## AMERICAN LEGION

All new streets of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and all streets which are to be renamed, will bear the names of local men who died in the World War. Lafayette Post No. 27, of the American Legion, presented a resolution to the common Council asking that this action be taken. The resolution was favorably acted upon by the council.

Hundreds of poor families, suffering from cold and hunger in Denver, Col., were cheered by the distribution of a cartload of potatoes donated by the Hughes Postmaster post of the American Legion at Powell, Wyo. The potatoes were distributed to the poor by the Salvation Army.

Members of the American Legion post at Collinsville, Ark., are acting as trust officers of the public school. When a survey showed that many pupils were not attending school because parents were destitute circumstances, Legion members persuaded the citizens to organize a charities' association to aid the needy families.

It was announced recently that National Headquarters of the American Legion through its Film Service at Indianapolis, had acquired ownership of the photoplay, "The Man Without a Country," an eight-act feature film based upon Dr. Edward Everett Hale's classic of that name. Since then the film has had its premier showing under Legion sponsorship at Louisville, where it broke all house records at the Mackay Theatre. The Legion has launched a national campaign to bring the film before the nation picture audiences of America to prove that the public will support clean and more truly American films.

### Auxiliary To Be Organized In Alaska

A call for the first annual convention of the Alaska American Legion Auxiliary has been issued by the Department Adjutant of the American Legion. The meeting will be held on April 6, 7, and 8, depending on the steamer schedule.

There are six units in Alaska, located at Anchorage, Juneau, Ketchikan, Fairbanks and Sitka. In the April convention of these units the Alaska Department will be organized departmental officers for the coming year elected and adopted a constitution and by-laws.

The unit at Igloolik has signified its desire to care for a ward of ex-servicemen in a hospital in the United States, but at present no ward has yet been assigned it.

The unit at Sitka Post No. 12, which was recently organized, helped to furnish Christmas cheer to disabled veterans at Otton, N. C., recently by sending forty-eight pounds of home-made candies and cakes.

### American Legion Auxiliary Aids German Brides

Dr. Kate Walker Barrett, national president of the American Legion Auxiliary went to Charleston, S. C., and Savannah, Ga., to assist the wives of the troops returning from duty on the Rhineland and to make an investigation of their conditions in the name of the Auxiliary. Dr. Barrett acted as a "big sister" to the eighty-three new-comers to America. She will attempt to make their entry into this country and acclimation to the conditions of life here as easy as is possible. With the returning troops are almost over one hundred American children born in Germany.

Dr. Barrett believes the Auxiliary will be able to relieve these new citizens of much of the embarrassment incident to taking up life in a strange land, by its work as adviser and as sponsor.

### No Charge To Certify The Claim of the Disabled

Joe Sparks, chairman of the American Legion's national rehabilitation committee, has urged all disabled veterans of the World War claiming a compensation to have their claims certified and their affidavits sworn to before officials of the United States Veterans Bureau without charge.

Members of the Sixth District Rehabilitation Committee of the Legion at their recent conference in New Orleans stated that hundreds of ex-servicemen are now paying notary fees when they file in no financial posi-

tion to do so because they are not aware that the papers relating to their claim will be certified by the Bureau free of cost.

### Veterans to Participate In International Councils

President Harding has expressed the belief that the United States will not be "excessively represented" in international councils without some man of the delegation who can speak for those who participated in actual warfare. H. Nelson Jackson, of Burlington, Vt., vice-president of the Interallied Veterans Association, has announced.

President Harding's statement was made in a letter to Mr. Jackson acknowledging the receipt of a Manifesto drawn up by representatives of eight allied nations at the international conference of the Association, held in New Orleans in conjunction with the American Legion national convention.

The letter, in part, follows: "I have read with great interest, and quite general approval, the policies set forth in the Manifesto. I do not subscribe to unconditional agreement in every detail, but as a general enunciation of principles and purposes the Manifesto lays down a very wholesome program which gives great promise of promoting peace.

"I note that you have said concerning representation in future peace councils of those who know intimately of the suffering and sacrifices of war. I very much doubt if it will be practicable in a half century to come, to have the United States becomingly represented in international councils without someone on the delegation who can speak for those who participated in actual warfare. It would be practicable to delegate the power of nomination, but the proposal of recognition of the men who were the uniform in time of war has my cordial commendation."

The American Legion is a member body of the Interallied Veterans' association.

### British Veteran Praises Legion's Stand

Major Arthur de Bles, of the Royal British Fusiliers and administrator of the Cologne sector during the world war, in a recent letter to Alvin Owsley, national commander of the American Legion commending him on the stand he had taken by the Legion in favor of the French occupation of the Ruhr valley, compares Germany to a "fraudulent bankrupt." Major de Bles sees the Legion stand as a ray of the pro-German propaganda going on in this country at the present. He states in his letter:

"It is with the greatest pleasure that, as former British administrator of Cologne, from December, 1918, to August 1919, I see the splendid stand taken by you in the name of the American Legion, against the pro-German propaganda going on in this country at the present time against the French action in the Ruhr.

"Your position is absolutely right, as I know by my own experience, for with such people as the Germans there is only one policy, not only which is efficacious, but which they understand, and that is the policy of force and consistency in enforcing all laws and regulations which have been laid down."

The British veteran maintains that the Treaty of Versailles was absolutely just, and had the Germans been willing to take their losses "like good sportsmen" they not only would have paid their debts, but would have regained in some degree the respect of the world.

"To make the matter clearer," he writes, "if a business man had received a judgment against a debtor, who has obtained days of grace by his promise to pay, would that man, should his debtor not keep his word, allow him to go free, or would he employ every means at his disposal to make him pay?"

"Germany through her evident lack of willingness to pay, as evidenced by her non-taxation, her government subsidies to all sorts of industries which were subsidized before, her fraudulent methods of exporting capital and, finally, by the spiriting away of locks of the great coal syndicate which would have shown conclusively the crookedness of her dealings, has

"In other words, a fraudulent bankrupt."

# Richard Lloyd Jones tells

**DARE THE IMPOSSIBLE**

In one of Maeterlinck's wonderful stories he tells of a powerful man of the Middle Ages who conceived great plans and executed them, but always with difficulty. Frequently he almost failed, and succeeded only by superhuman effort. Finally he found that a secret enemy was always working against his most careful plans, neutralizing his most strenuous exertions.

As the years passed he determined to find and destroy this enemy. Life was not worth living with this hidden foe forever encircling him with difficulties. One evening he went out for a walk. He saw another man approaching him. By that strange instinct which warns us of danger he knew that this man was his life-long enemy. He resolved to kill him.

As he approached, he observed that this man wore a mask. But, conscious that this was the antagonist of his life, he said as they met: "You are the man who from my youth till now has been pursuing me, thwarting me, almost defeating me. I mean to kill you, but I will give you a chance for your life. Draw and defend yourself."

The stranger said as he drew his sword, "I am at your service, but first see who it is that you would fight." He removed his mask and the man stood before himself.

This fable is true of every one of us. Where you think an enemy has injured you, look closely and nine times out of ten you will find yourself in the form of your habits.

It is a common practice to blame the world and not ourselves for our failings. Look deep enough and you will usually find that it is not the world that stands in your way, but you yourself.

If there is any evil in us, bad habits will develop it. And there is evil in all of us. Put your strength to the test, but never your weakness. Dare to try the apparently impossible tasks if they are tasks for good; never fear failure—all the world loves a good loser; and when you fall in the right, your defeat is only the beginning of final victory.

Day by day civilization is demanding more of each one of us—more that is pure and strong. Twentieth century society tolerates no weakness, no talent in individual workers. Today every man must be above suspicion. Each one of us must be proof against calumny. Everybody is lied about—sometimes by envy, sometimes by ignorance. Never resent a falsehood about yourself—after all it is a test of your reputation. Let your life, not your words, be your rebuke to slander. You defeat yourself when you stoop to the slanderer's low level.

Noble living is all the armor you need to wear. Sincerity is the most eloquent answer that can be made to the slanderer and it is the sure sure-bright that will reveal the slanderer's shame and put him in complete disrepute.

Be so true to yourself that you never need to fear yourself and you will never need to fear the world.

Such a preponderance of men and women from the very rich to the very poor, who are content to remain with us, is pretty good proof that the old world is a rather satisfactory sort of place after all. The best way to decide if the world is worth living in is to give it a trial for seventy-five or eighty years and then sum up.

## PROPER BALANCE OF AGRICULTURE IS KEYNOTE TO NATIONAL PROSPERITY

LEADER OF FARM BLOC IN CONGRESS TELLS WHY FARMS MUST GET ECONOMIC JUSTICE BEFORE ANY OTHER INDUSTRY CAN REASONABLY EXPECT "GOOD TIMES."

Washington, March 1.—For many years the United States Government has been content to let agriculture take care of itself. Farmers have gone on producing under many handicaps that might easily have been removed. The result has been disaster that in the last two years has overtaken the farmers, caused billions of dollars in losses by shrinkage in the value of farm products, and has been seriously detrimental to business throughout all the land.

The need of a constructive national program looking to the rehabilitation of agriculture is regarded by the Farm Bloc as imperative. It is now generally accepted that prosperity must come first to the farms before it can prevail in the city.

Farming is the only business left that buys at retail and sells at wholesale; that pays what is asked when it buys and accepts what is offered when it sells. The farmer remains merely a producer of the necessities of human life.

He gets but one-third of every dollar paid by the consumer for the

products of the farm. Our expensive antiquated and inefficient marketing system takes the other two-thirds.

The enactment of constructive, progressive legislation, which will bring about better conditions agriculturally is the mission of the Farm Bloc in Congress. As a member of that body, I think I may say, with perfect candor that there is nothing dark, sinister, nor forbidding in its make-up or its purposes. It is not political. It is for things rather than against them, for the city man as well as the country man. It is working for honest industry, honest finance, honest commerce, honest agriculture, honest labor, and wishes to cooperate with all of these.

**Agriculture Basis of All Prosperity**

The charge has been made by metropolitan newspapers of the East that the Farm Bloc seeks class legislation. That its aim is to profit agriculture, no matter at what cost to other industry. The men who make that charge lose sight of the fundamental fact that agriculture is basic that what contributes to its prosper-

ity and well being unquestionably benefits all industry. When agriculture is profitable the nation is prosperous.

In legislation the farmer is not entitled to any more consideration than any other class; but he is entitled to just as much.

The Farm Bloc does not recognize the right of any class to have an advantage at the expense of another group or of the population as a whole.

The Farm Bloc believes that the best way to meet the present situation and provide for the future is to increase the producer's profit by shortening the road to market. One way to accomplish this is through cooperative marketing.

The recently published report of the Federal Trade Commission shows that the gambling transactions in grain amount some years to more than twenty million bushels, or three times all the grain produced in the world.

The public has made up its mind that the Chicago Board of Trade's poker playing, using the country's food supply as the stakes, is the most wanton, most wicked, most destructive game of chance in the world, and it is now proposing to stop it by the Capper-Tincher law, which places grain exchanges under federal control.

The Farm Bloc measure which had strongest opposition was the amendment to the Federal reserve Act providing that agriculture should be represented on the Federal Reserve Board along with other industry, commerce and finance. Wall Street bankers opposed it bitterly, claiming that this is "class legislation."

No one seems to think it "class legislation" for commerce, finance and manufacturing to be represented on the Federal Reserve Board, and, of course, it is not. Then why should it be considered class legislation for agriculture, which is the largest and most vital industry of all, to be so represented?

For a long while the big five packer combine absolutely controlled the livestock markets and fixed the prices to suit themselves. As a result of the efforts of the Farm Bloc the packing industry is now under government control, and, as a matter of fact, the packers and everybody else now concedes that it is a good law.

One of the most important measures in the Farm Bloc program was the bill for the revival of the War Finance Corporation, making one billion dollars available for loans to the farmers and stockmen. This legislation saved thousands of producers from bankruptcy.

**Practical Financing is Pressing Problem**

The Farm Bloc still has many important things to accomplish. One of them is a credit plan which will be of speedy and immense value to the farming industry. The Bloc is endeavoring to have enacted into law a system of one, two and three-

### MISS ELINOR FARR WON RED CROSS ESSAY PRIZE

As announced two weeks ago, a prize was offered by the local Red Cross nurse for the best essay written by students in the Eighth and Ninth Grades of the St. Cloud school, on the subject of "Tuberculosis." The prize for this contest was given by Mr. V. Clyde Edwards, of the Edwards' Pharmacy, and was awarded to Miss Elinor Farr, whose paper was judged the best of those entered in the contest. The paper read in school and awarded the prize was as follows:

"Tuberculosis is sometimes called 'White Plague' because it causes more deaths than any other disease. It is estimated that one hundred and fifty thousand persons in the United States die from this disease in one year, and twelve thousand of these are children under twelve years of age. The disease is caused from a germ

called "Tubercle Bacilli," discovered by Dr. Koch in 1882. It is long and slender and can grow in most any part of the body. When the germ grows in the intestines, it is called tuberculosis of the intestines, and when it grows in the lungs it is called tuberculosis of the lungs or consumption. This germ also grows in the skin, liver, kidneys, lymphatic glands and the bones. It usually effects the lungs first.

The disease is spread by milk and more commonly from the sputum of a consumptive. When a person has this disease, they lose weight, haven't any appetite, at night they sweat an amount of being so weak and also have a very bad cough.

In giving treatment for this disease have plenty of fresh air, sunshine and wholesome food. Wholesome foods have an abundance of proteins and fats which are easily digested. Eggs, meats and milk are good wholesome foods.

The sputum from a diseased person should be received in a vessel that contains a disinfectant or in a paper-lined cup that can be burned afterwards. When the person is away from home, use pieces of cloth and put them in waterproof rags until they can be destroyed.

It is thought that tuberculosis is more easily developed in the cold, damp climates. The statistics show that there are more cases of this disease in the Northern states than in any other.

CHURCH DISCIPLINE

Lent is the season for which the primitive church set apart for the discipline of her members. In the dark ages monks and so-called saints thought there was great merit in fasting and emaciating their bodies, but the inquiring of the health of body and mind is not the purpose of prayer and fasting. Lent consists of forty days commencing from Ash Wednesday and ending at Easter, not including Sundays which are festival days or lesser fasts. It is not a modern innovation as Christ fasted forty days and forty nights and resisted temptation. For 1200 years the forty days were observed as a time to abstain from festivities and unnecessary indulgences in eating and drinking. Before the 1200 years the forty days are not definitely mentioned as the period devoted for special discipline, but history relates that there were always days set apart for such a purpose and that it can be traced up to the times of Christ. Some modern religions introduced in the seventeenth century do not seem to recognize fasting as a part of Christian religious duty, and so not necessary for discipline, but they put under the ban and preach against such amusements as card playing, dancing, theatre going and so forth. Some churches have incorporated them in their rules of discipline, so far as I understand, the teachings of the Christian religion, it leaves amusements to the consciences of Christians themselves. They should be able to judge for themselves whether they observe too much of their time which might be used for more useful purposes, such as reading good books, reading the Bible which is much neglected, visiting the unfortunate and sick, and striving to edify their minds and lives, making

Must Uncle Sam Be The Goat?

German payments of reparations and Europe's payment of indebtedness must be made in the commodities of commerce. There can be no doubt about that, and the delivery problems are very different from those presented by the ordinary growth of balanced trade from one year to another. Looking the situation straight in the face there is presented a great one-sided transaction—a flood of goods one way without corresponding movement of goods in exchange. Obviously such movements have in them the potentiality of mischief, in causing the derangement of regular established industry. Nor will we protect ourselves from dumping by high tariff walls. The French, in thinking of reparations naturally visualize only money with which to pay the bill for the reconstruction of devastated territory, but it is out of the question for Germany to pay in that way. Germany must pay with labor or the products of labor. Now in the Ruhr, German labor declines to function. This is a serious situation. The Ruhr is vital to Germany, and so, unless the occupation be ended, Germany must import coal from England for her own industries to make good the coal held by France. If Germany must export to pay for the coal she must get from England then to what extent will England and the United States receive exports from Germany in order that France may receive her reparations. Back of the whole difficulty stands the United States, holding aloof from foreign entanglements. The phrase becomes almost a catchword when considered in the light of the actual situation unless America is satisfied to be the goat.

Keep Peace By Advertising

The larger metropolitan newspapers in both the East and West have been quick to sense the delicacy of the situation existing between this country and Japan, as outlined recently in this newspaper, and coming as a result of the Japanese invasion of Siberia at the invitation of the United States during the world war. While the subject is treated with a certain degree of reserve, nevertheless the tension is quite apparent at Japanese delay in withdrawing her troops from all Russian territory. Relief is felt in the recent retirement of Japan from Chinese territory, which naturally bespeaks in a peaceful inclination stripped of any thought of territorial extension. If this policy be followed in the case of Russia, Washington will breathe easier. One of these days the great power of advertising will be used to clear the atmosphere and prevent international misunderstanding. Perhaps no greater opportunity ever has presented than exists now in the Japanese situation. America practically stands sponsor for the good faith of Japan. However, nothing would make for better understanding than a few simple frank and authoritative publicly advertised statements which would indicate the real thought of the Japanese people. When intelligent and honest advertising shall take the place of intricate diplomacy the world will rest on the bedrock of public understanding and that will mean world peace.
