WARRIOR McGUIGAN'S DAY.

The Harlem season closed yesterday. Lake-side opens Monday for a fifteen days' meeting. It was a balmy afternoon and a crowd of 4,000 was out. There were eighteen busy books in the ring. Common report had it that the business was the best of the year. Five stout favorites and a well-played second choice won. In consequence, the public had one of its really good days.

Major "Umbrella" William McGuigan had his astute aspect and winning way with him. Out of them came two winners—Bannockburn and Boanerges.

Boanerges was in The Finale Handicap at eight and one-half furlongs. The colt is cherry ripe right now. Warrior McGuigan knew it and out of his valor, Bannockburn—a significant name—was backed from 2 to 1 to 9 to 5. It took quite a lot of money, too, to back a horse off a point in such speculation as framed the group of starters. Macy was a heavily backed favorite. He carried a heavy stable commission.

Boanerges was away in front. Morrison restrained him. The colt was rated along in second place to the far turn. Then Morrison made his move. It happened that Macy tried to move up at the same time and the pair bumped. The damage was trivial and equal. Boanerges kept his stride though and won in hand by an open length. Burns rode a bad race on Macy.

Burns' villainy on Macy was redeemed through a hard and earnest bit of work on Milwaukee in the closing race. In and out jockeys are as bad as inconsistent horses. Milwaukee was a 1 to 2 chance and seemed to be a certainty. He was by far the best, else he could not have won. Through bad luck Milwaukee seemed to be hopelessly beaten, on the far turn, but Burns, on a desperate venture, squeezed through on the rails and picking his field up with patience and judgment got clear at the sixteenth pole and won cleverly.

The Ryanese scored again with their more than ordinary horse Garland Bar. They used Campbell and carried four pounds overweight. That misled the ring and made "a price." There was some 2½ to 1 offered but 6 to 5 was the best at post time. Campbell got into several pockets and came near falling off, but the Bar was so much the best that he won right handily from Laureate. G. C. Bennett ran Bar up from \$200 to \$1000. Tom Ryan bought him in.

The first race went to Udah, the 4 to 5 favorite, after a quivering finish, and Bannockburn cleverly captured the second race. In it Eitholin, with J. Woods up, fell. The boy was badly bruised and shaken up but no bones were broken. He had a most lucky escape.

Gath, at even money, won the half mile dash. He was bumped and knocked to his knees on the turn.

Barney Schreiber, Mack Burns, Jack Newman, Johnny Woods and his father left for California last night.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

"He was mucking around all over the course," appears to be the English turf writers' verdict about Tod Sloan's jockeyship in the Cesarewitch. Since that race, however, the flamboyant Tod has "mucked around" in front and respect may be expected in the future fatheadry of English criticism.

Mr. W. B. Cloete of England, has bought that beautifully bred horse Matt Byrnes, 5 by Hampton—Cherry, and six of the best of the Bitter Root Stud's mares from Mr. Marcus Daly. The price paid for Matt Byrnes is said to have been \$25,000.

ANARCHY IN NOMENCLATURE.

The personal liberty of possession carries with it the right of the individual to name his own as he chooses. No reasonable man questions such right. But there are possessive corners of detail which cheapen a sustaining body, dependant on public opinion. In this niche the turf and its individual owners and horses can be reasonably placed. There is far too much illiteracy and cheapness in the names of American thoroughbreds. Paternalism in turf government could be well used to regulate the evil—for such it is. The stud book tangle has been untied—for the good of the turf.

A board of nomenclature could well be made a part of the Stud Book's official guardianship. Such a board could healthily reject such a name as Bugger Burns—which an owner applied to the colt which DAILY RACING FORM, on its own common and charitable sense, accepted as B. Burns from the first. The Soudan—Bubble youngster was subsequently and sanitarily, though ugly, renamed Booker Burns II. The man who christened him originally should have been fined a few hundred dollars for mere education's sake.

There are some sharp and present instances of the carelessness of nomenclature cheapening the turf. Bill Daly owns a colt which the Eastern folks call Ortolan. The term is in Bill Daly's realm of idea. "Ought to Land" is his consideration of the colt's name. Without doubt the son of Magnetizer and Ortugal was named Ortolan. Ortugal, his dam, was christened from the province famous for the production of the ortolan, or lark, so relished by the epicure. The colt was Belmont bred. The Belmont taste in nomenclature was and is high of class and the name, Ortolan, natural and appropriate.

J. A. Bennett owns a colt, which the Eastern turf recorders are pleased to call Hansel. He may be so recorded on the rolls of registration—though such record can well be doubted, as Mr. Wheeler, the registrar, is a man of class and knowledge. The colt's name is Hansel without question. So DAILY RACING FORM accepts it, purely upon the ground that the son of Hanover and Tarantella—an imported mare by the lately deceased Peter—was named after the English term of first or lucky payment.

All about there is much anarchy in the naming of American horses. It's natural. There is so much do-the-best-you-canism in the avenues of its supply. Regulation is healthy, though, and the Jockey Club, with the Stud Book in its hands, can well afford to become a reasonable censor as to names. This reason should control initialism and such ill-directed efforts in the line of nomenclature which have given to the American turf a Horse Shoe Tobacco, a Bugger Burns, various Little these and Great them and a vast army of A B C's and X Y Z's.
