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TRY-OUT FOR LATONIA OAKS

FOUR PROSPECTIVE STARTERS MEET IN RACE
AND ALL ARE UNPLACED AT FINISH.

Several Upsets Mark Racing at Kentucky Course,
Although Track Conditions Are Greatly Improved—Big Crowd in Attendance.

Cincinnati, O., June 7.—With improved weather and track conditions came a corresponding improvement in the quality of the sport at Latonia today. Enlarged fields and contestants of better class held out the promise of good racing and attracted an attendance exceeding by far any Monday crowd seen here in years. The severe drubbings that the bookmakers have received here lately caused a diminishing of their ranks, only sixteen reporting for business in the customary place of the field. There was a continued tendency to lay short prices and when a commission of fair proportions showed for any of the starters, it caused the ring to become panicky. A little infusion of new bookmaking material would make the betting here a bit more steady.

The mile and a sixteenth handicap, which incidentally served as a try-out for a quartet of Latonia Oaks candidates, was the best offering of the afternoon, and resulted in a handy victory for Rara Avis over John E. McMillan and Nadzu. This trio, with Alice, which finished fourth, were the fittest of the contestants. During the early stage, Gliding Belle and Alice Bailed were contending factors, but lack of condition told on them after going a half and they both dropped out of the running. Gliding Belle will likely be benefited by her race today and probably will go to the post favorite in the Oaks next Wednesday.

Colony again suffered defeat, much to the chagrin of a host of supporters. On her recent good showings she appeared to hold safe the opposition she was meeting today, and on the strength of an industriously circulated report that T. M. Green, her most likely opponent, was unfit, she was backed to the exclusion of the others. T. M. Green followed her closely the first half, and despite a strenuous attempt to run out at the stretch turn, came away in the last furlong to win handily. The fight for second place was spirited, but Colony retained it.

Another upset that the layers profited by came with the running of the second race, won by the outsider, Tommie. The race was a hot favorite, but disappointed his backers badly by failing to finish better than third. Crowding in this race was responsible for the fall of Laveno, on which E. Martin had the mount. The boy escaped with a severe shaking up and a bruised knee, but on the advice of the track physician canceled the balance of his riding engagements for the afternoon.

The opener was contested by fifteen fillies, and enabled Xarco, racing in the colors of H. P. Healey, to leave the maiden class, for the mile and a furlong race an entry fee of \$10 had been charged, but this circumstance did not prevent the limit number from accepting. Scratches reduced the field to eleven starters. Hughes, showing conspicuous improvement over his previous efforts, won the purse. With the favorite, Bellevue, second. The closing dash brought sudden improvement in Gilvelear, which won in a sharp drive from Warner Griswell, recently purchased from P. Dpune by A. Gordon.

The crowding which took place in the second race in addition to causing jockey Martin to be thrown, was also responsible for the cutting down of C. A. Lelman so badly that it is improbable that he can be saved for racing purposes.

Jockey Hickey was fined \$25 by the starter for disobedience at the post.

Wash Norvell, who officiated at the Jamestown meeting, was an arrival this morning.

H. G. Bedwell set today to Nugent Bros. the useful colt, Tom Hayward, for the reported price of \$1,500.

T. C. McDowell is undecided about shipping King's daughter to New York to start in the Suburban Handicap. In the event that she remains here, Secretary Murphy will renew his efforts to bring about a meeting between her and Olambala.

Matt J. Winn is expected here tomorrow from Juarez, Mexico, where he has been in connection with the plans for the erection of a plant for racing next fall and winter. He will go on to New York after a brief visit here to arrange for the opening of Empire City track, of which he is the general manager.

L. Kirby purchased from J. W. Pugh a pair of two-year-olds, and two yearlings by Allan-a-Dale, out of Engia and Juanita.

NEW CASTLE SHOWS PROMISING FORM.

New York, June 7.—Elliott Cowdin, breeder of the Meddler-Homespun colt, Newcastle, for which Herman B. Duryea paid \$10,700 at the yearling sales last season, has received word from England that New Castle is promising two-year-old, Harry Payne Whitney took a half interest with Mr. Duryea in the purchase of this colt, and New Castle is now in the Whitney stable at Newmarket. Joyner has made no effort to get the colt to the post so far, because Mr. Duryea and Mr. Whitney do not wish it. Newmarket is eligible for the Epsom Derby of 1910, and his owners desire to give him every opportunity to mature before putting him at hard racing. The youngsters Joyner has raced in England so far are only the most precocious members of the juvenile division of the Whitney string.

THE RUN-UP OF MONTGOMERY.

New York, June 7.—P. S. P. Randolph is credited with having declared, when S. C. Hildreth raised his bid of \$2,300 on Montgomery to \$3,000, after that horse's victory in the Myrtle Stakes at Gravesend, Saturday, that it had been his intention to go only as high as \$2,500 in his effort to secure the horse.

The Myrtle Stakes cost Hildreth \$840, the purse being only \$1,100. Under the selling race rules half the difference between the sum at which Montgomery was entered to be sold and the amount he fetched—that is to say, \$1,000—went to Mr. Randolph by virtue of his ownership of Racquet. And inasmuch as Racquet got \$200 for the purse for his running second, he earned more by being beaten than he could have by winning.

LINNEL'S TRAINING LICENSE SUSPENDED.

New York, June 7.—The stewards of the Jockey Club have approved the finding of Earl Linnell by the Belmont Park stewards, and have ordered the suspension of his training license.

Linnell was punished for his failure to have Black Mate in the paddock for a race in which he was to start, and his failure to report his horse absent.

DETERMINED TO LIVE UP TO LAW.

Management of Brooklyn Jockey Club Means Business and Will Follow Court Decisions.

New York, June 7.—Joseph Dean, who was shown the gate at Gravesend Saturday by the Pinkertons, was formerly a clerk in the employ of a prominent bookmaker. The action taken by Dean's case gives evidence that the Brooklyn Jockey Club management proposes to enforce the provisions of the Hart-Agnew law as interpreted by the courts to the letter. Dean was plainly told that under no conditions and to no race track in this state would he be again admitted.

The cause for this drastic action was the assertion made by one of the detectives that Dean had been guilty of breach of the betting law. The stewards deemed him a menace to the best interests of the sport. It was said that Dean had been detected accepting money for a bet offered. Whether he had registered the wager, the track police were unable to say, but denying his actions as overstepping the lines laid down by the courts on the betting laws, it was decided to act before the new law was violated.

"We intend to enforce the law rigidly," said one of the racing stewards today. "The Jockey Club has always stood in the past for law and order and it does not, at this late day, intend to change its methods of conducting racing under its jurisdiction. If visitors to the track cannot live up to the requirements the stewards would much rather have them remain outside the gate. We intend to see that the law is obeyed in spirit as well as the letter."

"Oral bets under the court's decision are permissible, but there must be no registration of the bets and the bookmaker who accepts the money and makes a record of a bet does so at his own peril and must take the consequences of his act. The racing authorities are working in harmony with the police in this matter, but, even independent of the sheriff and his deputies, the track will not even any violation of the law inside of the race track gates."

It appears that before the Gravesend meeting opened Mr. Dwyer sent official word to every layer that the slightest violation of the law would result in permanent banishment from all of the New York tracks.

"It is legal to accept oral wagers, but they cannot be recorded and no money can pass before a race."

It is said that some of the plain clothes detectives were made, by means of a bribe, to receive any trying to induce some of the layers to accept cash wagers, but were unsuccessful.

"If things can go along now without friction," said a leading bookmaker, "racing will gradually become more popular. Persons who cannot obey the law are entitled to no sympathy when they find themselves barred at all the tracks. There is no reason why anybody should try to operate in defiance of the authorities. The Jockey Club means business and offenders will be dealt with summarily if caught."

When asked if the field would be opened at Gravesend, President Dwyer said that he was vigorously opposed to such a plan, and as far as his track was concerned the clean enclosure would not be used at all this year, if ever again. This seems to be the policy of the other track owners, who believe that the present arrangement is sufficient to meet the demands of the public. As the matter stands now it is impossible for the poorer element to visit the tracks and make wagers. Only those who can afford the expense are included in the list of patrons. The high admission rates and the total absence of free badges will provide a paying revenue which in time will make it possible to hold racing at least five days a week. On Thursday the Brooklyn Jockey Club took in nearly \$30,000, which netted a handsome profit.

In a few days more, however, John Cavanzoli will begin the dispensing of advance information, as in former years, and an effort will be made to better regulate the personality and operations of layers.

The Brooklyn Jockey Club has not yet made the announcement that there will be four or more days' racing each week at Gravesend, for which horsemen and turf patrons are awaiting with bated breath. Mr. Dwyer is not dissatisfied with the way things have gone since the horses moved from Belmont Park to the new track, and he is confident that the Brooklyn Handicap run was as numerous as expected, and the attendance Saturday was up to the mark, in spite of unfavorable weather. But Mr. Dwyer does not want to be precipitate. If the situation in the Suburban, his next important race, is not better, he may race either Wednesday or Friday.

SIR MARTIN AGAIN A FAVORITE.

London, Eng., June 7.—Sir Martin has become a notable favorite for the Royal Hunt Cup, one of the decided fixtures of the Ascot meeting. He is quoted in the future books at 10-1 and has been considerably backed already. His next important race on Tuesday he may race either Wednesday or Friday.

All the cracks that ran in the Epsom Derby are also in the St. Leger, September 8, except Sir Martin. So the St. Leger would be exceptionally open. Other cracks, such as Longfellow, in the \$50,000 Eclipse Stakes at Sandown, Bayard, in it, however. J. B. Joel's Your Majesty should hold him; also Santo-Strato, Minoru's next engagement is in the St. James Palace Stakes, Ascot, June 18, which he was nominated by Colonel W. Hall Walker before he was leased to the king.

His majesty's lease of Minoru and the other colts obtained from Colonel W. Hall Walker, expires at the end of next year, the terms of the agreement being until the end of their four-year-old season. Sir Martin, however, is being leased to the king, and is filling out and training into a beautiful mare. Her next outing will be at the Newmarket July meeting.

"Danny" Maher's many followers may take a rest, for the American jockey will not be seen in the saddle in England before Ascot. He has gone to Vienna to ride for the German Imperial Stud.

KING JAMES AND HIS CHARACTERISTICS.

New York, June 7.—It is feared that the stone bruise that King James sustained during the running of the Brooklyn Handicap may interfere with his participation in the Suburban, his next important engagement. If King James gets to the post in the Suburban, he probably will rule favorite. S. C. Hildreth has an idea that King James' ability to keep his stake engagements will not be materially affected by the mishap. It should develop that King James' stone bruise is a more serious injury than Mr. Hildreth supposes, the Hildreth candidates in the Suburban will be Fitz Herbert and Bestigouche or Joe Madden, if the going be good, or Joe Madden and Montgomery if the track is muddy.

Mr. Hildreth has affectionately bestowed the nickname of "Jimmie" upon the winner of the Brooklyn. From the time that he acquired this sterling son of the Unsightly, the horse has held a high place in his esteem and in the manner in which he has fulfilled the expectations of his owners in the east is especially pleasing to Mr. Hildreth. King James is as sensible and steady-going a horse about the stable as could be asked for, travels like a seasoned globe trotter and being equally at home in a sprint or as far as horses are asked to go is indeed entitled to be considered a really high-class race horse.

THE MAJOR'S PREDICTIONS FULLY REALIZED.

Lexington, Ky., June 7.—It was at the suggestion of Major F. A. Daingerfield, manager of Castleton Stud, that Ben Brush was mated with Pink Domino. Major Daingerfield predicted at the time that the result would prove a turf sensation, and the showing of Sweep, the offspring of the mating, verifies the soundness of his views. A few days after the foal was dropped he wrote to Mr. Keene that the colt was a wonderful-looking youngster. He also predicted wonderful results from the mating of Commano and Castopella, and his prediction was fully filled in the notable performances of Colia as a two-year-old.

MR. DWYER PROCEEDING CAUTIOUSLY.

Awaits Developments of Today and Thursday Before Deciding on Extra Days' Racing.

New York, June 7.—Things look promising for four days racing each week in future. When spoken to on the subject today, Mr. Dwyer said that he had not yet decided what would be done by the Brooklyn Jockey Club in that respect, as he wants to first see what the attendance will amount to tomorrow and Thursday. There is little doubt that an extra day's racing each week will be profitable. All the associations want, is a prospect of sufficient receipts to cover the expense of an extra day to offer the necessary inducements to keep horsemen here. Three days racing a week is regarded rather as a slim proposition for owners with large stables of horses, but four days would fill the bill and everybody would be satisfied.

Every race for tomorrow filled well, with the exception of the Broadway Stakes. What the field in this old fixture lacks numerically is amply atoned for by quality. Willie Fitz Herbert is the dominant factor in the ante-post betting. It is thought that the Hildreth crack will have stiff work cut out to beat Fashion Plate and Harrison, both vastly improved three-year-olds. Turfcast is such an ordinary looking colt that despite his one sensational performance in the Metropolitan, he is not regarded as a dangerous contender.

TWO ENDURING AMERICAN THOROUGHBREDS.

Remarkable Careers on the Track of the Noted Horses Logan and Blitzzen.

Many horses go through long and strenuous racing careers successfully without attracting more than a slight passing notice. There are, however, a few crops up which are raced so often and races so as to become a focus of admiring comment and acquire a great following. Two such that were running contemporaneously were each dubbed "iron horse" as an effective testimonial to their remarkable stamens and often demonstrated speed and courage. These were Alex Shields' Logan and "Pa" Bradley's Blitzzen.

Of the two, Logan was probably the superior, although Blitzzen was an admirable race horse when at his best and a truly remarkable mud runner. In the course of his ten years on the track Logan ran in the great number of 350 races and was placed in 243, a record difficult to match in any country. He was a hardy traveler, a hearty feeder and indifferent to surroundings. On one occasion he was sent from New Orleans to San Francisco and arrived at the Ingleside track about noon. He had been entered in a purse by telegram and about three hours after his arrival started and won from good horses. It was the general opinion that the horse would be dull and tired after such a long trip, hence he was at 10-1 in the betting and his owner profited largely. Logan is still a sound and lusty horse and was presented to the Canadian Racing Bureau, to which as possibly the only living great grandson of Glencoe he should prove of great value. Blitzzen, a smooth-turned brown, by the Leamington horse, Blazes, did most of his racing in his first three years on the turf, starting in 131 races as a two, three and four-year-old and acquitting himself nobly. Much of his racing was done here in Chicago, where his following was large, local and enthusiastic. It was at Garfield Park that he won the most valuable stake race of his career, the Hesiug Stakes, May 21, 1892, in which he defeated Notus and Strathmald at a mile and a quarter, with 122 pounds up in 2:11 over a hard track, and a mile and a quarter, which was the general opinion that the horse would be dull and tired after such a long trip, hence he was at 10-1 in the betting and his owner profited largely. PLANS TO BREED TO HERMIS.

Lexington, Ky., June 7.—E. R. Bradley, of Chicago, has bred his Atheling mare, Shrine, to Hermis. Mr. Bradley's Lexington Farm is close proximity to the place at which Henry M. Ziegler, of Cincinnati, has domiciled Hermis, and it is the intention of Mr. Bradley to breed several of his mares to the Suburban winner of 1904 next season. Shrine has a special following, and it is thought that Mr. Bradley thinks highly. Mr. Bradley was one of the Kentucky breeders who paid \$1,000 for the privilege of breeding a mare to the imported stallion Adam. He has a yearling by Adam at Idle Hour and predicts that it will make a race horse.

AMERICAN HORSES GIVEN TOP WEIGHT.

New York, June 7.—American horses are assigned to weights in the handicap for the Royal Hunt Cup to be run at Ascot June 16. Ballot is asked to carry 123, Colia 130, Priscillian 128 and Sir Martin 119. These imposts are causing much surprise and comment here.

The first-mentioned trio are the actual top weights of the race, though none of them has started on the English turf. The 119 allotted Sir Martin is considered an extremely heavy burden. The highest weight ever before carried by a winning three-year-old in the Royal Hunt Cup was 108 pounds, with which Suspendur won in 1892.

LEXINGTON STAKES ATTRACT INTEREST.

Lexington, Ky., June 7.—Officials of the Kentucky Racing Association are greatly encouraged over the interest being taken by horsemen in the east in the future of racing in Kentucky. During the last week Garrett D. Wilson, acting secretary of the local association, has received numerous requests for entry blanks to the stakes which will close on June 15. The indications are that such men as August Belmont, James B. Haggin, James R. Keene, John E. Madden and others who have never raced in this section will make entries to the two and three-year-old events to be decided here next spring.

FORTY DAYS' RACING FOR PADUCAH, KY.

Fort Worth, Tex., June 7.—P. A. Brady, who is presiding judge here and who will preside at the Oklahoma City meeting, announced today that a forty-day race meeting had been arranged for at Paducah, Ky., to follow the Oklahoma meeting. Mr. Brady will be presiding judge, with Milton S. Mooney as manager. Paducah is in western Kentucky, on the Ohio river, which, in that locality, marks the boundary between Missouri and Kentucky. Paducah has never before had a race meeting of the magnitude contemplated.

ENTHUSIASM AT MONTREAL

IDEAL CLIMATIC CONDITIONS ATTRACT GREAT CROWD TO BLUE BONNETS COURSE.

Favorites Take Five of the Six Races as on Opening Day—Captain Fred Presgrave Saddles Three Winners—Many Arrive from Toronto.

Montreal, Que., June 7.—A delightful afternoon, with practically perfect racing conditions prevailing, attracted a large gathering to beautiful Blue Bonnets this afternoon. The attendance exceeded in point of numbers that of opening day and the spectators exhibited much enthusiasm, most of the winners being roundly applauded as they flashed past the judges.

The Toronto delegation which arrived yesterday afternoon helped to swell the attendance, fully 1,500 coming from the Ontario city. There was a big increase in the ranks of the layers, thirty-nine doing business as against eighteen on opening day. Blue Bonnets is maintaining its reputation as a course over which truly run contests are the rule and not the exception. Five favorites were again successful this afternoon, which makes the record for the first two days ten winning choices out of the twelve races run.

Captain Fred Presgrave was in the limelight during the day. He saddled three winners, two of them carrying the popular colors of Thomas Clyde. Compton was the other winner whose preparation he attended to. Jockey Phil Goldstein had the mount on all three.

A steeplechase over the two mile and a half course and a race for hunters on the flat were offered as attractions. Mr. Col's Economy proved an easy winner in the jumping race after making the circuit throughout. Malton eased her up to a canter at the end.

Bobbie Keen, with Mr. Bert Holland in the saddle, won the hunters' race in easy fashion. Mr. Holland handled the old horse perfectly. Keeping him under slight restraint until well into the homestretch, where he drew away into an easy lead.

The fourth race furnished the best contest of the day. Dalbousie and Chief Kee fighting it out throughout the last furlong. The former managed to win by a nose, but was a desperate finish, with jockeys Preston and Goldstein both doing their utmost. Bob R., heavily backed by his connections, proved a keen disappointment. He failed to show speed at any stage of the running.

Colonel Weston Jarvis, a prominent English army officer, was a guest of the stewards this afternoon. Colonel Jarvis is in Canada on a visit to his friend, Earl Grey. He came down from Ottawa yesterday and will spend several days in the city. E. S. Skand of Ottawa and Major Heatherington, president of the Quebec Turf Club, were also visitors.

Red River was kicked while at the post on Saturday and came out of the race lame. J. H. Madigan's Ellicott is also lame and probably will be on the shelf for a week or two.

Captain Presgrave has had Rossfonten gelded and the horse will be turned out for the summer.

Lewis Hawes, an English jockey, was an arrival from England on Sunday. He has ridden in all of the European countries and also in New Zealand. He comes with strong credentials as a cross-country rider and will apply to the Canadian Racing Associations for a license.

VANDERBILT HORSES IN RARE FETTER.

Win Three Races in One Day on French Turf—Oversight Backed to Take Big Race.

Paris, France, June 7.—It was a great day at the St. Cloud race course today for W. K. Vanderbilt, whose horses were victorious in three races. His Exile won the Prix du Ruisseau, distance one mile and four and one-half furlongs, and a purse of \$400. In the Prix des Vaux, d'Or Cornstalk came in first and won a purse of \$2,000. Elpoin won the Prix des Geraniens, a race for three-year-olds, a purse of \$1,000.

Vanderbilt's Hudson and T. P. Thorne's Grand slam ran in the Prix des Frenes, but neither got a place.

Notwithstanding the law prohibiting bookmaking in France, two bets, each of \$1,000 to \$2,000 have been made that William K. Vanderbilt's colt, Oversight, will win the double event, the French Derby and Grand Prix de Paris. The former is to be run next Sunday at Chantilly and the latter on Sunday, June 27.

At the Chantilly course Sunday Edmond Blanc's Union, a bay filly by Ajax—Andres, won the Prix de Diane (the French Oaks), for three-year-old fillies, at ten furlongs. The value of the stakes was \$19,000, and Union was first by a scanty head. W. K. Vanderbilt's Silver Streak was unplaced. Mason Carnes' El Biar ran unplaced at the Prix des Ecuries, a handicap, at one and one-half miles.

YEARLING SALES AT SHEEPSHEAD BAY.

New York, June 7.—Upward of 250 yearlings have already been consigned to the Fasig-Tipton Company for the sale announced to begin during the Coney Island Jockey Club's summer meeting at Sheepshead Bay. SUIT OVER PURSE WON BY BELLE KINNEY.

San Francisco, Cal., June 7.—Frank Barnett, sheriff of Alameda County, and the New California Jockey Club have been made defendants in a suit filed by J.
