FOUR MEN ARE RULED OFF.

SAM MOST AND CHRIS MARTIN TRY TO BRIBE JOCKEY SMITH.

W. H. Rudolph and Gerald Evans Are Named As the Men Who Fleeced the Mississippi Banker Out of \$12,000.

New Orleans, La., February 7.—Four men were ruled off the turf by Judges Trevelyan and Murphy at City Park this afternoon. They were Sam Most, of Kansas City, Chris Martin, of New York, W. H. Rudolph, of Detroit and Gerald Evans, of Los Angeles. Most and Martin were expelled for attempting to bribe jockey B. Smith to pull horses. Rudolph and Evans came under the ban for fleecing the banker, the story of which was told in Daily Racing Form this morning.

The gist of the testimony in the case of Most and Martin was that one evening recently Martin approached jockey Smith as he was leaving a theater. He invited the boy into a saloon and there introduced him to Most, who was waiting at a table. Most told the boy that he had a good bankroll and would cut in at City Park with a book and lay against his mounts whenever he might send him word that he was satisfied that he could keep his mounts out of the money without exciting suspicion on the part of the officials. As a consideration Most said he would give Smith fifty per cent. of the money taken in this manner. Smith left the conspirators telling them he would think the matter over. He went straightaway to James H. McCormick, his contract employer, and told him of the proposition and asking his advice as to whether or not he should go to the judges with a statement. McCormick told the boy that he would attend to the matter. He took Smith into the betting ring the next day and had him point out Most. Then he set about investigating the character of the man, telling some of his friends of the proposal and declaring his intentions of getting the goods on them before he would go to the judges with a statement. Meanwhile Smith rode Careless for James Devlin. After the race Devlin expressed dissatisfaction with Smith's handling of the horse. One of Devlin's stable men told him that he had heard that Most had "got to" Smith. Devlin went to the judges and the investigation resulted. McCormick had gathered considerable information and this he gave to the judges. The officials expressed themselves as satisfied that Smith had not been guilty of wrong-doing.

Most was conspicuous in the betting ring at Latonia last summer and was heralded as a plunger. He did get together a lot of money, but before the season ended the bookmakers had it back and Most was next heard of as a tipster. He came here when the season opened and has been booking off and on all winter.

Martin for a while last summer trained the horses of C. T. Henshall at the eastern tracks. He has been hanging around the New Orleans tracks all winter, but has had no connection with any racing stable.

The specific charge against Rudolph and Evans was "touting and other practices derogatory to the best interests of the turf and contrary to the laws of racing." It is now said that the banker who was their victim hails from Mississippi. For sufficient reasons the name of the victim is not made public. Rudolph had been racing a stable of horses and making a book here. Evans was the cashier in Rudolph's book. He was in trouble at Ascot Park last winter. He was mixed up in the Gorman-Coston-Lynch case. It is understood that the Mississippi banker has employed detectives to locate Rudolph and Evans with a view to prosecuting them on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

BLAGRAVE PICKS LALLY FOR THE DERBY.

New York, February 7.—Barry Blagrove, on his way from California to his home in England, is spending a day or two in New York. He was here about a year ago and went on record with the prediction that Cicero would win the Derby of 1905. Acquaintances knowing of this have asked him to name the winner of the 1906 Derby. "Lally," says he, "looks as much a certainty for the next Derby as did Cicero for the last one. For the Grand National Steeplechase I like Ranunculus, which finished fourth last year and next to him my fancy is for Phil May."

HANDSPRING GOES TO MILLSTREAM STUD.

Lexington, Ky., February 7.—Trainer Tom Welsh of the Ormondale Stable is here to superintend the shipment of the stallion Handspring from Beaumont Farm to F. C. Bishop's Millstream Stud, Mount Kisco, N. Y. Handspring is the property of Messrs. F. C. Bishop and Andrew Miller and is to take the place of the dead Blackstock in the stud.

HUNDLEY SELLS MONITA FARM.

Lexington, Ky., February 7.—A. E. Hundley has sold his Monita stud farm near Danville and will dispose of some of his broodmares. He will retain a few mares and the stallion Ruskin for the foundation of another stud.

WILLIAM GERST'S STABLE AT NASHVILLE.

Brewer-Turfin Has Thirty-one Horses Under Care of Trainer McDaniel at Cumberland Park.

Nashville, Tenn., February 7.—Since the victories of Karama, Colloquy and La Vernita at New Orleans, trainers at Cumberland Park have been sticking a few more feathers into the cap of William McDaniel. The "Derby trainer" still has his good eye for likely racing prospects, hence the congratulations. It was upon his recommendation that Mr. Gerst bought Karama from Milton Young last July. He fancied the youngster because he so much resembled the Macduffs and told Mr. Gerst that taking the colt at \$400, the breeder's price, was almost like finding him. Colloquy and La Vernita McDaniel never saw until two or three months after Mr. Gerst had bought them, the brewer-turfin having made the purchase after McDaniel had told him that he liked their pedigrees. Late in the fall George Holle, who is Mr. Gerst's son-in-law, expressed a desire for some of the two-year-olds in his pater's string. Mr. Gerst told him to pick out what he wanted and he would fix the prices on them. Karama he got for \$550, which was an advance of \$150 on the original purchase. These youngsters were then turned over to George Ham, the former jockey, who has been connected with the establishments of Messrs. Gerst and Holle for three or four years. That he has made good with them thus far goes without saying.

William McDaniel has a string of thirty-one horses in Mr. Gerst's new barn at Cumberland Park. There are seventeen two-year-olds, eleven three-year-olds, two four-year-olds and one five-year-old. These horses are all in good health and have been moving along satisfactorily in their work. Following is the list:

Minot is a half brother to Louis Wagner and Arby Van. Vine Hill is a full brother to Langford James. Rider Haggard is a full brother to Sef Smile. Cormorta is a half brother to Albert F. Dewey. Weigand is a half brother to Pirilla. Lady Saylor is a full sister to Columbia Girl. Skimmer is a half sister to Wee Girl and Farmer Jim. Poster Girl is a full sister to Kolnoff.

Zal, Press Agent, Yowric, Minot, Weigand, Poster Girl, Dormonde, Paxton and Attention were purchased privately from Milton Young last July. Rider Haggard, Lady Saylor and Aloise were bought privately from Walter O. Parmer. Vine Hill, Cormorta and Skimmer came out of the auction sale in the Cincinnati Stock Yards last October. King Esta and Kaiserhoff were bred by Mr. Gerst. Branca never looked better in his life and has wintered healthily. Lady Savoy looks good and, though it has been reported in some papers that she was fired, she has never been touched with the firing iron. It is the intention of Mr. Gerst to ship a portion of his stable to New York. He has made several entries to stakes at Coney Island and Brighton Beach tracks. Branca and Lady Savoy are in the Brighton Handicap, Invincible Handicap, Islip Handicap, the Brighton Cup and the Cup Preliminary; Branca is in the Nautilus Stakes and Lady Savoy is in the Test Handicap. Press Agent and Yowric are in the Montauk Stakes; Press Agent, Yowric and Zal are in the Winged Foot; Zal is in the Atlantic, and Lady Saylor is in the Distaff at Brighton Beach. At Sheephead Bay Press Agent and Yowric are in the Zephyr; Yowric and Zal in the Spring and Lady Saylor in the Vernal.

Jimmy McLaughlin has sold Sun Fire to James Sinnott. The horse is now at the old Guttenberg track being prepared for the Bennings meeting.

THEY SPEAK, BUT THERE IS A "COOLNESS."

Manager Brooks Explains Rumors About Ascot—Says Judge Hamilton Asked Him to Leave the Stand.

Los Angeles, Cal., February 7.—Ever since Dick Williams took his stable to San Francisco there have been whispers that his sudden departure caused trouble between Judge Hamilton and Manager Brooks. These stories were helped out by the report that the two officials were not on speaking terms. Statements covering the matter were made by both officials and published this morning. This is what Manager Brooks has to say about the rumors of trouble:

"It is true that for over a week I did not go into the judges' stand at Ascot Park, but it is not true that the Dick Williams affair had anything to do with it. Along about January 22 I was in the judges' stand with some other gentlemen. Judge Hamilton called an owner into the stand and turning to us he said: 'Please let us have the stand, gentlemen.'"

"I walked out and today was the first day I have been in the stand since that happened. I do not know how the Williams affair came to be tangled up with this. Now, as to Williams' leaving Ascot Park for the north, it will be remembered that his boy, Walsh, had been set down two times. On January 24 Jockey Wiley, who had the mount on Hector, interfered with Big Ben and after investigation Wiley was suspended indefinitely. This angered Williams and was the cause of his leaving Ascot. I am the manager of the track and Judge Hamilton is the presiding judge. I have never attempted to hamper his action in any way, nor do I intend to do so, and he in his turn accords the same treatment. The rumor that we are not on speaking terms is not true, for I was in the stand today to see him about some matters. That is all there is to it so far as I am concerned."

Judge Hamilton's statement was along the same line.

THE SUN'S VIEW OF ASCOT TROUBLES.

Much unfavorable criticism of the racing at Los Angeles has been heard of late. The track is owned by George Rose, the millionaire bookmaker, who is the ruling spirit in the betting ring. It is said that many queer looking events have been allowed to pass without an investigation and that the track as a result has become unpopular. When bookmakers own stock in race tracks, conduct stables, have jockeys under contract and also lay the prices there is little wonder that the public grows wary. This was the direct cause of the downfall of the Guttenberg track and because of such practices the Jockey Club of late has adopted a policy tended to keep the bookmaker in his place.—New York Sun.

REDFERN TO RIDE AT OAKLAWN.

New York, February 7.—Jockey Arthur Redfern is making preparations to leave here next week for Hot Springs, where he will ride during the entire meeting at Oaklawn. Redfern now weighs 115 pounds stripped, but says he will be able to make 110 at the Springs. He will ride at the New York tracks during the summer and believes that he will be able to make 111 pounds throughout the season.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

There were so many accidents during the early part of the steeplechase meeting at Nice, France, that the management lowered the jumps and coated the upper portion of the obstacles with white paint. After this fewer horses fell.

The vacancy in the Board of Stewards of the Jockey Club of England, which occurred with the death of Sir James Miller, will, it is said, be filled by the election of Lord Stanley, who is the youngest member of the governing body.

It is said in San Francisco that the winnings of "Boots" Durnell on the races at the California tracks this winter will aggregate nearly one-quarter of a million dollars. It is claimed that the greater portion of this money has been taken out of handbooks and poolrooms.

Paris is to have a new race course. It is to be a magnificent place and will be known as Le Tremblay. It is to take the place of the track at Colombes and will have seven days of racing during September and October. There will be no steeplechasing at the new course.

The racing partnership between Colonel Robert Neville, of Virginia, and Charles Pizer, of New York, has been dissolved. Mr. Pizer will devote his attention to steeplechasers, while Colonel Neville will continue as a breeder, selling off the young horses he had put into the firm's stable.

Before the meeting at Ascot Park is over there will be put on a race for gentlemen riders, amateurs. Several members of the press will accept mounts, with one or two others. The race will be framed for amateur riders strictly and it will be made one of the events of the season.—Los Angeles News.

RADTKE TAKES A TUMBLE.

LADY FREE KNIGHT SLIPS AND FALLS WITH THE JOCKEY UNDER HER.

Two Horses Jump Over Prostrate Mare and the Boy Escapes Injury—Most Disagreeable Day of New Orleans Season.

New Orleans, La., February 7.—The worst weather of the season prevailed here today. A cold, drizzling rain fell all day. Both tracks were sloppy, although the footing underneath was firm. The attendance was a mere handful at each course and the betting was correspondingly light.

In the closing race at the old track there was an accident which gave the spectators a scare. Just as the leaders were entering the last sixteenth, Lady Free Knight, in a prominent position and gaining fast under Radtke's urging, slipped and went down. Radtke fell under her and on arising was in danger of being struck by Athena and Brookston, which were directly behind. Luckily for the rider, both horses jumped over the prostrate mare. Radtke escaped with a severe shaking up and a cut on the head. Lady Free Knight had her right eye knocked out. It is supposed that she was struck by Athena when she attempted to rise for the first time.

Third Alarm and Footlights Favorite were the only successful favorites during the afternoon. The victory of the latter was costly to her owner, as she was bid up \$600 over her entered price of \$700 by S. Louis. She was retained with an advance bid of five dollars.

The probabilities are that Major Daingerfield will be given a long retirement and in the opinion of a number of horsemen it is a question if he will ever be shaped up again for another race. He pulled up almost on the verge of breaking down and was with difficulty led off the track after the finish of the fourth race.

Judge Himes was given a workout of a mile between races, negotiating the distance easily in 1:52. It was a bad day for favorites at City Park. The only pronounced choice to win was Bertha E. in the closing race. Tichimingo was heavily backed by his stable and won the fifth race after being hard ridden to stall of the challenge of Airship. This race proved to be the best contest of the day.

SIR WILFRED IS INJURED IN SHIPMENT.

Tom McGrath Is Ailing—Barney Schreiber Wins \$10,000 Over Bannock Belle's Victory.

San Francisco, Cal., February 7.—First-class racing obtained at Oakland today, notwithstanding the defeat of five favorites. Only a solitary public choice in Bonar rewarded his backers. The card promised splendid sport and a big crowd was on hand. General regret was expressed over the withdrawal of Sir Wilfred and Tom McGrath from the five and a half furlongs sprint. The Durnell crack was slightly injured while being loaded on the car at Los Angeles for shipment to Oakland and the Woodlands youngster is on the ailing list.

Barney Schreiber won one of the biggest bets of his career, said to have been \$10,000, over the victory of Bannock Belle, a filly of his own breeding. The diminutive Balgowan four-year-old annexed the Kantaka Handicap of \$1,000 at a mile in a big field of good ones.

Z. Abrams claimed Supreme Court out of the third race for \$1,025.

Dr. J. Grant Lyman has announced the immediate sale of his horses in training and will leave for New York tomorrow night.

WOODFORD CLAY GOES TO CALIFORNIA.

Woodford Clay, the Kentucky turfman, passed through Chicago yesterday en route to California. "It is merely a pleasure trip," said he. "I am going to San Francisco to see a bit of the racing at Oakland and will then stop at Los Angeles and take the southern route back to Kentucky, spending a day or two at New Orleans and Hot Springs. I will get back home the latter part of March. My horses are all in good shape. They have wintered well."

CICELY A WINNER IN ENGLAND.

When Cicely, a three-year-old filly by Tartar—Faughein, recently won at one of the western tracks it was generally believed that she had never started before. The books quoted 15 to 1 against her and when she won the coup is said to have netted all of \$40,000 for her backers. Later it was discovered that Cicely had won a selling race in England by a sixteenth of a mile. She was bought out of this race and shipped to Canada, but, though she was kept constantly in training, she was not started until the trick was ready. She is owned by the Kirkfield Stable, well known in the east, which also put Wire In over the plate recently for another heavy winning.—New York Sun.

CAPTAIN CLAY DIES ON A TRAIN.

Lexington, Ky., February 7.—Captain James B. Clay, one of Kentucky's noted turfmen, breeder of Major Daingerfield, Lady Schorr, etc., died on a train near Baltimore this morning. He was on his way from Lexington to New York to sell a thoroughbred colt.
