## ED AUSTIN.

Good as Abe Frank has proved himself to be there are in Chicago some good judges of the merits of horses who entertain the opinion that his stable companion, Ed Austin, is probably better. This does not appear in the records, but the manner in which he has been made to play second fiddle to his more famous comrade, with the resultant avoidance of penalties for big stakes to come, serves to lend color to the theory. However this may be the colt has done enough on his own account to secure the respectful consideration of owners of other good two year-olds, and on the whole Mr. Bennett is a lucky owner in possessing two such racing jewels in one season.

Ed Austin is a half brother of that rare old sprinter O'Connell and evidently a chip from the same block in point of speed. His first start was at Worth May 3 in a four and a half furlongs dash for maiden two-year-olds, for which nine went to the post. From the beginning of the year he had been reported to be a good one and went to the post a 7 to 5 favorite and won easily by three parts of a length from Miracle II., Brissac finishing a distant third. The other starters were Hat Mitchell, Mihasa, Illwaho, Puryear, Fisher's Hornpipe and Bragg, the latter being left at the post. Ed Austin was under strong restraint at the finish and made an excellent impression on those who witnessed his debut. The race was run in 56 seconds.

At the same track, May 6, he captured another purse, at five furlongs this time. Having only John A. Clarke, Bert Sargent, Miracle II. and Harry Brennan to dispose of he went to the post an odds on favorite at 3 to 5 and won, but not without a sharp struggle. He did not get off well and it was some time before he was well settled in his stride but coming fast through the stretch he got up in time to win by a head with something left, John A. Clarke being second a nose in front of Bert Sargent. The time was 1:02 3/4 and it is not probable that the two sharp contenders in this race will ever again be able to be so near Ed Austin at the finish of a race. May 8, he won another purse at Worth, a half-mile dash which he won in 48 1/2 with Johanna D. second and Bridge third, Miracle II., John A. Clarke, Brissac and Graechi running unplaced. Ed Austin won easily by two and a half lengths conceding Johanna D. fourteen pounds, besides her sex allowance. He concluded his victorious campaign at Worth May 25, by taking another half-mile dash from Hat Mitchell, Brannigan, Johanna D., The Stewardess and Parnassus in 50 1/2 seconds, winning easily, with Hat Mitchell second, lapped out by Brannigan. He was, as usual, an odds on favorite, and left Worth with a record of four straight winning races.

His next start was for the Vernal Stakes at Hawthorne, May 27. The starters and weights were: Abe Frank, 124 pounds; Ed Austin, 118; Eddie Busch, 121; J. V. Kirby, 115; South Elkhorn, 118, and Brannigan, 118. Abe Frank won easily by two lengths, while Ed Austin saved second money by a neck after a sharp struggle with Eddie Busch and J. V. Kirby, it being a case of necks apart between the three. The five furlongs were covered in 1:04. June 5, he won a purse at Hawthorne over a five furlong route defeating Harry Beck, South Trimble, Miracle II., Declaimer, McChesney, Altona, Prince Light, Lady Avon, and Baldonkeel in 1:01. He led throughout and won easily by a length giving weight to all the other starters. He was a length in front of Harry Beck at the finish, the latter beating South Trimble a head. This was his last winning performance.

At Harlem, June 15, he sustained a defeat from the fast filly, Elsie L. It was in a half mile dash, and in an exciting finish Elsie L. was first by a neck, with Ed Austin second a neck before Sweet Billie. He carried 120 pounds to 112 each on the other two. The time was 48 3/4 and the seven other starters were hulled down in the distance, the nearest, Herodes, being seven lengths away from Sweet Billie. He started for the Graduate Stakes at the same track, June 18, and ran second to his mate, Abe Frank. Only four started, Abe Frank, 123; Ed Austin, 118; Arian, 106 and Charles W. Meyer, 123. Abe Frank won by a half length in 1:00 3/4 with Arian third, two lengths away.

At Washington Park his only start so far has been in the Quickstep Stakes, won by Abe Frank. The latter won easily enough by a length and a half and Ed Austin appeared to have the second money comfortably disposed of when Charles W. Meyer, coming on suddenly

shipped from Washington Park, Hawthorne and Harlem to Windsor, and a special train of horses leaves this city tonight to participate in what promises to be the best meeting ever given at Windsor.

The International Handicap, to be run on the opening day, has a good class of horses entered, including Advance Guard, The Conqueror II., Cambrian, The Rush, Bangle, Espionage, Ohnet, Senator Beveridge, Topmast, Handicapper and thirty six more. S. C. Wagner, vice-president of the Worth Jockey Club, is financially interested in the Canadian track, and lays much stress on the announcement that this will be made the best racing point in Canada, with the exception of the excellent meeting given at Toronto.

The booking will be open to all reputable bookmakers, and no owners who race there will be disqualified by the Western Jockey Club, as the Windsor Jockey Club is in a foreign country, but will collect Western Jockey Club for-

## ABE FRANK'S EDGEWATER.

The handicap taken by Advance Guard yesterday suffered little in comparison with its illustrious predecessor, the Young Handicap. The finish was moving and spirited, hardly five lengths intervening between the winner and the last horse. The son of Great Tom was given a much more energetic ride than he received in the classic of last Saturday, as in the latter event little Martin was of little or no help to him when strong arm and leg work might have landed him the winner. He was clearly outrun in the earlier stages of the race yesterday, but began to close ground when nearing the final straightaway and fairly flew down the last quarter.

To a good start Robert Waddell darted into the lead closely attended by Louisville and Specific with Advance Guard last. Curving around the club house turn and on to the half Louisville went into the lead with Specific displacing Robert Waddell from second position close up. The Mahone mare held her advantage all down the backstretch and to just a little before stretch turn with Specific always close up and Star Chamber taking third position. Once straightened for home there was a general closing up, but suddenly the red and white bars of Advance Guard's colors were seen moving up with the leaders. Mathews was now riding him as hard as he could and he was close up to Specific and Malay but in the last one hundred yards that big stride of his gradually cut down those in front of him and finishing with a dash he went over the line a short half length in front of Malay, who was the same distance before Specific. Robert Waddell was a good fourth and showed that he has not gone back. Louisville tired and quit badly when the crucial test came. Caviar ran a dull race but should do better at his next asking. The contest was exciting throughout and was productive of keen enthusiasm in the closing strides.

Abe Frank proved beyond a doubt that his long runaway last week had not dulled his speed. Many, thinking it had, were of the opinion that Pentecost would take his measure, but in this they were disappointed, for while he put up a splendid effort, he was unable to beat the winner, who has shown himself to be the best colt in the west this year, with the exception of Allan-a-Dale. Charles W. Meyer dashed to the front at the flag dip and opened a gap of a length on the Bennett beauty with the others fairly well up. The Schorr youngster still held his advantage to the run in, but when once straightened away, the son of Hanover went up and grabbed him. They ran lapped for a few strides when Charles W. Meyer was seen to sprawl and the race as far as the winner was concerned, was over. Abe Frank finally won by a length from Pentecost, who beat Sir Oliver a neck for second place. Pentecost was not given the very best ride possible and was slightly cut off in the last sixteenth. Sir Oliver finished with firmness and showed himself a high class colt.

P. Dunne's Approved took the day's opener in rather a handy fashion, while Fred Wood's consistent Leo Newell won the second race in a fierce drive by a neck from Odnor. Sly ran back to her California form and beat a fair field of sprinters in fast time, the six furlongs being run in 1:13 3/4. Scotch Plaid and San Andres had a terrific duel in the last race through the final furlong, Woods outriding Steele at the end and winning on the post by a neck. The usual big attendance was on hand and witnessed one of the best day's sport of the season.

The card this afternoon promises well, the main feature being a handicap for two year-olds, with the splendid filly Endurance by Right the top weight.

to 5, and Handwork, at 2 to 9, also went wrong within a month. It was demonstrated a number of years ago that such strong odds on favorites are not always sure to win. M. F. Dwyer once accepted 1 to 15 against his horse Kingston and lost \$15,000. It was Dwyer who made a practice of playing 1 to 3 and 1 to 5 shots regularly and he lost a fortune at it, too.

"As an instance of how shrewdly a big plunger manipulates things nowadays, it may be well to recite an incident that occurred in the betting ring at Brighton Beach last Friday. It was just before the fifth race. Alibert had opened at 3 to 5, with Locket at threes and April Shower at sixes. The plunger, who is followed about wherever he goes by a crowd of curious individuals, hurried into the ring and began to bet \$200 at a crack on Locket. As he ran down the line of layers, picking out the best prices against that horse, the pencilers became alarmed and cut the price to 9 to 5. At the same time Alibert's price was raised to 9 to 10 and in some books to even money. Then a half a dozen young hustlers, who act as commissioners for the plunger, rushed up to the books and plastered a pile of yellow gold certificates all over Alibert's chances.

"The colt won in a gallop and the crowd that had played Locket because they saw the plunger do so wondered where they were at. It was finally explained that the plunger had worked an old-time trick of 'burning up' money on Locket so as to 'hunch' the price on the favorite that on form could not lose. Then when Alibert's price suited him the plunger flooded the ring with 'real money.'

"That the local racing associations will make big money this year seems to be a foregone conclusion. It is this unusual prosperity, perhaps, that has caused the talk of another new track, in which Timothy D. Sullivan and other well-known politicians may be interested. It was said yesterday that if the scheme goes through the promoters of it would ask the Jockey Club to allow them to race here while the meeting at Saratoga is going on. It is maintained by some of the men who say that they are interested in the new venture that New York city and the immediate vicinity should not be without racing in August and that a new track running in that month would not in any way injure Saratoga. The thousands of racegoers who never can make the trip to Saratoga would then receive a chance to enjoy continuous sport here at a profit for those who would build the new track. But it is doubtful whether the Jockey Club would consent to a rearrangement of the plan which has worked successfully and with harmony in recent years.

"Secretary McIntyre of the New Saratoga Racing Association, has announced the entries to the stake races to be run at the Spa this year. The Saratoga Handicap, worth \$10,000 will be run on the opening day of the meeting. The horses eligible to start are:
