## RAIN A LATONIA VISITOR

Changes Racing Conditions and Brings a Few Upsets.

Linden and Sun God Give Williams Bros. a Double—Owner Macomber Scores.

Latonia, Ky., June 25.—The colors of Williams Brothers were conspicuous this afternoon, when Linden and Sun God, both representatives from their establishment, accounted for the respective purses for which they contested. Sun God's victory was accomplished in easy fashion, but Linden had to be ridden to his top speed to dispose of Brother Maclean. The finish between the pair of youngsters was the best that has been witnessed at this track during the present racing term.

Terrific rains during the night and early this morning quickly changed track conditions, accounting for many withdrawals, excepting in the initial races, which was for two-year-old maidens and brought to the barrier the limit number of starters allowed.

Prospects of additional rain was responsible for reducing the attendance and likewise curtailing the volume of speculation.

J. A. K. Macomber scored his first purse of the meeting, when his War Music, an English-bred filly, won in easy style from Madge F. and By Right.

The race furnished an added incident in the unseating of jockey Jeffcott from Florence Webber, a first-time starter. The boy escaped injury and walked back to the jockeys' quarters unassisted.

Skiles Knob was overlooked in the second race, notwithstanding his well-known ability to run well in that going such as prevailed this afternoon.

The fact that the unknown F. Smith had the mount on him was probably the main reason for the neglect.

The rider guided him faultlessly and kept him in the lead throughout to win easily from Yorkville and Sandman II.

T. C. McDowell's Plum, which was ranked with the best of her age and sex last year, but which has been racing disappointingly this year, scored a hollow victory in the fourth race, held to be the feature. She was thoroughly at home in the going and, getting away fast, led by a wide margin for the entire way. She was ridden by O'Brien, and that rider incurred the displeasure of the starter while at the barrier and was fined \$50.

Flapper, which showed fairly good form at New Orleans during the winter, but has been running indefinitely on Kentucky tracks, furnished an upset when she won in easy style in the sixth race, with Pitt landing in second place and showing a sensational effort in closing a gap of almost a sixteenth of a mile. Beautiful Girl landed third.

T. C. McDowell's American Eagle, which started in the Latonia Derby and showed an unaccountable dull performance, has since had a fever of 103% and his owner is of the opinion that he was ailing when he went to the post in the Derby.

## BIG FIELD IN HAROLD STAKES.

No less than fifteen colts and geldings have been named to contest the thirty-sixth running of the Harold Stakes at Latonia tomorrow afternoon. Among the fifteen are such juvenile stars as E. B. McLean's Uncle White, B. J. Brannon's St. Bernard and Colonel Livingston, J. C. Milam's Hidden Jewel and Morris & Walden's Ticklish. The presence of the youngsters at the starting post, with others that have been showing well in the racing of the last few weeks, will assure a contest in keeping with the best traditions of this long established and valuable juvenile event. If all fifteen of these named as prospective starters go to the post, the race will have a gross value of something over \$4,300 and the winner's net portion will amount to about \$3,600.

The rain with which the track was deluged on Tuesday, is expected to be highly beneficial to the course. It is the general expectation of those who give thought to such matters, that it will be found when the track dries out thoroughly, that the surface will be much firmer than before the rain came. Supt. Nolte is working the track in such a way as to take full advantage of the timely rainfall.

Another outstanding feature of this week's racing will be the running of the Merchants' Stakes of \$1,500 added on Saturday. This is a selling sweepstakes at one mile for three-year-olds and over, for which ninety-six of the better grade of selling platters in training in the west are eligible. The probable starters will come from among such well-known horses as Dorothy Dean, Kinney, Chalmers, Marauder, Grundy, Prince of Como, Sansyming, Bon Trop, St. Augustine, Leochares, Courtship, Marion Goosby, Diversion, Dick Williams, Buford, Gipsey George, Butter Scotch II, J. J. Murdock, Faux Col, Korbly and Opportunity. Last year this race was won by Kinney, with J. J. Murdock second. It will be noticed that both of these horses are likely to be among the contenders again this year.

Carl Ellwanger, who is identified with the Churchill Downs track, was a visitor from Louisville for the day.

## MAJOR BELMONT'S SIGNIFICANT WORDS

New York, June 25.—Major August Belmont, in a recent comment on the suggestion of General Haldeman to stop racing in Kentucky, hits the nail on the head in the following significant statement:

"If the government asked us to discontinue racing for the period of the war, we should do so毫不hesitatingly. But the government has not asked us to do anything of the sort. No person in the government service, who has given the subject of horse production in its relation to national defense serious consideration, looks on racing now as a mere sport. In well informed quarters, racing is regarded as a military necessity, because it is upon the continuance of well managed racing that thoroughbred production depends. We all know what anti-racing legislation in New York state in 1908 and 1910 cost the thoroughbred breeding industry in the United States. We lost about \$10,000,000 worth of the best stock to the enrichment of Europe, South America and Australasia. The cutting off of racing at this time would bring about a catastrophe as great as that of 1908 and 1910. South America, made rich by the war and keenly alive to the opportunity a lowering of thoroughbred values in the United States would offer, would send buyers to this country by the scores, and our good stallions and mares would go to the Argentine Republic, Chili and Brazil to get military horses for future sale in Europe, where the destruction of horseflesh in the great war has been tremendous."

## FIFTEEN YEARLINGS AT ASHLAND STUD

Thomas C. McDowell Has Fine Band of Young Horses, Majority by The Manager.

Lexington, Ky., June 25.—Major Thomas C. McDowell has at Ashland Stud fifteen yearlings, eight colts and seven fillies, which look like ready money even in war times. Numbered among them are members of The Manager's third crop and there is not one by that good son of Voter—Bracegirdle but pronouncedly carries his impress. The Manager's far outshines the get of any of the outside stallions to which the major sent his mares two years back.

Among the colts, the sons of Ellen-a-Dale and Gossip, both chestnuts by The Manager, stand out most prominently. It is difficult to choose between them. Each is the second foal of his dam and both possess highly attractive conformation and present evidence of unusual quality. Next best of the colts is the son of The Manager—Lucy Locket.

He is an upstanding chestnut and a brother to Major Domo, for which S. D. Riddle paid \$5,000 last August at Saratoga. A true Bramble is the bay colt by Sweep—Tenawha, dam of Highbrow, Romp and five other winners. Another attractive colt is the bay son of Duke of Ormonde—Miss Bellamy, half-sister to The Manager and likewise Understudy, the dam of Routledge.

Among the fillies, the sons of Ellen-a-Dale and Gossip, both chestnuts by The Manager, stand out most prominently. It is difficult to choose between them. Four of the fillies, all by The Manager, would do to go into the show ring anywhere. Their dams are Ancient, by Cesarian; Ilma, by Hastings; Alankara, by Allan-a-Dale, and Applause, by Royal Flush III. Ilma's daughter is bay. The others are chestnuts. The daughters of Ilma and Alankara are granddaughters of Monarka, daughter of Prince of Monaco and Narka by Macduff. The other yearlings

are Chestnut colt, by The Manager—Caution (dam of St. Augustine and daughter of Acushna, dam of Plum); bay colt, by Jim Gaffney—Star Jasmine; bay filly, by Uncle—King's Daughter; chestnut colt, by Peter Quince—Belle of Ashland; bay filly, by The Manager—Little Daughter; bay filly, by Ivan the Terrible—Dream Girl; chestnut filly, by Lucy Locket; chestnut filly, by Ballot—Star Cat; bay filly, by Dick Finnell—Caution, and chestnut filly, by The Manager—Wilful. This last named mare is by The Scribe, an English horse, which was sent from here to Australia, dam Ecstasy, by Ben Stromer—Bracegirdle, so the filly, which is quite attractive, is inbred to Peg Woffington, that good daughter of Longfellow—Ballet, to which traces the means of so many of Major McDowell's turf successes.

The Manager looks exceptionally well at the end of a busy season. To his court this year went thirty-five maidens and ten others were offered and declined.

## GET OF THE TETRARCH IN OUR RACING

Sons and Daughters of Great English Horse Among Nominations to Latonia Championship Stakes.

"The first of the progeny of The Tetraarch have started in England and have made good impressions. This reminds one that that great race horse is well represented in the Latonia Championship Stakes, to be run in the autumn of 1919," says a Kentucky turf writer. "Among those nominated for the main event is a gray filly, dam Marquetry, entered by P. Fitzgerald of Mondelichy, Adare, County Limerick, Ireland. Irish enough to carry the money of all the Sinn Feiners if she goes to the post. Another one by The Tetraarch is a bay or brown gelding, dam Whinstone, owned by Lady Conyngham, which was offered for sale last year and which took the combined pledges of many of Harry Morrissey's friends to prevent him from bracing submarines to get a look at this one for Henry A. Porter. Two others by this sire were entered by Peard & Dillon of London. Both are gray fillies, Abbazzia being the dam of one and Fragonarda of the other.

"Most of the get of The Tetraarch are gray, for a filly called Tetraarch won at Worcester and she was gray and the London Sportsman, in commenting on this said: 'At Worcester the Earl of Coventry, who is greatly interested in nomenclature, was asked in the paddock as to the name of Tetraarch. His lordship replied that the filly was named by W. C. Manning, who unfortunately died last week and that as a Tetraarch was a 'governor of a province,' so 'Tetraarch' represented the province itself. Sir Charles Nugent had no exalted idea of the filly's merit, easily though she won, as the race was run, but the mere fact that she was the first representative of her sire on the race course is sufficient to show that her sire's merit is reproduced in his stock.'

By riding seven winners last week, while F. Robinson was scoring on but one, L. Lyke increased his advantage over the latter until he is now leading by a margin of eight mounts. He is now but seven away from his century in races won and a week or so should attain that coveted distinction. In fact, Lyke, Robinson, Lansford, Sande and Howard are all within hailing distance of a hundred winning mounts, but they are alone in holding that immediate possibility. H. Lansford also rode seven winners and in doing so, resumed his former position of third in the jockeyship race, from which Sande had deposed him in the previous week. ## USUAL WINTER MEETING AT HAVANA

General Manager H. D. Brown Says Racing Will Be Continued in Cuban Metropolis.

Cincinnati, O., June 25.—H. D. Brown, general manager of the Cuba-American Jockey Club, was an arrival from New York to see the running of the Latonia Derby. He will return east at once. Horsemen who talked with him, were delighted to learn that so far as can be foretold at this time, the usual winter race meeting will be held at Havana next winter. Since the close of last winter's racing in March, Mr. Brown has been devoting the greater part of the time to matters connected with Havana racing, that will have a direct bearing upon the success of the next meeting at the Cuban metropolis. The most of his time has been divided between Washington, Baltimore and New York, although he did make a flying trip to Havana to make an inspection of certain improvements that he laid out at Oriental Park before returning to the United States at the close of the Cuban racing season.

On arrival here, he received a cable from a committee of prominent Cuban ladies, including Mrs. Menocal, wife of the Cuban president, and the wives of several members of the president's cabinet, seeking permission to use the Oriental Park track for automobile racing on June 29 and 30 for charitable purposes. He immediately cabled back donating the use of the track without charge and offering his services in any capacity desired to help make the affair a success.

Mr. Brown stated that the proposal to abandon fall racing in Kentucky has created a most painful impression in the east, both in racing circles and among army officers who appreciate the value of racing as a means to keeping up the standard of the army horse in America. The Preakness for three-year-olds to be run next spring will also be closed to geldings.

Jockey J. Clark pleaded a few hours respite with his local board, that he might ride Repentant in the steeplechase yesterday, then departed for Camp Upton, where he donned Uncle Sam's uniform.

Matt Byrnes of Eatontown, N. J., former trainer and starter, attended the elimination sale of John Sanford's stable today. Mr. Byrnes has taken up the breeding of horses and mules in Missouri and Canada.
