"There have been few horses the superiors of Tenny on the American turf, yet he brought only $\$ 810$ as a yearling. In his career he won over $\$ 90,000$. That good little animal, Badge, was purchased for $\$ 120$. When the late Byron McClelland was struggling to pay the debts sioner for the late $W$. L. Scott, for whom he was training, but for which it was decided Scott was not responsible, he got Badge. The little fellow relisved Byron and started him on a career of relisved Byron and started him on a career of
prosperity and honor. Badge's earnings footed prosperity a
over $\$ 83,000$.
"The original 'iron horse,' Barnam, was knocked down for $\$ 165$ as a yearling. When his career terminated he had nearly $\$ 50,000$ to his credit. Bermude, another of Byron McClelland's belpers, a winner of $\$ 28,0 C 0$, originally cost $\$ 350$. That gamest of cripples, Diablo, was a $\$ 240$ yearling. His winnings amounted to over $\$ 15,000$.
"The Subarban winner, Tronbadour, was ob tained for 8400 . Sam Bryant got Proctor Knott for $\$ 450$. and with him won $\$ 82,000$, including the first Futurity in 1887 . Ripple was an 880 yearling. There were not many more popalar horses on the Metrovolitan tracks than Madstone, purchased as a yearling for 8375 . He won nearly $\$ 45,000$.
"Lake Blackbarn cost J. T. Williams $\$ 500$ and, as a two-year-old, was sold to the Dwyers for 82.500 . King Crab, winner of over $\$ 47.000$, commanded $\$ 260$ as a yearling. Telie Doe, a $\$ 300$ yearling, won $\$ 25,000$. Tipataff, at a yearling sale, was considered worth 5450 . His winnings amonnted to $\$ 25,000$. Reclare brought nings amonnted She earned nearly $\$ 43000$. Charade, a $\$ 350$ colt, was another winner of $\$ 25,000$.
'JJoe Cotton cost $\$ 500$ and earned $\$ 30,000$ Russell was a rare investment for the Morris stable. His cost was $\$ 625$ and his earnings $\$ 72$,967. Burlington, 'the gentleman in black,' cost $\mathbf{s t 2 5}$. He returned $\$ \mathbf{2 2}, 220$, nearly $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 0}$ for every $\$ 1$ invested. Harry Bassett earned $\$ 53,000$ for the McDaniels confederacy, who paid $\$ 315$ for him.
"The above is not by any meane a complete list of the prominent performers of the past which as youngsters brought figures that in nosimply underestimated, while others of less actual value were more highly prized.
-"The most remarkable examples of cheap horses of the last three years are Espionage, Tappan and Kriss Kringle. Eepionage cost Lonis Ezell $\mathbf{3 1 1 5}$. As a two-year-old she won Lonis Ezell $\$ 115$. As a two-year-old she won

"At Now Orleane, a year ago, Tappan won a aelling race, for which he was ontered to be sold at $\$ 100$. 'Texas' Smith bid $\$ 200$ and got him. Last summer and fall he was one of the
best horses racing at Harlem and Hawthorne.

He went the mile with his head pulled back in his jackey's lap, and seemed to be a fall of run at the finish as be was at the start. Pat Dunne's Reminder was breezsd thres-quarters, and it is said that he will be a sure starter in the Kentucky Derby, notwithstanding the fact that Lientenant Gibson seems to have the ovent at his mercy. ## THE M'DOWELL STABLE.

The horses owned by Mr. Thomas C. McDowell performed so well last year, both eset and weat, that those who keep close track of racing affairs will hardly overlook the stable this vear. A Lexington letter gives the following information concarning Mr. MeDowell's atring or this year:
"One of the best strings of horses in Kenucky, from a standpoint of quality and indiidnal excellence, is that of Thomas C. Mc. Dowell, which has wintered at Ashland, and which will bs shipped to Churchill Downs some day during the present week.
"The stable is headed by the very brilliant take winner, Batten. He has developed into arand horse and has improved wondertally n every way, and from his baatiful appearance and the clever manner in which he is taking his work he may surely be reckoned a handicap probability.
"Indeed, it would not be at all surprising to see the handsome son of Sadie McNairy carry the 'white, black sash' to victory in more than ne of the richest handicaps of the year,
"His Excellency has also improved, and possersivg as he does a rare turn of speed, should prove a most usefal sort, though eprinting will likely ba his forte. Sozon is a very handsome and blood-like miss, fall of quality and balaaced; in fact, she is as charming o fily as one would see in a long time.
"Meredith, a son of Margrave, is a compact, muszular colt of good size, and has beantifal action. He is considered very fast and has given evidence of great ability to negotiate a roate. Mr. McDowell, in spazking of the colt said 'he will take a lot of beating in the Coney Island or Brighton Cup eome day
"The filly Usona, a very neat one, derives her name from the initial letters of the United States of North America, and is said to be truly worthy of the nomenclature. She has been very highly tried and will surely be heard from."
