Downfall of Prince Galahad in the Running of the Craven Stakes.

Daylight Patrol in France's Greatest Race—Progeny of Sir Martin Doing Well.

LONDON, England, April 20.—The Craven Stakes at Newmarket on the third day of the meeting brought further disaster to Persse's stable when Prince Galahad was so badly beaten. This must have been a great disappointment to his owners. Last season the son of Prince Palatine had hock trouble, and so ran in two races only. These, however, he won in most convincing fashion, and many good judges rather favored his chance of gaining classic honors if Tetratema failed to stay. It is difficult to find excuses for Prince Galahad's defeat. He was trying to give fifteen pounds to Daylight Patrol, which won easily by four lengths from Abbot's Trace, which, receiving three pounds only, finished six lengths ahead of Prince Galahad. It has been urged that Mr. Robinson's colt was slightly off his feed after his arrival at Newmarket, but taking his performance as it stands, it was a depressing one.

Daylight Patrol, the winner, had won a trial from Zerbino, third to Wimsu at Kempton on Easter Monday, and Perico. He was well supported from 6 down to 2 1/2 to 1. Obviously those who knew most were strongly of opinion that the son of Sunstar had a great chance of inflicting defeat upon Prince Galahad. Daylight Patrol is not a particularly attractive colt. He has a plain head. Owing to slow development, he had only run once previously, when beaten by Orpheus in the Prendergast Stakes last autumn. All the same, there are possibilities about Daylight Patrol, as well as Abbot's Trace. The latter, an impetuous, tear-away colt, put up an impressive performance at Liverpool, and was then considered likely to make a good showing in the Two Thousand Guineas. He is a son of Tracery and Abbot's Anne, which has bred about ten winners. She was eighteen years old when Abbot's Trace was foaled. Lord Dewar bought her privately for a big price from Lord St. Davids in 1915, when the mare was barren to Prince Palatine. She went to Tracery, and there was an option on a Tracery nomination for 1916. The foal, a bay colt, born that year was small, and as a yearling was sent to Australia, where, named Emblematic, he is a winner. In 1917 came the chestnut Abbot's Trace.

DAYLIGHT PATROL A GRAND PRIX HOPE.

Daylight Patrol is a chestnut colt by Sunstar—Lindoia, and has a "regular Rothschild pedigree." Lindoia, which had dubious forelegs, won the Ross Memorial Stakes of \$4,975 at Goodwood over the course, beating Persophone and Toolish, which the next year ran second in the Oaks. Lindoia only raced as a two-year-old. She was generally competing in first-class company. Daylight Patrol is her fourth foal. Her first was a filly by Spearmin and did not race. She was sold in 1916, when several American breeders made ineffectual attempts to secure her. Then came Sunstar Glow, which won at Newmarket as a youngster. She also ran second to Diadem in the Fulbourne Stakes, and third to Tabard and Grand Prix in the Clewwell Stakes, in which Gay Crusader was unplaced. Then came a filly by Tracery, which died in 1915. Next came Scarlet Glow, which was three unplaced in 1916. Daylight Patrol was foaled in 1917. Lindoia has a two-year-old filly by Cicero which is named Balissa, and a chestnut yearling colt Tracery by Tracery.

Lindoia is by Gallinule—Venus, a good stayer, and bred Hippocastum, winner of the Easter Stakes at Kempton, beating Abreour, the Derby winner, Rock Flint, Samubar and Roseworthy. He never reproduced this high form, for he developed spavins, which practically prevented his being trained, though, of course, war conditions also interfered. Venus is by St. Simon—Lady Lovelace, the dam of the Derby winner and well-known sire, St. Amant, which won almost \$120,000 in stakes. Lady Lovelace as youngster broke a leg. It was possible, however, to save her for the stud, and thus enable her to contribute to the romance of the turf.

The next dam was Nellie, which won seven races, value \$21,620, and ran third in the One Thousand Guineas and in the Oaks. She was by Hermit (Derby), dam Hippia, winner of sixteen races, including the Oaks, in which race she defeated Achievement, which had won the One Thousand Guineas, and later on also won the St. Leger. It will be seen that Daylight Patrol comes of a family which has been uniformly successful and he is moreover one of the best bred colts in England. He is in all the classic races as well as the Grand Prix de Paris, in which he may follow in the footsteps of his stable companion, Galopier Light. Orpheus, Abbot's Trace and Prince Galahad will no doubt add greatly to American interest in our classic races.

HE GOES OUT OF ALL BUT DERBY.

He Goes, owing to the regrettable death of a few days ago of his owner, Mrs. Wiltworth, at the early age of 35 years, is out of all classic races except the Derby. His running last year was generally meritorious, but he had not been satisfied with his work prior to the race. Last autumn a prominent American owner obtained an option on He Goes, principally because he was engaged in the Grand Prix. He did not exercise his option, and in the circumstances perhaps it is as well for him.

Rock Flint, which was bred in the United States, was responsible for a couple of winners last week, Plymouth Rock, for which Sir James Buchanan gave \$25,000 last December, won the first time he carried his new owner's colors. He captured the Wood Biton Stakes, one mile, easily by six lengths with top weight. Rock Flint stands at George Blackwell's Manderston Stud, Newmarket. Black-

PAUL JONES TAKES THE DERBY

UNCONSIDERED STABLE MATE OF BLAZES PROVES EQUAL TO A TASK IN WHICH THE LATTER FAILED---WHITNEY'S UPSET IN SECOND PLACE AND ON WATCH THIRD

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 8.—Bulletin.—Paul Jones from a fast beginning led throughout and his victory in a good measure was due to Rice's superb riding. Upset appeared the winner when a sixteenth from the finish, but began tiring right at the end. On Watch ran a good race and Danmark evinced discouraging traits, for he was going well when he gave up. Donnecona and Peace Pennant were disappointments. With his outside post position critics had early discarded Peace Pennant as a contender. The attendance was estimated by the management at 60,000 and the volume of speculation was stupendous.

The setting of the Derby was in keeping with the fame of the race. The greatest crowd that has attended a turf event in Kentucky witnessed the forty-sixth running of the Derby—sportsmen, statesmen and others of wide reputation. Private cars galore parked in the railroad yards and their occupants, visitors from all parts of the land, mingling this afternoon with others of wealth and fashion, brought a social tinge to the Downs rivaling a metropolitan atmosphere.

It vied with the best gatherings at Belmont Park, Saratoga and those of the olden days at Washington Park, which came to witness the American Derby.

Churchill Downs never looked more spick and span. Its great lawns, garbed in slushberry and flowers, and its infield, with its acme of horticultural achievement, afforded an exquisite view for a racing holiday.

Break of day found the first arrivals at the course. The early pilgrims, many of whom had failed to obtain accommodations at hotels or rooming houses and had been forced to spend the night in chairs of hotel corridors, took the occasion for a visit to view training operations and note the final preliminary warm-ups of the prospective Derby starters. Steadily the line of comers increased until about 10 a. m. all entrances found swarms wending into the grandstand, seeking vantage points, though all places afforded unobstructed vision.

The clubhouse contingent, boxholders and those having reserved seats in the exclusive section, were tardy of arrival, excepting those who had luncheon engagements at the clubhouse, and there were many of these parties. The noon hour found all roads from the city to the track in a congested condition. Conveyances of all descriptions, from the modern high-powered limousine to the faithful fashioned baroque, complete in detail to faithful former days, crisscrossed the track to the old, while the journey was tedious, though the distance short, they ultimately got there and most of the great assemblage that viewed the running of the 1920 Kentucky Derby had adjusted themselves in comfortable fashion before the bugle call in the initial dash starting off the racing here.

A more ideal day with respect to weather could not have been made to order. A brilliant sun shone throughout the day and continuous work by a huge force of track men gradually forced the muddy course to right steadily to a drying process, and it was in fairly good condition when the big feature was called for decision.

The spirit of the Derby fell upon downtown crowds last night. There was a display of fiery, lavish spending and sporting good-fellowship.

The crowd that blocked the streets and jammed hotel lobbies was serious, each elbowing, calculating member was keyed and intent on his part in the great business scheduled for today. Grouped in little knots in lobbies or on street corners in former days, cursing or blessed the weather as their fortune prompted, wished for or went in search of needed "bracers."

Hotel desks seemed settings for riot scenes, although the "S. R. O." sign had been out long before the rush began, the never ending prayer, "Just for a place to stretch out" went on into the morning. There was clarity and many who had met only in the camaraderie of Derby eve lay down in the friendship of mutual suffering in some sagging cot.

The sport of kings is the sport of the masses. No other event could bring to Churchill Downs the multitude that is brought by the opportunity to witness one of the most famous races offered by the American turf. There could be no racing upon such a scale were it not a fact that the people support it. The procession of automobiles to the track today suggested that everyone was driving to Churchill Downs in a motor vehicle, but thousands who are of the class to whom a dollar means a good deal, but to whom a Kentucky Derby means everything for the time being.

Capt. W. H. May, who has not missed a Kentucky Derby running since the inception of the race in 1875, made his annual visit, accompanied by his son, J. W. May, who came from New York to witness the race. "Bub" May intends to race again in the East and his horses are rounding into good shape.

Roddy Marshall, well-known Pittsburgh attorney and owner of the Keystone Stable, came over with a party of friends from the Smoky City to view Derby Day incidents. Many of the disappointed ones who failed to get proper hotel accommodations made themselves comfortable as best they could in the hotel lobbies. Others rode in taxi cabs during the night and managed to extract some sleep.

The W. R. Coe pair, Cleopatra and David Harum, will be shipped back to New York Sunday. Trainer Karpick was again starting the filly and her presence in the big race was by instruction of her owner. James W. McLelland, managing the extensive racing interest of Ed W. Simms, will leave New York on the Steamer Krookland for Southampton, where he will transfer for Paris, France. While abroad he intends to devote much of his time on a tour of inspection of the different studs in France and also to look over the recently acquired Prince Palatine. Mr. McLelland's trip will also

include a visit to Ireland and England, where he will look over the famous gray sire, The Teuchoc. Mr. McLelland will embark on the Celtic July 7 for his return to this country. The forty-two horses racing in the name and colors of J. W. McLelland and now at Havre de Grace in charge of trainers Kimball Patterson and Charles Hughes, will be shipped to New York Monday. The sixteen comprising the band in Hughes' care will go to Belmont Park and Patterson's division will be quartered at Jamaica.

Trainer Max Hirsch will take the G. W. Loft pair to Pimlico Sunday and they are intended to start in the Preakness Stakes.

Upset, Wildair and John P. Grier that trainer James Rowe brought here will be taken back to Maryland Sunday. Those horses owned by Harry Payne Whitney that trainer Mose Goldblatt brought here from New Orleans will be raced in Kentucky under Goldblatt's supervision.

Frank J. Bruen, who came here from Havana to witness the Derby, leaves for New York Sunday, where he will confer with Messrs. McGraw and Stoneham regarding plans for next winter's racing in the Cuban capital. While here Mr. Bruen had a long consultation with H. D. Brown, who planned and built the Cuban track and last winter decided to retire from racing, turning his interest over to Messrs. Stoneham and McGraw.

Jockeys Rodriguez and Fator returned to Pimlico tonight.

J. E. "Cap" Murray, well-known New York newspaper man, came from the East to see the Derby. W. A. McQuaker, managing the Waldorf Hotel, came with him. Both will remain some time to witness the racing.

Billy Stuart and John Sierlock, who have not missed a Kentucky Derby in many years, were early arrivals from Cincinnati.

The number of Kentucky Derby visitors conspicuous in the reserved section included Harry Payne Whitney, Harry F. Sinclair, Commander J. K. L. Ross, Daniel G. Reid, J. L. Repole, Lars Anderson, J. G. Widener, Allan A. Ryan, J. S. Gosden, W. P. Stewart, H. K. Knapp, W. G. Street, H. G. Faulk, G. W. Loft and Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt. The above-named were attended by big parties of guests and came in their private cars. Other notables included Governor Edwin B. Morrow of Kentucky, Ed W. Simms, Gifford A. Cochran, W. M. Jeffords, Monfort Jones, W. R. Coe, Edward Mangus, Price McKinney, Ral Parr, J. B. Edwell, A. Forman, Lawrence Waterbury, Henry Oliver, Garrett B. Wall, Thomas Cochran, Wm. H. Bowman, Thomas N. McCarthy, Harvey Gibson, Judge Charles Lyman and numerous others. W. W. Barlow, who races a few horses of his own breeding, was an arrival from Nashville. He owned the good but now dead stallion Ivan the Terrible and reports a promising crop of colts at his Nashville establishment sired by the horse. Blazes and Paul Jones will be shipped back to Maryland Sunday. They are intended starters in the Preakness Stakes.

Judge Charles F. Price was nursing a badly mashed finger, an injury he sustained while coming from Lexington on the train.

Archie Zimmerman made a flying visit from New York to witness the Derby. He will return east tomorrow.

George Barnes, acting for C. W. Clark, has been for some time trying to secure the colt Sterling from C. C. Van Meter and negotiations had reached a stage last night where it seemed probable that the colt would race in the Derby under the silks of Mr. Clark, but the offer of \$20,000 and \$10,000 additional in the event that the colt was turned down. Barnes then called all negotiations off, but this morning Mr. Van Meter agreed to the proposition and the hitch arose of locating Mr. Clark, who, believing that he could not obtain the colt, left for somewhere in Montana and up to a late hour could not be located on the phone by Mr. Barnes.

H. Tullet was denied the privilege of riding Key T. in the fourth race, the license committee granting him a trainer's license only.

Jockey T. Murray will leave tomorrow with the Larry Waterbury string for New York. The horses go in charge of trainer P. T. Chinn.

The Kentucky State Racing Commission members met in the clubhouse and transacted some routine business, which included passing upon the applications for licenses.

Sam J. Davis, formerly manager of the Essex Park, Hot Springs, Ark., track, was among the visitors.

W. O. Parmer, who is extensively interested in the Windsor track, came over from Nashville and will remain several days before going on to Detroit.

Fred Genard, former well-known racing official, came from Detroit, where he is at present located in business.

SOME PIMLICO SURPRISES

Ross Stars, Boniface and Billy Kelly, Beaten in Their Races.

Duettiste Shows Good Form and Wins the Green Spring Valley Steeplechase.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 8.—A brilliant attendance gathered at old Pimlico today and witnessed the signal downfall of the powerful J. K. L. Ross stable in the two most important races of the day. Copious rain had fallen overnight and made the going heavy, a circumstance that had much to do with the overthrow of Boniface and Billy Kelly under their heavy impost.

Duettiste maintained his reputation as a champion steeplechaser when he raced to the front in the last half mile of the thirteenth running of the \$5,000 Green Spring Valley Steeplechase and won from Royal Arch without any trouble, giving him twenty pounds and a good beating. Reliance made a good showing and finished third, but Brooks, from which much was expected, proved a failure. The first ribuff for the Ross stable came in the fourth race. Sir Barton was scratched and Boniface relied upon. He was at a short price and made a gallant finish, but the lightly weighted Slippery Elm, admirably served by the state of the going, proved too much for him, and won all the way. It was Boniface's first defeat this year and he was not in the least disgraced.

Tieklisch is a horse which should win frequently, but seldom does so because he seldom has a good rider on his back. Today he had the competent pilotage of A. Johnson and showed his appreciation of the fact by defeating the redoubtable Billy Kelly and gave the champion stable its second severe froer.

After Tutt galloped home in front of his opponents in the opening race, the stewards issued the following ruling: "The entry of the two-year-old Tutt is refused pending investigation."

"The entry of the horse L'Infirmer is refused. By order of the stewards.—Wm. P. Riggs, A. H. Morris, Frank J. Bryan."

L'Infirmer ran away two and a half miles yesterday on his way to the post in the seventh race yesterday. He is a notorious bad post actor and the officials deemed it to the best interest of the sport not to permit him to race here, hence the ruling in his case.

James Healey will ship the jumpers he purchased from L. W. Garth yesterday to Toronto to participate in the racing at Woodbine Park. He sold Jay Bird, which he claimed the other day, back to the Crown Stable.

Jack Campbell will leave for Toronto next week to assume his duties as racing secretary at the Thorncliffe track, Toronto. The meeting at Thorncliffe follows that at Woodbine Park and will conflict with that at Dorval.

James Ross, assistant superintendent to Edward Burke at Havre de Grace, was a visitor at Pimlico this afternoon. Many improvements will be made to the Havre de Grace plant during the summer, the purpose of the owners being to make the course one of the most picturesque and inviting of any of the Maryland tracks.

The big string that Kimball Patterson and Charles Hughes are training for Edward Simms will be shipped from Havre de Grace to Jamaica on Monday.

W. P. Burch, acting for Samuel Ross of Washington, has disposed at private sale to James Fitzsimmons the plater Chimera. It is said that Fitzsimmons acted for a New York patron in the transaction.

Stalls have been hedged down for the Harry Payne Whitney three-year-olds which went to Kentucky to start in the Derby. They are coming back to Maryland to fill their engagement in the Preakness Stakes.

The Maryland Jockey Club, now that racing has been placed on a firm foundation here, contemplates remodeling the Pimlico plant. James Foster, who designed the grandstand at the Polo Grounds in New York and the Yale bowl, was here today looking over the plant. It is said that the old grandstand will be torn down and a handsome and up-to-date structure built. The clubhouse will be moved farther down toward Belvidere avenue and a new paddock built where the present clubhouse stands. When completed, Pimlico will be an up-to-date and modern racing plant.

A. J. (Jimmy) Bunn departed for Atlantic City today for a short vacation. His horses have been turned over to J. Burtisshell to train.

James F. O'Hara, just back from a visit to Toronto, said today that the prospects for a good race meeting at Thorncliffe were particularly pleasing. No purse will have a less value than \$1,000 and the overnight handicaps will be of \$1,500. Mr. O'Hara is now busying himself with the preparations for the opening of the Driving Park meeting, which begins May 19 to continue to May 24. The success of this meeting is already assured with the number of horsemen who will remain in Maryland for its term. Stuart Polk shipped the division of the stable he was racing at Pimlico back to Havre de Grace, where they will leave on the special that will pull out on Sunday for Montreal.

Jockey Richereck will do the light riding and Rodriguez the heavy riding for the Seagram Stable during the entire season of racing on the Canadian circuit this year.

Jockey A. Nicklaus has decided to confine his riding this year to flat racing. He is under contract to the J. E. Davis stable.

The Commander J. K. L. Ross stable at Pimlico is being inclosed and when completed will be an ideal training stable for the early spring.

Herman Conklin and Jake Weidner, two of the racing officials employed here, contemplate locating in Maryland permanently. Mr. Conklin will reside in the future in Baltimore, while Mr. Weidner will make his home in the vicinity of Towson.

Man of War is expected to arrive at Pimlico May 12 and he will make his final preparations for the Preakness over the old Hilltop track. Jockey Romanelli announced that he will go
