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NO VOTE ON GITTINS BILL

FRIENDS OF MEASURE DECIDE TO DEFER FINAL ACTION IN ASSEMBLY. Vote May Come Today or Measure May Go Over Until September, When New York Legislature Is Scheduled to Meet Again After Recess.

New York, July 21.—After a canvass of the Assembly today the friends of the Gittins bill decided not to attempt to pass it, as its defeat would mean that it could not be brought up again at the present session.

The Gittins bill was passed in the Senate Wednesday by a Democratic-Republican combination, six Republicans voting for it and ten Democrats against it.

The vote on final passage was: Ayes—Black, Cronin, Cullen, Duhamel, Frawley, Gittins, Grady, Griffin, Harden, Harte, McClelland, McManus, O'Brien, Ramsperger, Santer, Saxe, Stillwell, C. D. Sullivan, T. D. Sullivan, White, Democrats, and Allen, Argetsinger, Brackett, Emerson, Ormond and Sage, Republicans.

Senator Thomas Grady, of New York City, started the successful effort to have the bill passed in the upper branch of the Legislature. Crowds waited about the Senate chamber all day expecting the bill to be reached, and a delegation of citizens from Saratoga, insisting that their businesses would be ruined if the bill was not passed, were nervously awaiting the result, and went home tickled with it.

Senator Grady's motion to take the Gittins bill from the table was adopted after a debate by a vote of ayes 28, noes 18. A subsequent motion of Senator Grady to reconsider the vote by which the Gittins bill was lost last week was then adopted by a vote of ayes 28, noes 22.

In changing his vote on the proposition Senator Griffin said that he believed the Legislature should give the racing associations at Saratoga, Jamaica Bay and at Sheepshead Bay for the balance of this season a chance to demonstrate their good faith in prohibiting gambling. He felt it was no more than fair to see if they would live up to their contention that the Gittins bill was not "lowering the bars" to permit gambling.

Senator Newcomb opened the discussion upon the bill reviewing the argument when the bill was defeated last week. "A legal argument can be made for this bill, I'll admit," said Senator Newcomb, "but practically it will tie the hands of the prosecuting officers so far as race track gambling is concerned. If racing officials would refuse gamblers and bookmakers permission to enter the race tracks racing in this state would be built up. Then this bill would not be necessary. We once had an inspector of police in New York who kept marked men out of the city without the aid of law simply by telling them he would not permit them to be around the city. The race track officials can do the same with the bookmakers, and if they were not on the tracks, the public gambling and the racing officials need not be in fear of criminal prosecution for permitting gambling."

Senator Ormond (Rep. of Monroe) said: "If I thought for a moment that the enactment of the Gittins bill would restore gambling on the race tracks I would oppose it to the bitter end, because no one is more opposed to gambling than I am. "But while I do oppose gambling I am not opposed to legitimate horse racing, and I like to see good horses. In fact, I am a breeder in a small way myself, and would like to see New York State bred horses lead the thoroughbred van. In our desire to end race track gambling we have gone so far, however, as to all but bring horse racing and breeding of thoroughbred horses in New York State. Impelled, as I believe, by mistaking noise for popular sentiment we have enacted laws so despotic as to close all race tracks and discourage further breeding of thoroughbred horses."

"Under the law as it stands today if a wager were made between two gentlemen upon the result of a race, and that fact came to the attention of the authorities, a director of a racing association, although in Europe and possessing absolutely no knowledge of the wager, is liable to indictment and subject to a prison sentence if convicted. Indeed, the law goes further and would permit indictment of a director of a hotel corporation, a club or any other incorporated body if a game of poker were played on its premises, despite the fact that such a director might not be within 1,000 miles of the place. That is unfair, uncalled for, unwise and unnecessarily drastic legislation."

"So long as it remains upon our statute books the directors of race tracks, and wisely, too, in my judgment, will not open their tracks to races. I believe that the majority of the people of New York State are in favor of horse racing under proper restrictions. This bill makes it necessary to prove a director of a racing association must have had guilty knowledge of gambling on the tracks before he can be indicted or convicted. To me this looks like a fair, common-sense proposition."

"The only thing we do by the Gittins bill," said Senator Grady, "is to put the law back where it was three years ago regarding directors and officers of racing associations."

Senator Wainwright interrupted Senator Grady to inquire if Senator Grady believed the provision of law sought to be amended meant that any officer or director of a racing association could be prosecuted criminally even if he did not have knowledge of gambling on the tracks.

THIRTY LEADING MONEY-WINNING OWNERS OF 1911

Last year S. C. Hildreth was the leading American winning owner and it is more than probable that he will hold the same position at the end of this year's racing. But whereas he was then lucky enough to amass the big sum of \$152,645 in stable earnings, it is now questionable whether he can reach the \$60,000 mark. Had New York racing been resumed it would have been a different story, no doubt. Other owners find the possibility of stable earnings curtailed also, but there are some who have no reason to complain of results. T. C. McJowell, R. N. Smith, W. McLemore, Gallaher Bros., P. M. Walker, T. R. Condran, A. Simons and several others have already won more than they did in all of 1910 and naturally should think well of 1911 as a racing year. With the big stakes of last year it is painfully different. Here is how the stable accounts of the thirty leaders of this year now stand:

"and that suggestion was made and Senator Gittins said he would accept it when this bill was before the Codes Committee. It was urged then that the bill be amended to read that any officer or director who knowingly permits gambling should be prosecuted criminally. That would have been a fair and more sensible proposition. But no, the very reverend clergy, including Canon Chase, objected to that word being put in the bill."

Senator Grady said Senator Wainwright knew perfectly well that it was too late now at the tail end of the session to amend the bill to this effect, because any sort of amendment at this period would kill the bill.

He insisted that the racing directors and officers were men of high repute in their communities, men who would not let down the bars to bookmaking and whose word on any proposition was worth millions of dollars.

"Refuse to pass this bill," said Senator Grady, "and you will find that it not only puts horse racing out of business and will send to England all of our fine horses and kill the great sport in our land, but that you will put every grocer, every lawyer and every other man and woman in this state in a position exactly similar to the race track officials. You can prosecute a lawyer for criminal responsibility if you find somebody playing cards for money in his office, no matter how ignorant the lawyer may be of the fact, and you can also prosecute every other man in whose office or home any kind of a gambling game goes on."

Senator Wainwright said he was willing to vote for a bill that the directors should not be held liable unless they had knowledge, and Senator Grady said it was too late to do this now. Senator Wainwright said such an amendment should be inserted in the law and that the governor could be asked for an emergency message, and if he refused the Legislature could remain in session a few days longer than intended in order to permit the bill to be reprinted three days.

"I intend to offer such an amendment," concluded Senator Wainwright. "Oh, don't hand us such a sugar coated amendment at this late hour," laughed Senator Grady. "It seems plain," said Senator Gittins, "that the opponents of this bill are willing to descend to a trick to defeat this bill."

"This amendment was prepared by me without consultation with any one," insisted Senator Wainwright. "This is the easiest thing," said Senator Hinman, "that has yet come over. All you have to do is to get dummy directors of a race track in Europe and you never can show knowledge of gambling on the track. But I am going to vote for the amendment, nevertheless, because it would mean the killing of the bill."

Senator Wainwright's amendment was defeated, ayes, 4, noes, 42. Senator McClelland of Manhattan severely criticized the clergymen who were opposing the bill. "It would be a nice thing if some one injected a gambling game into a Methodist conference," said Senator McClelland, "and then had the whole conference arrested, wouldn't it? I don't say such a thing would happen, but it is one of the absurd possibilities under the law at present."

Senator McClelland said he took a back seat from no one so far as his religious principles were concerned, that his father was a minister and that \$25,000 of his father's money had gone to foreign missions.

"But this bill is a fair and square proposition," he added, "and ought to pass." Senator O'Brien said he came from a district which contained many race tracks, and that he was in a position to intelligently judge the merits of the Gittins bill, and would support it.

BUSY DAY FOR HALTER MEN

LIVELY BIDDING MARKS DECISION OF SELLING RACES AT WINDSOR. Three Runups Enrich Association Considerably and Several Horses Change Hands—Nimbus Wins a Purse for Former Jockey Odum.

Detroit, Mich., July 21.—Today's program at Windsor was devoted in the main to selling races. While the fields lacked quality still they were evenly balanced and keen contests resulted. The "halter men" who have been exceedingly active on the Canadian circuit this season were again in the limelight. Three of the afternoon's winners were advanced and one of them changed hands. After Ta Nun Da had won the third race J. W. Flynn ran him up to \$1,500 and secured him at that figure. This was an advance of \$700 over the entered price. The next boost came after Light O' M' Life made a runaway victory of the fifth race, a dash of five and a half furlongs, for two-year-olds, in which the Schor entry, Jawbone, ran second. Light O' M' Life was entered at \$500 and Albert Simons, who trains Jawbone, ran the colt up to \$1,605, at which figure J. W. May retained him for his owner, Frederick Johnson. S. C. Hildreth then claimed Jawbone out of the race for \$1,010. May and his connections are reported as having won a big wager over Light O' M' Life's victory. After Arcite won the seventh race many gathered about the judges' stand, expecting a runup. They were not disappointed, as S. C. Hildreth stepped out and promptly carried the Carman horse from \$500 to \$900. He was bought in by his owner, Mr. Carman then claimed Compton, which finished second. The runup money during the afternoon totaled \$2,310.

Herman Flippen won his first purse of the season when Prince beat a poor lot of jumpers in the steeplechase. George Odum took another purse when Nimbus galloped home an easy winner in the fourth race, a dash of one mile.

A special horse train will leave here tomorrow night for Fort Erie. The following stables will be shipped on that train: August Belmont, E. E. Watkins, R. T. Wilson, A. G. Weston, R. F. Carman and Joseph E. Seagram. S. C. Hildreth will ship his string to Fort Erie on Monday and the Valley Farm Stable will go from here to Hamilton.

Oscar Holder received a telegram from Francis J. Pons this morning asking that all horsemen be informed that a ninety-days meeting would be given at Charleston next winter. It is the purpose of Messrs. Pons and his associates to construct a modern racing plant at Charleston and to give a high-class meeting. Liberal purses will be distributed and about forty stakes will be given during the meeting. The list of officials have not as yet been announced, but first-class men will be employed in the different departments. This is certainly good news for horsemen, for with Juarez, Havana and Charleston in operation, there will be plenty of winter racing.

Jockey Sweeney was suspended for two days by the starter, which accounted for his absence from the saddle this afternoon. The Windsor management announced today that no purse of less value than \$500 would be offered for its next meeting. Messrs. Parmer and Hendrie are doing their utmost to elevate the tone of the sport here.

The program for the closing day was made up of eight races. One of them, a \$600 condition affair, failed to fill and Mr. Hendrie then instructed the secretary to offer a \$1,000 handicap, for three-year-olds, at one mile and a quarter. When John Whalen entered the Belmont colt, Watervale, it frightened out other owners, and only three were nominated. The result was that this race, too, was declared off.

Horsemen who are stopping at Mt. Clemens report that Gene Elrod has improved rapidly during the past two weeks. He will remain at the springs a fortnight longer and will be in good condition for the fall meetings in Kentucky.

Dr. Graydon, who was threatened with blindness as a result of a gun shot wound last winter, is recovering the sight of one his eyes. He will be remembered by race-goers as trainer of Duke of Middleburg, winner of the Carter Handicap at Aqueduct in 1899 and later as trainer for John H. Madigan.

Jockey J. Henry had his first mount following his reinstatement when he rode The Golden Butterfly in the third race. Henry has signed a contract to ride for John W. Flynn. The contract, which runs to November 1, has been approved by the committee of the Canadian Racing Associations.

Jockey Yourell, who had the mount on Dr. Heard in the steeplechase, suffered a broken collar bone and also a broken arm as a result of his fall from that horse at the second fence.

Louis Martine has disposed of a half interest in Grasmere to J. W. Burtshell and the horse will be handled by Mr. Burtshell in future. Previous came out of his last race sore and will be rested for a couple of weeks. His next start probably will be at Hamilton.

AMBITION PLANS FOR HAVANA RACING.

Havana, Cuba, July 21.—H. D. Brown intends that the new track which he is building here and which will open for a winter meeting of high class on Thanksgiving day, shall be the best of all the racing plants that he has built. The track itself will be located on the outskirts of Havana, the loveliest and liveliest of all the cities of the Antilles—a city that within the past five years probably has attracted more tourists than any other in North America. It is a sparkling city, with ample hotel accommodations and a street car and cab service that could scarcely be duplicated. For years some of the wealthiest and best citizens desired a race meeting, but would not tolerate any that did not measure up to their ideals. They wanted good horses, grounds that would practically be a private park, and strict regulation. This is what they are promised at the new track.

The transportation will be especially convenient. Street cars will run to the main entrance, and from the center of the city to the club enclosure in the Grand Prada—a macadam boulevard, sixty feet wide, skirting the shores of the gulf, over which automobiles and carriages may go.

The course will be of the regulation mile type, with a six-furlong chute for the sprint races and a half-mile chute over which the two-year-olds may settle the question of supremacy. There will be 1,500 stalls, in barn sections of thirty, each of which will be equipped with electricity.

The stakes have already been mapped out. There will be a topine stake of \$10,000, which probably will be the feature for the opening day, a Derby of \$10,000, and others ranging in value from \$1,500 to \$5,000. Mr. Brown has engaged four large steamships to transport horses and horsemen to Havana and return at a rate less than one-third the usual fare. They will depart from New York, Jacksonville and other points that may be most convenient for horsemen. The trip is a short and pleasant one and Cuba will be seen at its best. The climate is ideal for man and horse, and Havana, for the past five years, has been one of the most sanitary and healthful of cities.

HORSEMEN WILL BE GIVEN REPRESENTATION.

Spokane, Wash., July 21.—Horsemen who come here to race during the inaugural meeting of the Coeur d'Alene Fair and Racing Association will be invited to select two members of the board of stewards that will supervise the racing at the Alamo track. The new course will be entirely completed within two weeks, according to W. W. Finn, superintendent of construction, when a large contingent of British Columbia horses are expected to take up quarters at the track preparatory to the opening.

Frank St. D. Skinner, who will serve as handicapper and judge, is expected here Sunday for a conference with the Coeur d'Alene Fair and Racing Association's officials.

General Manager Shelton and Steward Hildenbrandt of the Coeur d'Alene Association have gone to Butte to make a canvass of horsemen now racing there in the interest of the approaching meeting.

BUTTE LAYERS HAVE PROFITABLE DAY.

Butte, Mont., July 21.—Although a program of inferior quality was down for decision today, it did not affect the attendance, which was up to the daily average. Form, however, was at a discount, not one of the public selections being able to finish in front and the ring in consequence recouped to an appreciable extent their recent losses. The defeats of Elsewhere, Lochiel and Dell were hard blows to the talent. At the conclusion of the fourth race W. B. Carson claimed Judge Quinn from H. G. Bedwell for \$1,275. On account of the inconsistent running of the horse Prince Winter, his future entry was ordered refused by the judges.

AMERICAN IMPRESSIONS OF RACING ABROAD.

New York, July 21.—"Skater" Reynolds, who was in the employ of John W. Gates as a betting commissioner when that capitalist was cutting a swath on the eastern turf, has just returned from Europe, where he saw some of the racing in England, France, Germany and Austria. He gave his impressions of some of the things that struck him forcibly while abroad as follows: "You know they do not bet as much money on a race over there as we used to bet here at Sheepshead Bay and Saratoga. I know that J. B. Joel sent a man into the ring to bet a thousand pounds on Sunstar for the Derby at 6 to 5, and he had to go to twenty-two books to get it down. I bet \$88,000 on one horse at Saratoga some years ago, the majority of it at 6 to 5, I got it all on. Of course, there is a lot of betting in England long before a big event comes off over there and that makes some difference. Yes, I have handled some big bets in my time, and on one occasion I had a commission from Mr. Gates to bet \$100,000 on Colonel Girl, which beat Hermis in the big World's Fair Handicap at St. Louis. "I saw a lot of racing over there and I think the course at Berlin is the finest in the world. There is a magnificent clubhouse and quarters for royalty and their friends, at a stiff price, with other places for those of lesser degree, and they really take their positions cheerfully. In England it's a guinea to the grandstand, but these general visitors to the course only bet on the lawn in limited degree. Tattersall's of course, is of a bigger figure, two guineas being the price on Derby Day. "I'll tell you something," he continued, "Sir Martin is the best horse we ever sent to England. I saw his Derby failure. I watched the race through strong glasses, and in my mind there is no question but that he would have beaten his field easily with a fair chance. This year he never gets an ounce off. He is given the absolute top weight in every big event in which he is entered. Still I do not believe that Sir Martin likes the turf course. He was trained and tried as a two-year-old on the dirt track, and there's a vast difference. I do not know that we ever sent more than two good horses to England in the last decade, and these were Cap and Belis and Sir Martin. There's still the same old prejudice against the American horse going to England and winning the big stakes, but their horses have been trained and raced on the turf for centuries, and over here with us it is entirely different. "But the American who wins over there and establishes himself properly becomes a favorite. Take the instance of jockey Danny Maher, who has them all beaten when it comes to race riding. He is not only the kingpin of the riders in England, but all over the continent. I saw Jimmy McCormick in Germany and he certainly has a great horse in Daniello, which won the Austrian Derby. There's so much size, coupled with speed, in these horses you see racing for the big events over there that you are compelled to give it to them."

IMPROVEMENTS AT CHURCHILL DOWNS.

Louisville, Ky., July 21.—Many improvements have been begun on the grounds of the New Louisville Jockey Club at Churchill Downs that will be pushed to completion before the opening of the fall race meeting in September. The fence running from the clubhouse around the turn to the quarter post has been torn away, exposing to view the row of stables behind the old high fence and improving the view of that part of the track from the grandstand.

Superintendent Keegan has raised the track all around on the inside after doing a lot of top soiling and he is lowering the field on the lower end of the backstretch, where a hedge now stands, so it will be possible to stand on the ground anywhere near the stand, betting ring and paddock and see every bit of the racing. The long stable adjoining the paddock will be removed to a point below the clubhouse on the upper turn and the size of the paddock inclosure materially increased.

The last relic of Col. M. Lewis Clark's regime, the picturesque clubhouse on the backstretch, now in an advanced stage of decay, will shortly be entirely removed and in its place will be erected a handsome modern cottage for the use of the track superintendent and his family. One of the most important improvements proposed is the enlarging of the brick lawn in front of the grandstand and betting ring. Ultimately it will be extended out fifteen feet, and the part taken from the back of the grandstand will be borrowed from the smaller inside track. When this is done the homestretch will be somewhat narrower, but the first turn will be widened considerably, an improvement which will tend to avoid crowding as the horses make the turn. The inside track may finally be sown to bluegrass with the idea of providing a turf course.

HORSES AT LONG ISLAND TRACKS.

New York, July 21.—Almost 200 horses are in training at the various Long Island tracks. At present there are thirty-seven stabled at Gravesend, there having been some depletion recently by shipments to Saratoga. John Hynes, the veteran turfman, has his lot there, old Rye among others. Charles Kohler's horses are also in training over the Brooklyn track, and Master Robert bids fair to come back a wonderfully good horse. Chickasaw and Herodia are others in the Kohler string. Con Leighton is handling the Mr. Earle string, and the Thomas Monahan horses are also quartered there. Others are the strings of William Keating, J. L. McGinnis, John Mayberry, the Quincy Stable, Matt Allen, J. H. Valentine and several others.

The stables at Sheepshead Bay include the horses of Frank Frisbie, James R. Keene, Sam Booker, Wells Clark, Dr. Ashe and Ed Peters. The James R. Keene horses are in charge of Green, a colored trainer, who for several seasons was foreman for James Rowe, when the latter trained the horses of the Castleton Stud. James Rowe is now at Brookdale, where he has charge of an immense string belonging to H. P. Whitney. August Belmont has an even dozen in his own barn at Belmont Park, while another string, in charge of John Whalen, is campaigning over the Canadian circuit. Silas Veitch is training sixteen jumpers, the property of various owners. Grant Hugh Browne has six horses being trained by him. Mr. Browne only recently returned from Europe. C. F. Clark has the Alan Pinkerton horses in his care and there are many others that are fit and ready for the bugle call.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

W. K. Vanderbilt's Belfast finished third in the Prix Carline of 2,000 francs at Tremblay in France Wednesday. Mr. Vanderbilt's Balmoid, ridden by O'Neill, won the Prix Bougie of 4,000 francs.

There will be a nineteen-day meeting at Muskogee, Okla., beginning August 5. E. C. Smith will preside and Arthur McKnight will do the starting. After that there will be fair meetings in Kansas and Oklahoma, which will afford the horses now in the southwest opportunities for racing throughout the fall.
