GOLDEN RULE'S GOOD RACE.

A crowd much larger than that on the opening day was present at Lakeside yesterday and witnessed a good day's sport. The track from the center to the outside rail had dried considerably, but was still somewhat soft and slushy toward the inside rail and the conditions favored horses that run best in the mud, so they had the call in the betting in each race.

Much disappointment was expressed at the non-appearance of McChesney, which Durnell & Herz decided to scratch at the last moment. He was entered in the fourth race, a dash of one and one-eighth miles for three-year-olds and upward. Durnell & Herz, however, had two other entries in this race—Rolling Boer and Scotch Plaid—which were coupled in the betting and held at odds on. Even at these figures the entry was the medium of heavy backing and rewarded the confidence placed in it by running one two. Rolling Boer, closely pressed by Scotch Plaid, showed the way to the head of the stretch, where the former assumed an easy command at call and won as his rider pleased by three lengths, Scotch Plaid beating Jordan one for second place. The last named tired perceptibly when the pinch came. Colonel Ballantyne ran well for seven furlongs, but was well spent when entering the last quarter. Little Elkin ran a dull race and was never a serious factor. He can do much better and the race should be thrown out of future calculations.

Jack Demund was thought to be the best in the fifth race, an owners' handicap purse of \$500 for three-year-olds and upward, and was made an even money choice, but the best he could do was to run second to The Lady. He led by a safe margin for six furlongs and appeared the winner after straightening for home, but in the last eighth run, The Lady easily wore him down, winning as her rider pleased by two lengths. Jack Demund finished four lengths before Lady Strathmore for second place. The former tired so fast in the last sixteenth that he swerved toward the inside rail. Lady Strathmore was well spent when a furlong from home. She was probably a little short and the race should do her much good. Automaton ran well for six and a half furlongs and then retired. Prince of Africa might just as well have remained in his stall for all the figure he cut in the race.

The first race, a dash of six furlongs for three-year-olds and upward, was taken by Bummer, well backed by a wise few. Braw Lad, closely attended by Mattie Spencer, showed the way to the head of the stretch where there was a closing up of five of the field. In the last eighth Bummer steadily drew away, winning well in hand by two lengths from Evelyn Byrd, which beat If You Dare one for second place. Evelyn Byrd finished resolutely and was much the best of the others. If You Dare was under a keen drive all through the last furlong, tiring perceptibly in the closing strides. Braw Lad retired when a furlong out and has undoubtedly seen his best days. Graden was never in the hunt and ran far below expectations.

The second race, a four and a half furlongs scramble for two-year-olds, was won by the heavily backed Gregor K. Agnes Mack, displaying keen speed, led to the last eighth where Gregor K. easily wore her down, winning by one and a half lengths. There was a sharp struggle for second place all through the last sixteenth between Agnes Mack and Prince of Endurance, but the former reached the wire first by a neck. Belle Graham as usual showed some early speed. The others were never serious contenders at any stage.

Golden Rule is certainly a sprinter of high class, judging from his impressive victory in the third race, a dash of five furlongs for all ages. He was held at 1 to 2 in the betting, but even at those odds was the best backed horse in the race. As soon as the barrier went up he at once assumed command, closely pursued by Little Jack Horner for the first

eighth, but after that steadily drew away and won with ridiculous ease, finishing six lengths before Eva's Darling, which beat Scorpio a half for second place. Eva's Darling was a rank outsider in the betting, but ran a good race, finishing stoutly and easily outstaying Scorpio in the last sixteenth struggle for second place. The latter showed speed, but tired palpably in the closing strides. Fairbury began slowly and appeared to have little chance when turning for home, but made up ground fast in the final quarter and finished with a rush. Little Jack Horner showed his usual turn of speed, but sustained it only for four furlongs.

The last race of the day, a dash of one mile and seventy yards for three-year-olds and upward, proved to be an easy thing for Marcos. O'Hagen, on account of his light impost, was well backed by the talent at 3 to 1, but the best he could do under a good ride by Robbins was to run second. Harney, showing much speed, led for the first six furlongs, where O'Hagen, closely pressed by Mac Gyle, took command. When the field had become well straightened for home, however, Battiste brought up Marcos with a rush and he easily passed into the lead, winning by two lengths from O'Hagen, which beat Harney one length for second place. Harney tired fast when the pinch came. Henry of Trastamare ran a good race and is about due to win. Do Madge was never a serious contender. Mac Gyle appeared to have a chance when turning for home, but fell away beaten about the last eighth post.

WON ON NEW YORK TRACKS

This year the New York racing field, Buffalo not counted, was productive of the imperial total of \$1,798,975 to the owners who raced their horses over the various tracks in the state. The racing organizations that were factors in making up this great aggregate were these:

The Buffalo meeting was under the jurisdiction of The Jockey Club and might be fitly included in this table, but only those tracks within the scope of the metropolitan district are treated here. The total at Buffalo was \$75,910, which, if included, would bring the total racing return for the State of New York up to \$1,874,885 and would materially increase the earnings of several stables, Green B. Morris, for instance, having won \$10,345 at Buffalo. McLewee & Co., owing to the great performances of Major Daingerfield and Gold Heels lead in money won, but many other owners show enviable returns from the speed of their horses. CRESCENT CITY STAKES.

Owners are reminded that the date for closing entries to the big list of stakes offered by the Crescent City Jockey Club is near at hand. Every indication points to a winter meeting at New Orleans that will exceed in interest and prosperity even that of 1901-2, and that is saying a great deal. The sweeping increase of the purses to a minimum value of \$100 is a factor that serves to attract more owners and horses than have heretofore contributed to the success of the Crescent City meetings.

One of the principal features is the Inaugural Handicap for all ages, \$1,250 added, six furlongs, only \$5 to accompany the nomination. Then comes the Magnolia Selling Stakes, \$1,000 added, at a mile, all ages. The Palmetto Sweepstakes, two-year-olds, six furlongs, \$1,000 added. The Preliminary Derby Handicap Sweepstakes, two-year-olds, six furlongs, \$1,500 added. The Crescent City Handicap Sweepstakes, a mile and a quarter, \$1,500 added, all ages. The Xmas Handicap, \$1,000 added, all ages, a mile, and the New Orleans Handicap Sweepstakes, four-year-olds and upward, seven furlongs, \$1,000 added, closes out the year.

Opening 1903 with the New Year's Handicap Sweepstakes, three-year-olds, a mile and seventy yards, \$1,000 added, there follows the Audubon Handicap Sweepstakes, three-year-olds and upward, at a mile and a sixteenth, \$1,000 added. The Jackson Handicap Sweepstakes is a mile and a half, three-year-olds and upward, \$1,000 added. The Gently Handicap Sweepstakes, three-year-olds and upward, six and a half furlongs, \$1,000 added. The Live Oak Handicap Sweepstakes, seven furlongs, three-year-olds and upward, \$1,000 added. The Cotton Selling Sweepstakes at one mile, three-year-olds and upward, \$1,000 added. The Merchants Handicap Sweepstakes, at one mile and a sixteenth, three-year-olds and upward, \$1,500 added. The Club House Handicap Sweepstakes, three-year-olds and upward, \$1,000 added. The De Soto Handicap Sweepstakes, three-year-olds and upward, six furlongs, \$1,000 added. The George Washington Handicap Sweepstakes, \$1,000 added, a mile and a sixteenth, all ages. The Speed Handicap, six furlongs, three-year-olds and upward, \$1,000 added. The Oakland Handicap Sweepstakes, a mile and a quarter, \$1,000 added. The Bush Cup Handicap Sweepstakes, \$1,500 added, and a piece of plate valued at \$300, over two miles and a quarter, and the Crescent City Derby, a mile and an eighth, \$2,500 added, three-year-olds. The Derby will be the first three-year-old stake of importance of 1903 east of the Rocky Mountains and as such will fitly close the big hundred days' meeting.

As a local contribution to the meeting Harry White, the assistant secretary of the Crescent City Jockey Club, and who is looking after the stake entries at this point, has made arrangements to ship the following horses to New Orleans at the close of the Roby meeting.

LOCAL TURF GOSSIP.

Announcement was made yesterday that the losses sustained the past week at Roby by O'Leary and Weller have been the severest in the history of

the Lakeside Jockey Club. There are more heavy bettors in attendance at the Indiana track this season than ever before and the amount of business done under the syndicate system is large. One thousand dollar bets are as numerous this year as \$100 wagers used to be, and frequently are larger amounts offered by individuals.

Starter Dwyer received a telegram yesterday from C. S. Bush, president and general manager of the Crescent City Jockey Club, announcing that word had been received from starter Fitzgerald that he would positively be in New Orleans and dispatch the horses from the post on the opening day. Mr. Bush adds that this dispenses with the necessity of Mr. Dwyer's coming to New Orleans and thanks him for his offer to serve during Mr. Fitzgerald's supposed incapacity.

Le Roy Bros. will send Lough Derg tomorrow to their home in Winnipeg, Canada, where he will be turned out for the winter.

Jockey T. Burns sent word to a friend yesterday that he would arrive in Chicago Monday and remain here a short time before journeying on to California, where he will spend the winter.

J. O. Keene received word from Carl Mitchell, the American jockey who met with much success the past year in Russia, that he would arrive in New York November 11 and would repair at once to Washington, where the rider intends to accept mounts at the Benning's meeting. The jockey, before leaving Russia, signed a contract to ride next year for General Lazereff, a wealthy Russian, at a salary of \$12,000.

C. E. Broesman will ship his horses, including Hoodwick, at the close of the Lakeside meeting to Columbus, Ohio, where they will be quartered during the winter.

Marcos, the winner of the last race yesterday, was bid up \$200 over his entered price of \$800 and retained with an additional bid of \$5 by his owner.

T. H. Ryan has shipped all his horses to California, where they will be raced this winter.

Judge Hamilton was not quite satisfied with the ride put up by T. Walsh on If You Dare in the opening race, and sent for the jockey and questioned him closely as to the orders given him and why the horse was deficient in speed in the early stages. Later the judge sent for owner Fizer and questioned him as to the instructions he had given the rider. The explanations offered by owner and jockey must have been satisfactory to the judge as no action was taken.
