#### PATTERSON GOES EAST.

MEMPHIS, TENN., April 21.—Charles Patterson leaves to-morrow for the east with Ornament,
May Hempstead, Macy, Algol and W. Overton.
He handles the latter three for John W. Schorr.
The Schorr stable will be split, part going to St. Louis and part to Chicago. Tommy Burns goes with the Chicago division. W. J. McGui gan ran Sea Lion up to \$300 over his entered price to-day. R. Kirkwood & Co. and J. & F. Grefer both claimed Ben Frost. The judges awarded him to the former.

#### GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

Bookmaker Frank Carr, who is making a future book on the St. Louis Inaugural, reports a heavy play on Jim Arthur's colt Fervor, who has performed so well down south this spring. He opened at 20 to 1 in the book and was soon backed to 15's. Fervor is in the Inaugural at 100 pounds and is thought to have an excellent chance to win it. Brewer Schorr's Macy, who won the Inaugural last year, is still the favorite at 4 to 1, with Satsuma at 5's. Macy's stable companion, Timemaker, is held at 6 to 1, and so is Harry Duke. Quite a heavy commission was received on Harry yesterday. Fred Foster's Dr. Sheppard and George Bennett's Forbush are next in favor at 8 to 1 each. Whirlaway, who won a race at Memphis yesterday, is held at 100 to 1.—St. Louis Republic.

Hamburg is a very much improved horse, showing far more finish and quality than he did as a two-year-old. He moves like a piece of ma-chinery. No horse has done better in training this spring than Hamburg. He has had a lot of long spin galloping work, with occasional sprints and miles in about 1:50, and is now where his trainer (than whom there are none cleverer in any country) can thoroughly key him up for a bruising race on very short notice. -Morning Telegraph.

Last Sunday's San Francisco Chronicle says "Burns & Waterhouse to-morrow will ship Traverser back to Virginia Bradley at New York. The son of Rossington, despite the fact that he was sick for six weeks after his arrival, has won something like \$10,000, of which Bradley is to receive \$6,000. He has not been an es pecially good colt for Burns & Waterhouse on account of his uncertainty, which made backing him a rather precarious proposition. Then, again, Candelaria would have won the Palace Hotel Stake but for the presence of Traverser. Still it was very sportsmanlike on the part of Burns & Waterhouse to win with a colt that did not really belong to them.'

The New York Sun of Wednesday "Bromley & Co.'s big string of thoroughbreds arrived in Jersey City last night from Lexington, where they wintered. They will leave this morning for Morris Park track. The string is in charge of Trainer Julius Bauer. Four of the old campaigners, Rondo, Nick, Prince Lee and First Mate, were left behind, their legs being under suspicion. The thirty-two horses brought on are:

Michael F. Dwyer expects to race Harry Reed, Cleophus, Sly Fox, Ben Ronald, Rotterdam, Previous, Michael III and Hindoonet at the near-by Aqueduct meeting. He is not likely to

start many of his 2-year-olds until later on in the season. Of his older horses Cleophus has been doing especially well in her work. An eastern critic says: "Cleophus has developed into a grand mare, has done a lot of strong work, and as she has all of her speed she is likely to win every time out, no matter what the distance may be. Michael III is very fit, and there is no telling how good a horse he may prove to be. Previous has not done so much strong work as the rest of the string, but he outclasses anything he is likely to meet. He certainly has lost none of his speed. If he goes on as he is doing at present he will be a hard horse to beat in any company at the Westchester spring meeting.

From pugilism to horse racing is a turn Dan Stuart is reported to be about to make. According to this report, he will, with New York associates, give race meetings at Hot Springs, Ark., Dallas, Houston and San Antonio, Texas. He will invest \$200,000 in a track, buildings and other accessories midway between Dallas and Fort Worth and connect the track with the two towns by an electric railway. The Houston track will be at Dickinson, midway between Houston and Galveston. Approximately 100 days of winter racing will be given on the circuit, beginning at Hot Springs about the 1st of next December.

The California Jockey Club has abandon the plan of a summer circuit, starting off with important meetings at Sacramento and Los Angeles. The reopening of racing at Washington Park and the announcement of meetings at Harlem to precede and succeed the Washington Park meeting, was almost certainly a strong factor in the case. And well it might be. If there has been anything in the racing way worth taking at Washington Park that at one-time or another the Californians have not captured, it was an oversight. In its eleven years' history the American Derby alone fell five times to Californians. Under the circumstances it is quite natural that Chicago should be a favorite stamping ground with California turfmen. With the apparent certainty that the glories of high-class racing are to be revived here, it is doubtful if many who own horses of fair class could be kept away anyhow.

The abandonment of the California summer The abandonment of the California summer circuit will benefit the Montana meetings managed by Ed Tipton. Many of the smaller owners who do not feel equal to the expense of the long trip to Chicago will no doubt go to the northern tracks. President Tom Williams having thoughtfully announced his determination to declare the proposed California summer meetings off in time to enable them to make entries in the Butte and Anaconda stakes.

J. G. Follansbee's Don Porfirio, by St. Leon ards, from Vanduria, who has worked exceptionally well in the east, is entered for the English Derby, Prince of Wales and other rich stakes across the pond. If the youngster runs to expectations he will be sent to England this fall and specially prepared for the Derby.


