RACING AT LAKE SIDE.

The almost ideal racing weather that prevailed yesterday down at the Indiana dunes, drew out the largest crowd of the week to the Lakeside track. The attractions were of the mediocre order and three of the fields were unusually large. Several surprises were sprung, among them being the victory of Little Emmy a rank outsider in the fifth race, a dash of six furlongs for two-year-olds. Betting was brisk and was somewhat heavy throughout the day. The finish in the fourth race was the closest and most exciting that has bobbed up in the local racing field for some time, the entire field of four going under the wire noses apart, only those in the judges stand being able to separate them.

The scratching of Hermencia in this race left it an open affair, although Ben Chance was first choice, being held at even money in the betting while as good as 8 to 5 could be had against Frangible. To a good start Frangible, closely attended by Ben Chance, showed the way up to the last eighth where the former drew away and appeared all over the winner in the last sixteenth but Ben Chance next to the inside rail rallied under punishment and coming strongly in the closing strides just got up in time to win by a nose on the post. Uncle Tom, which had always laid within easy call of the leader finished stonily and was only a nose back of Frangible at the end. Old Admetus, under a weak ride, came with a rush at the end and was only beaten a nostril by Uncle Tom for third money. Had Dean been able to give him the vigorous ride he requires he would certainly have won.

The first race of the day, a dash of five furlongs for two-year-olds, was taken by Pronta, against which as good as 7 to 1 could be had. Autumn Leaves was the apparent best in the race and was rightfully made a red hot favorite but she got into an early entanglement at the post, and before she got through to clear sailing she was too far back of the leader to have even a remote chance of winning. Hat Mitchell, contrary to the form shown in his last few races, darted to the front at flag fall, closely attended by Miss Hume, the two running as one horse up to the last eighth, where the latter began to tire. Here Pronta, which had always been third, came fast and true on the outside of her field and under a vigorous ride won by a short length going away from John A. Clarke, he beating Hat Mitchell a head for second place. John A. Clarke came fast next to the inside rail in the last sixteenth under a weak ride. Fade Meny was pocketed badly in the last eighth and could never get through. I. Samelson got off flying, but the weight seemed to anchor him and he gradually fell away beaten in the last quarter.

Boomerack ran back to his best form and simply made his field look cheap in the second race, a dash of six furlongs. Off in front Emma M. ran well up to him for the first quarter, after which he drew away with ease, maintaining the lead to the end and winning in a canter by five lengths. The Butcher, generously backed, ran second, a length before Woodstick. The former closed up steadily in the last quarter and, while he was the best of the others, had no chance to beat the winner. Woodstick ran by far the best race he has shown this year and is worthy of notice from now on, especially in the mud. Protect showed a clever turn of speed. Rosa Diah ran well for five furlongs. Emma M., which has not started here in some time, was right there up to the last eighth, but tired badly when put to the test.

Kentucky, well backed by a number of horse-men and sharpshooters, took the third race at

six furlongs in a big canter. Off none too well, he worked his way into the lead by the time the first quarter had been run and after that he simply ran away from his opponents, winning eased up by two and a half lengths from Siren Song, which best Red Apple one and a half for second place. Siren Song threw her jockey at the post and ran away a little over a quarter of a mile before she was caught. Taking this into consideration, her race was a good one. Red Apple was tiring rapidly in the closing strides. A strong breeze was blowing up the stretch and this may account for Star of Bethlehem's somewhat poor showing, as he is thick winded. Aaron showed early speed. Lady Contrary was right there for five furlongs and then fell back rapidly.

The big surprise of the day was the winning of Little Emmy in the fifth race, a scramble of six furlongs for two-year-olds. She was one of the extreme outsiders in the betting as good as 20 to 1 being chalked up against her at one time. Rag Tag was held at odds on at all times but the best he could do was to run fourth. Little Emmy worked her way quickly to the front soon after the barrier arose and running with great speed held a commanding lead clear up to the last sixteenth where the stiff pace she had set began to tell and she began to weaken. She had enough left, however, to stagger under the wire a neck in front of Lysbeth which best Amote a head for second place. Lysbeth came fast at the end after making up some ground in the run in. It was the best race she had shown here this year. Amote also came stonily in the closing strides and was knocking at the door by the time the wire had been reached. Rag Tag tired badly when a sixteenth out and was well spent in the last twenty yards. Pyrrho ran below his best form. He probably runs best in the mud.

Pay the Fiddler at last dropped into a soft berth, had no trouble in annexing the purse of the last race to his owner's credit. It was a dash of once around the circle. Lydia S. showed in front to the last quarter, closely followed by Frank M. and Pay the Fiddler. Coburn on the latter did not call upon him until nearing the last eighth. When he did the gelding came away without much trouble winning by a length. Frank M. finished second eight before Jim Winn. Lydia S. showed speed, but quit when the pinch came. The others were simply excess baggage and might just as well have remained in their stalls.

It was reported yesterday that Sam Hildreth's recent \$10,000 purchase, McChesney, had pulled up lame after an exercise gallop. It was said, however, that it was because of a slight bruise and no serious injury is feared.

Robert Waddell has been taking moderate exercise recently, which would lead to an inference that the American Derby winner may sport silk at Bennings.

CONY ISLAND J. C. STAKES.

In the advertising department of this issue of DAILY RACING FORM will be found the conditions of a series of important stakes offered by the Coney Island Jockey Club, entries to which will close at midnight of Monday, November 18. This division comprises the richest prizes of the coast turf campaign, notably the Burns Handicap, the Thornton Stakes, the California Derby, the California Oaks, the Waterhouse Handicap and the Gebhard Handicap. They cater to all ages and classes of thoroughbred and owners who intend taking part in the racing at Oakland, Ingleside and Tanforan during the season of 1921-2 will be simply foolish if they neglect to enter their horses liberally in these attractive events. Entry blanks are ready at this office for all who may require them. The list of stakes to close Monday is as follows:

The Burns Handicap, 3-year-olds and upward, \$10,000 guaranteed; 1 1-4 miles.

The Thornton Stakes, 3-year-olds and upward, \$3,000 guaranteed; 4 miles.

The California Derby, 3-year-olds, \$3,000 guaranteed; 1 1-4 miles.

The California Oaks, 3-year-old fillies, \$2,500 guaranteed; 1 1-8 miles.

The Waterhouse Handicap, 3-year-olds and upward, \$2,500 guaranteed; 2 miles.

The Palace Hotel Handicap, 3-year-olds and upward, \$2,000 guaranteed; 1 1-8 miles.

The Bell Stakes, 2-year-olds, \$2,000 guaranteed; 5-8 mile.

The Pacific-Union Handicap, 3-year-olds, \$2,000 guaranteed; 1 1-16 miles.

PREPARING AT NEW ORLEANS.

There is considerable activity at the race track at present. The work of getting the barns into shape for the arrival of the racing stock has just been completed, and now a big force of men are at work painting the grandstand and the betting ring. As yet only a few youngsters purchased by Colonel Bud Renaud in the east are quartered on the race course, but today these youngsters will be joined by the Griffin string, consisting of some twelve or fourteen horses. Griffin, a week ago, engaged stable room for a dozen, and yesterday notified Secretary Clark that he was on his way south, and would arrive from Chicago this morning. He will find that the quarters are in perfect condition to receive him, for the stalls were bedded yesterday and put in excellent shape, says the Picayune of Thursday.

"The first big shipment is looked for on or about the 17th of November. The Harry White special train will leave Chicago on the 14th or 15th, immediately after the Lakeside meeting, and in this special will be nearly all of the good horses quartered in Chicago.

"The prospects for books on the opening day seem much brighter than ever before. It is expected that the opening day will find from fifteen to twenty bookmakers on the block. Cartwright will have a representative on hand, and Mr. Frank will represent Mahoney McCloud. Barney Schreiber will have a book in the row.

"George Rose is also reported to have made arrangements for quarters here for the winter. Several of the bookmakers, who have been accustomed to visiting California every season, have arranged their plans to spend the cold months in New Orleans.

"Last season California secured nearly all the good jockeys and a great many of the good horses. By making the stakes added money in place of a guarantee the local racetrack seems to have cut in on the San Francisco arrivals very strongly. It has been the strongest move the Crescent City Jockey Club has ever made.

"In the way of jockeys, the local course also seems decidedly well off this year. It has been stated positively that James Winkfield will ride here this year, and Blake, the colored jockey, who came originally from this city, will be down. He is riding now at 100 pounds; Bas-

inger, another colored boy from here, who has done good service in the west, will also be on hand.

"Tommy Knight will be another of the jockeys seen on the local course during the winter. Knight last season went to the west, but he comes south this year, with the greater part of the turf following.

"Every indication at present leads the management to believe that they will have more horses than they can accommodate. The stakes also seem to be filling up more rapidly than usual, with a much better class of horses than last season."
