from
a Mr. Pratt, came for £18. After

Breakfast we examined the 3 horses & had the owners try their speed: the first one was not strong enough, & the owner put his price down to £13. The Jones was not strong, & seemed sick, & I declined it; the third we all liked, & its owner came & voluntarily reduced it to £15, & I took it. We had, all gone into the Church, into the Louse-yard, at Mr. Puller's sick house; to the garden. After dinner, we went to the school-house, & sang hymns, & were saluted by some of the people & church-members who came to see us. Sang a long while. Monday-bread too. Rested in the house. I had waited for a barber to come & shave us, & finally shaved ourselves. Went out through the market: Koola nuts, & vegetables & fruits. Scavenger by-gangs. Buying a few things. At the agents', Mr. Brown, to see about the freight of the horse: to Mr. Sivia's (?); - Mr. Brown being sick, Capt Hamilton was there. To Mr. Adams',

to buy shawls & hats & native cloth & grain for
food for the horses on the way. Went back
again to Mrs Jarvis (?) to see about the
horse's freight. The clerk was gone. Was dis-

rest of the company had gone off before,
as might we coming. The boat ~~did~~ took
them, on its return, went back with
me. Reached the steamer just in time
to sit down to the steamer's dinner.

Nov. 13th Sabbath. Rose early. Was not like

Mr. Yates, & the other ministers from the steamer
came with Mr. Williams, & we all went
to the Wesleyan High School, Mrs. May

pany with the Wesleyan brethren, & we 4
went back to Consul Lewis: rested; read;
wrote; ate supper at 5 o'clock. After supper,

Nov. 16th. Wed. Rose early. Sweeds in our
room. The garden & grounds of the bank.
Rode in Batty-chien's to a store, to buy

for Mrs. Hansen. On to Mr. Lewis,
met Mr. Man White, who had been
writing to the Wobyan's to send Miss
and to the "mine" (Agave). Off to the
steamer. The steamer delayed, hunting for

found ashore. Two passengers - Frenchmen
for Monrovia. A pleasant day.

Nov. 17th: Thursday.

Passed Cape Mount, during the morning.

I also bought them 1/2 doz callers, & a little box of crackers. Went to Post Office. Met Rev. Mr. Gibson, the Librarian Sec'y for State, & he promised to try to send me a fruit I wanted. Went to Mrs. Sharp's again; & thence, to Mrs. Sherman's, & talked about Mrs. Freed. Thence, to the Keos track. Miss Sharp & Mr. Elliott came, in starting from the track, the crew were slow & three successive waves drenched us.

On this steamer, changed clothes & Mrs. Nassau attended to Miss Sharp's work, & I attended to Mr. Smyth's.

Three Librarian young men on board, as saloon passengers. Signs of heavy rain, & I did not sleep on deck.

Friday Nov. 18: Slept admirably; woke late: feel very well. One of the young Librians, Mr. G. D. Moore, said he wd. try to get me the African fruit I wanted.

Mrs. Sherman & 3 other Librarian ladies came on board, at Passaic; & being dissatisfied ~~for~~ they c'd not have the

Ladies' saloon to themselves, returned to the shore wth dredgeon. The "Senegal" was lying at anchor, on her way to England; & I sent a letter to Mr. Robinson, ordering 3 books, & to Mr. Malone, ordering drawing material for the Bana. At lunch, Mr. Galvan gave vent to some outrageous opinions against the negro race. News came by the "Senegal", that Mrs. Sutherland at Calcutta was dead, & Mr. Anderson sick of dysentery.

In the evening, on deck, a heavy rain-storm drove us down stairs. Had seen in the evening, the north star. Fear it is the last view I may have of it.

Saturday Nov. 19th. Early this morning, steamer plowed, - fired her gun, - whistled, & called for ~~the~~^{men} at a place north of Grand Cee; only a few came. Plowed, & fired, & whistled, at Grand Cee, - & more Kroos came off. At Cape Paluas, in the afternoon, crowds of Kormen came. Stood with Mrs. Kewer, & watched the mustering of the Kroos by the presence.

Mrs Nassau was interested in the new
rights of the canoes & paddlers & natives.
We went on to the bridge & there, with
one of the officers, went to the very end of
the bow, to see the anchor taken up.
A joke was found around, about my es-

coming to the bow, because of the presence
of the officer who was with me. Off
again at 6. P. M., & on our way into
the Gulf of Guinea.

Sabbath Nov. 20. At sea, & not near any port,
so, our morning religious services were
not interfered with, by discharge of or re-
ception of cargo. Mr Baxter read Prayers,
Mr. Robinson prayed & gave out a hymn,
& Mr. Elliott preached. In the afternoon,
at Cape Lake; & in the evening, at Half
Jack. Storms now every afternoon, or
evening. Sang hymns with Mrs Nassau
during the day; & with our ministerial
company during the night. The steamer lay
at anchor until long after midnight.

Grand Bassam (Nov. 1881) Elmira

Monday Nov. 21. Aft breakfast, reached Grand Bassam. One young French passenger left us there: a very sick mulatto man came on board, to go to Accra, to assist in Bassam very hot, - bad temp, - a bad place. In afternoon, at Assinie. The "Banguela" came homeward, anchored near us, & I wrote a letter to Dr. Lorie by it. A heavy rain-storm came up. We sat in shawls & coats under the covering. A damp evening, but I sat on deck with Mrs. Nassau. Have changed my stateroom to the one vacated by the Freshman.

Tuesday 22.

By breakfast, at Assinie: the coast more elevated: rocky islands near shore, like breakwaters: good landing. Mr. K.B. W. Walker (now in England) is engaged in gold-mining at this part of the coast. Came on as far as Elmira & anchored at 6.30^{pm}. Mr. Elliott bears tomorrow morning. Did not enjoy the afternoon or evening, & we very unhappy at night.

Acera

Wed of Nov. 23: Steamer was early off from Elmira, & in an hour, was at Cape Cod Point. Massive buildings ashore. Warm morning: Mr Elliott left for his work, & Messrs Baxter, Williamson, & Marshall went ashore to spend the day. Fell letters in the afternoon. At 4:30 ^{8.30} steamer started again & ran on to Wivelash: arrived there in the evening, & found the "Galton" lying there, where Capt. Moore, came on to the "Conce", & I went into the Capt's office, to ask for news about Galton: There was no news, & I was disappointed: felt ashamed that I had gone into the room unvisited.

Thursday 24: Handed Mrs. Searan a list of thanksgiving letters, for the evening of to-day. Some of the company went off ashore at Acera. After lunch, Mr. Robinson, & Miss Williams & I went ashore in an ordinary surf-boat: walked through the streets of Acera to the trading-house of the Basel German trading mission-house. Went to

Mr Rottmann's home, who, with Mr R. & Rev. & Mrs David, entertained us till the Messrs Marshall, Williamson & Baxter came, & in all went ~~off~~ in a surf boat, skilfully handled, through the surf to the steamer. Mr Nassau had a headache, & sat up on deck in the cool air to relieve it.

Friday Nov. 25. This morning, at Adachi, near the mouth of the Volta; thence on, in the afternoon, to Duita, just beyond Julia Coffe, where the steamer bought quantities of ducks & turkeys & fowls. I bought some eschschts^(onions). Had had a slight headache during the day, but it disappeared: Mr Nassau affectionately trying to relieve it. Off again this evening, on a course to ~~the~~ Lagos. The Day Beacon "smokes", of this part of the Coast, are quite thick.

Saturday Nov. 26. Early in the morning, arrived at Lagos, in a dense Day Beacon haze. The "Volta" was lying in the roads. Mr Baxter went ashore, to his mission.

The bar-ometer "Opsto." The bar-ometer. & the weather warm, cooler in the afternoon. Capt. Hamilton sick. No chance for us to go ahead.

Sabbath Nov. 27. Work going on in the steamer discharging the cargo to the branch steamer "Jurado"; nevertheless, we had religious services in the morning; Mr. Marshall preached & I assisted him with the preliminary services. Dr. O'Reilly & the ship's doctor assisting to excess. Early in the afternoon, the steamer ^{the work} got "done" & we started rapidly for Bony. Ran rapidly all night.

Monday Nov. 28. The haze much less than yesterday: became visible. Passed the mouth of the river. In the afternoon, rapidly entered toward Bony & anchored just at dark. Part of the evening on deck, with gentle breeze for our steamer. One 7' ... our ...

Tuesday Nov. 29th. Went, after breakfast, in the
Captain's boat, to the "Simpson", wh. had

America. ^(Not true) Returned to Mr. Edgerly's &
chatted; Mrs. Hansen playing a puzzle.
Retired early. Was surprised that so

Friday Dec. 2^d. A very much morning.
The excellent service. Mr & Mrs Eddie
to break fast. Had had morning prayers
with the Episk were held previously.
Got custom lines. Examined the printer's
house; the church, a handsome iron
building. At King Eyo's, - his child-
like reception of us, - his parlor, -
crowns, - mirrors, - chairs, - carving, clocks,
table, - awards, &c, &c. His autographs.
Brass rods & wire in the door-yard.
Elaborate paintings on the mud walls.
Sensitiv plant; driven ants. Carried
to the boat provided by King Eyo. Down
with the tide to the "Comice" & the
"maunata"; & there, on to Mrs Rossi.

167 (Lalabae (Dec. 1881)

Up the Dakekorn hill, - very steep. Mr. Ross
his dispensary, & a Mrs. Sutherland's
the residence. Mrs. Ross. Trees, - citrons,
peach oil tree. - At Mr. Andrews, - Mrs
S. Nick. At Mr. Peables, & saw Mrs P.
went to Mr. Ross; Mrs Savaan copy
of plan of (Mrs Sutherland's) house.
Chief Eyawla & another chief came
to see us, while we were dining. Mrs
Savaan, Mrs Gault, Mr. Robinson, & us
with Mrs. & Mrs Ross, the steamer gun
paid. Mrs. Gault left a handsome
log on the steamer, to be taken away
from the office; trying to write!
started at 2. P. M. The steamer in
company of Mrs's Willeison & Marshall.
The coal breeze as we approached the
sea. At 7. P. M., anchored outside
of the river's mouth. Fine moonlight.

Fernando P. (Dec. 1881)

at night, Dec. 3: Had anchored last night: &
about 1. A. M., resumed the journey &
reached Fernando P., by 7. A. M. The
"Mayumba" & the gun-boat "Foam" were
at anchor. Wrote notes to Dr. Gosman
& to Dr. Lorne. View of Fernando P.
peak. Admired the wooded shores of
Fern. P. island. Left at 11. A. M.
streaming south, between the island & the
mainland. A fine sea-wind. At
night, a clear moonlight. The dog "Rock"
enjoying himself going around the ship with
Capt. Hamilton. Thinking of our old
"Penita" mission, as the steamer, late in
the evening, got as far south as (as I
supposed) to be opposite ^{to} Batanga.
Sabbath Dec 4:. Daylight, steamer opposite
Cape St John. Recalling the memories con-
nected with Curico Bay; & especially with
my first wife's death in the bay
near Cape St John. Anchored at Elvri
island, about 9.30 A. M. The
missionaries had a Bible Reading,

the shore. We held. The Princess Royal
bark gone. Left Eboi, at 2. P. M. at

river. Anchored at 7. A. M. At 5. P. M.
Mr. Campbell & Dr. Baehner came for us.
gladly welcomed. Aboard by 10. A. M.

cabin & Mrs. Baehner. Welcomed a
Miss Baraka. Mrs. Baehner & Mr. Baehner
opened some trunks, to show some of
our new things. Pleasant prayer-
meeting in the ^{evening} ~~morning~~. Ready to
set at night.

Tuesday 6th. Rested, & met native
friends, & looked over boxes. Prayer
meeting in the ^{evening} ~~morning~~, at Mr. Campbell's,
led by ^{Rev} Mr. Walker. After the meeting,
social singing.

Wednesday 2^d. Reading & conversing with
fellow missionaries. Church prayer-meeting,

noon, & spent the night at Mr.
Campbell's. Had quite a duet with
Mr. Bacheler, in the ~~afternoon~~ evening,

Thursday 3^d. In the morning, enter-
taining Mr. Lyon, who was awaiting
until the "Ethiopia" should go.
In the afternoon, there was a meet-
ing of the Banta Female Mission-
ary. After this meeting, Mr.
Campbell took Mrs. Nassau, Mrs.
Mr. Gault, & Messrs. Robinson, Mackay,
Bacheler, in the ^{boat} "New-colo", to
St. Palen. Mr. Walker & I were
at home & in an ad. called on the
Cand. and L., who has with him his
wife & children.

Friday Dec 9th. Made no entry. Landed at Mr. Scholze's trading-house.

Sat. 10th. All went to Mr. Campbell's, & were weighed. Mrs. Tarran weighed 130 lbs, I, 144 lbs. The united weight of 12 missionaries was 1500 lbs. My height was 5 ft 9 in.

Sabbath 11th. Mr. Gaetz preached.

Mrs. Bachelor was not at church, being somewhat sick. I made remarks at the evening service. A pleasant chat with Mr. Marling in the evening. He told early. Recognized the long sailing crew of the night service, as I did, when I first went there.

Monday 12th. Waiting for Mr. De Heer to come. Mr. M'ia came in the evening during a heavy storm. He came into evening prayer meeting, just after its close, at Mr. Campbell's house. Had painted the "Sooan" in the morning.

Gaboon (Dec. 1881)

Tuesday 13th 1881. Began Mission meetings: not much progress, as Mr. Decker had not come. He came in the evening, just before ten o'clock: went down to welcome him. Mr. Mackay led the evening meeting.

Wed 14th. Mission meeting in the morning. Mr. Walker not very pleased in his manner to Mr. Campbell & myself. No meeting in the afternoon: had private talks with Messrs. Lant & Robinson: also with Mr. Mackay: also with Mr. Campbell. Preaching in the evening.

Thursday 15th. Mission meetings during the day: & Preaching in the evening.

Friday 16th. Mission in morning & part of afternoon. Preaching in the afternoon evening, & an unpleasant discussion with Mr. Walker about his, as a Congregationalist, acting ^{without appointment} as a Stated Supply of a Presb. ch.

Galena (Dec. 1881)

Sat. Dec 17. Mission meeting in the morning. In afternoon, Joague photographed a group of all missionaries present. Went bathing in the salt river with Miss Gault, Robinson, & Campbell. Writing in the evening.

Sabbath 18. Mrs. Campbell preached in the morning. Odd's supper in the afternoon. Men's meeting & Abia presided: a pleasant service. Mrs. Mason not very well.

Monday 19. Mission meeting in the morning: important matters, but not unharmonious. The photographer was about all day, taking various views. Working out estimates for station accounts in the afternoon. Mrs. Mason still at home & sick in the evening. She is quite better at night.

and go. Mrs Campbell, Gault & Ozden
assisted in packing her trunks. Left
at 3 P.M. ^{Mrs Bacheler & baby with us.} Waited an hour, at the
station, till the Capt. came. At 5 P.M.
steamed across the river, & anchored for
the night near the Point Porpouge.

172 At Sea (Dec. 1881) Ogové River

On the 23^d, early in the morning, started around the point, and steamed for Nazari, Bar. Entered the ^{Ogové} river at 4. o'clk; and, at night, went on to Angâta, & anchored about 8. P. M.

On the 24th, early, King Esongi came off to see me, & made me a warm native welcome. Went ashore into the steamer's boat, & got all the done for the Ogové houses, & brought them up to the steamer. Passed familiar points of the river all day, & anchored, in sunset, opposite Avanga. The insects from shore, attracted by the lights, came in such numbers as to drive us from the cabin: put out the cabin light. Captain helped us arrange the room for a mosquito-net for the ladies.

On the 25th, started early; passed Angâta. Comparing this Christmas with ~~that~~ of our friends elsewhere. No opportunity for religious services. At 3.30 P. M. anchored at the German trading-house, ^{with Lembar} received with 10 guineas from

The landing home, & the "Balanga" & "Plover"
steamers: & exhibition of flags. Mr. Schiff
gave the use of his boat, & Mrs. Cassan, Mrs.
Bachelor, & I went ashore, towing the "Swan".
Arae Egeñano, transferred Mrs. Cassan to
the "Swan", & rowed her to Anolindi, where we
were welcomed by Mr. & Mrs. Reading, the
sh. bell was rung to welcome us, at our
approach. Glad to sit down in a Christian
home. Prayers & tea ^{at Mrs. Reading's}, & spent
the night there. Many thoughts about
the expected changes at Kangaroo.

In the 26th, woke with headache: went
to the Hill, & walked around the premises
looked ^{at} the new houses, & the old ones
going to ruin. Returned to Anolindi,
& remained during the afternoon. Mr. Reading
had sent word to his Taurua friends, &
they came with guns, & fired a salute for
us. At night, he had an illumination,
a fire & etc. After tea, I left Mrs. Cassan
at Anolindi, & went & stayed all night
at the upper home.

174 Kāngwe

(Dec. 1881)

On the 27th, returned to Andindi, & brought Mrs. Tarsau to the Hill, & began to arrange with Mrs. Bachuler, about packing up her things.

On the 28th, busy packing Mrs. Bachuler's boxes.

On the 30th; in the afternoon, went with Mr. Reading, in canoe, to Mrs. Bachuler's goods. Called at Mr. Schiff's. Went to Mr. Sinclair's; he was not there, but was Mr. Gibson: a new man, Mr. Little, was there, just arrived. Saw Ajivo & his child. Returned to tea at Andindi; & at night, came with Mrs. Tarsau to the Hill, leaving Mrs. Reading at Andindi. A most moonlight night.

On the 31st; there had been a heavy rain, & wind last night. Sent a canoe to Andindi for Mrs. Bachuler. Started work in the paths. Carrying goats & a fowls for Mrs. Bachuler. A damp unpleasant morning. Writing up this diary. Went to the factories, in the afternoon: was taken with a feverish attack, & went to bed feeling very badly.

Rangwe (January 1882)

Sabbath Jan^y 1st. Rose feeling weak, but conducted public services in the church; about 60 or 70 people present. Enjoyed the services. Held Sab. Sch., in the afternoon. Rain fell, in the evening; but, we held Monthly Court, & there was unusual interest & much freedom in prayer & remarks by the members, & a collection of about \$3.00. Still had some fever, & a chill on going to bed.

Monday 2^d. Felt better from the operation of medicine. Went to Iruanga to see Kanoki, & tried to get people from him to take me up the river, to Okanda. After several hours, came away unsuccessful. Hippopotami on the way. Stopped at Kanoki's, on the way back, & engaged positively with him, for him to take me to Okota & Okanda. Returned in good health. Akandaga came to say he wanted to accompany me, as cook and as assistant.

176 Kängwe (January 1882)

Tuesday Jan 3^d. In morning, went with
Mr. Reading, in his canoe, & stopped
at Rankombi's town, took him in, &
went to Mr Schiff's. - Mr. Bohm was
sick; on to Mr Sinclair's, & made
out a list of things, to be taken up to
Okawela. Had a talk with Joklain
about his annoyance in coming to
the Mission-house. Mr. Reading stayed,
to go up to John Erney's. Stopped
at Mr Schiff's, on the way back, &
got rice, & ship-bread. Stopped to
inquire Mrs Reading, late to dinner.
The 2 girls troublesome about their
itches. Only a few at prayer-meeting
in the evening. A bright moonlight.

Wed. 4th

Mr Bachelor was sick with fever, - gave
him various remedies; & Mrs Reading
came over, & attended to the baby,
who also seemed sick. The 2 girls
again troublesome about their
itching food. Took little Mbara in this place

Thursday Jan¹⁵: Last night the girls
being still rebellious, I asked Agaid to
assist with the babe Otis, - so Mrs
Bachelor might have a quiet rest: &
Mrs Nassau assisted. I slept a little
on a lounge, & was up several times.
Awoke early, & started my work. Mr.
Reading came, & with news that the
"Impongwe" was fast on a sand-bank
in the Ngeruge. Talk about taking
back the fowls, that had been sent to
Mr Schiff's trading-house. Looking at
the site of the ^{new} house that is to be built
on the top of the hill. The Frenchman,
who has charge of the Aduma
people, came with a large company
of men, carrying logs for the new
house. Mrs Bachelor better in
health. In the evening, the 2
girls came to confess, & in for-
giveness, for their disobedience of the
past 4 days. Agaid again with
us, for the night.

178 Livingstone (January 1882).

Friday Jan^y 6th. Sent canoe to the trading-houses; and came back that Mr Schiff was going to Gabon. Wrote letters to send to him. But, he left, without notifying us, in the afternoon.

Sat^y 7th. Went, in the morning, again to the factories. Saw Mr Sinclair. Sent the 2 goats, from German-house, to Mr Sinclair. Talking & arranging about my journey up river. Came back, with a letter to Mrs Bachelor, from Mr Sinclair urging her to go on the "Pioneer". Busy all the afternoon, for her ~~to~~ on "Pioneer".

Sabbath 8th. After the morning service, heard the guns of the "Pioneer" starting on its journey. Renkambi came with the people, for fear of the journey to Okande, to have me arrange with him, but I refused to do any thing of the kind on Sabbath.

Monday 9th. Renkambi came with 6 people; but, I engaged only 5, Ogula, Etinda, Angimbozo, Nyanyi, & Kasangai. ^{which I borrowed of Mrs Perkins} I saw we went to Adande, & we packed boxes, & put them in the canoe.

In the afternoon, was busy getting together clothes,
& food & medicine for the Okola journey.

Journey to Okola & Okandé

Jan'y 10th Tuesday. Last night, after going to bed, was
a pain for the salt I had packed in the canoe
at Andindé, but, I rose, & with Ngere & the watchman,
walked over to where Akambie & Nambo were taking
care of the canoe, & they worked for over an hour to
clear things away carefully. But, the threatening rain
did not come. Rose early, & after good-bye to Mrs
Marian, went to Andindé; my crew joined me. Bought
plantains; had an unpleasant talk with

Reading; started about 9. A. M. Canoe was pretty
heavily laden; but, not as much as I had feared.

Had 9 for a crew. Lunched in the ^{river} at, near
the Agonyé. Benkoube came with his 2 canoes
& their crews, while we were eating. At Mr. J.
Erny's, 10. 10. P. M., & welcomed by him. Mrs Erny
& their baby Germain.

Wed'y 11th. Woke early, & anxious about the journey.
While Benkoube was getting his goods from Mr.
Erny, I sent my crew to get ngouja leaves in
the forest, with which to tie up my salt. They

stayed so long that I went after them. Busy at the salt all day. In afternoon, Messrs Sinclair & McKissock and a French priest came past a post, the "Ewaffa" having broken down. An amusing discussion, at supper, between Messrs Erwin & McKissock.

Thursday Jan 12: Rose early; breakfasted with Mr. Erwin & the ~~men~~ white men. Started about 7.30 A.M. On the way, my crew found a nest of egambé (a very large turtle) eggs on a sand-bar. Lunch at the post, & the crew murmured, because I comically selected for them the old rather than new plantains. As we approached Belambila, a "wai" had just broken out, between the villages of Apokwe & Walerija. Heavy rain. Stopped at Stombis town, for the night. A rainy night. Wrote a letter to Mrs Nassau, to be taken by a messenger calling himself "Mistool".

Friday 13: Started very early. At "Mistool's", stopped to buy food, but there was none. Met Likhopsami. Stopped at Kōmē's village, where Rankombe went ashore to see him. Passed the Falls ^{of Njagu-demba} on R.B. called Ngwilaka: stopped to eat, at Isala Point,

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L. B. means
"left bank"

where the Bakile, on hearing my name, recognized me as "Kasi", the friend of Kasa. An Akile, named Akâtigani, gave me a fowl; but, as soon afterward, he begged for tobacco, I gave him back his part.

Passed the mouth of the Obangé, a river on R. B., ^{opposite a long sand-bar (in dry season)} was told it leads toward the Rémbe.

In the afternoon, passed the mouth of a lagoon or lake, called Akops, on L. B. A half-hour later, passed, on R. B., a high Point, somewhat like Kângue, called Erere-volo, with 2 Fâruwe towns on it. Opposite to it, on the L. B., is a little creek, Ijé.

Stopping in the forest, in the night, shortly beyond Ijé ^{at an ulako, Emangimbo}, within forest of the Fâruwe villages.

Sat. Jan 14th. Slept well. Took coffee, instead of tea. Started early, & passed a small creek, on R. B., called Banganyé; and, a mile or so beyond, as a second mouth, connecting through a lagoon, with the lower ^{river}. Exactly opposite, on L. B., was a fine ulako. About 8:30 ^{A.M.} came to a Point, an Akile town, Yeña, friends of Kasa, who welcomed me as their ^{friend}. Land on the opposite R. B. somewhat high. Beyond Yeña, was the Point Evenganomni, where, in

Opokoujunga (January 1882)

the rising of the water rushes with violence. And, just beyond the point, is a small creek, the L.B., going into a lake or lagoon.

The river soon narrowed to about 600 yds, with high ground on both sides. Passed a creek on L.B.; it and the stretch of land, for ^{some} short distance, is called Opokoujunga. Between Yena & Opokoujunga, is the ^{former} site of the ^{place} (the head-man's name Alukijana).

A mile or less in front was the beginning of the Hills, ^{which} I have often seen, when looking up the river from Re-lambila. A lake or lagoon back of Opokoujunga.

River narrowing to about 500 yds; on R.B., steep red & yellow hill sides, reminding me of Sgerya in Upanja of Gambia. A new Fariwe village, near the highest of these Hills, - they have no special name, all being called by the name of the region, Opokoujunga.

The Hills were continuing coming out in fine outline on the Fariwe side. Stopped at the end of the district Opokoujunga, ^{Marigald} to eat at an Akile village of an old man Ekomutyi, & a younger man ^{Mfwinrijandai}, with whom the Gambia, Olimbo, was trading. On the R.B. opposite was the Fariwe village of a man,

Ngwe, with a long beard. Arrived the 3 fine hills ^{Ikoko} on the R.B. Stayed all day, as Nankombe wanted to buy food of the Fariwe. Some of them came over, in the afternoon, to see us, & to sell some corn, but they brought no plantains.

Sabbath Jan 15: Rested all day. The Fariwe came with a little food, wh. I ^(ant) not buy on the Sabbath. Last night, an insect entered my ear & I cd. not get it out; poured melted butter in the ear. Akendenge sick. Talked with the Bakile about God. Wrote a letter, of my mission work, to the "Presb. Journal". A dead slave thrown into the river. Many struggles, & singing hymns. The Fariwe came again, & Nankombe bought a few plantains of them. At night, Nankombe wanted to go fishing, as if Sabbath was over; but I forbade him. Put cotton in my ears, for fear of more insects, when I went to bed.

Monday 16: Left letters with Olimbo, to be sent by first chance. Cloudy misty morning. Akendenge better, but still unable to work with paddle. Fine row of hills. Slow paddling. A little sand-bar on L.B., at ... of a ...

creek, Okume. A little cove & rivulet, Olende, on L.B.,
 & gives its name to the district
 wh. is a good ulako. Fine pile, on opposite side
 of river, where Animba, a ^{Nkâmi} ~~Portuguese~~ man, working for
 Animba, at a Fânué town on R.B., crossed over
 into some town, to say ~~that~~ trade shd. not go up
 the river to Okota. This wd. seem to be a bar in
 my way, wh. I shall have to pass, on my return.
 Both sides of the river are high continuously,
 no sides, - Fânué on both banks. All the
 district is called Olende. Passed the ^{very large} ~~rock~~
 rock, Talaguga, ^{in the water} on R.B. Passed, on R.B., a creek

pleasant afternoon, about 3.30 P.M., with breezes
from the west. ^{Asange} Asange, the island, on wh.
Mr. Smith was living for a short time; also, a
small creek, on R.B., of the same name, - the
district also called by this same name. The
Fañu living only on R.B. About 4 P.M., on
L.B., a fine rocky ravine & spring-water, ^{where the crew gathered Kudamut}.

A row of rocks on R.B., one of them a pro-
jecting ledge called Yabe: opposite to it, we
stopped to gather bush-rope. Adēkē, an island,
the furthest point reached by the "Delta", of
Mr. R. B. N. Walker, on his second ascent of the
Ogowe. Slept on a sand-bar on L.B., a short
distance above Adēkē; the river noisy with
the water rushing against the rocks standing
in the channel.

Tuesday 17th Jan'y. River rose slightly during the
night, & we have floated the canoe, had it not
been well tied. No rain for the last 3 nights. A slight
misty rain this morning. An island, ^{by} ~~the~~ ^{the}
with small narrow channels about it. A series
of islands, Renāmbi, with rough poling. A
small island, Nengembwanji, with a few

Okota fishing houses. Stopped to lunch, at
Eliwa-mjenge, there is a lagoon ^{opposite} on R.B. Three
islands called Agewa-na-ubanda, Okota
hills seen yesterday were in nearer sight. A
Faiwe village, on R.B., the only one seen thus
far to-day, beyond the sandy islands Ngelen-
paranga, & Kampa, on ^{the other side} L.B.
called Meka, two small sandy islands,
Ikakasiina, the confines of inhabited
Okota. An Okota canoe crossing the river to
their fishing-camp. Tried to buy a terrapin from
them. An island called Okamba, with
young palm-trees on it, the first I have seen
in days. The sun set on our left bank,
i.e. we were going south. Stopped at Spanga-
ladi, the Okota villages of an old man Mbanga.

He and Afanga each gave me a fowl. A
very high hill (^{Idomba-njokhu} say 800 ft) just behind the village.
The people said elephants were numerous.

Wed. Jan 9 1882. A strong cold wind last
night. Shortly after starting, began to drag
canoes. A back-bone of rock, running from
top of a hill down to the water-side, on L.B.

(January 1882)

Olāngi

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with a cave, Etokabokē, wh. is said to run
far in & up the hill. An island, Ondongo,
where lived a former King Edibē, but Akinda
now is chief man. A hill ^{or R. B.} about twice as
high as Kāngor & of the same ^{many} ^{opposite}
to the large island Alēmbē ^{where are trading Doves & Iwike}. The river cut
up into many channels. Stopped to eat
nearly opposite the mouth of the Okoro river,
wh. enters on R. B. A most beautiful picture
of mountains, hills, river, lake-like enclosures,
islands, blue sky, fleecy clouds, fine N.E. breeze,
varied colors of green; beautiful! beautiful!! After
lunch, walked overland, while the canoe
dragged over some hard places. The mouth of
the river, from wh. the Inenga tribe came.
A few bare places on hill sides on R. B.; - the first
sign of open prairie. All this part of river is
called Alēmbē. ^{up the cataract} ^{channel} After slipping 2 or 3 times, in a bad
place, the canoe filled with water, & some things
were spoiled. Stopped, for the night, at head of
Alēmbē, on a strip of sand ^{in the} Olāngi ^{branch} wet,
it was no bad to sleep on. Began to give out

ations of Janina. Tried to bargain with the
Okota for a paddle.

Thursday Jan'y 19. Slept better than I expected;
but, none of us started in very good spirits.
Almost at once, came to a bad place, & finding
to venture it, dragged the canoe ^{up} solidly over
rocks. Benkobe came & helped us. Osege
rapids, & Spatiji prairie hillside on R.B.
Stopped, all afternoon, at Mbumba island, &
village, & dry the goods wet yesterday. The
Fulbe man came down sick; gave him medicine
& milk, & wrote a letter by him to my wife.

Friday 20. A heavy rain last night (connected
with the new moon). Passed a miserable night
feared I wd. sicken, & thought of giving up the
journey. Started late in morning, after the
morning meal, & after buying some sweet potatoes.
At once, met with a bad place, Agasi-
nyanga, near the Mbumba island. An
island, Agozo, opposite to the Okobe rocks in
the channel. Okota prairie hill-sides in-
creasing in number and size. The enthusiasm
of the crew, in relating new interesting points.

Yalimwānā (January 1882), Mangu (189)

A small creek, Atoka, on L.B. A prominent rock in the water, Njaku-ya-jomba, on R.B. Rapids & small islands both called Elanga. A fine site for a building on the open prairie side, in front of Elanga. The R.B. formerly occupied by Okota, but the use dismissed away by the Oshyba. A low rocky sandy island, Okenzwe. Cross to an Okota village, where Awuronjāgo, a Gahwa, was trading. A man by name to 2 other villages, in district Mangu, where was an old man, Anpelanga, & a young man, Elāndē. Buying plantains. Elāndē had settled a quarrel for me. An old man, Ajila, gave me a fork & plantain, which I soon returned to him, because of his begging me, in a disgusting manner, for tobacco. Left Gahwa with Awuronjāgo. A woman, wife of Lūwe, Ogula's friend, gave me the same things as Ajila. Okota women, conversation, prayers. Plural of Okota is Bakota.

Saturday Jan 21

Had a good sleep last night. Ascended a hill top, - finest view I have had in Africa. Just after

Songe.

1 January 1852

tasting, saw where the spring of water, ^{that} ~~the~~ emerged. A place with a ^{good} ~~great~~ sized cove of fresh water, Songe, on L. B. Paced on a hot distance; but, had to wait for Kanka by, who was after a trade debt at Songe, & who finally so ~~and~~ he ~~so~~ wait here over the boat for his supper. At late in the afternoon, I can't come back, about a mile, & stay with him, at the Okota village, the last on the river. Osyba & Apingi are beyond. Finer houses at Songe than I had expected; but people not as polite as at Shango.

Sabbath Jan. 22^d. Slept my well last night. Village more quiet than I had expected. Held meeting. In afternoon, some Bakota came, from their trade down river, & there was great welcoming & firing of guns, & ~~ring~~ of pa. Reading, writing, & ~~conversing~~. Benkumb's second Galasa canoe came. Walked to the top ^{of} a hill & had an extensive view. Five miles of Mt. Otombo, a few miles eastward; which is reported to have a lake on its top, & usually has a bank of cloud lying on it. The Osyba are living near it.

Songé

(January 1882)

Monday Jan 25. Warrid with Renkou's delays. Took counsel, & determined to return to Kangué. Because (1). The water is going down so rapidly that if I go on to Okanda, immediate return will become more difficult, & perhaps impossible, & I will be a prisoner at Okanda for a month. (2) Because the stage of water is unfordable, I sh^d. have come earlier (in Dec) before it fell so low, or later (Feb) when it will be somewhat risen. (3) Because my goods are too much for a canoe of this size; the canoe itself is not too small! But I have over \$150. in trade^{gold}; \$50. w^h. have been sufficient. Thus far, I have had call only for cloth, tobacco, pemade, mirrors, caps, dishes, knives. (4). Because the real object of the journey, the seeking a site for a station, is already accomplished, by what I saw near Ni^{ti}, & by what I see here at Okota. (5) To go on to Okanda is simply to gratify curiosity & I will not do so while New Nassau is so alone. I will leave her alone for duty, but not for our own pleasure. Got rid of part of the weight of my goods, by trusting Renkou with a lot^{of} w^h. He is to

repay me, in either native food or building materials, or, on his trade acct., if Mr. Erney is willing; viz: - 1 1/4 bag salt (39 bundles) \$5.00;
 25 large copper rods, 6.30; 40 small do, 5.00;
 28 large brass rods, 5.00; 40 small do, 4.00;
 4 kegs powder, 4.00; 16 yds (two dollar) cloth, 8.00;
 1 butt (20 yds) cloth, 5.00; 5 mirrors, 1.00; 3 ponales, .60
 2 files, .40; 6 kettles farina, 1.20, Total \$45.50. ^(trade price)

Took a parting view of Mt. Otomb; & started down river. Stopped at Eländé's village, & saw his father; & went with people of ~~our~~ village to examine a hill near by, for a ^{possible} mission-station; a fine site between the excellent riches of water, Abekâ, on the west, & Nyang on the east. Stopped at Aweronjâjo's to get my farina. Passed Imbwêke's place. Passed in safety Agâsinganga rapids, where, the crew said, ~~was~~ in the dry season, there was a hollow, into wh., if stones were thrown, there would come a sound like copper kettles, & the water would boil up. ^{island} Ah, at lower end of Imbwêke, & then crossed to the Fanwe side, to find a safe descent: succeeded safely. At the

spot, at Alombé, where the canoe had filled
in ascending the river, I went ashore with Naudo
& Skendige, & walked as far as Davis's & Sookie's.
They were absent. (Very cold, with sh. I had
risen yesterday, oppressed me. Was in a pro-
fuse perspiration. Fine view of the Kängwe
Mountain.

Wed^d of Jan^y 25: Surprised, on rising, to find
Dore & Sookie had come, during the night.
When I left, gave them part of my Yucca.
Came on to Spangaladi, & saw Ndama
there trading. Came on, & ate Nwoko at the
sandy beach where, on ascending, I had tried to
buy a teropira of an Okota. Stopped again to
drink at the spot where the crew had gathered
Kuda nuts. Met Xaseni with 5 or 6 heavy
-ity laden canoes, at the head of ~~the~~ Saange island.
He handed me a letter from my wife, of date
Jan^y 14: how glad I read it, & came on in
rejoicing. Xaseni warned us not to stop
at the Farun town near Talaguga rock.
Slept on Nijoli ^{island}; bats very very noisy.

174 Mamyaka's (January 1882)

Thursday Jan 26. The crew, warned by Laseui yesterday, feared to go to the Fa'ava side; so I had to pass by the points I wanted to inspect for a site; & we went to Mamyaka's lagoon, where Aniraba was trading, to inquire of the report of assault by Fa'ava on the Frenchman. It was true, but not of these Fa'ava. (Before doing this, I had inspected a hill on the Akeli side, opposite Nijoli, at a deserted Akeli village, Matâkâ. Mamyaka's is called Maberakê-maloba. Had a talk, through Aniraba, with the Fa'ava, who wanted to compel me to live with them, at their place. Stayed to eat. Killed, for the crew, the goat Renkomba had given me. Was much provoked at their slowness in cooking. In afternoon, went up river with Aniraba, who pointed out several places, ^{for sites} but, I did not stop to look, until at "little" Talaguga, ^{rock} a good place. Went on to Lebo, ^{rock} not a good place. Slept at Nijoli; felt sick from the cold I had taken. The French house at Nijoli was plundered, by Njâpâ-damba's people, of its

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flag & part of its rafting.

Friday, Jan'y 27th. Examined, at once, a hill of
poor Nijoli, on N.B. A fine site for landing,
water, & ascent, but slightly objectionable because
the hill was only a ridge & not much width for
building a house, but I liked it. Next, stopped
at a place with good water, & built a Fair
town on S.B. Next, at good water, at Tala
yuga rock. Next, at just above Nyare's
town. Just as good as at Nijoli site, except
that the ascent was not so good, but the hill
top wider for a site for house. Stopped to
see Nyare. Examined another place.
At Manyake's, a long talk about the site.
Made medicine for his sore toe. Held
evening prayers, & as the crew did not
want to stay there, yielded to their wish
to cross the river, to an ulako, & then,
yielded to their wish to go on down to
O'Keefe beach. Did so, at night; but, warned
with the long pull, & suspecting them of
deceit & intention to go to Olimba's,
ordered suddenly a stop in the forest, & a

little creek, wh. proved a good relato; but, a heavy rain came on. We were much displeas'd with all the company, excepting Ogula for their murmuring during the day.

Sat. Jan'y 28th. Rose wet & stiff, but had managed, with my coat, to keep my breast warm. Some Fairer fishermen passed early in a canoe.

Stopped at Olimbo's trading-place, to speak about his getting me thatch & bamboo, at \$1.00 per 50 of each, counting two x two. I gave him goods, on trust, as follows:-

cloth 3.50; cloth 2.00; 5 knives & 5 jaks 2.00; 1 keg powder 1.00; 2 1/2 lbs soap 1.00; 5 heads tob. 1.00; 4 butcher knives .80; 1 razor .20; 3 mirrors .60; 2 caps .40; making a total of \$12.50 in trade. I

did not promise exactly a how much I will give him, but expect to pay him not less than \$3.00, ^{as a present}. I asked him tentatively, & he suggested a white shirt & felt hat. Came on down, without incident, to the sand-bar

opposite Ere-volo, & dried my clothing, & ate there. Amusing division of my old cotton umbrella, wh. had gone to pieces (last night)

by the crew. Stopped to rest my eyes from
the sun, at Akatijaniw. While sitting at
his landing, a strange upheaval of the
water in the cove near by, probably caused
by a manatus or other creature. Some of
the heathen said it was an omburisi.

A song by the crew with a pretty melody,
each verse being improvised on the 5th line.
e.g. "Akile": "Famun", Kangu, &c, &c.

(Solo). Akile; akinda mo yavi.

(Chorus, responded) Akinda mo yavi.

(Full Chorus, melody) Ayi ya, 'kinda mo yavi,
Ayi ya, 'kinda mo yavi.

(rapid Recitation) Azwi na manji fa e myagagi ^{vava}
Ayi ya, 'kinda mo yavi.

Came on rapidly, urged by clouds gathering. Passed
by the crew's fear of Njagu-dumba, & the Akile^{people}
in mid stream. Saluted at Gore island; where
we heard there was no cause for fear of the
Batile. To Mr Erney; where I much regretted
& blamed myself for allowing the crew's fear
to prevent my stopping at Njagu-dumba.

(January 1882) Täyngö.

Sabbath Jan'y 29: Rested at Mr. Erväs, & had meeting, in the morning. A little tornado, in the afternoon. Some Finns came to see me, in the evening.

Monday 30: Stalked down river; passing Adälinatärpä, heard ~~of~~ the engineer of the "Höfvinger" was dead. Welcomed, on approach, by Täyngö, with bells, & shouts of no little joy, & Mrs Reading on the pack, Mrs Nassan at the landing, for the "Little Howard", & knew ^{therefore} Mr. Robinson had come. The boys who had come from Dr. Bachler's rebellions. Play of the arrival of the goods from Angäla. Letters arrived from America: Cousin Lotte Nassan, of date Oct. 10¹⁸⁸¹; Mrs. E. W. Crane, Oct 17¹⁸⁸¹; Rev. J. S. Malone Oct. 17¹⁸⁸¹; Rev Dr. Gasman Oct 17¹⁸⁸¹; & also Oct 25¹⁸⁸¹ & note from Mrs. Ozanne. Also, 2 letters from Rengö, & each from Mr Decker, Mr East, Mr Walker, Mr Campbell, & Jerry Harrington. Mrs Nassan had a full supply of letters also.

Tuesday Jan 31: Heard that the canoe I came in from Okola ^(Mr. Reading's) was stolen last night. As he had some of my crew; but Mr. Reading suspected the Fauna.

Wed. Feb. 1: The "Impoverished" had been heard from her grand^{er} ^{in the distance} & had come down the river, & sent word that letters wd be taken tomorrow. Felt very ^{ill}, from a cold, & cd. not write in afternoon; wrote ^{the bill} someing. Mr. Reading had been up ^{to day} to consult about Kängur of-
fairs.

Thursday 2: Looking after Mr. Robinson after the ^{and eaten} posts to be removed, from the ch. & this dwelling house. Have taken into my pay here, as cook, Agam; & partly Mr. Awa; & Loda (Mr. Robinson's boy) assist also at table; & Skendage & Akenbin are in my employ, for up-
river.

Friday 3: At work with Mr. Robinson, ^{I had met on the river} at the posts. Heard that the ~~canoe~~

On the 9th, I escorted Mrs Nassau over to Mrs Reading's, for her to see about a musquito-net, for Mr Robinson; I returned to the Hill & got ready for the journey ^{up river}. On the 10th,

sent Famur palaver, & the canoe was

Went on to On-pno-nyansi, where I hoped to get young men; but failed, & went on to Cranga, incident of Pe-din-gau's bygone. On the night air "miegâ nywani sube", the name of Keey. Pleasant welcome by 5 younger boys, Ktiissami. At night, engaged 3 men. Otâmbi, Mientyewa, & Ro-

On the 4th, started back up river. At a Wambâlij village. Pulled on to Khywanzewa, at night. Engaged Ke-tambî, & Kyanbortyia. On the 5th, was awaked by report of a gun across river; & soon after, a wild pig was brought to the village, some words were offered me, but I refused, for Patkats to try. Kenta's deaf-mute account of his affliction, & his anger at the information that there were many deaf-mutes in the world.

On the 6th, came on to near Kevgê river, bought wild-ox meat. At Kângwe, they were surprised at my quick return. Getting things ready for joining up river tomorrow.

on, I invited them to come & work tomorrow; they
were glad, but I am still suspicious of
these people. A sharp shower of rain in the
the afternoon.

Tuesday 14th, Two Farmers from Nyare's farm,
came to work at clearing the premises; their
large ideas of wages for labor. Villagers from
Nyare's; asking Farmers words; bought a
native butcher knife; bought mushrooms;
Showers of rain during the day. The tent

and many things in it camp with the rain,
& the absence of fresh air. Numbers of young
women & girls visiting. Bought honey and
bush-rope, visitors from Mungahara. A
conclusion of the household about doing away
with native customs.

Wed 15th Rose at 6. Most of the company
were slow to get up. The 2 Fairwe
yesterday came, & wanted for their 1 day's
the dollar of cloth I had provided for 10
days' work; after much talk, one accepted
a red cap, as his one day's pay, & left.
But the other refused to take less than a
cloth, & as I would not give it, he left, to
take an ivory palace in his town (Nyasa).

Mungahara came, with some of his people,
& we talked about this site, & after much
talking, he assented & said: "I'd like here rather
than near him; & points of Broadway were
mentioned, - & 2 pointed out. I gave him a
hatchet, & promised him a gun & other things
when the deed of the land shall be signed. A
heavy wind & rain at 11 A.M. A curtain

and without intermission for several hours. Men started to get to work in the afternoon. The troublesome Famine of the morning came, & agreed to work 6 days for a dollar. Bogart's set up stoves for a 10 p.m. hut.

Thursday 16: A clear bright day; it cheered our spirits. Put out the Jarina today; it was mostly in perfect condition. Mungwa sent to ask for some powder. Bought another onzel knife for iron pot. 40; Bought Kudde nuts, - muskrans, - chibo meat, &

Nyari's wife came to see me with a gift, of sugar-cane & plantain; - but, when she left, she asked for a gift in return, & I gave her back the sugar-cane. People in Nyari's town talking palaver about an ivory. A beautiful light on the opposite bank of river, under the setting sun.

Friday 17: The 2 Famine of Wed. & came in work for 1 dollar a week. Went, with 6 of the company, to Njwirinjwinda's for ~~the~~ & ~~beaver~~. Stopped at Nyari's village, to ask to buy plantain. Got 150

thatch - 15 bamboo (in afternoon, Olimbo came
w/ 10 more thatch.) Waited till noon for
the Gaim planlain; they did not come.
Leaving that in Olimbo's hands. Very hot
day: got headache. At the ^{man's} house, a knowledge,
was being turned; bamboo: tie it down.
Maid, I had to check temper. Francisco,
a Gove, stopped on his way down river, & I
got a letter for Cleary. Ate heartily supper.
Sat March 18th

Irregular cloud & sun-shine. River rising rap-
idly. Rentambi, intolerably lazy, sent him to sit
down in his home. At noon, he was vexed, & wth not
come for his food, & did not work in the after-
noon, so I gave him no food in the evening.
About 7 P.M., a canoe was heard going by;
called to it, & "Joseph", formerly ~~at~~ the Customs
office at Angala, stopped & took a letter for
me to Mrs. Menden, having notes for Miss Curran,
Miss Hally Todd, & Mrs. Foster. Rain at night.
Sabbath 19th

A clear day: & quiet. During morning ser-
vice, several "boys came" from Nydia's house.

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to sell potatoes; they stayed till after & I tried
to teach them the Lord's Prayer. Arrived at
Akendoug during the day. In the afternoon,
the boys came again & I tried to read the
Catechism to them. They, & a woman, came
a third time, in the afternoon. Sang many
hymns, & at dusk walked ^{the hill higher} up to the
proposed site of the house I expect to
build during the next months. Talked to
Ogula about Ventard's misdoings. The
river still rapidly rising, & the Rock
almost covered.

Monday March 20th. Wake feeling not very well,
awakened with anxiety. The 2 Famen came
to work, bringing a third Njēñē, to work
6 days for a dollar. Went into the woods
twice to different men, to stop their cutting
on these premises. Two Famen stayed about
a good while, disputing with others.
The men found some wild honey, & took
the small "Wetwido" case. A clear day.
Galun canoe, at noon, passed & stopped
singing out from the "Impongi" & "Pévee" had come.

Tuesday March 21: Busy all day at the house, water etc. Manuaga returned from up river about noon. The 3 Famine working better. Used up the little bamboo I had, & had to stop building. The men tried to keep a bush-rot of the Famine. The river, wh. had fallen a little yesterday, is again rising.

Wed. 22: Heavy rain last night. Clear morning. Agamboutyira & Rogombe with slight pains, pretending to be ^{too} sick to work. After dinner, went with Agula & Akenduge, to look over an outline for the premises. On the way, was seized with purging & vomiting & cramps in the stomach. Suppose it was due to the poison tin in cranberries. Finally reached Agamboutyira. He & his people welcomed me. Came back & lay down, & ate no supper. At noon, the

causes of Monday returned from Okota, & stopped to take letters to Mrs. Mason, with notes for Mr. Ozanne, Mr. Robinson, & Mr. Gault.

Thursday March 23rd. Did not feel vigorous, no pain, but weak from yesterday. Fairly visitors. I am glad to see that the Fairies are beginning to learn to walk by the week; also that bush-ropes will be gotten in sufficient suppl. Went, in afternoon, to view the premises in the rear of the proposed upper house. Began to clear the site for the house. Felt weak, & anxious what to do about getting more help from Galwa.

Friday, 24th. About 10. A. M., Mawaga came with Kimba & Adongo, & Nyare also came. Had a talk about the purchase of the premises, & paid Mawaga \$9. Am to pay Nyare to-morrow. Paid Adobongon \$6 days work, & 1 dollar of cloth. Paid Adonabata 1 dollar for bush-ropes. Sent Nyare toward camp & 4 of people to Nzirinjandais town, for lumber.

Saturday March 25th. Busy at the Water side house
In afternoon, sent for Nyare, who came with
his people, & I gave him a gun, in addition
to the other things of yesterday, & he was satisfied
being the Waidhuta rifle, to let them see it
wonder. Francis, the Goree, came ^{from dam river} but
I bought me nothing, not even a leise from
Langur. Feel disappointed.

Sabbath 26th. A clear bright pleasant day. One
Famine at morning service. He said that the Bakile
threatened quarrel with them, because of their having
sold some sweet potatoes from the deserted Akile
gardens. Read a song. No noise of cutting
in the forest, to disturb me. Heavy thunder &
signs of rain, wh. did not come till evening.
The Rock, wh. was again uncovered in the morning,
almost covered by rising water in the evening.

Monday 27th. Loring & Charney, most of
the men clearing at the "half-way" house.
Had Ogula cut down several large trees.
Mangage came with Adong, gave me a
good & played a long while; incident of the
mistake ~~at~~ about paying a ~~keeper~~ for

one bush-ape ~~that~~ belonged to another man.
Regatta, in the evening, receiving a gift of
one of Nyau's people, under a mistake
~~that~~ he had been asking me for a gift
just after he had made me his present.

Tuesday, March 28th. Letter from my wife to-day!
Went out this morning, with half of the men, &
at Nyau's town, called him to come & see where
the line sh^d. go of premises: there was some
misunderstanding about the cassava & plantains
who were going on the ground I had bought.
Ogula getting sticks for windows & door-frames. Three
others clearing the path back of the premises.
The boy who gave me some wild fruits
last evening, & whom I had told to get
me mushrooms to-day, brought & gave me
some this evening. Sitting under the trees
in the moonlight. The setting sun had
been fire in its shadows across the river.
Wed. 29th. With Ogula, cutting door-frames all
morning. Went out in afternoon to see how
the men were cutting the ^{boundary} path. Very heavy
rain & wind at night.

Thursday March 30, Sun clear & a drying wind blowing. My people slow to come to prayers. Just after prayers, Agamboutyia, profusely sick, for the entire company, complained of being sick, & that I compelled them to rest, & they all wanted to rest. All the others, except Rogombe, disclaimed, & said he was not their spokesman. This left only 2 complaints, & the rest rebuked them. Drying fabrics, & removing ^{from the tent} to the "waterside" house. After dinner, sent Ogula, & Kevulaga, Akambie, & Olambi to Manyagai, ^{to} & Lumbis for plantains. Spent the afternoon in arranging my boxes or fixing up the house. A fine bright day. Beautiful light of setting sun, on the other side. Scorpions are probably numerous & large here. The 4 came back, at night, with several plantains, & in good spirits.

Friday 31. Rose with a sick-headache. Had slept in the water-side house for the first night. Did not do much all day. Had a large tree cut down on the island, ^{liberty} for a bridge, but opening it was just across the channel.

... Bought a good deal of bush-
rope. Rogombi again sailing. Much
disappointed ~~that~~ Remkombi did not
arrive to-day as I had expected, from
Mpenbipolo's statement last Tuesday, ~~that~~
he w^d have been ~~here~~ ^{here} yesterday. Am
much disappointed, for my letter &c have
been here a week ago. Mourning is
going on in Nyare's town.

Sat. 7. April 11. Akambie, & Mwenyuz ^{at}
cutting the large copal tree. Adongo ^{to interpret} came
for the talk with Nyare, but Nyare was
not at home. Agorijo came for more tools
for thatch, - small wedges of Akile, - the poor
file. They left. Adongo's news about the
Fainan who was shot by mistake. Nyare
came to see me, with a gift of plantain, w^d.
Heard to be a sale. Tied up a letter bag's
some by. Diner. Down came a father ^{with}
his little child, with some fish. Down, a
Mpongma trader, from the town of the shot
Fainan; dreadful surgery. Bush-rope bought
with soap. The copal ^{tree} cut down. The little

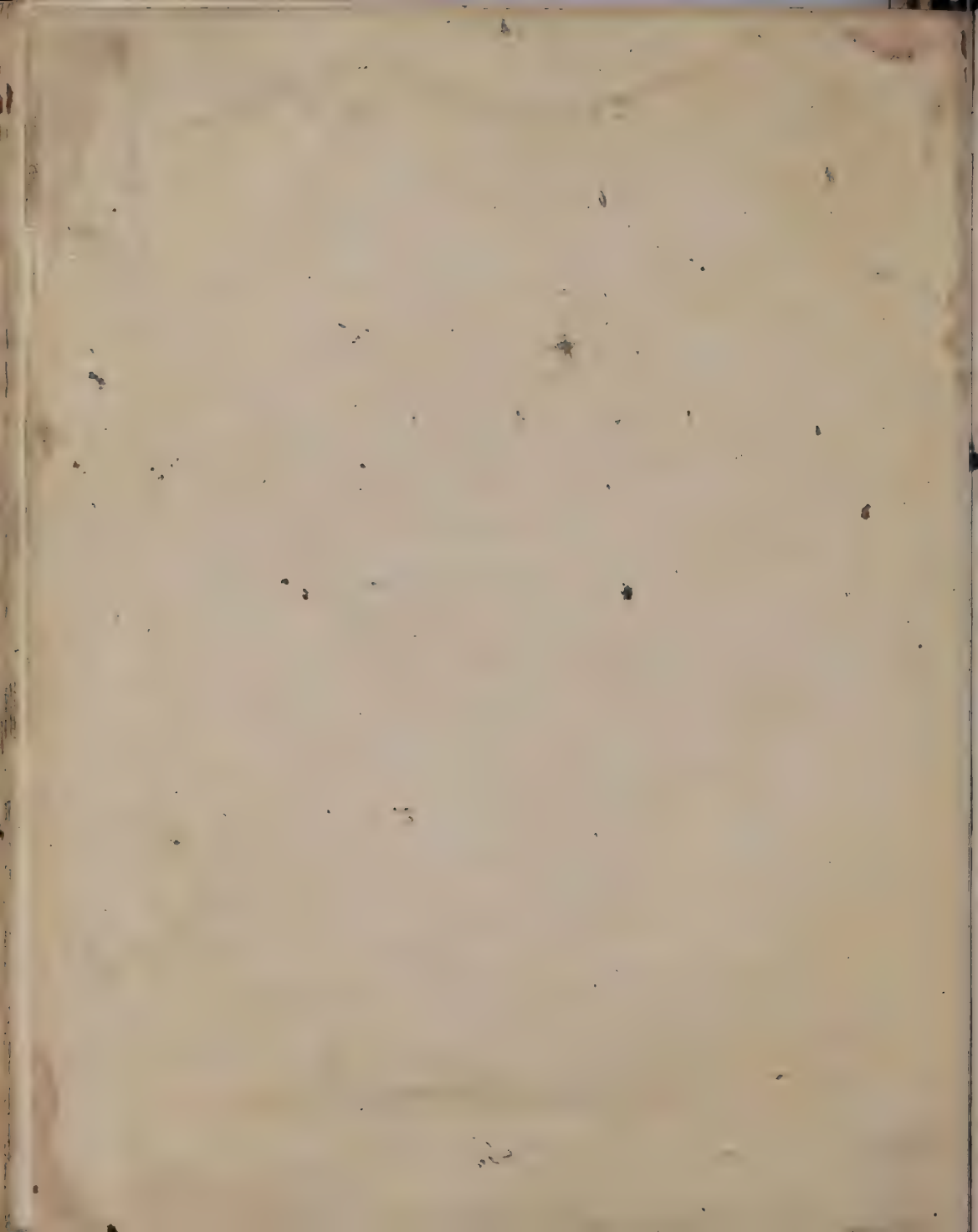
flying squirrel *ngunye*: green-copal. Ny
 & his wife Nyarubati had come about
 about ~~with~~ ^{with} ~~young~~ ^{young}
 noon, but I told them to come on Monday
 morning, when Adongo wd. be here. The
 clearing at the "half-way" house ^{on the hill-side} almost
 ready for marking out. Beautiful moon
 light. Singing in the shadows: clouds
 came & rain. Disheartened at the non
 arrival of RentKombe.

Sabbath April 2: Very heavy rain last night,
 it rained in over my earth floor. Loud roar-
 ing of the swollen brook. Kou Kote. A
 showery day, very much like American
 April showers. Otambi came to pay
 a lesson; for, he had forgotten even his
 letters. Amusing, how the chickens come to pay

Monday 3: Two canoes, Akingâ & Ntyembâ,
 came last evening, from Okta, with note from
 Lasani, & I sent letters to Kângon. Rainy evening.
 Adongo came to airport: Nyare came, late, in
 afternoon, but was unwilling to remove the plants
 from the pond I bought of him. Beautiful sun-set.
 Anxious for the arrival of RentKombe.

Tuesday April 4th. Showery morning. In afternoon, sent the Kongongo, to get logs for door & window frames. The 2 at the great tree finished, & it fell with a great crash. Bought a ntori & a ntamboni at a high price for the workmen. Bay was shot in his skull, in the crew of Auzila-Kukulau & 3 other canoes; quite an excitement at their arrival. Sent letter to Mr. Patten. Hare, the Jew, sent by Renkambi, - Renardo, - Francis, Josef, the young Calua, - the 2 Inengas, & now have 4 Europeans. Saw, in their company, my young Okota friend Etandi. Ayambu-utjua wanting to desert.
