**SIR MARTIN AN AMERICAN AGAIN**

Racing and Breeding Plans of the Larger Establishments of West.

Macomber, Cebrian and Rosseter Stud News—Charles Boots in Control at Elmwood.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., January 21.—A. K. Macomber, who has many horses at Charles Boots' Elmwood Stock Farm, Santa Clara County, thinks so highly of his five-year-old stallion Hand Grenade, a horse of the most fashionable English blood lines, that he will keep the comparatively young stallion exclusively for his own mares. Other stallions at the Macomber place will be allowed outside service. Hand Grenade is a son of Sunstar and All Green, by Greenlawn—Stheno, by Pioneer, and was among the horses purchased by Walter Jennings for Mr. Macomber in England five years ago. Mr. Macomber has not by any means given up breeding in California, despite the sending to France several months ago of twenty-two brood mares. There are about fifty mares at the farm at the present time. More than a score of yearlings are running in the paddocks. Ten yearlings are being cared for at the Cebrian's Mira Monte Stock Farm near San Jose. This was purchased some time ago by Mr. Macomber.

Mr. Cebrian has twelve yearlings at the San Jose establishment, ten by Von Tromp and two by Tim Payne. He plans to sell the Von Tromp youngsters, nine fillies and one colt, to his Kentucky farm this coming spring. It is likely that the Tim Payne youngsters will be offered for sale. The Cebrian mares and Von Tromp made the long trip to Kentucky in good condition, and are now housed in quarters on part of the J. B. Haggan farm, having been moved over from Glen Helen. With the sending of the Cebrian yearlings to Kentucky it is probable Mr. Macomber will take possession of the farm at San Jose. The mile track is in tip-top condition for training.

HAND GRENADE'S PROSPECTS GOOD.

Hand Grenade raced creditably on the metropolitan tracks for a number of years, and his owner is sanguine he will prove a successful sire. The stallion is a half-brother to the six-year-old Verdant, one of the brood mares that was shipped to France. Verdant was bred last spring to Hesperus, a son of Sunstar and Our Lassie, by Ayrshire—Yours, by Melton.

The breeding season at Elmwood will open next month, with Charles Boots, a past master in the art of mating horses, in charge. In addition to Hand Grenade there are in the stud barns Hesperus, War Fame, by Prince Palatine—Verlie, by Bill of Portland—La Vierge, by Hampton; Palo Alto, by Heywood—Rosormonde, by Ormonde—Fairy Rose, by Kisber; Borgia, by Brutus—Ledette, by Nathan Combs—Gipsy, by Hercules; Liberty Loan, by Dick Finney—Martha Palmer, by Sempronius—Alestis, by Hindoo; Paicines, by Sunstar—Dreamy, by Persimmon—Roussain's Dream, by Saraband; War Cry, by Sunstar—Fair Lassie, by Orme—Our Lassie, by Ayrshire, and other horses of well-known American and English families. Paicines is a half-brother of War Cloud, recently shipped to the French establishment of Mr. Macomber, along with Hollister and Star Hawk.

Mr. Macomber's favorite among all his royally bred thoroughbreds is Hollister, son of Sunstar—Our Lassie. Hesperus is his brother, and is being given ample opportunities to show his worth. Hollister's showing as a sire will be followed with the greatest interest by his owner.

CALIFORNIA FARM AND STUD NEWS.

In order to get the Spendthrift line John H. Rosseter of Wikup Rancho has added the sixteen-year-old mare Woolen to the matrons at his stud. After the close of her racing days Woolen passed into the hands of O. L. Rogers, former sheriff of Alameda County. She was bred to General Roberts, by Brutus. Among her progeny are the winners Zamloch and Gordon Roberts.

Woolen is by Woolsthorpe—Frequent, by Fonso, second dam Golden Reel, by Spendthrift.

The breeding season starts at Wikup February 5. Some thirty matrons will be bred to Friar Rock. Mr. Rosseter plans to use Friar Rock wherever he "nicks" with a mare.

What a judicious investment of a few hundred dollars will do is illustrated by the success of the Napa Stock Farm's brood mare Salvatrix, which raced hereabouts as Entre Nous. George W. Berry, former superintendent of the A. B. Speckels establishment, bought Salvatrix for about \$700 from Matt Reis eleven years ago. Berry said today he "picked up" the mare for his employer for the double reason of liking her individuality and her blood lines. The achievements of Salvatrix in the stud show Berry was altogether right in his judgment. In her first season she produced the winner Harbard, and since then has to her credit the winners Venetia, Savilla and Madge F.

Salvatix has the combination of sterling American blood and high-class English lines that so often prove successful in breeding. She is by Salvation—Instalatrix, by Brutus. She raced and won up to seven years old in 1909. Her dam, Instalatrix, was just as steady a producer, being the dam of Inaugurator, San Alviso, Cello, St. Elmwood and other winners.

EASTERN HORSES THRIVING HEALTHILY

NEW YORK, N. Y., January 26.—There was an unusual gathering of horsemen at the Waldorf today. Charles Hughes dropped in from Havre de Grace, where he is looking after thirty-five horses belonging to J. W. McClelland. All are in good condition, and the band is composed of twenty-nine two-year-olds and six older horses.

No sickness has been reported at any of the local tracks. Walter House reports everything in good order at Gravesend and not a horse is reported sick at Belmont.

## LINES OF DESCENT OF A HORSE WHICH PLAYED A GREAT PART IN RACING HERE AND ABROAD AND HAS RETURNED FOR STUD SERVICE IN HIS NATIVE LAND

Sir Martin is returned to the United States, and his return to the land of his birth is of far-reaching importance. Mr. Madden is deserving of hearty congratulations for having effected the purchase of a horse in every way fitted to benefit the bloodstock interests of this country. Realizing the sands of time were running low for the Futurity winner, Ogden, Mr. Madden cast about him in a praiseworthy endeavor to find one worthy to fill old Ogden's place, and choice fell on one of his earlier loves, Ogden's son, Sir Martin.

As a two-year-old in 1908 Sir Martin won the National Stallion Stakes, Great American Stakes, Great Trial Stakes, Double Event, easily beating Helmet by four lengths; Saratoga Special, but was beaten by Maskette, after a most unsatisfactory race, for the Futurity. In the running of the Flatbush Stakes, however, Sir Martin had complete revenge, easily turning the tables on the daughter of Disguise. Mr. L. Winans, becoming enamored of the colt's merits, purchased him for racing abroad for some \$55,000. Sir Martin was sent across to England, where the following year, as early as May 12, he, at Newmarket, won the Wednesday Welter Handicap. Starting favorite for the Derby, Sir Martin fell in a collision with Bayardo rounding Tattenham corner, fortunately escaping injury, and was next seen out at Ascot taking part in the Royal Hunt Cup, won by Dark Ronald. Sir Martin next essayed a trip to France, having to strike his colors to Biniou in the Grand Prix, Trouville-Deauville. Back once more in England, Sir Martin beat Mr. Belmont's Priscillian for the Challenge Stakes, Newmarket, in Cesarewitch week, and after this ran third to Christmas Daisy for the Cambridgeshire, and wound up his three-year-old season by winning the Durham Stakes of £1,000. The following year, as a four-year-old, Sir Martin must have been quite at his best when he defeated Bachelor's Hope, Louviers and others for the Coronation Cup at Epsom, but afterward the colt seems to have trained off, as he made no show in the Ascot Gold Cup, won that year by Bayardo. As a five-year-old all efforts to bring Sir Martin back to winning form proved unavailing. He virtually broke down after a wonderful trial for the City and Suburban Handicap. No better luck awaited him in 1912, but as a seven-year-old Sir Martin won one race, his last, the Ellesmere Handicap at Manchester in late November. The year 1914 found Sir Martin advertised to stand for service at "Lordship" as a stallion, and he is already the sire of winners, among them the two-year-old filly Hard-bake, winner of three races last year.

What does the pedigree of Sir Martin tell us in regard to his continued success as a sire? Lady Sterling, his dam, and dam also of the champion three-year-old of 1919, Sir Barton, stamps her offspring with her own chestnut Hanover coloring, even though Sir Martin's sire, Ogden, is a brown. Sir Martin, unlike so many of the progeny of Ogden, came early to hand, something most essential in racing as conducted in this country, and he must also be a horse of unusual constitution and vitality, as witness his early successful racing in England when not yet six months ashore.

The return of Sir Martin, from my viewpoint, is most fortunate, and a really good thing for the horse breeding interests of this country. Clean as a pin in all other pedigree respects,

Sir Martin's Hanover cross now bars him from registration in the English General Stud Book.

Too bad an exception cannot be made in the case of Hanover, but so it is, and must be endured, with blame attaching to none, for the English know that if the ban were lifted for Hanover the rest would raise the Roderick cry of "come one come all," and this is not to be even thought of. No matter, Sir Martin has found sanctuary in his birthplace, where his Hanover cross is no stigma and his Vandal blood no bar.

Comparatively few horses, to my knowledge, have been bred, as is Sir Martin, on the Matchem to Herod plan of mating; such a one, however, is Young Melbourne, the maker, together with his sons, of the fortunes of the Maid of Masham family, of which family also Sir Martin is a member; also Darebin, sire of the dams of Commando, Goldsmith and Africander, is Spendthrift, grandsire of Fair Play; Plebeian, winner of his only start, the Middle Park Plate, and sire of the dams of Matchmaker, Dean Swift and St. Frusquin; the Derby and St. Leger winner Sir Visto; Finasseur, winner of the Grand Prix de Paris and Prix du Jockey Club; Pretty Polly's conqueror, Bachelor's Button, and in the old days Melbourne, the main connecting link between Matchem, past and present. On account of all this, one is left wondering why the plan of mating Herod mares with Matchem sires is not more frequently put into practice.

Strange as it may seem, not one drop of the predominant strain of Galopin appears in Sir Martin's pedigree. The St. Simon-Melbourne affinity is proved. For this reason mares of Galopin descent, or mares showing the blood of St. Simon close up in their pedigrees, should prove the best of mates for Sir Martin.

Don't you know it is a positive relief to come across a pedigree such as is presented by Sir Martin, convinced as I am that the outercross and out-bred horses are the masking of the whole horse breeding structure? St. Simon, possibly the best stud horse that ever lived, had not one drop of Stockwell, Touchstone or Melbourne in him, and to this I attribute much of his success as a sire. My hope and belief is that time will show Sir Martin to be unusually successful as a sire, for he is an outercross for every Eclipse mare to be found in the Stud Book.

## BOBBY ALLEN DISQUALIFIED

Finishes First in a Close Finish, but Had Fouled Opportunity.

Whippet Places Another Race to the Whitney Account—Chief Wins Again.

NEW ORLEANS, La., January 26.—Despite a heavy track a big crowd visited the Fair Grounds today and, since five favorites won in a row, found the expedition pleasant and profitable, the layers suffering accordingly. In general, the racing was well contested and in one case the finish was followed by a disqualification. This came in the fourth race, in which the lightly weighted Bobby Allen had the best of opportunity by a nose, but had plainly fouled the latter in the stretch drive and was promptly placed last, giving the race to Opportunity, with My Dear second and Mose third. Bobby had been backed down from 5 to 1 to 1 to 5 and his disqualification hurt the feelings of a number.

The fifth was the principal race of the day, and in this Chief upheld his recent good form by taking up 120 pounds and winning all the way without any trouble, although Soldat de Verdon did his best to make a race of it. He finished two lengths behind Chief, with Romeo another two lengths back. Track habitudes here are beginning to doubt if Chief is not at least the equal of any racer now at this track.

The Broomstick filly Whippet placed the first race to the credit of H. P. Whitney without any great trouble. Budgie Kean was well-backed to beat her, but second was the best he could do, and only a nose better than Alcatraz at that.

As hotly backed favorites Whippet, Pilson, Jim Hastings, Opportunity and Chief took the first five races. Then came a change when Pat Dunn's Teddier, third choice to Semper Stalwart and Frank Mattox, captured the sixth race, and the 10 to 1 outsider Bombast galloped home with the seventh.

## SIR MARTIN ARRIVES AT LEXINGTON

LEXINGTON, Ky., January 26.—Two thoroughbred stallions from England, one a native American and the other a Britisher, arrived in the Blue Grass State last night. Sir Martin, the American, went to John E. Madden's Hamburg Place, where he was foaled and where his sire and dam now are, while Troutbeck, recently purchased by Edward Cebrian of San Francisco, went to John S. Barber's Glen Helen Stud, where he is to make the season. They arrived in New York on the Mauritania last Saturday and were brought out by John Miller. Along with them came F. R. Hitchcock's Tangle, which has been in France for the past four years.

Lloyd Gentry, who closed his riding career last year, now is a full-fledged trainer. He arrived here yesterday from New York with Flags, Right Over, Might, Ground-Swell and eight other horses, the property of The Beach Stable. They are in quarters at the Kentucky Jockey Club track, but are to be turned out at E. R. Bradley's Idle Hour Farm for a short while before getting into preparation for the spring racing in Kentucky.

It is stated here to be the intention of Joseph E. Widener to send Jerry Welch, a cousin of Tom Welch, who now is in France, to Lexington April 1 to manage Elmendorf Farm. Welch is to bring over from France all of the Widener mares now in that country. The yearlings from the Widener mares remaining in France have been sold to A. King Macomber.

## GENERAL NEWS NOTES OF THE DAY

CHICAGO, Ill., January 26.—Weather forecast: Illinois—Mostly cloudy Tuesday, probably becoming unsettled; warmer tonight and in extreme south portion Tuesday; colder Tuesday afternoon in west and north portions. General forecast: The Minnesota disturbance will move rapidly eastward preceded by rising temperature in the Middle States this afternoon. It will be followed by the northwestern area of high pressure and low temperature, which will overspread practically all sections from the Rock Mountains eastward to Lake Michigan and the middle Mississippi Valley within the next few hours. No precipitation of consequence probably except in Wyoming.

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 26.—The government today through Solicitor General King made a motion before the Supreme Court to dismiss the Rhode Island case, testing the constitutionality of the prohibition amendment and seeking an injunction against the attorney general from enforcement of the Volstead act. The Solicitor General says he will make an effort to get his motion before the Supreme Court early in March. In the argument of this motion all the issues raised by the State of Rhode Island may be directed by the Supreme Court, the test case settled and the constitutionality of the amendment decided.

## READY FOR THE BIG CUBAN STAKES

Plenty of Eligibles for National Handicap and Derby, to Be Run in March.

HAVANA, Cuba, January 26.—Five of the stake fixtures of the Cuban winter racing season at Oriental Park have been run, leaving eight more fixtures to be decided. The remaining ones are all important events, notably the Grand National Handicap and the Cuban Derby, both with an endowment of \$10,000, and therefore the most valuable stakes of any winter racing season.

Much interest is being shown in the probable fields that will contest for these important events. The fact that among the eligibles in both stakes are representatives of Cuban owned stables gives these stakes an added importance and interest. The Grand National and the Derby are both at one mile and an eighth. The handicap will have its running March 14, while the Derby will be decided March 28, the closing day of the meeting. Declarations from both events were due January 15, and the list of declarations in both races were smaller than expected. Twenty-nine of the pick of the allied division remain in the Grand National, while an even twenty are left in the Derby.

The most formidable nominees remaining in the Grand National are Cromwell, Kiku, Hank O'Day, Bally, Iolite, Walnut Hall, Lackawanna, Orestes, Grundy, Hubbard and Buford.

Of those remaining eligible for the Derby four are the property of Señor A. H. Diaz, these being Blue Wrack, Grayssian, Sea Bat and Ravensea. This well-known Cuban stable appears to hold a strong hand in the decision of this rich stake. The Armonia Stable, another Cuban racing establishment, has only Ford and Mess Kit to represent it, and this pair are not regarded as having much of a chance.

Of the American owned stables W. V. Thraves, J. T. Ireland, Frank Rector, W. C. Weant and J. W. Pangle have eligibles whose prospects are regarded with some favor. Mr. Thraves has the fast filly Mile, Dazie, which has been racing well in sprint handicaps, and which appears able to negotiate a long distance of ground. Mr. Ireland has the speedy Clearing Up, a winner in her first time at the barrier. Pangle has Roseland, a big, lusty gelding, that has been working well, but which has not yet started here.
