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NEW ORLEANS WEIGHTS.

NEW ORLEANS, LA., Dec. 24.—Secretary Clark, the official handicapper of the Crescent City Jockey Club, announced the weights in the New Orleans Handicap, which will be run Saturday next. Seventy-four nominations were made to this stake. Some of the speediest horses at the track are entered and it should furnish one of the best contests of the meeting. The distance is seven furlongs. GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

J. J. Marklein, who brought out Garry Hermann, Malvolio, Tom Cogan, Dr. Walker and many other good youngsters that cost insignificant sums, has again spent modest sums in the investment of yearlings that will face the starter first in 1903. Since Marklein severed connection with L. V. Bell, the wealthy New Yorker, as trainer of that stable in 1899, taking with him the supposed-to-be "culis" of the stable, which proved to be The Mecca, Garry Hermann and other winners which turned out to be good colts, he has been dubbed the "lucky Dutchman," and his investments this year show no high-priced colts or fillies, but he is expected to develop winners from the following list. The most paid was \$950 and the cheapest was \$200.

J. J. Marklein's coming two-year-olds (now yearlings) are:

Another bookmaker who will race extensively the coming year, and who achieved considerable success with Hunter Raine and other horses at Chicago tracks last summer, winning in all \$1,800 at Washington Park and \$5,800 at Hawthorne, is John Fay. Fay's kindergarten of thoroughbreds comprise four colts and two fillies. They are:

Joe Ullman's colors will be seen on the turf again in 1903 for the first time since the mighty Raceland

carried them to many victories. A quintet of juveniles, all richly bred, for which fancy prices were paid at the last June sales near Sheephead Bay, are being watched by the bookmaker for good results, and thus far none of them has failed to show speed in their preliminary work. Ullman's baby racers are:

- Chestnut filly, by Handsome—Florry Myers.
- Bay filly, by Esher—Matron.
- Bay filly, by Pirate of Penzance—Mannie Hunt.
- Bay colt, by Esher—Van-a-Clar.
- Lady Walter, ch. f., by Sir Walter—Lady Lake.

The most expensive youngster bought by Ullman was the Esher colt, which was knocked down to the bookmaker for \$5,500 after a spirited contest with C. R. Ellison.

Durnell & Herz have protested the payment of first money in the Crescent City Handicap, which was won by Moor last Saturday to A. Simons. The claim is made that the entry of the horse was irregular, but it is not likely any action will be taken in the matter by the stewards. After Saturday's entries appeared on Friday it was found Major Mansir was the only one of Simon's horses entered, and the latter called the attention of the entry clerk to the fact and claimed he also had entered Moor. The horse was afterward added. The entry clerk says he did not hear Simons tell him to enter Moor. As Simons had asked permission of the stewards the previous day to work out both horses, and told them he was going to start Moor and Major Mansir in Saturday's stake, the question which the stewards will have to decide is whether or not the entries which appear are official.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

Detroit, Detroit, Mich. The winner of a selling race must be put up at auction and sold to the highest bidder. The owner is on the footing of any other bidder and must outbid the others if he wishes to keep his horse. The surplus over the entered selling price goes half to the second horse and half to the association.

D. B. M., St. Louis, and others. In hand book betting an added starter counts for nothing except as to the extent he affects the odds. In respect to the race won by Moor, the Durnell & Herz entry was the winner in such betting.

T. M., Chicago. Moor cut no figure in the case except as to the extent he affected the betting. Your wager on Major Mansir to show should be paid.

Subscriber, Detroit, Mich. The produce of an outlawed mare is eligible to registry. Outlawry is from race, but not from breeding.

W. F. A., St. Louis. A "Dutch" book is one in which the percentages do not foot up enough to give the bookmaker a profit.

Doll, Cincinnati, O. As you bet on the entry all you were entitled to was the show odds against the entry, which was 3 to 5.

Perry, Toronto. The futurity course at Ingleside is on the main track, being the last three quarters less 170 feet.

I. S., Chicago. Your wager was on Lord Melbourne and was settled by the running of the horse.

J. J. B. and Subscriber, Chicago. Whiskey King was 1 to 3 to show.

A. J. A., Chicago. In handbook betting Jessie Jarboe was second.

Subscriber, Chicago. Antonius was even money to show.

J. E. R., St. Louis. Hanover Queen was 2 to 5 to show.

Anderson, Chicago. Your bet was a loser.

GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

M. H. Tichenor, the local horseman, is about to follow in the footsteps of W. C. Whitney and other millionaire owners, according to a report from New Orleans. Mr. Tichenor is laying his plans to go into the thoroughbred breeding business. Information from a well-informed source is to the effect that the Chicagoan intends to buy a farm in Kentucky in the near future and establish a well-equipped stud upon it.

Admonition, a son of Hanover—Kelp, and a good race horse himself, will be at the head of the stud. Admonition, though on the verge of breaking down, was taken up and put in training at Memphis last spring, and he won one race at the Montgomery Park meeting. He started once after that here, and in that race broke down so badly as to necessitate his retirement. "Bishop" Poole, trainer for Tichenor & Co., says that the horse has been doing well since his retirement, but that no further attempt will be made to race him.

Mr. Tichenor already has several highly-bred broodmares, and he is in the market to buy others. As soon as he secures a farm, and he has a place in view now, he will fit up in the most modern and complete style and will retire Admonition and the mares which he already has, together with two which trainer Poole owns, to it.

P. Dunne, the well-known owner, has invested a small fortune in yearling timber, most of which are bred on the same lines of former juveniles carrying his colors. A majority of the sires of the following yearlings, which will race in Dunne's colors, are either owned by E. Corrigan or are stationed in California. The most expensive youngster Dunne purchased is the bay colt by Star Ruby—Bethulia, and the least expensive is the chestnut son of Golden Dawn—Kiss Quick. The entire collection is richly bred, and possible successors to Savable are contained in the lot. All are colts, as Dunne rarely buys or races fillies.

According to a report from the east Clifton Bonner, a little colored lightweight jockey, may be signed by Richard Croker, New York's big political boss, who races horses in England. If the boy secures the position he will have to thank no less a person than Mayor Julius Fleischmann of Cincinnati, O.

Mr. Fleischmann's attention was called to the boy, who can ride at eighty-six pounds, last spring, when he was riding at St. Louis, and he opened a correspondence with Mr. Simon Bloom, of Pine Bluff, Ark., who is the boy's guardian and master, with a view of engaging the midjet. It happened that Mr. Fleischmann spoke to Mr. William Fleischmann, the manager of the Fleischmann stable, about the boy. He, in turn, mentioned him to Mr. Croker, who was looking for a lightweight jockey, with the result that Mr. Croker wrote Mr. Julius Fleischmann about Bonner. Simon Bloom has sent his terms to Croker, and it is very likely that Bonner will be signed by the New Yorker. Bonner is now at New Orleans, but he is not the Bonner who rode for Charles McCafferty at Latonia.

Clifton Bonner, the colored midjet jockey, was engaged to ride for Fizer & Co. of St. Louis. When this fact was announced two horse owners in Little Rock, whence Bonner came, set up a claim to the boy's services, stating that his mother had signed a contract by which it was stipulated her son should ride for them. Fizer fought this claim in the courts and it was near the end of the meeting at St. Louis before the matter was adjusted, Fizer being awarded the boy. He then sported Fizer's colors in several races at the Fair Grounds, but did not show surpassing excellence.

Burns is not a boy of great judgment, but he is wideawake, strong and energetic. He gets away from the post well and rides a strong finish. When everything is said and done it must be admitted that few boys wear better. He has been prominent half a dozen years or more now and always has been reckoned as a skillful boy. Three or four years ago he came east with a great blare of trumpets. He was the kingpin of the west at that time, but, like many another westerner, he failed to shine here and met with everything but success. In the last two seasons, however, his work has been of a high order, seldom absolutely brilliant, but always good. No better ever stays off a horse because

Burns is on him, although for a variety of reasons nearly every other jockey riding is shunned at one time or another. With Burns, however, they know that they stand an excellent chance of getting away—a strong point in machine made starts—and they are sure of a hustling ride. Despite his perversness at the post he has enjoyed the favor of such prominent turfmen as August Belmont and W. C. Whitney. It is believed, however, that Tommy no longer will be a thorn in the side of the starter. No matter how dense he may be, he surely cannot have failed to learn the lesson which the stewards of the Jockey Club taught when at the fall meeting at Gravesend they suspended him and Bullman indefinitely. Being under contract to Mr. Whitney, Burns may have had an idea that he was immune from severe punishment, but he knows better now, and unless he is more kinds of a fool than even his enemies could believe him to be, he must govern himself accordingly. The California record would seem to show that he is a more apt pupil than Bullman, for while Bullman has been in trouble with the Ingleside starter several times he has gone on his way smoothly and successfully, avoiding trouble with the starter and enhancing his reputation as a jockey.—Evening Sun.

Clarence McDowell, presiding steward of the Crescent City Jockey Club, said recently that the rumor to the effect that Rice had been advised to quit riding at the meeting was incorrect. He admitted that the boy had been riding in bad form, but said the stewards had no desire to see him stop. It was rather their desire to encourage him, in the hope that he would display improved form in the near future.

"The boy is somewhat rattled," said Mr. McDowell, "particularly of the extraordinary success which his junior, Gannon, has been achieving, but he is honest and capable and will, no doubt, very soon get out of the streak of bad luck that seems to have been following him."
