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## DAVE GIDEON ON AMERICAN RACING

NEW YORK, March 22.—“Do you know,” said Dave Gideon—of racing, fiddling and theatric fame—in a reflective way, “that I think Jean Beraud would have won the Futurity as our filly High Degree, which ran second for the stakes, formerly won by our trio, His Highness, The Butterflies and Requitul was pounds inferior to the colt. You see,” he continued, “Jean Beraud was not eligible as, by a clerical error, the nomination of his dam was omitted, and in her place appeared the name of the colt’s granddam. They say we sold the colt too cheap, but really I am glad that he went on and won \$30,000 after Mr. Whitney bought him, for what the turf needs is high class men like Mr. Whitney willing to invest in good race-horses.

“This year we shall have from the Holmdel farm some twenty-three two-year-olds, a fair average for our thirty-four broodmares. His Highness I consider the best stallion in America. He is a splendid looking horse, now eleven years old. He stands over 16 hands. Our policy will never kill him as he is stinted to thirty mares, all our own. We have some seven two-year-olds outside those bred at Holmdel. Of course one cannot tell how the youngsters will turn out. The trainer says that all are doing well. I know that at the farm the season is two weeks behind that of 1898. I don’t believe any one can predict what a certain two-year-old will do. My theory of training is the common sense one of taking good care of the animals and never overworking them. Some trainers favor early fitness. Others follow a waiting plan. One man likes to have a race or two in his horses before he bets on them, while equally wise men send theirs to the post ready to run at their best the first time out. But the true racing of the east comes in midsummer. In that season form is truest.

“With the advancement in all kinds of securities the resultant prosperity must be favorably felt on racecourses and we all look for a good season.”

In a general talk on racing matters Mr. Gideon said: “Tod Sloan is the best rider simply because he is patient and knows how to wait. There is nothing in any corner of business or life that equals the little bit saved for a sharp emergency. Tod is boy’s size with the brains of a man. This season we have engaged H. Martin to ride for us. If I can cure him of his ‘hurry up’ system may be he will be valuable. We have Spencer too. I fancy him to be our best rider. There is a good deal of difference in jockeys, as one may judge by the disaster that befel John McCafferty, a horseman, who would wager large money on his horse, ride him himself and lose simply because the other jockeys were more skillful than he.

“I am a believer in cash stakes. Over the three Futurities that we won there is still unpaid some \$50,000 in forfeits. I do not bet much money nowadays, the highest wager last year being \$3,000. The public seems to fancy my colors, as I rarely get better than 6 to 5 against my own horse. May be this is because of the general knowledge that my system is to weed out worthless stock. It costs just as much to feed and train a ‘crab’ as a good horse, and we dispose of animals not showing well. Of course we get fooled sometimes, as in the case of Salvable, sold to Sam Hildreth for \$200.”

## GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

New Orleans gossip shows that the near at hand decision of the Derby has led to a lot of scheming in the effort to secure competent jockeys. A dispatch to a Cincinnati newspaper of yesterday says: “Ed Heffner has succeeded

in having his wish realized, and O’Connor will ride his colt King Barleycorn in the Derby Saturday. The controversy over the services of the Daly lightweight between Heffner and J. H. McAvoy, the trainer of Hardy Pardee was taken cognizance of by the stewards, and they decided, after looking into the matter, that O’Connor must ride Hardy Pardee. Today, however, Mr. McAvoy gave way to the importunities of Heffner and relinquished to him his claim for the services of O’Connor, having been influenced to this course by the fact that the Daly orack had expressed a preference to ride King Barleycorn in Saturday’s big event. He did not, however, give up O’Connor until he had assured himself of the services of as competent a jockey. A day or so ago he wired Skeets Martin at Frisco, asking him if he would ride Hardy Pardee, and received a favorable reply. Martin is due to arrive at Memphis Thursday or Friday, and will be on hand to ride Colonel Applegate’s colt if he goes in Saturday’s race. Trainer McAvoy intends to try out the son of Pardee in the morning, and if he thinks as well of him after that trial as he does now, he will wire Martin at Memphis. If Hardy Pardee does go to the post many a person will pull for him to beat King Barleycorn, as the in-and-out performances of the latter have not left a pleasant taste in the mouths of local racegoers. Jockey Moody, it is reported, has severed his connection with Heffner, owing to the fact that he intimated to the stewards, when called into the stand yesterday, that he attributed King Barleycorn’s disgraceful showing Saturday to the ride Moody gave the colt. Prince McClurg, who made such a creditable showing with King Barleycorn, will be shipped by trainer McAvoy to Little Rock Friday to go in the Arkansas Derby. Hardy Pardee and the remainder of the Applegate string will be sent to Memphis next Monday. Tom Griffin and F. E. Gardner will leave for Washington with their strings Sunday. J. J. McCafferty will ship his lot to Memphis about the middle of the week.”

Indications point to a boom for Aqueduct this year. In the past the track has never had too many horses and has always been able to accommodate all comers. The stables on the track are calculated to give shelter to 360 horses and have always been sufficient ever since the opening of the track.

This spring, however, the demands for accommodations already exceed the limit of 360, and there are many more owners to be heard from. To meet this emergency, builders were put to work to construct one hundred new stalls, and they will be ready for occupancy the latter part of next week. If the demand for stable room continues, an additional one hundred will be put up, and more will be added as often as the necessity arises. The Aqueduct people do not propose to do anything on a small scale, and no owner will be turned away for lack of stable accommodation.

Superintendent Tucker has also started another improvement and is now roofing over the stand, which was formerly used by the bleachers. This will give additional sheltered capacity for 1,000 spectators.

In a letter from Memphis to a friend in Louisville Mr. Schorr’s trainer, William Walker, a very conservative man, says: “In regard to Algol, he never wintered better, and at present I would not give his chances for anyone in the Brooklyn Handicap. He is training far better than last year, and he has filled out and looks strong. If Lieber Karl starts in the Montgomery Handicap I think he will win it sure, for he has all the speed that he had last spring, but his legs are not any too good. As for the Kentucky Derby colts I can’t tell much yet. W.

Overton is doing well, but I have not done much with him. Manuel will be the horse to beat, I think. He looks fine and is a very powerful animal. Kentucky Colonel is doing well, and he is worth a bet in the Crescent City Derby. I think he will win.”

In a letter to a Chicago friend, concerning the status of Jolly Roger in the Kentucky Derby, John E. Madden says: “The horse is not eligible to the race. I did not keep up the payments on him and no one else had any authority to do so. If I owned the horse myself to-day I could not start him, as I did not make the payments on him.”

One of the smartest trainers at Memphis is authority for the statement that none of George Bennett’s two-year-olds amount to anything. The same party also says that Brewer Schorr has the poorest lot of juveniles he ever owned. J. C. Cahn’s recent \$1,500 purchase, Silver Fizz, a yearling chestnut filly, by Silver Fox—Tonique, is said to be one of the most promising youngsters at Montgomery Park. The news that George Bennett’s youngsters have failed to pan out well will be received with regret. Bennett went east last spring and invested liberally in yearlings at the big New York sales. He bought \$12,000 worth of youngsters, and the bunch will stand him fully \$20,000 by the time the Memphis meeting opens. Dick Stickney has been training the Bennett two-year-olds. Dick developed and brought out that good racehorse Prime Minister. Stickney now has full charge of the Bennett stable, Tom Nepper having been released by Mr. Bennett. Brewer Schorr bought most of his two-year-olds at private sale, securing the pick of Colonel Bill Barnes’ bunch of yearlings last summer. Mr. Schorr said himself several weeks ago that there wasn’t a first class two-year-old in his stable. Last year the Memphis brewer had a bunch of good ones, notably W. Overton, Sea Lion, Lieber Anton, Cathedral and Ordnung.—St. Louis Republic.

Acceptances for the Burns Handicap show that W. B. Jennings will not start Briar Sweet or Bendoran. It was thought the filly would be a sure starter despite her being the top weight. Still, the acceptance is a very good one and with the date of running so near at hand, it appears probable most of those left in will go to the post. The acceptances are:

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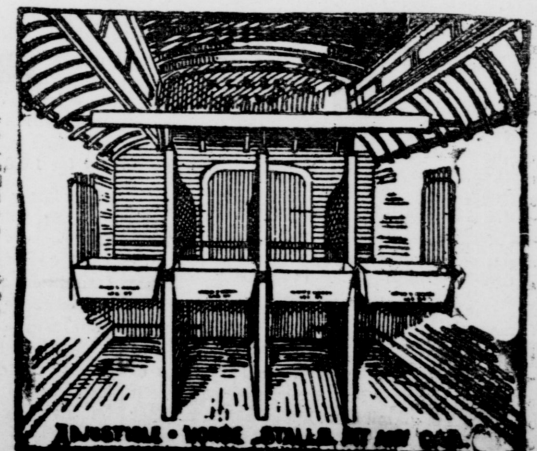
