By chance, a volume of poems was in my hand; it was 'The Voices of the Night.' I opened it at 'The Footsteps of the Angels.' . . . The poem spoke to me like a human voice, and from that time I loved Longfellow, and wrote poetry—such as it is. . . . I am sure your life will be a pure and glorious one—even if it be short. . . 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
