LARGEST FALL ATTENDANCE

Bids Adieu to Long Island Racing for the Current Year.

Star Master Surprises By Defeating Roamer and George Smith in Stake Race.

New York, October 12.—The Liberty Loan drive went forward another great bound. Track records were reduced and one of the fall season's largest crowds made adieu to Long Island's racing for this year.

Roamer's picture and racing plate, to be given to the day's highest bidder, went to Arnold Rothstein on his late bid of \$70,000.

Al Johnson, Henry Hanf, Phil Katz, R. H. Brown and Chas. Shongood gave \$5,000 each. Mrs. Hyland widow of one of America's foremost trainers, gave \$5,000, while her daughter gave \$2,000.

PRESENTS PHILIPPIC TO GOVERNMENT.

Joseph Marrone yesterday presented to the Remount Commission of the Federal government the four-year-old Philippine by Cicero—Quair, by Orme.

The tender was made through the Breeding Bureau of the Jockey Club. W. S. Vosburgh has regarded Philippine as one of the best bred of all the English horses that have been brought to the United States.

The course is now at its best and there is no doubt in America that it is better fitted for fall racing.

For the opening day there is a real good card as the result of Secretary Schaumburg's efforts and the attendance should rival that of any opening day this fall.

The Liberty Loan drive, which has excited the comment and admiration of the entire country, will be continued at Empire, with the same energetic committee which had charge of the work at Jamaica.

As John Sanford, a member of the Jockey Club and a steward of that body, gave \$700,000 at his home town of Amsterdam, it will be seen that racing people have done their part nobly.

HORSES AT LATONIA READY TO RACE

Trainers at Covington Track Keeping Their Charges On Edge for Coming Meeting.

Cincinnati, O., October 12.—Indications are not lacking that for the most part the six hundred or more horses quartered at Latonia in anticipation of the opening of racing there on Thursday of next week are ready for what may be asked of them in the way of racing once the meeting gets under way.

Colonel Vennie, Jefferson Livingston's only eligible for the race, worked five-eighths in a manner suggesting the return of this good horse to winning form in the near future, but it is hardly likely that he will be ready to undertake such a bruising task as the winning of the Inaugural promises to be in his present condition.

Edward Trotter had his two good sprinters Troilus and A. N. Akin out for work today. The former cantered a half mile in 51, while his stablemate ran three-quarters in 1:16 1/2.

E. T. Colton has arrived from New York with the good mare Hanovin and the selling pacer Harry Ferguson, all three of which race in the name of J. Marrone.

FRUIT CAKE IN GOOD CONDITION.

A. K. Macomber's Fruit Cake, J. B. Goodman's Bribed Votter and Williams Bros.' Paux-Col are three Inaugural candidates that have been working satisfactorily since their arrival from Louisville.

The last named was given slow work today following a work-out of a mile in 1:41 1/2 earlier in the week. Fruit Cake is reported by the work watchers to be in extra good condition.

Fell Swoop, another of the Macomber string that is eligible for the Inaugural, has been showing soreness in his work of late. His best work since arriving here has been a mile in 1:41.

J. C. Milam's fast two-year-old, Hidden Jewel, is another horse that has been showing some soreness in recent work, but he is reported to be fit and ready for a good race in spite of that handicap.

Clairvoyant, in the Kay Spence stable, which raced disappointingly upon several occasions at both Louisville tracks this fall, is suspected by his trainer of having developed sesamoid trouble, which, of course, will seriously affect his usefulness in future racing.

T. P. Hayes' crack two-year-old filly, Regalo, looked upon as the best of her sex and age racing in Kentucky this fall, has been doing satisfactory work since her arrival from Louisville.

J. S. Hawkins recently introduced to the racing world a two-year-old that is expected to prove of better than average quality. This is Stockwell, a chestnut colt by Ballot—Janice. He is among the 141 eligibles for the \$10,000 Queen City Handicap, in which the two-year-olds will be asked to race a mile on Saturday, November 2.

REASONS FOR RACING POPULARITY

LATONIA CHAMPIONSHIP STAKES DATA

Manager Hachmeister Issues Book Containing Important Information on America's Richest Race.

Cincinnati, O., October 12.—Important information in relation to the richest of all American races, present or projected, and perhaps the richest of all races in any part of the world, since the rich turf prizes of England and France have either been discontinued or reduced in value on account of the great world war, is conveyed in a book of 161 pages just issued by General Manager John Hachmeister of the Latonia Jockey Club, containing a mass of data connected with the initial running of the \$50,000 Latonia Championship Stakes in the autumn of 1919 and the 1920 renewal of the same race.

The book is undoubtedly the most pretentious publication ever issued in connection with one particular race in the history of the American turf. It is being mailed to the nominators of the 471 thoroughbreds named for the 1919 running of the race and also to all who contributed to the total of 342 nominations received for the second running of this extraordinarily rich event in 1920.

The book shows that of the 471 nominations originally made for the 1919 running of the Latonia Championship Stakes on March 1, 1917, 339 still remain eligible. The remaining 132 have been declared at various times since the original closing date, under the conditions of the race calling for progressive payments of subscription fees.

The Latonia Championship Stakes for 1919 is a race of one mile and three-quarters for three-year-olds of that season. Its probable gross value is estimated at the princely sum of \$50,000, of which \$15,000 is directly contributed by the Latonia Jockey Club in the form of added money. It is estimated that the race will be worth something like \$40,000 to the winner, in addition to a gold cup valued at \$1,000, a gift from the Thoroughbred Horse Association by private subscription of certain of its members.

NOTABLE TWO-YEAR-OLDS ELIGIBLE.

Among the notable American two-year-olds of this year that still remain eligible for this great race are P. A. Clark's Dunboyne, winner of the Futurity at Belmont Park last month and J. W. McClelland's Eternal, winner of the Hopeful Stakes at Saratoga in August. The Futurity and the Hopeful are the richest of American stakes for two-year-olds.

Except for an increase in the amount of money going to the first four horses and their nominators, the conditions for the second running of this notable race in 1920 follow closely the lines of the original provisions. A change has been made in the method and amounts of the progressive payments in connection with nominations for the race.

The principal foreign nominators included Sir Marc Sykes of the famous Studerum Stud in England, who named twelve; Sir Alec Black, of Great Grimsby, England, who named eight; Sir John Robinson, of Notts, England, who named five; M. Chert Hallborn, noted French breeder, of the establishment in France, Russell Swanwick, of the Royal Agricultural Stud, England; Patrick Clarke, of the Balrauc Stud Farm, in Ireland; the Marchioness Conyngham, Stags, castle, Ireland; John A. Dawson, Newmarket, England; D. M. Grant, London, England; John B. Joel, London, England; H. H. Peard, London, England; Capt. E. Tanner, Newmarket, England, and Robert Whitworth, Halifax, England.

Another notable innovation shown by the book is that, instead of with the barring of the Latonia Derby to geldings next year and the increase of the value of that notable race for three-year-olds to something like \$30,000, the breeders of the first three horses in that important event will share in the prize money to the extent of \$500 to first, \$200 to second and \$100 to third.

LAUREL RACING SUSPENDED

Track to Be Closed and Sport Discontinued Until Further Notice.

Closing Order May Be Rescinded If Epidemic of Influenza Is Checked.

Laurel, Md., October 12.—In compliance with the order of the Maryland State Board of Health, the management of the Laurel race track announced late this afternoon that until further notice the track will be closed and racing discontinued.

The hope was expressed that the cessation of racing would be temporary and that the sport might be resumed before the end of another week. The medical authorities have expressed the opinion that the epidemic of influenza may be in check soon and that the closing order might be rescinded.

A drizzling rain throughout the morning and afternoon put the race track into a somewhat soft condition and proved to the benefit of J. W. Parrish's Midway, which beat Cudgel a length and a half in the Washington Handicap at a mile and an eighth. Willis Sharpe Kilmer's Exterminator, which led for half the distance, was third, while Omar Khayyam was rather a poor last in the field of four starters.

Billy Kelly, the greatest two-year-old of the year, also ran well in the going, but just managed to beat E. B. McLean's Leochares by a scant nose. It was the best race of the day and a wonderful performance for a two-year-old at the weights.

During the running of the Old Dominion Steeplechase Handicap J. Lumsden's Kingstown Pier stumbled at the jump at the upper end of the lawn enclosure and jockey Craig, a colored boy who rode Kingstown, was struck on the head by Robert Oliver, which was last of the field at a mile and a half. Oliver was not expected to prove serious.

Sir Charles Gordon was a guest of Commander Ross at the track this afternoon. Goldcrest appeared in the opening dash. Goldcrest, after taking the lead, he, however, gamely outstayed Grouse for place honors.

With the Quickstep Purse came Commander Ross' first victory of the day when his filly, Milkmaid, decisively beat Routledge, Mormon and other good two-year-olds.

PIMLICO STAKES WELL PATRONIZED

Five Feature Events Attract 360 Entries — Best Horses in Country Among Nominations.

Baltimore, Md., October 12.—The five rich stakes of the Maryland Jockey Club have attracted 360 entries and the Pimlico Nursery Stakes for two-year-olds at four and a half furlongs, which will be run next spring drew 339, representing forty-five different interests. The \$10,000 Bowie Cup, one mile and a half, for three-year-olds and over, drew ninety-five nominations; the \$10,000 Manly Memorial Steeplechase, two miles, drew 100; the \$5,000 Pimlico Autumn Handicap, one mile and a quarter, for three-year-olds, fifty-one; the \$5,000 Walden, one mile, for two-year-olds, 132; the \$3,000 Elkridge Steeplechase, two miles through the field, for three-year-olds, thirty-three.

These races, with the Pimlico Breeders' Remount Purse, one mile, for stallions three years old and over, that will pay \$2,500 in added money and which has been added to the Maryland Jockey Club's regular program at the request of the officers of the remount division of the War Department at Washington, will be the feature of a meeting in which a matter of about \$115,000 will be distributed. No purse will have an added money feature of less than \$1,000, with seven races each day. Of these races, one, at least, will be steeplechase. Cross-country racing has always been tremendously popular here and the Maryland Jockey Club having always had conspicuous success in filling its daily steeplechases spring and fall.

The quality of the horses that will take part in Pimlico racing may be estimated from an inspection of the rosters of the several stakes. Among the great long distance runners of mature age in the field are Eyclid, Bondage, Sunny Slope, Flags, Spur, Battle, Minister Tot, Regal Lodge, Lucnille, Exterminator, The Porter, War Cloud, Hollister, Motor Cop, Roamer, Crimser, Midway, Cudgel, Foreground, Crank, George Smith, Tiptity Witchee, Omar Khayyam, Westy Hogan, Corn Tassel and Slippery Elm.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES OF THE DAY

German reports that Prince Maximilian's reply to President Wilson's inquiries has been dispatched and indicating that it "is in a sense" an acceptance of the president's conditions of peace led to an authoritative statement at Washington yesterday that the public should be warned against believing Germany is about to end the war by unconditional surrender.

An Amsterdam dispatch of yesterday says: Handled, while stating that it will not be responsible for the truth of the statement, says that the news received in Dutch circles is to the effect that Germany will accept President Wilson's conditions and especially those in regard to the evacuation of occupied territory.

Word has reached London that Serbian troops have reached a point within six miles of Nish and are storming the outer defenses of the fortress. A Franco-Serbian column is moving around the city from the southeast and another allied force is encircling it from the southwest.

Neutral travelers arriving in Switzerland from Germany report rumors that Emperor William may abdicate appear to take great consistency day by day. The arrivals add that the unpopularity of the German crown prince has increased in Germany.

The Wolff Bureau, the semi-official German news agency, has circulated a Frankfurter Zeitung dispatch from Berlin stating that the German reply to President Wilson's note was sent Friday night, and that it is in a sense an acceptance.
