WHEELER HANDICAP DAY.

This is the concluding day of a meeting that will linger long in the memories of the many thousands who have witnessed the many remarkable and sensational racing performances that have signally marked the Washington Park meeting of 1901. It fitly culminates with the famous Wheeler Handicap as the star attraction that will serve to draw 25,000 people to the great South Side track. For this fourteen horses have accepted their imposts and their weights and probable riders are as follows:

The Lake View Handicap will bring Abe Frank, Sir Oliver, Memnon and Charles W. Meyer into competition again and on a dry, fast track the Hyde Park Stakes running will probably be reversed.

The purses have all filled remarkably well and all around a day of great racing is assured.

ENDURANCE BY RIGHT.

Last fall Col. W. S. Barnes bought a Belle Meade bred filly at Woodard & Shanklin's Lexington sale and last spring sent her down to Memphis to be trained along with the other horses in the Memphis division of his stable. Before the opening of the racing season he leased her running qualities to Mr. J. W. Schorr, thereby making a poor deal for himself and a remarkably good one for Mr. Schorr. That filly was Inspector B.'s now famous daughter, Endurance By Right, unquestionably one of the best young mares that ever wore a bridle. It is said that Mr. Schorr only paid \$1,200 for her running qualities, and as she has since won eight races out of nine starts, it can easily be seen that she has already repaid this sum many times over to the fortunate Memphis turfman.

Her first start was in a half mile dash for a purse at Memphis last spring, April 19, which she won by two lengths from Herodiade with Attelle third, Lena Schady, Winter Bell, Lady Burlington, Hunter Raine, Jaubert and Easter Boy running unplaced. She was known to have shown well in her work and went to the post a 6 to 5 favorite. The time was 53 seconds and as subsequent racing has shown she by far outclassed her opponents. She started no more at Memphis, being sent from there to Louisville.

Here she was sent to the post on the opening day of the meeting to contest for a purse at a half mile and was a 7 to 10 favorite in a field of eleven fillies. She won by a length in 49 seconds, running on the outside all the way and necessarily covering much more ground than the majority of her opponents. Miss Thomey was second and Seortie third, the unplaced ones being Drummond, Our Jessie, Lady Maxim, Dodie S., Cousine, The Fashion, Pearl Ban, Miss Gaines and Attelle, the latter being left at the post. At the same track May 8 she met the solitary defeat that marks her career. The track was muddy, the distance five furlongs and as usual she was an odds on favorite at 7 to 10 but third was the best she could do, Runnels, a 40 to 1 shot, leading throughout and winning by three lengths with Harry Beck second, a length and a half before Endurance by Right. It was the big filly's introduction to mud and she could not extend herself in it, a useful point for

her admirers of today to bear in mind. Behind her finished Belle's Commoner, Kentucky Muddle, Corinne C., Lady Appleby and The Boston, and the race was run in 1:03. This defeat ended her Louisville campaign.

She was now taken to Latonia to fill her first stake engagement of the year—the Clipsetta—a dash of five furlongs for fillies. The race was run May 16 and the starters were Endurance by Right, 110 pounds; Foundling, 112; Lingo, 106½; Almanzo, 103; Julia Junkin, 103; Mamie English, 107; Jean Raphael, 103; Throstle, 104½; and Wedding March, 107. She won but only at the end of a sharp drive. Foundling, a smart filly herself, took the lead and the rail and held it to near the end where Endurance by Right, running on the extreme outside nearly all the way, got up and driving out won by a half length in 1:02½. Lingo was third a length behind Foundling. It was a smashing good race for the winner as, owing to her position, she covered many more lengths than Foundling. The stake was worth \$1,235 net and Endurance by Right was a 6 to 5 favorite.

The good filly was now brought to Chicago,

105; Quality, 105; Mamie English, 115; Hoodwink, 112 and Doreen, 115. There was a notion abroad that Doreen was dangerous and the reflection of this notion in the betting ring caused the opening odds of 6 to 5 against Endurance by Right to expand to 11 to 5 at post time. As a sequel she won in a canter by three lengths while Doreen got off so badly that no effort was made with her and she finished last. Endurance by Right ran second to the stretch then drew out and won easing up, Throstle second two lengths before Mabel Winn. Time, 56½ seconds.

On the opening day of the Washington Park meeting she proved that she was able to show her dainty heels to the good colts as effectively as she had been doing with those of her own sex. This was in a dash of four and a half furlongs in which with 120 pounds up she met Magi, 115; Pentecost, 123; Blue Mantel, 111; Runnels, 118; The Four Hundred, 115; Red Hook, 118; Bridge, 118; Frank Mc, 111; St. Sever, 108; Bragg, 118; William H., 118; The Boston, 115, and Corinne Unland, 108, and ran away from them, winning by two lengths in 54½ seconds, with Magi second and Pentecost third.

GEORGE ARNOLD'S FINE RACE.

The fourth race at Washington Park yesterday was productive of one of the most exciting finishes of the meeting, George Arnold, Headwater and Major Dixon passing over the imaginary line noses apart. It was a spectacular finish and aroused the immense gathering to the keenest pitch of enthusiasm. George Arnold, whose performances hereabouts this year have suffered in comparison with his great races of last year, was allowed to go up in the betting, many of the talent putting their faith in Headwater on his good showing against Sidney Lucas several days ago.

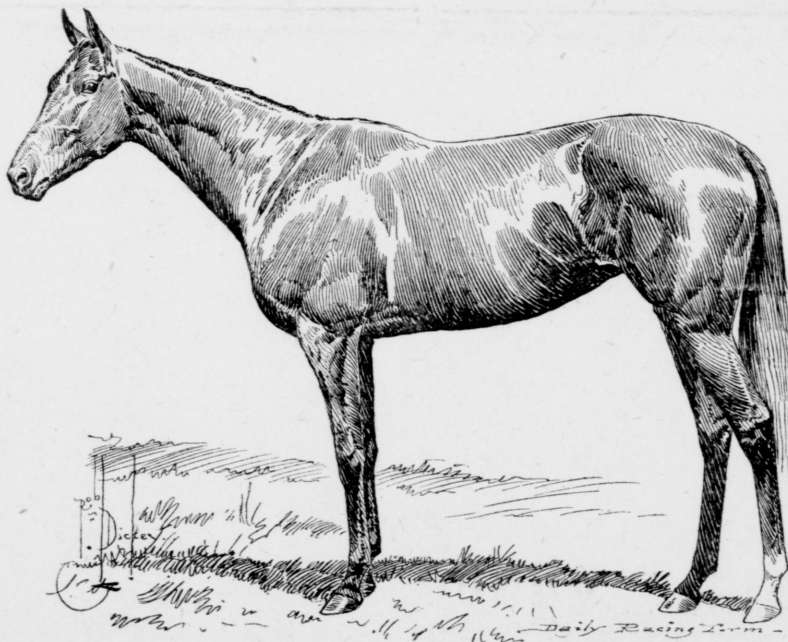
George Arnold put up one of his best races and showed a dash of his former speed, going into the lead soon after a half had been run. He wheeled into the final quarter a length in front of Headwater on whom Major Dixon, who had moved up fast along in here on the inside rail was lapped. It appeared very rosy for the Jones gelding as the trio approached the last eighth as he had moved up to the son of Sir Dixon's throat latch.

Caywood now sat down and rode one of the best races of his life. He armed and legged the big horse with all the power he could summon and by dint of an energetic effort, the like of which has seldom been seen here this year, fairly shot George Arnold's nose first past the post, with Headwater's nose the same distance in front of Major Dixon. Mathews, on the last named, lodged a claim of foul against George Arnold, but the judges failed to sustain it. George Arnold is now back to his old form again and it will take a mighty good horse to beat him at seven furlongs or under from now on.

Cambrian had on his running clothes yesterday and ran to his best form. Favored by the start, he dashed at once to the front in the fifth race, a mile and seventy yards affair, closely attended by Caviar, with Specific third a length away. The last named got about two lengths the worst of the send-off and was never able afterward to close the gap. Moving down the backstretch, Cambrian, running along well within himself, easily maintained his advantage, while Caviar increased his lead over the Ellison hope to two lengths. Along in here Bullman rallied Specific and by dint of punishment got his mount close up to the two in front of him when bending for the final straightaway. Once straightened for home Caviar cried quits and the son of St. Florian dashed up into second position. Bullman tried his every art and skill to close on the flying Respass horse in front of him, but the two lengths' handicap at the start was too much to overcome, Cambrian winning by a length, with Specific two in front of Caviar. The last named was well up to the head of the stretch and then fell away. He is probably waiting for the mud to show at his best.

Theory, ably piloted by Bullman, ran back to her California form and had no trouble in annexing the purse of the first race to her credit. She was easily in the lead all the way and won handily at the end by two and a half lengths from Sevoy, who beat the fast closing Lady Elite one for the place. Duelist, of whom much was expected, ran a dull race and was never a contender. Sevoy was rank for five furlongs, but when the pinch came showed the white feather. Andria was badly outrun for the entire journey.

The five and a half furlong scramble for youngsters went to the consistent Jaubert, who flashed to the front at the barrier's rise and remained there to the end, winning in a canter by three and a half lengths from the improving Red Hook, who was two lengths in front of the faint-hearted Doreen. The Four Hundred, who ran

and here she has achieved her greatest fame and won for herself a host of adherents ready to back her to defeat any filly in the land, to say nothing of the colts. Her bow to the local race going public was at Hawthorne June 1, when she was brought out to do battle for the Lassie Stakes at five furlongs. The starters were Endurance by Right, 118; Doreen, 115; April, 110; Prona, 110, and Barouche, 115. As by rights she should have been, she was a 7 to 10 favorite and the winner, but did not appear to have any too easy a time of it, as Woods had to shake her up sharply when a furlong out. She won by a length and a half, however, with Doreen second, a length before April. The time was fast, 1:01. Doreen herself ran a good race, the best she has shown since coming from California.

Her next essay was at Harlem June 12, when she was started in the Petite Stakes, a dash of 4½ furlongs, for which eleven fillies went to the post. They were Endurance by Right, 120 pounds; Throstle, 110; Mabel Winn, 112; April, 110; Autumn Leaves, 115; Barouche, 115; Lingo,

Then she emphasized her excellence by winning the Lakeside Stakes, June 25, and putting on record a grand performance. Allan-a-Dale with 111 pounds in the saddle had just created a furore by breaking the track record at five furlongs, running it in 1:00½, but she immediately overshadowed this fine racing feat by taking up 122 pounds and running the distance in one minute flat. Opposed to her were Sweet Billie, 115 pounds; Sister Jeanie, 115; Wainamoinen, 120; Flora Pomona, 118; Prona, 110 and Doreen, 115. Sweet Billie led around to and into the stretch at a heart breaking rate of speed, with Endurance by Right running in third place to midway of the stretch where she set sail for the flying leader and soon having her in trouble, drew away and won by two lengths amid thunderous applause, her rush down the stretch being of the order that makes people get on their feet and open their throats wide.

This grand filly confirmed her greatness last Wednesday by taking up 122 pounds in an over-

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TURF HAPPENINGS ABROAD.

H. Engine Leigh, the well-known American trainer, was a few days ago the principal actor in one of the most sensational episodes of the present season on the English turf.

The incident arose over a selling race for maiden two-year-olds at the Newmarket first July meeting.

The Rancocas filly Soldanella was the favorite, but ran badly, while "Mr. Russell's well tried colt Monsieur de l'Orme was made the medium of a heavy wager by his party.

Serene in the contemplation of their substantial profits, the winner's party prepared to bid him in at the subsequent auction.

The rule has long been in existence, but the practice of invariably inserting the auction clause has caused it to become so obsolete that J. Waugh, the trainer of Monsieur de l'Orme,

probably was unaware of its exact wording. Leigh was wide awake, however, and thus he secured a very smart youngster for Mr. Gardner at an expense of only £200, the entered selling price, not having to even pay the customary addition of the value of the purse, as is the case in the claiming of the beaten horses.

Monsieur de l'Orme is by Orme-Lily Asphodel, she by Hampton-Jersey Lily, she by Beauclerc-Tiger Lily, by Maccaroni. This is the family of Orme, St. Gatien, etc., and Monsieur de l'Orme holds a number of important engagements, including the £3,000 National Breeders' Produce Stakes at Sandown Park on Saturday of this week, the £3,000 Imperial Produce at Kempton Park in October, and the £10,000 Eclipse Stakes of 1902.

Mr. Gardner's stable seems particularly strong in two-year-olds, for his colt Omaha II. has made remarkable improvement of late, and is regarded in many quarters as being but little behind the best of the year.

Omaha II. began the year by winning the May Auction Plate at Kempton Park on May 11, when he was heavily backed into favoritism and was bought in for \$8,750.

Elizabeth M. was the same week made an even money favorite for the July Cup, six furlongs, but Mr. Whitney's filly was always last of the field of five when it came to racing.
