HEADS APART IN HANDICAP

STIRRING FINISH MARKS DECISION OF STAKE RACE AT PALMETTO PARK.

Carlton G., Republican and Lochiel Placed in Order Named—Favorites Make Good Showing in Soft Going.

Charleston, S. C., February 8.—The Charleston Hotel Handicap, one mile, carrying a gross value of \$1,200, was the feature of today's card at Palmetto Park and resulted in one of the best contests of the season.

Rain, which fell last night, moistened the track considerably and made the going slow. Because of the changed conditions there were many withdrawals, the closing two races suffering most.

The success of five choices during the afternoon was attended by a stiff loss to the layers. The prices were rather short and the betting was confined mostly to two or three starters in each race.

The success of Bar Masterson at long odds saved the layers from a Waterloo. He was practically unreported and scored a fluky victory over the favorite, Chemulpo.

Encouraging reports relative to the condition of Charles Littlefield were received during the day from the Roger Hospital, where the venerable turfman is confined.

The H. O. Constock band of two-year-olds brought here from California were offered for sale by auction in the paddock before the racing today and several of the colts attracted spirited bidding.

H. O. Constock will leave for California on Monday. He contemplates returning east some time during the summer provided racing is resumed in New York.

Brian Path, bunch of Keys and His Majesty, the three three-year-olds that G. W. Langdon is wintering at Sheepshead Bay, will probably be purchased by J. W. Messervy.

R. D. Williams, who is handling the J. L. Holland stable at Charleston, is reported to have refused an offer of \$5,000 from G. W. Langdon for Carl, supposedly the best of the two-year-olds in training at the South Carolina track.

RICHEST AMERICAN STAKES OF THE YEAR TO BE RUN IN KENTUCKY

General Manager John Hachmeister Announces \$10,000 Added Handicap for Douglas Park — Latonia Derby to Carry Value of \$6,000 Added

Louisville, Ky., February 8.—John Hachmeister, general manager of the Douglas Park Jockey Club of Louisville, and the Latonia Jockey Club at Latonia, this evening made an important announcement in connection with racing over these two courses the coming spring.

The minimum purse value will be \$500. Manager Hachmeister announced that entries to the stake events will be received only with the understanding that the officers of the club reserve the right to refuse the entry or the acceptance of a transfer of any entry for any cause and without notice to the subscriber.

The present method was a necessity from the start, and was entered upon until such time as eight independent layers should indicate a disposition to cut in. As a further evidence of the association's sincerity in wanting independents to operate, several offers of substantial size, from persons who aimed to continue the studiate style of operation for the entire meeting, have been turned down without serious consideration.

While not so heavy as last season, the volume of speculation is sufficiently ample and exceeds \$40,000 daily. Independent Handicap, for three-year-olds and upward, one mile and a half; \$6,000 added.
Clipsetta Stakes, for two-year-old fillies, five furlongs; \$2,000 added.

Frank E. Brown, after the close of the Palmetto Park meeting, will ship to Lexington to await the opening of racing there with his select band of racers. Grover Hughes, which had been atiling is expected to rank among the top-notch sprinters at the track.

Charles Ellison, who has amassed a fortune on the turf by successful betting operations, contemplates a return to the ranks of racing owners and has commissioned "Jack" Baker to purchase him several serviceable racers to form the nucleus of a substantial racing establishment that he intends to campaign chiefly on the Kentucky tracks where the mutual system of betting is in vogue.

RULING COMES TOO LATE TO AFFECT STAKES.

Action of Racing Commission Increasing Values in Kentucky Will Apply Only to Purses This Spring.

Lexington, Ky., February 8.—The action of the Kentucky State Racing Commission at its meeting last Thursday in pronouncing an amendment to rule 13, which carries with it an increase in the amount of assets to be added to stakes and purses by the licensed associations conducting race meetings in Kentucky came as a result of the direct appeal of breeders, owners and trainers of horses and the fact that the commission has recognized their claims as just as afforded them much satisfaction.

There are some expressions of doubt as to the right of the commission to designate the minimum of the amount to be added to stakes and purses by the various associations, but inasmuch as the matter has been undertaken by the commission, it is reasonable to presume that the members know the ground upon which they are advancing. It is worthy

of remembrance that the commission has won both times a racing association has questioned the legality of its acts and the constitutionality of the law under which it operates.
Secretary G. D. Wilson of the Kentucky Association who sold his Troquois Farm this week to Paul Lansing of Georgetown, owns the stallion Stallwart, eight broodmares and eight yearlings. He said today that he intends later in the year to sell these. The mares are Modera, the dam of Firestone, Northumbria, sister to Eugenia Barch; V. I. ant, by Disguise; Cap and Bell; Allantette, dam of All Red; Wedding Day, dam of four winners; Tin Cup, Torrid and Etelka.

President Catesby Woodford of the Kentucky Association has announced his intention of disposing of all his horses this year and retiring from the ranks of the breeders. He has now approximately sixty head of thoroughbreds including the stallion Miller, broodmares and weanlings at his Racedale Farm in Bourbon County. He sold a number of the get of Star Shoot to John E. Madden last fall. He still owns a half interest in Star Shoot, which is this year at John E. Madden's Hamburg Place. Mr. Madden owns the other half interest.

John N. Camden's Kentucky Futurity winner and Kentucky Derby candidate, Helios, is at the local track in charge of "Ylma." Kozelick, trainer Jack Keene's Russian assistant, and he is looking decidedly robust. He has grown a great deal bodily, but has not increased much in height. He is a big horse on short legs and is as hard as a nail. Trainer Keene will return soon from Juarez to begin the preparation of this son of Star Shoot and Hindoo Rose and he will bring with him the good three-year-old Lord Marshall, which he bought last season from Mr. Camden, and which is also to be a candidate for the Kentucky Derby.

William P. Scully, who has figured much at the sales in this vicinity for the past half-dozen years as a buyer of and dealer in the cheaper grade of thoroughbred horses, has decided to take a chance in racing and has rented a stable at the Kentucky Association track. He has eight two-year-olds, as follows:
Bon Quince, ch. c. by Peter Quince—Benita Brush, Claxonette, b. f. by Peter Quince—Screech, Intermediate, ch. c. by Go Between—Biscayne, Gold Vision, b. f. by Goldcrest—The Dreamer, Avenue, ch. f. by Plunder—Nigella, Lord Marshall, b. by Metee—Ylma, Kozelick, trainer Jumella, br. f. by Go Between—Outwit, Renew, br. c. by Samson—Toddy Smith.

There are some good prospects among these youngsters, particularly the Peter Quince filly. She was bred by J. N. Camden and worked a quarter last fall in 23%, but she had unsightly knees and on that account Mr. Camden discarded her. Mr. Scully seems to have strengthened her knees. In the opinion of horsemen who know her, this filly is likely to win, if she does not break down.
Dan T. Morris has returned to Lexington from Paris and announced today that he will again train his stable at the Kentucky Association track. He has been out of the sport for three years.
William Houston, one of the old school of thoroughbred trainers, has gone to Captain Hancock's Ellerslie Stud in Virginia to look after the stallions and broodmares and superintend the preparation of the yearlings for the sales ring. For several years he has been with John Splans's stable of trotters in this city.

Trainer Charles H. Hughes, who returned from New York yesterday with the good horse Sebago, visited Red Bank, N. J., while away and he says the Hallenbeck horses, in charge of trainer Frank M. Taylor, are wintering well. He says Mr. Hallenbeck refused \$20,000 for Adams Express a short while ago.
Superintendent James P. Ross opened the mile track at the Kentucky Association grounds this week for training operations and these crisp mornings it has been well occupied with horses at exercise. The weather this week was extremely cold.
Phil T. Chinn, who recently returned from France, is now looking over the young material in the interest of some eastern friends who may buy several if Mr. Chinn finds suitable animals.
Ed W. Heffner, of Sheepshead Bay, today bought from T. P. Hayes the yearling chestnut colt by Oranmont—Algie M., for \$4,000. This colt is considered one of the best young racing prospects in Kentucky.

HIGHBRIDGE MAKES PROMISING DEBUT.

London, Eng., February 8.—At Sandown Park today the Prince of Wales Steeplechase, at three miles, for \$1,500, was won by the seven-year-old gelding Glen Heston, carrying 161 pounds. The seven-year-old American gelding Highbridge, with 172 pounds up, was second, and the seven-year-old horse Strangways, 153 pounds, was third. Glen Heston was the favorite at 9 to 4, while it was 4 to 1 against Strangways, and 100 to 8 against Highbridge. The latter is the only American steeplechaser in training for the Grand National at Liverpool next month. This was the American horse's tryout. He carried top weight and made a distinctly good showing. In the last half mile Highbridge for a short period led the way.

PURSES TO MUD RUNNERS

MISS JEAN AND INQUIETA SCORE AS FAVORITES OVER THE JUAREZ COURSE.

Track Is Exceedingly Heavy and Day Raw and Cold —Jockey Peak Arrives to Ride R. F. Carman Horses.

El Paso, Tex., February 8.—A cold raw day and a heavy sticky track were the conditions that prevailed at Juarez this afternoon. The attendance increased over yesterday's and the volume of money handled by the layers far exceeded their expectations. Two winning favorites rewarded the talent. Miss Jean, which on a previous occasion demonstrated her liking for soft going, found conditions just suited to her and scored with great ease. She was one of the two winning favorites, Inquieta being the other. The latter was backed into favoritism on the strength of her partiality for the mud. The other winners were at fairly lucrative odds.

Jockey C. Peak arrived today from Charleston and will ride here under contract to R. F. Carman. Peak can ride at 167 pounds. He was suspended last summer at Latonia by Judge Price for rough riding, but the suspension was lifted during the Churchill Downs fall meeting. He is an acceptable acquisition to the riders here.

Durlin was sold just before the first race to Joseph Schreiber by C. W. Carroll, who trains for A. B. Spreckels. The colt ran well for a short distance in the bad going, then fell back.
Jockey Gross was taken sick after riding in the fourth race and his engagements for the last two races were cancelled.

Jockeys E. Cotton and P. Hill were suspended for five days by starter Cassidy for disobedience at the post.
Voisel was cut down behind so badly that his racing days are probably ended. He had one of his tendons almost severed.

W. G. Marshall of Montgomery, Ala., brother-in-law of presiding steward C. P. Price, paid his first visit to the Juarez course today. He is a traveling passenger agent for the L. & N. Railroad. He is on a leave-of-absence and will probably remain here for a fortnight.

H. D. BROWN'S CUBAN PLANS.

Charleston, S. C., February 8.—H. D. Brown, manager of the Laurel track, who has been in the limelight of late because of his controversy with the Jockey Club, was a visitor here this week en route to Havana, where he goes in quest of a concession to operate a track for winter racing. Mr. Brown thinks that the time is now opportune for the establishing of racing in the Cuban capital on a scale that will command the approval of the most fastidious and likewise prove a financial success to the promoters. Mr. Brown plans to have racing at Havana for a period of sixty days beginning in January, when the tourist season is at its height. He contemplates beginning his meeting immediately at the close of one of thirty days' duration here in the fall, with the idea that after the close of the Havana meeting the horsemen could be transferred back to Charleston for another meeting of thirty days preceding the spring meeting at Jamestown. Mr. Brown's plan virtually provides for a fall, winter and spring circuit consisting of Jamestown, Charleston and Havana. The horsemen could be transported to Havana from Charleston by specially chartered steamers for a nominal sum. Arrangements could also be made for the transfer to and from Jamestown to Charleston by steamer if the horsemen preferred it.

STEEPLECHASE LICENSES GRANTED.

New York, February 8.—The board of stewards of the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association, at a meeting held Thursday, elected John R. Fell to membership in the association. Licenses were granted to the following trainers: James Owens, T. F. Cahill, Silas Veitch, D. F. Kinney and W. H. Henry. The jockey licenses approved were on the applications of James Lynch, William Kohler, William Booth, E. Tice and E. Klenck.
The stewards present at the meeting were: Harry S. Page, Henry J. Morris, Joseph E. Widener, Henry W. Bull and J. W. Burden.

JUAREZ MEETING LIKELY TO BE EXTENDED.

Sport Is Prospering at Mexican Course and March 30 Probably Will Be Closing Date.

El Paso, Tex., February 8.—Practically all of the stars among the 800 or more horses now quartered at the Juarez track will do considerable racing this month and next before the wind-up of the 1912-1913 season. The cracks that have not as yet raced will all be started a flap or two here as a preliminary to spring racing in Kentucky. The season here, though well in its second half, is not yet at its height, and hardly an afternoon passes without a dozen or more new faces of prominent persons being seen on the ground. These recruits are mostly eastern visitors on their way home from California and Mexico City, and after a day or two spent here, they proceed and others take their places. Not a regular of any importance was drawn away by the opening of the Charleston meeting, nor will a stable leave here for the South Carolina course this winter, in all probability. Though it is too early as yet for an official announcement, it is reported that the present Juarez meeting will not close this season until Sunday, March 30, which will make a total of 116 racing days. The 100 days always set for the racing here would bring the present meeting to a close on March 14, this early date being due to the fact that racing this winter has been conducted every day in the week. It is a well known fact that none of the horsemen would care to leave here so early as the middle of March, and as Manager M. J. Winn has always advertised 100 or more days of racing for this meeting and everything is moving along like well-oiled machinery, it is regarded as a certainty that the meeting will be at least extended to the date above noted and perhaps to the Sunday following, April 5. This will give an abundance of time for resting of horses going from here to Kentucky for the Lexington, Louisville and Latonia spring and summer meetings.

even if the former track should open earlier than April 26, which is not at all likely. The present meeting at Juarez has beyond doubt established the Mexico course as the leading winter race track of this country for years to come. From now on, it will continue to grow more and more important as the years advance.

J. A. Shannon has purchased for a private price from J. A. Seckington the two-year-old filly Lovers' Lane, by Atkins—Princess Tulane, by His Highness. This filly has only started once here and then she ran unplaced, but she has shown well in private trials. She is the second foal of her noted dam.

L. P. Doerhoefer, who went home to Louisville last week, after spending more than two months at the Jockey Club Juarez track, will at once take up and begin galloping Jimmie Gill, Baron De Kalb, Billie's Nightmare, Ursula Thompson and George Karne, all of which have been turned out in Kentucky since last fall. Shelby West, his racing partner, and the latter's father, P. M. West, who assists in training the Doerhoefer & West stable, will remain at Juarez to race out the season with Gold of Ophir, Ursula Emma, Jack Ellis and Senator James, and then take the string back home to join the other division of the stable at Churchill Downs. Mr. Doerhoefer will make no attempt to give the string in Kentucky any severe training until Mr. West returns to Louisville with the Juarez division. This Louisville stable has enjoyed a prosperous season here and will be regular patrons of Juarez racing in future.

Al Austin has decided to retire his good race mares Florence A. and Marie Hyde to the stud. A Texas breeder has been endeavoring to secure the pair, but so far has not met the price Mr. Austin has set on the daughters of Hadenff and Salm. If he does not succeed in disposing of them before the present meeting is over, he probably will ship them to California and have them mated with Salvatore, the sire of Jim Basey and other high-class winners. The latter stallion is one son of the mighty Salvatore that has made good in the stud.

The speedy filly, Mrs. Gump, has been fired for knee trouble by Dr. C. Cann, and her owner, Frank Farrar, has decided to make no attempt to race her until mid-summer.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

John S. McDonald, who is abroad, recently bought eighteen broodmares in different parts of England. The two-year-olds The Crown and Copernicus were shipped here from this country to join the stable of Louis Winans, in England. The Crown is a brother to Star Charter.

Joseph Welles, the best of the two-year-old fillies so far shown at Palmetto Park, has plenty of size and is of good conformation.

Jockey C. Peak, who has gone to Juarez from Charleston to ride for R. F. Carman, later will go to Kentucky with the Carman racing establishment. Peak was under contract to Mr. Carman last season when he suffered suspension for rough riding.

Jockey J. Wilson, who has signed to ride for J. W. Schorr during the coming season, brought back with him from France a letter of commendation from the French Jockey Club stewards under whose jurisdiction he rode last year.

At Thursday's meeting of the Kentucky State Racing Commission, when the matter of requiring the various racing associations of the state to increase stakes and purse values was under consideration, it was at first proposed that \$1,000 be the minimum amount of added money for stakes at Lexington and \$400 for purses. The rule which the commission formulated to vote upon March 10 provides for \$750 and \$350, respectively. The values at Louisville and Latonia were set as petitioned for.

It transpires that the anti-bookmaking and anti-pool-selling legislation enacted in Utah a few days ago is not designed to interfere with oral betting. An amendment to cover oral betting was beaten in the lower house just before final action was taken on the measure. The bill as it now stands makes bookmaking a felony, punishable by a term of one year in the state's prison or by a fine of not exceeding \$2,000, or both. The Thornley bill in the Senate, originally a duplicate of the Mabey bill, which passed the lower house, was amended by the Senate to make the penalty, in addition to a two-years' prison sentence, a fine of \$5,000.
