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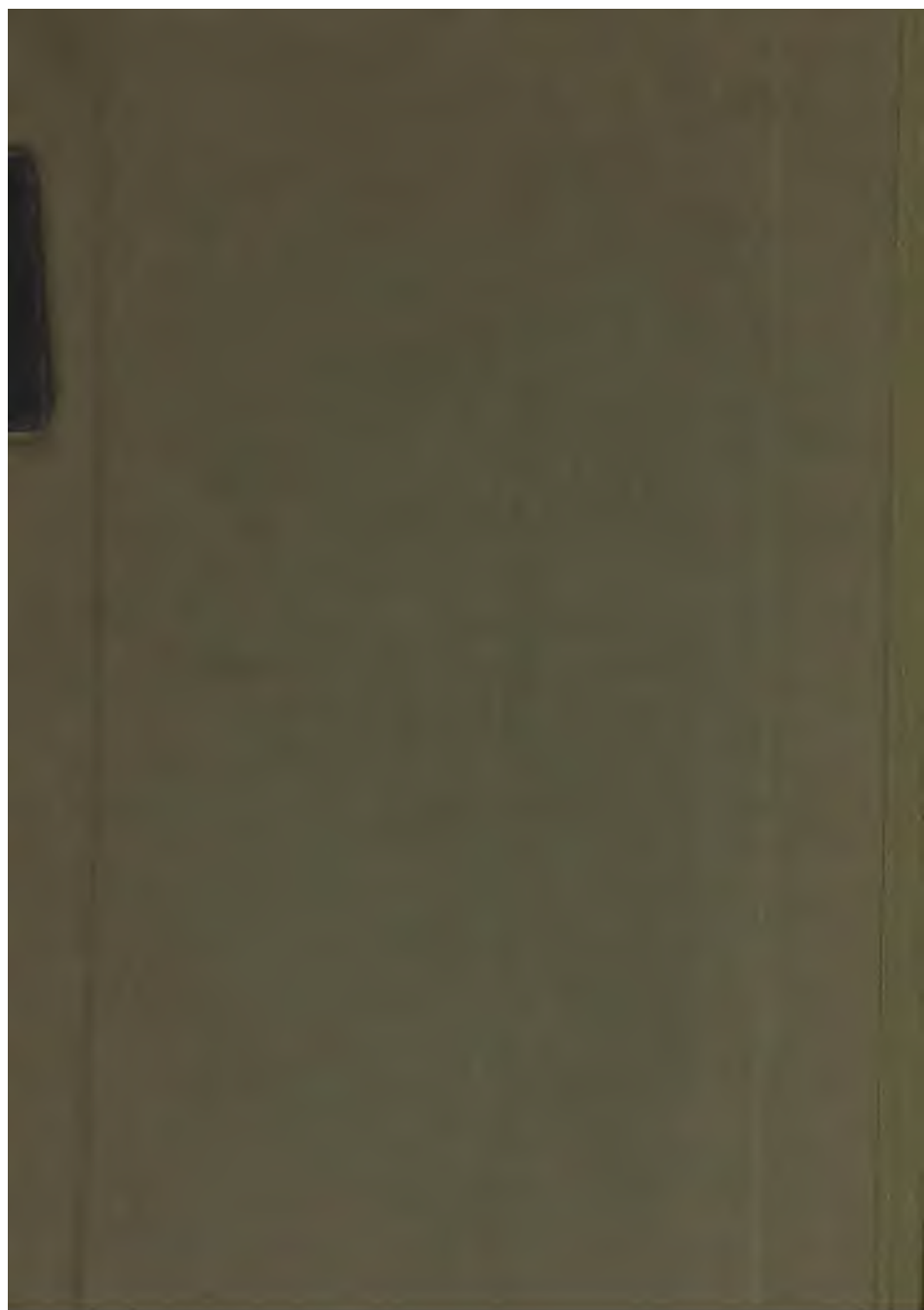

STREET COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE,
New York, July 6, 1860.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit the following summary of the general state of the business of this department for the quarter ending 30th June, 1860. During the quarter, requisitions have been drawn upon the Comptroller to the amount of four hundred and sixty-six thousand six hundred and one dollars and forty-six cents (\$466,601 46), of which three hundred and eighty-two thousand four hundred and fourteen dollars and forty-one cents (\$382,414 41) were for objects and purposes provided for by tax, and eighty-four thousand one hundred and eighty-seven dollars and five cents (\$84,187 05) were on trust account. The City Treasury will be re-imbursed for the latter by assessment upon the property benefited. For statement showing the amount of each appropriation for the year 1860, passed by the Common Council, and

amount of requisitions upon the Comptroller, drawn by the Street Commissioner on each appropriation and account, see Appendix marked A; and for full details as to the amount applied to each object and purpose, and for statement of assessment lists delivered to the Collector of Assessments; amounts paid by that officer to the City Chamberlain, and amount returned to the Clerk of Ar-rears, see Appendix marked B.

In the Bureau of Street Improvements, there have been expended eighty-eight thousand two hundred and thirty-one dollars and ninety-four cents (\$88,231 94). In the Bureau of Wharves, forty-five thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven dollars and forty-nine cents (\$45,787 49). In the Bureau of Roads, twenty-seven thousand three hundred and thirty-five dollars (\$27,335). In the Bureau of Lands and Places, eleven thousand five hundred and forty-four dollars and sixty-five cents (\$11,544 65.) In the Bureau of Lamps and Gas, one hundred and five thousand nine hundred and fifty-six dollars and forty-two cents (\$105,956 42). In the Bureau of Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, twenty-one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight dollars and sixty-six cents (\$21,848 66). In the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, by the Superintendent, ninety-three thousand three hundred dollars and six cents (\$93,300 06); by the Deputy Superintendent, fifty-six thousand three hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$56,392 25). On the 1st of April, 1860, there remained in the hands of the Collector of Assessments one hundred and seventy-nine thousand two hundred and eighty-three dollars and forty-six cents (\$179,283 46). And during the quarter there have been transmitted to him for collection, lists amounting to ninety thousand two hundred and one dollars and twenty-three cents (\$90,201 23). During the quarter he has paid to the City Cham-

berlain, A. V. Stout, forty thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars and eight cents (\$40,675 08); N. C. Platt, thirty-eight thousand three hundred and thirty-four dollars and forty-nine cents (\$38,334 49).

Returned to the Bureau of Arrears, thirty-six thousand two hundred and forty-one dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$36,241 99); leaving on the 1st inst. a balance of uncollected assessments of one hundred and fifty-four thousand nine hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty cents (\$154,984 20). For details of the business of each Bureau of the Department, your Honorable Bodies are respectfully referred to the reports of Superintendents transmitted herewith. By the report of the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, it appears that a large amount of work, not included in the estimate for the year 1860, made by that officer in the fall of 1859, has been ordered by the Common Council. An additional appropriation will be required to enable me to carry into effect the resolutions ordering work, and to keep the public buildings in repair during the balance of the year; I have taken occasion to call your attention to this subject, more particularly in special communication to your Honorable Bodies under this date. The appropriation for "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices," and "For Supplies for Police Department," are nearly exhausted. I judge, however, that the demands upon those appropriations will be but slight during the remainder of the year, and hope to make them suffice. In conclusion, permit me to ask the attention of your Honorable Bodies to the recommendations made to you from time to time, during the past two years, by the Street Commissioner, some of which have not been acted upon. I had the honor of transmitting a list of them in my last quarterly report.

Street Commissioner:

SIR:—I herewith transmit the quarterly report, for quarter ending June 30, 1860, showing the expenditures and vouchers drawn for work done under the supervision of this Bureau; also, the number of contracts made, contracts completed, bids opened, and contracts awarded and awaiting confirmation, during the quarter.

Since my last quarterly report the following old contracts have been re-advertised for re-letting:

Sixty-second street, from the Eighth to the Ninth avenue, regulating.

Fifty-fifth street, from the Sixth to the Seventh avenue, regulating.

Forty-fourth street, from the First to the Third avenue, regulating.

Surveys have been ordered for the purpose of re-letting the following contracts, viz:

Fifty-fifth street, from the Third to the Fifth, and from the Seventh to the Eighth avenues.

Fifty-sixth street, from the Fourth to the Fifth avenue.

It is highly important that some action be taken by the Common Council, in the matter of regulating Fifty-second street, from the Fourth avenue to the East river, and

Fifty-first street, between the Sixth and Eighth avenues. Contracts were made for regulating these last named streets, and the larger portion of the work done, but in consequence of the illegality of the ordinances, (the same having been passed in different years by the respective Boards of Common Council,) the work has been abandoned.

The draft of new ordinances was submitted to the Common Council, with a communication, for their action, but none has been taken.

These streets are in a portion of the city which is being rapidly built up with fine dwellings, and it is highly necessary that some immediate action be taken toward their completion, as they are at present in a dilapidated and unfinished condition, and no action can be taken by the department toward their completion, until such time as the Common Council shall pass new ordinances for that purpose.

It is, also, important that some measures be taken, by the Common Council, toward opening all streets and parts of streets not now opened, above Fifty-seventh street, which street is the northerly limit of the streets opened in whole; although parts of streets have been opened, from time to time, north of that point.

If some action is not taken in the matter of opening and regulating the streets north of Fifty-seventh street, the progress of improvement must be impeded. All the streets are regulated, or under contract to be regulated, south of, and including Fifty-seventh street, with some few unimportant exceptions.

For streets not opened, I refer to lists heretofore transmitted.

Ordinances are frequently passed for regulating and grading streets, under the supposition that the same have been opened or ceded, and for want of jurisdiction the work can not be placed under contract, until such time as the streets are legally opened or ceded.

I would, also, call attention to repeated communications heretofore made in the matter of laying out an exterior street along the Harbor Commissioners' exterior water line, and altering and changing the grades of the adjacent streets and avenues, to conform to the same, which would probably require the action of the next Legislature, as it would be next to impossible to comply with the present existing law in regard to altering and changing the grades. If some action is not taken in the matter, it will be impossible to regulate the streets and avenues, with the present grades along the water fronts, so as to be of any commercial utility whatever.

I would, also, call attention to the several communications heretofore made, in former reports, in regard to the necessity of the speedy confirmation of awards of contracts, and the necessity of having ordinances full and explicit, so as to embrace all the work intended to be done under them.

Last year the experiment was made of placing street signs in the corner lamps, which appears to have given general satisfaction.

On examination I find that about 450 signs have been lost, displaced or broken, in seven months; and frequently the signs have been changed, that is, the "streets" have been placed on the "avenues," and the "avenues" where

the "streets" should be; this displacement was mostly done by the lamp-lighters. On complaint being made to the presidents of the gas companies, they promised to do what they could towards rectifying the evil, which has, in some measure, been remedied, but not fully.

The whole cost of placing the signs in the lamps was \$1,500, and I see no reason why it should require one-third of the amount of the first cost, yearly, to replace and keep them in repair.

I have endeavored to ascertain, in what part or portion of the city, the greatest damage is done, and find that the greatest destruction is in the suburbs.

A communication was made, on the 18th of April last, recommending that an ordinance be passed, fixing a small penalty on all persons destroying, displacing or otherwise injuring the said street signs. I now reiterate that recommendation.

With such an ordinance and the assistance of the police, I have no doubt but that there would be a great diminution in the number of signs broken or taken away, and consequently a considerable saving in expense to the city, as well as a convenience to the public.

In conclusion, I would, also, call attention to the various communications heretofore made, in regard to street numbers, and the necessity of some action being taken in the matter by the Common Council.

SIR:—In compliance with your instructions contained in your letter of the 21st ult., calling for a report of the business done in this Bureau, for the second quarter of the present year, I respectfully transmit to you the following report:

There are at present employed in this Bureau, one hundred and seven men as laborers, two general foremen, four men as foremen, twenty-one horses and carts, and six watering carts.

There has been expended in this Bureau during the quarter, for which vouchers have been rendered, and chargeable to the appropriation of roads and avenues, the sum of twenty-three thousand five hundred and fifty-seven dollars, and twenty-three cents, (\$23,557 23), one thousand five hundred and twenty-three dollars, and fifty-five cents, (\$1,523 55,) of which was expended for labor and materials on the Kingsbridge road.

The expenditures have been as follows:

On Manhattan street, which is now being repaired and Macadamized as directed by the Common Council per resolution, and approved by his Honor the Mayor, on the 14th of November, 1859, the work on which is now progressing rapidly towards completion, there has been expended, for which vouchers have been rendered, the sum

of two thousand and nineteen dollars, and nineteen cents, (\$2,019 19), for labor; five hundred and twenty-four dollars and seventy-cents (\$524 70), for material; making a sum total of two thousand five hundred and forty-three dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$2, 543 87).

On Bloomingdale road, there has been expended, the sum of three thousand nine hundred and twenty-one dollars and ten cents, (\$3,921 10.) for labor; one thousand five hundred and ten dollars and fifty-nine cents, (\$1,510 59,) for material.

On the Third avenue, there has been expended the sum of four thousand seven hundred and seventy-four dollars and seventy cents, (\$4,774 70), for labor; three hundred and eighteen dollars and forty-two cents, (\$318 42), for material, making a sum total of five thousand and ninety-three dollars and twelve cents, (\$5,093 12.)

On the Second avenue, the contract with John Kinsley, for Macadamizing the same is now progressing more rapidly, than at the date of my last quarterly report.

By last report of Inspectors, the Contractor has thirty-seven men and three horses and carts, employed, and the work completed from Sixty-first to Eighty-ninth street.

There has been expended on account of this contract, the sum of two thousand five hundred and ninety-eight dollars and fifty-six cents, (\$2,598 56), to John Kinsley on account of work on contract; one hundred and sixty-two dollars (\$162 00) for inspectors wages; seven hundred and eight dollars and forty-nine cents, (\$708 49;) for labor, and three hundred and nine dollars and sixty cents, (\$309 60), for material, amounting to a sum total of three

As regards the general condition of the roads and avenues, it has been remarked by gentlemen who are in the habit of driving over the same, that they are now in a better condition than they ever have been, but a great deal of necessary work yet remains to be done, so as to place them in a condition to withstand the winter.

The limited appropriation of this Bureau for this year, fifty-thousand dollars, (\$50,000 00,) will seriously embarrass me in keeping the roads in proper order; for the sum of twenty-six thousand six hundred and two dollars and forty-four cents, (\$26,602 44,) has already been expended during the past half year, and with outstanding bills, for which vouchers have not as yet been rendered, will probably amount to the sum of thirty-thousand dollars, or over, leaving the small balance of twenty thousand dollars, for the remaining half year.

There will be required to be expended during this year, for Macadamizing on Bloomingdale road, from One hundred and first street, to One hundred and tenth street, as also other portions of the roads. These remarks together with detailed statement of expenses are,

SIR:—In reply to your circular, calling for my report of the second quarter of this year, on the condition of affairs in the Bureau under my charge, I would respectfully answer:

Subjoined is a statement of the various parks and places, and the nature of the work done since my last report.

THE BATTERY BARK.

I have had men employed in grading and repairing the walks with foundry ashes and sand mixed; the curb re-set around the grass beds; making new walks for the convenience of the public; also, receiving good mould on the enlargement, which enabled me to fill up the stagnant pool and level the hollow that formerly existed there.

BOWLING GREEN

Has been put in good condition, the walks cleaned and shrubbery trimmed; also, the railing has been overhauled and repaired.

CITY HALL PARK.

In this park much labor has been performed, and much improvement made; some of the flags require raising; the park is in a very clean state.

WASHINGTON PARK.

This park is in good order; the shrubbery and plants have been trimmed, some seeds sown, and good order is kept in this park. I would recommend that some portions of the flags and walks be repaired. The railing has been scraped, cleaned and painted with two coats of Ruby's metallic paint, and presents a neat appearance.

UNION PARK.

This park is in admirable order and kept clean; trees and plants trimmed; the borders spaded; seed sown; some manure spread, and new designs made, and ornamented with choice plants of various kinds; the gates repaired at a trifling cost.

MADISON PARK.

This park is sadly in want of flags, likewise an iron railing, as the picket wood fence is fast breaking up; the shrubs, trees and flower bushes have been trimmed; evergreen trees of different kinds have been planted, as per orders; there is much care needed in this park, and so far the public appear to be well satisfied.

PARK, THIRD AVENUE AND SEVENTH STREET.

This park is in good order; has been thoroughly cleaned; the market sheds are about to be torn down, so as to allow me to clean and scrape the iron railing.

EAST AND WEST STUYVESANT PARKS.

These parks are in admirable order, and kept in a most beautiful manner; the flowers and shrubbery in full bloom; some seed has been sown; I would recommend some portions of the flagging to be re-laid; also, the railing has been repaired in both parks, and needs painting badly.

ABINGDON SQUARE PARK.

This park has been put in good order, everything looks and promises well; the railing needs painting.

CHRISTOPHER STREET PARK.

This park has been cleaned; the railing has been scraped, cleaned, painted, and looks beautiful.

PARK, ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SECOND STREET AND THIRD AVENUE.

This park has been overhauled and put in good order; a new picket fence raised, where the empty space caused by removal of the old market-house; some filling in will be required, and the entire fence will need painting.

PARK, WEST BROADWAY AND BEACH STREET.

This park has been put in good order, cleaned, and looks neat; the railing wants painting.

DUANE STREET PARK.

This park has been cleaned and looks well; the railing has been repaired and needs painting.

FIVE POINTS PARK

Has become a common and wants a strong iron railing.

RESERVOIR SQUARE.

I am removing and leveling the earth, preparatory to its being surveyed; large quantities of rubbish still remain and much labor is needed; the men at work perform their duty with care and faithfulness.

FOURTH AVENUE PARK.

This park is now being laid out. I received a large quantity of good mould and manure, which was required as there was very little earth on the top of the tunnel.

TOMPKINS SQUARE.

According to orders, this park has been thrown open, and though not complete, looks admirably well; seats have been placed in good positions; large numbers of good healthy, young, thriving trees planted; handsome designs made in the centre of grass-plots, ornamented with ever-greens. It requires a neat railing to surround the fountain, and needs small wicket gates at the entrances; some flagging required.

MOUNT MORRIS PARK.

I have received orders appointing a surveyor for same, and shall proceed to lay out park, as soon as directions from you are issued.

There are employed in each of the following parks two keepers, viz: Battery, City Hall, Washington, Union, East and West Stuyvesant, Maddison and Tompkins squares, and each receives one dollar and fifty cents per day.

The greatest number of laboring men employed on the various parks and places during this quarter, average (68) sixty-eight, and I state that those men, from time to time, are employed on different parks through the city, and a rule I have made, when one or more could be dispensed with, without detriment to the interest of the city, to discharge him or them, believing that I am authorized to employ only the necessary number of men to keep the public grounds in order.

SIR:—In compliance with your circular letter of June 21st, and section 29, of the charter of 1857, I herewith transmit a statement of work done, and expenditures incurred, during the quarter ending June 30th, 1860. In Appendix marked A, you will find an abstract of all vouchers certified by me, during the quarter.

In Appendix B, you will find a statement, showing the amount paid for gas, to the various police stations, public offices, &c.; and for fitting, repairing and lighting public lamps, &c.; and in Appendix C, a statement of expenditures, as shown by the certified vouchers of this Bureau, with the balance available; also, amount of bills unpaid, amounting to thirty-six thousand three hundred and three dollars and fourteen cents (\$36,303 14), which constitute all bills and claims at this date, for work done during the last six months, and vouchers for which will be forwarded to you on Monday, July 2d, leaving a balance of two hundred and eighty-three thousand six hundred and seven dollars and sixty-two cents (\$283,607 62), of the appropriation for lamps and gas, against which there are no bills or claims whatever.

In February last, application was made by the Agent of the "Sterling Gas Regulator Company", for permission to place the regulators on some of the public offices in the city, with the view, that in case they were found to be of any

benefit in the way of effecting a saving of gas, then that they might be purchased by the proper authority. Having very little faith in the various burners, regulators, &c., brought to this office, I at first declined, but being shown certificates from different parties who had used them, and by whom they were highly approved, I at length consented that they might be placed in the City Hall and Fulton Market, for trial, and the following result will show the saving in gas consumed during the three months ending May 1st, 1860, over the corresponding time of last year, viz:

There has been no decrease in the number of burners in the above places, nor in the number of hours burning, the flickering and blowing of the lights caused by the difference in pressure has entirely ceased, and a steady and uniform light has been given; and as the above saving is much more than the price of the regulators, I would respectfully recommend that those now in use be purchased; and that in the public buildings, where a large quantity of gas is consumed, that the regulators be placed therein.

On the 10th of May last, a resolution was approved, directing the Street Commissioner to advertise for proposals for furnishing one thousand (1,000) lamp-posts, one thousand (1,000) lamp-irons, and one thousand (1,000) gas lamps. Much difficulty having always occurred in keeping the lamps in proper repair, from the tin-rims being constantly destroyed by rust, caused by their contact with the lamp-irons, I have had a pattern lamp made, with a copper rim, which will be a great improvement, as the rims will

then last as long as the other parts, and, with your approval, I will cause the specifications to be made out in a few days, in accordance therewith; also the specifications for lamp posts and irons.

In compliance with resolution of Common Council, or by my direction, the following lamp posts have been fitted up during the last six months,

SIR:—In accordance with the request contained in your circular of June 21, 1860, I herewith transmit a report of the business done in this Bureau for the second quarter of the year 1860, embracing the months of April, May and June.

Since making my last report, the matter concerning the steam engines, (to defray the expenses of which, I urged an extra appropriation, in a communication to the Common Council,) has been favorably considered, and thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) additional appropriated by the Legislature for that branch of the service, as also ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) additional for other expenses of this Bureau—in all forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.)

This amount, added to the amount called for by my predecessor (Mr. Howard,) viz: sixty thousand dollars (60,000), makes a total of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), appropriated in the Tax Levy to defray the expenses of this Bureau for the year 1860.

From the foregoing statements, it will be seen that the available balance of the appropriation for Public Buildings, Construction and Repairs is reduced to seven thousand one hundred and seventy-six dollars and thirty-seven cents. (\$7,176 37).

This result is not surprising, when it is remembered that the estimate for the amount required for the construction and repairs of Public Buildings, was made September 30, 1859, and that since then the Common Council have adopted resolutions, ordering work to be done by contract and otherwise, to the amount of one hundred and ten thousand dollars, (\$110,000), and of which, work, amounting to about seventy thousand dollars, (\$70,000 00,) is now in progress, and included in the foregoing statement.

In order to carry into effect the remaining resolution, and keep the Public Buildings in proper order, for the balance of the year, it will be necessary for the Common Council to make an appropriation of about sixty thousand dollars, (\$60,000 00).

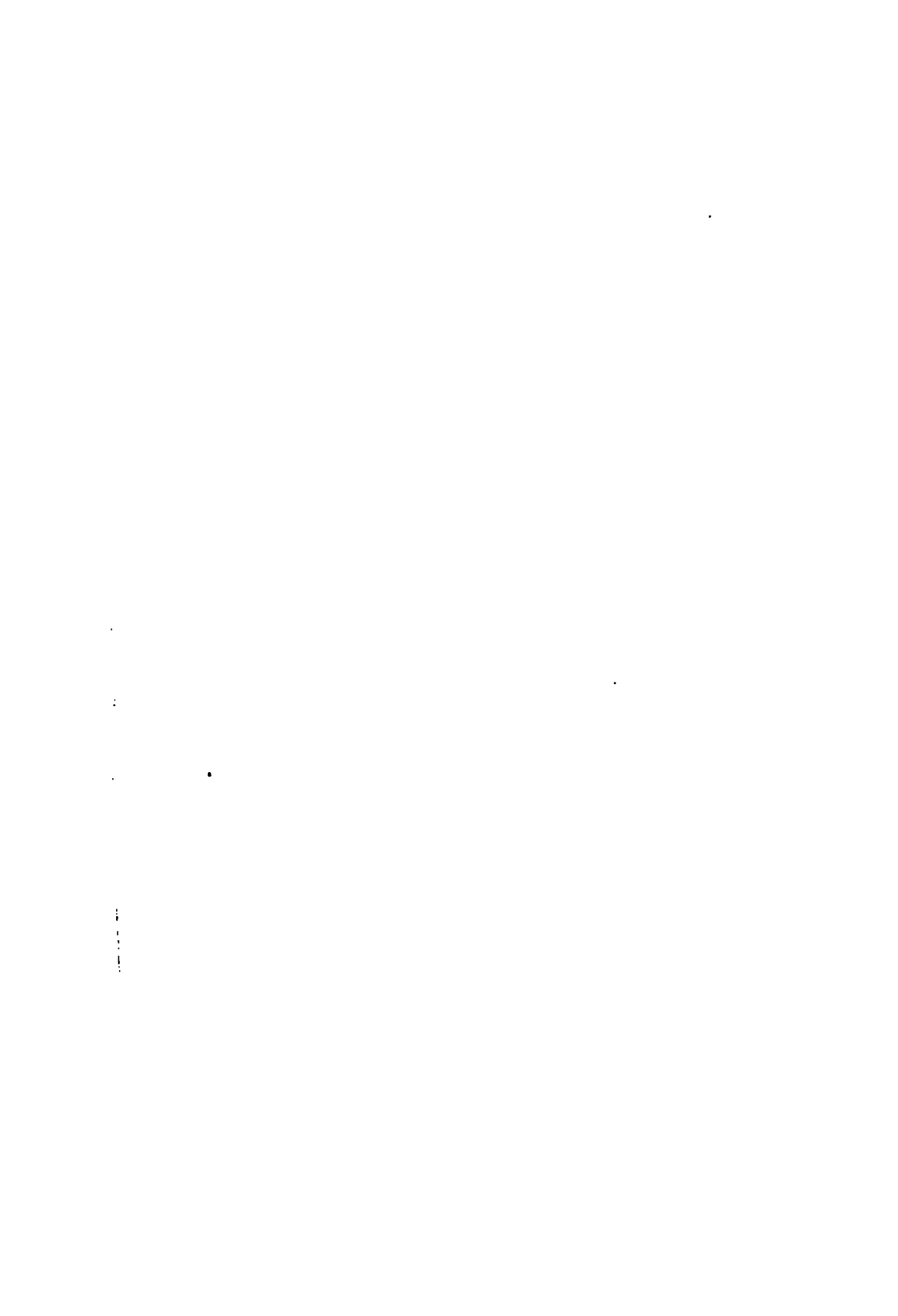

SIR:—The Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies reports to this office, that the balance available of the appropriation for "Public Buildings, Construction and Repairs," after allowing for payment of outstanding contracts, is only about seven thousand dollars.

The Common Council, without recommendations from this Department, have ordered work to be done, which was unforeseen, and not included in the estimate of the Superintendent, some of which work has already been executed and paid for, some is now in progress, and a portion has not yet been contracted for or ordered to be done.

Although there was, on the 1st instant, an actual balance on hand of eighty-two thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars and thirty-seven cents, it is clear that there will be a deficiency in this appropriation, to meet which, and to enable the Department to carry out the orders of the Common Council, an additional appropriation will be necessary.

In view of the above facts, I took occasion, on the 6th inst., to address a communication to the Common Council, setting forth the state of the appropriation, and the present condition of the several works ordered by them, and requesting that an appropriation of sixty-six thousand dollars be made therefor.

I have now to ask, whether you cannot make some provision by which the money can be raised for this purpose, provided the Common Council make the appropriation?

SEWERS—REPAIRING AND CLEANING.

CROTON AQUEDUCT DEPARTMENT,
New York, July 14, 1860.To ROBERT T. HAWS, Esq., *Comptroller, &c.*:

SIR:—The Croton Aqueduct Board beg leave to call your attention to the importance of the following works, which were not anticipated, and consequently were not provided for in the estimates for the current year, under the head of "Sewers, Repairs and Cleaning," viz: The re-construction of the Trunk Outlet for the present sewer in Canal street; the construction of a temporary trunk outlet for the present sewer in East Eighteenth street, and also a trunk outlet for the proposed sewer in West Thirty-second street.

The former of these works has become necessary in consequence of the rotting and girding way of the present trunk. This trunk is of very large dimensions, being about nine feet by fifteen feet in the clear, and extends through the pier to the outer end. Through this trunk the sewerage of nearly five hundred acres of a densely populated district is discharged into the rapid current of the river. In consequence of the decay of the trunk, this offensive matter falls into the quiet waters of the slips on each side of the pier, creating thereby a nuisance offensive to the senses, and prejudicial to the public health. From the examination made under the direction of the Board, it is apparent that almost the entire re-building of the trunk is necessary—the estimated cost of the same being \$7,500.

The proposed temporary trunk outlet in East Eighteenth street, is designed to preserve the outlet to the present sewer in said street, which will shortly be destroyed by the filling in, in progress at the foot of that street under a resolution of the Common Council. The estimated cost of the proposed trunk outlet is \$1,500.

The proposed work in Thirty-second street is the construction of a wooden trunk as an outlet for the sewer authorized to be built in this street from Tenth avenue to Hudson river. For a length of about three hundred feet at the exterior end, a brick sewer cannot at present be constructed, and in consequence thereof the Common Council, by resolution, directed a wooden trunk to be constructed in place of the brick sewer, at the expense of the city, but omitted to make the usual appropriation therefor. The estimated cost of this work is \$1,500.

The above works the Board are anxious to commence and complete at the earliest possible day, believing them to be imperatively necessary as sanitary measures; no appropriation, however, exists from which their expenses can be defrayed, and, as little or no margin was allowed in the estimates made for the prosecution of other work by this Department, there will be no available balance of other appropriations.

Under the same head of "Sewers, Repairs and Cleaning," there will be required for general purposes, about \$9,500—a larger amount of work than was anticipated at the time the estimates for the current year were prepared, having become necessary. This amount the Board consider as absolutely necessary to enable them to carry on the

stant works that will be required under this head, during the remainder of the work-season.

REPORT.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

The undersigned, the Special Committee, to whom were referred the messages of his Honor the Mayor, dated the eleventh and eighteenth days of July, 1860, asking the concurrence of this Board in the removal of Alfred W. Craven as Engineer, and Thomas B. Tappen as Assistant Commissioner of the Croton Aqueduct Board, respectfully

REPORT :

That your Committee held their first meeting on the 10th of September, instant, when they were attended by Messrs. Craven and Tappen.

That previous to the assembling of the Committee, a note had been addressed by the Committee to his Honor the Mayor, requesting him to appear before them on the investigation of the charges preferred by him, with which request his Honor refused to comply.

That on the second meeting of your Committee, held on the eleventh day of September, instant, Messrs. Craven and Tappen both appeared before your Committee, and read their written answers to the charges contained in the messages of the Mayor, which answers were verified by them under oath, and are hereto annexed.

That the said answers having been read, each of said officers expressed his desire and anxiety to have the charges preferred against him thoroughly examined. That his Honor failed to attend this meeting of the Committee also.

That your Committee thereupon directed their Clerk to serve upon his Honor copies of the answers of Messrs. Craven and Tappen, and adjourned to the seventeenth instant, in order to give his Honor an opportunity of disputing the truth of said answers, if he desired to do so.

That on that day your Committee again assembled, for the purpose of proceeding with the investigation; but finding that, owing to some oversight of the Clerk, the answers had not been delivered to the Mayor, they again adjourned, in order that a service thereof might be made.

That the said answers were served on the Mayor on the eighteenth day of September, instant, and that the next meeting of your Committee was held on the 20th of September, instant. That at this and the previous meeting, Messrs. Craven and Tappen were present.

The Mayor, however, failed to attend.

It is thus apparent, that, while the parties accused by the Mayor have been ready, on every occasion of the meeting of your Committee, to confront the Mayor and enter upon the investigation of his charges, his Honor has steadily refused to appear before your Committee, or to take a single step toward the substantiation of those charges.

The sworn answers presented by Messrs. Craven and Tappen are, in the opinion of your Committee, thorough

refutations of the charges of the Mayor, and cast upon him the burden of proving his allegations.

This he has failed to do, and your Committee can, therefore, draw no other inference than that he has become satisfied, from a perusal of the answers, that the charges contained in his two messages were erroneous and untrue.

It is, at all events, the opinion of your Committee, that there is not a single charge in either of those messages which is not thoroughly explained by the parties accused ; and justice to them demands that your Committee should express their sincere belief that the charges were unfounded, and that there is not the slightest ground for supposing that either the Engineer or the Assistant Commissioner has, in any respect, failed to discharge the duties of his position with ability and fidelity.

With reference to the charges of the Mayor in relation to the Reservoir, your Committee also deem it their duty to state, that, in their opinion, there never has been an instance in which the estimates by an Engineer, of the probable quantities and of the cost of the work required for a work of this character, have so closely approximated to the actual result; and that Mr. Craven, so far from being subject to censure for his professional action in that matter, is deserving of the highest commendation.

In conclusion, your Committee would report, that the charges of his Honor have not only not been proven by him, but that they have been thoroughly disproved by the answers of the accused; and your Committee, therefore, present for the adoption of the Board the following resolution :

Resolved, That this Board do not concur in the removal of Alfred W. Craven, Chief Engineer, and Thomas B. Tappen, Assistant Commissioner of the Croton Aqueduct Board, as requested by the messages of his Honor the Mayor, dated July 11th and 18th, 1860, respectively.

INVESTIGATION.

FIRST SESSION.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 10, 1860.

PRESENT—Alderman Starr.

Messrs. Tappen and Craven were also in attendance.

After waiting some time for the other members of the Committee,

ALDERMAN STARR said that, in the absence of his colleagues, he would adjourn the meeting until the following day.

Mr. Auld (of the Mayor's office) here entered, and handed the Alderman a communication from his Honor the Mayor.

ALDERMAN STARR then read the following :

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
New York, Sept. 10, 1860.

H. W. GENET, ESQ.,
Chairman, &c.:

DEAR SIR:—I am in receipt of a note, requesting my attendance at a meeting of the Committee appointed by the President of the Board of Aldermen, in July last, to investigate the sufficiency of the causes alleged by me for the removal of Messrs. Craven and Tappen, of the Croton Aqueduct Department.

I respectfully decline attending the meetings of this Committee, and shall not, directly or indirectly, participate in its proceedings.

The grounds upon which I asked the consent of the Aldermen to the removal of these officers will be found in my communication to the Board, dated July 13th, and I refer your Committee to that document, as fully sustaining, by official data, every allegation preferred against them.

As an independent department of the city government, I have discharged the duty imposed upon me by the Charter in this matter, and now leave the Aldermen to discharge theirs, without interference on my part.

Very respectfully, &c.,

FERNANDO WOOD, *Mayor*.

MR. TAPPEN supposed the Committee had the power to subpoena his Honor, and that it would do so. He and Mr. Craven were very anxious that the investigation should proceed without any delay.

ALDERMAN STARR:—These charges preferred by the Mayor are very lengthy. I should like very much, gentlemen, to oblige you by proceeding with the matter to-day, and continuing this meeting; but, then, the Chairman and the other member are both absent, and I am afraid I will have to put it off till to-morrow. I will make it one o'clock to-morrow.

MR. CRAVEN:—I would much desire, then, that the Committee sit from day to day, until we have the matter fully investigated. I am quite ready to disprove these charges, so far as they affect me.

Mr. TAYLOR — If the other gentlemen are not present
 tomorrow we will adjourn. A formal adjournment.

A motion was made and carried that the meeting be adjourned.

The meeting was then adjourned to 10 o'clock Tuesday
 at 10:00 A.M.

SECOND SESSION.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, 1860.

PRESENT—Aldermen Genet (Chairman), Boole and Starr.

At a quarter past one o'clock, Alderman Starr was the only member of the Committee present.

Messrs. Craven and Tappen were in attendance.

ALDERMAN STARR said :—In accordance, gentlemen, with the promise which I made yesterday, that I would proceed if no other members would be present to-day, and would continue this investigation, we will now proceed. The first thing in order will be the reading of the charges made by his Honor the Mayor against Alfred W. Craven and Thomas B. Tappen. Alderman Starr then read the following :

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
New York, July 13, 1860.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN :—On the 11th instant, I had the honor to submit to your Honorable Body a communication, removing Alfred W. Craven from the office of Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct Board, and Thomas B. Tappen from the office of Assistant Commissioner of the Croton Aqueduct Board, for the causes therein named. The Board have deferred definite action upon the subject, for the reason, as was alleged in debate, that the causes stated were insufficient. I now have the honor of submitting some additional reasons for these removals, which I am confident will meet with the prompt endorsement of the Board.

It having been intimated to me that the estimate of work done upon the Reservoir, now in course of construction, already largely exceeded its original estimated cost, I called upon the Croton Department for a statement—a copy of which is annexed, marked A—from which it appears that the work already done, up to April 30th, 1860, amounts to \$694,385 48, exceeding the original estimate for the whole work by more than \$60,000.

I have also called for an estimate of the work remaining to be done to complete the Reservoir, and in reply have been furnished with the inclosed vague and loose statement from the Engineer in charge, marked B, from which it may be inferred that there is between \$250,000 and \$300,000 required to finish the work, of which one-half or more is for the Gate-House, which was not originally intended to have been included in the contract of Messrs. Fairchild & Co.

These statements show the quantities of the several kinds of work completed and remaining to be done on the contract of Messrs. Fairchild & Co. (exclusive of the gate-house), and in comparing these quantities with those originally estimated by the Engineer, the following remarkable discrepancies appear:

First. That the excavation has been *increased* by an amount of from 30,000 to 60,000 cubic yards, or seven per cent.

Second. That the puddle has been increased by an amount of from 25,000 to 30,000 cubic yards, or thirty-seven per cent.

Third. That the embankment has been *decreased* by an amount of 215,565 cubic yards, or one-third less.

Fourth. That the stone paving has been *decreased* by an amount of 46,941 cubic yards, or $\frac{1}{280}$ only of the original amount.

Fifth. That the paving in cement has been *increased* by an amount of 18,867 cubic yards, or more than nine times greater.

Sixth. That the concrete masonry has been *increased* by an amount of 33,568 cubic yards, or more than forty times the quantity originally estimated.

These remarkable discrepancies, together with the largely increased cost of the Reservoir, naturally directs attention to a more particular examination of the nature of the changes made in the original plans which have caused these discrepancies and increased the cost, and to ascertain their effect upon the interests of the city.

It requires either the professional knowledge of an Engineer, or the experience of a contractor acquainted with such work, to determine the actual value of the different kinds of work required for this Reservoir. Not having that knowledge, I have availed myself of the opinions of the most skillful contractors, as expressed in their bids for this work (see page 101, Doc. No. 2, 1858), to ascertain how these changes in the plans have affected the interests of the city and the contractors, and also how they would have affected the original award of the contract for this work.

This examination leads me to the conclusion, that

wherever these changes have been made, they have proved very beneficial to the contractors, and in most cases have largely increased the amount which the city must pay for the work.

For instance, a diminution of the embankment, for which the contractors have *only one cent* per cubic yard, and an increase on the excavation, for which they have *twenty-one cents* per cubic yard, and a diminution of the stone paving, for which they have only one dollar and ten cents, and an increase in the paving in cement, for which they have *four dollars* per cubic yard.

The enormous increase in the concrete masonry—for which the city is compelled to pay *five dollars* per cubic yard, when other responsible bidders, well acquainted with the value of such work, offered to do this item at much less, even as low as \$2 98 per cubic yard—is another remarkable change.

The document before referred to shows that the Engineer estimated the bid of Messrs. Fairchild & Co. at \$97,334 32 lower than the offer of Messrs. John P. & T. Cumming, Jr., while it now appears by his present estimate of quantities, that if the contract had been given to Messrs. Cummings & Co., instead of Fairchild & Co., the city would have saved over \$40,000.

The Engineer's mistake in this award is, therefore, nearly \$140,000, and has resulted in a loss to the city of over \$40,000.

As the Engineer has been proved to have been mistaken to the extent of \$140,000, may it not be safely assumed that he is still mistaken in the work to be done (some

\$250,000) in the same ratio, so that the city will probably lose by this mistake nearly one hundred thousand dollars?

The notoriety which has been given to the large increased cost, and the expensive and peculiar changes which have been made in the plans of the Yorkville Reservoir, have directed my attention to an examination of this work, in the first instance, and the result has satisfied me that all of the contracts which have been made, and all of the work which has been executed under the direction of the Croton Aqueduct Department for a few years past, require a very strict investigation.

A large portion of this work, under the charge of this department, is of so purely a professional nature, that it must necessarily be left to the ability, industry and integrity of the Engineer of the Board, and if he is wanting in either of these qualifications, the interests of the city must be sacrificed, as it has been shown to have been in the case of the Yorkville Reservoir.

The increased consumption of water in the city has already exhausted the supply, and within the next few years it will be necessary to adapt the whole works to an increased consumption and a more equalized distribution.

These important changes in the works, involving an increased capacity of the pipes over the High Bridge, in the Manhattan Valley, and through various districts in the city, will require a large outlay of money; and it is indispensable that the plans of the works shall now be arranged with the utmost skill, and that the contracts should be let and the work done so as to avoid the enormous losses and errors which have been shown to have been made in the new Reservoir.

In commenting upon this subject, I have abstained from giving currency to any of the rumors which have reached me, but have confined myself to the results, which are patent to any citizen who will take the trouble to examine the papers herewith submitted.

If I am correct in the conclusions drawn from the statements here presented—and, of course, being founded on mathematical data, there can be no error—I am confident your Honorable Board and the public will unite with me in the belief that A. W. Craven, the Engineer, is disqualified for the important trusts confided to him, and that there is sufficient cause to warrant me in his removal, and the appointment of some other and more competent person in his place.

Another cause is to be found in the following statement: Your Honorable Body, as a constituent part of the Common Council, adopted a resolution to confirm an assessment for paving Forty-ninth street, from Third to Lexington avenue, with trap-block. In the performance of this work, the Engineer did not exercise a proper vigilance.

The remonstrances of nearly every property owner on the line of Forty-ninth street, between the above avenues—copies of which are annexed, marked C and D—disclose the fact, that the materials employed were not in accordance with the terms of the contract, but that an inferior quality of stone was used, and also that the work was performed in so negligent a manner as to cause it to settle in many places immediately after its completion. The Croton Board had notice of the defective character of the material employed on the work on the 11th of October, 1859, but, notwithstanding, on the 14th of December, 1859, gave a

certificate of its completion and acceptance, on which, doubtless, the action of the Common Council was based. Either the property owners on Forty-ninth street, embracing several of our most intelligent citizens, are utterly mistaken in their emphatic condemnation of the work, or Mr. Craven has been guilty of gross negligence in its supervision and examination.

There is yet another case which can hardly be reconciled with the constant care and entire accuracy demanded of one to whose professional skill is intrusted the construction of important public works. I allude to a sewer now in progress in Fortieth street, Ninth avenue, Thirty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, in which an error in the grade was made of eight inches at the maximum, which may involve the city in litigation and loss, and throws a serious responsibility on the Engineer of the Board.

But there are other causes, in which not only Mr. Craven, but Mr. Tappen is equally culpable. They have retained in office persons who have been proven guilty of official delinquency, committed as officers of the Department.

On the 7th of December, 1859, Paul Chappell and three other persons made a complaint to the Croton Aqueduct Department, stating, in substance, that John Cornwell and William Conboy had taken a contract for the excavation of a cellar for Mr. Henry J. Armstrong, at Yorkville; that Cornwell had furnished powder fuse and tools belonging to the Department, to aid in the performance of this contract, and that he had fraudulently returned the time of the men while working on this job, for which they were paid by the Department.

conversion of public property, he is retained by Messrs. Craven and Tappen in the service of the Department; and the party who had appropriated the property, and derived a benefit from the labor of men paid by the city, was also retained in his position after the circumstances were brought to the knowledge of the heads of the Department.

The Charter emphatically declares, that any officer of the city government, or person employed in its service, "who shall commit any fraud upon the city, or convert any of the public property to his own use, or knowingly permit any other person so to convert it, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, in addition to the penalties imposed by law, shall forfeit his office, and be excluded forever after from receiving or holding any office under the city Charter."

That Cornwell and Conboy violated this provision of the Charter is clear, and their retention in the public service by the chief officers of the Department was an act utterly subversive of good faith and honesty in the discharge of duty on the part of their subordinates.

I know no dispensing power in such a case as this, and its attempted exercise, in defiance of the Charter, by the then acting President and Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct Department, calls for the most decided vindication of the statute thus set at naught by those whose duty it was to have enforced its penalties.

It should be observed, that all the foregoing matters occurred previous to the entrance on office of the present President of the Croton Aqueduct Board, Mr. Stephens, who is in no respect implicated therein.

CROTON AQUEDUCT DEPARTMENT,
ENGINEER'S OFFICE, May 2, 1860.*To the Croton Aqueduct Board:*

GENTLEMEN:—The data in the office not worked up, and the want of others not yet obtained, in consequence of the constant changes in the work, leave me without the means of giving you an immediate answer to the inquiry of “the quantities of materials and work required to complete the new Reservoir?”

To give these quantities definitely would require considerable time and expense in this stage of the work. As requested by the President of your Board, yesterday, I will give an estimate on such data as are before me, and on my judgment of what will probably be required. The quantities for the gate-houses, &c., &c., are not complete, as some of the details of the plans have not been completed. These are, however, but a small per cent. of the whole. The quantities required to complete the work, under Fairchild, Walker & Co.'s contract, are thus approximately estimated as follows:

Earth excavation, 120,000 to 150,000 cubic yards, dependent in some degree on the manner in which the outer bank is finished in connection with the work on the Central Park.

Rock excavation, 80,000 cubic yards.

Puddles, 10,000 to 16,000 cubic yards.

Embankment, 100,000 cubic yards.

Paving in cement, 30,000 cubic yards,

Concrete, 10,000 cubic yards,

These quantities have varied from the original, as it was anticipated they might, from the nature of the work, when the contract was made, and special notice was given to that effect, and special authority was reserved by the Board, by the contract, to make such changes as circumstances, in your judgment, should require. Changes, some by your authority, have been made, which have altered some of the quantities very largely. For the gate-houses on the Reservoir and Aqueduct, and works connected therewith, the estimate is as follows:

- 9,500 cubic yards of concrete masonry.
- 1,343 cubic yards of brick masonry in arches.
- 2,800 cubic yards of other brick masonry.

- 2 sky-lights.
- 4,330 cubic yards of earth excavation.
- 4,850 cubic yards of rock excavation.
- 8,800 cubic yards of embankment.

MESSRS. ASSESSORS:

The undersigned are parties in interest, and have examined the improvement specified in the above notice, together with the assessment therefor, and object to the confirmation of the same for the following reasons:

First. That a large number of the blocks used in the construction of the pavement in question were defective in measurement, and, therefore, not in conformity with the fourth sub-division of the specification; all of which was brought to the attention of the Department having cognizance of the matter at the time, and in season to have prevented it; and,

Second. That an excess of fifty-two yards and a fraction is assessed upon the property on the line of said street, over and above the surveyor's estimate of the same, making a difference of one hundred and twenty-one dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$121 68) against the parties assessed; and,

Third. That thirty-one days' inspection fee is charged against the property, whereas it should have been twenty seven (the time bid by the contractor), making a difference of four days, or eight dollars wrongfully charged to the improvement; and,

Fourthly. That seventy-six dollars and sixty-two cents (\$76 62), or two per cent. on the whole cost of the work (\$3,831 24), is levied upon the said improvement, as a fee for assessing the same; whereas, the late act of the Legislature of the State, in relation to taxes and assessments in the city of New York, passed April 14, 1859, clearly for-

bids the laying or collection of any such item of charge, as more fully appears by section 16 of said act, reading as follows, to wit:

"The said Board of Assessors, or a majority thereof, shall make all estimates and assessments, give all notices, receive and pass upon all objections, and certify to the Common Council, in accordance with the existing laws relative to all such matters. The said Assessors shall each receive an annual compensation of two thousand dollars, to be paid by the Comptroller of the city of New York from the city treasury, and which shall be in lieu of all other compensation."

Under these circumstances, and for the reasons set forth above, the undersigned respectfully protest against the confirmation of the said assessments.

To the Board of Assessors:

The undersigned, owners of property and residents on Forty-ninth street, between Third and Lexington avenues, most earnestly remonstrate against the acceptance, approval or confirmation of the work of paving with Belgian pavement on said street, between said avenues, for these reasons:

First. The specifications under which the contract was made for doing the work required that the stone used for

the pavement should be what is commonly called and known as trap-block, being uniform square blocks. This requirement has been totally violated and disregarded by the contractor.

Second. The contract under which the work was performed required the above kind of stone to be used, and that the pavement should be laid in a complete and workmanlike manner, neither of which has been done ; but, on the contrary, a thin and very inferior quality of stone was used ; and the work was so improperly performed, that it has already settled in several places below the line or grade.

For these reasons, which are open to proof, your subscribers humbly pray, &c.

During the reading of the above, Aldermen Genet and Boole entered the room.

ALDERMAN BOOLE said he should have been present the previous day, but that he had forgotten the meeting was called for Monday.

ALDERMAN STARR:—In the absence of Alderman Genet

and yourself, I commenced reading the charges. I supposed that was the first thing in order.

ALDERMAN GENET:—They have been published already, and the whole matter is before the public. I don't suppose it is necessary to read them through.

ALDERMAN STARR:—Well, I don't know that it is. The Committee can decide, however.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:—If the reporters present desire to have them read, in order to report them, the reading of the document will make but little difference.

When Alderman Starr had finished the reading of the document,

The CHAIRMAN said:—I presume that is the substance of the whole of the charges. Now, gentlemen of the Croton Department, we would wish to hear your replies.

MR. TAPPEN:—As my reply is not so lengthy Mr. Craven's, I would ask that my answer be heard first.

The Committee assented.

MR. TAPPEN then addressed the Committee as follows:

To the Honorable the Committee of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred a communication of the Mayor of the city, containing certain charges against ALFRED W. CRAVEN, Chief Engineer, and THOMAS B. TAPPEN, Assistant Commissioner of the Croton Aqueduct Board:

The undersigned respectfully submits the following answer to the charges made by his Honor the Mayor.

Those charges, so far as the undersigned is concerned,

are of alleged "serious disagreements and insubordination," and retention in office of Messrs. Cornwell and Conboy.

No specifications whatever accompany the charge of serious disagreements and insubordination, and the undersigned is not aware of any serious disagreements with, or the existence of any insubordination to, the Mayor of the city, on the part of the officers of the Croton Aqueduct Board, great care having uniformly been taken in all the operations of the department, whenever the Mayor thought proper to oppose its action, to conform, as far as practicable, to his wishes, as the following statement will show, and, if there are any exceptions to this uniform tenor of conduct and of courtesy towards the Mayor, they have occurred when individuals, representing that they expressed the wishes of the Mayor, have desired the removal of certain persons in the department, whom the undersigned declined to remove, unless some better reason than mere political antagonism could be alleged against them; no other reasons having been presented, they were retained; and, inasmuch as the power to appoint subordinates is solely vested in the Croton Board, and as no subordination to the Mayor in this regard is required by any law, this effort may not have been in his mind when "serious disagreements and insubordination" were charged against the undersigned; and he, therefore, proceeds to the only subjects of disagreement which have occurred—as to which, the undersigned repeats, every disposition was shown to oblige the Mayor, consistent with a just performance of public duty.

The Croton Board were, by a three-fourth vote of the

Common Council, directed to place an additional pipe across the High Bridge, to increase the supply of water—a measure of pressing necessity—and to lower the main-pipe on the Eighth avenue, to conform to the new grade, and to do them by day's work, the first of which was approved by the Mayor, December 31st, 1859; the other was passed during the present year, and approved by the Mayor, February 28th, 1860. The Charter of the city says: "Whenever any work is necessary to be done to complete or perfect a particular job, or any supply is needful for any particular purpose, which work and job is to be undertaken, or supply furnished for the Corporation, and the several parts of the said work or supply shall together involve the expenditure of more than two hundred and fifty dollars, the same shall be by contract, under such regulations concerning it as shall be established by ordinance of the Common Council, unless by a vote of three-fourths of the members elected to each Board, it shall be ordered otherwise."

The above works were ordered to be done otherwise, and believing the completion of the same of more importance to the city than the particular manner in which said work should be done, as the pipes through which the Croton is conveyed over the High Bridge are so small, that whilst the Aqueduct, from Croton Lake to the High Bridge, is constructed to deliver sixty millions gallons of water per diem, those pipes convey only about one-half the quantity, and the surplus is drained into the Harlem river, the pipes were laid at that reduced capacity, on the mistaken idea that the wants of the city would be supplied by them, for many years yet to come; but the rapid increase of our population, and the establishment and extension of many

branches of trade requiring water, calls for equalizing the carrying power over the Bridge to the whole capacity of the Aqueduct, so that the many dangers to the city, resulting from a diminution (such as frequently happens) of the quantity of water in the Distributing Reservoir, may no longer exist.

The Croton Board, in obedience to the resolutions of the Common Council, were proceeding with those most important works, as directed—one of which had been approved of by his Honor, so that there was no reason to suppose there would be any objection on his part, and progressing so, that there would have been a certainty of completion during the present working season—when information was received that the Mayor had expressed doubts about the legality of the manner of doing the work, and that he would not sign the warrants for the same, notwithstanding the great necessity for an additional pipe across the Bridge to bring the water to the city, that is now wasted on the north side of Harlem river, and the limited time for doing the work on the Eighth avenue, they were immediately discontinued, in order that the Mayor might have an opportunity to investigate the same, and notice sent to him to that effect. In a few days, a communication was received from the Mayor, saying that he would approve of the work on the Eighth avenue, and it was immediately re-commenced. There being no legal objections against one that would not be good against the other, the Croton Board sent another communication to the Mayor, urging a speedy decision on the High Bridge improvement, as an adequate supply of water was depending on the additional pipe being laid during the present season, no answer to which has been received, and nothing has since been done

towards the completion of the work, except to do a portion of it by contract. In thus suspending the work, in compliance to the wish of the Mayor, no insubordination can be traced. The above are the only matters in the conduct of actual operations in which there has been a difference of opinion between the Mayor and the Croton Aqueduct Board, that have happened since the undersigned has been a member thereof, and the communication to the Board of Aldermen, of serious disagreements and insubordination, is the only official information that the undersigned has that there has been any disagreement.

The particular matters contained in the communication of the Mayor to the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, on the 18th instant, all occurred previous to my being a member of the Croton Board, except the paving of Fortyninth street. In that case, a complaint was made about the time the work commenced, which was referred to the Water Purveyor for examination and attention, who visited the work daily while it was in progress, as also the general inspector, with the inspector in charge of the work constantly on the ground, whose certificates we have that the work was performed in accordance with the contract; and the undersigned has no recollection, nor is there any evidence in the office, that any complaint was made after that time.

As the main burden of the communication is concerning matters of engineering, those matters can best be answered by the gentlemen especially charged therewith.

In said communication, the Mayor says: "But there are other causes in which not only Mr. Craven, but Mr. Tappen, are equally culpable; they have retained in office persons

who have been proven guilty of official delinquency, committed as officers of the department," and speaks of the case of Cornwell and Conboy.

The matter alluded to took place in the early part of June, 1859, two months previous to my appointment as a member of the Croton Board. The examination of the case was made in December, 1859, by the Board, Mr. Myndert Van Schaick being then its President ; the testimony was all taken before Mr. Van Schaick, and the unanimous decision of the Board, as rendered by him, was, that there had been no intention of wrong-doing on the part of either Cornwell or Conboy, and that a reprimand and caution was deemed sufficient. There was nothing in the evidence tending to implicate Mr. Cornwell or Conboy in any collusion to defraud the city. Mr. Conboy was not an officer in the department ; he was merely a laboring man, working in the gang under charge of Mr. Cornwell, and left the employ of the city to work on his own account ; and whatever wrong was committed was by Mr. Cornwell, in lending the powder and tools (which were returned), and allowing some of the men to leave their work and assist Mr. Conboy. Mr. Cornwell had no interest in the work, either direct or indirect, and believing that the charge was made through malice, because the parties making it had been discharged by Cornwell, and as my associates stated, he had worked for the department for the past ten years, and had always been a faithful and efficient officer, and that there had never been a previous charge against him, the above decision was given. After Mr. Van Schaick had resigned his position, his Honor the Mayor sent to know whether the above parties were employed, and for

copies of the evidence, which were furnished him, and he then asked that they be discharged.

Believing that the Board had acted justly, the Mayor was requested by Mr. Craven and myself to look over the testimony again. After a few days, we were informed verbally that the Mayor was satisfied, and that he would see the Board, or one of its members, about it; and the undersigned believes that the Board were correctly so informed, inasmuch as the Mayor has signed the warrants every fortnight since, for the pay of Messrs. Cornwell and Conboy, whom he now again charges with wrong-doing. Since the above occurrence, the Croton Aqueduct Board have heard nothing from the Mayor respecting the matter, until the said communication was sent to the Honorable the Board of Aldermen.

In submitting the above answer to the charges made by the Mayor, the undersigned would take this opportunity to say, that he has been ready at all times to afford every facility and every information to the Mayor of the city, which, by virtue of his official position, he was entitled to; this he deemed a duty, in order that the public interests might not be prejudiced, and is ready and willing at any time to answer for any action of his, since his connection with the department.

That (continued Mr. Tappen) is my answer to the charges made against me by the Mayor; and I can only

add, that I will bring any proof the Committee may require to substantiate what I have said.

The CHAIRMAN:—We will now hear you, Mr. Craven.

MR. CRAVEN then addressed the Committee as follows:—Gentlemen, I have got rather a long document, I am afraid. I suppose I must infer, from the Mayor's not coming before the Committee, and accepting their invitation to present himself and substantiate his statements, that he has given up his charges, or has withdrawn them. I prefer, however, for a better understanding of himself and myself, that a full investigation should take place.

The CHAIRMAN:—The Mayor concludes, I suppose, that the making of these charges—the preferring of them—is sufficient, until they are answered. And when they are answered, it may be necessary to give a further notice to the Mayor to make good his allegations.

MR. CRAVEN:—I do not, sir, wish to avoid presenting my answer, and I will now submit it.

The CHAIRMAN:—Oh, certainly not; we do not so understand you.

MR. CRAVEN then addressed the Committee in the following language:

CROTON AQUEDUCT DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF CHIEF ENGINEER,
July 31, 1860.

*To the Special Committee of the
Board of Aldermen:*

GENTLEMEN:—A message was transmitted to the Board of Aldermen, by the Mayor, on the 11th instant, in which he says:

"In consequence of serious disagreements and insubordination, I hereby remove Alfred W. Craven from the office of Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct Board, and Thomas B. Tappen from the office of Assistant Commissioner of the same Board."

In the use of this language, the Mayor appeared to forget that, by the Charter, he had no power to remove an officer without the express consent of the Board of Aldermen, nor without cause. The message proposed to remove me without the consent of your Board, and without any statement of *facts*, enabling your Board to determine whether the "serious disagreements and insubordination" existed in fact, or whether, if existing, they constituted *causes* for removal.

This communication having failed to receive the approval of your Board, the Mayor undertook to correct his error, and, on the 18th inst., transmitted another message, in which he states that he has "the honor of submitting some additional reasons for these removals," and that he is "confident they will meet with the prompt indorsement of the Board."

These two messages have been referred by the Board to you as a Special Committee, and I have to thank you for your courtesy in granting my urgent request for a full investigation.

Although the assurances of my fellow-citizens, constantly volunteered in numerous gratifying expressions, might seem to warrant my treating the accusations against me with disdain, I deem that this very confidence, so unreserved and so kindly exhibited, should be justified and rewarded by a clear and perfect statement of my case. I

cannot but feel that such entire trust in my integrity, when it is thus assailed, demands from me, in simple gratitude, that I should show it is not misplaced.

In doing so, I must tax the patience of all who, for the sake of truth, will read or listen to this paper. It is well known that a falsehood can be told in three words, which it will take three pages to disprove, and that this is eminently so where professional and technical matters are concerned.

I will examine each of the Mayor's messages fully and in detail. In order to do so fairly and frankly, I will state the charges against me with a directness which he has failed to attain, and will unfold the covert insinuations with which they are accompanied. The issue is not simply the retention of my place—that is but a trifle in the balance. The issue is one of character—of private and official integrity, and, therefore, to me, of life. If I had been assailed by a private citizen, I might have given the assault such a degree of consequence as his personal character would demand. But when my assailant happens to be the Mayor of the city, and, from his public position, embodies his attack in official documents, to remain on the records of the city forever, I cannot let them pass in silence or contempt, but must expose and confute these calumnies, not only for my own sake, but for the sake of my friends, and of all men who appreciate private or professional character.

CHARGES OF THE MAYOR.

The charges in the second message of the Mayor are four in number;

First. That the work done, and the work remaining to be done, upon the new Reservoir, now in course of construction, largely exceeds the original estimate of such work made by me as Chief Engineer; that the quantities of such work, in various items, differ from the estimate—some being largely increased above, and some very largely decreased below, the original estimate; that wherever these changes have occurred, they have proved very beneficial to the contractors, and largely increased the cost of the work to the city, with the covert insinuation that the changes were made by me, because they would be beneficial to the contractors, and because I was acting in their interests, and not in the interest of the city; that I have made a mistake in awarding the contract to the present contractors, whereby the city will suffer loss; that I have made expensive and peculiar changes in the plans of the work, whereby its cost is increased; that I have been wanting in ability, industry and integrity, whereby the interests of the city have been sacrificed; and that I am disqualified for my position, and some other person more competent should be appointed in my place.

Second. That, in the work of paving Forty-ninth street, from Third to Lexington avenue, with trap-block, the Engineer did not exercise proper vigilance; that the materials employed were not in accordance with the contract, but that an inferior quality of stone was used; and, also, that the work was performed in so negligent a manner as to cause it to settle in many cases, immediately after its completion; that the Croton Board had notice of the defective character of the materials employed in the work, but, notwithstanding, gave a certificate of its completion and acceptance.

Third. That an error of eight inches in the maximum was made in the grade of a sewer now in progress in Fortieth street, Ninth avenue, Thirty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, which error may involve the city in litigation and loss, and which throws a serious responsibility on the Engineer of the Board, showing the want of the constant care and entire accuracy demanded of one to whose professional skill is intrusted the construction of important public works.

Fourth. That John Cornwell and William Conboy, employees of the Department, who had a private job for the excavation of a cellar at Yorkville, were accused, before the Croton Aqueduct Board, in December, 1859, by John Chappel and three others, to the effect that

Cornwell had furnished powder, fuse and tools belonging to the Department, to aid in the performance of this private contract, and had allowed men in the service of the Department, and under his supervision, to work upon this cellar, and had fraudulently returned to the Department the time the men were thus engaged, thus causing them to be paid by the Department for labor performed on private work; that, notwithstanding the admission of Conboy himself that he borrowed powder, fuse and tools from Cornwell, both of these persons are yet retained in the service of the Department; that Mr. Tappen, the then acting President, and myself, the Chief Engineer, ought to have had them indicted for converting the public property to their own use, and had them excluded, by their conviction, from ever receiving or holding any office under the city Charter; that we have upheld them in despoiling the city—refused to invoke the most decided vindication of the law against them, and, by keeping them in service, have subverted "the good faith and honesty" of the Department.

Such is the substance of the reasons for which you are called to assist in removing me from my position as Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct Board—a position which I have held for the last eleven years, without having, so far as I am aware, ever incurred the slightest suspicion of dereliction in duty, of inability to discharge the responsible labors imposed upon me, or of want of fidelity to the public interests.

I shall answer them in the order in which they are above referred to, and shall, in doing so, examine somewhat minutely the various items of each charge.

RESERVOIR.

First. As to the Reservoir :

Under this head, in order to have the whole subject thoroughly understood both by you and the public, I am obliged to go into details which would be unnecessary if I were addressing a body of engineers.

It is necessary, then, to understand what this Reservoir is to be—what the land upon which it is constructed originally was—for what purpose the estimates of the various kinds of work upon it were made, and in what manner we arrived at the supposed quantities of work to be done.

The object of this construction is to obtain space for impounding or storing a sufficient quantity of water within the city limits, and in immediate connection with the street mains, to supply the inhabitants with water during such time as any repairs to the main aqueduct or conduit of masonry make it necessary to shut off the usual daily flow into the city. The present Reservoirs are insufficient for this purpose. The amount stored in them is so small, compared with the daily consumption, that we are unable to keep the water shut off during a greater period than seventy hours at a time, whatever repairs may be necessary; while the condition of some parts of the aqueduct is such, that the necessity for more thorough examination and repair than can be done in that period, is steadily becoming more pressing. This subject engaged my attention almost immediately after my original appointment as Engineer, and, foreseeing the importance of the early completion of this work, I urged forward, as far as lay in my power, the legislative steps necessary for its commencement. The property selected for its site was not, however, obtained until 1856, and the appropriation for its construction was not made by the Legislature until 1857. The site lies between Eighty-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets, and between Fifth and Eighth avenues, embracing an area of 106 acres, and, although situated at considerable height above the level of tide-water, the centre of it was a natural

basin, surrounded by land and rocks of various degrees of elevation. This basin was a swamp, or morass, covered more or less with water, and rendered difficult of accurate examination by the thicket which covered the surface and filled the soil with its matted roots. The Charter of the city required that this, like all other similar work, should be done by contract, and be awarded to the lowest bidder, without any distinction; and the established practice of the Federal, State and City Governments does not permit that work of this kind should be let or taken *in solido*, or by the lump. The practice requires that an *estimate* should be formed of the relative quantity of *each item or kind of work and material* to be employed in the entire construction, and that contractors should bid a certain *rate or price for each item or kind*. Such rates or prices, multiplied by the estimated quantities, would give the total result of each bid; and a comparison of such totals would determine who was, by the law, the lowest bidder. The undertaking of the work was not dependent on its cost. The Reservoir was *a necessity*, and would have been ordered by the city, even had the original estimate of its cost been double what it was. But even had the undertaking been dependent on its cost, so long as the government was not deceived by my estimate of the total cost (*which I shall clearly show hereafter*), minute exactitude in the relative proportions of the different quantities making this total cost was not indispensably necessary for the purpose of letting the work. It was desirable that they should be as exact as it was possible to determine; but as each contractor would bid upon the same estimate of quantities, and the real object was simply to ascertain, in obedience to the Charter, who was the lowest bidder upon a supposed

basis, it is clear that, when the estimate was made, the bidders stood equal, and upon the same footing with each other.

But how was even a probable estimate of each kind or item of work and materials required for the total construction to be ascertained? The *surface* of the entire area of 106 acres could be seen with the naked eye. In many cases, the surface gives indications of what will be found underneath. But this area of land was peculiar, as I have before described it; and who could tell *what would be found beneath its surface?* how much solid rock? what kinds of rock? how much earth? what kinds of earth? how much of the materials, either of earth or rock, would be fit to use in the construction? Engineers have no more power of subterranean insight than ordinary men. We did the only thing practicable in such cases. We examined with *unusual care* the entire surface, and by excavations in some places, and the use of iron "*sounding-rods*" at very short distances apart over the entire area, we arrived at an approximate result. Our borings with the rod were carried down as far as possible, sometimes reaching to the depth of thirty feet; but these soundings could not always be relied upon with entire certainty. In some cases, the rod might strike a rock, which would indicate the solid ledge, but which, upon the development of the work, would prove to be simply a large boulder, or else an upward projecting point, far above the general level of the ledge. So, also, with the kinds of rock and the kinds of earth, no data could be given which would be entirely reliable. The officer in immediate charge of these examinations was the present efficient engineer of the work, Captain George S. Greene, late of the United States Army, and for some

years Professor of Mathematics and Engineering at West Point Academy. A more thorough investigator or more upright man can nowhere be found. And I assert confidently that a closer approximation to the real quantities, as developed in the construction of this work, could not have been made on this piece of ground, unless at an expense which would be entirely unwarrantable. We did not, therefore, expect to obtain a result showing the *actual* number of yards of excavation, whether of earth or of rock, or the *precise character* and proportions of the materials which the site of the proposed Reservoir contained. We simply expected to obtain data which would enable the contractors competing for the work to form some judgment of its requirements and its cost, and thus put them on an equal footing, and further to enable me to give to our Board my own views of its probable total cost. The examinations resulted in the following estimate of quantities—I quote from the specifications :

“(31.) Quantities estimated for the construction of the work, on which the comparisons of bids will be made.

- * E. 792,519 cubic yards of excavation, composed as follows, viz : 63,304 cubic yards of soil and other materials not suitable for the construction of embankment, to be placed in spoil banks, within the space mentioned in specification (1), (of which 17,362 cubic yards will be placed on the outer slopes of the banks); and 25,000 cubic yards of excavation from the puddle ditches, to be placed in embankment or spoil bank ; 704,215 cubic yards of excavation for puddle and embankments.
- F. 284,894 cubic yards of rock excavation.
- G. 78,988 cubic yards of puddle in the ditches and embankment.
- H. 642,589 cubic yards of embankment, exclusive of the puddle bank.
- I. 20,938 cubic yards of broken stone lining of inner slopes.
- K. 47,111 cubic yards of stone paving or slope wall.
- K². 2,009 cubic yards of paving laid in cement.
- O. 555 cubic yards of brick wall, laid in cement.
- P. 833 cubic yards of concrete on the middle bank.
- Q. 54,000 square feet (superficial measure) of sheet piling.”

At the same time, being aware of the uncertainty of any quantitative estimate in a case of this description, and being desirous, on the one hand, that the city should be guarded against extra claims, and that, on the other hand, no competitor for the work should be misled, the following clause was inserted in the proposals, and immediately following the estimate of quantities :

" Other quantities, dependent on developments in the progress of the work, are not estimated. The foregoing are the quantities which have been estimated, approximately, for the construction of the work ; they form, however, no part of the contract, and persons bidding are cautioned, that the Croton Aqueduct Board do not hold themselves responsible that any of them shall strictly obtain in the construction of the work, and the contractors are required to examine the plans and the ground, and to judge for themselves, as well of the quantity, as the distance of haul, and other circumstances affecting the cost of the work, and to make their bids for each item independent of others, so far as relative quantities are concerned."

The above clause was also included in the contract and specifications.

The proposals having been advertised, bids were received on all the items of work and materials, from seventeen different individuals or firms. The bids were so much per foot or per yard for each item, and, multiplied by the estimated quantities, resulted in totals varying from \$614,001 97 to \$1,914,730 46. And this extraordinary difference in the *totals* was not greater than the rates or prices for which the different competitors proposed to perform the *various items* of the work—showing conclusively, what in practice is well known, that the price or rate at which a contractor is willing to do one portion of a large work, is no evidence that such rate or price is considered by him to be remunerative. They frequently propose to lose by some portions of the work, and to make up the loss by the price or rate which they will obtain for other portions.

The contract was awarded in the summer of 1857, by our full Board and the Comptroller of the city, to Fairchild & Co.; the law requiring such award to them as the lowest bidders complying with the ordinances prescribing the form of making bids. The total of their bid was \$632,473 33; that of the next highest bidders (Cummings & Co.) was \$729,807 25. The contract was not confirmed by the Common Council until the spring of 1858.

With these general explanations, I now proceed to the first sub-division of the Mayor's general charge in regard to the Reservoir. On the 2d of May, we furnished him, at his request, a table showing the quantities of work already done, and comparing them with the estimate; but without asking from us one word of explanation, he sends in his message of July 18th, in which he states that the following remarkable discrepancies appear between the work as done and as estimated.

INCREASE OF EXCAVATION.

First. "That the excavation has been increased from thirty to sixty thousand cubic yards, or seven per cent."

I have shown you the inherent difficulty in forming a close quantitative estimate for such a work on such ground, and the strong probability that the quantities would not be verified by the actual progress of the work. I have shown you that my experience enabled me to foresee these contingencies, and that I did foresee and did provide against extra claims against the city, by the warning to the contractors and the express stipulations of the contract itself. I will now show you, under each head, the special cause for such discrepancies, and I shall then leave you to

determine whether it is fair or manly to say of them, with obvious obliquity, *and without asking a word of explanation*, that they are "remarkable."

The exact quantity of excavation is even now a matter of conjecture; but whether it will involve an increase of seven per cent. or not, it is nevertheless true, that it will be considerably in excess of the amount as originally estimated. The reasons for such increase are these:

REASONS FOR INCREASE OF EXCAVATION.

First. When the work was commenced, the more depressed portions of the site of the Reservoir were very wet. To render it fit to receive the embankments, and also to enable us to procure, by excavation, proper material for those embankments, it was necessary to make large ditches through the site of the Reservoir to draw off the water.

This, of course, increased the excavation; that is to say, increased it to the extent of the number of cubic yards of excavation which each ditch contained.

Second. The material thus excavated, instead of being carried directly into embankments, was necessarily collected in temporary places of deposit. When the ground was sufficiently drained to permit the construction of embankment, it was necessary to remove the material from these temporary banks to permanent embankments, thus involving a double excavation. The work upon the Reservoir was commenced in the spring of the year 1858, when the ground was wet from the melting of the snow and from the spring rains; and far greater difficulty was experienced on this account than would have been the case

if the contractors could have entered upon it early in September, 1857, as was anticipated at the time the estimate was made and the contract awarded.

The Common Council, however, did not confirm the award of the contract soon enough to enable the contractors to commence the work at that time.

Third. Upon excavating, it was found that in many places the earth was not of proper quality for embankment, and the contractors were obliged to dig much lower in the site of the bottom of the Reservoir than was anticipated, to obtain earth which was suitable.

The contractors, it will be seen by a reference to the first section of the contract, were bound to take their materials for the construction of the Reservoir from the ground, if they could be obtained; and if they could not be obtained upon the ground, they were entitled to charge, for such of the materials as they procured *from other sources*, a price *additional* to that agreed upon in the contract for similar kinds of materials found *within* the lines of the Reservoir.

It was, therefore, to the interest of the city, that materials should, if possible, be obtained from the Reservoir grounds, and it was *to prevent an increase* in the price of the materials necessary for embankment, that I directed the increased excavation to be made *within* our grounds.

It was foreseen that this difficulty might arise, and a provision was inserted in the 10th section of the specifications, to this effect :

" (10.) The earth, within the working lines of the interior slopes of the basins, will be excavated to the depth of forty feet below the top of the exterior Reservoir banks,

and as much lower as may be required by the engineer, to obtain materials for the embankments or for the puddling. The surface of the bottom of both basins to be worked to the same depth, and to such slopes as the engineer may direct. The exact depth cannot be determined until the surface of the rock is uncovered. Whenever it may be necessary to go below the bottom of the Reservoir, as it shall be established by the engineer, to obtain materials for embankment or for puddle, the space so excavated shall be filled up with such waste materials as the engineer may direct."

Here, it is shown that we were fully authorized by the contract to order an increase in the excavation, should it become necessary for the purpose of obtaining materials for embankment. The necessity did arise, and the excavation was materially increased thereby. The pecuniary advantage accruing to the city (*not the contractors*) by the order to obtain the required quantity of material from *within* the limits of the Reservoir, will at once be perceived by referring to the Contract. Section

"(E.) For all excavation, whether hardpan, quicksand, stones, boulders, or otherwise, excepting solid rock which requires blasting, and excepting boulders more than half a cubic yard in capacity, and for disposing the materials according to the specifications in spoil bank, or in re-filling excavations made to obtain materials, or embankments, or puddle bank, or puddle, to be measured in excavation, twenty-one (21) cents per cubic yard.

"(H.) For embankments, including the soil one foot in depth on the outer slopes, and exclusive of all puddle and all masonry and broken stone on the slopes, in addition to the price paid for excavation in item E, or for furnishing materials in item N, when the engineer may direct, materials to be furnished from outside the Reservoir ground, to be measured in embankment, one (1) cent per cubic yard.

"(N.) For earth to be furnished for embankment, should the engineer direct any to be obtained *beyond* or *outside of the Reservoir* ground, in addition to the price paid for embankment in item H, to be measured in embankment, fifty (50) cents per cubic yard."

That is to say: If the earth for the embankment were furnished from within the Reservoir grounds, the contractors, for excavating and putting it in bank, were to receive 22 cents per cubic yard; if obtained from other sources, they were to receive 51 cents per cubic yard for it.

Fourth. The nature of the rock encountered in the actual working, materially added to the amount of rock excavation as originally estimated. In many places the rock was found to be of a porous, friable character, full of cracks and fissures, and utterly unfit for the base of the puddle trench. This contingency was also provided for.

The 12th section of the specifications in the contract contained this provision :

“ When any fissures, seams, or soft rock are found within the basin of the Reservoir, or under the banks thereof, the rock is to be excavated to such extent as the engineer may direct, and the space filled with concrete, puddle, earth, or sand, as may be required by the engineer.”

It will be apparent from the above, that not only was our Board authorized to carry out these portions of the contract providing for this *method* of prosecuting the excavation, but that my duty, as an engineer, left me no alternative but to avail myself of the *provisions made in the contract for this express purpose.*

Let us now proceed to the consideration of the second specification of the Mayor's charge, under the head of the Reservoir.

INCREASE OF PUDDLE.

2d. “ That the puddle has been *increased* by an amount of twenty-five or thirty thousand cubic yards, or thirty-seven per cent.”

Before entering upon this subject, I will briefly describe what “ puddle ” is :

A “ *puddle trench,* ” or “ *wall,* ” is a space in the centre of the embankment which surrounds the Reservoir. It is made of mixed materials (earth, clay, and sand) worked

together carefully with spades while wet. Properly made, it is impervious to water, and is the barrier on which we rely to prevent the banks from leaking. The embankment alone cannot be depended on for this purpose. Although in some degree water-tight, the main function of the embankment, exclusive of the "puddle," is to resist the lateral thrust of the impounded water. Below the base of the embankment, the space for this puddle is carried, in the form of a trench, to the solid rock. Above the base of the embankment it is carried up, or constructed, at the same time with the embankment, and it is then sometimes called a "puddle wall." If the embankment rests on, or starts from ordinary earth, and the puddle trench is not carried down to the rock, the water will pass through the earth below the puddle wall, and thus escape. To ensure perfect work, therefore, it is better to carry the puddle trench down to the rock in all cases where it can be reached, within available distance, unless, indeed, the earth on which the embankment rests is in itself impervious to water. In the new Reservoir the water will be enclosed by a puddle wall, resting upon the solid rock throughout its entire length. At no one point, therefore, can the embankment leak.

With these explanations and remarks, I will proceed to the

CAUSES OF INCREASE IN PUDDLE.

1st. The porousness and friability of the subterranean rock encountered in the puddle trenches, which, as I have above shown, caused an increase in the rock excavation, produced necessarily a corresponding increase in the puddle. In many cases the fissures and holes in the rock

rendered it utterly unfit for the bed or base of a puddle trench, and the contractors were required, in such cases, to continue their excavation until they reached a bed of solid rock which *was* suitable for this purpose. This, of course, produced both an increase of excavation and of puddle. The deeper the excavation for the puddle trench, the greater the amount of puddle required to fill it.

2d. In sounding the ground for estimates of quantities with the iron rods used for such purposes, an engineer is frequently deceived as to the amount of rock contained in the ground, from the fact of the rod happening to strike upon a boulder or a point of rock which appears to be the main ledge. This occurred in our examinations. Upon excavating, it was found, in many instances, that where solid rock was presumed to exist, the engineer's sounding-rod had been stopped by a boulder or by an upward projecting point of rock, and that the main ledge was far below the level indicated by the rod.

In some such instances we were obliged to go ten feet deeper to reach the main ledge of rock. Under the southern bank, we were compelled, by the character of the rock, after reaching the ledge, to excavate through it twenty feet further to get down to a bed which was proper for the puddle. The additional excavation, both of earth and rock (and the consequent increase of puddle), owing to these causes, under the western bank through the swamp, was exceedingly great, the character of the natural earth requiring its entire removal for a width equal to half the width of the base of the embankment. This excavation extended down to the rock, and the space was filled up with puddle—a proper and justifiable arrangement of materials.

By section (7) of the specifications and contract, you will see that the contingency of increase in this particular, also, was foreseen and provided for.

"(7.) Puddle ditches are to be excavated to the rock under the centre of all the embankments, where the rock is not lower than forty-six feet below the top of the exterior Reservoir bank: and *in any loose, broken, soft, or porous rock, the ditches will be excavated to such depth as the Engineer may direct.*"

So much for increase of puddle.

DECREASE IN EMBANKMENT.

The 3d sub-division of the Mayor's first charge is :

"That the embankment has been decreased by an amount of 215,565 cubic yards, or one-third less."

The reasons for this decrease are these :

1st. From the apparent nature of the ground, it was in many places uncertain how far we should have to go, below the natural surface, to find good material for the bed of an embankment. A large allowance was made for this, and provision made in the specifications for decrease, should it be found advisable. As our work was developed, it was found that at certain parts of the work we should not be obliged to go to such depth for a proper bed as we anticipated, and for which depth we very properly had made an estimate. Less embankment was, therefore, necessary—but for the same reason less excavation was required; first, the excavation required to go down to the proper bed for the embankment; and, second, the excavation necessary to obtain materials to make the embankment, had it (the embankment) not been thus decreased. As a yard of excavated earth will not make a yard of compacted embankment, the saving or decrease of excav-

ation by this development was more than twofold the amount of decrease in the embankment. Thus, a large amount was in reality saved to the city; and if the price for excavation in the contract was a remunerative one (which, notwithstanding the assumption of the Mayor, does not appear), this development, or so-called "change," was greatly against the interests of the contractor.

2d. Another reason for decrease is in the embankment yet to be done, and it is this: A road now contemplated by the Central Park Commissioners, around the Reservoir, enables us to fill against the outer slopes of our banks with waste materials out to a level with their road, instead of covering these slopes from top to base with a foot of selected soil for a turf protection to said slopes. The amount of this soil was originally included in the comparative estimate, as embankment.

STONE PAVING AND PAVING IN CEMENT.

The 4th and 5th sub-divisions of the Mayor's first charge are as follows:

"*Fourth.* That the stone paving has been decreased by an amount of 46,941 cubic yards, or $\frac{1}{284}$ only of the original amount."

"*Fifth.* That the paving in cement has been increased by an amount of 18,867 cubic yards, or more than nine times greater."

REASONS.

Inasmuch as the decrease in the dry slope wall, or what is designated in the contract as the "stone paving," arose from the same cause which increased the amount of the paving in cement, I shall answer these two sub-divisions together.

The increase in the paving in cement will be to a still greater amount than mentioned by the Mayor; to wit, it will be increased to the same extent as the dry or stone paving is decreased. To explain:

It will be seen by reference to section 19 of the specifications of the contract, that it is provided that,

"The interior slopes of all the banks will be covered with 8 inches in thickness of stone broken to pass through a two-inch ring; on this will be laid the paving, 18 inches in thickness, of a single course of stones set on the edge at right angles with the slope, *laid dry*, and well wedged with pinners. The stones to be laid in such manner as may be directed by the Engineer, the base of the paving to extend to the rock, or to such depth as the Engineer may direct; the stones to be sound; and of proper shape to make neat and compact work."

The original intention was, therefore, to build a dry or rip-rap wall on the interior slopes of the embankment.

The estimate of the quantity of paving required for these slopes was 47,111 cubic yards (see Estimate). This estimate will correspond almost exactly with the quantity which will be actually put up when the contract is finished. *The quantity of stone paving has not been increased or diminished.* It is simply laid up in cement, instead of being laid dry. The reasons and authority therefor I will now show.

It was found, as the excavation progressed and the character of the rock within the lines of the Reservoir was developed, that the stone was *unsuitable for a dry wall*. About 175 cubic yards of this wall *was* laid dry, and the stone was found to be so unfit for a serviceable wall, that the Board directed the contractor to take it down.

The question, therefore, arose whether the contractor should be allowed to furnish suitable material from *other* places *outside* of our lines, or whether the stone should be laid in *cement*. The contract contained full provisions to meet this contingency also. See contract (section 17).

"Should the excavation *within* the outer slopes of the exterior Reservoir banks not furnish sufficient material of a *suitable* quality for puddling and embankments, in the opinion of the Engineer, then the contractor will be required to furnish enough material to supply the deficiency, and of such quality as may be approved by the Engineer."

By section K of the Specifications it is provided that the contractor shall receive, "for paving or constructing slope-wall, *the stone to be taken from the rock excavated*, and for labor in constructing the same, \$1 25 per cubic yard."

By section K² it is provided, that for the same stone, "laid in cement mortar, including all labor and material to be measured in the work, the contractor shall receive \$4 00 per cubic yard."

By section L, it is provided that the contractors shall receive, "for stone to be furnished for the paving, in case the *stone should not be deemed suitable for paving by the Engineer*, in addition to the price above stated in item K, \$3 per cubic yard."

The price, therefore, for a *dry* wall to be paid to the contractors, in case they furnished the material from *outside* of the Reservoir lines, was by the contract \$4 25 *per cubic yard*; while the price to be paid to them, in case they used, for the wall, the stones found *within* the lines of the Reservoir, *laid in hydraulic mortar*, was, as above shown, *only \$4 per cubic yard*; and assuming that the total quantity of slope-wall when finished will correspond with the quantity estimated, to wit, 47,111 cubic yards, we shall have the whole laid up in *hydraulic mortar*, for \$11,444 42 *less* than it would cost if laid *dry* with any stone available outside the Reservoir ground.

The whole of this subject was most carefully and thoroughly examined by myself personally, and at different times by myself in conjunction with my colleagues in the Croton Board. The ground was visited, the stone examined, and the question, engaging as it did our earnest attention, was fully discussed in all its bearings.

Having become satisfied that it would be utterly impossible, within any reasonable expenditure, to construct a suitable *dry* wall out of the rock found within the lines of

the Reservoir, and the contract providing that the contractors should receive less for paving in cement-mortar with the stone found within the lines, than for building a dry wall out of stone procured by them elsewhere, at a meeting of the Croton Aqueduct Board, held on the 20th day of May, 1859, at which my then associates, Messrs. Myndert Van Schaick and Theodore R. De Forrest, were present, I introduced the following preamble and resolution, which were then unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, It has been found (by the Chief Engineer) that the excavation within the lines of the new Reservoir does not furnish stone of sufficiently good quality to make a suitable facing for the interior slopes, if laid dry, but that the same stone will make a good slope-wall, if laid in hydraulic cement; therefore,

"Resolved, That the said slope-wall be laid in cement to such extent as the nature of the stone may make it advisable; such change, and such character of the work being provided for in the contract."

It is proper to state in this connection, that a wall of stone laid in hydraulic mortar, in the manner in which this work is done, is better for the purposes for which it was designed, than any dry wall which could be constructed of any stone whatever, of equal dimensions.

The dry wall was originally selected as a matter of economy; and if the stone had proved good, a dry wall constructed of it would have been sufficiently substantial in the outset, though liable to require earlier repairs. When I found that the stone excavated would not answer the purpose, I abandoned the dry wall, and resorted to the substitute (*already provided for in the contract.*) which involved the least expense to the city.

In referring above to my colleagues, I would not be un-

derstood as wishing to divide the responsibility of this substitution. As the professional adviser of our Board, I gave my opinion—and gave it decidedly; and in this, as well as in all points touching the Reservoir, I am not only willing, but anxious to assume the entire responsibility. Everything that has been done, has been solely for the perfection of the work, and *nothing has been done which was not a clearly-expressed part of the contract*. Even had we not been so entirely fortified by the forethought shown, and provisions made in the contract, I would have recommended work for which there was no provision, rather than that the Reservoir should be imperfect. Nay, more—even could I have imagined that any one existed who could impute to me unworthy motives for my action, I would have advised or directed all that has been done under the contract, without reference to the question whether or not it would be beneficial to the contractors; and for this simple reason: that I owed it to the city to do their work honestly and well, without being deterred by the risk of personal calumny or contemptible suspicion.

There has been, in fact, therefore, *no decrease in the stone paving; the same amount* of stone paving will be laid as estimated—but instead of being laid dry, it is laid in hydraulic mortar for the reasons above stated.

INCREASE OF CONCRETE.

The 6th sub-division of the Mayor's first charge is:

"That the concrete masonry has been increased by an amount of 33,568 cubic yards, or more than forty times the quantity originally estimated."

The reason for this increase was the character of the rock hereinbefore described, as developed in the depths of

the excavation for the puddle trenches. It was found so full of fissures and seams, even after blasting the porous and disintegrated portion away, that it was deemed essentially necessary to cover it with a layer of concrete, as a bed or base for the puddle.

It was supposed there would be more or less of these fissures and seams encountered, but it was impossible to divine their number or extent, and therefore impossible to make any accurate estimate in respect to the quantity of concrete necessary to fill them.

Anticipating, however, that concrete might probably be required, the following provision was inserted in the contract:

"SECTION 12. Where any fissures, seams, or soft rock are found within the basin of the Reservoir, or under the banks thereof, the rock is to be excavated to such extent as the Engineer may direct, and the space filled with concrete, puddle, earth, or sand, as may be required by the Engineer."

As it could not be known whether it would be necessary to lay a bed of concrete for the puddle, and if so, to what extent, an estimate was made simply of the concrete which would be required on the surface of the middle or dividing embankment—833 cubic yards—which is just the amount which will be required there.

It will be seen from the above, that the variations from the estimated relative quantities by way of increase or diminution, in every item of work alluded to in the Mayor's message, have resulted either from the nature of the ground as developed, or the character of the materials as excavated; that the estimate itself was not, and was not intended to be, an accurate statement of quantities, but the best approximation to accuracy which, under the circumstances, could be obtained. As an engineer, I do not hesitate to

declare that the estimate was thus accurate in all its parts.

The only *apparent* change of plan from the requirements of the contract, was the substitution of a wall laid in hydraulic cement, for a dry wall on the interior slope of the Reservoir. I have shown that this "change" was foreseen and provided for, and was induced by the nature of the rock encountered, and by the desire on my part to avoid the necessity of procuring materials for a dry wall from outside the Reservoir lines, at a greater cost. I have also shown that this "*change*" (if that can be called a change which is provided for in the contract) was concurred in by the Croton Board, unanimously.

It may, however, be inquired what authority had the Croton Board to authorize this substitution. The answer will be found in the following extract from the contract itself, which not only authorizes all that we have done, but would have authorized an *actual change of plan*, had the developments of the work made a change necessary for its perfection:

"And said parties of the second part further agree, that said Croton Aqueduct Board, or the Engineer, may make alterations in plan, form, or dimension of said work, either before or after the commencement of the construction. If such alterations diminish the quantity of work to be done, they shall not constitute a claim for damages, or for anticipated profits on the work that may be so dispensed with. If they increase the amount of work, such increase shall be paid for only according to the quantity actually done, and at the price established for similar work under this contract; and the contract will be regarded as completely executed and fulfilled, when the work required by the altered plans is done and paid for, as herein provided.

"And it is further agreed, that if the work shall be increased by the enlargement of any part of the same, or by any contingent work which the Engineer may deem necessary to facilitate the execution, or *render the work in any particular conformable to local circumstances*, or which may be deemed by the Engineer necessary for perfecting the work, beyond what is provided for in this contract and specifications, such increase shall be paid for at the same rate as similar work is herein contracted to be paid for; and if such work is not similar to work herein contracted for, it shall be paid for as an extra item, at a price to be agreed upon previously to the commencement of such extra work."

It was under this authority that the Board acted in making this "change;" an authority which was reserved to them by the contract, for the *express purpose of meeting such an exigency.*

CHANGES BENEFICIAL TO CONTRACTORS.

But it is alleged against me, that "whenever these changes have been made, they have proved very beneficial to the contractors, and, in most instances, have largely increased the amount which the city must pay for the work."

What is the proof? The Mayor admits his ignorance of the subject. He says: "It requires either the professional knowledge of an engineer, or the experience of a contractor acquainted with such work, to determine the actual value of the different kinds of work required for the Reservoir." And he adds: "Not having this knowledge, I have availed myself of the opinions of the most skillful contractors." And where are their opinions? He finds them in the bids of Cummings & Co. *for those particular items of the work which happen to be lower than the bids on the same items by Fairchild & Co.* The total bid of Cummings & Co., was the next above to that of Fairchild & Co. What authorizes him to say that the bids of Fairchild & Co., being in some instances higher than those of Cummings & Co., show them to be remunerative? I have shown to you that, by universal experience, the bids for special items of a work are no evidence that such bids are remunerative; on the contrary, that bids on certain items are frequently made at a known loss. *Why select the bids of Cummings & Co., and ignore the bids of the sixteen other contractors?*

Take the items quoted by the Mayor :

Excavation has been *increased* beyond the estimate. Fairchild & Co. receive 21 cents. The bids for this item varied from 12 to 60 cents, one being at 12 cents, two at 20 cents, and Cummings & Co., being 22. Who can tell, testing the matter by such bids, whether 21 cents is remunerative or not? or, to use the language of the Mayor, "very beneficial to the contractors." By the test which he has adopted, of selecting the *bid* of Cummings & Co. as a criterion, Fairchild & Co. must be making the excavation *at a loss*.

Stone-paving has been *decreased* below the estimate. Fairchild & Co. receive 125 cents. The bids on this item varied from 90 to 750 cents, the bid of Cummings & Co. being 135. Who can say that it was "beneficial to the contractor" to have this item *decreased*, when other bidders were ready to do it at 90 cents?

Paving in cement has been increased above the estimate. Fairchild & Co. receive 400 cents. The bids on this item varied from 250 to 850 cents; that of Cummings & Co. being 350 cents. Who can say that the *increase* of this item was "beneficial" to the contractors at 400 cents, when other bidders were not willing to do it for double the amount of the compensation which they are to receive?

The *concrete masonry* has also been *increased*—Fairchild & Co. receiving 500 cents, the other bidders varying from 298 to 800 cents. Four only out of the seventeen bidders were willing to do it for less than 500 cents. Eleven bidders asked from 500 to 800 cents. Which was the remunerative price? Who can say that it was "beneficial" to Fairchild & Co. to do this item at their price?

But why, in this minute catalogue, did the Mayor omit another item, to wit, *puddle*, which, he says in another place, has been *increased* beyond the estimate more than 37 per cent? The bids on this item varied from 20 to 150 cents. Fairchild & Co. bidding the *lowest price of all*, viz, 20 cents; Cummings & Co. bidding 30 cents. Was this *increase* beneficial to Fairchild & Co.? By the test adopted by the Mayor it was very prejudicial to them. *Why, then, did he not mention it?*

The allegation of the Mayor, therefore, that, "whenever

these *changes* have been made, they have proved very beneficial to the contractors" (admitted by him to be made in total ignorance), is wholly contradicted by the only test by which he seeks to establish the charge.

Independent of this fallacious test, however, I am entirely satisfied, from my own observation and experience, that the prices paid Fairchild & Co. for the excavation and the puddle, the quantities of which have from necessity been largely increased, are not remunerative; that the other items of increase, to wit, the paving in cement, and the concrete masonry, considering the strict manner in which the contractors are held to the letter of their contract, are paid for at prices which are only fair and by no means extravagant.

In fact, in the original calculations of the cost of the entire work, made for the use and guidance of the Board before even the proposals were drawn, I set down the probable price for excavation and puddle at a higher figure than those payable under the contract; and the probable prices for slope wall, if laid up in mortar, and for concrete, at about the same figure as is now payable under the contract.

At this point may very properly be introduced a statement of what really was the original estimate of the cost of this Reservoir, in which the Mayor alleges so gross a mistake was made by the Engineer. The Mayor's charge is so worded as to lead you to the belief that my original estimate of the cost, exclusive of the gate-houses, was some \$630,000, and that its actual cost will be \$100,000 more than that sum. This, as he well knows, was simply the bid or estimate of Fairchild & Co., made in competing for

the work. Now, I am prepared to show you, that my original *estimate* of the probable cost of the whole work, exclusive of the gate-houses, made for the guidance of the City Government, was in round numbers \$1,025,000, instead of \$632,473 24, which was simply the bid of Fairchild & Co. If you will add what the Mayor is pleased to term my "mistakes" to this sum of \$632,473 24, you will still find that the total cost of the work will be at least \$100,000 less than my estimate, instead of being over \$100,000 more.* The reasons that my estimate will now be found to be ample, are, 1st, That my prices on the several items, making up the total, were higher than those *bid* by a majority of the competitors; and, 2d, because to this total, my experience as an engineer cautioned me to add sufficient to meet all the contingencies which have been already actually developed in the progress of the work, and which I have so minutely described.

From the facts here stated in regard to the extent of area, and the peculiar character of the ground, no one

* As it may be inferred from the Mayor's statement that the cost of the new Reservoir will be excessive, it is well to make here a comparison which will be understood at a glance :

The present Distributing Reservoir cost.....	\$434,551
The present Receiving Reservoir "	414,500
The new Reservoir now under construction will cost, including Gate-houses, and making full allowance for developments.....	1,000,000

No arguments as to the relative economy of building *large* or *small* Reservoirs will weaken the fact here shown; that, by comparison, the new Reservoir will be finished at an exceedingly reasonable price, to say the least.

will have been surprised to learn that the actual quantities have differed from the approximate estimate, while many will be surprised only because they differ so little. The *only point*, then, rests in the allegation of the Mayor, that these differences or variations have, in every case, proved beneficial to the contractors. I have said enough, I trust, to show that this charge, like its predecessors, is wholly unfounded.

MISTAKE IN AWARDING THE CONTRACT.

But it is said that I made a mistake in awarding the contract to Fairchild & Co., as lower bidders than Cummings & Co.

This is not true. In the first place, the award was not made by me personally, but by the entire Croton Aqueduct Board. In the next place, there can be no "mistake" in an estimate of this kind, where there is not only no assertion or even pretence of perfect exactness, but an actual provision for, and warning against contingent developments. In the third place, the award was *perforce* made in obedience to the Charter, which requires work to be let to the lowest bidder.

The Mayor does not pretend to deny that the bid of Fairchild & Co. was lower than that of Cummings & Co., by \$97,334 32, nor that the bids were tested by the estimate made for the purpose of ascertaining who was the lowest bidder, while it has been already fully shown no closer approximation to the developed facts than that estimate could have been made, without incurring an expense unwarranted by the circumstances.

RUMORS.

Having fully refuted all that is either openly uttered or covertly insinuated in the *expressed* charges of the Mayor as to the new Reservoir, I beg to call your attention, for a moment, to the extraordinary language with which he concludes this portion of his message.

He says: "In commenting upon this subject, I have abstained from giving currency to any of the *rumors* which have reached me." With what object, let me ask, was this allegation made? Were the rumors which float in the air of the Mayor's office true, or were they false? He does not condescend to inform you. What was their substance? He does not state. From whom did they proceed? and who were engaged in their promulgation? He is silent. Did they come from the vicious and corrupt, whose efforts at extortion I have baffled and defeated? or from some schemer for my office? or from the parasites of power, who hoped for favor, by offering up the incense of my slaughtered reputation? He does not inform you. He merely states that he has "abstained from giving currency to any of the rumors." If he professed to be too honorable to give them currency, why did he not abstain from stating the fact, if *such a fact there be*, of their existence? Was it intended to set the imagination of men at work, and to allow them to give these rumors their form and feature, each according to his own fertility and caprice? I have now been engaged nearly twenty-five years in the arduous duties of my profession. For eleven years past I have been known to my fellow-citizens in the responsible position I now hold. Both here and in other places, I have successfully prosecuted important public works,

costing millions of dollars, and until I read this message of the Mayor, I never heard of any remarks prejudicial in the slightest degree to my reputation. For my own part, I do not believe that the Mayor has ever heard a whisper to that effect from lips that were honest ; and I ask you, and all men, who, having character, knows its value, what expression in the English language is applicable to one who, in hunting a man down for his office, attempts in this manner to "*rumor*" *away his reputation*?

PAVING OF FORTY-NINTH STREET.

I ask your attention now to the second charge of the Mayor, viz. :—

That in the work of paving Forty-ninth street, from Third to Lexington avenue, with trap-blocks, the Engineer did not exercise proper vigilance; that the materials employed were not in accordance with the contract, but that an inferior quality of stone was used, and also that the work was performed in so negligent a manner, as to cause it to settle in many cases immediately after its completion ; that the Croton Board had notice of the defective character of the material employed in the work, but notwithstanding, gave a certificate of its completion and acceptance.

What is the proof to sustain this accusation ? Nothing more than the unsworn statement of nine persons claiming to be owners of property on the line of the street, and interested in defeating the assessment for the work.

Did the Mayor investigate this charge ? Does he believe it to be true ? On the contrary, in the same breath in which he makes the charge, he expresses entire ignorance of it ; because he says "*either* the property owners are utterly mistaken in their emphatic condemnation of the work, *or* Mr. Craven has been guilty of gross negligence in its supervision and examination." I will now proceed to show the facts of the case.

I find upon inquiry of the Water Purveyor, who is charged by law with the superintendence of paving, that the work was commenced on the fifth day of October, 1859, (but six days preceding the date of the alleged notice; that immediately after the notice, he inspected the stone brought upon the ground by the contractor; that he called out and rejected all the stone which was not in accordance with the contract, and that such stone was then removed from the ground; that he visited the work daily for the purpose of seeing that it was properly done and in accordance with the contract; and that after the 25th of October, Mr. Eldridge, who was then appointed General Inspector of Paving Contracts, visited the street twice a day for the same purpose. Each of these officers reports further, that, whenever he found any stone not in accordance with the contract, he threw it out, and ordered the Inspector on the work to do the same. This was done to such an extent that the contractor and his friends complained to the Water Purveyor against what they termed his persecution.

The contractor was Mr. W. A. Cummings, one of the most respectable and reliable contractors in the city.

On the 10th day of November, 1859, the Inspector in charge of the work made return under oath to the Board, that it had been completed in conformity to the specifications of the contract. The Water Purveyor subsequently certified his approval of the same, and it was thereupon sent to the Bureau of Assessments for their action thereon.

The remonstrants, if injury had been done to them by the Croton Board, had then an opportunity of appearing before the Assessors, a body entirely distinct and free from the control of the Croton Board. It appears by the pa-

pers on file that they did so—that they were heard before the Assessors, and that the Board of Assessors decided that they had failed to make a case which would warrant them in refusing to make an assessment. It also appears by the report of the Committee on Assessments of your own Board, that they did not consider the remonstrances, attached to the assessment list by the Assessors, as required by law, sufficient to delay the confirmation of the assessment. The Board of Councilmen concurred with your Board in confirming the assessment. It was reserved for the Mayor to discover that the Water Purveyor, two Inspectors on the work, three members of the Croton Board, three Assessors, the Committees on Assessments of both Boards, and a majority of the Board of Aldermen and Councilmen, were all wrong in regard to this matter, and that the owners of property, assessed for the improvement, were right. One word as to the signatures attached to the remonstrance before the assessors. The name of J. M. Henry appears among the signatures. Mr. Henry, I am informed, is employed in the office of the Assessors, and was requested by Mr. Saxton, whose name heads the signatures to one of the remonstrances, to erase his name. Mr. Henry accordingly drew his pen through the name of Mr. Saxton, and to show that it had been stricken out by authority, wrote his own name opposite to the erasure. And yet Mr. Saxton and Mr. Henry are returned to you by the Mayor, as two of the eleven owners of property who remonstrated against the assessment.*

* It is a little curious that the most prominent citizen on the list of remonstrants has assured me, since the attempt of the Mayor to remove me, that he took much trouble to obtain an opportunity of signing one of the numerous remonstrances against the proposed action of the Mayor.

SEWER IN FORTIETH STREET, NINTH AVENUE, THIRTY-NINTH STREET, ETC.

I have now to call your attention to the third charge of the Mayor. He says :

"That an error of eight inches in the maximum depth was made in the grade of a sewer now in progress in Fortieth street, Ninth avenue, Thirty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, which error may involve the city in litigation and loss, and which throws a serious responsibility on the Engineer of the Board, showing the want of the constant care and entire accuracy demanded of one to whose professional skill is intrusted the construction of important public works."

The Croton Board, intending to make a contract for this work, directed one of the City Surveyors to prepare a plan and profile of the sewer, by which the specifications for the work could be drawn and the contract let. It must be borne in mind that City Surveyors are appointed by the Common Council, and although the Croton Board has no voice in their recommendation or control over their appointment, they yet are obliged to employ them on all work which is to be paid for by assessment. The City Surveyor selected for this work was in good standing, and had been employed on similar work, in common with the other City Surveyors, for many years, to the entire satisfaction of the Board. He made the plan and profile, but it appears after the contract had been let and the work was progressing, that he had erred in his minutes of the depth of excavation for the sewer trench. By this error, *neither the original plan, nor line nor the efficiency of the sewer itself was in any degree altered or impaired.* The simple effect was, that at the corner of Ninth avenue and Thirty-ninth street, the contractor, in order to get down to the proper grade, was obliged to excavate eight inches deeper than was indicated by the levels given on the original profile

on which the contractors had based their proposals. This additional eight inches of excavation became *extra work*, for which the contractor is undoubtedly entitled to compensation. As soon as the error was discovered and reported to me, I conferred with the Corporation Counsel, and our Board have, in his opinion, and by his advice, done all that is necessary for the protection both of the contractor and the public.

Although I will not allow any one to throw upon me the mistakes in levels, *however rare*, of any of the thirty or more surveyors, who are appointed by the Common Council, and whom we are obliged by ordinance to employ, justice to the surveyor in question has led me to make a fuller explanation on this charge than for myself I would have made.

RETENTION OF CORNWELL AND CONBOY IN THE EMPLOYMENT
OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The fourth charge of the Mayor is as follows :

That John Cornwell and William Conboy, employees of the Department, who had a private job for the excavation of a cellar at Yorkville, were accused before the Croton Aqueduct Board in December, 1859, by John Chappel, and three others, to the effect that Cornwell had furnished powder, fuse and tools belonging to the Department to aid in the performance of this private contract, and had allowed men in the employ of the Department and under his supervision to work upon this cellar, and had fraudulently returned to the Department the time they were thus engaged in this private contract—thus causing the men to be paid by the Department for labor performed on private work; that notwithstanding the admission of Conboy himself that he borrowed powder, fuse and tools from Cornwell, both of these persons are yet retained in the service of the Department; and that Mr. Tappan, the then acting President, and myself, the Chief Engineer, ought to have had them indicted for converting the public property to their

own use, and had them excluded by their conviction from ever receiving or holding any office under the city Charter; that we have upheld them in robbing the city of public property—refused to invoke the most decided vindication of the law against them, and, by keeping them in service, have subverted the good faith and honesty of the Department.

These are very serious charges, alleging very enormous offences, and conveyed in very strong language, suited, if true, to their enormity.

What are the facts? Conboy had been a laborer in a gang of which Cornwall was foreman, and got a job, when he was not in our employment, for excavating a small private cellar at Yorkville. His fellow-laborers, in the same gang, helped him in the work at such intervals as they were not required by our Department, which they had a right to do. John Chappel and three others were laborers whom we had discharged, and who, for some reason or other unknown to me, bore very ill-will against Cornwall, whom we had retained. They brought before the Board several accusations against him, to wit:

1st. That Cornwall was interested in the job with Conboy.

2d. That Cornwall used the powder, fuse and tools of the Department in its execution.

3d. That he returned the time of the fellow-laborers on the job as time expended in the service of the Department, and received pay accordingly; and,

4th. That they thereby excavated this cellar at the cost and expense of the city.

These charges were carefully, patiently, and thoroughly investigated by our full Board, Honorable Myndert Van

Schaick* in the chair. The examination took three or four days, about four hours each day. The testimony was contradictory, and failed utterly to prove the slightest fraud, or attempt at fraud, on the part of either Conboy or Cornwell. Judging from the testimony and the manner of the witnesses in giving it, the members of the Board were immediate and *unanimous* in their conviction that no possible suspicion of dishonesty could attach to the accused. This opinion, drawn from the evidence as heard and listened to, was, moreover, fully in accordance with the character of Cornwell, who, through a steady service in the Department since its creation in 1849, had proved himself at all times, and under all trials, unquestionably entitled to our unreserved confidence.

Two facts, however, were proved, which we deemed of some importance:

1st. That Cornwell did lend to Conboy, at some unexpected emergency arising in the excavation, one keg of powder (worth about \$2 75); 150 feet of fuse (worth about \$1 75); and five or six picks, the property of the city. It was proved, however, beyond all doubt, that these articles were returned, and that not a penny of loss was sustained by the city, and that nothing was further from the intention of these men than to convert the public property to their own use. The powder agent who supplies contractors from the magazine, only makes his rounds about once a week, and it is customary for contractors and gangs of workmen who happen to be without powder, when they

* The Mayor must know that Mr. Tappen, the Assistant Commissioner, was not then acting President, as he alleges. The examination was in the early part of December, 1859, and Mr. Van Schaick did not tender his resignation until after Mayor Wood's assumption of office.

encounter a wet piece of rock which requires immediate attention, to borrow powder and fuse from each other.

2d. It was also proved that Cornwell had returned, on the pay-roll of the Department, three or four days more time for one of the men than the man had made in the service of the city. In excuse for this mistake, it appeared that he was at that time in charge of two gangs of men, working in different streets, and at considerable distance from each other; that this was done to save the Department the expense of an additional foreman; that in taking the time of the men on these two gangs he trusted, on the occasion above referred to, partially to a hasty look at the gangs, and partially to the report of the laborer who acted as sub-foreman during his absence. This was deemed gross negligence, and for this, as well as for lending the powder, fuse and tools, he was severely reprimanded; but, both because of his long-trying fidelity, and the entire disproof of the main and very serious charges under which he was tried, it was deemed neither expedient or justifiable to dismiss, or even suspend him from the works.

On the 25th day of February last, the Mayor sent a note asking for the papers and testimony in the case. They were promptly and cheerfully given. If looked at in the light in which the Mayor has viewed our action, is it not strange that we should have preserved so carefully such a record of it, and have been so willing at all times to submit it to the public for examination and criticism? After reading them, he expressed surprise that Cornwell should be retained in the Department. Mr. Tappen and I immediately went to him and told him all the circumstances, and how different was the impression of the

Board while listening to the evidence and looking at the persons giving it, from what it might be on merely reading the written testimony; but that if he still thought, in view of the *written* testimony, that it was injudicious to keep Cornwell, rather than that the good name of the Department should suffer, we would remove him. The Mayor replied, that under the circumstances, he wished us to let Cornwell stay for the present.

The substance of this conversation I repeated frankly to Cornwell, and advised him to see the Mayor for his more perfect satisfaction in the matter; which he said he would do, and if he could not satisfy him he would resign cheerfully, rather than give us any annoyance. He called on the Mayor in company with Councilman Baulch, when, as I understood from both Cornwell and Baulch, the Mayor said he (Cornwell) had better stay where he was. Since that time the Mayor has regularly, *every fortnight, approved and countersigned the warrants* necessary for the payment of Cornwell and Conboy.

Against the laborer, Conboy, nothing whatever was proven, and of course nothing whatever was done.

A simple comparison of the charge of the Mayor in this matter, with the facts above stated, will make further comment on this point unnecessary.

SERIOUS DISAGREEMENTS AND INSUBORDINATION.

Having examined the four different accusations, with their several sub-divisions, contained in the second message of the Mayor, I have now to ask your attention to his first message, in which he urges my removal upon the ground of "*serious disagreements and insubordination.*"

I am at a loss to understand how there can be any *disagreements*, between me or the Croton Board and the Mayor, in the discharge of our duties, because, by the laws and the distribution of powers confided to each, there is no subject upon which it is necessary that we should *agree*. The action and decision of the Board on the matters within their jurisdiction are final and conclusive; there cannot, therefore, be any "disagreement" between us; there may be *dissatisfaction*.

Nor can I understand how I can be guilty of "insubordination" to *him*. I am not "subordinate" to him in any sense whatever. I am an engineer. He is a layman. I am an officer, employed professionally on the plans and execution of public works requiring skill and science. He is the Mayor of the city, and modestly, but justly, acknowledges his total ignorance of both. The law has committed, therefore, no such folly as making me, in my official capacity, "subordinate" to him; and the act of 1849, organizing the Croton Board, and defining the duties of the Chief Engineer, places this fact beyond a doubt.

The language and spirit of that act, and appointment for five years, and numerous other items, show the clear intention of the Legislature, that this most important branch of the public service should be saved, as far as possible, from the baneful effects of the changes of party, and the demands of patronage. The Mayor is authorized and required to see that the laws and ordinances, as adopted, are honestly and faithfully executed by us. And in case of fraud, or neglect on our part, he has the power to ask for our removal, by and with the concurrence of the Board of Aldermen, for causes to be stated. But he has no power

to suspend the operation of a law, or of an ordinance once enacted, nor to interfere in the plans of public works under our charge, nor with the appointments or pay of the agents whom we shall select for their execution.

He has the power, however, and is required to countersign all warrants drawn by the Comptroller, for the payment of money from the public treasury. The Mayor may, of his own mere will, refuse to sign warrants for the payment of workmen legally employed.

In either case, if the Department is anxious for the dispatch of the work, and is yet unwilling to resort to the slow and compulsory process of the Courts, they are obliged to yield to the demands of the Mayor, who thus obtains, by usurpation, a power over the Department which the law never intended to give.

INTERVIEWS WITH THE MAYOR.

With these preliminary observations, I shall give you a statement of my official intercourse with the Mayor, since the first of January last, and you will then be enabled to judge what are the facts, which, with odd confusion of ideas, he denominates "serious disagreements" and insubordination," and whether they constitute a cause for *my* removal. He has not sent to your Board any statement of the facts upon which he relies to uphold these charges, and I might, therefore, dismiss them with the above remarks; but I prefer to give the following account, for the complete understanding of the whole subject, and to enable you to form your own judgment as to the real motives of his last message.

The occasions which arose, calling for official intercourse

between the Mayor and myself, were of a two-fold character.

First. The refusal of the Mayor to sign warrants for the payment of expenses in constructing certain public works, authorized by the Common Council, at one time on the ground that the ordinances were illegal, and at another time because he did not like our plan of construction. And,

Secondly. An attempt to coerce the Board in the selection of their inspectors of work.

It is provided by the act entitled "An act to create the Croton Aqueduct Department in the city of New York, passed April 11, 1849," as follows :

" § 4. The Croton Aqueduct Board, in addition to the matters charged upon them by the said amended Charter, are hereby charged with the preservation of the Croton lake and waters, with the preservation of the banks of the Croton river from injury or nuisance, with the execution of such measures as may be necessary to preserve and increase the quantity of water, and keep it pure, with the management, preservation, and repairs of the dam, gates, aqueduct, high bridge, reservoirs, mains, pipes, pipe yard, and property of every description belonging to the water-works ; and they shall have the construction of such new works, and the purchase and laying down of such mains and pipes as the Common Council may authorize ; and also the construction, repairs, and cleansing of all the sewers and underground drains, but subject to the orders and directions of the Common Council, as to the times and places of building new sewers, and to the general plan which has been or may be adopted for the sewerage and drainage of said city. They shall be responsible for the supply of water, and the good order and security of all the works, from the Croton lake to the city, inclusive ; for the exactness and durability of the structures which may be erected, and of the daily work to be performed ; and for the sufficiency of the supply in the pipe-yard to meet every casualty ; and for the fidelity, care and attention of all persons employed by the department in watching the works and in making constructions and repairs ; and shall inspect thoroughly the interior of the aqueduct, and make the necessary repairs at least twice in each year."

" § 7. * * * * * They shall appoint and employ all the clerks, foremen, mechanics, keepers, watchers, laborers and other persons whom they may judge to be necessary for the performance of their duties, under this act, except the officers and clerks in the Bureau of the Water Register, and shall require such bonds and securities as they may deem proper, from such of said officers and servants as they shall appoint."

It will thus be seen that, by law, the greatest responsibilities are cast upon the Croton Board, and that, consequently, the *plans of work*, and the *selection of agents* in their execution, are confined to that Board *exclusively*.

It had for a long time been our anxious desire to increase, as a matter of public necessity, the daily flow of water into the city. For this purpose, it was absolutely necessary to enlarge the capacity of the pipes over the High Bridge and between the two Reservoirs.

To accomplish this object at the High Bridge, without, at the same time, during the construction, cutting off the flow of the water through the aqueduct, is a very delicate operation in engineering. Certain portions of the work could be done very easily by contract, but other portions of it would be utterly unsafe to commit to any contractor whatever. They should be performed by the Board, under the direct supervision of the Engineer and his assistants.

To ensure this necessary control over the portions referred to, we asked for, and obtained from the Common Council, on the 31st December last, an ordinance (passed by a three-fourths' vote, as required by law), permitting this work to be done by the day. This ordinance or resolution was signed by Mayor *Tiemann*.

Early in the current year, it became necessary, in consequence of a change made in the grade of Eighth avenue, to lower the main conduit-pipe in that avenue, to conform to the new and reduced grade. The main through this avenue supplies the daily wants of a large portion of the western part of the city. To strip this pipe, excavate a trench twelve feet deep below it, in some places through

solid rock, and to lower the pipe to the bottom, *without shutting off or interrupting the entire flow of water through it, for even one minute*, was also a work too delicate to commit to the hazards of a contract. There was also less danger here, than will be in some points of our work on High Bridge, but still there was sufficient risk to make it our duty to ask for permission to do this work also by the day. A resolution to that effect was passed on the 22d day of February, 1860. This resolution was indentical, *as to its legality*, with the one passed in reference to the High Bridge. This was signed on the 28th day of February by Mayor *Wood*.

On or about the 13th March, 1860, both these works were commenced, and after considerable progress had been made, and the Comptroller had signed the warrants for the payment of the workmen, we were surprised to hear that the Mayor refused to countersign them.

On the 16th May, the Croton Board, upon my motion, passed the following resolution :

"Whereas, A question has arisen as to the legality of the resolution under which this Board is now proceeding with the improvements at the High Bridge, and the lowering the main pipes on the Eighth avenue by 'days' work,' instead of by contract :

"Resolved, That until his Honor the Mayor decides whether he will approve of the prosecution of the work in its present form, all the said work at the High Bridge and Eighth avenue be suspended."

On the 22d May, the Board sent the following letter to the Mayor:

CROTON AQUEDUCT DEPARTMENT,
New York, May 22, 1860.

TO HON. FERNANDO WOOD, *Mayor, &c.*:

The lowering of the main Croton pipe in Eighth avenue by days' work, in obedience to a resolution of the Common Council, passed February 28, 1860, having been suspended on the 16th instant, in consequence of some doubts expressed by your Honor as to the legality of the resolution referred to, the Croton Aqueduct Board beg leave to make the following statement and inquiry:

The lowering of the pipe became necessary, as your Honor has already been informed, by the alteration of the grade in the said avenue. The lineal distance for which the pipe must be lowered is about the third of a mile; the maximum vertical depth to which it must be depressed to conform to the new grade, is about twelve feet.

The daily supply of the western portion of the city makes it necessary that the flow through this pipe be entirely uninterrupted. To lower this pipe, thirty inches in diameter, when full of water, even one foot below its original bed, without breaking a joint, or without other accident, could not, with any safety, be done by contract. To lower it the entire distance required, (without drawing off the water,) by contract, would involve a risk amounting almost to a certainty of an accident, against the disastrous consequences of which no amount of security received from the contractor could be set off as a compensation. It was for this reason alone, that the Croton Aqueduct Board asked that such work should be under the absolute control of the Engineer supervising it, so that he could at any moment either decrease or increase the extent of his operations, or stop the work altogether, as the exigencies of the moment might make necessary, without being influenced, as would be a contractor, by the desire, for pecuniary reasons, to drive the work to the utmost verge of safety.

It was for these reasons alone that the Croton Board asked for the authority to do the work otherwise than by contract.

When our operations were suspended, the pipe had already been stripped of its covering, a large portion of the new bed on the lower grade prepared by excavation, &c., and the pipe supported above it by the screws and other appurtenances necessary for the lowering. The process of lowering had also been commenced. The pipe now stands

on temporary supports, at some distance above the surface of the avenue; and although every precaution and care have been taken to render it secure and prevent any accident, it is by no means in a position of absolute safety.

We would further beg leave to say, that in the contract made by the Street Commissioner for grading said avenue, a specified time was reserved, during which this Department should have a right to the possession of this portion of the avenue, for the purpose of lowering the pipe. No more of that time now remains to us than is necessary for the work we have to perform.

Under these circumstances, we have deemed it our duty to make this statement, and to ask whether, in your opinion, the necessity of the case requires that the work in question should be resumed, and whether, in the event of its resumption, you will sign the warrants for the money required in its prosecution.

On the 23d May, a letter was received from the Mayor in reference to the work on the Eighth avenue, as follows:

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
New York, May 23, 1860.

THOMAS STEPHENS, Esq.,

President Croton Aqueduct Department:

SIR:—In reply to the communication from the Croton Aqueduct Department of the 22d instant, I beg leave respectfully to say, that for the reason stated—as well as that in my judgment the proposed lowering of the main Croton pipe in Eighth avenue *by days' work does not conflict with the city Charter*—I have no objection to the renewal of that work forthwith.

On the 31st May, the Board again addressed to the Mayor another urgent request to countersign the warrants for the High Bridge, as follows:

CROTON AQUEDUCT DEPARTEENT,
May 31, 1860.

To His Honor, FERNANDO WOOD, *Mayor, &c.*:

SIR:—The work which was in progress for the improvement of the High Bridge was suspended at the same time the operations in lowering the main pipe in Eighth avenue were suspended, and for the same reason, viz., the question raised as to the legality of the resolution under which we were acting.

This resolution was passed by the last Common Council, on a representation, by this Board, of the great risk which would be incurred in doing the necessary work by contract. The great mass of the materials to be supplied, and a large portion of the mechanical part of the work can be done by contract; but a part of it cannot be so done, without danger as imminent as that set forth in our communication to you as to the work on Eighth avenue, dated May 22d. Should an accident occur on High Bridge, the supply of water would be cut off, not solely from a portion of our streets, but from the entire city.

Under these circumstances, we beg leave to set before you this urgent expression of opinion that, so far as the safety of the city requires it, this work should be done by the day.

This embraces but a very small portion of the entire work, and we beg to ask whether, in view of the necessity, which urged our Board to ask for the resolution above referred to, you will countersign the requisitions drawn for such expenses as may be incurred in prosecuting, otherwise than by contract, such portions of the work as, in the judgment of this Board, it is utterly unsafe to allow to be done by contract.

It will thus be seen that down to the date of this letter, the Mayor had undertaken to determine (as in the case of

Cornwell and Conboy), whom we should retain in our employment, and whom we should dismiss, and (as in the case of the High Bridge and that of the Eighth avenue) what work we should do and what work we should not do, although both involved the same points of legality. All these questions were, as I have shown, placed, by the law, exclusively within the jurisdiction of our Board. We were, however, compelled to submit, because, without money to pay the men, no work could be done.

But the Mayor made further demands; he notified the Board that he required that all Inspectors appointed by us should be sworn before him at his office. This course was unusual, had never before been adopted, and was not required by the act of 1849; but, wishing to interpose no objection, so far as the mere ministerial administration of the oath was concerned, we directed the Inspectors to attend upon him for that purpose.

About this time—the last week in May—the rumor prevailed in the city and in the public prints, that the Mayor intended to remove all the Heads of Departments, myself included.

When I heard the rumors, I called upon him, and for reasons which will suggest themselves to your minds, I beg leave to state our conversations somewhat minutely.

I told him frankly, that perhaps my calling might be considered rather abrupt, under the circumstances, but as I was generally in the habit of going at my object in a straightforward way, I could not help doing so in this case. First telling him what I had heard, I said that, as I presumed the only good grounds for removing an officer

were either the want of ability or fidelity, and as I had been flattered, by the general voice of the community, into the belief that the first charge *would not probably* be the one, and as I was conscious that the second *could not possibly* be brought against me, I presumed he must be under some misapprehension or misinformation in regard to facts, and I, therefore, called to ask him if such were the case, and to say that I was ready to answer and give explanations upon any points required.

He said that *he had heard of nothing and knew nothing against me,** and had not yet told any one he intended to remove me. I told him that my object was not to ascertain what he had told any one, but what he intended to do. He then said, in so many words, that he had not arrived at his present position without a severe struggle, and without incurring many obligations; and that *his object in removing heads of Departments was to get control of the Departments, so that he could put in those who would co-operate with him, and, also, could pay off his obligations.*

Some other conversation ensued, which was mere amplification of this. As I was going out, the Mayor told me that he had not yet made up his mind what he would do, but that he would not act at all in my case, until he had seen me again.

A few days after this, he sent for me. When I came to his office, he told me it was said that an arrangement had been made by me with the Board of Aldermen, by which I

was guaranteed my place, on condition that they should have all the patronage. I replied, that it was out of my power to prevent such calumny; and that no friend of mine would believe me capable of doing anything of the kind.

He said it was an Alderman who was friendly to me that had made the statement "that I did not want the patronage, and had said I wished it were in my power to get clear of it." I answered, that so far as patronage *per se* was concerned, it was very true that I did not want it, for even if I had friends to provide for, all personal feeling would be entirely secondary to my duty to the public as Engineer, which required me to select foremen for their merits alone; that the pressure of politicians upon me in behalf of their friends was so great for every place, however insignificant, that the selection of inspectors was one of the most wearing and unsatisfactory labors of my office; and that, if I could do so conscientiously, I would willingly let Aldermen or any other person select for me; but that, while I was willing and anxious to accommodate the Common Council by the employment of their friends to the utmost of my power, my regard for my professional reputation, and for my duty, would always forbid my yielding to any one uncontrolled power to appoint inspectors over work for which *I was solely responsible*.

That I never had, and never should, forget myself so far as to make any such agreement with any body of men, or with *any single man*; that strong as was my desire to retain my position until the Reservoir was finished, (it being a work which could not but prove a great credit, professionally and publicly, to all who are engaged upon it,) the

desire was not so strong as to make me forget my duty as a man and an officer, and that I would not hold my place at the expense of any *such breach of trust as that implied in his remarks*. The conversation then ended, and I withdrew.

A few days after this interview, I was informed that the Mayor refused to swear in an inspector whom the Croton Board had appointed to supervise the construction of a sewer in the Sixth avenue, between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, by contract.

This refusal made it quite evident that the order of the Mayor before mentioned, requiring all inspectors to be sworn before him, was intended to include something more than the mere ministerial administration of the oath; yet we submitted.

On the 2d of June, 1860, the subject of this refusal, and the continued suspension of the work at the High Bridge, came under the consideration of the Croton Aqueduct Board, which, on my motion, adopted the two following resolutions:

(Extract from minutes, Croton Board.)

Resolved, That J. J. Noble be suspended until the Mayor shall have time to investigate certain charges alleged against him.

Resolved, That a communication be sent to the Mayor, stating the necessity for going on with the work at High Bridge, and asking whether he will countersign the warrants therefor."

On the ninth day of June, the Mayor sent to our Board the following letter, exculpating the Inspector:

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
New York, June 9, 1860.

I am satisfied that the charges against J. J. Noble are unfounded.

FERNANDO WOOD.

At the time this letter was received, I was absent, owing to illness, but I am informed by my colleagues that Noble was sent back again to *the sewer* on which he was first appointed; but that the Mayor refusing to recognize him on that sewer, he was *again withdrawn*.

On the 20th of June, the Board again addressed another letter to the Mayor, in regard to the High Bridge, as follows:

CROTON AQUEDUCT DEPARTMENT,
June 20th, 1860.

To HIS HONOR FERNANDO WOOD, *Mayor, &c.*

SIR:—The Croton Aqueduct Board beg leave respectfully to call your attention to their communication of May 31st, relative to the proposed improvement of High Bridge.

Copies of opinions of the Corporation Counsel, given in reply to a question submitted by one of the Committees of the Board of Aldermen; and, also, to a question submitted by this Board, are herewith furnished; the points involved being similar to those raised in the matter above referred to.

The work of enlargement on High Bridge was authorized to be done by days' work, on the 31st day of December, 1859.

The work, preparatory to the construction of a new pipe, was commenced on the 13th day of March, 1860. The work was suspended, at the request of the Mayor, and by order of the Croton Aqueduct Board, on the 16th of May, 1860. The gravel covering of the Bridge and pipes had, at that time, been removed, and the dry wall around the gate-house, on the Manhattan side, had been taken up, preparatory to making a connection with the gate-house.

The Bridge is now, and has been since operations on it were suspended, in this exposed condition, and it is most important that some definite conclusion in regard to it should be arrived at, without further delay.

If the work is to be abandoned, the covering mass and material which has been removed from the pipes and masonry should be replaced, as a protection. If it is to be prosecuted, no time is to be lost. The delay already experienced will make it necessary to cover

with a temporary roof, extending the whole length of the Bridge-work, which must now be unavoidably left unfinished. Further delay will render it impossible to get our pipe-work in such a state of forwardness as to be available during the coming winter. During the cold weather of last winter, the water in the lower Reservoir was reduced to so low an ebb, as to create serious apprehensions of the result of any large fire which might have occurred at the time. During the coming season, the increased population of the city will superinduce an increased consumption of water, and the difficulties and risks heretofore encountered will be proportionably magnified, unless the proposed improvements be completed. These improvements are the enlargement at the High Bridge, and the additional connection by a four-foot pipe between the Receiving and Distributing Reservoirs. Both these works are now suspended, and we beg leave to report that some action should be taken at once, if the surplus water now running waste at the north end of the High Bridge is to be made available for the comfort and safety of our citizens and their property.

The greater part of the work, at both the points above named, can be done by contract; but, inasmuch as certain parts of it cannot with safety be done otherwise than by days' work, application was made to the Common Council, which resulted in the ordinances above referred to. Should you decide that, under the circumstances, you will sign the warrants necessary for the payments on the work, we can go on, and yet be prepared for the coming winter. If not, and we are thrown upon the delays and dangers of the contract system, the difficulties may be very serious. The Board feel satisfied that a personal inspection of the site of the proposed work would aid in the removal of the objections expressed by your Honor, and they will be happy, if opportunity be afforded them, to accompany your Honor to the same, at any time you will be pleased to name as consistent with your other engagements.

On the 28th June, having received no reply from the

Mayor, I called upon him at his office, when the following conversation occurred:

I asked him if he had yet made up his mind whether he would countersign the warrants for the payments on the work, and told him that, as had been fully set forth in our two communications to him, dated May 31st and June 20th, the necessity for some action on the subject was absolute and immediate.

He answered, that he had made up his mind not to sign the warrants. I asked him if he would notify our Board, in writing, of his determination, and he said he would do so the next day. I then observed that he was assuming the responsibility of delaying a work, the immediate progress of which was most important to the city, both as to comfort and to safety. He said he should be governed by his own judgment in that respect, and added, that his reason for opposing the work was *that he did not like the plan*. He did not state, in what respect, nor did I ask him. I answered, that with all due deference to him, that the plan was a matter committed by the Legislature to the judgment of the Croton Aqueduct Board. He asked if I meant to say that he had no right to any opinion, or no right to supervise the departments. I answered, that, as chief magistrate, he had not only a right, but that it was his duty to inquire into the manner of conducting business *in all the Departments*, and to check any dishonesty or impropriety of conduct, if he found it; but that in all matters which, by the Charter, were exclusively placed under the control of the different Departments, as to specifications and plans, he most surely could claim no prohibitory voice; and particularly in a matter of engineering science connected with

the Croton Aqueduct, he was not the officer legally appointed to decide; and that he could not properly make his opinion a good ground for stopping a work of such pressing importance, and in regard to the plans of which the proper Department had fully decided. He said he should undertake it. I then repeated my request for his decision in writing, and he repeated his promise to let us have it without delay.*

I then spoke to him about the Inspector on the sewer in Sixth avenue, whom he had refused to recognize because of certain charges alleged against him by the contractor on said sewer, which charges he, the Mayor, had, in writing, notified our Board were unfounded. He said he would recognize him *on any other sewer* than the one for which he had been appointed. I then urged upon him, that *if a contractor could select his own Inspector, and be upheld by the Mayor* in doing so, there would be little use in appointing Inspectors at all; that such a course would establish a precedent entirely subversive of all power to have public work done with any degree of honesty, or fidelity to the city. As he would not be changed by any arguments, I withdrew.

On the 6th of July, I offered, at the meeting of the Croton Board, the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, On the 3d of May last, an Inspector was selected by this Board, to superintend the sewer about to be constructed in Sixth avenue, between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets; and,

Whereas, His Honor the Mayor, (who had already claimed that all inspectors under this Department should be sworn in by him,) refused to swear in said Inspector, in consequence of certain charges which he stated had been alleged against him; and,

Whereas, On motion of A. W. Craven, Chief Engineer, said Inspector

* He has not done so to this day.

was suspended from the work, in order to give his Honor the Mayor an opportunity of investigating the said charges, and the Mayor was advised of said suspension ; and,

Whereas, By a letter dated June 9th, the Mayor informed this Board that the charges against said Inspector were disproven; but, notwithstanding said letter and said exculpation, his Honor still refused to swear him in, giving to said Inspector, as a reason for such refusal, that he had promised the contractor on said work not to do so; and,

Whereas, Acquiescence in such a reason for the dismissal of any Inspector, would lead to a total subversion of the ability of this Board to have any of the work committed to its charge performed honestly, and according to the contract made in behalf of the parties to be assessed; therefore,

Resolved, That said Inspector be re-appointed on said sewer in Sixth avenue, between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, according to the original selection of this Board ; said appointment being by virtue of the authority given by the Charter to this Department, to appoint Inspectors on all work, for the faithful performance of which this Department is by the same Charter *alone held responsible*.

On the 11th July, he sent his first message to the Board of Aldermen, removing me from office, for "serious disagreements" and "insubordination."

On the 18th July, he sent a second message, removing me for additional reasons, which I have stated and examined in the first part of this answer.

And you, and my fellow-citizens at large, will probably be surprised to learn, that though I have been at all times ready and willing to make the statement and explanations I have now presented to you, and although the alleged reasons of the Mayor contain the most serious charges against my character, both personal and professional, yet that the Mayor never alluded to them in any of my interviews with him, nor did I ever hear of them *until I read*

his charges in the newspapers, which carried them into all parts of the United States.

CONCLUSION.

I dismiss this subject to your final determination, with a brief statement of the conclusions clearly deducible from the facts.

1st. It is not true that I have made any "changes" whatever in "the plan" of the Reservoir, either "extensive" or "peculiar," or otherwise. No work *has been done, or is contemplated* upon the Reservoir, except such as is specifically mentioned and provided for *in the contract, and at prices therein limited.*

2d. It is true that there are variations in the *quantities* of work and materials, as originally estimated, and as actually to be done.

3d. It is not true that these variations are "remarkable," except in one sense, that, considering the vastness of the area, and the impossibility of making an *exact* and subterranean estimate, they are "remarkable" in presenting comparatively so slight a difference.

The area is 106 acres, presenting an irregular surface of rocks and morass, the rocky hillocks rising in some places thirty-five feet above the swamps in the same area.

The depth of our excavation exceeded, in some places, thirty feet.

The estimate was of necessity made before the surface was broken for the work, and the *quantities*, and particularly the *qualities* of the various earths and rocks to be

found beneath the surface, were, as every engineer knows, and as I have explained to you, matters more or less of uncertainty.

4th. It is true that for these variations, requiring *additional* work and materials, the contractors will be entitled to some \$100,000 beyond their bid of \$632,743, which was based on the quantities and qualities stated in the estimate; but it is not true that the cost to the city will be increased that amount beyond *my estimate of the cost*, made for the use of the government. Such estimate was (exclusive of the gate-houses) \$1,025,000. The Reservoir will be built for \$150,000 less, at least; probably much lower.

5th. It is not true that in "every case" in which these variations have occurred, "they have proved very beneficial to the contractors." On the contrary, several of them are done at prices which indicate a loss, and the others are done at prices barely remunerative, and which a majority of the competitors were not willing to do for fifty per cent. advance.

6th. It is not true that I made any "mistake" in the award of the contract.

I. I did not make the award: it was made by Messrs. Van Schaick, De Forrest, myself (as the Croton Board), and the Hon. A. C. Flagg, the Comptroller, unanimously. Fairchild & Co., to whom the award was made, were the lowest bidders.

II. Even had I alone made the award, it was made *strictly* according to the requirements of the Charter; there was no *mistake in any one point of the letting*.

I may be excused from saying here, that, notwithstanding the difficulty attendant upon explanations on professional subjects, I have clearly shown that the charges of the Mayor, which were set forth with such minute detail of figures and items, are utterly unfounded when examined in the light of intelligence and truth. In the whole conduct of the work on the Reservoir, from the first examination of its site until the present moment, that course has been adopted, and those precautions taken, which the experienced and skillful men in my profession would, under similar circumstances, suggest and advise; and I hope you will be as much surprised as my professional brethren are, that the very facts which I would invoke as evidence of capacity, integrity and judgment, are perversely distorted so as to assume, to the eye of those who do not understand the subject, the aspect of folly, ignorance, or something worse.

In providing, by numerous specifications, for contingencies dependent upon the developments of our operations, and in availing myself of those provisions, I have done only what was absolutely required by my duty as an officer, to ensure the perfection of the Reservoir. Had I done otherwise, I could not have, as now, the right to hope that with this great public work my name may hereafter be honorably associated.

7th. It is not true that the paving in Forty-ninth street was executed without "proper vigilance" on my part. The Water Purveyor, charged by law with such work, examined and passed it. The Croton Board, the Board of Assessors, the Board of Aldermen, and the Board of Councilmen, confirmed it. Against the unanimous action of these five separate bodies, there is no evidence but the un-

sworn statement of nine property holders, interested to defeat the assessment for the work.

8th. It is true that an error of eight inches, in the maximum, was made in the grade of a sewer in Fortieth street; but it is not true that the error was made by me, or that I am responsible for it, or that the city will suffer any loss by it. The error was made by a city surveyor, *appointed by the Common Council*, and will simply involve the additional charge, by the contractor, for extra excavation, averaging four inches in depth, for a limited distance.

9th. It is not true that any of the men in our Department have been guilty of the fraud of converting the public property to their own use, or that we have retained any such men in our employment.

Some discharged laborers got up a prosecution against Cornwell, a foreman of a gang (employed by us for eleven years with entire satisfaction), charging him with gross offences. We examined witnesses patiently for four days, and the entire Board, Messrs. Van Schaick, Tappen and myself, unanimously dismissed the charge. We were the proper tribunal before which to try the case, and we did try it thoroughly and honestly. This the Mayor has in effect admitted; for, since the explanations given him, he has signed the warrants for the payment of Cornwell and Conboy semi-monthly, up to the present time.

So much for the second message. Now for the first.

10th. It is not true that there have been any "disagreements," serious or otherwise, between the Mayor and myself. Such a state of facts is simply impossible; because, by law, in the discharge of our respective duties,

there is no one subject upon which it is necessary that we should *agree*.

11th. It is not true that I have been guilty of "insubordination" to him. I am an *Engineer*, charged with the responsibility of the plan and execution of public work requiring skill and science. He is a *layman*, and the law is not guilty of the absurdity of making me "subordinate" to him in the discharge of my duty. On the contrary, the act of 1849, organizing the Department, imposed upon me a personal responsibility, and makes my decision, within the sphere of my jurisdiction, final and *exclusive*.

12th. But it is true that, after his repeated attempts to usurp the power of the Department, and to make it the slave of his will, I have raised those objections which I was legally entitled to interpose, and which are demanded of me by every consideration of fidelity to the city.

By *abusing* the power confided to him of countersigning the warrants of the Comptroller for the pay of our men—granting or refusing his signature at pleasure—he has undertaken to say whom we shall retain in our employment, and whom we shall not—whom we shall select as *Inspectors*, and whom we shall not—and what work, authorized by law and the ordinances, we shall execute or omit.

He has arrested the execution of two very important public works, in the very height of their progress; and, by his action on one of them, defeated or delayed the long-cherished desire of the Department to increase the supply of water. One of these works—that on Eighth avenue—was in course of execution under an ordinance of the Common Council, *signed by himself*; and the other—that on the

High Bridge—under an ordinance signed by *his predecessor*. Both of these were suspended upon his asserted doubts of their *legality*. He withdraws his objection to the first and least important of the two, and grants us *his permission* to proceed.

He refuses *his permission* to the latter, involving the *same point of legality*, and starts an objection to the *plan* of the work—a matter wholly within the province of our Board, and wholly upon *my* responsibility.

For the sake of not having any important public work delayed, I have never, for one moment, stood upon the question of subordination, but have yielded in every point until it came to a question involving my fidelity as an officer. He refused to countersign the warrant for the pay of an Inspector whom we had appointed upon a sewer, upon the ground *that he had promised not to do so, at the request of the contractors* whose work the Inspector was to supervise—expressing his willingness to recognize such Inspector *upon any other sewer*. I immediately introduced resolutions into our Board, pledging my colleagues to resist these usurpations; and within five days afterward he sent to the Board of Aldermen his first message, proposing to remove me for “serious disagreements and insubordination.”

Mr. CRAVEN continued :—I am ready to proceed with the examination at any time, and will bring forward witnesses to substantiate all I have stated.

ALDERMAN STARR:—Mr. Craven, until the charges are substantiated and entirely proven, it is not necessary for you to bring forward any witnesses. I find here a letter from his Honor the Mayor, declining to attend the meeting of this Committee, and stating that he “shall not, directly or indirectly, participate in its proceedings.” He also says that he has already given sufficient grounds for the removal of Messrs. Tappen and Craven, in his communication sent to the Board, and that he shall take no further part in the proceedings. Now Mr. Chairman, I move that a copy of Mr. Craven’s and Mr. Tappen’s denial of the charges be sent to his Honor the Mayor, and that he have two days to read and digest them ; and, if he finds that they are not an utter annihilation of the charges

made against these gentlemen, that he be invited by this Committee to prove the statements made in the communication which he sent to the Board of Aldermen.

The CHAIRMAN :—Well, that is the idea I also took of this matter until this letter was received. (Here the Chairman read Mayor Wood's letter declining to attend the meetings of the Committee)

ALDERMAN STARR :—Now, Mr. Chairman, every charge that is made by the Mayor in his communication to the Board may be true ; but, unless there is some proof of the fact, I am unwilling to vote for the removal of Messrs. Tappen and Craven, after so patiently listening to their denials of them.

The CHAIRMAN said that was also his idea of the matter. The allegations of the Mayor and the gentlemen's answers to them had been heard, and it now devolved upon his Honor the Mayor to sustain his case. The Mayor had refused to do so, and also to participate in any further proceedings in the matter, throwing himself simply upon his allegations of the charges. The Mayor having refused to appear and prove the charges, he (Alderman Genet) did not see what the Committee could do further.

ALDERMAN STARR :—I think the Committee should adjourn, and give the Mayor an opportunity to be heard ; I am sure he was not aware that such a denial would be made, and, after reading it, and on sober, second thoughts, he may either appear here to substantiate his charges, or withdraw them.

MR. JAMES WADSWORTH here desired to address the Committee, and spoke as follows :—At the request of sev-

eral citizens, I appear before you, to attend this examination, and to say to you, gentlemen, that there are citizens who desire to be heard here, no matter what may be the final dispositions of the charges made by the Mayor; and they would like the privilege of presenting the names of certain engineers, and certain contractors, and certain laborers who are cognizant with this work, and the manner in which it has been conducted, from its commencement to the present time; and the Chairman will bear with me, when I remark, that I do not appear here for the Mayor, but on behalf of certain citizens, who conceive that the Mayor has but fulfilled his duty in this matter. It is probable that the position of the Mayor in this matter may not be understood. The Mayor is a co-ordinate branch of the municipal administration, and, acting upon statements made to him, he only discharges his duty, when he sees fit to ask you to consent to the removal of these gentlemen, who have been placed in charge of the Croton Aqueduct Department, for certain reasons which he states. The Mayor having fulfilled his duty, the interest of the citizen begins, and these statements and counter-statements having been made, I now ask, (at the same time entertaining the highest opinion of the qualifications of these gentlemen,) that we may have the privilege of presenting to your consideration such testimony as bears upon this subject, and which will tend to enlighten you upon these matters. We conceive, also, and I say it as a citizen of New York, that this question has been fairly submitted to you, and that it is not for the Mayor to appear before you as public prosecutor. He is an individual part of the administration, and, as such, has discharged his duty; and that being the case,

permit me to suggest, whether, in the present state of the case, it is not the duty of this honorable Committee to take up this matter for themselves, and make up their own minds on the subject, independent of the Mayor altogether. And, on this point, I conceive the whole matter has been misconstrued. The Mayor has made no charges whatever before this Committee, or before the Common Council. He has, in accordance with what he deems to be the meaning of the provisions of the Charter, removed for cause; and the Charter requires that no removal be made without the consent of another department of the municipal government—the Board of Aldermen. I also conceive, sir, that the citizens have a right to be heard here, and I now ask, on their behalf, that this examination be proceeded with, independent of whatever action the Mayor may or may not take in the matter; and that I be permitted to hand in the names of parties to this Committee, who profess to know something of this matter.

ALDERMAN STARR:—I don't desire to go beyond our jurisdiction in this matter. We, as a Committee of the Board of Aldermen, have been appointed to investigate certain charges made by his Honor the Mayor against these gentlemen. We know of no charges at all having been preferred against these officers, by the citizens of New York, and if the citizens have any charges to make against Mr. Craven or Mr. Tappen, it is their duty to make such charges to the Common Council. The Mayor has made charges of malfeasance, and he has a right to establish them; and, until we have evidence that the people have charges to make, we cannot hold any investigation of them. Should any culpable charges be proven, I would be the first to report to the Board that the officers be removed. At

present, I think we can only deal with the Mayor's communication.

THE CHAIRMAN :—Allow me to ask you one question, Mr. Wadsworth ; you say you appear for some citizens ?

MR. WADSWORTH :—Yes, sir.

THE CHAIRMAN :—And what do you propose to prove, on behalf of the citizens ?

MR. WADSWORTH :—Simply to prove these statements—that the substance matter of the Mayor's statements to this body, is correct.

THE CHAIRMAN :—Then, in other words, you come here and assume the responsibility of sustaining the allegations of the Mayor ?

MR. WADSWORTH :—Certainly, at the request of several citizens, but not at his Honor's request.

THE CHAIRMAN :—Now, another question. In what way do you propose to do this ?

MR. WADSWORTH :—By presenting to this Honorable Body the names of parties for their examination, and asking the privilege of being present ; and in case there is any information which I may receive, pertaining solely to this matter, of suggesting questions, or of asking them.

THE CHAIRMAN :—Have you the names of any persons, citizens of New York, who desire this matter to be proceeded with ?

MR. WADSWORTH :—I have.

MR. CRAVEN here addressed the Chairman, and said :—Allow me to say, Mr. Chairman, that whilst I don't wish to interfere with the determination of your body, as far as

I myself am concerned, I second the application of Mr. Wadsworth, in order that we may have a full investigation of this matter.

THE CHAIRMAN considered it would take up unnecessary time to adopt Mr. Wadsworth's suggestion.

ALDERMAN STARR :—I am not willing to adopt the course suggested by Mr. Wadsworth, although Mr. Craven desires it. If the investigation goes on, the Mayor is entitled to all the credit for ripping up these things. He has made the charges, and I think he is the person to prove them.

MR. TAPPEN:—If I understand the matter rightly, Mr. Wadsworth is correct. The Mayor has made no charges, for it appears to me that his allegations do not amount to charges. If the gentleman came here to prove these allegations, he hoped the Committee would give him an opportunity to do so.

ALDERMAN STARR:—We are only here to investigate the charges made by the Mayor, and we have nothing to do with the charges of any citizen. If the citizens of New York have complaints to make, let them be made in the proper place.

THE CHAIRMAN:—Allow me to make this remark—Mr. Wadsworth, in answer to a question put by me, says that he appears on behalf of some citizens. Now, I wish to know if they are willing to take the *onus* and responsibility on themselves to sustain these charges. I would like to know upon what grounds they go.

MR. WADSWORTH:—Just this ground, sir, that the attention of my fellow-citizens has been directed by the communication of the Mayor to this matter, and we claim that

the importance and the immediate amount of interest involved are matters of sufficient public importance for the citizens themselves to move in the matter. The Mayor does not appear as a maker of charges against those gentlemen, but he feels it to be his duty to impart to this Committee, by a fair, an open, and an official statement, the reasons which induced him to call upon the Board to remove these gentlemen. Now the citizens come in and ask the privilege of presenting their views.

THE CHAIRMAN:—But, then, the Mayor asks the removal from office of the gentlemen.

MR. WADSWORTH:—Yes.

THE CHAIRMAN:—And, has he not a right to show cause why he asks their removal?

MR. WADSWORTH:—The Mayor has already done so in his communication to the Board. I also wish to ask a question: whether the official documents referred to—the minutes of this investigation before the Croton Board—shall be regarded by the Committee as official, of which the Committee will take cognizance of, or whether you would desire that we should present them before you, for your consideration?

THE CHAIRMAN:—Certainly, we should.

MR. CRAVEN (to Mr. Wadsworth):—That will all be presented by me, sir. I assure you, I am more anxious than you are about this investigation, and I desire that the fullest examination should be had.

MR. WADSWORTH:—I would ask whether this Committee would permit additional testimony to be introduced in cer-

tain cases already investigated by the Croton Aqueduct Board—cases which, in the judgment of certain citizens, were not sufficiently proceeded with?

CHAIRMAN:—That matter will remain to be decided by the Committee.

MR. WADSWORTH:—Permit me to state, Mr. Chairman, that I am not unknown to many of you here ; I am known to Mr. Craven, and always entertained the highest respect for him, and I have no object in the world for this investigation but to gratify the feelings of intelligent citizens, that this examination may be full, fair and impartial. It is certainly due to the citizens and to Mr. Craven that this examination should be full and impartial, and we only ask to present some facts that will enable the Committee to arrive at a result in the matter.

THE CHAIRMAN:—Mr. Wadsworth, will you name some of the gentlemen you refer to, or whom you represent?

MR. WADSWORTH:—I will give you the names of such witnesses as have been handed to me to present to the Committee.

THE CHAIRMAN said the Committee did not want the witnesses' names, as they had not decided whether they would take up the charges made by the gentlemen Mr. Wadsworth represented. They desired to know the names of the citizens who made the complaints.

MR. WADSWORTH did not desire to name the gentleman.

MR. CRAVEN:—I am perfectly willing that this examination should go on; at the same time, there are certain rights

I must stand upon. If Mr. Wadsworth comes here representing citizens, whom he states have complaints and feel aggrieved, I think he should state to the Committee who these gentlemen are.

THE CHAIRMAN:—I should think, if Mr. Wadsworth wants an investigation in behalf of these citizens, why let him have it, but at the same time I think it is necessary for him to suggest the names.

ALDERMAN STARR:—As a Special Committee, appointed by the Board to investigate the charges made by his Honor the Mayor, I don't think that we can entertain these charges of Mr. Wadsworth. We know of no citizens who are dissatisfied; and if there are any, they should complain to the Common Council.

MR. WADSWORTH:—Well, Mr. Chairman, I ask that this Committee of the Board of Aldermen give me the privilege of pursuing this investigation?

THE CHAIRMAN:—Upon whose behalf?

MR. WADSWORTH:—As a citizen of New York.

THE CHAIRMAN:—Mr. Wadsworth, the Committee, will determine whether they will permit you to go on or not.

ALDERMAN STARR:—I was appointed a member of this Committee for the purpose of investigating certain charges made by the Mayor against Mr. Tappen and Mr. Craven, and as far as those charges are concerned, I am prepared to attend here and remain a day—a week—or for a month, in order to give all the parties an opportunity of investigating them. But I am not here to investigate as to the truth of the charges prepared by any other parties than

those of his Honor the Mayor; and until I am instructed by the Common Council to do so, I shall insist that the Committee shall not take up any other matter but that for which it was appointed—to investigate the charges made by the Mayor.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:—Mr. Chairman, I am of the same opinion, and I move that—

ALDERMAN STARR:—Permit me—I have already made a motion that those answers be sent to the Mayor—

ALDERMAN BOOLE:—Well, Alderman Starr, I think that is the proper course to pursue before we go any further, to present the replies of both these gentlemen to his Honor the Mayor, and give him two or three days to examine them. The Committee can then take action in the matter. I don't see that you can proceed any further to-day.

THE CHAIRMAN also suggested that Messrs. Craven and Tappen's answers be sent to the Mayor.

The motion was then put and carried.

MR. CRAVEN:—Mr. Chairman, allow me to say that I am here to-day without counsel, and I don't suppose I will have any. As for myself, gentlemen, I am ready to go on at any time with this investigation, and to meet any witness or any body of men.

MR. WADSWORTH:—May I ask, if the Committee have decided to hear the witnesses I can produce, or whether they choose to postpone the consideration of the question until next meeting.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:—I move, sir, that it lay over until

we hear from his Honor the Mayor with respect to these denials.

Carried.

The Committee then adjourned to Monday, September 17, 1860.

THIRD SESSION.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 1860.

The Committee met at one o'clock at Room No. 8, City Hall.

PRESENT — Aldermen Genet (Chairman), Starr and Boole.

Messrs. Craven and Tappen were in attendance.

The Committee consulted together for a few moments, when

THE CHAIRMAN said that the Clerk had neglected to send a copy of Messrs. Craven and Tappen's answers to the Mayor, and as a resolution had passed the Committee, at its last meeting, that such replies should be forwarded to his Honor, to see what reply, if any, would be made to them; and inasmuch as the Mayor had not received the answers to the charges, he considered that before they should proceed any further with the investigation, they should transmit the documents to his Honor.

MR. CRAVEN:—Mr. Chairman, I have not the slightest objection to the matter taking that course, though his Honor has, over his own signature, declined to appear before this Committee or have anything to do with its proceedings. The investigation, sir, in my judgment, should proceed independently of him, under these circumstances.

MR. JAMES WADSWORTH said:—Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the Committee, I am here to-day to receive your answer, on behalf of myself and those citizens concerned

and associated with me, and who agree with me that the papers read here on the last day, by Messrs. Craven and Tappen, are not full answers to the charges and statements made in his Honor the Mayor's communication to the Board of Aldermen—I am here, sir, to ascertain whether I might present some statements, if they are desired by your Committee, as proofs or corroborations of the statements made by the Mayor on this subject. For that purpose, gentlemen, I ask permission to have this investigation continued to-day.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:—The Mayor has presented charges, which have been referred to a Special Committee of the Board of Aldermen, for the purpose of having them fairly and fully investigated. These charges have been denied by the gentlemen against whom they were preferred; therefore, the question resolves itself into one of veracity between these gentlemen and the Mayor. I consider, sir, there is no way in which we can get at this matter, except by sending for the Mayor, in order that he may substantiate his charges, and thus put an end to this investigation.

MR. WADSWORTH:—Gentlemen, in connection with the remarks which I was permitted to make at the last meeting of the Committee, I desire to add, that it appears to me that the honorable gentleman who has spoken last has misconceived the position occupied by the Mayor at present towards this Committee and the Board of Aldermen—that is the legal connection in which the Mayor appears to this Board. We may by one illustration clear up this whole matter at once. If the President of the United States, as Chief of the Executive Department, has the power to remove parties, subject to the approval of the Senate, and

exercised the power, and showed cause therefor to the Senate—if, I say, that body were then to insist on the President appearing before the Senate, and making good, personally, his charges, they would be acting in violation of all former precedent, and illegally. Now, sir, I believe that in that statement of the Mayor, which he sent to the Board of Aldermen, his whole case is contained. He makes a statement, in corroboration of which proofs are presented. He then comes to a decision, right or wrong in the premises, and then transmits a statement of his decision to the Board of Aldermen, as a co-ordinate branch of the city government, for their action upon it. He does not transmit his communication as charges, but as statements upon which charges may be founded. That, gentlemen, is the true condition of the Mayor and this Committee; and, I contend, in no legal sense can the statements be regarded as charges. The Mayor has fulfilled his duty, and transmitted the statements for your action; and I consider that it would be as great a legal breach of decorum for you to insist on the Mayor's attending here, and personally proving his statements before you, as it would be for the State Senate to insist on having the Governor before it, to prove a statement he saw fit to transmit to that body, or for the higher branch of the general government to treat the President of the United States with similar discourtesy. So much, then, for what I conceive to be the relation of the parties dealing with this matter. And now, as to the Mayor, I contend that there are no charges in the Mayor's communication, and hence no reason for his appearance here in the capacity of a public prosecutor.

The CHAIRMAN:—Then I understand you to say, Mr.

Wadsworth, that the Mayor does not make any charges against the gentlemen whom he has thought proper to remove from the Croton Board?

MR. WADSWORTH:—No, not in the legal sense, does he make any charge. This statement may be construed as charges by those citizens interested in the Croton Aqueduct Department, and the gentlemen, on another hand, who are chiefly interested in this trial. The Mayor of the city having done his part, the right of the citizens then commences; and, gentlemen, in the exercise of that right, they ask to appear before you to prove the statements of the Mayor. It is now for the Committee to judge whether any citizen, or number of them, at his or their own request, may not present facts to illustrate and establish the matter before you, claiming, as they do, that the statements of the Mayor have not received a full or explicit denial in the answers made by the gentlemen of the Croton Board to this Committee. It is for you, should you wish to do so, to place the answers of these gentlemen in the light of a contradiction to the statement of the Mayor, but, sir, even in that light, I submit that the denials amount to nothing, nor would the seven affidavits of the gentlemen appended to them, be regarded as proof at the bar. With your permission, gentlemen, we intend to establish these four propositions:

First—That the specifications were wrong.

Second—That the estimates were wrong.

Third—That the bids of the contractor being of an extraordinary character, ranging many of the items much above the cost of the work; and,

Fourth—That the accord of the Engineer and the Croton Board in making these discrepancies accord to the awarding of the contract, every one of which was to the advantage of the contractor, and loss to the city. I just state that here are four points which we claim we can establish.

MR. CRAVEN:—Now, Mr. Chairman, I object to Mr. Wadsworth's continuing in this way. I am here without counsel, and, therefore, I think it is scarcely fair for him to go on in trying to prove the Mayor's charges, unless he will state fairly and honestly who he appears here for.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:—I think it but only just that if any person has anything to say against the two gentlemen who are now before us, that they should come forward in a proper manner, and make their charges to the Board of Aldermen. If Mr. Wadsworth, or the parties he represents, refuse to do this, why, what further has this Committee got to do? These two gentlemen before us have presented to the Committee a denial to the Mayor's statements, or charges—it makes little difference which you call them—and with all respect to the gentleman who spoke last, I would suggest that, if he has anything against the gentlemen, let him, as a citizen, take the proper course, and present his charges to the Board of Aldermen, and have them referred to this Committee, and they will receive a full, fair and candid investigation.

MR. CRAVEN:—And I should also wish that the gentleman would put his charges in writing, so that he can be penned up to what he states, and be held answerable for any charge he may make.

MR. TAPPEN:—Mr. Chairman, our answers to the Mayor's charges have been presented to the Committee, and if they think them insufficient, why they can proceed with any further investigation they choose; but I contend it is for the Committee to determine that question. If there are any other charges to be made, let them be presented to the proper quarter. I think that this Committee should confine itself to an investigation of the charges now before it.

THE CHAIRMAN:—The question now before the Committee is, whether they will allow any further investigation or the presentation of any further proofs than those already presented by his Honor the Mayor. I must say, that I look upon the charges contained in the Mayor's communication as very loose and indefinite; but, nevertheless, they may be true. If they had been based on any facts, or on the statements of any persons whose names would appear, and to whom we could refer for proof, it would then, I think, be necessary to proceed with the examination of witnesses. For instance, now: he charges this Department with insubordination, and that is a very loose charge, indeed; and I am of opinion, if he had any evidence to support such a charge, he should have presented it to this Committee, after making such charges as he has against these gentlemen. As the Mayor has refused to appear personally before the Committee, to substantiate his charges, I think it would be highly improper for the Committee to take up the statements of any loose individual who might be prowling about for the purpose of creating confusion and disturbance in the management of the affairs of the City Government.

MR. WADSWORTH:—Allow me to say, gentlemen, that

whilst I have treated this Committee with all the courtesy to which they are entitled, since I first appeared before them, I would wish it understood that I will not have a position assigned to me which I neither occupy or have any desire to fill. I simply ask of the Committee permission to pursue this inquiry; and let me say, that I am not "prowling about," and that I have no other object in view than the interests of the citizens, and the furtherance of justice. Now I only ask this permission of the Committee to go on with this inquiry. Of course the Committee can decide either for or against the investigation.

ALDERMAN GENET:—You said, the other day, you were here for the citizens.

MR. WADSWORTH:—I did, sir.

THE CHAIRMAN:—And I asked the names of the citizens, and you declined to give them.

MR. WADSWORTH appealed to the report in the *New York Herald*, of what he had said upon that occasion, as it was the only full and correct report of the proceedings as published. That report contained exactly what he had stated. There were many citizens ready to appear as witnesses, and who desired that this investigation should proceed, and he (Mr. Wadsworth) was ready to present the Committee with their names.

THE CHAIRMAN:—I asked you, sir, at the last meeting, whether you were willing to present the names of any citizens who had charges to make, and you said you were not prepared.

MR. WADSWORTH:—I did, and now I ask permission to

go on with the trial, for if one citizen has a right, forty have a right, and if forty have a right, one has the same right.

MR. CRAVEN:—Now, Mr. Chairman, has it come to this, that a respectable citizen is willing to come forward and give his name, and is ready to make an attack on one whom the Mayor has already booked out of office? I want to know whether I am here obliged to reply to such attacks, or if they are to be recognized? Am I to be tried in a Star Chamber? I am ready to meet Mr. Wadsworth, or any other gentleman, either privately or publicly, but I am opposed, sir, to this stabbing in the dark.

MR. WADSWORTH:—It is our wish, sir, to make the trial as open and as public as possible.

MR. CRAVEN:—Well, it cannot be done upon these charges.

The Committee having consulted for a short time:

THE CHAIRMAN said:—It is the unanimous decision of this Committee, Mr. Wadsworth, that they refuse to hear you in this matter, or accede to your request, and their reasons are these: if you desire to be heard, or any other citizens desire it, you or they can present, specifically, in writing, the reasons for charging these two gentlemen with malfeasance, to the Common Council, which reasons or charges will be referred to this Committee; and, upon doing that, we assure you that we will give you every investigation that you, or any other citizens of New York, may require.

MR. WADSWORTH:—When the matter was fairly before

the Committee, the citizens who concur with the Mayor in his views upon the matter did not consider it necessary to introduce new charges.

THE CHAIRMAN:—I have stated the decision of the Committee, Mr. Wadsworth.

ALDERMAN STARR:—Our position is this: charges have been presented against these gentlemen by the Mayor. They have been replied to, and have not been sustained by his Honor, and I, at least, am not in favor of having any new ones made, until those we have before us are disposed of, in some way that will be clear and satisfactory. If we were to receive charges in the manner suggested, we would be receiving them, perhaps, and investigating them till our term of office would expire.

ALDERMAN BOOLE moved that the Committee adjourn to Thursday, September 20, 1860, for the purpose of learning whatever the Mayor may have to communicate.

Carried.

The Committee then adjourned.

FOURTH SESSION.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 20, 1860.

PRESENT—Aldermen Genet (Chairman), Boole and Starr.

Messrs. Craven and Tappen, with thir counsel, Mr. James T. Brady, were also in attendance.

THE CHAIRMAN inquired of Messrs. Craven and Tappen if they had anything more to say with reference to the charges made by his Honor the Mayor.

MR. CRAVEN:—Nothing more, sir, than that we are perfectly willing to proceed with any investigation or examination, if there is any doubt in the minds of the Committee.

THE CHAIRMAN:—I will state, then, that inasmuch as the Mayor has not deemed fit to respond to the answers of Messrs. Craven and Tappen, we take it for granted that he has nothing further to suggest; and if you, gentlemen, have nothing further to say, we shall consider this investigation closed.

MR. TAPPEN:—I have nothing further to suggest, gentlemen, except to state that I am ready to prove all that is set forth in my answer. That is all.

MR. TAPPEN:—I consider, sir, that the answers embrace all the points contained in the Mayor's charges, and completely overthrows them. If the Committee desire anything further, we are prepared to give any proof that may be required.

THE CHAIRMAN:—Inasmuch as there is no communication from his Honor the Mayor on this matter, although a

copy of the papers has been sent to him, and as you, gentlemen, have nothing further to offer, the Committee has come to the conclusion to close this investigation, and report to the Board at the earliest moment.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:--I don't see anything else the Committee can do than to close this inquiry, make up our minds, and report to the Board. If the gentleman, Mr. Wadsworth, who spoke here the other day, wishes to make any charges against these gentlemen, he can do so by presenting them to the Common Council. They will be referred to this Committee, and it will be for the Committee to take such action to gratify Mr. Wadsworth and other parties.

THE CHAIRMAN:--The decision of the Committee, then, is that this investigation is closed.

MR. CRAVEN:--May I take the liberty of asking, gentlemen, for a speedy report.

THE CHAIRMAN:--The Committee will report, sir, as soon as possible—as soon as we can get together to examine the matter.

ALDERMAN BOOLE:--It is a very lengthy document, Mr. Chairman, and will require a good deal of study. I should not be in favor of saying that we would report at the next meeting.

THE CHAIRMAN:--We will report, gentlemen, as soon as we can.

The gentlemen withdrew, and the Committee adjourned *sine die*.

GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with the duties of my office, prescribed by the Charter, and by the amended ordinance re-organizing the Street Department, I have the honor to submit herewith a detailed statement of all the

expenditures of this department, on all work or supplies, done or furnished by contract or otherwise, from July 1st to September 30th, 1860.

During the quarter, requisitions upon the Comptroller have been drawn, amounting to four hundred and thirty thousand three hundred and nineteen dollars and thirty-four cents (\$430,319 34), of which three hundred and fifty-four thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight dollars and eighteen cents (\$354,868 18) were provided by tax, and seventy-five thousand four hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixteen cents (\$75,451 16) by assessment upon property benefited.

In Appendix A, to which you are respectfully referred, will be found a statement of the amount of each appropriation, made for the Street Department, for the year 1860, by the Common Council—the amount estimated, as necessary and asked for, by the Street Commissioner; the amount of requisitions upon the Comptroller, drawn by the Street Commissioner on each appropriation and account, during each of the three quarters of the present year; the total amount, from January 1st to September 30th; and the balances of all appropriations, appertaining exclusively to the Street Department.

For statement in detail, of the amount charged to each object and purpose, assessment lists delivered to the Collector of Assessments, and all matters under the cogni-

zance of the Book-keeper, you are respectfully referred to his exhibit transmitted herewith, and marked Appendix B.

Reports of the Superintendents of Bureaux, of the Deputy Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, and of the Collector of Assessments, are also submitted to your Honorable Bodies, and they contain minute information of the business of each bureau, for the quarter ending 30th September, during which time the Superintendent of Street Improvements reports having drawn vouchers to the amount of..... \$59,328 48

I take great pleasure (whilst alluding to this Bureau,) in informing your Honorable Bodies, that after the lapse of more than two years, during which time my predecessor and I have frequently called attention to the subject, the books which were wanting to make up the accounts of a former Collector of Assessments, (Jos. R. Taylor) and his deputies, have been delivered, in consequence of proceedings instituted by the Hon. the Counsel to the Corporation.

The appropriation for supplies for, and cleaning public offices, was nearly exhausted on the 31st of August last, since which time no requisition has been drawn upon the Comptroller on that account. For the absolutely necessary expenses of fuel and cleaning of the public offices, the appropriation for Contingencies, Street Department, is now being used, and, I trust, that it will be made to suffice.

For the causes which have led to the exhaustion thus

early, of the legitimate appropriation, you are respectfully referred to the report of the Deputy Superintendent, (hereto appended.)

As you have noticed, my remarks in my several reports to the Common Council, have been advised by me personally, of the disorganized condition of this Department, when Mr. Cooper and myself entered upon our duties in April, 1858, and as you are aware of the orders given by me in regard to what the books should show, and have perused Mr. Livingston's communication to me of January 26, 1859, conveying a full and detailed statement of the manner of opening the books and

keeping the accounts of his office—your great experience and knowledge of book-keeping, will have detected any omissions and errors in his "System;" and you will please state, as fully as you deem proper, whether the detailed arrangements of the accounts—their entry on the "Audit Books, Journal and Ledgers"—form of the balance sheets, and general appearance of the books and accounts, meet your approval—and whether the "system" is well adapted to the correct keeping and rendering of the accounts of such an immense Department as the one under my charge; and whether the same system could be readily understood and continued, by a competent book-keeper.

The promptness and correctness with which all my requirements are met, and the method and order with which the books are kept, are proofs to me, of the efficiency of the system; but I wish to avail myself of your great professional experience and good judgment, and therefore request your candid opinion and criticism, upon this highly important branch of the department under my control.

DEAR SIR:—Your First Book-keeper, Mr. Chas. M. Livingston, having afforded me full opportunity of examining his books of account, and having freely responded to such observations and inquiries as my interest in the subject prompted me to make, I have great pleasure in replying to your favor of the 30th ult., requesting my "candid opinion and criticism," on the plan of accounting pursued in the department under your control.

The most significant commentary I can offer, will be found in my simply stating the fact, that in one half hour I found myself completely

master of the scheme of accounting I went to examine, comprising, as it does, some dozen distinct bureaux, with as many ledgers, all merging into and checked by the general ledger of the First Book-keeper, and preserving an unbroken and direct chain of reference, from any item, or class of items, in the aggregate, to the vouchers from which they emanate. The extreme simplicity with which the plan thus provides every facility to the Auditor, and, at the same time, affords the ample classifications and corroborative tests of double entry, speaks most conclusively for the clear comprehension of the originator; and I must in justice add, that I have seldom audited accounts, where the needed special adaptation to the purposes in view, was so promptly supplied.

The preliminary arrangement of triplicate vouchers, to be finally checked and filed in three distinct departments, forms a basis for this efficient system of accounting, which, so long as these vouchers are ascertained to be based on valid claims, seems to secure all that the best friends of reform can desire.

Of the accounts kept in your office prior to your administration of the affairs of the department, I have no further knowledge than what I derive from your official reports. These, however, have been sufficient to convince me, in common with the public generally, that a great change in the mode of keeping the accounts, was needed most urgently, and I am persuaded that the system you have substituted, cannot fail to be highly appreciated by all friends of reform.

In the system you now pursue, the tax levies and funds under your cognizance are exhibited in gross, and charged to the parties held responsible therefor; they are further distributed, under the various heads of appropriation, and the expenditures arrayed against them; the balances, at the end, agreeing exactly with the assets found remaining. Moreover, the vouchers copied and aggregated, afford a check that corroborates the final results, after this immense mass of data has been digested, through the double entry process of arrangement, and emerges in the form of a balance sheet; and, independently of this, the plan embraces numerous checks between the head and subordinate bureaux, thus furnishing proof, claiming all but the certainty of absolute demonstration to the Book-keeper or Auditor, that "all is right." These most essential elements of a system of accounting being now combined, and suc-

SIR:—I herewith transmit the Quarterly Report, for the quarter ending September 30, 1860, in tabular form, exhibiting all the expenditures for work done under the supervision of this Bureau; also, the number of contracts made, contracts completed, bids opened, and contracts awarded and sent to the Common Council for confirmation, during the quarter.

Since my last Quarterly Report, the following old contracts have been re-advertised for re-letting, viz:

Thirty-ninth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, flagging.

Fifty-fifth street, between Third and Fifth, and Seventh and Eighth avenues, regulating.

Fifty-sixth street, between Third and Fifth avenues, regulating.

Eighth avenue, between Eighty-second and One hundred and second streets, regulating.

I would respectfully call your attention to the recommendations for various improvements in my last and former reports, and by you submitted to the Common Council, which, in my opinion, require the attention and consideration of that Body, especially, those portions relating to the establishing of an exterior street along the water, in the upper part of the city, and amending and adjusting

the grades of the adjacent streets and avenues to conform thereto, and for which it will require an act of the Legislature, which should be applied for at the next session. If some action is not taken in the matter, a great portion of the water front on each river will be useless.

I, also, submit an estimate of the amount necessary to be appropriated and raised by tax for the year 1861, for the expense of the work required to be done under the supervision of this Bureau.

SIR:—In accordance with instructions, contained in your circular letter of September 13th, I herewith transmit the third quarterly report for the year; showing the business of this Bureau for the three months, ending September 30, 1860.

In statement marked "A" I have given a detailed account of the amount of expenditures, together with the application of the same, for the third quarter of the year 1860, commencing July 1, ending September 30, 1860.

In statement "B" the business of the first, second and third quarters is shown, together with the total expenditures for the three quarters.

Statement "C" shows the appropriations upon which I have been permitted to draw; the amount of vouchers drawn for the three quarters; the existing liabilities; together with the available balances. In making up the liabilities, I have separated the amount of contracts awarded and not confirmed, from the amount of contracts in progress and not completed, from the fact that some of the contracts awarded July 24th, owing to the exhausted condition of the Appropriation for Wharves, Piers and Slips, were delayed, in compliance with instructions from your office, viz: for

Building pier foot of Twenty-third street, East river.....	\$21,891 00

This amount being deducted from the previously reported amount of liabilities, enabled me to report in my monthly statement of September 1st, the amount of contracts awarded and not confirmed at \$36,055 20.

Since my last quarterly report, contracts to the amount of \$5,722 00, have expired by the limitation of time allowed for confirmation, as per clause in the proposals "that if such confirmation shall not be made within three months after such award, the said party of the second part, and his sureties, and the parties of the first part, shall, thereupon, be released and discharged from all obligations to execute the said contracts," these contracts are as follow:

Bulkhead on line of Hammond street, North river, awarded April 20.....	\$1,343 00
Rebuilding outer end of pier No. 25, East river, awarded June 1.....	1,479 00
Repairing pier No. 31, East river, awarded June 1.....	2,900 00

These deductions now enable me to report the amount of contracts awaiting confirmation at \$30,333 20, thereby reducing the gross amount of liabilities so as to leave an available balance of the Appropriation for Wharves,

Piers and Slips, of \$9,999 62, to be expended for necessary repairs, until the appropriations for 1861 are confirmed.

In connection with the usual report, I transmit for your consideration, an estimate of the appropriations for the year 1861, prepared after a careful inspection of the wharves, piers and slips under my charge, amounting to three hundred and thirty-four thousand three hundred dollars.

The item of seventy-five thousand dollars, (\$75,000), for building new piers, is inserted in this estimate in view of the increasing demands of the commercial interests on the East river.

The item of sixty-thousand dollars, (\$60,000), for dredging slips, is absolutely required to render the Corporation slips, available for ships of the present tonnage; the amount of dredging required to be done yearly is largely increased by the deposits from the sewers into the slips, and being mostly of sand, are not affected by the action of the tides; these deposits in a very short time, will fill up the slips at the bulkheads in front of the sewers to such an extent, that at low water the vessels are grounded.

This can only be remedied by extending the sewer the entire length of the pier, so that the deposits being emptied into the river, may be washed away by the strong currents. During the present year, but few sunken vessels have been removed, thereby leaving me a balance of three thousand, nine hundred and thirty-five dollars, (\$3,935), of the Appropriation for "Sunken vessels Removing," this balance together with the appropriation of five thousand dol-

lars (\$5000), estimated for 1861, will enable me to perform the work ordered, or what is reasonable to expect will be ordered by the Common Council, chargeable to this appropriation.

SIR:—In compliance with instructions contained in your circular of September 30, 1860, I herewith transmit a detailed statement of the work performed, vouchers drawn and liabilities incurred during the quarter ending September 30, 1860, together with my opinions and recommendations in relation to the condition of the various roads and avenues, under the supervision of this Bureau.

During the quarter ending September 30, 1860, vouchers have been drawn by me on account of "Appropriations for Roads and Avenues," amounting to thirteen thousand, and twelve dollars and four cents, (\$13,012 04), liabilities have been incurred, for which vouchers have not been rendered, amounting to about sixteen hundred dollars, (\$1600 00), making the expenditures and liabilities for the quarter ending September 30, 1860, amount to fourteen thousand, six hundred and twelve dollars and four cents, (\$14 612 04).

This, together with the amount drawn at the date of my last quarterly report, viz: "twenty-six thousand, six hundred and two dollars, and forty-four cents, (\$26,602 44), makes the aggregate amount of expenditures and liabilities, by this Bureau, since January 1, 1860, forty thousand, nine hundred and twenty-four dollars, and four cents, (\$40,924 04), which deducted from the appropriation for "Roads and Avenues," for the year 1860, leaves an available balance of eight thousand seven hundred and eighty-five dollars, and fifty-two cents, (\$8,785 52).

The insufficiency of the appropriation for "Roads and Avenues," for the year 1860, referred to in my previous reports, is now plainly apparent, being reduced to about ten thousand dollars; (\$10,000 00,) for this reason, I have deemed it expedient to recommend that the force be discharged, to reduce the expenditures, and render the balance of the appropriation available for the payment of work and material, necessary to keep the roads and avenues in passable condition, during the coming fall and winter.

The cessation of operations by this Bureau, has taken place at a time when the greater portions of the roads are not in that order and condition, that the actual necessities of the traveling community demand.

There are parts of the roads, however, that are in excellent condition and give general satisfaction, but a constant force would have to be employed, and a large amount of material used to keep them in permanent order, owing to the heavy rains that are constantly washing them away.

MANHATTAN STREET.

The work directed to be done on this street, by resolution of the Common Council, is now completed, and in good condition.

FORT WASHINGTON DEPOT ROAD.

This road is now completed, and gives general satisfaction, great care has been taken in repairing it so as to render it durable and permanent.

BLOOMINGDALE ROAD.

To make this an excellent road, the greater portion should be Macadamized, for which purpose there is a large quantity of stone prepared along the line, and to keep it in good order and repair, would require a large amount of material to be used, and a force constantly employed.

KINGSBRIDGE ROAD.

To avoid the necessity of frequent repairs, I would recommend that this entire road be Macadamized, which could be effected at an expense of about fifteen thousand dollars, (\$15,000 00).

SECOND AVENUE.

The contract with John Kinsley, for Macadamizing Second avenue, is progressing about as rapidly as at the date of last quarterly report. A statement of the amount which has been drawn in his favor during the last quarter, is subjoined.

Since my last quarterly report, a contract has been entered into with Stephen Walker, for working Eleventh avenue, as a country road, the work on which is now progressing rapidly under the supervision of the Inspector.

An estimate of the amount of money that will probably be required during the coming year, to keep the roads in order, is also subjoined agreeable to your instructions.

THE BATTERY PARK.

I have had a number of men actively employed in grading and repairing the walks with good foundry ashes and sand, well screened and mixed; the curb raised and re-set around the grassplots; making new walks for the greater convenience of the public; also, receiving good mould on the enlargement, which enabled me to remove many nuisances, such as removing dead trees, &c., and, in fact, performing every thing actually necessary.

BOWLING GREEN.

This park has been cleaned, the plants therein pruned, the fountain and railing repaired, and all, at present, is in good condition.

CITY HALL PARK.

In this park I am having the walks overhauled and repaired with foundry ashes and sand. The flags in various parts require relaying. The park is at present in a clean state.

WASHINGTON PARK.

This park is in good order, and well cared for, the shrubbery will be trimmed, shortly. I would recommend

that portions of the flagging be relaid, and the walks repaired, before the winter sets in.

UNION PARK.

This park is in admirable order, and kept very clean; the plants have been trimmed; the borders spaded; some seed sown, and all looks well. Portions of the flags around the fountain need raising, which will cost but a trifle.

MADISON PARK.

In a former report I recommended a line of flags to be laid in the principal walks, I, again, renew the recommendation. The picket fence broken down, has been replaced, but the balance will certainly come to the ground. The borders have been spaded, and the men employed are actively engaged in keeping the park clean.

PARK, THIRD AVENUE AND SEVENTH STREET.

This park is in very good order, and a gardener is engaged in clearing and trimming the shrubbery, (since the removal of the market sheds,) the railing has been scraped, cleaned and received two coats of bright green paint. The park greatly adds to the appearance of the neighborhood.

EAST AND WEST STUYVESANT PARK.

These parks are in very good order, and are kept in fair condition; the flowers, shrubbery and other plants are well cared for. I would recommend the flags to be raised, as the last rains have formed deep gutters, carrying off the gravel; also, the railing needs painting.

ABINGDON PARK.

This park has been cleaned, and the plants and shrubbery placed in good condition for preservation, during the stormy weather. I would recommend that the railing receive a coat of paint.

CHRISTOPHER STREET PARK.

This park has been completely cleaned, and attention is paid to keeping it in order; the railing looks well, since being painted.

PARK, ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SECOND STREET AND THIRD AVENUE.

This park has been cleaned, and all nuisances removed; looks well, and needs but little care for the balance of the year.

PARK, WEST BROADWAY AND BEACH STREET.

This park has been put in good order, and cleaned completely. The railing needs painting.

DUANE STREET PARK.

This park has been placed in good condition, and perfectly cleaned. The railing needs painting.

FIVE POINTS PARK

Has become a common, and will be until an iron railing surrounds it.

RESERVOIR SQUARE.

This park is fast approaching to something like the appearance of a site for a public park. Vast quantities of rubbish have been removed, and, still, much requires to be done. The ground has been surveyed.

FOURTH AVENUE PARKS.

These parks receive great attention, much labor is still required, large quantities of garden mould have been received, and timothy, clover and grass seed sown. It will be necessary to procure a number of plants and shrubbery for the park, as soon as the season will permit. So far, the work performed gives general satisfaction.

TOMPKINS SQUARE.

Since the park has been thrown open to the public much care has been taken to protect the young trees from being destroyed. This park needs gutters, to carry off the water, small picket gates, a railing around the fountain, and some flagging.

MOUNT MORRIS PARK.

There has been nothing doné with this park, as the action of the Common Council is deemed necessary, before certain portions of the work can be proceeded with.

There are employed in each of the following parks, two keepers, viz: Battery, City Hall, Washington, Union, East and West Stuyvesant, Madison and Tompkins squares; and each keeper receives one dollar and fifty cents per day.

The number of laboring men during this quarter, averages sixty-eight (68), and I state, that those men from time to time are employed on different parks, through the city, and a rule I have made is when one or more could be dispensed with, without detriment to the interests of the city, to discharge him or them, believing, as I have before taken occasion to say, that I am authorized to employ only the men to keep the public grounds in order.

G. W. SMITH, ESQ., *Street Commissioner*:

SIR:—In compliance with your circular letter of September 13th, I herewith transmit my report of the business done in this bureau, for the quarter ending September 30th. In Appendix marked A, you will find an abstract of all vouchers certified by me, during the quarter. In Appendix B, you will find a statement, showing the amounts paid for gas to the various police stations, public offices, &c., and for fitting, repairing and lighting public lamps, &c. In Appendix C, a statement of expenditures, as shown by the certified vouchers of this bureau, with the balance available; also, amount of bills unpaid, amounting to thirty-one thousand three hundred and forty-two dollars (\$31,342), which constitute all bills and claims at this date, for work done during the year, and vouchers for which, were this day transmitted to you, leaving a balance of one hundred and eighty-one thousand seven hundred and fifty-seven dollars and eight cents (\$181,757 08) of the appropriation for lamps and gas, against which there are no bills or claims of any description whatever. Also, in accordance with your request, an estimate of appropriations required for this bureau, for the year 1861, for which see Appendix D.

The number of gas lamps mentioned in the first line of each gas company, is the number that I suppose will be burning on the 1st of January next; while the additional is the number estimated to be required during the year, to light up new streets, &c., in accordance with resolutions of Common Council. The amount for gas regulators

I have included therein, as a petition for the same is now pending before the Committee of Lamps and Gas of the Board of Councilmen; and I would earnestly recommend that the same might be favorably acted on, without unnecessary delay, as, from the result already obtained from those now purchased, I feel well assured, that by their use, a large saving could be effected in the consumption of gas, in the various police stations, public offices, &c.

Should the award of contracts for one thousand lamp-posts, lamp-irons, and gas lamps, which are now pending before the Common Council, be confirmed, the new ones called for in this estimate will probably not be required during the year 1861. I will also state, that from an estimate of the probable expenses necessary to be incurred, during the next three months, there will remain, on the 31st of December next, an unexpended balance of about seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000.)

On the 2d day of January next, the contract with A. & G. Brandon, for repairing and re-glazing the public lamps will have expired; and I would recommend that measures be taken before the close of the year, to have a new contract made, in order that the repairing of the public lamps may be continued legally, for if left over until next year, before the same shall be advertised, and the award of contract made, six months of the year will probably have expired before confirmation by the Common Council, during which time the work would have to be done by this department, contrary to the provisions of the charter. The contracts with the Harlem and New York Gaslight Companies are in the same condition as mentioned in all my previous reports, no action having yet been taken thereon by the Common Council.

On the ninth of August last, an award of contracts for one thousand lamp-posts was made to Hugo V. Ungelter, at one and seventy-three one hundredths of a cent per pound, and for one thousand lamp-irons, and drilling and tapping the cross-heads, at seventy-seven cents each. Also for one thousand gas lamps, to Alexander Brandon, at one dollar and ninety-nine cents each; and the same were sent by you to the Common Council for confirmation; the papers were referred to the Committee of Lamps and Gas, and no further action has been had thereon.

During the last quarter, eight lamp-posts only have been fitted up by the Manhattan Gaslight Company, and ten by the Harlem Gas Company, as follows:

By Manhattan Company Thirty-fifth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, opposite a church.....	2	“

The lighting of two lamps have been discontinued, and the same taken up, making the total number lighted by the Manhattan Gas Company, on September 30th, 8988.

The Harlem Gas Company have fitted up and lighted, in One hundred and eleventh street, both sides, between Third and Fourth avenues, ten lamps. Making the total number lighted, September 30th, 2,350.

It appears from the foregoing statement, that the available balance of \$7,136 37, as shown in last Quarterly report, is entirely exhausted. This can be accounted for by the fact, that the outstanding bills have exceeded the estimated amounts, by the payment of about \$1,800 to inspectors on contract work, the payment of \$941 for extra

work on Tompkins Market, not included in last report, and by small repairs that have been deemed indispensably necessary.

We are, therefore, at the approach of winter, when it is particularly requisite that the exterior, at least, of the public buildings should be in good order, without the means of making such repairs as the safety and preservation of the public property absolutely demands.

SIR:—In accordance with instructions in your circular letter of September 13th, I herewith transmit the third Quarterly Report of the business done by this bureau, ending September 30, 1860.

In statement marked " A " you have the usual account, in detail, of the amounts furnished each office and department with which this bureau has transacted business for the third quarter of the year 1860, ending September 30th.

In statement " B " will be seen the appropriations from which I have been permitted to draw, with the amounts expended for the third quarter, and total amounts for the three quarters ending September 30th, as well as balances unexpended, subject to the control of this bureau.

The statement shows a balance of only three hundred and ten dollars and eighty-six cents, on the appropriation for supplies for and cleaning public offices. I have already made out vouchers and sent them to your department, amounting to five thousand one hundred and ninety-seven dollars and seventy-six cents, which should properly belong to that appropriation, but I defer charging them to it. Your instructions in the matter as requested, knowing it will overdraw the appropriation—in my report of March 31st, I took occasion then to say, that in consequence of the additional charge to this bureau of the sup-

plying of the Police Courts, cleaning the same, and cleaning of all the Civil Courts and public offices, I should be obliged to draw much more heavily from the appropriation for Supplies for, and Cleaning Public Offices, than was at first intended when making up the estimates for the year, and that the Fire Department had also drawn very heavily from this appropriation to newly furnish many of the engine, hose, and hook and ladder houses, with chairs, stools, tables, &c. This appropriation, from its title, embraces so much, and has so many demands upon it from all of the offices in the Corporation, that it is with the greatest difficulty I have been enabled to keep it even as low as it is. I have been, and still am compelled, from day to day, to put off parties that greatly need supplies, and it would seem actually necessary that some provision be made soon to settle outstanding liabilities, as well as incur some additional expense for supplies needed between the present time and the usual time of the passage of the Tax Levy.

The appropriation for supplies for Police Department, with bills in the office to audit is entirely exhausted, and I have, by your instructions, directed the Police Commissioners to make no more requisitions for supplies of any kind upon this bureau until there is provision made for their payment. Owing to misinterpretation of circular issued from your department informing him of the exhaustion of the appropriation of Supplies for and Cleaning Public Offices, the Chief Engineer of Fire Department has discontinued giving requisitions upon this bureau, but is, as I am informed, supplying them directly from his office. I would suggest that just previous to the issuing of the circular, this bureau supplied itself from the appro-

priation of "Fire Department" with a large amount of supplies for the department, and they are still on hand awaiting orders of the Chief to be delivered to the different companies. Your attention is respectfully called to this matter.

In paper marked "C" you have an estimate of appropriations necessary for expenditures to be incurred during the year 1861. The appropriation for Supplies for, and Cleaning Public Offices, embraces fuel, stoves, furniture, printed books, and cleaning all courts and offices of the city government. In asking for thirty-five thousand dollars for Police Department, my estimate is based upon the fact that there has already been expended nearly twenty-five thousand dollars, and only nine months of the year have passed; and the winter months are fast approaching, with additional cost for fuel and stores; beside a continual increase of the working police force is being made from time to time, demanding additional expense.

The outstanding liabilities of the bureau have been pretty closely gathered in, and amount, as near as can be ascertained, to five thousand dollars, which includes all bills in the office, but not yet audited.

GENTLEMEN:—The two years for which I was appointed Street Commissioner, on the 11th of November, 1858, having expired, I now, under the Charter, only hold the office until the appointment of my successor.

Since the commencement of my connection with this Department, including the time that Edward Cooper was Street Commissioner (viz.: from April 9th, 1858), to this date, there have been expenditures incurred, and requisitions made upon the Comptroller, by the Street Commissioner, for the payment thereof, amounting to...\$3,554,604 91

In various quarterly and annual reports, I have had occasion to fully discuss the requirements and condition of the Street Department. I would now only advert to the fact, that this varied and important business, at the time Mayor Tiemann came into office, in 1858, was in an extremely disordered condition—the result, in part, of ignorance, neglect and designing fraud, and, in part, of defective laws—increased, no doubt, by the fact that for some time previous there had been two claimants for the office of Street Commissioner, both tramelled by injunctions preventing the regular and systematic transaction of the public business.

Previous to 1858, it was customary for the Street Commissioner, from time to time, to draw upon the Comptroller for one or more hundred thousand dollars, as he thought proper. Upon these general requisitions, the public money was received into his possession, and accounted for by vouchers or receipts of persons to whom he (the Street Commissioner) made payments. I objected to this system, and refused to receive the money, and insisted that the Finance Department should make payments upon proper

requisition from this Department. This, in my judgment, is the most important change made in the manner of conducting the public business since my connection with the Department.

The system adopted for the transaction of business, the keeping of accounts and making payments, is similar to that of the Bureau of Construction under the Treasury Department of the General Government, at Washington, and was described in my first quarterly report to your Honorable Body, under date of January 31st, 1859, as follows:

“The Superintendent of the Bureau, having charge of a particular kind of work, or the furnishing of supplies, makes to the Street Commissioner a written report, setting forth the facts in the case, and his recommendation thereupon. If approved, the Street Commissioner, or Deputy, certifies to the necessity of the expenditure, as required by the Charter, and orders the work to be done, or the supplies to be furnished. The Superintendent, after the execution of the work, or delivery of the articles, examines the bill rendered to him, and, if it is found correct, he has triplicate vouchers made out in regular printed form, on each of which the account is copied. The original bill is filed in his office, and the triplicate vouchers, certified by him, are transmitted to this Department; if approved, they are certified by the Street Commissioner or Deputy, entered in the books of the office, and a requisition is then drawn upon the Comptroller, by the Street Commissioner, for the amount of the voucher. The requisition, with triplicate vouchers appended, is then sent, with letter of transmittal, to the Comptroller, by whom a warrant is drawn upon the treasury in favor of the party to whom the money is due, and this warrant is given to the party, upon signing a receipt for the amount upon each of the triplicate vouchers. The Comptroller retains one of the receipted vouch-

ers, and sends the other two to this office, one of which is filed here, and the other is transmitted to the office of the Bureau under which the expenditure was incurred. These triplicate vouchers form the basis of the whole system of payments and accounts, and in themselves are a record of all the money transactions of the Department, of which there is a complete file of original papers in the office of the Comptroller, in this office, and that of the Bureau under which the work was done."

After more than two years' trial of this system, I am perfectly satisfied with its operation.

In this connection, I take great pleasure in referring to the manner in which the books and records of this office are now kept. Previous to the 19th of April, 1858, when Mr. Edward Cooper was appointed Street Commissioner, no journal had ever been kept, and it was difficult or impossible to ascertain what the transactions of the Department had been. The books now furnish the most exact information, and in every form in which it can possibly be required, and, in connection with the monthly reports from the different Bureaux, enable the head of this Department to transact its business with a rapidity and facility which, two years ago, seemed impossible of attainment. This result has not been accomplished without close attention and diligent endeavor on the part of many of my subordinates, and to them I owe my warmest thanks.

The business records of the whole Department have been brought from a state of confusion, bordering on chaos, to a degree of clearness, regularity and accuracy that will compare favorably with any other establishment, either public or private.

In regard to the practical execution of work, whilst it has not always been what was desired, still I think that, in the main, the city has received an equivalent for the

money paid, in nearly every instance, and that speculation and fraud, once so common, have been, since the commencement of Mr. Edward Cooper's term of office, almost entirely unknown in this Department.

I have before this adverted to the defective laws and Charter of the city, and will here repeat, that they are fearful trammels upon a law-abiding officer, and give every excuse for evasion and open violation, to those who choose to disregard them.

Prominent amongst my former recommendations to the Common Council, and perhaps the most important, is that of a change in the fiscal year. Established precedent and ordinary judgment would seem to have made the necessity for the proposed change too plain to admit of a doubt. Nevertheless, it has been bitterly opposed in this city, and, notwithstanding the recommendation of the Common Council, has never been even discussed in the Legislature. It is a matter of vital importance, and the financial affairs of this city, as regards appropriations and expenditures of money, cannot be properly regulated until this change is made.

Important recommendations have been made by myself and Mr. Edward Ewen, in regard to the business of the Bureau of Street Improvements—including assessments for local improvements, change in the mode of appointing inspectors of contract work; changing grades, especially on the west side of the city, so as to conform to the new line established by the Harbor Commissioners, change of ordinance relative to street numbers, &c.—and they have not always met with the attention to which they are entitled.

In my first report, it was recommended that some plan be adopted—and I have never ceased to urge the necessity—for making the wharves of durable materials. Nothing has as yet been done. Recommendations have also

been made concerning the other Bureaux, not necessary to mention in this communication.

In calling attention to my previous reports and recommendations. I take this occasion to say, that had I fully known the lamentable condition of the business and records of the Department, the confusion, disorder and trouble connected with past unfinished transactions, and the inadequate authority conferred by the Charter and laws, I would not have accepted office in the Department. Having undertaken it, however, I have endeavored to discharge the duties properly. Whatever success may have resulted therefrom, is due mainly to the talents, zeal, industry and integrity of the officers associated with me in the Department. My thanks, and those of the community, are due to the gentlemen who have so strenuously exerted themselves in the great work of establishing every part of this varied, complicated and extensive business upon its present basis.

I have felt constrained to allude to recommendations made by this Department, which have not been favorably acted upon by the Common Council; and I now, with great pleasure, refer to the many ordinances passed by your Honorable Body, at the suggestion of this Department, and beg leave to tender my sincere thanks to the members of the Common Council, for the courtesy and kind politeness with which I have, on all occasions, been treated by them in official intercourse.

I am not sorry to have arrived at the end of my specified term of service, and shall endeavor to regulate the business so that it can be turned over to my successor in good condition, without delay, whenever he may be appointed.

REPORT.

LAW DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK,
OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY TO THE CORPORATION,
Nos. 82 and 84 Nassau street, Dec. 20, 1860.

*To the Hon. the Common Council
of the City of New York:*

In pursuance of section 30, of article 3, of chapter five, of the Revised Ordinances of 1859, I have the honor to transmit herewith the titles of all the actions in my hands, which I am authorized by section twenty of said chapter, to prosecute, on behalf of the Corporation, now pending and undetermined.

The schedule hereto annexed marked A, contains the titles of all actions which are now pending in the Appellate Courts, and those which have been commenced in Courts of Record. Schedule B contains the titles of those causes which are still pending and undetermined in the courts of the different Justices of the District Courts of the city. Schedule C contains the different cases in which proceedings are now pending, in bastardy and abandonment cases.

When I first assumed the duties of this office, in January last, I found numerous complaints against the several city railroad companies, for running their city passenger cars without licenses. They generally denied their liability to pay license fees to the city. I therefore commenced immediate prosecutions against the Sixth, Eighth and Ninth Avenue Railroad Companies respectively, to secure a ju-

judicial determination of the question. These have resulted in an acknowledgment of their liability on the part of these several companies to take out and pay for licenses for as many cars as is equal to the highest number run by them on any one day during the year, which, I am perfectly satisfied, they will perform with exactitude, and have, therefore, abandoned all prosecutions against them.

The Harlem Railroad Company, the Second Avenue Railroad Company, and the Third Avenue Railroad Company run a large number of cars, and pay no license fee whatever to the city for any of them, and have never paid any license fees since they commenced to run their cars. The suits now instituted against them are intended to bring the question of their liability to as speedy a judicial determination as possible, since it is a loss of many thousand dollars to the city annually, besides being unjust to the lines of omnibuses, and the other city railroad companies who pay license fees.

During the last year, there have been five thousand and seventy-eight complaints made and entered in the books of this office, for violations of the city ordinances, all of which have received proper attention. About three thousand of these complaints were dismissed upon satisfactory explanation, and prompt compliance with the law, without suit. Prosecutions were commenced on the balance of these complaints, for the recovery of the penalties attached to the offence, a portion of which were subsequently discontinued by your direction, others upon satisfactory explanation, and others because the parties complained of could not be found. The result of the cases prosecuted will be seen from my monthly returns to the Comptroller. These

returns will also show that I have accounted to the city for six thousand four hundred and sixty-three dollars and seventy-seven cents, to December 1st, 1860, collected for penalties, which amount will probably be brought to exceed seven thousand dollars, with the returns to be made for the current month.

From these penalties, I have paid to the Treasurer of the Fire Department, two hundred and twenty-five dollars, which they were entitled to under your ordinances, being recovered for violations of regulations connected with that department. These returns will compare with the returns made from this office for previous years, as follows:

At its last session, the Legislature abolished the Board of Governors of the Alms-House, for which I was counsel, under your ordinance, and established in its place the Board of "Commissioners of Charities and Correction." This act authorized these Commissioners to appoint their own Attorney and Counsel, but made no provision for his payment. Upon being informed of this by one of the Commissioners, I offered to continue to act as Attorney and Counsel to the new Board, in whatever case they might see proper to call upon me; waiving all claim to compensation or reward. That Board has accordingly called upon me during the past year to prosecute about one hundred and fifty bastardy and abandonment cases, which have all been attended to by this bureau.

Extracts from the Charter and Ordinances in relation to Appropriations.

Annual and occasional appropriations shall be made by proper ordinances of the Common Council for every branch and object of city expenditure; and no money shall be drawn from the City Treasury, except the same shall have been previously appropriated to the purpose for which it is drawn.—*Charter, Section 31.*

No expense shall be incurred by any of the departments, or officers thereof, whether the object of expenditure shall have been ordered by the Common Council or not, unless an appropriation shall have been previously made covering such expense.—*Ib., Section 28.*

The Chamberlain shall keep books, showing the amounts paid on account of the several appropriations; and no warrants shall be paid on account of any appropriation after the amount authorized to be raised by tax for that specific purpose shall have been expended.—*Ib., Section 22.*

He (the Comptroller) shall submit to the Common Council, on or before the first day of November in each year, a detailed estimate of the receipts and expenditures for the year, commencing on the first of January following, in order that the annual appropriations may then be made; and, also, an estimate of the probable amount of tax that may be required for the year, commencing on the first of January following, with the draft of an act authorizing the raising of such tax, in order that application may be made to the Legislature for authority to levy the same.—*Revised Ordinances, 1859, pp. 58, 59.*

All resolutions, authorizing expenditures to be hereafter made, shall provide for defraying the same from the general appropriations for the year; but in case any special appropriations shall be made for any object of expenditure, under any of the several heads of accounts, the same shall be considered as forming a part of the several heads of accounts, and of the general appropriation.—*Ib., p. 187.*

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,

Gentlemen of the Common Council of the City of New York :

In compliance with the requirement of existing ordinances, the Comptroller herewith presents to your Honorable Bodies his estimates of the receipts and expenditures of the Corporation, for the year commencing January 1, 1861, and of the probable amount required to be raised by taxation in said year ; also, a draft of an ordinance, making the annual appropriations, and draft of an act of the State Legislature, empowering the Board of Supervisors of this county to levy and impose a tax, for so much of the amount as said Board are not authorized, by existing laws, to raise in that manner.*

° The following is a copy of a resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen, January 16, 1860, and of the reply thereto of the Corporation Counsel :

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be, and he is hereby requested to inform this Board whether the Corporation of the city of New York is possessed of authority to levy and raise money by taxation, for the ordinary support of the City Government, including donations, such as it has been customary for many years for the Common Council to make, and whether it is necessary that the taxes required to be imposed and raised for said purposes should be levied by the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York ; also, whether it is necessary to procure the passage of a special law every year, in order to levy such taxes. (*Vide Journal Board of Ald.*, page 108.)

OFFICE OF COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,
New York, Jan. 31, 1860.

The resolution of the Board of Aldermen, on the subject of levying taxes, requests me, in substance, to inform the Board whether the Corporation of the city has authority to levy taxes for the ordinary support of the city government, including such donations as it has been customary for the Common Council to make ; or whether the taxes for those purposes must be levied by the Board of Supervisors ; and whether it is necessary to procure a special law every year, authorizing the levy of such taxes.

I do not find that the Corporation of the city, acting through the medium of the Common Council, has any authority to levy taxes. The power was formerly vested in the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen, acting as Supervisors (2 R. S. 1813, p. 399, sec. 150). It is now vested in a Board of twelve Supervisors, elected annually. (Laws of 1857, chap. 590.) In my opinion, the authority to levy taxes, for the ordinary support of the City Government, must be exercised by the Board of Supervisors, and not by the Corporation.

The Amended Charter (chap. 446, of the Laws of 1857) provides as follows:

Annual and occasional appropriations shall be made, by proper ordinances of the Common Council, for every branch and object of city expenditure; and no money shall be drawn from the City Treasury, except the same shall have been previously appropriated to the purpose for which it is drawn.—*Section 31.*

No expense shall be incurred by any of the departments, or officers thereof, whether the object of expenditure shall have been ordered by the Common Council or not, unless an appropriation shall have been previously made covering such expense.—*Section 28.*

The Chamberlain shall keep books, showing the amounts paid on account of the several appropriations; and no warrants shall be paid on account of any appropriation, after the amount authorized to be raised by tax for that specific purpose shall have been expended.—*Section 22.*

The revenues of the Corporation, exclusive of taxes, are principally pledged and devoted to either the Sinking Fund, for the redemption of the City Debt, or the Sinking Fund for the payment of Interest on the City Debt. All of the income applicable to the support of the City Government, is derived from the sources detailed on page 21.

The act of 1813, already mentioned, provides, that the Supervisors of this city shall meet annually, "and examine and ascertain what sums of money are by law imposed on the said city, in that year, for the maintenance of the poor, for defraying the contingent charges of said city, and for other purposes; and shall cause the same to be raised, levied, and collected in the said city, in the same manner as the contingent charges of the several counties of this State are directed to be levied and collected." Taking this provision in connection with the general law in relation to the Boards of Supervisors of the several counties in the State, it seems to confer sufficient authority, without any further legislation, to levy and collect taxes annually, to defray all the expenses which are by law imposed on the city. But the provision has received a different practical construction, both by the Legislature and the city authorities. In nearly, or quite every year since the enactment of the law of 1813, the Legislature has passed an enabling statute, authorizing the Board of Supervisors to levy and collect certain sums of money, to defray the expenses of the City Government for that year; and these laws have usually, if not uniformly, been passed on the application of the Common Council. After the long period during which this construction has prevailed, I should not think it safe for the Board of Supervisors to levy the annual taxes, without special authority for that purpose.

After what has been said, it is hardly necessary to add, that neither the Corporation nor the Supervisors have authority to levy taxes, for the purpose of making donations. The tax law of 1859 (chap. 489), provided, among other things, for donations, to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars; and a like provision has been made in some prior years. But those powers were exhausted when the Supervisors had acted upon them.

It will therefore be seen, that although appropriations are required to be made for all purposes, before any expense can be lawfully incurred, nearly the whole amount of money necessary to pay such appropriations must be raised by taxation.

Under the present system, much embarrassment is caused by the delay and uncertainty of the action of the Legislature, in relation to amounts needed for various purposes. Although the necessary appropriation for a given object may have been duly made by a "proper ordinance of the Common Council," in case there is no money in the Treasury applicable to the payment of the expense, the Comptroller must either withhold his sanction to the making of a contract for executing the work, until authority is granted by the Legislature to raise the amount by tax, or run the risk of exposing the public property to a forced sale upon an execution, in satisfaction of the claim of the contractor.

Although the passage, by the Common Council, of an order to execute a particular work, and the making of a suitable appropriation for it, may confer all necessary authority for action by the proper Executive Department, something further is necessary to provide the means to pay the expense. If the receipts of the General Fund are insufficient for that purpose, recourse must be had to the Legislature for authority to raise the amount by taxation, and if such authority is not granted, then the debt incurred for such work cannot be paid from the treasury.

This important subject is recommended to the serious consideration of the Common Council.

GENERAL CLASSIFICATION OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES.

For greater convenience in considering the Estimates, the Receipts and Expenditures of the Corporation are divided and classed under the following five general heads, viz. :

I. SUPPORT OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT,—Including the expenses of the Department of Charities and Correction, Board of Education, Board of Central Park Commissioners, Board of Health, City Courts, and the usual Contributions to various Charitable and other Institutions.

II. INTEREST ON THE CITY DEBT.

III. REDEMPTION OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE CITY DEBT.

IV. PUBLIC WORKS,—The cost of which is defrayed by loans upon Corporation Stocks.

V. PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS,—The expense of which is defrayed by Assessments for benefits upon property in the vicinity of the improvement.

The objects for which “annual and occasional appropriations” are required to be made “by proper ordinances of the Common Council,” are comprised under the first, second and third heads, and include all expenses provided for by taxation, and the estimates required from the Comptroller refer exclusively to those expenses.

SUPPORT OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT.

The estimates of the expenses for this purpose are provided for under the titles of the several Departments, Commissions and Officers having more immediate charge and cognizance of the same, as follows:

I. THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT:

AN ORDINANCE

MAKING THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK FOR THE YEAR 1861, THE PAYMENT OF THE INTEREST ON A PORTION OF THE CITY DEBT, AND THE ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS UPON THE PRINCIPAL OF SAID DEBT BECOMING DUE IN SAID YEAR ; ALSO, AUTHORIZING THE BORROWING OF MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF THE COLLECTION OF THE REVENUES.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows :

SECTION 1. In order to provide for the support of the government of the city of New York, and of the several Departments, Boards and Commissions, charged with the administration of particular branches thereof, for and during the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the following sums of money are hereby respectively appropriated to and for the objects and purposes hereinafter set forth, that is to say :

SECTION 4. The Comptroller is hereby authorized to borrow, from time to time, on the credit of the Corporation, in anticipation of its revenues, and not to exceed in amount such revenues, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet expenditures under the appropriations for the current year, and to issue Revenue Bonds, in the usual form, for the moneys so borrowed; also, to redeem and cancel the said bonds, from time to time, at or before the maturity of the same, out of the moneys arising from the revenues aforesaid.

SECTION 5. It shall not be lawful for any department or officer of the city government, or other person or persons, to incur expenses for any purpose whatever, on account of the Corporation, or to be paid from the city treasury, unless an appropriation therefor, sufficient to cover such expense, shall have been previously made by the Common Council, nor unless such expense shall have been expressly authorized by competent authority.

A N A C T

TO ENABLE THE SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NEW YORK TO RAISE MONEY BY TAX TO DEFRAY THE EXPENSES, IN PART, OF THE SUPPORT OF THE GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, AND TO REGULATE THE EXPENDITURE THEREOF; ALSO, TO PROVIDE FOR DEFICIENCIES CAUSED BY ERRONEOUS ASSESSMENTS AND THE NON-COLLECTION OF TAXES.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SECTION 1. The Board of Supervisors of the County of New York are hereby empowered and directed, as soon as conveniently may be, after the passage of this act, to order and cause to be raised by tax, on the estates subject to taxation according to law, within the said county, and to be collected according to law, a sum not exceeding three millions five hundred and sixty-five thousand six hundred and ninety-two dollars, on account of the Corporation of the City of New York, for the following purposes to wit :

SEC. 2. The amount so authorized to be raised for the expenses of the said Corporation, which are, or may be incurred for cleaning streets in that part of the said city lying south of a line running through the centre of Fifty-seventh street, shall be assessed only upon the estates taxable for such purpose lying and being south of said line.

SEC. 3. The said Board of Supervisors are hereby also empowered, in case of any judgment or judgments being obtained against the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York, after the passage of this act, and before the annual taxes for the year 1861 are levied, which judgment or judgments shall be founded upon claims or debts not contemplated in any estimates or appropriations heretofore made by the Common Council of said city, or by the said Board of Supervisors, and not provided for in any of the several amounts, by this act, or other law, authorized to be raised by taxes, or which may have been heretofore raised for such purpose, upon the request of the Comptroller of said city, to include in the amount of taxes to be raised for and on account of said Corporation for the year 1861, such sum as shall be sufficient to satisfy such judgment or judgments, and all legal costs and expenses incident thereto, for which the said Corporation may be liable; and such sum shall be collected in the same manner as other taxes are by law collected.

SEC. 4. In case any such judgment or judgments shall be recovered against the said Corporation, at any time after the annual taxes for the year 1861 shall have been levied by said Board of Supervisors, and before the annual taxes for the year next succeeding shall have been levied, the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York are authorized to borrow, upon the credit of the Corporation, such sums of money as, from time to time, may be necessary for the payment of such judgment or judgments, and the legal costs and expenses incident thereto, and which the said Corporation may be liable to pay, and to issue Revenue Bonds therefor, in the usual form, the same to be payable at any time during the year 1862, from the taxes and other revenues of the Corporation, applicable to such purposes, for that year; and the Board of Supervisors, or other body authorized to levy the taxes for said city, for the said year 1862, shall include an amount sufficient to pay such Revenue Bonds, so issued, with the interest thereon, in the annual tax levy for said year, in addition to the amounts provided in said levy for other purposes; and the same shall be collected in the manner provided by law for the collection of other taxes.

§ 3. No portion of the sums of money heretofore appropriated by the Common Council, or which may hereafter be appropriated by it, for any specified objects or purposes, whether said moneys were or are to be hereafter raised by taxation, or received from other sources, shall be expended for or applied to any other objects or purposes than those specifically named and provided for in such appropriations. PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that in case any original appropriation made by said Common Council, shall be found insufficient for the uses or purposes for which the same was made, it shall be lawful for said Common Council, upon the recommendation of the Comptroller, either, by resolution or ordinance, a transfer to the credit of such deficient appropriation, of such amount or amounts as may be found necessary, from any other appropriation or appropriations in which there may be an excess or surplus over the estimated expenditures to be made for the current year, on account of which the said mentioned appropriation or appropriations were made; and the sum or amounts so transferred shall be deemed and taken to have been originally embraced in such deficient appropriation.

§ 4. It shall be the duty of the said Board of Supervisors to take in any and every Ordinance or Resolution passed by them authorizing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, within the city and county of New York, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per cent. of said aggregate amount, to take for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor.

§ 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Common Council:

In obedience to the ordinances of the Common Council, I submit the following report concerning the operations of this department, for the year 1860.

The number of actions and special proceedings in which the Corporation was a party, either in form or interest, which were pending when I came into office at the commencement of the year, was between three and four hundred.

The schedule marked A, hereto annexed, contains a list of twelve judgments which had been recovered against

the Corporation before I came into office ; ten of which judgments, amounting, in the aggregate, to more than six hundred and fifty thousand dollars, besides interest, have, by the joint action of the Comptroller and the Counsel to the Corporation, been vacated and annulled within the present year. In the two other cases the motions to set aside the judgments were denied.

SCHEDULE B contains a list of four judgments recovered against the Corporation, in the Marine Court, prior to the present year. Perpetual injunctions against the collection of these judgments have been obtained within the year, but accompanied with provisions under which the matters in controversy may yet become the subjects of legal investigation.

SCHEDULE C contains a list of thirteen proceedings to open or widen streets or public squares, which proceedings were pending at the commencement of the year, with the disposition which has been made of the same.

SCHEDULE D contains a list of eighteen proceedings to open streets, which have been commenced within the year, with the present condition of those cases.

SCHEDULE E contains a list of seventy actions and special proceedings which have been finally disposed of within the present year.

SCHEDULE F contains a list of actions and special proceedings which have been tried or argued the present year, but are not yet finally determined.

SCHEDULE G contains a list of other actions and special proceedings which are pending in various stages of progress, but have not yet been tried nor argued.

Besides conducting this great amount of litigation, deeds, leases, and other writings for the Corporation, have been prepared in this office, the forms of many contracts have been examined and approved, consultations have been held almost daily in relation to the affairs of the city, and more than one hundred written opinions have been prepared and furnished to the different departments and officers of the City Government.

Much of the large amount of litigation in which the Corporation and its officers are involved has resulted from the great body of laws specially applicable to the city of New York, the radical alterations which have been made in those laws nearly every year, and the crude and ill-advised provisions in some of the enactments. Besides the Dongan, Cornbury and Montgomery charters which were granted under the British Crown, we have a single legislative act relating exclusively to this city, which contains more than three hundred sections, and other acts scattered through some fifty volumes of laws, sufficient to make three or four large and closely printed books. We have had three new legislative charters within the last twelve

years, and hardly a session of the Legislature has been held within that time without making some, and often many changes, in the laws touching the rights of individuals and the powers and duties of the city authorities. Some of these statutes have been framed by persons having a very limited and imperfect knowledge of the previously existing laws, and others by persons who have had some private end to answer, without regard to the general welfare of the city.

In this connection it may be proper to state, that at a former period the Charter was rarely, if ever, altered, except in pursuance of memorials from the Common Council, or representations made on its behalf. But now the charter and other city laws are undergoing perpetual change, not only without the application, but often without the knowledge of the city authorities; and many of these changes are made on the suggestion of interested parties, for the purpose of securing some private advantage at the expense of the city. Such individuals, either in person or by their agents, are in constant attendance upon the Legislature, with some plausible story or complaint to induce legislation in their favor.

Owing to these causes, and others which might be mentioned, we not only have a great excess of legislation, but many of the laws relating to the city have been so badly drawn, that it is often extremely difficult to determine what they mean, or even what statutes are in force, or which have been repealed or superseded by other enactments. In many cases neither citizens nor public officers can determine with much certainty what are their respective rights and duties; and litigation follows, as a matter of

course. The evil has been increased by the multiplication of officers charged with the same or similar duties, and by conflicts of jurisdiction, which have arisen in consequence of not accurately defining the powers and duties of the several departments and officers of the city government.

Other laws have been passed for the benefit of individuals which, if carried into effect, will deprive the city of property and franchises worth millions of dollars; and it can hardly be expected that the rights of the city will be surrendered until the constitutional powers of the Legislature to pass such laws has been judicially settled.

Claims against the city must now be presented to the Comptroller for adjustment before actions or special proceedings against the Corporation can be maintained. (*Stat.* 1860, *p.* 645, and see *Stat.* 1859, *p.* 570.) These laws have already had a beneficial effect in checking litigation, and it may be hoped that they will prove still more useful in future. The Comptroller now has the opportunity to investigate claims upon the city treasury before actions are brought; just and legal demands are settled at once; and, in doubtful cases, an amicable compromise is preferred to legal strife, wherever it can be effected upon reasonable terms.

I found in the office no register, or other record of any street opening, or other proceeding of the like kind, which had been commenced within the last six years. I have caused a register to be made of all such cases as were ascertained to be then pending, and all those which have subsequently been ordered by the Common Council. I have also caused an atlas to be prepared, in two volumes,

showing all the street openings above Fifty-sixth street, with the dates of the several openings. The register and atlas will of course go to my successor in office, with the other registers, books, and papers of the Department.

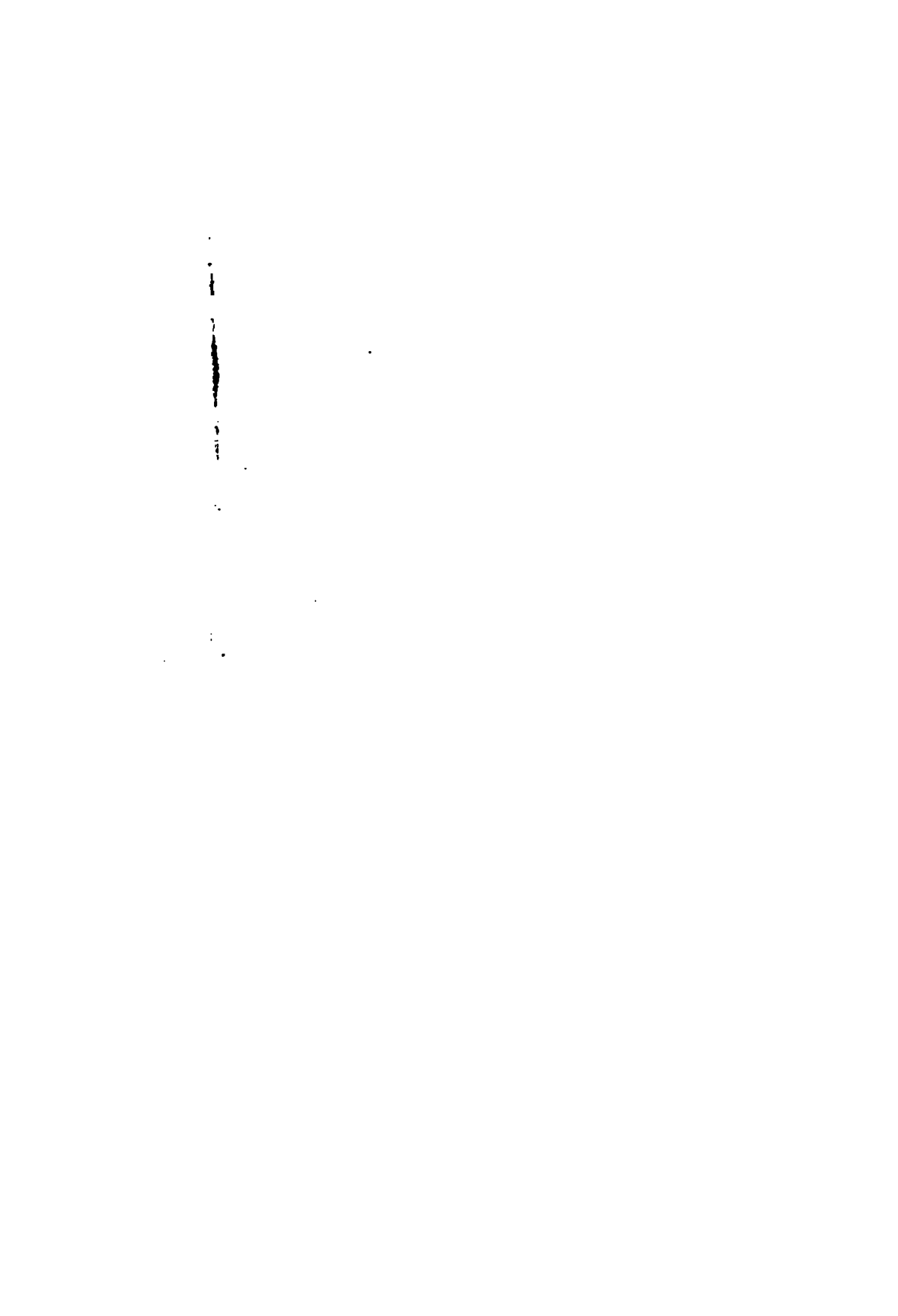

The following communication from the Street Commissioner, submitting his Fourth Quarterly Report for the year 1860, being business of the Street Department up to and including 31st December, 1860, was received, laid on the table, and directed to be printed.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

GENTLEMEN—In my report of the 12th ultimo, I stated, “the two years for which I was appointed Street Commissioner, on the 11th of November, 1858, having expired, I now, under the charter, only hold the office until the appointment of my successor.” Not having as yet been relieved from the position, it becomes my duty, at this time, to transmit, for the information of your honorable bodies, a detailed statement of the transactions of this

Department, for the Fourth Quarter, together with a summary of the business for the year, ending this day.

From the appropriations appertaining to this department exclusively, amounting to one million six hundred and seventy-three thousand and seventy-one $\frac{4}{100}$ dollars (1,673,071.04), there have been expended, and requisitions made upon the Comptroller for payment of, one million three hundred and twenty-three thousand three hundred and thirty-one $\frac{20}{100}$ dollars (\$1,323,331.20), leaving a balance of three hundred and forty-nine thousand seven hundred and forty $\frac{30}{100}$ dollars (\$349,740.30).

For statement, showing the amount of each appropriation for the Street Department for the year 1860, the amount asked for by the Street Commissioner, the amount of requisitions upon the Comptroller, drawn by the Street Commissioner for the three (3) quarters, ending September 30th, for the quarter, ending December 31st, also the total amount of requisitions for the year 1860, together with the balance of each appropriation, you are respectfully referred to Appendix marked A; and for details as to the amount applied to each object and purpose, and for statements of assessment lists delivered to the Collector of Assessments, amounts paid by that officer to the City Chamberlain, and amounts returned to the Clerk of Arrears, to Appendix marked B; and for exhibit of the business of each of the nine Bureaux of the Department, to the reports of the Superintendents and Chiefs thereof: all of which are hereto appended.

I take this occasion to refer again to the valuable and efficient services rendered by many of the principal officers of this Department, and beg leave to call your especial attention, and that of the public, to the highly creditable

manner in which the business of the Department was conducted by the Deputy and acting Street Commissioner, Capt. Mansfield Lovell, for a period of several months, during my necessary absence from the country, on account of sickness. His duties, at all times important and arduous, were doubly so during that period. I am indebted to him for much valuable assistance.

In this connection, I desire to allude to the valuable services, great experience, and good judgment of Mr. Edward Ewen, Superintendent of Street Improvements. I am satisfied that there is no man in this city more competent than he, to perform the duties pertaining to this, the most important bureau of the Street Department. He has done all that could be accomplished under existing circumstances, to establish the business of his bureau upon a proper basis. It would have been fortunate for the city had all his recommendations been favorably acted upon.

The duties devolving upon the Chief Clerk, and the principal Book-keeper, of a Department organized as this is, are important and onerous, of a highly responsible character, and excessive in amount of labor. I am happy to say that no portion of this immense business has been better accomplished than that devolving upon these officers, respectively. What is said above, is in nowise intended to disparage the claims of the many other deserving and competent officers connected with this Department, or the important services rendered by them. With few, if any, exceptions, they are entitled to credit and consideration.

SIR—I herewith transmit the Quarterly Report, for the quarter ending December 31st, 1860, exhibiting in tabular form, all the expenditures for work done under the supervision of the Bureau. I also transmit a summary of the expenditures, and a statement of the work done during the year 1860.

There have been made during the year 1860, 53 contracts for various works, amounting in the aggregate to \$452,814 33.

An appropriation of \$16,000 was made to this Bureau for the year 1860, to defray the expenses of placing glass street signs at the corners of the streets and avenues, numbering and renumbering streets, setting and resetting monument stones at the corners of streets and avenues, flagging and repairing sidewalks in front of city property, for necessary surveys and maps not included in assessments, and other necessary street improvements not provided for in other appropriations: in addition to which, there was on hand an unexpended balance from the preceding year, of \$3,900 10, making an available fund of \$19,900 10 for the year. On account of which the following amounts have been paid :

I respectfully call your attention to several communications heretofore made (especially to those dated January 29th, 1859, and September 30th, 1859), in regard to establishing and locating an exterior street along the Harbor Commissioners' exterior line of bulkhead, and amending and changing the present grades of the adjacent streets and avenues, to conform to the same.

The Commissioners, in establishing their line of bulkhead along the rivers, made no provision for a street along the said bulkheads.

On the Hudson River the bulkhead line, as established by the Harbor Commissioners, is at an average distance of about forty feet from the westerly line of the 13th avenue, between 14th and 29th streets, and from thence, at about one hundred feet distant from the westerly line of the 12th avenue.

appears to me that the 13th and 12th avenues should be changed from their present location to the bulkhead line, as there would not be sufficient space to locate a street of any breadth along the exterior line of bulkheads, and leave room between the present avenues and the street for building purposes.

In consequence of the change made between the former

and present exterior line of bulkhead, it has deranged the grades heretofore established of the streets and avenues adjacent thereto; or in other words, by locating the new line inside of the old line, the present grades, in many places, will be from twelve to fifteen feet above the level of the bulkheads, and would be inaccessible for commercial purposes.

It would, therefore, be advisable to change and modify the present grades of the streets and avenues, so as to conform to the exterior line of bulkhead as now established.

Under existing laws it would be next to impossible for the Common Council to change the grades as required. The act of the Legislature of March 4th, 1852, in relation to changing the grades of streets and avenues, contains the following clause, viz.: that "it shall not be lawful for the Common Council to alter or change, in whole or in part, the grade of any street or avenue in said city now established, or which may hereafter be established, except upon the written consent of the owners of at least two-thirds of the land in lineal feet fronting on each side of the street or avenue opposite to and adjoining that part thereof, the grade of which is to be changed or altered."

The before-mentioned clause in the Act, in my opinion, should be repealed (as it is next to impossible to carry it out), leaving the rest of the act as it now stands, which provides for indemnity to those who may be injured by a change of grade.

It is highly important that some action be taken in the matter by the Common Council, as no beneficial improve-

ments can be made until the whole matter is properly adjusted.

June 3d, 1859, I made a communication in relation to the manner and mode of numbering and renumbering streets and avenues, giving my views fully on the subject, in order to have some uniform system in the matter of numbering streets, and have the same fixed by an ordinance of the Common Council, which, if passed, would, in my opinion, prevent the continual change and confusion in street numbers, as heretofore and now existing in many cases.

Again, December 23d, 1859, and June 26th, 1860, I made communications on the same subject.

To all of the before-mentioned communications I respectfully refer you for further particulars.

All the streets ordered to be renumbered by the Common Council since my first communication of June 3d, 1859, have been numbered in accordance with my views, given at that time, and appear to have given general satisfaction, and to make it permanent, the ordinance submitted to the Common Council, or some other well-devised ordinance in its place, requires to be passed, otherwise there may be new ideas and new changes made with every change in the Street Department.

During the last and present year glass street signs have been placed in the lamps at the corners of the streets and avenues, instead of placing wood signs, as formerly, at the corners, which has been a large saving in expense, in addition to being useful at night as well as by day, and they appear to give general satisfaction.

These street signs are frequently transposed, displaced, and missing.

April 18th, 1860, I made a communication on the subject, recommending the Common Council to pass an ordinance imposing a penalty on any person or persons who, through carelessness or otherwise, should remove, destroy, or misplace the said street signs.

I am not informed who the parties are that have displaced or transposed the street signs, but understand that considerable hostility has been manifested by the lamplighters employed by the Gas Companies to clean and light the lamps, to signs being placed in the lamps; and as no other parties have any thing to do with the lamps, it is reasonable to suppose that the said lamplighters must have had a hand in the matter of transposing the street signs.

Complaint was made to the Gas Companies in regard to the matter, and they promised to use their influence to prevent the evil, since which time it has in some measure been remedied, but not fully.

I submit if it would not be well to have an ordinance passed, imposing a penalty of say two or three dollars on any person or persons who may remove, transpose, or destroy any of the said signs.

June 17th, 1859, a communication was made in regard to the inefficiency of existing ordinances for flagging and repairing sidewalks, under complaints made and notices issued from this bureau to parties required to flag and repair the same. An amended ordinance was sent to the

Common Council for their action, which ordinance has not been fully passed by both Boards.

If the notices sent from this bureau to individuals to repair their sidewalks are to be enforced, it is requisite that sufficient power be given for that purpose. The requirements of the present ordinances are such as to leave it optional with the parties notified to do the work or not, as they please.

If the amended ordinance submitted to the Common Council should be passed, it would give all the needful power in the matter.

I reiterate what I have heretofore frequently called attention to, in the matter of preparing ordinances relating to work to be done under the supervision of this bureau. Frequently the ordinances passed by the Common Council for work to be done, are not clear and explicit, and do not give sufficient authority to do the work intended to be done under them. This could be rectified by having them examined and supervised by this bureau previous to their passage.

The following assessment lists for work done under illegal contracts, remain in this office, viz. :

Fifty-sixth street, regulating, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, between the Sixth avenue and Broadway, amounting to \$8,696 90.

Fifty-seventh street, regulating, between the Third and Fifth avenues, amounting to \$35,970 00; on which has been paid \$38,251 31.

Eightieth street, regulating, between the Fifth avenue and the East River, amounting to \$33,801 00.

Filling sunken lots on Fifty-fifth street, between the Tenth and Eleventh avenues, amounting to \$6,019 81.

For full particulars in regard to the foregoing works, I respectfully refer to the Street Commissioner's Report, January 16th, 1859. Document No. 5, pages 157, 173, 205, and 276.

At the last session of the Legislature, the draft of an act was presented to that body, to authorize a fair and equitable settlement of all illegal contracts heretofore made; but, from some unknown cause, the same was not passed.

I would, therefore, respectfully recommend another trial, at the next session of the Legislature, as no settlements can be made, or assessments laid, until some legislative action shall be taken for that purpose.

In conclusion, I would respectfully call attention to the several communications heretofore made—particularly to those relating to inspectors, and confirming awards of contracts.

No. 3. Regulating curb and gutter, and flagging, Fifth avenue, between Sixty-first and Eighty-sixth streets. Contract dated December 4, 1858.

This work is in progress, and is nearly completed.

No. 4. Regulating curb and gutter, and flagging, Fortieth street, between First and Second avenues. Contract dated May 19, 1857.

This work is not progressing: the ordinance considered illegal. See Street Commissioner's Report, January 16th, 1859. Document No. 5, page 285.

No. 5. Regulating curb and gutter, and flagging Fifth avenue, Forty-ninth to Sixty-first street. Contract dated April 7, 1857.

This work is in progress, and nearly completed.

No. 6. Regulating and grading Fifty-sixth street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues. Contract dated September 10, 1853, relet July 31, 1860.

This work is nearly completed. See Street Commissioner's Report, January 16, 1859, Document No 5, page 137.

No. 7. Regulating Fourth avenue, between Seventy-first and Seventy-ninth streets. Contract dated January 10, 1857.

This contract was illegal, and was afterwards legalized by an act of the Legislature, passed April 16, 1860. For particulars in regard to the illegality, see Street Commissioner's Report, January 16, 1859, Document No. 5, page 243. This work is progressing, and is nearly completed.

No. 8. Regulating Fifty-sixth street, from Third avenue to East River. Contract dated June 26, 1852.

This work was about two-thirds done, and the balance relet October 25, 1860.

No. 9. Regulating Fifty-eighth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues. Contract dated November 5, 1857.

Little or no work done. Injunction placed

on the work. For particulars, see Street Commissioner's Report, January 16, 1859, Document No. 5, page 113.

No. 10. Regulating Forty-fourth street, from First to Third avenue. Contract dated February 5, 1857.

About one-half the work done, and the balance relet August 16, 1860.

No. 11. Regulating Eighty-fourth street, from Eighth avenue to Broadway. Contract dated December 8, 1858.

This work is in progress, and nearly completed.

No. 12. Flagging, curbing and guttering Eighty-sixth street, from Third avenue to East River. Contract dated March 23, 1855.

About two-thirds of this work was done, and then abandoned, the same being in litigation. See Report of Street Commissioner, January 16, 1859, Document No. 5, page 123. The unfinished portion of this work will be relet, as soon as the sewer now in course of construction in said street is finished.

No. 13. Regulating and grading Tenth avenue, between Fifty-fourth street and Broadway. Contract dated October 3, 1858.

This work is in progress, and nearly completed.

No. 14. Regulating and grading Sixty-second street, from Eighth to Ninth avenue. Contract dated January 15, 1857. Relet June 1, 1860, and nearly completed.

No. 15. Regulating and grading Sixty-first street, from Third to Fifth avenue. Contract dated October 21, 1859.

This work is about one-third done.

No. 16. Regulating and grading, curbing and guttering, One hundred and twenty-ninth, One hundred and thirtieth, and One hundred and thirty-first streets, from Tenth avenue to Hudson River. Contract dated April 23, 1856.

One hundred and twenty-ninth and One hundred and thirtieth streets completed, One hundred and thirty-first street in progress, and nearly completed.

No. 17. Regulating and grading Fifth avenue, from Eighty-sixth street to Mount Morris square. Contract dated August 17, 1859.

This work is in progress and about one-third done.

No. 18. Regulating and grading Eighth avenue, between Fifty-ninth and Eighty-second streets. Contract dated December 24, 1859.

This work is in progress and about one-fourth done.

No. 19. Regulating, curbing and guttering, Fifty-sixth

street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues. Contract dated December 19, 1859.

This work is in progress and about one-fourth done.

No. 20. Regulating, grading, curbing and guttering, Fifty-eighth street, from Ninth avenue to Hudson river. Contract dated December 28, 1859.

This work is in progress, and is about half done.

No. 21. Regulating curb and gutter, Fifty-sixth street, from Ninth avenue to Hudson river. Contract dated December 28, 1859.

This work is progressing slowly—very little done.

No. 22. Regulating Fifty-fifth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues. Contract dated February 7, 1855.

This contract was considered illegal, and the work was relet, June 1, 1860. See Report Street Commissioner, January 16, 1859, Document No. 5, page 191. This work is in progress.

No. 23. Grading Third avenue, between Eighty-sixth and One hundred and tenth streets. Contract dated August 23, 1856.

Under this contract the work was nearly completed. The contract is considered illegal. See Report Street Commissioner, January 16, 1859, Document No. 5, page 213. There is

nothing doing towards the completion of this work.

- No. 24. Regulating Ninth avenue, between Fifty-third and Sixty-fourth streets. Contract dated May 14, 1859.

This work is in progress and about four-fifths done.

- No. 25. Regulating and grading First avenue, from Thirty-seventh to Eighty-sixth street. Contract dated August 17, 1859.

This work was let in three contracts, and is in progress—about one-third done.

- No. 26. Regulating curb and gutter, and flagging Fifty-ninth street, from Fifth to Eighth avenues. Contract dated September 17, 1859.

This work is in progress—about half done.

- No. 27. Regulating curb and gutter, and flagging Fifty-eighth street, between Fifth and Seventh avenues. Contract dated October 20, 1859.

This work is progressing slowly—about one-fifth done.

- No. 28. Curbing and guttering and flagging Fifty-fifth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues. Contract dated October 15, 1859.

The contractor on this work claims to have finished it, which is denied, and the work not accepted, not being done according to contract.

No. 29. Regulating curb and gutter, and flagging Fifty-first street, between Sixth and Eighth avenues. Contract dated May 29, 1853.

This work was about half done under this contract, and then abandoned—the ordinance under which it was let, being illegal. See Report Street Commissioner, January 16, 1859, Document 5, page 224.

No. 30. Regulating and grading Fifty-second street, between Fourth avenue and East river. Contract dated October 29, 1856.

This work was nearly completed under this contract, and then abandoned, in consequence of the illegality of the ordinance under which it was let. See Report Street Commissioner, January 16, 1859, Document No. 5, page 128.

This work was let, with other works, in one contract, October 11, 1860, to Jeremiah D. Moore, for \$638 75. Award of contract not confirmed.

This work was let March 21, 1859, under an ordinance approved by the Mayor, December 30, 1858, and was not confirmed; consequently new specifications were made, and the work relet October 11, 1860, as above stated.

- No. 3. Flagging Twenty-seventh street (north side), between First and Second avenues. Approved by the Mayor March 22, 1860.

This work was done by the owners of the property benefited.

- No. 4. Flagging Thirty-fourth street (north side), between Second and Third avenues. Approved by the Mayor, March 22, 1860.

The whole cost of this work, amounting to less than \$250, was done by David Donaldson, without contract.

- No. 5. Flagging, &c., Twenty-fourth street (south side), between Ninth and Tenth avenues. Approved by the Mayor, March 22, 1860.

This work was let, with other works, in one contract, May 8, 1860, to William Baird for \$2,104 71. Award of contract confirmed July 26, 1860. Assessment list confirmed November 19, 1860. Works all finished.

SIR—In accordance with instructions contained in your circular letter of December 6th, I herewith transmit the Fourth Quarterly Report for the year, showing the operations of this bureau, for the three months ending December 31, 1860, together with a summary of the business for the entire year.

In statement "A," I have given a detailed account of the amount of expenditures, together with the application of the same, for the fourth quarter of the year, amounting to \$46,076.68, and for the whole year, amounting to \$188,861.64.

Of the amount of the expenditures for the present quarter (\$46,076.68), certified vouchers for \$27,969.46 were drawn by the late Superintendent of Wharves and Piers. Vouchers for the balance (\$18,107 22) have been certified by myself, as Superintendent.

Statement "B" shows the appropriations upon which vouchers have been drawn, the total amount of vouchers drawn for the four quarters, the existing liabilities, together with the available balances of the appropriations.

The large amount of unpaid bills, \$8,474, shown among the liabilities, originates from the presentation of bills for work completed since the closing of the books of the department for the current year.

SIR—In compliance with your request, contained in circular, dated December 6th, 1860, I herewith transmit a summary of the general business of this bureau, during the year 1860. The total amount of appropriation "for Lands and Places" for the year 1860, was twenty-eight thousand four hundred and fifteen $\frac{49}{100}$ dollars (\$28,415.49), of which sixteen thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine $\frac{68}{100}$ dollars (\$16,929.68) was expended during the first, second, and third quarters of the year ending September 30th, 1860, leaving on the 1st of October, an unexpended balance of eleven thousand four hundred and eighty-five $\frac{81}{100}$ dollars (\$11,485.81). Of this amount there has been expended during the quarter ending December 31st, 1860, six thousand three hundred and nineteen $\frac{88}{100}$ dollars, (\$6,319.88). Making the sum total of expenditures for the year 1860, on account of this appropriation, amount to twenty-three thousand two hundred and forty-nine $\frac{56}{100}$ dollars (\$23,249.56), which amount being deducted from the appropriation for Lands and Places, leaves an unexpended balance of five thousand one hundred and sixty-five $\frac{23}{100}$ dollars (\$5,165.93).

There have been expenditures incurred to be charged to this appropriation, amounting to about seven hundred dollars, for which no vouchers have been drawn. The balance of the appropriation for Lands and Places for "Tompkins Square," remaining unexpended, at the beginning of the year, was three hundred and eighty-five $\frac{4}{100}$ dollars

(\$385.84), and the amount expended, on account of this appropriation, during the year 1860, was three hundred and seventy-four $\frac{2}{100}$ dollars, leaving a balance of eleven $\frac{6}{100}$ dollars (\$11.60).

The balance of the appropriation for Fourth Avenue Parks, remaining unexpended at the commencement of the year, was twenty-five thousand two hundred and eighty-four dollars (\$25,284.00), and the amount of expenditures heretofore reported, on account of this appropriation, to October 1st, 1860, twenty-one thousand one hundred and two $\frac{5}{100}$ dollars (\$21,102.54); amount expended during the last quarter of the year, three thousand four hundred and forty-nine $\frac{8}{100}$ dollars; making the total expenditures, on account of this appropriation, during the year 1860, amount to twenty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-two $\frac{4}{100}$ dollars (\$24,552.41), and leaves an unexpended balance of seven hundred and thirty-one $\frac{5}{100}$ dollars (\$731.59). The total appropriation for Mount Morris Square amounts to twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00), of which there has been expended for surveys, &c., during the year 1860, seven hundred and twenty dollars (\$720.00), leaving a balance unexpended, amounting to nineteen thousand two hundred and eighty dollars (\$19,280.00).

All the parks are in good condition except Madison Park, which will require a new iron railing, and a course of flagging to be laid through the cross-walks.

SIR—In compliance with your circular letter of the 6th inst., I herewith transmit my report of the work done, and expenditures incurred, for the quarter ending December 31st, 1860.

In appendix marked A, you will find an abstract of all vouchers certified by me during the quarter. In appendix B you will find a statement showing the amounts paid for gas to the various police stations, public offices, &c., and for lighting, fitting and repairing the public lamps, &c., during the first, second, third and fourth quarters of the year, and in appendix C a statement of expenditures, as shown by the certified vouchers of this Bureau, with the balance available, showing a total expenditure of four hundred and thirty-one thousand three hundred and fifty-four dollars and ninety-nine cents ($\$431,354 \frac{99}{100}$), and a balance in the hands of the Comptroller of seventy thousand one hundred and fifty-two dollars and eighty-six cents ($\$70,152 \frac{86}{100}$), which will materially enable me to carry on the more important business of the Bureau during the winter without falling in arrears. There are no outstanding bills or claims of any description for work ordered during the year, and we will again commence the new year without owing a dollar, which is strongly in contrast with the management of this Bureau in former times.

I also submit the time-table for lighting and extinguishing the public lamps during the year 1861, for which see appendix D.

Since my last report, a contract has been made with Alexander Brandon, dated November 26th, for furnishing one thousand gas lamps, at one dollar and ninety-nine cents each, of which one hundred have been delivered.

Also, a contract with Hugo V. Ungelter, dated December 14th, for one thousand cast-iron lamp-posts, at one and seventy-three hundredths of a cent per pound, of which three hundred and fifty have been delivered.

Also, a contract with Hugo V. Ungelter, dated December 14th, for one thousand lamp irons, and drilling and tapping the cross-heads for the same, at seventy-seven cents each, none of which have as yet been delivered.

As stated in my report of September 30th, the present contract for repairing and reglazing the public lamps will expire on the second day of January next, and as the opening of the bids advertised for the 27th inst. has been postponed, owing to business engagements of the Comptroller, it will be highly important that some arrangement should be made without unnecessary delay, by which the repairing of the lamps may be continued during the winter, or until the new contract shall be confirmed by the Common Council. The cost thereof will amount to over four hundred dollars per month; and I would recommend that a resolution be passed by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to both Boards of the Common Council, directing the Street Commissioner to cause the repairing of the public lamps to be continued until a new contract shall be confirmed.

The contracts with the New York and Harlem Gaslight Companies are still in the same condition as men-

tioned in all my previous reports, no action having at any time been had thereon by the Common Council.

- “That the Harlem Gas-light Company be directed to lay down gas mains, and light One hundred and eleventh street, between Broadway and Ninth avenue.” Approved November 1, 1860.
- “That the Harlem Gas-light Company be directed to lay down gas mains and place street lamps in Eighty-fifth street, between the First and Second avenues.” Approved December 5, 1860.
- “That the Manhattan Gas-light Company be directed to have mains laid, and bulkhead from foot of Twelfth street to Nineteenth street, North River, lighted with gas.” Approved December 15, 1860.

Many of the above resolutions cannot be complied with for some time, from the fact that the streets are not yet graded, and I do not consider it good policy to fit up lamp posts therein until such is done, because it often happens that the present grade of the street is changed to such an extent that the lamp-posts are buried, in some instances, almost up to the lamp; and the lamp-posts have, therefore, to be taken up and reset, at an additional expense to our already overburdened tax-payers.

I would respectfully call the attention of the Common Council to the gas-lamps frequently ordered to be fitted up in front of church edifices. Resolutions are often passed directing two lamps to be placed in front of a church, when at the same time there will be one, and sometimes two, already there, or within a few feet thereof; there are therefore now a number of churches with four public lamps in front; and even then, the congregation appear not to be satisfied, for we find them petitioning the Common Council to place two lamps in front of the chapel on the rear of the church, and which petition is generally granted.

As there are about three hundred churches in the city, the cost of lighting two only in front of each will amount to over fifteen thousand dollars per annum, exclusive of the cost of the lamp post, lantern and repairs, and the expense is yearly increasing. I cannot see the necessity of having so many lamps, or of having them lighted every night, while not one-half of the churches hold divine service even one night in a week. And I would therefore suggest, that some action might be taken by which the expense of lighting the above lamps may be lessened; and I

would also recommend that parties applying for church lamps should be referred to this office, and then, if there should be one or two lamps in front of the church, or within a few feet thereof, the same could be taken up and reset.

In my report of March 31st, I stated that much difficulty was had in having the streets in the lower part of the city properly lighted, from the fact of sidewalks being taken up for the construction of vaults, and when relaid, the same being done with granite blocks or iron plates, thus making it almost impossible for the lamp-post to be reset, and I therein recommended, in order to obviate the difficulty, that a suitable ordinance be passed by the Common Council making it obligatory on all persons constructing vaults or sidewalks as above, to make provision for the lamp-posts to be reset where required.

Finding the evil complained of continually increasing, and no action having been taken by the Common Council upon my former recommendation, I caused the following ordinance to be introduced in the Board of Aldermen, on the nineteenth of November last, viz. :

AN ORDINANCE

FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC LAMPS.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows :

SECTION ONE. Any person breaking or mutilating any of the public lamps, shall be liable to a penalty of five dollars for each offense.

SECTION TWO. No person, without permission of the

Superintendent of Lamps and Gas, shall take up, remove, or carry away any public lamp-post in the city of New York, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense.

SECTION THREE. No person shall remove, or cause or permit to be removed, any public lamp-post in the city of New York, for the purpose of constructing a vault or otherwise, without the permission of the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas; and the owner or owners of such vaults shall cause the lamp-post so removed to be reset immediately upon the completion of the vault, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense.

SECTION FOUR. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The above ordinance was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas, but no report has been made thereon. I earnestly hope, however, that the same may be passed without unnecessary delay.

Much annoyance has also been had from the frequent complaints of the glass street signs in the public lamps being misplaced or broken. On the 19th November, 1859, I addressed a note to the officers of the three Gas Companies, calling their attention to the matter, and urging upon them the propriety of adopting some measure by which the evil complained of might be avoided; and in compliance with my request, the Superintendents of the Gas Companies issued stringent orders to their lamplighters to use great care in having the signs retained in the lamps in a proper manner, and for a short time the complaints had almost ceased; but I regret to see, within the

past few weeks, the signs in many instances again misplaced, and thereby rendered useless.

As these signs are a great convenience, if properly taken care of, and entirely useless when placed wrong, I would join in the recommendation made by the Superintendent of Street Improvements, in his report of July 2d, that a suitable ordinance be passed, fixing a penalty on all persons, whether lamplighters or others, displacing or otherwise injuring the said street signs. If such an ordinance should be passed, I have no doubt but that the evil complained of would almost entirely cease, and the said signs would thereby be acknowledged one of the best improvements of the age.

G. W. SMITH, Esq., *Street Commissioner* :

SIR—In accordance with request in your circular letter of the 6th inst., I herewith transmit, marked "A," my quarterly report, embracing also report of the business of the bureau for the whole year. The report shows I have charged to the different officers and departments under my supervision for the quarter, the sum of \$18,477 25, and for the whole year the sum of \$155,121 75. I have bills in the office yet to audit, amounting to \$6,709 96, which should be drawn from the appropriation as follows, viz.: Supplies for Public Offices, \$1,755 58; Supplies for Police Department, \$2,472 13; City Contingencies, \$1,645; Fire Department, \$60 50; Printing for Departments, \$650; Stationery and Blank Books, \$76 75; Contingencies Street Department, \$50. The bills for Police Department were incurred about the time the appropriation for Police was exhausted, by orders given for repairing old and putting up new stoves, printed books, stationery, and general supplies, and could not very well be avoided. The bills for City Contingencies were incurred recently for portraits of his Honor ex-Mayor Daniel F. Tieman, and the Hon. John A. King, ex-Governor of the State of New York. The balance of the liabilities are for bills which could not be called in sooner, and in consequence of closing the books of the bureau so early in the month, were necessarily left over for the next year. You will not fail to see that the amount, about \$2,500, is less than has ever been left to report upon as due for the next year, since my connection with the office.

In paper marked " B," you have statement of amounts drawn from the several appropriations, with balances unexpended.

The appropriation for Printing, Stationery and Blank Books has been found nearly sufficient, but the amount for Police Department and Supplies for Public Offices has been entirely inadequate ; compelling me to draw from the appropriation for Contingencies Street Department in payment for bills incurred for both these appropriations. In my report of October 1st, I asked for a large increase of both those appropriations, in the matter of Supplies for Police ; the reasons then stated for an increase, are still greater at this time, as the Board of Supervisors has quite recently authorized a large addition to the present Police force, requiring, of course, additional expense. The account books for the business of the office are the same as previously reported, having found them to be all that is required for a comprehensive understanding of any and all accounts of the bureau.

All of which is most respectfully submitted.

The expenses for the fourth quarter are larger than that of any previous quarter of the year, owing to a number of New Apparatus having been completed and placed in possession of the Department during the past three months. The amount of appropriation remaining on hand—as per my Statement—is ten thousand three hundred and thirty-eight dollars and fifty-one cents. . . . \$10,338 51

Against this balance there are outstanding claims for New Apparatus, not yet com-

pleted, and for repairs, &c., for which I was unable to return vouchers in time for payment this year, amounting to about five thousand dollars. \$5,000 00

In reference to the transactions of this Bureau for the year, I would state that I have worked under many difficulties in conducting its affairs for the past year. Knowing the trouble which has occurred in previous years, owing to a shortness of funds at the end of the term, and the delay in the passage of the tax levy for the succeeding year, I felt desirous of having a balance on hand at the close of 1860, in order that the workings of the Bureau might not in any way be retarded. To accomplish this end I have labored zealously, although, for some time past, having many doubts and misgivings as to the result. My doubts I consider were well founded, as when I entered upon the duties of this office a considerable amount of the appropriation had been expended; during the year, the amount appropriated for Steam Fire Engines, viz., thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), has been rapidly swallowed up, for New Steamers only, so that I have been obliged to draw upon moneys otherwise appropriated, to pay for repairs, &c., for the same; and, to conclude, the Common Council, in their *liberality* to the Fire Department, have passed resolutions providing for a large number of Apparatus, without any previous notification being given to me either by them or by the companies for whom they were providing.

In many instances apparatus have been built beforehand, without my knowledge, so that immediately upon the passage of the resolutions in reference to the same,

which, in a MAJORITY of CASES READ, to "PURCHASE WITHOUT CONTRACT," the bills have been presented to me for transmittal to you for payment, the money being taken from the appropriation, which had been previously otherwise provided for.

Notwithstanding all these drawbacks, I have been enabled, by curtailing some of the expenditures of the Department, to show a balance on hand of Ten thousand three hundred and thirty-eight dollars and fifty-one cents (\$10,338 51), and to report the Department, and apparatus appertaining thereto, to be in good working condition.
