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HAVRE DE GRACE IS SAFE

MARYLAND COURT OF APPEALS UPHOLDS HARFORD COUNTY RACING COMMISSION. Gives Decision Overruling Attorney-General Poe's Contention That Failure of Commissioners to Qualify Invalidated Act Creating Commission.

Baltimore, Md., November 15.—Governor Goldsborough and Attorney-General Edgar Allan Poe were sweepingly overruled today when the Court of Appeals decided that members of the Harford County Racing Commission did not forfeit their offices by failing to have themselves sworn in within thirty days of the date of their appointment. The opinion was given in connection with the sustaining of a decision by Judge Harlan in the Circuit Court of Harford County. The court also overruled the contention of the attorney-general that the Harford County Racing Commission act is unconstitutional. Today's opinion at Annapolis which was written and read by Judge Briscoe, temporarily ends the governor's fight against the Havre de Grace track. The decision means there will be racing at Havre de Grace for thirty days next year, probably for fifteen days in the spring and fifteen in the fall. The matter reached the Court of Appeals on an appeal taken by Attorney-General Poe from the decision of the Circuit Court of Harford County enjoining the sheriff of that county from interfering with the racing at Havre de Grace. The attorney-general contended in the Harford County hearing that the racing was illegal because the racing commissioners for Harford County, from whom the authority to conduct the Havre de Grace meeting was derived, failed to qualify. It being the attorney-general's contention that the members of the racing commission come under the general provision of the Maryland law requiring all appointive and elective officers to qualify and that failure to qualify vitiated the special act of the legislature creating a racing commission for Harford County and conferring upon it absolute control of racing within its jurisdiction. The Harford County judge did not go into the merits of this contention, but based his ruling upon the broad ground that the acts of the Racing Commission of Harford County were binding because it was a de facto body regardless of whether its members had qualified or not. The sheriff of Harford County, on the advice of counsel had refused to take action looking to the suppression of the racing at the Havre de Grace track and the injunction was obtained by the track management after a large force of Baltimore city policemen, acting under the orders of Governor Goldsborough, had assumed to interfere with betting at the track and had served warrants upon some of the bookmakers, all of whom were speedily discharged without the formality of a trial when the news of the issuance of the injunction reached the track immediately after the arrests were made. Attorney-General Poe then entered the appeal and announced that he would seek to have the highest court in the state pass upon all the questions involved, including the validity of the Harford County Racing Commission act. The matter was argued in the Court of Appeals at great length last month and today's decision settles the matter effectually in favor of the racing interests. As the Maryland Legislature will not meet until February 1, nothing can intervene to prevent the racing at the Havre de Grace track next year except the refusal of the Harford County Racing Commission to grant dates and there is small likelihood of any such action as the commissioners having already served official notice on the promoters of another track which it was proposed to build adjacent to the Harford Agriculture and Breeders' Association course that they might expect no consideration in the matter of dates. It was this that led to the agitation against the Havre de Grace racing this year. Rival politicians are interested in the two racing organizations.

JUAREZ STABLES NOW RAPIDLY FILLING.

Six Hundred Horses Already Quartered at Mexican Course—Kentucky Contingent Delayed a Bit.

El Paso, Tex., November 15.—The big shipment of thoroughbreds from Kentucky to take part in the Juarez meeting, 100 or more days, beginning on Thanksgiving Day, November 28, which left Latonia on Tuesday last, was delayed a trifle on route, but will reach the Juarez track tonight. The past few days have brought arrivals from all parts of the United States for the meeting and there were more than 400 horses quartered in the stables at the Jockey Club Juarez track before the arrival of the Kentucky contingent. Some 200 horses are in the Kentucky shipment and later arrivals will undoubtedly swell the total available for the meeting to at least 700, and perhaps more. This will go far towards assuring a successful meeting. Aside from the consideration of quantity, quality will be well represented. Some 200 followers of racing are coming from Kentucky with the horses that are due tonight. They will find ample accommodations for their winter's sojourn, a new million-dollar hotel having recently been thrown open to the public. There is every reason for believing that the Jockey Club Juarez is about to enter upon the most successful meeting in its history.

The country in the vicinity of the track is in a state of tranquillity for the first time in two years and no interruption menaces the racing as in preceding seasons. It is worth while noting that the interruptions were of no consequence, however, and that the Jockey Club Juarez has always been able to carry out its schedule in spite of the difficulties temporarily encountered this year, all is serene and this condition alone will help to make the meetings more successful than its predecessors. NORFOLK'S BEST MEETING

JAMESTOWN JOCKEY CLUB NOW ENJOYING GREATEST PROSPERITY IN ITS HISTORY. Bashti Equals Track Record of 1:39 3/4 for One Mile in Scoring an Easy Victory in Feature Race of Program That Produces Close Finishes.

Norfolk, Va., November 15.—Norfolk is now having its best race meeting since the Jamestown Jockey Club inaugurated the sport in this part of Virginia. Another large crowd visited the track this afternoon and witnessed some keen sport. Several of the races furnished close finishes and in two of them the winners were first home by the smallest of margins. In the third race less than a length separated the first three horses and in the fifth the first went seven noses and heads apart. Four of the six races found large fields going to the post, but starter Dade succeeded in effecting good starts in all of them.

The feature race, a dash of one mile, gave Bashti another opportunity of showing a flash of the form she displayed in this country as a two-year-old when she was rated as the best of her age in training. Bashti made the lot opposed to her in today's race look cheap. She was ridden by Jockey Butwell. A peculiar thing about this lameness or soreness of Bashti is that she pulls up sounder than when she goes to the post. The ailment is said to be in her chest, which possibly may have been injured in shipment to or from the other side. Bashti ran her mile today in 1:39 3/4, equaling the track record. Chester Krum, an erratic performer at best, was in a running mood this afternoon. He raced to the leaders in the run around the first turn and dropped in behind Haldean until after they had gone half a mile, then drew away and opened up an easy lead. In the stretch racing Butwell had only to sit still and Chester Krum won by a couple of lengths. The race was a selling affair and he was entered to be sold for \$600. He was bid up to \$1,000 by Sam Lons, who secured the horse at that figure. Mondon's handling of Pardon in this race did not please the critical, who complained that the lad did not make the most of the good start he got. Instead, he permitted his mount to drop out of forward contention and at the finish he came with a belated rush.

Two favorites won, Bashti and Union Jack being the successful choices. The first three winners, Sam Hug, Patrick S. and Absconder, were outsiders. Moody was carried as the rider of Takahira in the fifth race, but was taken down and A. Ferguson was substituted. Moody's apprenticeship expired a few days ago, which accounted for the shift made by the officials. Several additional owners got in today. C. Reed, C. Reynolds and the division of the stable that Thomas Fortune Ryan has been racing on the Kentucky tracks came from Latonia this morning. There were ten in Mr. Ryan's lot and a majority of them will be disposed of by private sale during the meeting. The Ryan horses are in charge of Cy. Hughes, the veteran Kentucky trainer. Dave Woodford came over from Washington. He reports that the Beverwyck Stable has gone into winter quarters at the Bonner track. It is just possible, however, that a couple of the horses may be sent to Charleston in January. R. E. Watkins sold Shelby to J. Howard Lewis this morning and the horse has been turned over to M. J. Daly. Shelby is destined for a steeplechase and will be schooled at the Widener farm in Pennsylvania during the winter months.

Jack McGinniss came over from Pimlico with Monty Fox and Sam Jackson. At the conclusion of this meeting these horses will be sent to Gravesend, where they will be wintered. Henry J. Morris, owner of the two-year-old Scallywag, was an arrival from New York. He will remain for the rest of the meeting. H. C. Hallenbeck announced today that his horses would be wintered at the farm he purchases a few weeks ago near Eatontown, N. J. On the completion of a spacious barn that is under course of construction, all of his horses will be shipped from Pimlico to the farm. Frederick L. and Hobnob will be nominated for the Kentucky Derby next spring and the chances are that the stable will be shipped from the farm direct to Churchill Downs in May. There are seven races on the program tomorrow and the management announced that the horses would be called to the post for the first race at 2:15 sharp. A portion of the gate receipts at the Jamestown Jockey Club track today will go to the Norfolk convention fund. No complimentary will be honored at the gate today. Superintendent Miller has already received applications for 165 stalls from horsemen who contemplate wintering here.
