TRANCE IN SECOND PLACE.

IS UNEXPECTEDLY DEFEATED BY FITZ HERBERT FOR THE WOODHAVEN STAKES.

Big Chief Runs a Fast Three-Quarters—Roseben Badly Outrun in His First Start of Year—Alethou in Form.

New York, April 27.—Roseben, the best sprinter of recent years, made his first appearance of the season at Aqueduct today and was badly beaten. It was a condition race at five furlongs and Roseben carried 130 pounds. He had worked well enough to warrant his winning and was favorite. His owner, D. C. Johnson, sent in a good-sized commission on the horse. Berry Maid and Red River were the best fancied of his opponents, the former having plenty of support. Roseben's preliminary was not altogether satisfactory and was reflected in his race. He broke well, but did not have the early speed of old. He had the inside position and the others bearing over forced Shaw to pull him up. At the end of the first furlong he had been taken back until he was well behind the leaders. On the turn Shaw took him to the outside, but the old fellow did not respond to urging and in the run through the long stretch never appeared to have a winning chance. Berry Maid and King Cobalt made the running throughout. The former is a game and good filly and under Musgrave's hand ride won by a head in 59½. The track record is 59. The race stamps Berry Maid as a filly of a lot of quality at sprinting distances. Red River was third and his performance was high-class in every respect.

Trance, with two baby stakes to her credit at the meeting, was a 7 to 10 favorite for the Woodhaven Stakes. She was looked upon as the best thing of the day as she had beaten virtually the same horses on the terms she was meeting them. But from an outside position she never seemed able to get to going right and Fitz Herbert led throughout to win in a canter. Fitz Herbert ran in the colors of H. R. Brandt, Barney Schreiber's trainer, who probably won him out, as the race was worth \$1,500 to the winner and the odds were 5 to 1. Trance had no trouble to beat the others, the field being badly strung out at the finish.

Colonel Jack could not take up 120 pounds and win the six furlongs handicap. He was a lukewarm favorite, with the heavy backing on Alethou, which made a runaway race of it, winning from Oxford, which ran to his best form. Big Chief and Blacksheep made a fighting finish in the first race, which was won by the former in 1:13, the best time for six furlongs made at the meeting. There was some bumping in the stretch, and Musgrave, who rode Blacksheep, claimed a foul, which was not allowed.

An accident occurred in the closing race. It will probably result in the death of James R. Keene's filly, Red Bonnet. Soon after the start there was a mix-up, Red Bonnet and Raquel both going down. Raquel was quickly on her feet and continued to race around the track after the race had ended, but Red Bonnet was so badly hurt by the fall that it was believed that she would have to be shot. Red Bonnet was not much of a racing proposition, but would have been valuable for the stud. She was by St. Simonian, out of Beckon, and undoubtedly had been reserved by Mr. Keene for breeding purposes. Neither Notter nor Flynn, the riders to fall, were seriously injured.

Enoch Wishard narrowly escaped a bad injury today. He tried to board the horse train as it left the siding at Sheephead Bay, but slipped and just missed having his leg crushed. His knee was badly bruised and although he went to Aqueduct his injury was so painful that he returned home before the first race.

Fred Forsythe lost by death the three-year-old filly, Suzanne Sue, by Oddfellow—Annie Clark. She was a maiden but considered a good filly.

A good field is expected for the Excelsior Handicap Wednesday. Brookdale Nymph, Jack Atkin, Nealon, McCarter, Rifleman, Spooner, Chapultepec and a half dozen other horses of quality have been prepared for the event. The track is in first-class condition and with favorable weather a great contest is assured.

From a cable interview with Richard Croker, the ex-Tammany chieftain has strong hopes of winning two of England's classics this season, the One Thousand Guineas and the Oaks with Rhodora, which has wintered nicely and has developed into a grand-looking three-year-old. Orby is expected to race at the Epsom meeting also.

EL CUCHILLO'S DEATH THROUGH NEGLECT.

It turns out that El Cuchillo, the jumper sent to France by Joseph E. Widener and which died while in training, was the victim of neglect. A recently received letter from France has explained that the horse picked up a nail and the injury was neglected until blood poisoning had set in. When his foot began to swell he was sent to the establishment of a veterinary and shortly afterward he died. Prompt attention to the wound, which was slight, would probably have saved the life of the good jumper.

LEADING KENTUCKY DERBY CANDIDATES.

Balbus, Sir Cleges and Milford Preferred Among the Eligibles at Present.

Louisville, Ky., April 25.—Barney Schreiber would rather win the Kentucky Derby than nearly any other fixture on the American turf, barring, possibly, the Futurity. Fate has played him a queer prank on two occasions—in 1906 and in 1907. In the year first named Schreiber had Dr. Gardner in the Derby. That spring he started in the Montgomery Handicap, at Memphis, but he was sick as the result of stomach trouble and ran a disappointing race. He was taken east where, after showing his high class, he was sold to Frank Farrell for \$15,000. The year before Dr. Gardner was eligible to run for the Derby he was entered in the Nursery Stakes at Churchill Downs, but at that time the war between the two rival turf bodies prevented Schreiber bringing the son of Bannockburn—Uarda to Louisville. Thus circumstances of an unusual character prevented Schreiber from winning that stake also.

Inability to get Jack Atkin in condition kept him out of the Derby in 1907. He had been at Hot Springs, and inclement weather kept trainer Herman Brandt from getting the son of Sain—El Salado in trim for the event which thrills all Kentuckians when it is run and gains for the victor a halo of honor and sentiment that is not attached to any other event on the American turf. At least, owners and breeders of the old commonwealth say as much.

Schreiber's dependency in 1908 is Banridge, a bay colt by Bannockburn—Park Ridge and the pacer-maker of Schreiber's Jack Atkin. If he is able to stand when the bugle calls the Kentucky Derby starters to the post on the afternoon of May 5 Banridge will be at the barrier. He will have on his back a jockey—probably Keogh—who will be sent here from Oakland especially to pilot him. W. A. Kirwan, Schreiber's representative in the south and west, has received a letter from his employer telling him that he will have a crack rider for Banridge. He intimated that it might be Keogh.

Schreiber thinks Banridge is a colt of good class. As pacer-maker for Jack Atkin he has always acquitted himself satisfactorily. On Sunday, April 5, Banridge was sent along with Jack Atkin over a seven-eighths route to get the big horse ready for the Carter Handicap. Jack stepped the distance in 1:28½ and Banridge did it in 1:28½. That afternoon Jack Atkin was placed on a train and ten days later, at Aqueduct, won the race going away. Banridge has been working well at Churchill Downs. He has completely recovered from an injury to his hoof, and it seems that he has a chance to enable his owner to realize one of the greatest ambitions of his connection with the turf.

There is no more certainty now as to the outcome of the Derby than there has been all along. Posted turfmen declare that the race is more open than it has been for years. Because of this the field will be larger than usual, with more than one man feeling that his name is to be added to the list that started the day Price McGrath's green and yellow sash and cap were carried to victory thirty-four years ago by Aristides. That was in 1875, and since then such giants as Vagrant, Baden-Baden, Day Star, Lord Murphy, Fonso, Hindoo, Leonatus, Buchanan, Joe Cotton, Ben Ali, Montrose, Spokane, Rliey, Kingman, Azra, Halma, Ben Brush, Tophoon H., Plaudit, Manuel, Lieutenant Gibson, Allan-Dale, Agile, Sir Huon and Pink Star have been crowned Derby kings in the land of the thoroughbred racer.

Two men who have sent Derby winners to the post are each confident that they will do so again. One of them—George J. Long—has owned two horses which won the prize. In 1892 he first captured it with Azra, and in 1906 Sir Huon carried the peacock blue and yellow sash first under the wire. W. H. Fizer, who trained Pink Star, the winner in 1907, has three eligibles this spring—Milford, E. T. Shipp and Al Muller, while Long has Balbus and Sir Cleges.

A week ago Sir Cleges was the acknowledged star of the Long stable, but now Balbus is displaying form that leads to the belief that he will be the one which will stagger the others with his speed. In the last seven days Balbus has been clipping off a mile in about 1:43, more than a second faster than his stable mate. Trainer Cloyne will not admit that Sir Cleges is the inferior of the pair and it is believed that he expects, when the supreme test comes, that Sir Cleges will show that he is a real racer and can run faster than in a work-out. Sir Cleges is not the sturdy-looking colt that Balbus is. Balbus is an exception among Alvecoats because he is compact, virtually chunky and in every line displays great driving power. He looks the racer all over. He is a chestnut in color. Sir Cleges, which is by Falsetto—Florika, is a bay and a flashy Jooker.

Fizer will send at least two starters to the post. Right now he thinks Milford can win, but he will let E. T. Shipp set the pace for the son of Falsetto—Florika. Milford is a greatly improved horse. Two victories at New Orleans, one of them over Lotus Eater, revealed his belated form. Since then in a trial, according to report, Milford defeated Pinkola, another of the Fizer string, in 1:41½, the distance being a mile. Turfmen who saw Milford in New Orleans vary in their estimate of him. Every other one will say Milford cannot win the Derby, but most of them agree that he will

DRUID HILL PARK STAKES TO AL BUSCH.

Shows Much Improvement Over His Washington Form and Easily Defeats Taboo.

Baltimore, Md., April 27.—The Druid Hill Park Stakes for two-year-olds and the feature of the program offered Pimlico patrons this afternoon, proved an easy victory for Al Busch, which ran coupled with M. T. Greene as the Shields entry. Al Busch was ridden by Murphy, outbroke his opponents, dashed into a commanding lead before they had gone a furlong and was never headed, leading Taboo by a length and a half after the winning mark was passed. A field of the best youngsters that has started at Pimlico in some years went to the post in this race. Taboo, on the strength of the good form she showed at Washington, found strong support, while race-goers who had seen Simcoe perform at New Orleans, picked out the Madigan colt as the probable winner. The betting on the race was divided between this pair. Taboo managed to finish second, but Simcoe's chances were not helped any by a rather ragged start and much early interference. There were five added starters, the new ones being Cuning, Indian Hunter, Golden Castle, Cheek and Hawkwing. The last two were coupled as the Garth entry.

Kemp Ridegeley, which was raced at the City Park meeting at New Orleans, showed a good performance in the steeplechase in which he made an exhibition of his opponents and won in runaway fashion. Ridegeley was ridden by E. Heider, was under restraint all the way and won in a canter from Bettie Landon. The winner covered the two-mile course in 4:20½, which meant a new track record. This colt will be shipped to Belmont Park at the close of the present meeting, where he will get his final preparation for the Grand National Steeplechase.

Favorites won three of the races, the successful choices being Servile, Kemp Ridegeley and Park View. Jockey Charley Koerner rode the winner in the first two races and finished second in the third with Ontario. In the third race Sugar Pine hung up a new track record for seven furlongs when he ran the distance in 1:27.

J. C. Nally arrived from Benning this morning with his stable.

Allan Steele has arranged to ship the three-year-old Gilvedear to Louisville next Saturday morning. Gilvedear is an eligible for the Kentucky Derby and is a sure starter in that race, provided he ships well. He was sent a mile and a quarter this morning in 2:00, which is very fast for this track. Jockey Joe Hogg has been engaged to ride the colt in the Derby.

Jockeys C. Walker and Boyling were granted licenses by the local stewards this morning.

A. G. Weston has received word from Thomas Healy that he would ship three two-year-old fillies, the property of R. T. Wilson, Jr., to Pimlico tomorrow. Weston will race these youngsters for Mr. Wilson on the second circuit.

HALTER MEN WORK ACTIVELY AT OAKLAND.

Three Winners Change Owners by the Selling Process—The Mist Wins the Feature.

Oakland, Cal., April 27.—There was the briskest kind of bidding on winners of selling races at Oakland today and what was somewhat unusual and surprising in connection therewith, the three horses concerned changed hands. Green Goods, entered for \$600 in the first, was acquired by J. Dinkelspiel on his bid of \$900. Bardonia was sold to J. E. Dunn for \$800 after a boost of \$400, and Legatee reverted to W. Hawke for \$1,800 in the mile and a quarter dash, which was just \$500 more than the Bedwell gelding was entered for.

The card for an off day was of more than average excellence, and more than 5,000 race-goers journeyed to the Emeryville course to take a chance at the half-dozen supposed to be outstanding good things it contained.

Four of the public choices materialized in Green Goods, Captain John, Legatee and Security, Walter Miller's mounts capturing just half of the program. The jockey never showed to better advantage than on Billy Cahill's recent purchase, the gigantic two-year-old Captain John, which stands over seventeen hands high, weights 1,300 pounds and runs like a stake horse.

The feature race was taken by The Mist at 5 to 1. She is easily the most consistent mare in training here. The improving Sidney F. finished second and the receding second choice, Sugarmaid, third.

Dominus Arvi, the favorite with Miller up, sustained an ignominious defeat, leaving the Los Angeles contingent, which had backed him to a man, badly bent.

The start of the last race developed a curious angle in the fast breaking and true running Booger Red being left at the post. Brannon's colt was injudiciously sent after his opponents and in a marvelous burst of speed, overhauled and beat such fast horses as Burning Bush and Salvadale, after running on the extreme outside throughout. Judge Hopper questioned the jockey and was told that the horse refused to break.

Jockeys Walsh, Sandy and McIntyre, guilty of rough riding and misbehavior at the barrier, were suspended on Saturday for six days each.

Only a portion of Keene Bros.' and Bedwell's horses were sold at auction last Saturday. Queen Whims went to Zeke Abrams for \$425; Wuerzburger to W. Walker for \$1,000; Jeremiah to W. Freeman for \$425; Monaco Maid to J. Boyd for \$300; San Gil to H. Robinson for \$600; Bannatyne to Zeke Abrams for \$100; Pelham to E. E. Hickox for \$275; Twin Heart to C. Bates for \$110. Legatee was also boosted on Saturday by W. Hawke from \$1,000 to \$1,500, but was bought in.

BETTER LEXINGTON GOING.

TRACK DRIES OUT RAPIDLY THROUGH A HIGH WIND AND RACING IS GOOD.

La Fayette Scores from Katie Powers in a Close Finish—Alice Baird Surprises Her Owner—Hostile Hyphen Defeats St. Hario.

Lexington, Ky., April 27.—The most interesting race of the first five days of the local meeting was the mile and a sixteenth selling affair that closed today's racing. The gray gelding, La Fayette, and the old Longstreet mare, Katie Powers, came over the hill about a half-length apart, and when straightened out in the stretch raced head and head to the finishing post, La Fayette winning by a nose, fortunate in having the last nod. In another stride Katie Powers was in front. Jockey Warren rode La Fayette well. The victory was a popular one, small local bettors being down seemingly to a man. The dollar book was virtually swamped. The smart money went to Doubt, but why it would be hard to tell. Pat Civill did not fancy the chances of his horse over such a track and said so.

The win of Alice Baird was a pleasant surprise to her people. Jack Baker thought she would run a good race, but he did not believe that she would beat Serenade. Her victory was due largely to J. Lee's hustling ride. No boy here is his equal when it comes to riding two-year-olds. It is the knowledge of this fact that caused the small bettors to back the filly today.

The mile race was a puzzle. Hostile Hyphen, St. Hario, Rustle, Ed Kane and Convolv each had support after the market had settled. Hostile Hyphen proved much the best.

The surprise of the day was the victory of King's Son at 20 to 1.

Romp broke the ice for T. C. McDowell at the meeting. Ida May should never have been neglected in favor of Night Mist. Figures did not Heense such speculation, even with the changed track conditions. Ben Howe, considering the fact that his pilot, Frazier, was making his debut as a jockey, ran a creditable race and will win soon. With a good rider up he would not have been worse than third.

Following the rain of last night the weather today was cold and raw. The high wind is drying out the track rapidly. Colder weather is predicted for tomorrow, however.

Three of the twelve books went off, those absent from the line being Martin Foley, C. Pangritz and John Moore. Foley says he lost \$4,000 the first four days, and Pangritz is \$3,000 loser.

Pat Dunne came over from Louisville to spend the day. He says the prospects for the meeting at Churchill Downs are bright. There is a great deal of local interest.

Cal Milan says there is some improvement in the condition of R. C. Rann today. If he gets well it will be a long time before he starts.

Edward Corrigan returned from Chicago this morning. The attendance today numbered about 1,500.

RICHARD CROKER IN A LEGAL FIGHT.

London, April 27.—The libel suit brought by Richard Croker against the English Sporting Chronicle will not be compromised, but will be fought to a finish. Mr. Croker's suit is based upon a story written by its New York correspondent, Wilf. P. Pond, which purported to trace agitation against race track gambling, in the first instance, to the former leader of Tammany Hall. Printed matter from New York papers of 1892-3, concerning Mr. Croker's rapid rise to affluence, after the famous Lexow investigation, will form the basis of the defense. This includes the first poolroom war started by the Dwyers, alleged to be backed by Tammany.

JACK ATKIN'S REMARKABLE RACE.

New York, April 27.—The remarkable feature of Jack Atkin's performance Saturday last in the Queens County Handicap was the fact that he ran down the long homestretch in the teeth of a gale that blew in from Jamaica Bay. With such a burden to carry the Sain colt never faltered for an instant, and when his time, 1:39, was hung out, the experts gasped. Though once supposed to be a hopeless cripple Jack Atkin is now a typical iron horse. Many horsemen believe that the Sain colt may prove a worthy rival of the mighty Roseben in the handicap sprints this year.

WILL SEEK AN ENGLISH PURCHASER.

Lexington, Ky., April 27.—Harry Stanhope has decided to ship Marechal Neil and her yearling black colt by Watercress to England and to be sold in July. Marechal Neil is twelve years old, by Hanover—Margarine, by Algerine, and therefore full sister to Rhoda B. Marechal Neil's yearling by Watercress is one of the handsomest youngsters seen in Kentucky in many a day. Marechal Neil was not bred last year, but was mated yesterday with the French horse, Adam, at Millstream Stud. They sail on the steamer Minneapolis from New York June 6.

Edward Alvey is trying hard to get Dr. Mathews II. He was sent a mile in 1:45 during the week. His time for the quarter was 1:37, and he galloped out a mile and an eighth in 2:00. While Dr. Mathews was at Santa Anita Park during the winter he did not show a trial duplicating the one mentioned. Notwithstanding the appearance of the colt, one indicating loss of flesh, Alvey says he will be ready to start and will be hard to beat. Not many men will tell you this horse has a chance.

J. N. Camden, Jr.'s, Dumvay, did not startle anybody at the Lexington meeting, since he finished outside of the money and in a race won by Pinkola, with Macias second and Tom Kearney third. The distance was a mile and Dumvay tired badly after going a half. This colt is being trained by W. J. Young. Another starter which Young is handling and which will go to the post is Bill Herron. He is the property of Barney Dreyfus, owner of the Pittsburgh baseball club. It is believed he is a good colt.

Synchroized, Cymbal, Zagz, Stone Street, Frank Bird, Glivoder and Simon Well are other possible starters. R. C. Rann has been withdrawn because he has pneumonia.

There has been no recent support of Mr. Vanderbilt's candidate, Sea Sick II. Perrier is universally admitted to have made wonderful improvement during the winter and in marked contradiction to his famous sire, at the corresponding period of his racing career, is coming steadily to hand. Moreover, he is possibly even a better looking horse than was Persimmon at the same age.

An Austrian bookmaker in Austria's betting center, Vienna, has just discovered to his cost that, although there is no direct telephonic communication between London and Vienna, the means of communication are already sufficiently rapid to enable unscrupulous persons here to make safe bets on the racing results in England. He accepted bets on a particular race up to a certain hour and found that he had been defrauded of 50,000 crowns by a gang of sharpshooters who had arranged to receive the result by telephone from London to Paris, Paris to Berlin and Berlin to Vienna and knew the winner in little over half an hour after the race was run. The bookmaker informed the police who had been victimized and several members of the conspiracy have been arrested.

I am glad to hear, writes "Audax" in Horse and Hound, there is little fear of the late Duke of Devonshire's stud being entirely broken up. It is probable, although nothing is definitely settled, that the horses in training will be sold at Newmarket during the two thousand week, with the exception of four fillies, which have already been housed and will almost certainly eventually join the best mares of the existing stud, which will be kept on by the present duke.

At the approaching Epsom meeting, says Sporting Life, the unique sight of a four-year-old in Spring, a three-year-old in Rhodora and a two-year-old in Alabama, the produce of one mare, Rhoda B., will be seen under silk for their respective races.

Demetria, a black colt by the French horse, Clairon, out of the English mare, Miss Snap, by Marden, won the Italian Derby at Rome last Sunday. Demetria is owned by Prince Borja and was ridden by the English boy, A. Child.

Jockey Aylin had an extraordinary cosmopolitan record as a rider last year. He was riding both on the flat and at steeplechasing (which very few jockeys can combine), and in France was successful eight times, in Germany sixteen, rode twenty winners in Austria and four in England. The total of fifty was pretty equally divided between flat racing and hunting. Aylin has arranged to ride in Austria for this month and for a stable containing seventy horses, so that his prospects are deservedly favorable.

There are in the Grand National Steeplechase course at Aintree thirty jumps, twenty-eight of which have to be negotiated twice. The water jump opposite the stand is only taken once. The last jump is a rail and thorn fence.

According to the reports from Newmarket, August Belmont's Norman III., a Derby eligible, is said to be the best over a distance in Watson's string. It is said that all the horses of the same stable are hard and fit just now.

The winners of the Grand National since 1890 that were more than ten years of age at the time were Why Not (13 years) in 1894, Manifesto (11 years) in 1899, and Grudon (11 years) in 1901.

John M. P. ran for the Grand National in 1906, and started at 7 to 2. He only ran for the race once.

The mile record (1:23 1/4) is held by the American horse, Cadman, which made it at Lingfield on July 13, 1900.

Manifesto was third for the Grand National in 1900, third in 1902, third in 1903, and he won in 1897 and 1899.

The Derby won by Hermit in 1807 was not run in a snowstorm, but snow fell while the horses were at the starting post.

Robert Stevier purchased Duke of Westminster as a yearling for \$30,000 and sold the colt to Mr. G. Faber for \$112,750.

The filly by Cylene out of Sceptre is engaged in the Derby and the Two Thousand Guineas, the Derby, the Oaks, and the St. Leger in 1909.

The amount won in stakes by the Duke of Portland in 1889, Donovan's, was, according to English calculations, £72,858.10, or \$358,113.50.

The Derby was run in a snowstorm when Bloomsbury won in 1839.

The yearlings in the Avondale Stud of E. S. Gardner, Avondale, Tenn., and the Edenwald Stud of W. O. Parmer, Edgelyfield Junction, Tenn., will be disposed of at a sale in Toronto. The Avondale youngsters are by Masetto and the Edenwald offerings include the get of The Commoner and Lord Esterling.

So many events have been crowded together in the ter-centenary celebration of Quebec in July, that the Quebec Turf Association has wisely decided to hold its race meeting in the last week of August as usual. Lieutenant-Colonel Ashmead, honorary secretary of the club, announces the dates as August 25 and 27. Francis Nelson, of Toronto, will officiate as judge.

The New York Telegraph's critic thinks that "it will take a mighty good horse to beat the New-castle Stable's Spooner in the \$10,000 Excelsior Handicap at Jamaica next Wednesday. With the possible exception of Jubilee, Spooner is the smartest three-year-old shown this season. His performance in the Queens County Handicap at Aqueduct Saturday was above reproach."

John M. P., which is in the Widener string this season, is the same erratic horse that he was last year. At least he is the same horse of strange and terrible moods, even about the stable. At times he is tractable and a perfectly sane and friendly companion, while without any warning, when he is in one of his moods, he has to be watched constantly.
