## MISSOURI LAD BY A NOSE.

### COOK'S COLT WINS THE FAIR GROUNDS' FEATURE FROM THE ENGLISHMAN.

**Besterling, the Favorite, Is Unplaced—Whisk Broom Is Defeated—Jockey Lloyd Is Suspended—Trotter's Charges.**

New Orleans, La., February 2.—The New St. Charles Hotel Handicap, having a net value of \$2,130 to the winner, the feature race at the Fair Grounds this afternoon, was won by Fred Cook's Missouri Lad, which defeated the Englishman by a narrow margin in the very last stride. The improvement shown by these two horses was sudden and both were practically neglected in the betting. As a contest the race proved all that was expected. There was a general shifting of positions during the mile and a quarter trip and at one stage or another all but Marvin Neal and Don't Ask Me seemed to have some kind of a chance. After Dromio got through setting the pace for the first six furlongs, St. Valentine moved up and took the lead and on the turn out of the backstretch showed in front a couple of lengths. The Englishman, which had been running in a contending position, then made his effort. Entering the homestretch he caught and passed St. Valentine. He had a commanding lead at the furlong post, but began to tire and Missouri Lad, coming fast, gradually wore him down. Besterling, the favorite, hard ridden all the way, was unable to improve his position.

After the Englishman's reversal of form the stewards suspended jockey Lloyd, who rode the horse on Friday, pending an investigation. Ed Trotter, owner of The Englishman, entered a complaint with the stewards that Alphonse Fontlieu, the bookmaker, had made insinuations to the effect that he was responsible for the bad race run by The Englishman yesterday. Trotter asserts that Fontlieu laid against his horse to show on that occasion, while he wagered heavily on him today. Evidently Trotter made some sort of an accusation against Lloyd.

The investigation of the Jack Martin ride on Orly still hangs fire and goes over until next week. Martin, it is announced, has decided to ride only occasionally for the remainder of the winter—just to keep him in condition, he says.

The result of the two-year-old race also proved a surprise, Whisk Broom, the 1 to 2 favorite, being beaten by both Montbert and Rubywick. After the withdrawal of E. M. Fry the race appeared little better than a walkover for Whisk Broom. When it came to the running, however, she was not there and was unable to get away from Montbert, which drew away in the final quarter, winning easily.

The racing at the Fair Grounds today marked the end of the third period of the Crescent City Jockey Club's meeting. The third period of the season at City Park will begin Monday. The Fair Grounds officials have all gone to Hot Springs for the first two weeks of the meeting which is to open Monday.

Two car loads of horses left for Hot Springs tonight. Among them were the stables of Kay Spence, T. E. Crist, F. W. Gehring, Phil King, J. Himy, A. Jones and W. Ham.

### ABSURD ATTEMPTS AT "REFORM."

"A provision in the Gambling Bill before the Legislative Council of Victoria, Australia, which aimed at prohibiting newspapers from publishing the betting on races, has been struck out of the bill," says the London Sporting Life.

A similar amendment to the present law forbidding betting on races in the state of Missouri, was introduced to the Legislature at Jefferson City last month, and just now there is in the hands of the Judiciary Committee of the City Council an ordinance intended to make such publications unlawful in Chicago.

That such measures are unconstitutional is hardly to be questioned. In fact the legal department of the city of Chicago has so advised the local legislative body. The ordinance, it is expected, will come up for discussion in the Council tomorrow night.

The Missouri Legislature has given no serious attention to the matter. It has not been heard of since it was introduced. If it has gone into the hands of a sensible committee, it is not likely to come out again.

## EUDORA WINS THE CALIFORNIA OAKS.

### Big Crowd Sees the Racing at Oakland, the Bad Weather Notwithstanding.

Oakland, Cal., February 2.—The California Oaks was won today by H. R. Schaffer's Eudora at odds of 6 to 1 over the abbreviated distance of one mile and a sixteenth. The starters numbered an even dozen and the race was the best contest of any that had been decided in the history of the stake. The three public choices, Grace G., Miss Officious and Dollie Dollars followed the winner and finished exactly in the order in which they were favored in the betting.

Despite the unfavorable weather and track conditions that prevailed during the afternoon 10,000 racegoers were attracted to the Emeryville course by the splendid card that was offered up for their delectation. In addition to the big fixture the program contained a handicap at a mile and a sixteenth, which engaged a superior lot of horses, including the crack Tony Faust. This three-year-old was unequal to the tremendous weight concession asked of him by the handicapper and met defeat. The victory of Beechwood in this race at 20 to 1 was the big upset of the day.

A half dozen fast sprinters made up the field for the race over the Futurity Course in which Mary E., after many failures, was finally successful.

Walter Miller scored one victory, two seconds and two thirds. Sandy scored three winning mounts, all at lucrative odds.

C. E. Durnell protected Laura F. M. in the third with a theatrical advance of \$400 after W. M. Cain had stopped bidding at \$800.

Thirty-four bookmakers occupied positions in the ring.

## PROMISING MOUNTS FOR JOCKEY LYNE.

### Lord Carnarvon Has Some Splendid Two-Year-Olds—Something About His Stud.

Lord Carnarvon, in whose colors it is understood that Lucien Lyne is to do some riding when he goes to "the other side" this year, has five estates in England—one in Hampshire, one in Derbyshire, one in Nottinghamshire and two in the west of England. At Highclere, in Hampshire, his breeding stud, headed by the stallions Robert le Diablo and Mauvezin, is located. The stud was formerly kept on the estate in Derbyshire, but was removed to Highclere some five years ago. It is described as one of the best appointed establishments in all of England, and it is claimed that the mares and foals at Highclere have done remarkably well. There is much chalk in the soil, affording pasturage of the kind which is regarded as having bone forming qualities. The water is drawn from a spring three hundred feet deep. It is pumped by an oil engine into a tank of 125,000 gallons capacity and then piped to the paddocks, much the same as on breeding farms in this country which have no brooks coursing through them.

Lord Carnarvon's young horses are broken at the farm in the fall of their first year and sent in January of their second year to Whatcombe to be trained. Among his two-year-olds this year are several of Mauvezin's first crop and great expectations have been formed regarding them. If Mauvezin has imparted to them the speed he had when in training, Lyne can consider himself fortunate if he is asked to ride them, for they will assuredly carry him to victory. It is said that Lord Carnarvon considers his juvenile division for 1907 the best that has ever left Highclere.

## JOCKEY BIRCH'S INJURIES.

The case of jockey Arthur Birch is attracting wide attention among the men of medicine and surgery in England. Ten weeks ago Birch was thrown at the open ditch in the steeplechase course at Gatwick. His mount fell upon him. He was taken to a room in the official quarters on the course and put to bed. He was unconscious for several hours and it was expected that he would die, but he revived consciousness and has since been confined to bed, lying in one position. His back is broken and consequently he has no use of his limbs. He has been visited by scores of physicians. Sir Victor Horsley saw him on January 15 and declared the case the worst of its kind that he had ever seen. He diagnosed it as dislocation of the vertebrae and rupture of the spinal column. He says an operation is out of the question at present and advised against an attempt to remove the injured jockey to his home for at least a month.

## MAJOR THOMAS' HORSE PORTRAITS.

Lexington, Ky., February 2.—The late Major E. G. Thomas' collection of paintings of famous horses has been shipped to New York. The Jockey Club will buy them to hang in its offices if they are found to be in good condition upon their arrival.

## JERSEY LADY WINS THE ASCOT OAKS.

### Milshora, the Favorite, Finishes Second—Good Card and Exciting Contests.

Los Angeles, Cal., February 2.—The card at Ascot Park today was one of the best of the meeting and the racing was exciting. The Ascot Oaks brought thirteen of the best fillies here to the post, the winner turning up in Jersey Lady, which lasted long enough to withstand the challenge of Milshora, the favorite. The stake was worth \$2,250 net to the winner.

The heavy losses sustained by the books yesterday was apparent in today's cut-in, only eighteen answering the roll call. The pencilers fared better, making it about upsticks on the afternoon's speculation.

The fourth race for Monday is virtually a Derby preliminary. Rodrock, the steeplechase jockey, left for Washington tonight. A party of Canadian horsemen, including Messrs. McKenzie, Elliott, Cowan and Campbell got in today and will remain a month. Ramus will be sent down from Oakland to run in the Ascot Handicap next Saturday. Varietes bowed a tendon in last Friday's race and Cadichou was badly cut down today.

## STREETT PLANS RETURN TO THE EAST

### Can Do Better There with a Few Horses Than with a Big String in the West.

New Orleans, La., February 2.—"I think I will go east next season," said "Doc" Streett a few days ago, in his slow, ruminating way. "The west is all right. I have made money out here, but in my opinion a man to be successful in western racing, where the purses and stakes are not as big as they are in the east, ought to have only a small stable of workmanlike material. He cannot afford to carry a great deal of dead timber. As I have been situated, I have been loaded up with castoffs from Mr. Keene's stable, most of them cripples, and I have had to carry along a big lot of horses, twenty to thirty of them, on the off chance that after a long period of waiting I might get two or three into winning form. That takes away a good bit of the profits when you really do get hold of a good one. For example, during the past year there has been no time when my stable has numbered less than twenty head, and from that up to thirty-one. Yet Toboggan out of all this bunch is the only winner of any consequence that I have had. I believe that a man might do better with one horse like Toboggan out east than he could do with a stable full of possibilities here. In fact I think I made a mistake that I did not go east with Big Ben, after I got him patched up and when he was at his best, as I believe that I could have won some of the sprinting handicaps with him out there."

Streett's idea of going east recalls to mind that some of his greatest turf triumphs were earned on the eastern turf. Twenty years ago he was a factor in eastern racing, usually managed to have one or more good horses in training, and it is needless to say also managed to win good races with them. Among a long list of smart performers that Streett raced in those days were Maroon and Niagara, both of which were just short of handicap form. The story of the beginning of the interest which James R. Keene has had in Streett in the last dozen years, to the extent of letting him have the culs of the western stable to race in this section, is an interesting one. It dates back to Domino's Futurity. Of all the horses that Mr. Keene ever owned, and he has owned a lot of high class ones, from Dan Sparling and Spendthrift down the line, Domino was nearest his heart. This son of Himyar and Mannie Grey was one of the fastest horses that ever raced on the American turf, and Mr. Keene, than whom there are very few better judges of thoroughbred quality, early appreciated his possibilities. In Domino's Futurity the contention was naturally expected to be between Mr. Keene's colt and Dobbins, Mr. Croker's representative, and for which the Tammany chief had paid \$20,000.

In this Futurity Streett started a little bit of a runt of a colt, Galilee, by The Bard. As is well known, the trio finished so closely together that the judges could scarcely separate them. Dobbins had the rail, Galilee was in the middle and Domino on the outside. Sims, who rode Dobbins, apparently had the race won a hundred yards out, but Galilee and Domino both closed on him with tremendous rushes. Galilee was so much smaller than the other two contenders that he was lost to view between them, and many of the spectators thought that on this account a Futurity which ought to have gone to Streett went to Keene, but of course the matter of the size of the horses in judging a finish cuts no figure and there is little doubt but the placing of the officials was correct. "Mike" Dwyer, who was in partnership with Mr. Croker at the time, and Mr. Croker, were both dissatisfied and wanted a return match, to which Mr. Keene, with the sportsmanship in racing that has always characterized him, was agreeable, but the details of the match could not be arranged satisfactorily all around and it was dropped.

That Streett with a colt considered to be little more than a selling plater should have come so near to "upsetting the beans in the platter" appealed strongly to Mr. Keene, ever ready to appreciate merit either in racehorses or knowledgeable men who handle them. He went out of his way to congratulate Streett, and from that time on has had no little confidence both in the "Doctor's" judgment of horses as well as his training ability.

If Streett does take Toboggan and one or two other fair performers east next summer, he will not be there long until racegoers will know that he is around.

It is understood that jockey Mountain has agreed to ride for C. R. Ellison when he is able to return to the saddle.

## TROUBLE AT HOT SPRINGS.

### OAKLAWN MEETING WILL OPEN MONDAY, BUT IN UNCERTAINTY.

**County Judge Sumpter Is Unrelenting—Failure to Divide Dates at the Bottom of It All.**

Hot Springs, Ark., February 2.—Everything is in readiness for racing at Oaklawn and the meeting will be opened Monday as announced, but whether it will continue for the scheduled sixty days is a subject on which a prediction had best not be ventured.

There is trouble here and lots of it. The situation in the legislature at Little Rock, which seemed most grave a week ago, is now the least of the obstacles in the path of the Hot Springs Jockey Club. The general public, which includes the business interests, is not opposed to racing or to betting. The public wants racing and betting, but many of them do not want it all at one track.

Therein lies the basis of the row. The politicians have taken a hand and, without meaning to impugn the motives, acts or orders of Judge Sumpter, there is a well founded belief that had there been a division of the dates with Essex Park the County Judge would probably not have instructed constable Smith to make preparations to suppress betting at Oaklawn Monday. It is but another illustration of the all-or-nothing policy of the boss gamblers that has killed every good game they have had; the same policy that has done more to bring racing into disfavor in certain localities than the fanatical manias, commonly designated as reformers, could have accomplished in ages.

The track is drying fast from its recent drenching and when the horses are called to the post for the opening race it will be as fast as ever. Over 800 horses are quartered at the track and vicinity and many more would have been here only for the lack of stable room. There are plenty of riders, but no top-notchers. D. Austin, Aubuchon, G. Swain, J. J. Walsh, C. Schilling, Cherry and Beauchamp are considered the best. Beauchamp, who has been riding abroad the past three seasons, got in this morning from Cincinnati. He can scale at 103 pounds and will probably be much in demand.

The most prominent stables here are those of T. P. Hayes, J. S. Hawkins, J. C. Milam, H. R. Baker, Henry McDaniel, Chinn & Forsythe, P. T. Chinn and C. E. Mahone. Many horsemen are of the impression that the two-year-olds here are the best collection ever gotten together in the west, and predict that there will be many sensational performers in the lot.

## CHARGES ARE MADE AGAINST DEVLIN.

### Gamara's Grooms Say Trainer "Doped" the Horse for a Betting Coup.

New Orleans, La., February 2.—An interesting aftermath to the reported betting coup on Gamara, when he won a race on January 25, developed today when two of the stable hands that exercised and rubbed the horse made a complaint to the stewards that Gamara had been "doped" by J. P. Devlin, his trainer, on the day he won and that the stimulant had been withheld from him in his next out on January 31.

The complaint came as the result of an alleged grievance. The two men claimed they had not been given a share of the winnings which they say was promised. Gamara is owned by local people who backed him in the Covington poolrooms the day he won. Devlin was called before the stewards and questioned regarding the alleged "doping." He entered a denial and an investigation was ordered. The complainants were under the influence of drink at the time they made their statements and for that reason they were ordered to bring in their evidence next week.

## KEEP AN EYE ON THIS ONE.

Lexington, Ky., February 2.—Out of Sight, Fred Foster's old bread winner, has had three successive foals at Marchmont Farm and John Ireland now has a two-year-old out of her in training at Oaklawn which he regards very highly. When Out of Sight quit the turf Foster sent her up in Ohio and seemingly forgot all about her, at least he let a large feed bill accumulate against her. This caused her to be offered for sale on a court judgment. James Hukill, the manager of Marchmont Farm, saw the advertisement and he went to Ohio and bought her at a bargain. The foal she was then carrying, a filly by Fabulous, sire of Ace, is now in the stud at Marchmont as a three-year-old. She showed good speed as a yearling, but she was alling as a two-year-old and so was not trained at that age. The two-year-old Ireland has out of her at Oaklawn is a filly, by the good English racehorse Carlton Grange. Out of Sight landed more than one big wager for Frank Shaw. He backed her with confidence while she was a member of Fred Foster's racing stable.

## MILLER HENDERSON'S GOOD ONE.

Lexington, Ky., February 2.—Reports from Louisville are to the effect that the two-year-old black filly, by Ogden or Planides, out of Lambert, can run rings around anything else in the stable of Miller Henderson. C. F. Grainger paid only \$350 for this filly as a yearling last summer and presented her to Mr. Henderson, his nephew. Lambert has already produced a good winner in Crowshade.
