CLEOPATRA THE VICTRESS

Takes Long Established Alabama Stakes from Ethel Gray.

Fair Gain Again a Winner—Pat Dunne Furnishes a Surprise—Ararat a Probable Star.

(BY J. L. DEMPSEY). SARATOGA, N. Y., August 12.—The Alabama Stakes, inaugurated at this track in 1872 and serving annually as a test to establish the best three-year-old filly, was the carded feature of today's program, and its decision brought victory for W. R. Coe's Cleopatra, which led Ethel Gray home in game style...

When McAttee called on her to take the lead, she did so in easy style, and only once in the stretch racing did the rider have to urge her a trifle to keep in the van of Ethel Gray, which had offered a pressing challenge when about an eighth out, but Cleopatra went by the finish line under mild restraint. Ethel Gray ran a good race and had little difficulty in displacing Edwina from second place. Cleopatra's victory was popular and loudly cheered.

The second race found Fair Gain an easy victor over Biff Bang. Shillelagh II. was backed with rare confidence in the fifth race, but Eddie Martin got him away from the barrier slowly and guided him wide all the way, resulting in his failure to get any part of the purse...

Pat Dunne furnished an upset in the sixth race when his two-year-old Old Faithful won in easy style from Playfellow, brother to the redoubtable Man o' War. Billy McLaughlin and General Menocal were the supposed good things, but they never figured prominently at any part of the race.

The Harry Payne Whitney stable uncovered a possible crack colt in the final race in Ararat, a son of Broomstick—Dovelet. It was only a canter for him to show the way home to the others, Lucky Find and Toreador following him closest at the finish. Today's seven-race card and augmented attendance by week-enders here from New York brought about more activity than on former days of this week...

SECONDARY FEATURE TO BROOKHOLT.

A heavyweight handicap at three-quarters served as the secondary feature and it brought eight of the original twenty-eight carded to the post. The frequently disappointing Blazes again proved a failure, for he was an outstanding choice, but the finish found Brookholt and High Cost fighting it out stubbornly for the purse, with Brookholt just managing to get the verdict. War Marvel headed Blazes for third money. There was some excuse for Blazes' failure, for he was away slowly and forced to race wide for the entire way.

Mary Erb, which ran a good race yesterday, when she landed in second place, won the opener from Mavourneen, with Light Fantastic in third place. Jockey Fator received a six-day suspension from the starter, for disobedience at the post in the third race.

J. M. Murphy claimed W. R. Coe's Mavourneen out of the opener at a cost of \$3,000. The eleven horses in training owned by Frederick Johnson, and trained by William Martin, have been turned over to J. P. Mayberry's charge. The change in trainers was due to the fact that Martin wants to confine his activities to his own horses.

During the absence of "Snapper" Garrison, who is ill, F. A. Gailor is in charge of the Montford Jones horses. Garrison is progressing favorably and will be able to leave the hospital shortly. Jockey Sande returned from Fort Erie this morning and Sir Barton will arrive tonight.

Jockey M. Garner was unable to ride this afternoon and Mooney and Lyke substituted for him on the Florissant Stable starters. Kay Spence has decided on shipping Minto II. and Ace High back to Lexington next week. The others that he brought here will be sold privately.

S. A. CLOPTON purchased Flare at private sale from G. R. Bryson, acting for J. Griffith. The nine yearlings bought by Mrs. Payne Whitney up to date will be kept here and broken by W. R. Midgely. He will transfer the youngsters to Belmont Park at the close of racing at that track.

E. R. Bradley has decided to send part of his string to Belmont Park after the close of racing here. The others will be shipped direct to Lexington. Pat Dunne's horses will be transferred to Lexington before the close of racing here.

Marshall Bros. contemplate sending their horses direct to Latonia after the meeting here and will not campaign during the Lexington meeting. The highly regarded Light Brigade—Jesse Woodson colt, that Sanford C. Lyne brought here to be sold by Fasig-Tipton, has been sold privately to the Quincy Stable for a good figure.

TRACK RECORDS SMASHED

Jorice and Bullion Hang Up Two New Marks at Fort Erie.

Second Day's Sport Brings Out Large Crowd—The Baggage Wins for E. B. McLean.

FORT ERIE, Ontario, August 12.—Jorice, a chestnut filly by Plaudit—Abby C., hung up a new track record at Fort Erie today, when she won the Niagara Falls Purse, a dash of five and a half furlongs, which she ran in 1:05 1/2.

The Edward B. McLean stable made amends for the defeat of The Porter in the Dominion Handicap when The Baggage, a filly by the Irish stallion Lough Foyle—The Mix II., won the opening race in easy fashion. The Baggage outlooked and outran the others all the way. The winner was bred by Mr. McLean at his farm in Virginia.

Another track record was broken when Rome Respass' Bullion ran the mile and seventy yards in the fifth race in 1:41 1/2. Bullion came from behind and beat Wynnewood out by a head in a driving finish.

Top of the Morning was withdrawn from the fourth race for the reason that he was ineligible. Jockeys Yeargin and Harboure were suspended for the remainder of the meeting by the stewards for rough riding, and McGraw was given three days by the starter for disobedience at the post.

Edward Stutte, one of the old guards, who a few years back was rated as one of the biggest operators in the country, was a visitor at Fort Erie. G. R. Allen has arranged to send Archie Alexander back to Windsor tomorrow. He shipped the horse here for the one race which he won this afternoon.

R. D. Williams has obtained first call on the services of the apprentice jockey G. Yeargin, beginning with the Windsor meeting and ending with the conclusion of the fall meetings in Kentucky.

Carroll Shilling left this morning with Commander J. K. L. Ross' great racer Sir Barton for Saratoga. The latter will be a starter at Saratoga on Saturday. He will be shipped back to Windsor to start in the \$10,000 Windsor Jockey Club Handicap on the opening day of that meeting.

John Schorr will send the Edward B. McLean racer The Porter to Saratoga tonight. Jockey Jack O'Brien will remain until tomorrow night. He will have the mount on Carmandale in the Buffalo Enquirer Handicap.

Before leaving for Saratoga Commander Ross announced that he would ship Boniface to Fort Erie to start in the Edward Maglin Handicap, a mile and a sixteenth race which will be featured on the closing day of the meeting.

The Edward B. McLean stable will be shipped from Saratoga to Havre de Grace at the conclusion of the meeting at the Spa.

J. G. Bussey is gathering together a stable to race at the Oriental Park meeting in Cuba. Jockey Jack O'Brien will accompany him and do the riding for the stable.

The blanks for the stakes to be run at the fall meeting at Havre de Grace were distributed among the horsemen this afternoon.

George Hay was an arrival from Toronto. His mission here is to look after securing cars for the horsemen to ship to Windsor and he immediately got busy lining up those who intend shipping from here to Windsor.

ENGLISH RACING STATISTICS

Sir Robert Jardine, Cinna, Polymelus and Donoghue Leaders in British Racing to July 26.

LONDON, England, July 28.—The statistics of English racing for the flat season, which began March 22, up to July 26, are given in the tables below: Sir Robert Jardine still leads the owners by a wide margin; his filly Cinna is in front of the horses. Polymelus has by far the largest total of the sires of winners, and S. Donoghue has a clear lead among the winning riders.

TRIBUTE TO DEAD TURFMAN

Wilf P. Pond Writes Interestingly of "A Distinguished American Horseman," the Late W. K. Vanderbilt

Under the heading, "A Distinguished American Horseman," Wilf P. Pond in the August issue of The Spur pays tribute to the late William K. Vanderbilt, the following article, however, being written and printed before the death of Mr. Vanderbilt:

"So much of the time of William K. Vanderbilt has been spent in France of recent years that it has not been generally realized to what extent he has developed abroad the interest in racing and breeding that originated in the United States in his limited venture with a few two-year-olds by Ornament. In fact, it is not too much to say that he built up in France the greatest thoroughbred establishment in the world, regarding which the late Schuyler L. Parsons remarked after visiting it: 'Truly, I never knew there were so many thoroughbred horses in the world.' His two-year-olds by Ornament did not make a strong mark on American racing records. Yet it was on these fillies that Mr. Vanderbilt's colors were first worn and the curiously distinctive and attractive 'White' with one black band on sleeves, white cap introduced to the racing world, for these are the colors which in later years so frequently seen in the van of the leading French turf events.

"Buying many English and French mares, Mr. Vanderbilt also, in 1912, bought some splendid American stock from the late James R. Keene and sent these over to France to mate with his stallions. Among the carefully selected ones were Maskette, Pope Joan and Court Dress by Disguise, Meg's Hill and Stepping Stone by Ben Brush, the aptly named Early and Often by Voter and Mosquito by Commando, the latter representing the marvelous winning strain that Mr. Keene built along the side line of Alarm-Himyar-Domino-Commando and all the rest of that glorious strain that traces on from Domino today.

"Included among these stallions were the great Maintenon, by Le Sagittaire—Marcia and Sea Sick, by Elf—Saf Saf, a winner in his day of the French Derby and other notable races, while from America, some years earlier, went Halma, by the great Hannover, sold to Mr. Vanderbilt by the Fleischmann, and whose son was Over Sight.

CLOSE STUDENT OF BREEDING.

"A good horseman and a close student of all breeding matters, Mr. Vanderbilt has not handled his vast interests in any dilettante fashion, but has given close personal attention, as is evidenced by entries in his own handwriting in many of the pedigree lists of his great establishment, marking the periods when it has been necessary to add late additions of this or that family to the printed forms from which, in due course, the newer prints are made. So it was not astonishing that he, too, had his turf adventures of entertaining equine angels unawares. One of these was the good race horse Prestige, by Le Pompon—Orgueilleuse, bought out of an auction list to be raced and not lose a race in his sixteen starts, and yet after this scintillant racing career he sold to sire for his new owner the great French stake winner and sire, Sardana-pale. Of such is the luck of racing and breeding.

"While his colors were not seen on American courses after his first venture with the Ornament fillies, Mr. Vanderbilt has had a much greater interest in American turf matters than is generally supposed, as for years, in fact from its inception to its closing, when struck by ex-Governor Hughes' disastrous campaign against racing a decade or so ago, he was the principal stockholder in the Coney Island Jockey Club and had also much to say concerning matters of American racing that were not necessarily confined to that exceedingly popular and high-class racing organization.

"Some idea of what American racing lost by his colors being carried in France and not in America may be gathered from the fact that for about ten years he headed the winning owner list of the French turf and that in one year, 1908, his winnings amounted to over \$262,815, and in 1906 the amount won was \$245,980. These figures were, of course, before the war, and it therefore may be confidently expected that just as soon as things racing become more normal the Haras du Quesnay will again be found at or near the head of the list.

"Fortunately the stallions and mares suffered very little inconvenience from the war and thus the immense stud can be speedily brought back to its highest plane of activity. Although conditions have, of course, changed materially in all other countries, and there is not the amount of high class stock that can be bought that there was before the supply was so terribly diminished by the drain of the war and by the resultant inertia that affected stud farms just as it affected all other lines of production all over the world, the Haras du Quesnay is splendidly equipped to carry on all breeding operations with the stallions and mares that are still within its fences, and, as the future can only be judged by the past, there is every rational expectation that even the brightest records in the past history of his magnificently equipped breeding farm will eventually be duplicated or even surpassed."

Dr. Clark went the same distance in 1:59 and appears in grand form. The Whitney two-year-old Peter Pan filly Prudery showed that she is as equally at home over a slow as well as a fast track when she went three-quarters in 1:15, the best work of the morning. FAMOUS TURF "PICK-UPS"

Great Prices for Horses of Present Day Compared With Past Bargains on the English Turf.

Instances where thoroughbreds sold for a song, trained to racing fitness, displayed championship quality, won fortunes in turf prizes, and resold for fabulous amounts, are being cited by British turf writers in commenting on the recent sale of the two-year-old Incheape for the reputed price of \$150,000.

Atop this, the refusal of Samuel D. Riddle to part with Man o' War for any sum has caused an additional apple among the ranks of England's racing commentators. This and record prices which have obtained in thoroughbreds during the past year have drawn the ink from their pens.

English examples of odd horse prices in the past are many. Here are some of them with their figures, according to their own records: Deadlock was purchased by Captain Machell for a paltry \$95. Her son, Inslang, captured the "Triple Crown," won \$285,000 in stakes, and could, in his prime, have been sold for at least \$150,000—a return of \$434,905 for the original investment.

GREAT NATIONAL WINNER FOR \$175.

Salamander, bought at a county fair for \$175, made nearly a thousand times that amount for his owner, Mr. Studd, when he won the Grand National. St. Gatien, purchased for \$75,000 after running a dead heat with Harvester in the Derby, was the son of Rover, once considered a poor bargain at \$260; and The Godolphin, whose progeny have won millions of dollars, was rescued in Paris for a few dollars from the shafts of a watercart.

Donovan won \$275,000 in stakes alone (more than his weight in gold) before he passed the winning post for the last time; Flying Fox carried his owners to the extent of \$300,000; Ayrshire won \$175,000; La Fleche, \$172,925; Orme and St. Frusquin, nearly \$165,000 each; Surefoot, \$161,890; Gladiator, \$155,525, and Diamond Jubilee and Ormonde \$188,000 between them.

Here, then, they point out, are a dozen horses, including Inslang, who collectively won in stakes alone a sum exceeding \$2,220,000, representing an average of more than \$185,000. Nor do these figures by any means represent the full value of these equine "gold mines," for Flying Fox, after his racing days were over, was sold to M. Blanc for \$196,875; Ormonde, for \$156,250, and La Fleche brought \$63,000 as a brood mare.

To these sums should be added the amounts won by their sons and daughters and later progeny, if their full potential value is to be ascertained.

Take St. Simon, for instance. In eleven seasons his sons and daughters won something like a quarter of a million in stakes. At the stud, and after a distinguished turf career, Blacklock sired no fewer than 123 winners, who secured stakes to the value of \$229,000; Hambletonian, who won the St. Leger and nineteen other races, was sire of 144 winners of \$190,500; and he was one of 109 sons and daughters of King Fergus, who enriched their owners by \$150,000 in days when money prizes were trivial indeed; while Canozou and her sons, Paletot, Fazzalotto and Cape Flyaway captured no less than \$123,900 among them.

In seven years Isonomy's progeny accumulated \$777,690; Hampton's \$602,200, and Galopin's \$620,115; while Hermit's, some years ago, had won considerably over \$1,750,000.

It is thus not surprising that any owners of race horses reap rich harvests on the turf. Lord Palmouth had a turf career of unexampled prosperity, winning no less than \$1,500,000 in stakes.
