AMERICAN RECORDEQUALLED

PLATE GLASS RUNS MILE AND SEVENTY YARDS IN 1:42 1/2 AT FORT ERIE.

Carries 123 Pounds to Victory Over Meridian in Admirable Fashion—Woodcraft and Novelty Score for the Hildreth Stable.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 4.—An American record was equaled at Fort Erie this afternoon when Plate Glass ran a mile and seventy yards in 1:42 1/2 in winning the Fourth of July Handicap. Plate Glass carried top weight of 123 pounds and was ridden by Guy Burns. He beat the Kentucky Derby winner, Meridian, by a length. The pace was fast throughout, the fractional time being 23, 46 1/2, 1:12 1/2, 1:37 1/2, 1:42 1/2. Several watches caught the time a little faster than officially announced, but at all events it equaled the best time on record for the distance in this country, made by Bubbling Water at Oakland November 30, 1910. It also reduced the Canadian record for the distance by one-fifth of a second.

An immense crowd turned out to witness the sport, the attendance being even larger than on the opening day, when the gate receipts broke all records. The Niagara Racing Association furnished a splendid program and keen sport resulted. S. C. Hildreth furnished two of the winners in Woodcraft and Novelty, both of which won easily. The steeplechase furnished a stirring contest, the finish finding the three leaders fighting it out through the home-stretch, with Mystic Light beating Hawking a neck. The steeplechase course at Fort Erie was modeled this spring and the fences made stiffer. The result is that the contests through the field have been much better than in previous seasons. A majority of the races furnished exciting finishes and in three of them heads or necks separated the first two.

Novelty's performance in the fifth race was a splendid one. The Hildreth three-year-old made great weight concessions to everything in the race and won in runaway fashion. Entering the home-stretch, he stumbled and all but went to his knees. Jockey Shilling pulled him together and the colt quickly recovered and came on to win by a couple of lengths from Grassmere. The latter closed a big gap and beat Still Night in the closing strides. Archibald was very weak when he dismounted and was forced to cancel his engagements on Montague and M. Cambon. The officials permitted Mr. Cambon to withdraw the latter when it was found that Archibald was unable to ride.

The Ontario Jockey Club has purchased the property at Long Branch, on which it held an option. The privileges of the Canadian tracks has been denied steeplechase jockey W. A. McKinney. This action was taken at the meeting of the Canadian Racing Association yesterday.

Matt Feakes, trainer for Mrs. L. A. Livingston, was overcome with the heat yesterday, but was about and in good condition today. Jockey W. Allen arrived from Westbury, L. I., this morning. He came to ride Waterway in the International Steeplechase to be run on Saturday.

GREAT THROG AT HAWTHORNE.

Crowd Estimated at 20,000 Turns Out to Witness Decision of Racing Program.

Further proof of the tremendous local popularity of racing was afforded by the presence of a crowd estimated at upwards of 20,000 at Hawthorne track yesterday, when the meeting under the auspices of the Letter Carriers, continued from Monday, was brought to a successful close. That such a crowd should gather to see racing conducted under the conditions that necessarily prevailed, provides a striking illustration of the appetite of Chicagoans for the sport, notwithstanding its extended period of dormancy and presages wonderful prosperity for it should circumstances permit a resumption of racing hereabouts.

At the outset of yesterday's proceedings at the track certain venturesome layers of odds became exceedingly bold and offensive in their operations. The result was that the police employed by the management took into custody several of the most flagrant offenders. The betting, however, went on, but in a more subdued and unostentatious way. There was no general display of odds, but those who were anxious to back their opinions readily found the opportunity.

Yesterday's contests were even more interesting than those of the preceding day, several of the finishes being exceedingly close. The starting was generally satisfactory and the outcome of the day's sport sent the big crowd away well satisfied.

Most of the horses and jockeys that participated in the racing will return to Kentucky forthwith. As on the opening day, creditable time was recorded in all the races yesterday, indicating that the track is in excellent condition, notwithstanding its long period of disuse.

Announcement was made yesterday for the benefit of the thousands in attendance that Labor Day, September 4, would bring another racing program at the track under the auspices of certain of the labor organizations of the city.

ROUND THE WORLD AGAIN HERSELF.

W. G. Yankee's Fleet Filly Beats Best Horses in West in Winning Latonia Stakes.

Cincinnati, O., July 4.—Round the World today won the Independence Handicap from the best opposition that could be mustered at Latonia. Countess was second and Nimbus third. The stake was the feature of a good card and carried a gross value of \$2,000, the winner's net share being \$1,440. Fifteen were originally named to go, but Messenger Boy, Milton G., Princess Callaway, Joe Morris, White Wool and Governor Gray declined the issue. The absence of the last named from the race was disappointing to many who had gone to the track expressly to witness his performance. The reason given for his failure to start was that he had shipped badly from Fort Erie and had not arrived at the track until noon. Ocean Bound and Countess were held in greatest favor by the bettors, while Star Charter and Nimbus also came in for a fair share of speculative attention. Round the World was lucky at the start, getting away fully in her stride and her early flight of speed enabled her to secure a commanding lead and remain clear of interference. Jockey Thomas steadied her after rounding the upper turn, but when pressed by Nimbus and Countess, set her down again and she continued in the van throughout. The struggle for second place was always between Nimbus and Countess after Ocean Bound had dropped out of it in the first half and Countess outstayed Nimbus in the closing drive. Star Charter ran a splendid race. Off last and bumped by Polls, he was a distant trailer, but closed an immense gap to finish in fourth place. The running of King's Daughter in this race marked her last racing performance. Her owner, T. C. McDowell, announced after the race that she would be forthwith retired from the turf for all time. She will be sent to Ashland Farm ultimately to enter the stud.

Today's torrid weather detracted from the enjoyment of the racing and caused intense discomfort to the big gathering of spectators. The only cool place within the enclosure was the betting ring, where numerous electric fans exercised an alleviating effect. The betting portion of the attendance again suffered losses by the failure of the best-backed horses to finish as expected. The chief disappointments of the afternoon were Mary Emily, Buckhorn, Follie Levy, Countess, Forehead and Fort Johnson. Buckhorn was regarded as the best betting proposition of the day, but he readily succumbed to Presumption. Follie D. proved by a decisive victory over Follie Levy that her recent victory in the Brewster's Exchange Handicap was not a fluke. She carried even weights with the Odum filly this afternoon and led for the entire trip to win as her rider pleased.

The inconsistent Stone Street again ran to his best form and made the good band of platers that started in the closing order, as usual. Ida May taking second place and Queen Marguerite third. Jockey Obert had his left leg badly injured as a result of coming in contact with the fence while astride Gagnant in the opening race. His mount was caught in a jam soon after the start.

Messrs. H. K. Knapp and F. R. Hitchcock returned today to New York but announced that they would probably return here to witness the running of the Cincinnati Trophy on Saturday next. Praetorian was withdrawn from the opening race, because of a slight lameness and will probably be rested until the following week. Today's speculation was heavy and those successful in picking winners were rewarded with good odds. Jockey Taplin rode today with his face liberally covered with courtplaster, having sustained the injuries in a mysterious attack last Sunday. Several of his teeth were knocked out by a stone thrown by an unknown person.

LIABILITY LAW MAY BE REPEALED.

Albany, N. Y., July 4.—It is now intimated that Governor Dix will not sign both of Senator Gittins' race track bills now before the Senate in the event of their passage. But he is likely to sign the amendment to the so-called "directors' liability law," which holds stockholders and officials of race tracks responsible for any violations of the laws that take place on the grounds with or without their sanction. Governor Dix seems to have an idea, say senators, that the bill defining bookmaking contains a "joker," which would permit wide open bookmaking on the tracks. For that reason he is not willing to sign the bill, they say. If it is passed, on the other hand Governor Dix seems favorable to the passage of the bill which would relieve the officials from responsibility for violations of the gambling laws committed within racing enclosures.

Antagonists of racing in this state have been telling the fair associations that their directors cannot get into the toils under the liability law so long as they do not permit "bookmaking." Because of this information some of the fairs have announced that they do not desire a repeal of the directors' liability law as proposed by one of the Gittins bills. As a matter of fact fair directors as well as those operating the Jockey Club tracks can be arrested and indicted if so much as a single private bet between individuals is made on their grounds. The law as it is written makes no mention of "bookmaking," but is explicit regarding so-called "betting." Leading patrons of the turf seem to think that Governor Dix may be willing to sign the bill modifying the liability law, in which event the tracks can re-open. But they appear to believe that the other Gittins bill defining the meaning of the term "bookmaking without writing" will not be passed at this session of the Legislature. Eminent attorneys say that "bookmaking without writing" if put to a test would easily be picked to pieces in the courts and that private individual wagers would be declared legal.—New York Sun.

CASTOFFS THAT DEVELOPED INTO STARS.

The winning of the Grand Steeplechase at Auteuil in Paris by Blagueur II., with his stable companion Cheshire Cat second, is a striking instance of insight in buying. Edmund Veil-Picard bought Blagueur II. as training companion to Binon, and when the latter's successful career was over he wished to get rid of Blagueur II., but found no one willing to give the modest price of \$1,600. His brother, Arthur Veil-Picard, was struck by the possibilities of the horse and bought him at this figure and he has since won over \$120,000 with him. Cheshire Cat is a pie-nose, blind in one eye, crooked-legged and looking as if he could not stand up. Arthur Carter bought him for \$1,400, and when a veterinary ad-

vised him to get rid of the horse as soon as possible, Carter put him in a \$400 selling race, which he lost, and then sold him for \$800 to Wallace Davis. After winning several that races the American trainer sold him to Arthur Veil-Picard, who put him to the hurdles under Davis' training, and since that time he has scarcely been beaten except by his stable companion, Blagueur II.

HENRY KLAIR DIES AT LEXINGTON.

Lexington, Ky., July 4.—Henry M. Klair, aged 38, a follower of the turf well known on every race course in this country, died here this morning of brain fever, caused by a fall from a street car last Thursday night.

"DUKE OF GLOUCESTER" IS DEAD.

William J. Thompson, who long held sway in New Jersey when racing flourished in that state, and who was widely known as the "Duke of Gloucester," died last week at his birthplace near Belfast, Ireland, whither he went to recuperate following an ordeal in the bankruptcy courts.

Taboo and Star O'Ryan have been released from starter Cassidy's schooling list at Latoria.

J. B. Haggin has added the ninety-three acres of the George K. Graves farm to Elmendorf Farm, near Lexington, Ky., and now has more than 7,000 acres in his holdings there.

Governor John A. Dix of New York, it is reported, is being deluged by telegrams urging him to give his approval to the Giffins bills, designed to relieve the racing situation in New York state.

The piece of plate which the Latoria Jockey Club will this year provide for the winner of the Cincinnati Trophy will be a replica of the cup originally provided for this important juvenile race by former mayor Julius Fleischmann of Cincinnati. It will be a splendid specimen of the silversmith's art. These features of the design which symbolize the purposes for which the cup was intended are all cast in bold relief and are extremely heavy. The front panel of the cup shows a beautifully executed horse's head surrounded by a horse shoe, both cast in solid gold, and stand in striking contrast to the background of gray silver in which the rest of the cup is finished. Beneath the horse's head and shoe appears the inscription in large letters: "Cincinnati Trophy for two-year-olds." The three handles represent the cornstalk, suggestive of Kentucky, the home of famous thoroughbreds, and between each handle are etched in relief in ornamental letters appropriate inscriptions. Ornamentations of oats embellish the base.
