## HARDY PERENNIAL PLANTS.

For some years past we have been handling Hardy Perennials anquestionably the most complete both in variety and quantity in the country.

This does not necessarily mean that the plants bave been altogether pot-grown, but that they have been field-grown and dug and potted up during the Fall and early Winter months, and such stock can be planted, even late in the Spring, with practically no loss, which, in the case of clumps, is often quite serious.
