CHEAP GOOD HORSES.

Commenting on instances of noted race horses having been sold at some stage in their careers for modest sums, an eastern writer says:

"Joe Ullman got Raceland for \$225 and was almost ashamed to have anybody know he was the buyer. Raceland was a grand two-year-old and later a Suburban winner.

"Age did not improve his appearance, and he was familiarly called 'Old Bones' by local turf goers. Raceland was one of many cheap horses which won large amounts and fame on the turf.

"Morello, the Futurity winner of 1892, was sold among the Ellerslie yearlings, in 1891, for \$100. As a three-year-old he raced in the west. To the minds of many who witnessed his performances at St. Louis and Chicago, he was one of the greatest race horses ever seen in this country.

"There have been few horses the superiors of Tenny on the American turf, yet he brought only \$210 as a yearling. In his career he won over \$90,000. That good little animal, Badge, was purchased for \$120. When the late Byron McClelland was struggling to pay the debts which he claimed to have made as a commissioner for the late W. L. Scott, for whom he was training, but for which it was decided Scott was not responsible, he got Badge. The little fellow relieved Byron and started him on a career of prosperity and honor. Badge's earnings footed over \$83,000.

"The original 'iron horse,' Barnum, was knocked down for \$165 as a yearling. When his career terminated he had nearly \$50,000 to his credit. Bermuda, another of Byron McClelland's helpers, a winner of \$28,000, originally cost \$350. That gamest of cripples, Diablo, was a \$240 yearling. His winnings amounted to over \$45,000.

"The Suburban winner, Troubadour, was obtained for \$400. Sam Bryant got Proctor Knott for \$450, and with him won \$82,000, including the first Futurity in 1887. Ripple was an \$80 yearling. There were not many more popular horses on the Metropolitan tracks than Madstone, purchased as a yearling for \$375. He won nearly \$45,000.

"Luke Blackburn cost J. T. Williams \$500 and, as a two-year-old, was sold to the Dwyers for \$2,500. King Crab, winner of over \$47,000, commanded \$260 as a yearling. Telie Doe, a \$300 yearling, won \$25,000. Tipstaff, at a yearling sale, was considered worth \$450. His winnings amounted to \$25,000. Reclaire brought \$25 more. She earned nearly \$43,000. Charade, a \$350 colt, was another winner of \$25,000.

"Joe Cotton cost \$500 and earned \$30,000. Russell was a rare investment for the Morris stable. His cost was \$625 and his earnings \$72,967. Burlington, 'the gentleman in black,' cost \$425. He returned \$42,220, nearly \$100 for every \$1 invested. Harry Bassett earned \$53,000 for the McDaniels confederacy, who paid \$315 for him.

"The above is not by any means a complete list of the prominent performers of the past which as youngsters brought figures that in no wise represented their actual value. They were simply underestimated, while others of less actual value were more highly prized.

"The most remarkable examples of cheap horses of the last three years are Espionage, Tappan and Kris Kringle. Espionage cost Louis Ezell \$115. As a two-year-old she won nearly \$11,000. She is now a four-year-old, winning races in California.

"At New Orleans, a year ago, Tappan won a selling race, for which he was entered to be sold at \$100. 'Texas' Smith bid \$200 and got him. Last summer and fall he was one of the best horses racing at Harlem and Hawthorne.

"Kris Kringle, sold for \$35 a little over a year ago, was, at the close of the season of 1899, one of the best handicap horses racing in the west. He has since been sold for \$4,000 and will be raced in the east this year."

GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

Despite the heavy losses of the ring at the previous Oakland meeting, the bookmakers are well ahead of the game this season. The present week has materially benefited every penciler. George Rose, John Coleman, Fred Cook, Frank Eckert and Joe Harlan are jointly more than \$100,000 ahead of the season. Not one of the foregoing quintet is less than \$20,000 winner. The Hoffman brothers are probably \$10,000 winner in their two books, while Hughey Jones and Phil Archibald are accounted to be \$10,000 ahead. Gus Blum is a small winner, while Fred Pesch, who dropped \$10,000 the first part of the season, has won most of this sum back in the past two or three weeks. Several others who have been booking on and off during the season are but little winner or loser. The St. Louis Club is the only book in the ring that has not missed a day during the entire season. It is controlled by Paul Hoffman, Charles Hoffman and J. Jackson.

The Empire City race track will pass into the hands of Philip J. Dwyer, president of the Brooklyn Jockey Club, this season. He will act as manager. John B. Sexton, one of the executors of the estate of the late William H. Clark, is authority for this announcement. The executors of the estate tried recently to sell the track to several members of the Jockey Club, but the terms were not acceptable and the prospective sale fell through. It was then that P. J. Dwyer's aid was sought. Mr. Dwyer is an old friend of the family.

J. J. Douglas, Eothen Stud, Middletown, Ky., has sold to John E. Madden, Hamburg Place, at a private figure, Bassinette (dam of Blarneystone and San Cecilia), bay mare, 15 years old, by King Ernest—Miss Bassett (sister to Harry Bassett) by Lexington, and the speedy Quiver (dam of Amyntas), bay mare, 10 years old, by Faustus—Belle Broeck, by Ten Broeck. Both these mares are in foal to Falsetto, and will be bred to either Plaudit or Mirthful. This addition to the matrons at Hamburg Place brings the number at that establishment up to nearly 100 head of the choicest bred brood mares in this country.

The celebrated mare Spinaway (dam of Handspan, Montauk, etc.), by Leamington—Megara, by Eclipse, will be bred to the Commoner, Mr. E. C. Cowdin, her owner, of Mt. Kisco, N. Y., having instructed Col. Milton Young to that effect by telephone from New York.

Wyndham Walden reports the loss of the mare Misericordia at his farm in Middleburg, Ky. She was the property of the Messrs. Morris and was raced by them at the New Orleans meeting. She apparently shipped in good shape, but the day after being unloaded from the cars at Washington she was taken sick and died the same night.

AT LOUISVILLE.

Track and training gossip at Louisville, Tuesday, was to the effect that the injury to Elizabeth Klein, Dr. Buschmeyer's filly, was received with regret by local horsemen. It was generally conceded that this fast filly might win the Tennessee and Kentucky Oaks. With Elizabeth Klein out it is generally believed now that the Kentucky Oaks is between Baker & Gentry's fast Anna Bein and Lady Elite, owned by Col. Wm. S. Barnes. Lady Elite is at Memphis, but Anna Bein is here and is in fine condition. She has been given no very hard work, her trainer, Jack Baker, not caring to send her along so far in advance of the race.

Lieutenant Gibson stepped three-quarters last Sunday in 1:17, and was flagged down before finishing the mile in something close to 1:44. It was going entirely too fast for the Derby, which is just one month off. At the rate he was going Gibson would have been ready in two weeks' time, so Mr. Hughes concluded to ease up on the colt a little. He was given nothing but an exercise gallop today. It is doubtful if he will be given anything but slow breezes in the next two weeks.

The horses at the track are so far advanced in their work that trainers are taking things easy, and are not worried in the least. Half miles were made today in 50 seconds with all ease, and owners are now looking for the distance to be covered in 48 seconds. With a three-year-old Pat Dennis set a mark of 48½ seconds.

Ethel Collins went a half mile in company with Finch, a three-year-old belonging to Pat Ryan, who has just returned from the Pacific Coast after a very successful winter. Ethel Collins carried 125 pounds, while Finch only carried 70 pounds. Finch went the half mile in 0:49½, with Ethel Collins only a length behind at the finish. Horsemen conceded that the performance of Ethel Collins, with the weight she carried, stamped her as being in fine form and almost ready for racing.

Pat Dunne's Vain was given a good stiff mile, but the time was not caught. Vain, it is said, is being prepared especially for the St. Louis Derby. He went the mile with his head pulled back in his jockey's lap, and seemed to be as full of run at the finish as he was at the start. Pat Dunne's Reminder was breezed three-quarters, and it is said that he will be a sure starter in the Kentucky Derby, notwithstanding the fact that Lieutenant Gibson seems to have the event at his mercy. Horsemen at the track seem to think that Brewer Schorr's Sam Phillips is the horse that Gibson will have to beat in the Derby, and that he will have to extend himself to his full capacity to beat Phillips out. Kentucky Farmer, another Derby candidate, belonging to Woodford & Buckner, and being trained by John Rodegap, is in seemingly fine form, but has not as yet been extended.

Peter Wimmer, trainer of the Whitney string, gave his horses exercise gallops today, and it is doubtful if he will send them along much further at the local track. He will ship east, it is said, April 17, and all he desires is to have his horses well seasoned by the time he gets away. The string, including Jean Beraud, are already far advanced beyond all expectations, and after reaching home they will require very little preparation for racing.

THE M'DOWELL STABLE.

The horses owned by Mr. Thomas C. McDowell performed so well last year, both east and west, that those who keep close track of racing affairs will hardly overlook the stable this year. A Lexington letter gives the following information concerning Mr. McDowell's string for this year:

"One of the best strings of horses in Kentucky, from a standpoint of quality and individual excellence, is that of Thomas C. McDowell, which has wintered at Ashland, and which will be shipped to Churchill Downs some day during the present week.

"The stable is headed by the very brilliant stake winner, Batten. He has developed into a grand horse and has improved wonderfully in every way, and from his beautiful appearance and the clever manner in which he is taking his work he may surely be reckoned a handicap probability.

"Indeed, it would not be at all surprising to see the handsome son of Sudie McNairy carry the 'white, black sash' to victory in more than one of the richest handicaps of the year.

"His Excellency has also improved, and possessing as he does a rare turn of speed, should prove a most useful sort, though sprinting will likely be his forte. Suzon is a very handsome and blood-like miss, full of quality and balanced; in fact, she is as charming a filly as one would see in a long time.

"Meredith, a son of Margrave, is a compact, muscular colt of good size, and has beautiful action. He is considered very fast and has given evidence of great ability to negotiate a route. Mr. McDowell, in speaking of the colt, said 'he will take a lot of beating in the Coney Island or Brighton Cup some day.'

"The filly Usona, a very neat one, derives her name from the initial letters of the United States of North America, and is said to be truly worthy of the nomenclature. She has been very highly tried and will surely be heard from."

This stable will probably be shipped to Brooklyn after the Louisville meeting. The makeup of the string is as follows:

Among those now there are Chenier, Lost Time, Prosperous, Joe Bell, Captain Rees, The Dauphin, Zufallig, Boanerges, Braw Lad, Brakeman, Eustis, Aragnol, Brandywine, Hampden, Czarowitz, Cheesemite, Van Brunt, Jim Hogg, Arquebus, Jack Hayes and Wild Tartar. Secretary Macfarlan will give as many steeplechases as he finds will fill well, as he is convinced the people like to see cross-country racing.
