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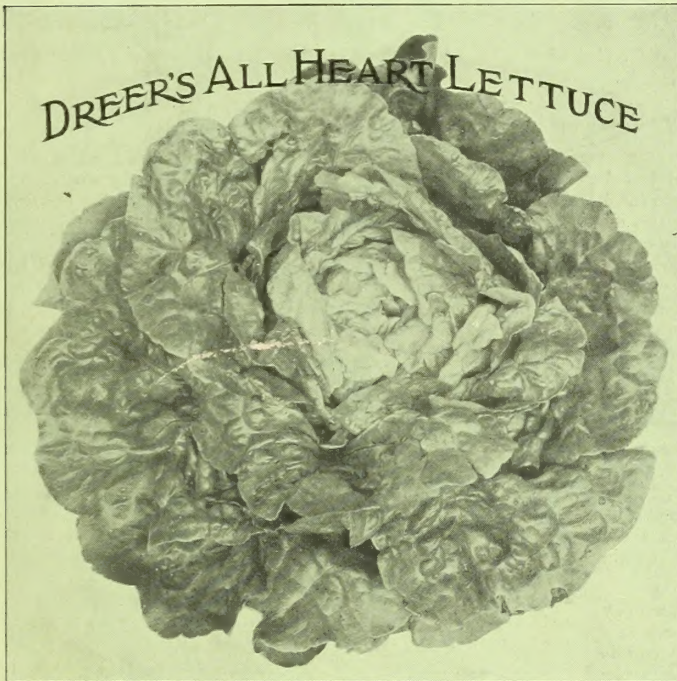

We strongly recommend to market gardeners the installation of some improved system of irrigation by which they would be independent of rain and have a shower of water at their command at all times, thus assuring good crops even during a season of drought and we will be pleased to give any information desired on the subject.

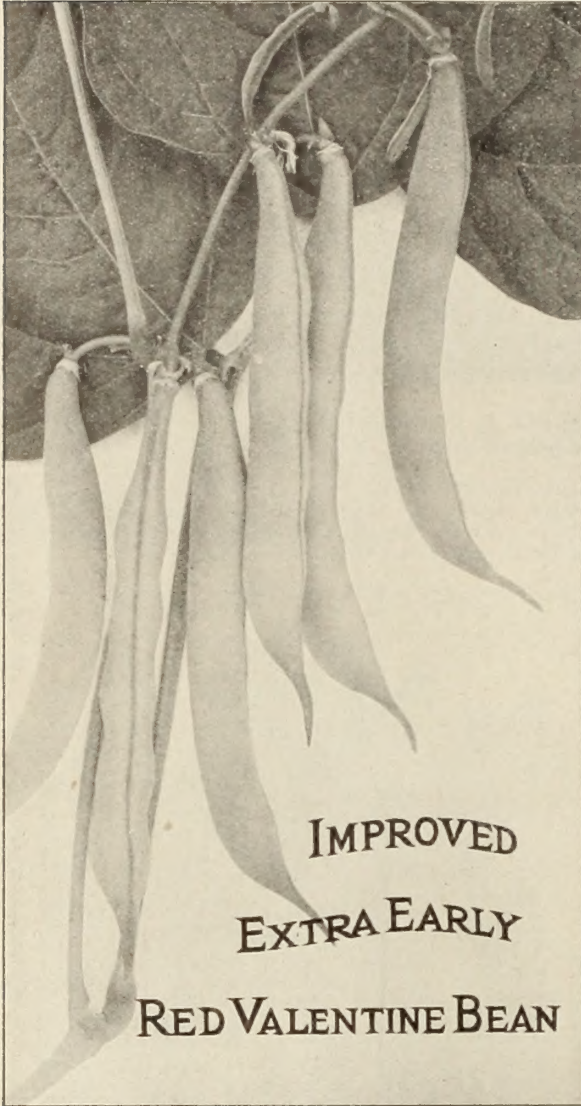
