

Foreword

In its very first year as a separate agency, in 1913, the Department of Commerce issued a directory of the national associations which businessmen themselves had set up to be the centers of their cooperative activities. Such directories have been issued every few years since.

This directory supplements the basic directory of 1949, *National Associations of the United States*, now out of print. A new basic directory is in preparation.

This directory was prepared by Jay Judkins, Chief of the Trade Association Division, with the assistance of Arthur L. Foulger under the direction of John C. Green, Director, Office of Technical Services. Aid of various kinds was furnished by the American Society of Association Executives, Chamber of Commerce of the United States, National Association of Manufacturers, National Academy of Sciences--National Research Council, and other leading centers of information.

Introduction

Some 4,700,000 business enterprises in the United States provide efficient services to the Nation's population of 180,000,000 persons and a livelihood for almost 50,000,000 employees and proprietors.

Decades ago, agriculture was the foremost source of employment. Today, business establishments provide the jobs of some 70 percent of the Nation's employed labor force. The remaining 30 percent are in agriculture, government, household service, and all other occupations.

For mutual-aid purposes, a large proportion of the owners of these 4,700,000 factories, stores, and other business units are members of one or more national or local nonprofit organizations of employers. Typical larger ones, having members throughout the United States, are the American Bankers Association, with headquarters in New York, Automobile Manufacturers Association, Detroit, National Association of Home Builders, Washington, National Association of Retail Grocers, Chicago.

Many types of cooperative services can be carried on by such associations: a number of these are in such areas as technical and market research, sales promotion, employee training, and government and labor relations.

The 2,000 National Associations

Listed in this directory are more than 2,000 national associations of business firms, with name, address, chief executive, year formed, and approximate number of members and size of staff.

Some 1,800 of the 2,000 national organizations are trade associations—that is, groups of competing firms in one field of business. Examples of the other 200 organizations, composed of noncompeting business firms or executives, are the American Arbitration Association, American Standards Association, Chamber of Commerce of the United States, National Bureau of Economic Research, National Industrial Conference Board, National Office Management Association, National Safety Council, National Association of Manufacturers, National Sales Executives, Inc.

1,000 Associations of Manufacturers

Of the 2,000 associations of businessmen, almost 1,000 are primarily of manufacturers, over 300 are of distributors, and most of the remainder are of firms in such other fields of business as banking, construction, insurance, transportation, and the service trades.

More than 300 of the 2,000 associations are composed of firms which have a special interest in

international trade and affairs. Some associations have members in Canada, Mexico, Europe, and other areas.

18,000 National and Local Organizations

A large share of the varied cooperative efforts of American businessmen to constantly improve their services to the public are carried on through 18,000 national and local organizations which they have established for mutual-aid purposes: 13,000 trade associations (almost 2,000 national, 3,000 state or regional, and 8,000 local) and 5,000 local chambers of commerce and other community development agencies.

Importance of Associations in the National Economy

President Dwight D. Eisenhower has referred to the importance of associations in these words: "By strengthening management and encouraging competition, our American trade and professional associations contribute much to the national economy."

Many years ago the importance of trade associations to the Nation was stressed by Herbert Hoover, then Secretary of Commerce. He recognized their value as centers of democratic, mutual-aid techniques, and stated, "With wisdom and devotion, their voluntary forces can accomplish more for our country than any spread of the hand of Government." In the Introduction to *Trade Association Activities* a Department of Commerce publication of 1923, he emphasized their usefulness to smaller-size enterprises: "The problems of cooperative action are mainly the concern of smaller business The trade association as a facility for the promotion and self-regulation of industry and commerce has become, by reason of its scope and activity, an important American business institution."

Department of Commerce Directories

This directory is the sixteenth of a series which the Department of Commerce has published during the past 47 years. It is supplemental to the Department's last basic directory, *National Associations of the United States*, issued in 1950, and now out of print. It was composed largely of chapters on each major field of American industry: metals, chemicals, etc. Preceding a listing of the trade and professional associations in each field were summary text and statistics on the importance of each area to the Nation's economy. This format

will be followed in the next basic directory, which is now in preparation for later publication, but its coverage will be confined to those associations of direct interest to the business community.

Increase in Number of Associations

Trade associations have experienced an excellent growth in number, in usefulness, and in responsibilities. In 1910 there were approximately 250 of national importance. In 1920 there were 600; by 1940 the total was 1,100. In 1960 there are 1,800.

Two of the major reasons for this exceptional growth are (1) the introduction of countless new

products, based on technical research, which have resulted in the creation of hundreds of new industries; and (2) the increasing realization by businessmen of the practical value of cooperative work-together efforts, and that these are best carried on through permanently established associations.

In recent years, the number of business enterprises in the United States has averaged around 25 for each 1,000 of the population.

As shown below, the growth in number of national associations of businessmen over the past 20 years has markedly exceeded the rates of increase in number of business establishments and in the national population:

The 4,700,000 Business Firms in 1960

In membership campaigns, associations realize that the vast majority of business firms in the United States are of very small size. In hundreds of industries, an association can hardly expect to enroll all existing units in its membership. Most associations, however, strive to include at least three-fourths of the industry's volume, and as large a proportion of the units as reasonably possible.

Of all business enterprises in the United States in 1956, two fifths had no employees at all. Only one firm in twenty employed 20 or more. Less than 1 percent of all firms had 100 or more employees; however, these larger firms accounted for nearly three-fifths of all paid employment.

Although many of the no-employee business enterprises are not members of associations, it is probable that several million firms are affiliated with the 2,000 national and 11,000 local-area associations. The accompanying table shows a breakdown of these 13,000 associations by major fields of business.

During 1959-60, from 48 to 50 million persons were engaged in industry and business--manufacturing, distributing, and service. In round numbers, there are 5 million owners and partners of the 4.7 million business firms shown in the table, and some 44 million employees, including part-time family workers.

Manufacturing is first as to number of national associations and employees. With approximately 17 million employees and employers, it is the outstanding provider of jobs, with about 35 percent of the above almost 50 million total. Associations of manufacturers comprise almost one-half of the 2,000 national associations of businessmen.

On the other hand, retail trade is the outstanding segment as to number of business units, with over 2 million of the 4.7 million total. Its 4,600 nation-

al and local associations comprise over one-third of the 13,000 national and local trade associations throughout the United States. The relationship between the number of business units and associations for all other major fields of American business are shown in the accompanying table.

Association Management: A Growing Field of Employment

Employment opportunities in association management are rapidly increasing. Approximately 30,000 specialists in association services (executives and their assistants) are now employed by the 2,000 national associations of businessmen, not including those on the staffs of the thousands of affiliated local associations.

Several universities already have courses in this general field, and summer schools in 1960 for trade association and chamber of commerce executives were to be held on college campuses in New York, Michigan, North Carolina, Texas, Colorado, and California.

Definition of a Trade Association

A "trade association" may be defined as a non-profit, voluntary cooperative organization of business competitors, designed to assist its members and its industry in dealing with mutual business problems in such areas as accounting practices, business ethics, market and technical research, standardization, statistics, and trade promotion, as well as in relations with the industry's employees, government agencies, and the general public. (Note: A "bureau" usually handles only one aspect of business, such as credit or traffic.)

Despite the word "trade," such associations are in no way restricted to firms in the wholesale, retail, and service trades. They can be composed of manufacturers, contractors, transportation companies, banks, mining companies, or enterprises

in any other branch of American business. Another interesting example of terminology is found in the many different words used in trade association names, other than the word "association," such as:

- Board --National Board of Fire Underwriters
- Congress --National Congress of Petroleum Retailers
- Council --Airport Operators Council
- Federation--Advertising Federation of America
- Foundation--Milk Industry Foundation
- Institute --American Iron and Steel Institute
- League --U. S. Savings and Loan League
- Society --Society of the Plastics Industry.

Examples of Long Established, Larger Associations

A few national trade associations are more than 100 years old, employ staffs of 100 or more technical specialists and clerical assistants, and have over 50,000 members--with local-area affiliated associations in business centers throughout the United States. However, the majority have been formed within the past 30 years, employ staffs of four or fewer persons, and have fewer than 300 members (not including members of any affiliated locals). Examples of older or larger associations are listed below; five are in fields where heavy

capital investments are necessary, while three are in fields requiring less capital.

AIR TRANSPORT ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA, Washington, D. C.--ATA was formed in 1936 as the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce. About 50 airline companies are members; it has a staff of 150 persons. The aircraft used are produced by firms belonging to the AEROSPACE INDUSTRIES ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA, which has a staff of 80 persons. Many of its 130 member firms also produce rockets, missiles, and other "space age" vehicles. These two related industries (aircraft production and transportation) provide employment to about 900,000 workers.

AMERICAN IRON AND STEEL INSTITUTE, New York, N. Y.--AISI dates back over 100 years to the American Iron Association, formed in 1855. It has a staff of 90 persons. Its membership includes approximately 200 companies; also 2,500 executives of steel industry companies. The Nation's steel mills normally provide employment to over 600,000 factory workers.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF RETAIL GROCERS, Chicago, Ill.--NARGUS was formed in 1892. About 70,000 owners of 112,000 non-chain food stores are members. This association of smaller-business units has a headquarters staff of 30 persons, not including, of course, the staff employees of affiliated local associations in over 400 cities.

NARGUS provides its member stores and its locals with published "increased-efficiency" details on such food store problems as advertising layout for newspapers, delicatessen product sales promotion, employee training, "investment proficiency" analysis, meat and dairy merchandising, packaging, shoplifting deterrents, and store improvement costs. Among other associations of food retailers are the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FOOD CHAINS with a staff of 20 and a membership of 240 companies owning 13,000 larger stores and supermarkets; and the SUPERMARKET INSTITUTE with a staff of 30 and a membership of 700 companies owning 9,000 stores. Some larger food store owners belong to more than one of these three associations.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF REAL ESTATE BOARDS, Chicago, Ill.--Established in 1908, NAREB has 64,000 members, through 1,300 local associations of real estate brokers. Its staff totals almost 100 persons. Among other large associations in this general field is the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF HOME BUILDERS, with a staff of 120 persons. Although a comparatively new organization, formed in 1942, it has 41,000 members in 1960, through 380 local associations of residential contractors.

Thirty Fields of Trade Association Activities

Following are 15 typical major areas of activity of national associations:

1. Serving as the industry's center of information on current business facts and problems affecting employers, employees, and customers.
2. Frequent bulletins of general interest.
3. Conferences and conventions.
4. Close contact with trade and professional associations in related industries.
5. Government relations and legislative research.
6. Studies of trade practices, unfair competition, and business ethics (false advertising, defamation of competitors, etc.).
7. Public relations activities and building up of consumer good-will.
8. Sales promotion of the industry's products.
9. Labor relations in general.
10. Statistics. Original or republished, on current production, sales, etc. Also, economic planning, including long-range studies of possible future trends as to competition from other industries, raw material supplies, production and distribution improvements, etc.
11. Marketing or commercial research to find wider and more profitable markets.
12. Technical or industrial research to find new or improved products and manufacturing techniques.
13. Uniform cost accounting and industry surveys of costs of production and distribution.

14. Standardization, simplification, inspection, grading, and certification.

15. Commercial arbitration between members, or between members and customers.

Fifteen other areas of service, usually of less importance, are: Foreign trade promotion; legal advice on broad industrial problems; credit reporting; insurance studies; traffic problems; packaging and warehousing; patents, copyrights, trade marks, and design protection; field services; exhibitions of the industry's products; machinery and equipment exchanges; employment placement bureaus; engineering and inspection services; library, visual aid, etc., specialized services; cooperative buying and selling (some locals but few nationals are active in this field); cooperation with trade and professional associations in other countries.

Association Budgets and Expenditures

The cost of membership in national associations of manufacturers usually is about 1/10th of 1 percent of each firm's annual sales of the products covered by the association. In the case of national organizations of retailers, membership dues are often less than \$50 a year. An average of many typical expenditures of medium-size associations shows the following relationship between staff salaries and other association costs:

In round numbers, 50 of the 2,100 national organizations of businessmen listed in this Directory had an annual revenue in 1959 of from one to several million dollars. In such cases they were able to have from 100 to more than 500 staff employees. Examples of these larger associations are:

National Association of Manufacturers, with headquarters in New York City.

In many smaller national organizations, with limited budgets, the chief executive's annual salary is \$15,000 to \$20,000, as compared with \$40,000 or more for the largest ones. A minority of the 2,000 associations supplement their annual revenue from dues with income from selling advertising in some of their publications, or from management of the industry's trade show. (Federal tax exemption of nonprofit organizations is not lost if such non-dues receipts comprise only a minor part of annual income.)

Trade Association Publications Available to the Public

Most national associations receive many letters each day from nonmembers—students and other researchers, salesmen, consumers, government agencies, persons in foreign countries, and others. Naturally, many of the over 1,200 smallest-staffed associations (those with only one to four employees) are not financially able to provide detailed reports on their industries for distribution to the general public, yet each serves as best it can as a national center of information or guidance for its individual field of business.

Only a small percent of national associations prepare detailed annual reports for public distribution or issue trade journals or trade directories. All, however, distribute weekly or monthly reports of various kinds to their members, hold frequent conferences to analyze and act upon current problems of the industry, and are in constant contact with members through correspondence and by telephone.

Despite any budget and staff limitations, highly efficient services to their industries are provided by smaller national associations because of expert management and the aid of many specialized committees of members. Often there are active regional, State, and local associations whose research and other activities can be utilized by the national association of each industry.

International Cooperation Between Associations

Associations of businessmen are numerous and influential in industrial nations throughout the world. They are leaders in national endeavors to maintain high standards of living, and national prosperity with full employment. To an increasing degree, such organizations and the trade and professional associations of the United States are engaged in various kinds of cooperative programs to achieve their common goals of greater economic and social betterment.

Centers of Information for Associations of Businessmen

Seven centers of information for associations are, in order of year of organization: New York Chamber of Commerce (1768), National Association of Manufacturers (1895), American Chamber of Commerce Executives (1905), Chamber of Commerce of the U. S. (1912), U. S. Department of Commerce (1913), U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce (1915), and the American Society of Association Executives (1920).

The oldest of all organizations of businessmen is the 1768-formed New York Chamber of Commerce; many of its members have nation-wide and international interests. Most of the oldest trade associations were formed in the 1850-65 period in the brewing, cotton, paper, shipping, steel, and wool industries.

Notwithstanding their names, some of the seven centers below are active in several areas, such as trade associations, professional associations, and chambers of commerce. Summary data are presented; details will be sent by each, upon request:

AMERICAN SOCIETY OF ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVES, 2000 K St., NW., Washington 6, D. C.—ASAE has a membership of approximately 2,000 leading executives of trade and professional associations. Regional chapters, in about 25 cities, hold monthly meetings to discuss current association management problems. ASAE publishes a quarterly journal, which has included hundreds of excellent articles on association organization, financing, and current activities problems; reprints of these are often available at 25¢ each. It also has a monthly news bulletin, a *Here's How* series, and many committee reports.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, 14th and Constitution Ave., NW., Washington 25, D. C.—Associations work closely with such Bureaus and Offices in this Federal Government Department as Area Development, Business and Defense Services, Business Economics, Census, Coast and Geodetic, Distribution, Field Offices, Foreign Commerce, Industrial Mobilization, International Trade Fairs, Maritime, Patents, Public Roads, Standards, Technical Services, and the Weather Bureau. Associations and businessmen can contact the Department through any one of its Field Offices, located in 33 key cities in the United States. Also, some 650 chambers of commerce and associations serve as official Cooperative Offices. Since 1913, surveys of associations have been made by the Trade Association Division, Office of Technical Services, which serves as the Federal Government center of information on most types of nonprofit organizations.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF THE U. S., 1615 H St., NW., Washington 6, D. C.—The Chamber is the Nation's largest association of businessmen, with a direct membership of 2,800 chambers of commerce, 700 trade and professional associa-

tions, and 23,000 companies. Among its departments are Agriculture, Association Service, Chamber of Commerce Service, Construction and Civic Development, Domestic Distribution, Education, Foreign Commerce, Institute, Insurance, International Relations, Labor Relations and Legal, Manufacture, National Defense, Natural Resources, Taxation and Finance, and Transport and Communication. There are departmental newsletters, the monthly *Nation's Business* (\$18.00 for 3 years), and other periodicals. Among 1958-60 books are *Association Labor Relations Desk Book* (\$12.00), *Association Management* (\$6.00), *Basic Operating Policies* (\$1.50), *Chamber of Commerce Management* (\$6.00), *Federal Tax Aspects of Association Activities* (\$4.50).

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF MANUFACTURERS, 2 E. 48th St., New York 17, N. Y.—NAM is the Nation's largest association of industrial interests with a membership of over 20,000 manufacturing companies; also 400 trade associations through its affiliate, the National Industrial Council (918 16th St., NW., Washington 6, D. C. NAM claims that its direct and indirect membership produces over 75 percent of the annual factory output of the United States. It issues a weekly *NAM News* and many other publications for its members. It is a leading center of information on industrial problems, international economics, labor relations, legislative research, taxation, and related subjects.

The following are entirely concerned with chamber of commerce matters:

AMERICAN CHAMBER OF COMMERCE EXECUTIVES, 1627 K St., NW., Washington 6, D. C.—ACCE has a 1960 membership of approximately 2,000 leading executives of chambers of commerce: organizations of persons interested in promoting the civic, commercial, and industrial welfare of a single community. It issues a quarterly journal, a monthly news bulletin, and frequent committee reports on local chamber problems.

NEW YORK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, 65 Liberty St., New York 5, N. Y.—It issues the only annual directory of chambers of commerce throughout the United States, covering almost 3,000 cities; 60 pages, \$1.00. Most of its members have nationwide interests and many of its activities pertain to national problems.

U. S. JUNIOR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, Boulder Park, Tulsa, Oklahoma.—USJCC has a membership of about 200,000 young men of 21 to 35 years of age. There are local chapters in some 3,800 communities, whose activities are devoted to aiding young men to become civic and business leaders. Each "Jaycee" local fosters Americanization programs, economic education, local social welfare, and allied interests. Among its publications are *Future: The Magazine for Young Men*, a monthly.

Key Word Index

This index is arranged for the convenience of those who seek to identify associations in any one product or service field.

Where necessary, the name of an association is transposed so that the business field covered appears as the first word. For example, "Coated Abrasives Manufacturers Institute" has been rearranged so that the key word "Abrasives" is first. This brings it together with three other associations in the same field, including the Grinding Wheel Institute.

When the name of the association is transposed, the first word in the name is written in capital letters: for example, Abrasives, AMERICAN Society for.

In each larger grouping the key words are listed to correspond with the sequence in the alphabetical directory section. The reader can thus obtain information on addresses and executives of all associations in any group by going through the Directory section in page order. For example, see the 31 associations listed under the key words "Advertisers" or "Advertising."

Affiliated with the more than 2,000 national associations of businessmen listed in this section are most of the some 16,000 local-area organizations mentioned in the Introduction.

The following information is presented on each association: name, address, year formed (under its present or former name), name and title of chief paid executive, and approximate size of staff and of membership; with special designations for associations of manufacturers and those of distributors. If the association name does not clearly indicate the field covered, explanatory notes are added (see ABRASIVE GRAIN ASSOCIATION).

The almost 1,000 national associations of manufacturers are designated by the letter "m" immediately following the name. The over 300 of distributors (wholesalers or retailers) are designated by the letter "d," including some of both manufacturers and distributors, designation by "m-d."

In many cases, associations in the distribution and service trades admit manufacturers as non-voting, associate members. Consequently, the sym-

bols are used merely for the purpose of general indication. Precise facts on types of members can be obtained from each association, or from the Trade Association Division in the Department of Commerce. The remaining 700 associations are not marked with symbols. These are in such areas as construction, finance, services, and others named in Table 1.

Appendix A is a listing of over 90 associations of engineers; such agencies are important factors in the technical research activities of trade associations.

Use of the Key Word Index: If the exact name of an association is not known to the reader, it can be readily located by using the Key Word Index. A number of associations have changed their names slightly since the 1956 Directory. For example, the National League of Insured Savings Associations was formerly the National Savings and Loan League, as stated in its listing. The word "Savings" in the Key Word Index guides the reader to the present name, where the old name is also given.

Appendix

National Societies of Engineers

Listed in this Appendix are about 90 of the national associations in the field of engineering and related technical research. In recent years, practically all of the 1,000 national associations of manufacturing companies named in this directory, plus many in other fields, have greatly accelerated their promotional services in encouraging research for new and improved products and processes. This normally results in expanded production and lowered prices for the consuming public. There are increasingly close ties between associations of businessmen and those of technical research experts.

The 90 societies in this appendix have a total membership of over 800,000 technical experts. According to a recent governmental study (Occupational Outlook Handbook), there are approximately 850,000 engineers in the United States, of whom almost three-fourths are employed in private industry.

In addition to research promotion, many national trade associations are also directly carrying on industrial research in their own laboratories, or in cooperation with Government research agencies

(such as the National Bureau of Standards), with commercial laboratories, universities, and such nonprofit, technical research institutes as the Armour Research Foundation, Battelle Memorial Institute, Franklin Institute, Mellon Institute, Midwest Research Institute, Southern Research Institute, Southwest Research Institute, and Stanford Research Institute.

In the main directory are several leading organizations in technical research which include both engineers, and companies or trade associations; examples are the American Standards Association, National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council.

Of the some 90 societies listed below, nearly 30 have headquarters in New York City, 15 are in Washington, D. C., and 12 are in Chicago. To facilitate the finding of associations of engineers and related professions in specialized fields, the names are listed with the "key word" first. For example, the Institute of the Aeronautical Sciences (with a membership of over 20,000 aircraft engineers and designers, and a staff of 60-70 persons), is presented as "Aeronautical Sciences, INSTITUTE of the."
