### ATLANTA AREA WORLD SERVICE COUNCIL METHODIST CHURCH OPENED YESTERDAY

The Atlanta Area World Service Council of the Methodist Episcopal Church opened with a public meeting in the local church on Wednesday evening. Through the courtesy of beautiful tenor solo, the choir sang the city in suspending their regular mid-week services the large congregation included strong delegations from the other denominations.

Dr. A. J. Price, Superintendent of the Jacksonville District presided over the meeting. Several musical selections were given.

Mr. Wm. Seabridge rendered a beautiful tenor solo, the choice being an anthem "Hail to the Lords Anointed" and a male voice quartet was given by Messrs. Steen, Steen Patton and Parker.

Dr. Clippen, of Atlanta, Ga., spoke of the general difficulties and the conspicuous victories in the church work in Georgia.

The address of the evening was by Dr. W. H. Hollingshead, of Chicago, representing the World Service Commission of the General Conference. Dr. Hollingshead paid high tribute to the attractive qualities of the State and prophesied unhesitatingly and a steady and starting growth in the population. He drew attention to the dangers of over-population as evidenced in the denser parts of the world and emphasized the importance of provision for spiritual and moral growth.

The speaker then launched out a description of the amazing accumulation of wealth that has come to our country and then spoke of our responsibility to the suffering and needy in the world. This address was followed with enthusiasm by those in the audience.

Following the meeting an informal reception to Bishop Richardson and the delegates was held in the annex of the church. The Epworth League had charge of the arrangements and served light refreshment.

The business session of the Council will be held on Thursday. On Thursday evening Bishop Richardson will give a public lecture on his trip to Europe.

**NEW HOTEL ON NEW YORK AVE. UNDER CONSTRUCTION**  
The above is the architect's perspective of the new hotel now being built at St. Cloud, Florida, by H. L. Bodley, Fred K. K. Berry and Geovoe C. Hunter, and designed by Architect Harlan Jones, all Galion men.

The building will be 120 feet by 250 feet in dimensions and two stories high. It is located on one of the best corners in St. Cloud, and will be of fire proof construction. The lobby, foyer, dining room, kitchen, servants rooms, public toilets, and refreshment rooms are on the first floor, while the remainder of the floor is given over to eleven store rooms.

The second floor will consist of forty-five hotel rooms, each one equipped with bath, and a public writing room, and the ladies parlor. Each room will have outside windows for light and ventilation. There will be a roof garden over the lobby.

The building is of Spanish design in keeping with the general architecture of Florida. It is expected to have the building already for occupancy by the first of the year.

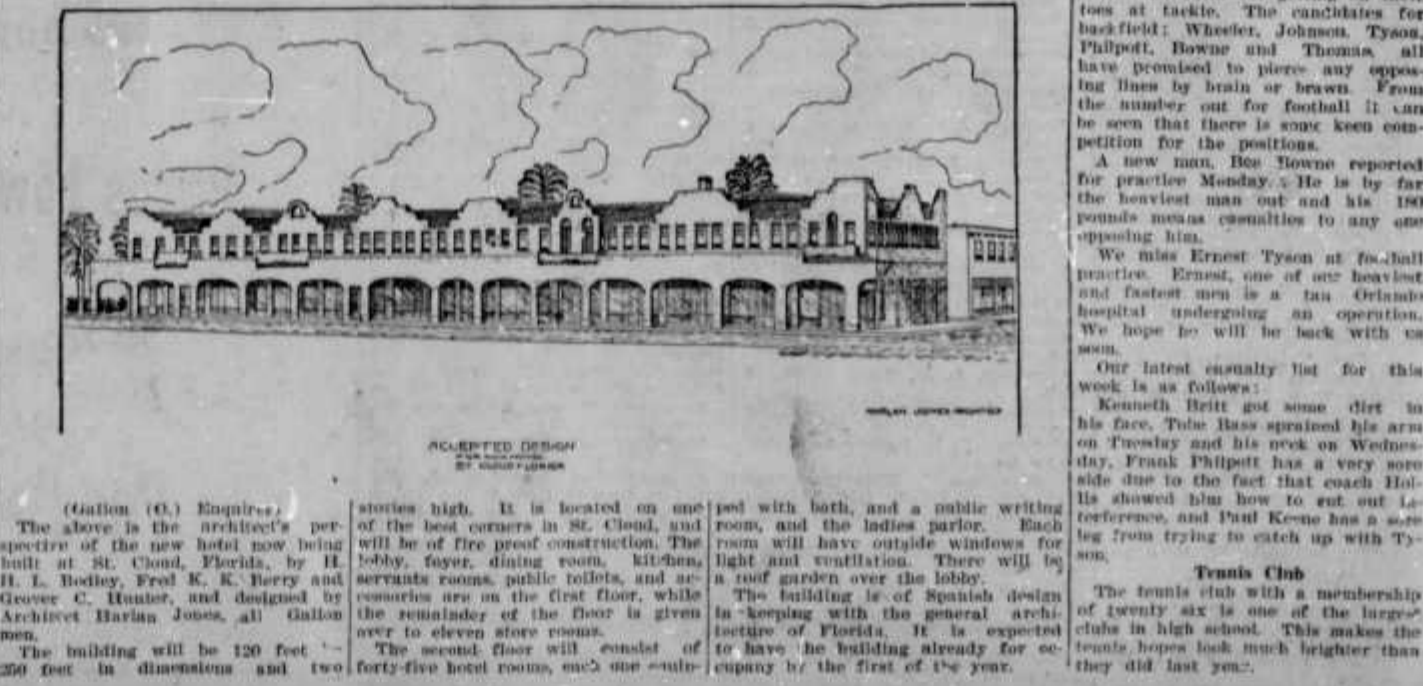

### GOVERNMENT TO SEND FISH TO THIS STATE

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 23.—T. H. Hodges, state fish commissioner has announced that the federal government had advised him that three fish culturists will be sent to Florida to assist in restocking the waters of this state with millions of fish.

These advice were received from Henry O'Malley, United States fish commissioner, who stated he asked to personally visit Florida in connection with the work, as well as Lewis Radloff, deputy commissioner.

Mr. O'Malley also stated the federal bureau intended to augment its work here by supplying "trout" and "fingerlings," which are a small species of fish. These will be plentifully distributed in the waters of the state.

The decision of the federal bureau to extend its work in Florida followed a recent visit of Mr. Hodges and members of the Florida fish hatcheries commission to Washington.

The Fish Hawk, one of the largest floating fish hatcheries in the service of the federal government, is due in Florida about November 1, to begin the work. Mr. Hodges has already taken up with the various transportation companies the matter of furnishing a special car to carry the small fish to various points in the state.

### FLORIDA GAME LAW PLEASING TO PUBLICATION

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 22.—Congratulations are extended Florida in a current issue of the Field and Stream, sporting publication, on the creation of a state game and fresh water fish department.

The felicitations are contained in a lengthy and oral, the leading commentary article on the page. It says in part:

"Florida has at last joined the list of states which have set up a modern and adequate system of game and fish administration. The state legislature at its recent session created the game and fresh water conservation department, and the governor has appointed J. R. Royal, a prominent sportsman and conservationist, as commissioner. Florida's wonderful wild-life resources will intelligent and progress principles by a central state authority, instead of the inadequate and antiquated county unit method as heretofore."

The editorial describes Florida's efforts hitherto in looking after her fish and game, and then takes occasion to predict that the new law will meet with the approval of sportsmen. It then concludes:  
"Inroads on Florida's game and fish resources have been tremendously increased since the wonderful expansion of tourist business in that state, and the enormous influx of northern winter, as well as permanent residents. It is the same old story of the destruction of wild life by the advancing hosts of civilization, and fortunately Florida citizens have at last awakened to the situation, and have taken steps to conserve one of their most valuable resources."

### NORTH CAROLINA FIRST IN AUTOS FOR FARM USE

Automobiles owned on farms in the South Atlantic seaboard states number 367,526, according to automotive statistics issued here by the American Research Foundation.

North Carolina ranks first among the states in this section in the number of farmer-owned automobiles, the figures show, with 82,294 cars. Virginia is second with 73,677. Then come Georgia with 49,159, South Carolina with 52,179, Maryland with 51,413, and Florida with 31,805.

Total automobiles owned on all farms in the United States number 3,821,085 of which 3,454,159 are passenger cars and 367,926 are motor trucks. In the proportion of automobiles to farm population, it is shown the average is one farm car to every

8.1 farm people in America. Farmers, according to statistics, are the greatest buyers of automobile equipment. They purchased 9,250,000 tires and 10,000,000 tubes last year. Mail order houses supplied a big percent of these. Montgomery Ward & Company, largest retail tire dealers in the world, sell close to 2,000,000 tires a year. Other items of automobile equipment bought by farmers last year were: 1,250,000 storage batteries; 8,000,000 spark plugs; 7,500,000 feet of brake lining; 45,700,000 gallons of oil; and 18,000,000 piston rings.

Use of automobiles on the farm is increasing rapidly. It is estimated that farmers will buy 1,119,500 automobiles in 1925 at a cost of \$804,700,245.

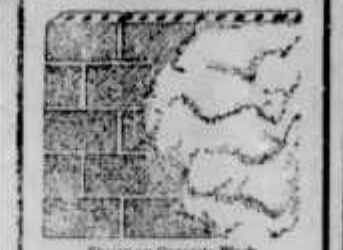

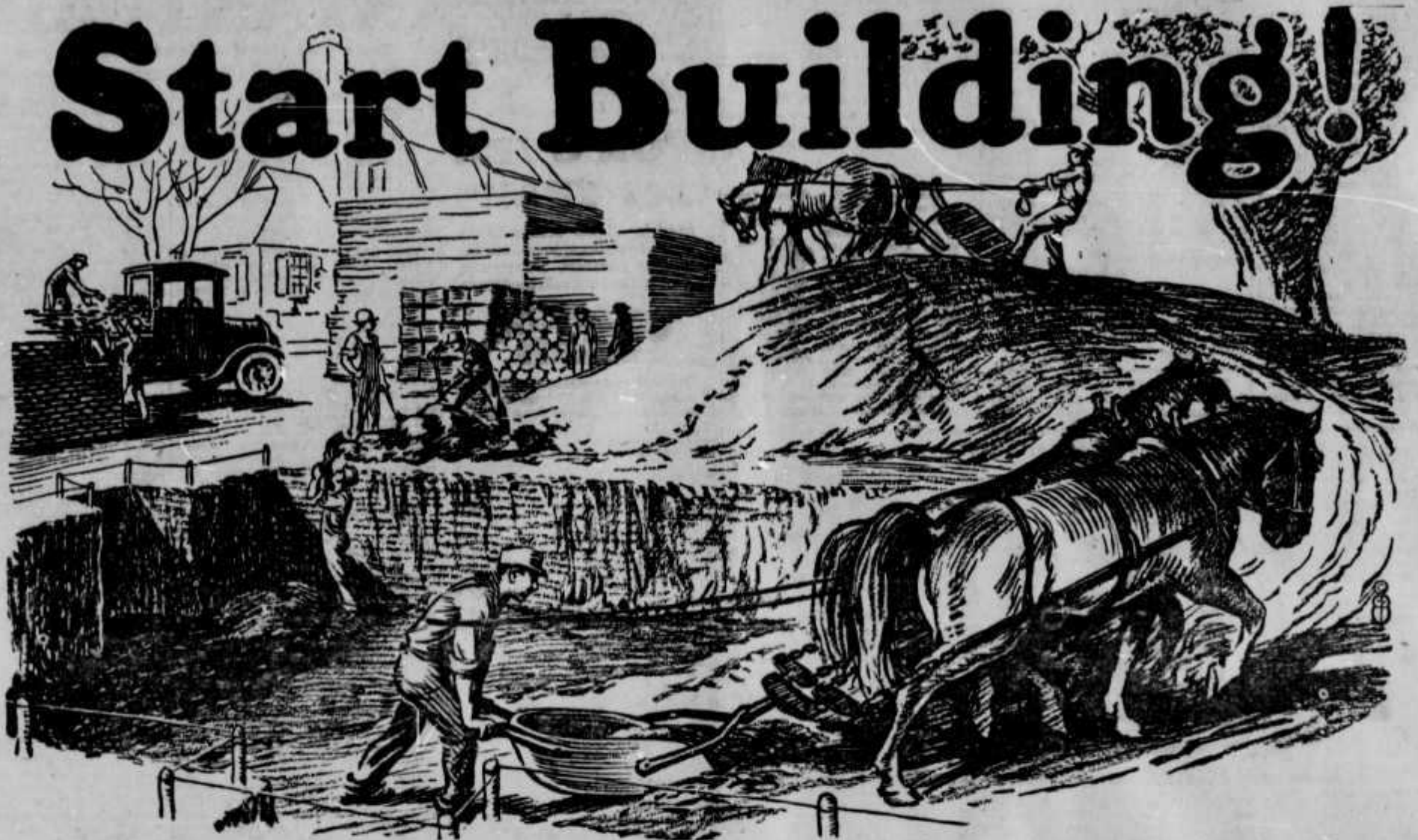

SIXTY-FOUR YEARS AGO.

Next Wednesday, Sept. 9, the New York State Memorial on the field of Gettysburg will be dedicated. Sixty-four years ago a group of young men from Jamaica left here to join the 40th N. Y. In later years some of them played important parts in the civil life of Jamaica and Queens County. Comrade Rider himself is one of Jamaica's best known and most respected citizens and the other residents of Jamaica are gratified to note the recognition given him by his comrades of the G. A. R.

He is a past commander of A. M. Wood Post of Jamaica and was one of its delegates to the National Encampment at Grand Rapids, Mich., just closed.

Mr. Rider and J. Tyler Watts are two of three surviving charter members of this post.

There are about 16 in the Wood Post, G. A. R., at present and they are truly the Grand Old Men of Jamaica. They should be so honored and on all fitting occasions they are indeed given the fullest measure of respect and reverential tribute.—The Long Island Daily Press, Jamaica, N. Y.
