HEAVY GOING AT COLUMBIA

RAIN GIVES MUD RUNNERS A CHANCE AT SOUTH CAROLINA COURSE.

Horses Quoted at Liberal Odds in Betting Cut Considerable Figure in Day's Results—Presiding Steward Nathanson After Rough Riders.

Columbia, S. C., December 15.—Unfavorable weather again reduced the attendance and detracted from the interest in today's racing at the Fair Grounds. Changed track conditions came as a result of a copious rain last night and racers that are favored by soft going were the main contenders at the finish of the different races. Upsets were frequent, most of the winners being held at liberal odds. The steeplechase over the short course resulted in victory for Emiskillen, the favorite, with Sam Ball in second place and Dr. Heard third. The Speaker furnished the main incident of the race by his refusal to take the ninth hedge while leading his field. Sam Ball loomed as the likely winner after The Speaker's elimination, but tired unexpectedly in the stretch.

Stanley Kunz, of Chicago, after persistent efforts, broke into the list of winning owners when Dunc Campbell scored in the fifth race. His margin was only a nose over Warner Griswell, with Tippy close up in third place. Dunc Campbell's success was profitable to his connections, for he had been backed from 12 to 1 to 7 to 1.

Martin Nathanson, who is looking after the Charleston stake entries here, reports that owners have responded liberally to their nominations. The stakes will close tomorrow.

Sid Cohen displaced Charlie Walters in the betting ring today, which kept six layers in line posting the prices.

Jockey Gordon has shown little improvement since he was taken to the hospital and the doctors are beginning to entertain grave fears regarding him.

Charley Quinn, who is interested in the stable racing in the name of Frederick Johnson, was one of the arrivals from New York this morning. Mr. Quinn's mission to South Carolina is to secure quarters at Charleston for the winter. He stopped here to take in a bit of racing, but will leave for Charleston tomorrow night.

Steward Nathanson gave the jockeys to understand that he would not tolerate further rough riding. Ambrose was the first to offend and was suspended for one week. Edwards was suspended for four days by the starter.

Benny Myers, who at one time was associated with J. M. Cooper in the ownership of a stable of racers, was responsible for the bidding on Montague after the latter won the sixth race. Myers advanced the horse \$100 over his entered price of \$200, but Mr. Cooper retained him by the usual advance of \$5.

Dr. N. S. Adams of Wilkesbarre, Pa., whose winter home is in Columbia, has decided to go in for steeplechasing. He maintains a large string of hunters and is a member of several hunt clubs in South Carolina. Chattanooga, an eight-year-old gelding by Leobach, has been turned over to one of the trainers here to be schooled for steeplechasing.

John Howard arrived today from Chicago. Advice today from Lexington, Ky., announced the death of Oscar Lewis, a one-time noted colored rider. Lewis did his best riding while under contract to Prince McGrath and had the distinction of riding Aristides to victory in the first Kentucky Derby, run in 1875. He also scored notable victories on Tom Bowling and won the Monmouth Cup with Aaron Pennington and the Jersey Derby on Calvin. Interment will take place in Lexington.

COONEY ISLAND JOCKEY CLUB PLANS.

Futurity to Be Run at Some Other Course if Sheephead Bay Track Is Sold.

New York, December 15.—Concerning the report that the Sheephead Bay race track is likely to change hands shortly, Secretary V. E. Schaumburg of the Coney Island Jockey Club admitted today that there were negotiations under way looking to the sale of the track, but he said positively that up to this time no sale had been made. The sale of the property, he said, "would not mean the dissolution of the Coney Island Jockey Club. The club has been under tremendous expense carrying its plant with no adequate return, and it is for that reason that an effort was made to have the assessment on the buildings, which have been absolutely useless all season, cancelled."

"As far as the obligations with the horsemen are concerned, they will be kept if the conditions will permit. Futurities are provided for 1912, 1913 and the race of 1914 is to close January 2. It would not be necessary for the Coney Island Jockey Club to have a track of its own on which to run off these races. If racing is possible and the track has been sold in the meantime the races will be run over some other course."

W. K. Vanderbill is the principal owner of the Sheephead Bay race course. He is at present in Paris, where he headed the list of winning owners on the French turf for the season just completed. Though he has taken an active interest in the conduct of the Coney Island Jockey Club he has for years confined his racing efforts to France.

GOSSIP FROM BLUE GRASS REGION.

Lexington, Ky., December 15.—The meeting of the directors of the Kentucky Association called for today was postponed indefinitely because of the inability of President Catesby Woodford to be present. Trial of the suit of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company for \$25,000 damages because of the death of three thoroughbred horses and injury to others in transit will be called in the Circuit Court Monday.

G. W. J. Bissell announced today that his yearlings will be shipped from here to Charleston, S. C., on January 2 and that Wayne Lewis, who is now at Columbia, and who has been re-engaged by Mr. Bissell as trainer, will be at Charleston to receive them.

David Look, the new owner of Castleton Farm, was here today and made formal acceptance of the deed which was lodged for record. From today the expense of maintenance will be borne by Mr. Look, though Major Foxhall A. Daingerfield will continue in charge of the place until January 1, when Mr. Look will take actual possession. Beginning with today, all of James R. Keene's thoroughbred stallions, mares and foals of 1911 are to be boarded by Mr. Look until Mr. Keene otherwise disposes of them.

STAKE WINNING JOCKEYS OF 1911

With one or two unimportant exceptions, the stake races of 1911 have been run and the year's record of stake winning jockeys furnishes a striking illustration of the woeful shrinkage in American stake values consequent upon the suspension of New York racing. The New York tracks were always depended upon to provide the bulk of important American racing events and the elimination of such great fixtures as the Belmont Stakes, the Metropolitan Handicap, the Brooklyn Handicap, the Brighton Handicap, the Suburban Handicap, the Futurity Stakes, the Matron Stakes, the Double Event, the Saratoga Special, the Grand Union Hotel Stakes and the National Stallion Race, to say nothing of numerous other stakes of greater or less value and renown than some of those enumerated, leaves a void that reduces the stake showing of 1911 to a mere shadow as compared with the substance of preceding years. The record for 1910 in this respect was lean enough, to be sure, but that for 1911 is decidedly worse.

Last year C. H. Shilling headed the list of stake winning jockeys, with a total of thirty-two stake victories, representing an aggregate value of \$110,265. This year the distinction of leadership in this respect goes to E. Dugan, whose record is nine stake victories, entailing a total value of only \$19,920. C. H. Shilling is second, with fourteen events, worth \$19,700. Virtually all the stake successes of both of these leaders were achieved on Canadian tracks. SUNSHINE SUCCEEDS SNOW

NORMAL CONDITIONS PERMIT ENJOYMENT OF GOOD RACING AT JUAREZ.

Closer Keeps Up His Winning Streak and Beats Good Opposition in Feature Contest—Two Jockeys Suspended for Rough Riding Collision.

El Paso, Tex., December 15.—Bright skies and a warm sunny day followed yesterday's snow flurries, and there was a large attendance at Juarez this afternoon, the fair sex being especially well represented.

Good, clean and hotly contested racing well repaid those that made the journey across the international boundary line.

The feature race, an allowance affair, at six furlongs, was won by that sterling two-year-old, Closer. He overtook Oakland early in the racing, and won in clean fashion from Coppertown and Harrigan. The youngster showed a disposition to run out in the stretch, losing much ground thereby, but Selden soon straightened him away and, responding gamely to urging, he crossed the finish line with a two and a half lengths' advantage. The race was marred by rough riding, as Carter, on Oakland, cut across in front of Harrigan in rounding the turn into the stretch and forced the latter to pull up, thereby losing all chance. As Carter indulged in the rough riding at the instigation of Selden, who called out to him to do so, the stewards suspended both boys for five days.

State Senators Cullen, Murtha and Fooley and Assemblyman Yates, of New York, together with Mrs. Frawley, wife of the father of the New York boxing law, were visitors at the Juarez track today. They are en route to New York from San Francisco, where they have been in connection with the selection of a site for the New York building for the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

J. T. Strite bid up Thistle Belle from \$400 to \$850, but C. P. Lamar retained her.

Jockey T. Rice is due to arrive here within a day or two from Chicago.

Eugene Krump, who created a furor on the Intermountain circuit last summer and finally was suspended at Coeur d'Alene, attempted to pass the gates this afternoon and was denied admission.

HILDRETH HORSES KEPT GALLOPING.

New York, December 15.—Samuel C. Hildreth left Sheephead Bay on Tuesday for Aiken, S. C., where he will spend a few weeks on a hunting expedition. Mrs. Hildreth accompanied her husband, and she will visit her sister, Mrs. Frank M. Taylor. Fitz Herbert, Zeus, Novelty, Restigouche, Hampton Court, Shannon, Cliff Creek, Puggins, Gold Blade, Chickasaw, Dinna Ken and the yearling colts by Voter, Broomstick and The Scribe in the Kohler string under Mr. Hildreth's care, are doing famously since going into retirement for the winter season. The older horses in the collection are getting a daily gallop of four miles. The open weather has given every opportunity to send them along smartly, and they will be kept at such exercise as long as the weather permits. A straw ride that affords good footing has been laid under the long enclosed shed and this will be used during inclement spells. Mr. Hildreth's plater is making a large number of racing plates without toes or calks, such as are used on the turf courses of England, which is, of course, another indication of the preparations for the shipment of Mr. Kohler's horses abroad.

A FRENCH VIEW OF ENGLISH RACING.

One of France's noted turf writers, whose nom de plume is Passaro, has been telling his readers of his experience of English racing as seen at Newmarket.

Passaro has something to say about the strict business of racing from the point of view of Newmarket. He dwells on the magnificence of the many courses—"you could put a dozen Longchamps on Newmarket without crowding" is one of his comments—the bold, broad, rolling saloons straight—and the notable absence of turns—which are so common on the French tracks—but he adds: "But if the course—which really represents the scene—is perfect, the other side of the picture is not so alluring. Here at Newmarket we are far from those impressive classic structures, those 'snail's paths' of our incomparable Longchamps. Here, flowers, no relief. The useful excludes the agreeable; one feels that the English do not go racing to amuse themselves—the equipment of Newmarket leaves no doubt of that."

A Frenchman—accustomed to the quiet of his own race-course, with the noiseless system of investments at the "pari-mutuel"—would easily be staggered by "Tattersall's." "In that ring," he states, "reigns shrieking, bustling and bewilderment. It is only the place for the strongest of the strong. Our fair punters would never have ventured there; for it would be at the risk of losing not only plumes, but hats, curls and every scrap of finery. There is a little exaggeration in all this, but an English commentator admits that "Tatt's" is sometimes a disgrace to a respectable community, for such jostling as goes on among those who rush about the ring would not be tolerated elsewhere.

With all the recent English "kicking" against starting, it is worthy of note that the French critic was impressed with the "excellence of the starting at Newmarket." He remarks: "The discipline and order which rules among the jockeys when they range themselves under the machine is admirable, and the task of the starter is naturally simplified. The result is that the majority of the starts are irrefragable."

Concerning the English jockeys, he was struck by the way they managed to keep their horses straight in a big field, but he adds that seems to be their chief "occupation" in a race. He mentions that the Franco-American, Garner, was one of the few whom he saw "bumping"—but he excuses Garner on the score of seasickness. He attributes the failure of English horses, and frequently the lack of merit shown by English jockeys when riding in France, to the fact that the repeated turns on French courses produce "hustling" and both horse and rider have to accustom themselves to circumstances. "It is," he adds, "therefore impossible to pretend to judge the ability of Englishmen when we see them riding in France."

He marvels at the authority of the stewards over jockeys or anybody else, stating that their verdict is accepted as gospel by English race-goers. "Be it the question of a result, the disqualification of a horse, or an infliction of a penalty—there is not the least criticism, the rulings are accepted as dogma. Compare this with our independence of spirit in France." All the same, Passaro is forced to admit that the restraint of a British racing crowd was impressive. He instances the hissing of Borne's Beauty, remarking "there was gravity and method in the two adverse manifestations, but neither lasted much longer than thirty seconds. Our French public would have indulged themselves much longer. The English crowd sometimes have a way of burning stands and molesting officials."
