JOCKEY CLUB PROCEEDINGS.

The annual meeting of the Jockey Club wa held in New York Thursday. The following members were in attendance: August Belmont, F. R. Hitchcock, James Galway, P. J. Dwyer, H. H. Knapp, William Astor Chanler, S. S. Howland, J. G. Heckscher, Andrew Miller, J. H. Bradford, A. F. Walcott, A. H. Morris, F. K. Sturgis and James R. Keene.

Rule 147 of the racing rules was amended by the addition of the following as the second paragraph:

"A jockey under suspension shall not be permitted to ride in races for anyone during the period of his suspension." James Galway, F. R. Hitchcock and Andrew

Miller were elected stewards to serve for two years.

The stewards held a meeting after the annual meeting for the purpose of organization and general business. The following officers were re-elected:

August Belmont, chairman; James R. Keene. vice chairman; F. K. Sturgis, secretary and treasurer.

The treasurer was authorized to pay the bill. amounting to \$62, for medical services to jockey Martin Bergen. Applications for reinstatement lodged by William Becket and H. Flippen were denied.

It was expected that racing dates for 1899 would be announced but the matter was laid over until Monday next. Much curiosity exists concerning the number of open dates that may be allotted to Saratoga.

The amendment to rule 147 has a decided bearing on the much discussed starting prob-Restricting a jockey to his own stable has been a failure as a punishment for unruly jockeys and was always a mistaken concession to owners anyhow. If the truth was known, it would probably be established that owners are as much, or more, to blame for bad conduct of jockeys at the post than any other element. Precious few owners direct their riders to go to the post and obey the starter's orders strictly. On the contrary, owners and trainers, as a rule, direct their riders to get away in the lead re-gardless of fines, starter's orders, suspensions or any other punitive provisions of the rules. This amendment will pinch where it ought to pinch, and if another rule providing that any person who paid or furnished the money to pay a jockey's fine without absolute proof that the money was to be surely deducted from the jockey's salary would be suspended, it would be another salutary move in the direction of secur ing that obedience to the starter's orders, while the post, that should prevail on all race tracks.

#### NOTES OF THE TURF.

The usual early crop of rumors about twoyear-old wonders begins to show up. Two fillies trained by Henry McDaniels at Lexington are credited by henry inclanies at Lexington are credited with having worked a quarter in 23% seconds. One is by Wagner-Glenbelle; the other by Likely-Sallie Marshall. Sallie Mar-shall is a full sister to Victorine, the dam of Ornament. At the same track a filly by Tea Tray-Islette is reported to having given signs of being a crackerjack. F. P. Kidd is also credited with having a good one in the chestnut filly by Hanover-Shadow Dance.

A dispatch from New Orleans says that as the result of a conference there Thursday between Frank Fowler and George C. Bennett it was decided that racing will begin at Newport Sat-urday, April 8, and continue until Friday, May 19. This means that Newport will clash with Memphis, Nashville, Louisville and with Lex. Leigh this year.

ington, if any meeting is to be held at the latter point. No decision as to racing officials was arrived at. The meeting will cover thirtysix racing days.

In the columns of the London Sportsmar there are no less than 120 thoroughbred stallions advertised for the season of 1899.

George Murphy, Memphis, Tenn., has sent from McGrathiana Stud to Louisville for train-ing these colts: Ch. c, 2, by Watercress-Rosalind; br. c, 2, by Strathmore-Lilith; blk. c. 2, Hindoo-Gammacita.

The Australian-bred horse, Pounamu, by New minster-Beryl, sold by Spencer Gollan to the Russian Government, will go into the stud under the name Marshal Saxe.

Milton Young, has purchased from Capt. S. S. Brown the broodmares Senorita, Sunbeam Matinee, Galop and Sunset. All these mares are in foal to Troubadour.




