CHEAP GOOD HORSES.

Commenting on instances of noted race horse having been sold at some stage in their career dest sums, an eastern writer says:

"Joe Ullman got Raceland for \$225 and was st ashamed to have anybody know he wa the buyer Raceland was a grand two-year-old later a Suburban winner.

"Age did not improve his appearance, and he was familiarly called 'Old Bones' by local turi goers. Raceland was one of many cheap horse

which won large amounts and fame on the turf.
"Morello, the Futurity winner of 1892, was sold among the Ellerslie yearlings, in 1891, for \$100. As a three-year-old he raced in the west To the minds of many who witnessed his per formances at St. Louis and Chicago, he was on of the greatest race horses ever seen in this

country.
"There have been few horses the superiors of Tenny on the American turf, yet he brought only \$10 as a yearling. In his career he won over \$90,000. That good little animal, Badge, was purchased for \$120. When the late Byron McClelland was struggling to pay the debte which he claimed to have made as a commis sioner for the late W. L. Scott, for whom he was training, but for which it was decided Scott was not responsible, he got Badge. The little fellow relieved Byron and started him on a career of prosperity and honor. Badge's earnings footed over \$63,000.

original 'iron horse,' Barnum, knocked down for \$165 as a yearling. When his career terminated he had nearly \$50,000 to his credit. Bermude, another of Byron McClelland's helpers, a winner of \$28,000, originally cost \$350. That gamest of cripples, Diablo, was a \$240 yearling. His winnings amounted to

'The Suburban winner, Troubadour, was ob tained for \$400. Sam Bryant got Proctor Knott for \$450. and with him won \$82,000, including the first Futurity in 1887. Ripple was an \$80 yearling. There were not many more popular horses on the Metropolitan tracks than Madne, purchased as a yearling for \$375. He won nearly \$45,000.

"Luke Blackburn cost J. T. Williams \$500 and, as a two-year-old, was sold to the Dwyer for \$2,500. King Crab, winner of over \$47.000, commended \$260 as a yearling. Telie Doe, a \$300 yearling, won \$25,000. Tipetaff, at a year ling sale, was considered worth \$450. His win nings amounted to \$25,000. Reclare brough Charade She earned nearly \$43 000. a \$350 colt, was another winner of \$25,000.

"Joe Cotton cost \$500 and earned \$30,000 Russell was a rare investment for the Morris stable. His cost was \$625 and his earnings \$72, 967. Burlington, 'the gentleman in black,' cost \$425. He returned \$42,220, nearly \$100 for every \$1 invested. Harry Bassett earned \$53,000 for the McDaniels confederacy, who paid \$315 for

"The above is not by any means a complete list of the prominent performers of the past which as youngsters brought figures that in no wise represented their actual value. They were simply underestimated, while others of less actual value were more highly prized.

"The most remarkable examples of chear orses of the last three years are Espionage Tappan and Kriss Kringle. Espionage cost Louis Ezell \$115. As a two-year-old she wor nearly \$11,000. She is now a four-year-old, win ces in California.

"Kriss Kringle, sold for \$35 a little over a year go, was, at the close of the season of 1899, one of the best handicap horses racing in the west. He has since been sold for \$4,000 and will be raced in the east this year.

GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

AT LOUISVILLE.

Track and training gossip at Louisville, Tuesday, was to the effect that the injury to Elizabeth Klein, Dr. Buschmeyer's filly, was received with regret by local horsemen. It was gener ally conceded that this fast filly might win the Tennessee and Kentucky Oaks. With Elizabeth Klein out it is generally believed now that the Kentucky Oaks is between Baker & Gentry's fast Anna Bein and Lady Elite, owned by Col. Wm. S. Barnes. Lady Elite is at Memphis, but Anna Bain is here and is in fine condition. She een given no very hard work, her trainer, Jack Baker, not caring to send her along so far

in advance of the race.

Lieutenant Gibson stepped three quarters last Sunday in 1:17, and was flagged down be fore finishing the mile in something close to 1:44. It was going entirely too fast for the Derby, which is just one mouth off. At the rate he was going Gibson would have been ready in two weeks' time, so Mr. Hughes concluded to ease up on the colt a little. He was given nothing but an exercise gallop today. It is doubtful if he will be given anything but slow breezes in the next two weeks.

The borses at the track are so far advance in their work that trainers are taking things easy, and are not worried in the least. Half miles were made today in 50 seconds with all ease, and owners are now looking for the dis-tance to be covered in 48 seconds. With a three-year-old Pat Dennis set a mark of 482 sec.

Ethel Collins went a half mile in compar with Finch, a three-year-old belonging to Pat Ryan, who has just returned from the Pacific Coast after a vary successful winter. Ethel Colline carried 126 pounds, while Finch only carried Finch went the half mile in 0:491 with Ethel Collins only a length behind at the finish. Horsemen conceded that the performance of Ethel Collins, with the weight she carried, stamped her as being in fine form and almost ready for racing.

Pat Dunne's Vain was given a good stiff mile out the time was not caught. Vain, it is said is being prepared especially for the St. Louis Derby. He went the mile with his head pulle back in his jockey's lap, and seemed to be as full of run at the finish as he was at the start. Pat Dunne's Reminder was breezed three-quarters, and it is said that he will be a sure starte in the Kentucky Derby, notwithstanding the fact that Lieutenant Gibson seems to have event at his mercy. Horsemen at the track seem to think that Brewer Schorr's Sam Phillips is the horse that Gabson will have to bea in the Derby, and that he will have to extend himself to his full capacity to beat Phillips out Kentacky Farmer, another Derby candidate belonging to Woodford & Buckner, and being trained by John Rodegap, is in seemingly fine nded. form, but has not as yet been exte Peter Wimmer, trainer of the Whitney string

"Indeed, it would not be at all surprising to see the handsome son of Sudie McNairy carry the 'white, black sash' to victory in more than one of the richest handicaps of the year.

"His Excellency has also improved, and possessing as he does a rare turn of speed, should prove a most useful sort, though sprinting will likely be his forte. Sozon is a very dsome and blood-like miss, full of quality and balanced; in fact, she is as charming a filly as one would see in a long time.

"Meredith, a son of Margrave, is a compact, muscular colt of good size, and has beautiful action. He is considered very fast and has given evidence of great ability to negotiate a route. Mr. McDowell, in speaking of the colt, said the will take a lot of beating in the Coney Island or Brighton Cup some day.

"The filly Usona, a very neat one, derives her name from the initial letters of the United States of North America, and is said to be truly worthy of the nomenclature. She has been highly tried and will surely be heard from."
