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JOCKEY BURNS IS BARRED

DONALD MACDONALD'S IMPROVED PERFORMANCE IS RESPONSIBLE FOR RULING.

Officials at Moncrief Park Also Had Other Grounds for Denying Rider Privilege of Accepting Mounts During Remainder of Jacksonville Meeting.

Jacksonville, Fla., February 22.—The Washington Handicap, at one mile and an eighth, carrying a value of \$1,500, was offered as the feature of a well-balanced card at Moncrief Park this afternoon. One of the best fields of handicap horses on the grounds went to the post and the race showed just how good a racer Donald Macdonald is at present. This son of Sombro-Berriedale carried 125 pounds, overcame early interference and galloped home an easy winner in close to track record time for the distance, the mile and an eighth being run in 1:53 1/2. Donald Macdonald's improvement resulted in jockey Guy Burns being denied the privilege of riding here during the remainder of the meeting. Burns is riding here under the management of Albert Simons and his effort on the horse in his previous race did not appear satisfactory in the opinion of the judges. Two other failures had been chalked up against Burns, one on definite when he was favorite and finished last in the race February 7, and another on Ragman February 20, when the horse ran disappointingly. The officials did not accuse Burns of fraud in any of these races as the wording of the ruling issued by them shows. The ruling was that "for generally unsatisfactory work, G. Burns has been denied the further privilege of riding here."

This afternoon Judge Murphy sent for S. A. Clopton and requested that another rider be substituted for Burns on Donald Macdonald. Mr. Clopton was willing that any jockey be given the mount and Butwell was selected. The officials wished to see if the horse had trained off, as some claimed, and his performance in the race certainly discredited that theory. In the opening race Burns had the mount on Albert Simons' Margerum, and when the break came he cut across and interfered with most of the horses in the race. Burns thereby earned a suspension of two weeks for foul riding, and after Donald Macdonald's victory, it was thought to be for the best interests of the turf if the lad be kept from further riding here. Three favorites and a well-backed second choice won, which helped the public to recoup some of the heavy losses they had experienced during the preceding days. J. W. May showed up another shifty two-year-old in the opening event in the well-bred Ursula Emma, by Broomstick—Admirance, which beat the favorite, New Haven, by a length. Ozana made her appearance after a long letup and beat a band of good sprinters in the third race, which she won easily from Alfred the Great. Obert, who had the mount on Star Blue in this race, was suspended for two weeks for cutting across at the start. James Duckworth received a wire to the effect that his father is dangerously ill at his home in New Iberia, La., and he left for there tonight. Charles E. Rowe came from Tampa this morning with his stable and Tom Hatfield's good horse, Emperor William. The latter is a candidate for the Florida Special to be run next month. Al Bellaw also arrived from Tampa with his horses. Jack Phillips, who took the two-year-olds Elan and Eglantine to Tampa and sold them after winning four races, returned this morning from the west coast track. He is in search of more material to ship to Tampa. Jack Greenberg was an arrival from Louisville and will remain for a couple of weeks. The Latonia stake receipts reached here today and Joe McLennan will bring entries for those fixtures. Likely starters in the Ponce de Leon Handicap on Saturday include Lahore, 116; Star Charter, 117; The Nigger, 113; Governor Gray, 113; Dr. Ducner, 111; Judge Monk, 110, and Antenor, 107.

THIRTY LEADING MONEY-WINNING HORSES

To the Texas-bred mare, Meadow, belong at present the distinction of leading the money-winning horses of 1911. Some of her performances have been distinctly high class and speak well for her sire, Leonid, a son of Hastings—Leopoldina, that won the Autumn Stakes of 1901 at Sheephead Bay for August Belmont, defeating such a star as Major Daingerfield. Next to Meadow is the good Voter colt, Polls, only \$50 in advance of George Odom's flying filly, Follie Levy. This trio of money getters represents Juarez racing, while the fourth in the list, Mary Davis, stands as the leader at Jacksonville. Arasee is chief among the Oakland horses, Condran's speedy gelding, The Nigger, heads the three-year-olds and the Abe Frank colt, Closer, has won more money than any other two-year-old of the year. MUCH IMPRESSED BY COLIN.

Colin was such a splendid race horse and so great a favorite with American patrons of racing that there is bound to be a lively interest here in his fortunes as a sire in England. His sire, Commando, grand-sire Domino and great grandsire Hinjar were immediate successes when sent to the stud and if Colin inherits this family characteristic of first crop of two-year-olds should cause some stir in English racing two years hence. Recently Sporting Life's "Our Special Commissioner" visited Colin at Heath House Stud and wrote of the famous American quite eulogistically, a part of his observations being: "I have again and again late declared my belief that there is no such thing as direct descent in either tail-male or tail-female. For a generation or two it may be in the male line and then branch off into the female line, to revert again to the male. A time will come when we shall have to invent a new system of grouping our thoroughbreds. We have scarcely sufficient knowledge to enable us to do so yet. Two or three of us were the other day looking at Colin, both in and out of his box. He's a typical Springfield," was the observation of one of the party, and the observation was endorsed by another member. If that is so—if Colin has actually inherited his chief characters from Springfield, what is the use of pretending that he comes of the Commando-Domino-Hinjar-Alarm line, just because it happens to be the top line in his pedigree? Colin's dam, Pastorella, is of Springfield. Then again, take the case of Springfield himself. He was by St. Albans, a son of Stockwell. His coat color, bay, suggests that he favored his dam, Viridis, rather than his sire, who was a chestnut, like Stockwell. Now, Viridis went back in tail-female to Hester, a daughter of Camel. She and the two intervening mares were all browns. In that fact we have prima facie, though not conclusive, evidence of actual descent. Camel was the sire of Touchstone, and the name of Touchstone crops up again and again in Colin's pedigree.

"As a matter of fact, Colin traces back to Touchstone in tail-male. I have said that this is not sufficient to justify his being labeled a Touchstone horse, but when it is taken in conjunction with all the other evidence pointing in the same direction, the chances are that he is properly so labeled. Touchstone was foaled in 1831. There are some people who pool-pool the notion that it is as feasible to attempt to discover in-breeding to a horse which belongs to a generation so far back, although they themselves do not hesitate to speak of a horse of the present day as belonging to the Herod family, although Herod was foaled in 1758. It so happens, however, that we have recently been supplied with two very striking examples of the persistency of hereditary characters, although they may lie dormant for several generations. I refer to the two grays—Postmans and Master Graystoke—the one by St. Simon and the other by Galopin. There was the gray strain in both these sires, coming to them through Mrs. Ridgway, the dam of Vedette. The moment an opportunity was given it asserted itself. Though both the grays referred to will be classed as descendants of Blacklock, it is practically certain that they are nothing of the kind.

"In an article I wrote about Colin when he was retired to the stud in the autumn of 1909, I referred to his pedigree as revealing a concentration of Touchstone blood. Regarding this statement in the light of the wider knowledge I now possess, or think I possess, I realize that it stands in no need of revision. That is, I am afraid, much more than can be said for a good many pronouncements that have appeared in this column. We live and learn. Somebody has remarked that only a fool pretends that he has never made a mistake. I hope it will never be possible to accuse me of adhering to a false doctrine, because I am afraid to convict myself of ignorance and error. That our theories regarding heredity have hitherto been largely based on unsound premises is, I firmly believe, undeniable. Whether the discovery of a true and sound doctrine will enable us to improve on our previous efforts is another matter. One can only hope that it will have that result. Be Colin's descent what it may there is no getting away from the fact that he is a very fine individual. In all probability he was the best race horse ever foaled in the United States, and that is putting the case pretty high. During two seasons he went to the post on fifteen occasions and was never beaten.

"Then Colin came to England. Mr. Keene, his owner, entertained a faint hope that he might be able to show us what manner of horse he was. Leg trouble had asserted itself before he sailed from his native shores, but there was just a chance that the mischief could be remedied. To a certain extent it was—sufficiently so to enable Sam Darling to subject Colin to a severe trial, from which he emerged triumphant. But that gallop was his last. The old weakness returned and Colin was, perforce, turned out of training. He stood last season at the Heath Stud, Newmarket, under the management of Lord Marcus Beresford. There he is still, and there he will be next season also, if all's well. Subscriptions to him for 1912 had already been booked. His list for the coming season is going very strong; very few nominations to him remain unappropriated. Those few are well worth securing, unless I am greatly mistaken. Colin at once fills the eye as a thoroughbred stallion of the highest class. He looks the horse

he proved himself to be when in training. His old trainer, James Rowe, was recently staying at Newmarket with his friend, Andrew Jopner. Rowe went to see Colin and expressed himself delighted with his appearance. Mr. Keene, too, lately paid a flying visit to the stud, and was entirely satisfied with the progress the son of Commando is making. Baron Oppenheim has been another 'caller,' and his approval took the form of acquired subscriptions. Colin stands just under sixteen hands. He is beautifully molded and shows splendid quality. He is a very quiet, sensible sort of a horse, and altogether it will be astonishing if he does not make a big name for himself as a sire."

WINNING OWNERS AT JACKSONVILLE.

With two-thirds of the winter meeting at Jacksonville a matter of history, F. J. Pons stands at the head of the list of money-winning owners at that track. Mr. Pons has a commanding lead and may be able to hold his supremacy to the end of the meeting, although if some of his nearest competitors for the honor should succeed in winning one or more of the valuable stakes still to be decided, it might have the effect of displacing the Pons stable from its present position. S. A. Clopton, G. P. Chinn, R. D. Williams, J. W. Schorr, the Beverwyck Stable, A. Weber and L. P. Doerhofer are other owners that have fared especially well at Moncrief. CALIFORNIANS HOPEFUL

OPINION PREVAILS THAT SUSPENSION OF RACING IS BUT A TEMPORARY CONDITION.

President Williams of New California Jockey Club Keeping His Own Counsel As to Course He Intends to Pursue—Hope for Pari-Mutuels.

The San Francisco newspapers encourage the idea that the suspension of racing in California, brought about by the passage of the Walker-Young law, is only a temporary condition. The impression generally prevails that racing has by no means received its death blow in the Golden State, where it has flourished since pioneer days. The following excerpts from the San Francisco Call are of special interest at this time:

"While President Thomas H. Williams of the New California Jockey Club has made no announcement to date as to his plans in regard to future racing in California, from inside sources it is learned that the president of the jockey club is waiting for the legislature to adjourn before he gives out information as to what he proposes to do. Those who know Williams best declare that he is not the type of man who will quit without a fight and that he will certainly test the constitutionality of the Walker-Young law, which is so sweeping in its prohibitions of betting. It is known that Jerry O'Shea, manager of Ingleside coursing park, proposed to hold coursing matches at the coursing sward on next Sunday, but he has declared the meeting off. When he made the announcement that there would be running there on Sunday he stated that the matches would be held, but no betting would be allowed. However, it would be a hard matter to hold such a contest and prevent the spectators from betting among themselves, and under the present law the racing association would be liable even if it did not recognize the betting features.

"The Williams and O'Shea interests are similar and the two men are very friendly, so it is reasonable to believe that they will have an understanding in regard to the course which will be pursued in making the test. It would not be wise to make a move too soon, as it would give the solons an opportunity to go further with their stringent laws.

"The Walker-Young bill is sweeping in its scope and the police will be kept busy gathering in violators, as the poolrooms are still running. Several arrests have already been made and the police calendars are likely to be filled before long with violations of the Walker-Young betting law. The poolroom men of this city are talking of testing the law on their own behalf. They may beat T. H. Williams to it.

"The prevailing opinion of racing men and admirers of the sport seems to be that racing is only temporarily eclipsed and that it will be going again within two years, if not sooner. The sport is popular. The people like it and want it, and it is a hard thing to kill a pastime that is in popular demand. Racing without betting would be a farce. It would be impossible to conduct race meetings without betting, but the idea is to eliminate the betting feature as much as possible.

"There have been many features to the old system of racing which have been a big knock to the game, and if these evils had been remedied long ago the enemies of the sport would have been without weapons for an attack. Bookmakers have done more than anyone else to bring racing into disrepute, and if the supporters of the game ever hope to revive it on a sound basis it must be without bookmakers or layers of any kind. They are by no means a necessary, and racing would prosper without them. While there is no chance for pari-mutuel betting to be allowed here for at least two years, it is confidently expected that this form of betting will be sanctioned by law some time in the future in this state.

TAMPA RACING UNTIL MARCH 25.

Tampa, Fla., February 22.—Cold weather, coupled with the counter attractions of a monster floral parade and an aviation meet at the old fair grounds, contributed to a greatly reduced patronage at the West Tampa track this afternoon. Only the regulars were in attendance and their small numbers gave grandstand and lawn a deserted appearance. Considering the small crowd speculation was exceptionally good. Outsiders accounted for most of the purses, the exceptions being Sweet Owen and John Marrs. The latter, after winning the closing dash, was bid up \$105 over his entered price of \$200 and was bought in by his owner. The judges had a session with jockey Bergen after the first race for his listless effort on Abe Gooding. The warning had its effect, for he took a brace and landed two winners thereafter. Jockey D. Murphy was also on the carpet and the judges informed him that unless he showed less inclination to ride other than his own mounts, he would be barred. Jockeys Holmes and Pryor were each suspended for three days by the starter. Jockey Wrispen made his re-appearance in the saddle this afternoon and showed little effect of his recent serious injury.

Authoritative announcement was made this afternoon that the racing here would continue until at least March 25. The contemplated return to Pensacola is still in abeyance, but it is almost certain that a meeting of two weeks will be held there, beginning early in April. It is understood that the case against Manager Strode and Aviators McCurdy and Beachy, growing out of the alleged breach of the Sunday law, has been dropped by the civil authorities. The reason given is that all parties interested in last Sunday's aviation exhibition at the race track were ignorant that a law had recently been passed by the council refusing permission to hold Sunday exhibitions to which an admission fee was charged.

WALTER MILLER GOES INTO BUSINESS.

Walter Miller, the American jockey who rode in Europe last year with success, has decided to forsake the pigskin forever, but instead of emulating the examples of James Rowe, James McLaughlin, John Hylan, George Odom and many other successful jockeys of other days in taking up the calling of a trainer of horses, Miller has embarked in the haberdashery business in New York. He weighs 150 pounds and decided to retire from the saddle because of inability to keep down his weight. He is well fixed financially.

INTRINSIC BEATS ROUND THE WORLD.

El Paso, Tex., February 22.—Despite the continued inclemency of the weather a fair-sized crowd attended the races at Terrazas Park today, the principal feature of the card being the Washington Handicap, at one mile. Contested by a numerically weak field and, seemingly, at the mercy of the top-heavy favorite, Round the World, the race resulted in one of the biggest upsets of the meeting. Sebago, the Dunne candidate, declined the issue, and Pit a-Pat, from the stable of W. F. and L. E. Fine, was added at a late hour. After showing superior speed in the early running the favorite began to tire in the last part of the race and succumbed to the stretch challenge of Intrinsic.

In the early part of the day odds-on favorites were bowled over with regularity. The talent in a measure recovered their early losses by the success of Florence A. and Fred Mulholland. T. H. Ryan, G. W. Dodge, Ben Levy and W. Hart arrived today from Oakland. Mr. Ryan's horses, Downpatrick and June W. are on the way. L. P. O'Leary arrived with the useful Inclement. Jockey Eddie Taplin came into the limelight by piloting three winners.

El Paso is to have a new hotel costing about \$800,000, thanks largely to the efforts of Col. Matt Winn, who interested eastern capital in the enterprise. It will be built at the junction of El Paso and West San Antonio streets and will be ready for occupancy early in 1912.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

Steeplechase jockey Fred Williams has signed a contract to ride the coming season for Barlett McLennan. William Hogan, Mr. McLennan's trainer, is wintering at Belmont Park, where he has Agent, Lillie Hoy, Brushbrook and three other jumpers.

Stanley Davis, who will ride for Theodore Meyers in France this season, sailed from New York last Saturday. He expects to report for duty as soon as possible after arriving in France and he may do some riding in the south of France before the regular season opens in the vicinity of Paris.

The Sheephead Bay Club, for years a famous rendezvous for horsemen gathered for the meetings of the Coney Island Jockey Club, is about to be closed. Richard Doggett, who holds a mortgage on the place, has at the request of the influential spirits of the club decided to foreclose, and the buildings and furniture will be sold at auction.
