It must be re-membered that not only Buckwa eclipsed the long standing Springbok-Preakness record, but that each of his three competitors probably did the same thing, certainly Daisy F. and Veloz

NOTES OF THE TURF.

It is said that J. R. Hand has shipped King Bermuda, Elia Penzance and other horses to Tampa, Fla., to take part in the projected meet-Owners who desire to race on the big tracks hereafter, should be careful about taking a hand in winter racing except over authorized tracks or they may suddenly discover that they have become outlaws. Racing at Tampa comes under the jurisdiction of the Jockey Club and if authorized by that body would be all right, but no notice of such authorization has been promulgated as yet. It is also said that racing is to be over a half-mile track which would come in conflict with a strict Turf Congress rula.

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
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
