GREAT DAY AT SARATOGA.

GROUND CROWDED AND SPECTATORS ARE REGALED WITH HIGH-CLASS RACING.

Omar Khayyam Carries High Weight to Victory in the Kenner Stakes—Papp First in the United States Hotel Stakes.

Saratoga Springs, N. Y., August 4.—W. Vian's Omar Khayyam, winner of this year's Kentucky Derby, shouldered 131 pounds, conceded weight to the other three-year-olds that contested with him and won the Kenner Stakes in handy style, though Butwell, his rider, had to resort to rousing tactics on the colt to keep him from loafing, which he was inclined to do after wresting the lead from War Star. The finish found the pair separated by a length, with Midway following and Ticket, the only other starter, well beaten. War Star essayed the task of pacemaker and showed the way to the others until just before rounding into the stretch, where Omar Khayyam, which had been going along leisurely, moved up and quickly passed the leader. Once in the van, however, Omar Khayyam began loafing and the War Stars were enabled to keep well up with him. The last eighth found War Star still going fast and Butwell had to apply his whip on Omar Khayyam to keep him to his task. Midway loomed up menacingly at one time, then fell back after rounding into the stretch, but at all times held Ticket safe. The net value of the stakes was \$3,200. From a time standpoint, the race was not much and was considerably below the track record of 1:58 made by Sir John Johnson in 1909 and The Finn last year.

Of probably more interest in a racing way was the decision of the United States Hotel Stakes, a feature which had its inception in 1880, and has been decided over this track annually with the exception of the years 1896 and 1912 and 1912, when racing was suspended here. Sixteen of the most highly regarded youngsters in the country accepted the issue and it furnished a sparkling victory for G. W. Loft's crack two-year-old Papp, carrying the steady impost of 130 pounds, an equal weight assignment with W. S. Kilmer's Sun Briar. The others were all recipients of weight concessions from the pair. Papp was given an intelligent ride by L. Allen and was also lucky in getting through a narrow opening on the stretch turn, which enabled him to save much ground. In the final sprint he stood a terrific drive and was again lucky in squeezing through next to the inner rail to ultimately triumph over August Belmont's Drastic, with W. R. Coe's Nutcracker pressing the pair closely after having closed an immense gap.

Sun Briar, Bully Boy and Happy Go Lucky were the leading trio for the first half mile, at which point the latter pair fell back, but Sun Briar clung gamely to his task until well along in the last eighth before he relinquished command. He landed fourth at the finish. The race had a guaranteed value of \$7,500, but the excess from entry and starting fees that goes to the winner, in the event of over subscription of the guarantee, enabled the winner to get \$8,975 for his part. After the finish, Jockey Fairbrother, on Nutcracker claimed a foul against Drastic because of the colt having swerved over on the Coe representative near the finish.

Ideal Weather a Contributing Factor.

The Saratoga Association came in for all its glory this afternoon when an immense attendance taxed the spacious stands, the club house and box contingent being especially large, ideal weather contributed extensively in aiding towards a pleasant outing and it likewise contributed towards the wholesome and enjoyable sport.

Betting activities was by far in excess of any former day during the meeting and the success of many well backed ones gave the form students opportunity for considerable profit.

Gifford A. Cochran's Fairy Wand scored in a close decision from Marie Miller in the opener, getting up in the last few strides, after Marie Miller had threatened a runaway. Queen of the Water a stable companion to Fairy Wand, landed in third place.

The steeplechase over the two mile course was a spectacular affair, the seven starters making the race without mishap. Bet, proved best and won after a sharp brush with Crest Hill. The Brook landed in third place. The final race in which a big band of youngsters started, was the Papp and McGibbin's Paul Connelly in easy style from Golden Glow and George Washington.

Among the first to congratulate Mr. and Mrs. George W. Loft on the victory of Papp in the United States Hotel Stakes was the breeder of the colt, J. O. Keene of Keeneland Stud, Kentucky. Congressman Loft gave \$3,700 for the son of Peter Quince as yearling end, as he has won the Whirl, Flash and United States Hotel Stakes in a row, there is reason for his claim that he owns one of the best two-year-olds of the year.

Papp comes from a stout maternal line, his first dam being Phoebe G., by Mazagan, while his second dam is Amy J., (dam of Luke), by Pandoran, next dam Fanny R. by Galliard and the next dam Royal Nun, by Hermit.

The victory of Omar Khayyam in the Kenner Stakes adds to the interest which is being shown in a possible meeting between this crack son of Marco and Mr. Belmont's great colt Hourless. It was the consensus of opinion in the paddock and the club house that Omar Khayyam's performance stamped him a really high-class three-year-old. As Mr. Vian has bought the brown colt Westy Hogan by Dick Fennell—Carrie Jones, he now has a pair of high-class three-year-olds to carry his colors.

It is not often that one man owns two such good colts as Liberty Loan and Westy Hogan, but this was the case of the Kentucky blacksmith John Whitlow, who was only induced to part with the latter after the strongest persuasion on the part of Messrs. Vian and Carman, who spent two hours at his stable on Friday evening before the sale was concluded.

James W. McClelland was in high fettle over having secured the Vulcan—Rose Tree II. colt. "I went all the way to Nashville to look the colt over and was determined to get him if it were possible within my means. That I made no blunder is amply shown by the fact that an offer of \$3,000 profit has already been made to me for his transfer, but he is not for sale."

Deal for Westy Hogan Concluded.

The deal for Westy Hogan was concluded today and the horse formally transferred to R. F. Carman, who was acting for Wilfred Vian, owner of Omar Khayyam and other noted racers. The price, while not disclosed, is said to be in excess of \$20,000, as the latter figure had previously been refused for the colt by John O. Whitlow. E. B. McLean also was eager to secure him, but Mr. Carman closed the deal before Mr. McLean's agents could conclude negotiations.

Henry S. Copplin, who is financing Joseph A. Murphy in his venture to restore racing in Missouri, was an arrival and will remain here until about

YEARLING HALF-BROTHER TO THE GREAT ROAMER BRINGS \$10,000 AT AUCTION SALE

Saratoga, N. Y., August 4.—The John E. Madden-W. O. Parmer consignment of yearlings was put under the hammer this morning in the Saratoga paddocks, prior to the racing. Spirited bidding resulted when promising material was offered. The colt by Vulcan—Rose Tree II. (half brother to Roamer) was the star of the sale and brought the handsome sum of \$10,000. J. W. McClelland was the purchaser. Another in the Parmer band that brought a good price was the colt by the untried sire Assagai—Touch Not, dam of Great Britain. He fetched \$4,600 and went to J. W. May, presumably acting for Schwartz Bros.

The star in John E. Madden's band was the chestnut colt by Ballot—Majolica. W. S. Kilmer secured him on his bid of \$5,000. Forty-one yearlings were offered and brought a total of \$49,000. The twenty-three head from Parmer's consignment brought a total of \$27,500. The John E. Madden collection of sixteen head brought a total of \$21,500. R. L. Travers and the Oak Ridge Farm, sold a colt and a filly in the consignment.

FOLLOW THE CONSENSUS OF OPINION

Is Thomas C. McDowell's Motto in Buying Horses Offered in a Sales Ring.

Saratoga, N. Y., August 4.—While the sale of the Madden and Parmer yearlings was going on this morning Maj. T. C. McDowell intimated he was a decided "consensus" man. "I like the consensus of opinion in everything," said the Major. "I always back the consensus of opinion of the tipsters, when I haven't an opinion of my own and Eugene Leigh, auctioneer declares that a colt is the best of the band in a sales ring. I always wait and see what the bidders think. The auctioneer, perhaps, is concerned, but if the bidders don't respond in goodly numbers, there always is a doubt in my mind whether the opinion of the owner is correct. I have seen a yearling led into the ring without comment by the auctioneer and the bidding would come from every corner of the earth, while at other times a colt with plenty of recommendation creates little rivalry among the bidders. You can bet in a case like that, the colt that had a host of bidders is the best. Follow the consensus of opinion is my motto in buying horses in a sales ring."

Mr. McCarter Potter, the well-known New Jersey breeder, has five yearlings, three by Knight of the Thistle and two by Popinjay, a Flambeau horse, which he will race next year. They will be trained by Kim Patterson. "Popinjay is a Flambeau horse that was wished on me," said Mr. Potter. "His owner died and he asked me to give the horse a good home on my farm. He grew into such a promising horse, that I have tried him in the stud and the result has been more than satisfactory, so far as looks are concerned and if they don't race well then I have missed by guess."

Harry Breivogel One of Latest Arrivals.

Harry Breivogel is one of the latest arrivals here. He motored up from New York with "Jap" Muma. Mr. Breivogel will stay a few days working in the interests of Laurel, where some rich stakes will be divided among the horsemen during the month of October.

Jack Sanders, a well-known sportsman and racing enthusiast, motored from Detroit with his family for a week or two at the Springs. He intends to journey to New York for a few days, then to Atlantic City before making his return trip to Detroit.

Senator Stillwell was on hand early to watch the yearling sales, as was "Packey" McCabe, who has much to do with the Democratic organization of the state. They were guests of the association, and Eugene Woods was their chief adviser in matters of speculation.

Matty Corbett passed through the village early this morning with his family. They were on their way to the Thousand Islands, as the Saratoga atmosphere does not agree with Mr. Corbett.

Mr. Harry Buck, who for years published the Racing Calendar, was at the track today for the first time this year. He has been a victim of rheumatism and reports improvement.

Troxler returned to the saddle today after recovering from his fall at Empire City.

Mrs. August Belmont was one of the most interested horse enthusiasts at the sale.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF.

Jockey Butwell rode one of his great races Friday at Saratoga, when he landed Stromboli a winner in the Schuylerville Handicap. His masterly finish helped the Belmont horse to score a nose victory.

Thomas C. McDowell has a fast filly in Olive Wood, a daughter of his promising young sire, The Manager. Olive Wood has won her last two starts, displaying a fine turn of speed on both occasions.

The two-year-old Papp, which won the Flash Stakes at Saratoga on the opening day, and the United States Hotel Stakes yesterday, was bred by J. O. & G. H. Keene and sold as a yearling to G. W. Loft for \$3,700. So far this year Papp has won for Mr. Loft the sum of \$17,686.

GREAT OFFER FOR THIRTY YEARLINGS

J. O. Keene Refuses Proffer of \$75,000 for His Youngsters to Be Sold at Saratoga.

Lexington, Ky., August 4.—About a month ago a wealthy man, who resides in a northern city, and who is contemplating a first-class racing establishment for 1918 and thereafter, asked J. O. Keene if he would sell him the thirty yearlings he now has at Saratoga to be sold next Thursday. Keene replied that he would if they could agree upon a price and terms. The gentleman came back with an offer of \$75,000, one-third cash and the remainder in six and twelve months. Keene declined to take the notes for the reason that he has partnership interests in all of the youngsters. Messrs. George J. Long, millionaire ironmaster of Louisville and owner of Bashford Manor Stud, and John W. Schorr, wealthy Memphis brewer and turfman, are part owners of the twenty-six foreign-bred yearlings and Mr. Schorr has a half interest in the four that were bred at Keeneland Stud.

The day the yearlings were shipped to Saratoga, one of Keene's friends, who knew of the offer and its refusal, asked him if he expects to average \$2,500 cash for his colts and fillies at the Spa. "I will be much disappointed if I do not average better than that," said he. "I personally selected these imported colts and I bred the other four. I have been constantly with them ever since they came to Keeneland Stud, and I have observed their growth and studied them carefully. I know what they are and what they promise. I know that they are much above the average of horses we have in this country and I know that others know it also. Just a few days ago I declined to let a good friend of mine take his pick of six of the English colts for \$5,000 each. I doubt if he could have picked the six best, but I did not want to put the slightest damper on my sale. I am just as anxious as anyone to know the true state of the market for imported yearlings, brought over as weanlings and properly acclimated in Kentucky, such as I have, for I am intending to go over again next fall and invest about \$100,000 in the best blood and individuality I can find in England and Ireland."

Keene counts the beautifully made chestnut colt by Santoi—Trossau, by Love Wisely, as the star of his English yearlings and he believes that he is a \$10,000 yearling if there is one worth that price on the market. There are others that are quite near him in appearance and the prospects are that it will be a big sale.

FALL MEETING AT AQUEDUCT.

Queens County Jockey Club Granted Permission to Race from September 17 to October 6.

Saratoga, N. Y., August 4.—The following was handed to the press during the afternoon by Secretary Algernon Daingerfield of the Jockey Club: "Proceedings of a meeting of the stewards of the Jockey Club, held at the clubhouse of the Saratoga Racing Association, Saturday, August 4, 1917:

Present, Mr. August Belmont, Mr. H. K. Knapp, Mr. R. Hitchcock, Mr. Andrew Miller, Mr. Schuyler L. Parsons and Mr. John Sanford. The chairman, Mr. August Belmont, presided. On motion, duly seconded, the approval of the stewards of the Jockey Club was granted the Queens County Jockey Club to conduct a race meeting at Aqueduct, Long Island, N. Y., from Monday, September 17 to Saturday, September 29, both inclusive. On motion, duly seconded, the meeting adjourned."

At a re-convened meeting of the Jockey Club, permission was granted the Queens County Jockey Club to continue the racing until October 6. The failure of the other New York associations to receive dates, is said to be because all the associations agreed to pool their interests, thereby avoiding conflicts and solving a ticklish problem.

PATRONAGE WILL BETTER.

MEETING INAUGURATED IN MID-WEEK USUALLY TAKES HOLD AFTER FEW DAYS.

Management of Saratoga Racing Association Will Have No Cause for Complaint If Present Standard Is Maintained—Racing Folk Enliven Village.

Saratoga, N. Y., August 4.—The same satisfactory conditions that attended the racing already conducted this year on the metropolitan tracks, Belmont Park, Jamaica, Aqueduct and Empire City, are prevailing here, the greater part of them to Saratoga is not quite up to the expectations of some of the more enthusiastic prognosticators, but it is of ample proportions and the management of the Saratoga Racing Association will have no real ground for complaint if the present standard is maintained throughout the meeting. But the general belief prevails that as the meeting progresses, the patronage will steadily grow. It is pointed out by those who have been coming to Saratoga year after year, that when racing is inaugurated here in the middle of the week, as it was this year, it is not until the week-end that the patronage begins to assume representative proportions. So it is thought that the next few days will afford a truer index of what may be expected in the way of sustained attendance than the days which have already become a matter of history.

This charming resort is at its best just now, and the host of visitors, who are enjoying the hospitality of the village, find plenty of diversion in addition to the racing, which is, of course, responsible for bringing the greater part of them to Saratoga. It really takes the racing folks to enliven the village. Before they come and after they go, Saratoga is like many less renowned summer resorts. With the advent of the racing crowd, however, things begin to hum and the village takes on a liveliness that, added to its natural charm, makes a sojourn here well worth while.

One of the most pleasing features of the daily routine here are the concerts, which are constantly going on in the beautiful public recreation grounds into which the city of Saratoga has converted the charming estate of the late Richard Canfield.

The social life which has always been so much of a skillful training in the social art of racing season is on quite the same scale as heretofore. Practically all of the wealthy men, who have of late so freely identified themselves with New York racing, are here with their families and some of them are entertaining on a lavish scale, with the result that, if anything, the social activities of preceding seasons are being excelled.

Stars Will Appear Next Week.

As for the racing itself, not many of the stars have yet been seen in action. Most of them are ready for what may be asked of them, however, and will make an early appearance. Next week's tempting programs will bring the most of them, and the intersectional rivalry, which has already been keen, will be further intensified.

Weldship's failure to place in the opening day steeplechase was disappointing to Gwyn R. Tompkins and his connections. Weldship's well-known liking for the Saratoga track was responsible for his being extensively backed in the contest, in spite of the fact that he was being asked to concede his opponents considerable weight. He flattered his backers by racing prominently almost to the end of the race, but weakened at the crucial moment as if a bit short of work, and the sharps look for him to show improvement when he races again. Weldship is one of the great favorites among the steeplechasers now in training.

Frank M. Taylor, whose last engagement as a trainer was with the Willis Sharpe Kilmer stable, is among the regulars who are on hand at the Saratoga track each afternoon. Mr. Taylor, who is a keen student of the form of horses as well as a skillful trainer, has no professional responsibilities nowadays, but is planning to take charge of a few horses again, when a favorable opportunity presents itself. His most notable success in recent years was achieved with the stable of H. C. Hallenbeck.

Hal Farrell has reached Saratoga from California with sixteen yearlings, bred by Edward Cebran at his extensive San Jose breeding establishment, where he has the Castleton stallion Von Tromp and a big band of choice-bred mares. These yearlings are destined for the sales-ring and will be sold during the progress of the Saratoga meeting, at the conclusion of which trainer Farrell will return to California to devote his attention to twelve horses which are being prepared for racing at Turfway next winter. There is a possibility that Reno may be the starting point for their campaign, however, if they can be prepared in time for the September meeting at that point.

Eddie Dugan Rides Russian Derby Winner.

Former jockey Willie Dugan, who rode Nelson to his victory in the Suburban Handicap, is here. He has received word that his brother Eddie, who formerly rode with marked distinction in this country, is riding successfully in Russia, where racing is going on despite the turmoil through which that country is passing. One of his recent notable successes was the winning of the Russian Derby at Moscow last month.

Former jockey Willie Travers, now the owner and trainer of a racing stable, is among those drafted for service in the United States army. He does not expect to be immediately called to the colors, however. Marshall Cassidy, son of starter Mars Cassidy, and one of his assistants at the starting barrier, is another racing man who also has been drafted for service.

H. D. Brown has returned from his trip to Cuba, made for the purpose of laying out and supervising further improvements for the beautification of Oriental Park. He is now at Los Angeles, Cal., where he is having a large number of bungalows erected as an investment. Word comes from Los Angeles that Mr. Brown will shortly make an announcement of his plans for next winter's racing season at Havana, which is expected to eclipse all previous meetings at this point, which is gaining rapidly as a racing center and which bids fair to become increasingly important with the passing of each year. Practically all of the stables which were raced at Havana last year will go back there in December, together with a considerable number of others.

DONGAN HILLS DRAWS THE NEW YORKERS.

New York, August 4.—A crowd of about 3,000 turned out to view the fourth day's racing at the Staten Island Agricultural Fair this afternoon. The talent received another good start today, when Margaret L., favorite in the first race, went through at 8 to 5. Scabard, the short-priced one in the second, also finished first. Eddie T., winner of the fourth race, was splendidly ridden by Taplin and his backers were rewarded with the good price of 2½ to 1. Brooks, the 4 to 5 favorite, was defeated by a full length.

Today's visitors included many prominent state legislators, who came over to enjoy the racing. J. M. Murphy, prominent breeder and owner of the Waldeck Farm, was an arrival. He still shows traces of his recent injuries and is particularly troubled with a hip ailment, for which he will seek relief at the John Hopkins University.

Jockey W. Allen's most serious injury, as a result of his fall yesterday, was a fractured jaw. Square Dealer, which Mrs. Whitney recently acquired, will be put to fencing soon, with a view to making a steeplechaser of him.

W. S. Kilmer has bought at private terms the highly regarded colt by Hession—Bassetting (dam of Waterblossom) from John E. Madden at private terms.

St. Levy, one of the prominent layers during the flourishing Chicago racing days, was among the visitors this afternoon. Cleek, winner of the fifth race, was claimed after his victory by W. H. Baker for \$1,750. J. M. Henry claimed Paul Connelly, winner of the closing race, for \$1,450.

E. Trotter purchased Bromo at private terms from L. S. Thompson this morning.

DOUGLAS PARK AND LATONIA STAKES

Attractive Offerings for the Kentucky Autumn Racing Campaign of This Year.

The outlook for good racing in the coming fall campaign over the Kentucky tracks is cheerful and enticing. On the last page of this issue of Daily Racing Form will be found the stake offerings of the Douglas Park and Latonia Jockey Clubs. Their conditions will prove entertaining and attractive to owners and trainers.

The Kentucky State Racing Commission only allowed the Douglas Park Jockey Club seven days for its fall meeting. Nevertheless, the club gives the same stake list as it did last year and announces that no purse will be of less than \$800. The Latonia management is moving in the direction of increasing the importance of its fall racing. This movement will have its culmination in 1919, when the \$50,000 Latonia Championship will have its first running, in the presence of the greatest crowd ever assembled on a Kentucky race track. This year Latonia secured a grant of twenty-five racing days from the Kentucky State Racing Commission, on condition that its provision of money be increased by \$15,000, over and above what would be offered anyhow for stakes and purses. Of this \$5,000 is devoted to a new stake race for two-year-olds at a mile, which is intended to, and may, decide the two-year-old championship of 1917. Another \$5,000 is used in increasing values of stakes already established, and the third \$5,000 is in reserve for special handicap and condition purse races of not less than \$1,000, which will be devised from time to time in the course of the meeting. All of which must appeal enticingly to owners. They should look over the conditions published today and forthwith proceed to make the generous nominations well deserved by the stakes offered. The added money in the Latonia Stake races of last year has been increased to the following liberal extent: The Latonia Cup, \$2,500; Inaugural Handicap, \$1,000; Fort Thomas Stakes, \$1,000; Autumn Selling Stakes, \$500.

FAST WORK-OUTS AT SARATOGA.

(By J. L. Dempsey).

Saratoga Springs, N. Y., August 4.—Training activities were conspicuous this morning, more horses being on the course than at any previous time. Some creditable work-outs were noted, chief of which were the following:
