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HAWTHORNE'S GOOD RACING.

For an off day's card the racing at Hawthorne yesterday was of a high order, the finishes in nearly all cases being of a close and exciting nature. A large crowd was on hand and witnessed a great day's sport. The most exciting finish occurred in the fourth event, a handicap purse of \$700 at seven furlongs, Scotch Plaid beating Maggie Davis a head on the post in a striking finish. Gonfalon was supposed to hold this race at his mercy, being held at even money in the betting, but the best he could do was to run a far off fifth, being outrun from start to finish.

Off to a good start, Maggie Davis rushed into a lead of two lengths in front of Scotch Plaid, with Andes third and the rest within hailing distance. Nearing the half Maggie Davis still clung to her advantage, while Anna Bain had displaced Andes in third position. It appeared all over the Sloan mare, when straightened for home, as she still had a lead of two lengths when nearing the last eighth, but along in here Scotch Plaid began closing gradually, and in a desperate finish got up to and beat her a head right on the line. Andes was a poor third seven lengths away. Obia met with considerable interference in the first quarter or she might have had a chance to run into third money. How so good a horse as Gonfalon could have performed so shabbily is a mystery. He showed no high speed at any part of the flight, and was thoroughly exhausted at the finish.

Canmore, on his recent good six furlongs showing at Washington Park, was supposed to hold the second race in fee simple, but he ran about as badly as Gonfalon ran in the fourth race, finishing many lengths behind Trinity Bell, the winner. P. Dunne came near springing a surprise in this event, his speedy Hanover gelding, Flying Torpedo, grabbing the lead at the barrier's rise and holding a commanding advantage to the last sixteenth, where Trinity Bell came with a whirl and just got up in time to nip him on the post by a short head. Jim Winn, who overraced himself, finished third six lengths away, while the red-hot favorite finished a dismal fifth nine lengths back of the winner. Canmore showed well until straightened for home, where he quit badly.

Fourteen youngsters lined up at the barrier in the day's opener and after several false breaks Holtman succeeded in getting them away to a splendid start. Legal Maxim showed the way to the last quarter closely pursued by The Four Hundred and Parnassus, but when they got well straightened for home McChesney came with an irresistible rush and had everything beaten before the last sixteenth had been reached. From here to the line he simply cantered home winning by five lengths, from The Four Hundred who beat Legal Maxim one for second place.

Aladdin, supposed to be a good thing, had a rough journey and never got clear sailing until the stretch spread, from which point he closed some ground and would have been third in another stride. Lapidus, as usual, showed early speed but could not carry it far. Red Hook ran far below his mark and his race should not be given serious attention.

A big field of youngsters also went to the post in the third race, a dash of five furlongs. P. Dunne's Emathion was considered the best on his last performance at Washington Park, but he was short of speed, finishing a poor seventh. The winner turned up in Lord Quex, who came with a dash in the last hundred yards after everything had been run into exhaustion and won by a length going away, with Commissioner Forster second, a head in front of Jane Oaker, who was fading away fast at the end.

Ethel Simpson displayed quite a turn of speed for a half mile, as did Hat Mitchell, but both retired when the crucial test came. Puryear, backed by a select few for a good thing, finished a bang up fourth and will bear watching from now on.

Odnor with his light impost of 91 on his shoulders had little trouble in taking the fifth race, going into the lead soon after the first quarter had been negotiated and remaining there to the end, winning easily by four lengths from Nettie Regent, who beat Hermencia two for second place.

The finale went to Henry of Trastamara, who put up a brilliant effort coming from away back in the last quarter and mowing down his field with ease. He won going away easily at the end by a length from Max Bendix, who finished three before If You Dare. Max Bendix, belonging to Pat Dunne, made his initial appearance on the turf and ran an impressive race. He finished with courage, but the winner's energetic rush in the last hundred yards was too much for him. If You Dare, as usual, was there with plenty of early speed, but quit when the rub came. Dalkeith ran a fair race and is due for an early bracket when placed right. The Rogue ran far below expectations and is capable of a much better showing.

EASTERN TURF GOSSIP.

Of matters immediately interesting to eastern followers of the turf, the Sun of Monday says: "The action of the stewards of the Jockey Club in ruling jockey Combs and W. P. Ware off the turf for life means that both of them will be barred from every race track in the world. It is the most serious punishment that can be inflicted and it is the first time in a number of years that the stewards have resorted to such drastic methods. The simple revocation of a license was considered effective enough, but in the cases of Combs and Ware the extreme penalty was deemed necessary. Ware is the man who originally brought jockey Landry here and turned him over to T. J. Healey. It was said yesterday that Ware engineered the deal by which Combs received \$500 for pulling Wax Taper on June 25.

"The riding of H. Michaels during the past week was nothing if not effective enough to prove that this boy has the making of a great jockey. In two instances he met the noted Shaw in driving finishes and in each case the former triumphed. It was only by superior riding, too, that enabled Michaels' mounts to win, and that fact made his success all the more noteworthy. Shaw's weakest point is in finishing. He can only use his hands, whereas nearly every other good boy is an adept with the whip. Patsy McCue, for instance, is one of the strongest finishers before the racing public. McCue, by the way, never rode better in his life than at present. Several weeks ago the boy was a wreck. He had been living a gay life and the riding of horses became a secondary issue with him. But one day Tom Healey took McCue in hand, read him a lecture and put him on his feet with the promise of steady employment. Since then McCue has been displaying gratefulness by riding superbly.

"Compute's victory in the Foxhall Stakes was the talk of the turf world yesterday. It was generally agreed that the colt, on his work early in the spring, should not have been overlooked by the shrewd men who figure horses all the time. Compute was full of promise when he first came out for this season's campaign, but he was seized with the coughing epidemic that took such a firm hold on a lot of good horses in the spring, and was on the sick list for a long time. that when he went to the post for the Foxhall
Stakes Compute was far from well and had it
not been for the masterful riding of McCue he
would have been beaten possibly by both
Hyphen and Goldsmith. As it stands, the two-
year-old situation is about as complex as it
possibly can be.

"Though Allan-a-Dale was signally beaten on
Saturday his owner, T. C. McDowell, declared
after the race that the Halma colt could not be
purchased from him for less than \$50,000. It is
said that Mr. McDowell received an offer of
\$25,000 for the colt last week and quickly re-
fused. Mr. McDowell, by the way, says that he
has not been engaged by W. K. Vanderbilt to
train the latter's horses, but that he has entered
into a partnership with the well-known million-
aire by which he will look after the latter's in-
terests on the turf. Mr. McDowell will prob-
ably manage Mr. Vanderbilt's stable, while a
well-known trainer will do the actual work of
preparing the horses.

As the Brighton meeting draws to a close the
quality of the racing appears to improve daily.
On Saturday Starter Fitzgerald had a series of
big fields to contend with and he handled
them well. In the second race he got
eighteen horses away so neatly that the
crowd applauded. Some persons called the
start in the Foxhall Stakes poor, because
from the stand the field appeared to get
away from the barrier in two divisions. As
a matter of fact, however, the start could not
have been more perfect. Andrew Miller, one
of the stewards, was at the post, and he said

that the horses were sent away with perfect
alignment. The two-division scheme of send-
ing the horses away from the "chute" is due
to a stretch of quicksand in the middle of the
track, which the jockeys wish to avoid. As
the starting point is at an oblique angle from
the grandstand, many persons are inclined
to criticize starts as being poor when in reality
they are perfect.

MAY RACE AT CLEVELAND.

Cleveland is at last to have a glimpse of the
running horse, as a syndicate, headed by
Colonel Kidd, has secured the Valley Park
track and intends to hold at least a six weeks'
meeting, beginning the latter part of August.

Colonel Kidd thinks that Cleveland will make
an ideal place for summer racing and that the
public there will easily support a meeting of
that length. If the venture is successful, the
meeting will be continued indefinitely.

The Valley Park track was only built a few
years ago and has been used as a gentlemen's
driving park. It is situated in a suburb of
Cleveland called Newburg, and is said to be an
ideal spot.

The meeting will be run as an independent
track similar to Fort Erie and Windsor, and any
horse in good standing will be allowed to start.
Negotiations are in progress with Tom Riley,
whom the management has selected to wield
the starter's flag. Riley will leave for Cleve-
land tonight and will accept the berth if it does
not clash with the fall dates for Newport,
as he has promised to be back there, and he is
more than anxious to work again for Manager
Fowler.—Cincinnati Commercial Tribune.

A NEW RACING STABLE.

It is reported that Mr. William Kissam Vanderbilt will maintain a racing stable in this country next year. If the report proves to be a fact, it will be of no mean importance to the American turf. The more men like Mr. Vanderbilt run horses in their own colors and in their own name the better it will be for the sport of racing thoroughbreds. It is well for the turf of this or any other country that men who are able to indulge in the sport for the sport's sake should become turf patrons. Too many stables maintained solely for the profit there is in racing do not tend to improve the character of the sport.

Moreover, the more men of Mr. Vanderbilt's kind go into racing, the surer will be the guarantee of the improvement of the American thoroughbred. Once men of this stamp gather stables of horses, it usually follows that, before long, they start breeding establishments of their own. This was the case with the late August Belmont, the late Dunham Withers, and the late Pierre Lorillard, and is the case with Mr. Whitney, with that astute turfman, John E. Madden, with James K. Keene and many others. There is a satisfaction about racing and winning with horses of one's own breeding that never comes from victories won with horses raised by other men. If may be expected, therefore, that, before many years have come and gone, one of the finest breeding establishments in the United States will be owned by William K. Vanderbilt. Indeed, it looks much as if that establishment were in process of formation now. Mr. Vanderbilt recently bought Halma, one of the best of the sons of Hanover, for \$25,000, and it was said at the time of the purchase that the young stallion was to be shipped to France, where Mr. Vanderbilt already has a number of brood mares. It would not be surprising, however, if Mr. Vanderbilt had already concluded to keep Halma in this country and to bring the mares of French breeding over the ocean.

Mr. Vanderbilt will find a place already warmed and waiting for him when he makes his appearance as a racer of running horses next year. The fancy for fast horses is in the Vanderbilt blood, but William Kissam Vanderbilt is the first of his name to become a patron of the running turf. His father and his grandfather had a healthy fondness for the American trotter and the perfection to which that particular type of thoroughbred has been brought is largely due the patronage of Commodore Vanderbilt and his son, William H. Vanderbilt, and to men like Robert Bonner and Frank Work. If William K. Vanderbilt develops a running horse equal in merit to that great trotter, Mountain Boy, which Commodore Vanderbilt owned and drove, or to Small Hopes, and Lady Mac, or Aldine and Early Rose, or Maud S., horses which made the stable of his father famous, he will prove a sound and commendable chip of the old block.—New York Sun.
