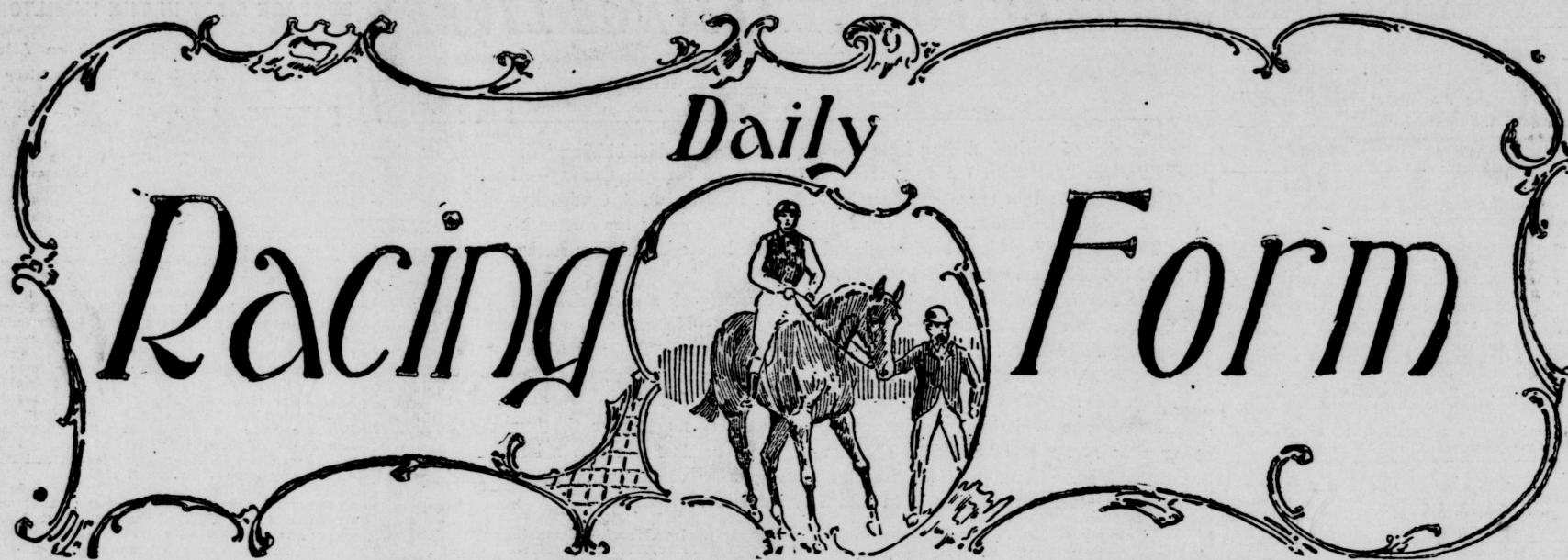

**ROYAL CONTEST IN STORE**

Eager Interest Waits on Meeting of Two Great Horses.

**Characteristics of Man o' War and Sir Barton and Their Bearing on Saratoga Cup Race.**

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 7.—What promises to be the racing test of the year will be the meeting of Man o' War and Sir Barton in the Saratoga Cup, at one mile and three-quarters, on the closing day of the meeting at this point. It will be the first time these splendid specimens of the thoroughbred will try each other's mettle, unless a special race should be arranged by the management between now and that date; and if the weather and course conditions are favorable a new record may be looked for. Man o' War's sensational work on Tuesday last, when he covered a mile and an eighth in 1:49 1/2, and Sir Barton's mile and a quarter in 2:01 1/2 in the Saratoga Handicap indicate the fitness of both horses.

It will be interesting to see whether the old adage about a good big horse being able to take the measure of a good little one will hold in this case, as it has in most of the other tests that have been made between horses that have been concededly first class, but have not been matched in a physical sense. Somebody recently referred to Sir Barton as "a bull of a horse," conveying the impression that he is a great heavy type of the thoroughbred. As a matter of fact, he is a trifle over 15.2 hands in height and probably never has weighed 950 pounds in training. He is all horse, however, from his rat-like ears to his well-placed tail.

**SIR BARTON A GLUTTON FOR WORK.**

It is doubtful if the turf ever had a tougher bit of racing material than Commander Ross' champion. He is a glutton for work. When trainer Bedwell was getting him ready for his early engagements as a three-year-old, he gave him a drilling that would have knocked out any horse but the son of Star Shoot. Trials with Cudgel and Billy Kelly on all kinds of tracks and with weight up were the order of the day. The culminating work that made the average trainer hold up his hands, and declare that Bedwell had at last reached the climax, came one day at Havre de Grace, when the colt was brought out in a drizzling rain—a cold, raw afternoon that would make the average man keep his charges indoors, and sent a mile and an eighth in 1:54 1/2. He had Cudgel as a prompter for five eighths, and Billy Kelly brought him home. There wasn't an onlooker that didn't question the wisdom of Bedwell's judgment on that occasion, and yet history records that he was right. Bedwell knew his horse. It was his work day, and rain, hail or shine Sir Barton was on the track. If any proof were needed as to Bedwell's skill, the manner in which he brought the four-year-old to the post for the Saratoga Handicap recently should be convincing. That Bedwell will have him on edge for the Cup is a foregone conclusion. That he will start him also is certain as he has always raced his horses when they were ready, and has never shown a disposition to dodge the issue with his rivals.

When A. K. Macomber was in this country recently he said that our system of racing took much more out of a horse than the method which prevailed in France. Races are run from start to finish here, no matter what the distance, whereas on the continent there is frequently no pace during the early part. The fact that Hollister, which was considered a miler when racing here, has been placed in good company at a mile and a half in France is proof of this assertion.

**CUP A RACE FROM END TO END.**

It is for this reason that the Saratoga Cup should go down in history as a great race. Both Man o' War and Sir Barton like to go to the front. If both trainers give orders to race from the moment the barrier is released a contest that will surpass anything the American turf has seen may be looked for, as both horses are dead game and each comes from families noted for their stamina. It will be a case of the survival of the fittest. Nature will be called upon for her last reserves of speed and stamina. Whichever horse has the stouter heart and the greater degree of nerve force will be crowned the champion.

In Sir Barton, Man o' War will be meeting the horse best qualified to search out his weaknesses, if he possesses any. No other horse that could be selected could be depended to carry him along all the way. When Sir Barton is in action he is the picture of the relentless, tireless type of thoroughbred that never acknowledges defeat. With his head and tail on a line and his ears flattened to the disappearing point on his neck, he is a veritable racing machine.

On the other hand, there is no denying the fact that Man o' War is a phenomenon. In physical makeup he is as nearly perfect as horses come. He is 16.2 hands, but is so beautifully modeled that he does not look it. His action is long, low and sweeping, like that of the greyhound, and his stride so terrific that old-timers compare it to that of Longfellow. There is no doubt that he covers more ground at a bound than his older rival, and as his recovery is so smooth and frictionless, his admirers claim that over a long route this will be greatly in his favor. If Sir Barton has as much speed as Man o' War he has never shown it in public. He is, however, blessed with what might be termed the "gift of continuance," and if Man o' War takes his measure on Tuesday, August 31, it will indeed be a case of hats off to the champion. Louis Feustel has handled him with rare skill to date and has earned the highest praise for his ability as a horseman.

The record for the Cup is 2:58, held jointly by Africander and Exterminator. The former made his fine effort in 1903, and he was a three-year-old, with 113 pounds up. That was the scale at that period for a three-year-old. W. S. Vosburgh always contended that three-year-olds had the

**MARKET FOR YEARLINGS LIVELY**

**THIRTY-NINE JUVENILES SOLD AT SARATOGA WEDNESDAY FOR A TOTAL OF \$109,850 --- FRIDAY NIGHT'S SALES BRING THE HIGHER AGGREGATE OF \$128,950**

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 7.—The big sale of yearlings here began Wednesday night. The attendance filled the spacious Fasig-Tipton sales ring with a brilliant assemblage and included every prominent owner in these parts and other sections of the country. Bidding at times was spirited, particularly when some of the choicer offerings were in the ring, and prices realized were on a par with last season. The general consensus was that the demand for youngsters is still great and that those combining good ancestry and looks will command big sums.

Thirty-nine youngsters went under the hammer at the initial sale and they comprised consignments of Miss Elizabeth Daingerfield, Samuel Ross, The Short-Grass Stud Company, C. H. Berryman, Balgowan Stud, D. W. Scott, Carr & Piatt, W. W. Darden and others. The entire collection realized a total of \$109,850, for a grand average of \$2,817.35.

The star offering was the Short Grass—Marian Hood colt, which was knocked down to George Barnes for \$13,500. The bidding on this colt was lively up to the \$10,000 mark, when it became draggy. The Spanish Prince II.—Junta colt, also in the Short Grass Stud consignment, was the next highest priced colt sold during the evening, and he also was knocked down to George Barnes on a bid of \$10,500. The other nine colts and fillies offered by the Short Grass Stud Company brought the total to \$44,100, or an average of \$4,909.

George Barnes was an active bidder on these colts and had six of them knocked down to his account. It was not established for whom he was acting, but it was not for C. W. Clark.

The Daingerfield-Ross offering, comprising eight head, went for a total of \$18,100, and an average of \$2,262.50. The star in this consignment was the Sweep—Highflown colt, which went to William Garth on his bid of \$5,100.

Commander J. K. L. Ross secured the colt by Jim Gaffney—Irish Queen for \$9,000. This was the first offering of the evening and a lively tilt for his possession ensued. The Sweep—Droll colt in the W. W. Darden consignment also realized \$9,000.

There was nothing particularly striking about any of the offerings so far as looks were concerned, and a noticeable feature of the sale was the inactivity of many former eastern buyers in the high bidding. The sales in full follow:

Fasig-Tipton's sale mart Friday night rivaled the elaborate setting of the Madison Square Horse Shows, for wealth and fashion were conspicuous and the brilliant assemblage included many of America's foremost feminine social leaders, who occupied vantage points near the ring, attired in evening gowns.

The magnet responsible for attracting the fashionable people was the offering at auction of the yearlings consigned by A. B. Hancock from his Claiborne and Ellerslie studs; those of Capt. P. M. Walker's Page Brook stud; Rear Admiral Carey T. Grayson's and Charlton Clay's.

There were forty-eight yearlings to go under the hammer; all bred in the purple and by such noted sires as Celt, Wrack, Rock View, Jim Gaffney, Martinet, Ballot and Dick Fennell. Also such less tried but promising sires as Lough Foyle, Madrigalian, Bard of Hope and Madman. The grand total of the sale was \$128,950, a grand average of \$2,686.65.

The star of the sale was the sturdy looking colt in Hancock's lot, by Rock View—Gold, which went for \$14,000 to W. R. Midgely, acting for Mrs. Payne Whitney. The same purchaser also secured the highest priced filly of the sale when the chestnut Miss, by Celt—Network, was knocked down on a bid of \$12,500. **MAN O' WAR'S EASY TRIUMPH**

Takes the Miller Stakes Before a Great Assemblage.

**Fleet Nancy Lee Wins the United States Hotel Stakes in Fast Time.**

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 7.—While the United States Hotel Stakes held the place of honor on today's card by virtue of its great value and long history, it was overshadowed to a great extent by the recently established Miller Stakes, formerly known as the Kenner. This was due to the presence in it of S. D. Riddle's superb three-year-old Man o' War. In fact, the colt's intended start this afternoon was responsible for an augmented attendance that brought the visitors up to a record standard for this course. So great was curiosity to obtain a close-up of the noted colt that an extra detail of Pinkerton police had to be rushed to the saddling point in the paddock, and then it was with difficulty that the colt was given enough walking space. The thousands of persons in close proximity to him caused the colt to become nervous and he cavorted about friskily until he was on the track, where he steadied down and was tractable on reaching the post.

Nothing like the interest displayed in this horse has ever been manifested on an American race track, and there is no doubt that he is the greatest drawing card in the way of a racing attraction that the United States has ever known.

So far as a contest was concerned, the initial running of the Miller Stakes will go down in history as an easy achievement for Man o' War, for Sande, substituting for the injured Kummer, took the great colt into the lead at once and he was never remotely endangered of losing command. Donnacona, which followed him closest throughout, appeared to be holding his own for three quarters, but it was only on surferance that he kept so close to Man o' War. After rounding into the stretch, Donnacona shortened his stride, and Sande, realizing there was no further contention behind him, took Man o' War under restraint and was content to let him go along at a moderate gallop through the last eighth. Donnacona was not pushed or ridden extra hard, and easily held King Albert, the only other starter, safe for second place. The net value of the stakes to Man o' War was \$4,700.

After Man o' War had won, Mr. H. K. Knapp, who acted as a steward for the race, presented Mr. Riddle with the beautiful cup which Mrs. Miller had donated for the stake, which was named in honor of her late husband, Andrew Miller, who was for many years secretary-treasurer of the Saratoga Association. Mr. Knapp congratulated Mr. Riddle on the possession of such a superb horse and the owner of the great colt told of the pleasure he derived in adding the Miller trophy to his collection of racing souvenirs. After the presentation Mr. Riddle said he regretted that he had not let Sande send the colt along for the track record at the distance, which is 1:56, made by Cudgel with one hundred and thirty-one pounds up as a four-year-old. As Man o' War also carried one hundred and thirty-one pounds and ran in 1:56 1/2 without Sande changing his rein hold, it is a foregone conclusion that he could have beaten it. After weighing out Sande said: "I never felt anything like that horse in my life. Why, he is a regular machine. He strides farther than anything I ever rode and does it so smoothly that you would not think he was running at all."

Man o' War's next start will be in the Travers Stakes on Saturday, August 21.

**NANCY LEE DEFEATS FAST COLTS.**

It remained for a filly to triumph over a crack band of two-year-olds that met to decide possession of the \$7,900 net that went to the winner of the United States Hoel Stakes and Nancy Lee, carrying the silks of P. A. Clark, was the heroine to accomplish the feat. She did it in such decisive style that no room was left for doubt as to her superiority this afternoon. She displayed fine speed from the start, disposed of the early contenders in easy style and shook off General J. M. Gomez' challenge with apparent ease. The Cuban owned colt's race was also a sparkler, by far much better than his showing in the Flash Stakes on the opening day, and the same applies to E. R. Bradley's Black Servant, which finished fast and gamely after being a forward contender throughout and beat Registrar for third place. The dis-appointment of the race was Harry Payne Whitney's Exodus, which was far back throughout the running. There were originally ten named to start in the race, but Adonis and Kirklevington were absentees, the R. T. Wilson connections adding Knight of the Heather at the last moment to substitute for Kirklevington.

The Ballston Steeplechase Handicap over the about two miles course furnished an outstanding upset by the runaway victory of G. R. Tompkins' Highland Light, which won as his rider pleased. Evidently the riders of the others engaged in the race must have thought that Highland Light would not hold his lead far, for they employed restraining tactics and made no serious effort to go after the leader until almost concluding the last turn of the field, and then it was a hopeless task to overtake him. Barkle landed in second place and Lytle third. The favorite, Royal Arch, blundered badly at the water jump and it proved his undoing. A cheap band of maidens opened the sport with Brink the winner from Nelle Yorke and Judge David.

Nightstick took an ordinary band into camp in the fifth race and won the first purse for Larry Waterbury at the meeting.

The concluding race fell to Sea Rock, carrying the colors of Samuel Ross. Hoodwink, which finished third in the race, might have won but for being upset considerably at the post. Activities of the claiming brigade was confined to the fifth race. The winner, Nightstick, in this was bid up from an entered price of \$800 to \$2,100 by Sam Louis, but P. T. Chinn protested him for

MAN O' WAR'S EASY TRIUMPH (Continued from first page.) Larry Waterbury with the customary \$5 advance. Title was claimed by J. D. Wilson for \$2,400, and Frogtown went to W. Garti's stable at a cost of \$2,400.

"Snapper" Garrison was taken with an attack of acute indigestion during the afternoon and required the attention of a physician. The Uncle-Miss Grayville colt (brother to Little Nephew), which E. R. Bradley bought at the yearling sales, was for the account of Bud Fisher, the noted cartoonist, who intends to embark in racing as an owner, and is in quest of serviceable material in the way of matured horses, as well as youngsters, to form his racing establishment. Bob Shannon will have charge of furnishing the racing lessons of the Miss Grayville colt.

Emil Herz shipped the Short Grass stud youngsters to Gravesend, where they will be broken and instructed in racing requirements. The Montfort Jones yearlings that Edward Garrison is in charge of will also be shipped to the one-time Dwyer track to go through their early racing paces.

Victor Munoz, the well-known sporting writer of Havana, was among the newcomers, and will make an indefinite stay here, as the guest of A. H. Diaz. Leo L. in the James Johnston Stable, had to be destroyed this morning after breaking a leg, as a result of a fall while being schooled over the jumps on the Oklahoma track.

"I have always held Tremont to be the greatest two-year-old that raced in this country," said James McLaughlin, the one-time famous rider and now veteran patrol judge, "until near the end of last year, when I changed my opinion and gave the palm to Man o' War. I believe him the greatest young horse this country ever had in racing. Hindoo and Luke Blackburn I hold superior to Sir Barton."

ROYAL CONTEST IN STORE (Continued from first page.) advantage under the scale as it existed then, and finally it was changed so that the impost at the present time is 116 pounds, and this is what Man o' War will carry as against 126 for Sir Barton. The fact that Friar Rock, Omar Khayyam and Johnen all won the prize with 113 pounds was convincing proof that the older horses were at a disadvantage under the old scale.

The Saratoga Cup is one of the oldest of the American Stake races. It was inaugurated in 1865 when it was won by Kentucky, a son of Lexington, in the colors of Hunter & Travers. The same horse won it the following year. Springbok won it in 1874, and in 1875 dead-beated with Preakness, Parole and General Monroe each won it twice, but in the other years of its existence it has never been taken on more than one occasion by the same horse. Four mares have won it—Thora in 1882, when the distance was two miles and a quarter, the true Cup route; Los Angeles at two miles in 1891, and by Beldane and Running Water in 1904 and 1907, respectively, when the distance was one mile and five-eighths.

President Wilson and his associates will be put to it to find room for all who will want to see the Cup of 1920.

the pair elicited spirited bidding from many quarters. The chief bidding strife of the evening, however, developed with the appearance in the ring of the Jim Gaffney—Alice Dudley colt, consigned by Charlton Clay. Commander J. K. L. Ross and J. S. Cosden figured as the principals as seeking possession of him, but Commander Ross secured the colt on his bid of \$12,600.

There were thirty-three head consigned by A. B. Hancock and they realized the munificent sum of \$97,850, an average of \$2,686.65.

The eleven youngsters from Capt. Walker's Page Brook stud totaled \$11,100, an average of \$1,110. The star of the consignment was the Celt—Moisant colt, which brought \$3,800. The two fillies comprising the consignment of Admiral Carey T. Grayson went for \$3,800, an average of \$1,900, but the record average for the sale was reached by the pair consigned by Charlton Clay. Their sales totaled \$14,400, an average of \$7,200.

Mrs. Payne Whitney, for whom W. R. Midgely was acting as the buyer, secured five youngsters at a cost of \$37,900. Commander J. K. L. Ross was also a liberal buyer. The prices realized, while not of the frenzied bidding order of last year, were satisfactory and showed the yearling market to be in a healthy condition.

BONDAGE FIRST IN THE HAMILTON CUP

Meeting Comes to a Close with an Attendance Equal to Any in Hamilton's History

HAMILTON, Ont., August 7.—Mrs. James Arthur's six-year-old horse Bondage, saddled by Clyde Phillips and excellently ridden by Jockey Richereek, won the Hamilton Cup at a mile and a quarter for three-year-olds and over, which featured the closing card of the Hamilton Jockey Club meeting. Claymore finished second and Ladder of Light third in a stirring finish with but a half length separating the pair at the head end of the procession.

The victory of Bondage was easily the most popular of the meeting. An immense crowd, fully as large as the best previous gathering in the history of the course, backed the Arthur color bearer into favoritism and applauded him lustily when he rushed past the judges. Richereek rode a confident race, allowing his mount to gallop along at his own pleasure until nearing the far turn, while Claymore had raced into an immense lead in the first three quarters. After passing the half mile ground, the pace began to tell on Claymore, and Bondage set sail for him. Straightening out, Bondage challenged Claymore at the eighth post, wore him down in the next sixteenth and began to draw away from there, hand ridden.

The refusal of the entry of Trusty, made by the stewards here, holds only for the current meeting, according to an announcement made today. His entry was accepted on other Canadian Associations tracks, but this son of Broomstick—Loyal was shipped to Montreal to campaign on the half-mile tracks with the remainder of the string of Stewart Polk.

Dee Hammond, P. J. Miles and M. Seifert also will ship to Montreal Monday. All of the large stables that have been racing here, such as the Ross and Polson strings, will be sent to Fort Erie for the meeting opening there Wednesday. Some of the other horsemen shipping there are H. Tullett, C. Murray, F. Farrar, J. T. Strite, T. Crist and A. L. Austin.

W. Russell claimed Yorkist out of the third race today from A. V. Thomas for \$1,900. Mr. Russell was represented in the race by Lady Blunroe. Mr. Thomas had planned to take Yorkist to Fort Erie. The remainder of his stable, consisting of Yowell, Skye Ball and a yearling, will be left here until the opening of the fall meeting at Woodbine Park.

J. W. Murphy will ship Duc de Guise from here to Fort Erie. Joe Grune, a promising Louisville apprentice under contract to Mr. Murphy, will also go to Fort Erie.

King's Champion, J. MacManus' three-year-old, is being pointed for the Dominion Handicap, of \$10,000 added, the feature of the Fort Erie meeting.

The Canadian Racing Associations will hold a meeting some time during the meeting at Fort Erie, when several matters of importance will be taken up. Among them will be the action taken by the stewards representing the Hamilton Jockey Club against jockeys Heupel and Claver, who were suspended for that meeting and their cases referred to the Canadian Racing Associations. Heupel's riding of the maiden Voormir was said to have been the cause of the lad being set down and, if that is a fact, the chances are that he will be restored to good standing. Claver got in trouble through his riding of Roseloy, which he pulled up at the start of the race.

The claiming rule in use on the Maryland courses is responsible for several owners who raced on that circuit in former years deciding to finish out the season here. The horsemen claim that the Maryland rule places them at the mercy of the baltermen and that the Kentucky rule, which is in force here, is much more satisfactory.

Thomas Hodge and W. H. Cissna have decided to ship their horses from here to Ottawa, where they will be rested until the opening of the Connaught Park meeting.

Jockey S. McGraw, who hurt his knee as a result of a fall from Capon at Kenilworth, has recovered from his injuries and will resume riding at Fort Erie.

Jockey J. Williams, who suffered a couple of broken bones as a result of a fall at the previous meeting at Fort Erie, is still confined to his home in Hamilton, but hopes to be able to be in the saddle again when the Havre de Grace meeting begins.

At the conclusion of the Fort Erie meeting Cyrus Field Clark will leave for Kentucky to take up the yearlings purchased by J. H. Louchain several weeks ago. The two-year-old Tenite will be taken to Kentucky and turned out. No attempt will be made to race her until next spring. The horsemen here are finding the job of securing cars for shipping a difficult proposition, with the result that some who contemplated racing at Fort Erie will be unable to get there. H. Nester has arranged to ship his string in three box cars tomorrow.
