MOST SATISFACTORY SALE

Bidding Uniform and Better Prices
Realized at Thursday's Auction.

Thirty-five Yearlings Bring \$60,
200—Top Price Paid for a
Sweep Colt.

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 13.—Good looking youngsters, the progeny of popular and winning sires, including Sweep, Ballot, Star Shoot, Ben Brush, Brummel and His Majesty and comprising consignments from G. A. Cochran's Runnymede Farm, J. S. Barbee's Glen Helen Stud, J. T. Gwathmey, Stone & Rucker and W. C. Goodloe, were responsible for improved prices realized for the yearlings that went under the hammer Thursday night at the Fasig-Tipton mart. Thirty-five colts and fillies went for an aggregate of \$60,200, an average of \$1,720.

The star of the sale, in the matter of price, was the Sweep—Iridescent colt in the J. S. Barbee consignment. He commanded keen attention from numerous bidders, but ultimately became the property of S. C. Hildreth at his bid of \$7,000.

The seven other youngsters in the Barbee lot brought his aggregate to \$17,150, an average of \$2,437.75 per head. This, however, was eclipsed by the three youngsters which comprised W. C. Goodloe's consignment. They sold for a total of \$11,500, an average of \$3,833.33. In this lot the highest price was paid for the Ballot—Shuck H. colt, which went for \$5,000 and became the property of W. R. Coe, for whom W. H. Karrick was bidding. The Sweep—Biscayne colt in the same lot went to G. W. Loft, of the New York State Racing Commission, on his bid of \$4,700.

The five head offered by Stone & Rucker were disposed of for an aggregate of \$9,400, an average of \$1,880. The Sweep—Mariposan colt was the most fancied of this consignment, and went to Carr & Piatt for \$3,100.

The eight head of the Runnymede offering yielded \$10,300, an average of \$1,287.22. The filly by His Majesty—Adriana was the star of the lot and brought \$3,100, which was the top price for any filly in the sale.

The bidding was uniform and on the whole it was the most satisfactory sale of the present season.

SARATOGA'S SATURDAY CARD

Saratoga Special, Champlain Handicap and North American Steeplechase Down for Decision.

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 13.—Despite the rainy weather and its accompanying heavy track the racing at this point has been very good the past few days, and the course is thronged daily with enthusiasts from the surrounding country, which, with the transients here for the entire meeting, constitute a gathering that makes an ordinary day resemble an old-time Saturday.

With the clearing skies there is every indication of the best of the two-year-old division getting to the post for the Saratoga Special tomorrow. The Special is one of those events which has a compensation extending beyond the day of the contest. In the first place it is a sporting proposition, and calls for a subscription of \$500 for each starter. The trophy which the Saratoga Association donates to the winner is always a handsome one, and the desire to have it in one's collection of racing souvenirs is responsible in a great measure for the popularity of the race. There are long winter evenings when the average owner finds it a pleasure to inspect, perhaps for the hundredth time, some such prize as the gold cup which will go to the winner of this year's test, and if there are friends to hear how the emblem was won the gratification in its possession is all the greater. Racing without such tests as the Saratoga Special would be largely commercial, and the more of them the turf has each year the better it is going to be for the sport.

The overnight acceptances for the Special include H. P. Whitney's unbeaten Peter Pan colt Tryster, which has not started since his victory in the Youthful Stakes at Jamaica, June 19; the crack filly Prudery, a stable mate of Tryster; E. R. Bradley's Black Servant, J. W. McClelland's Serapis, R. T. Wilson's Dimmsdale, W. S. Kilmer's Our Flag and H. H. Hewitt's Advocate.

In addition to the Special the Champlain Handicap and the North American Steeplechase will be decided tomorrow. The former, for three-year-olds and over, is at a mile and an eighth, and with such a crack field as Exterminator, Boniface, Naturalist, Gnome, Dr. Clark, Cirrus, The Porter, Mad Hatter, Minto II, Jack Stuart and Cromwell, is certain to furnish a contest well worth going miles to see.

Recent rains have brought the steeplechase course to a state bordering on perfection and with eight of the best jumpers in training named to contest the 1920 running of the North American Steeplechase, lovers of cross-country sport are sure to witness an exciting and spectacular race over the jumps.

J. K. L. ROSS AND H. P. WHITNEY

To Race at Coming Windsor Meeting—Sir Barton, Boniface, Exterminator and Other Stars in Opening Day Feature.

DETROIT, Mich., August 13.—J. K. L. Ross, the Montreal sportsman, has engaged twenty stalls at the Windsor Jockey Club track for the second summer meeting, starting August 21. He has named Boniface and Sir Barton for the Windsor Jockey Club Handicap, to be run on the opening day. Harry Payne Whitney, who has asked for a dozen stalls, has nominated Wildair, John P. Grier, Damask, Upset and Dr. Clark for the same stake, and Willis Sharpe Kilmer says he will start Exterminator in the \$10,000 fixture.

Messrs. Ross and Whitney were not here at Windsor for the first meeting, the former declaring that the horses campaigning in his colors on the Canadian tracks had gone stale, while the transportation problem was responsible for the non-appearance of the Whitney stable.

Entries for the five stakes to be decided at Windsor the week of August 21-28, which closed Wednesday last, have been practically as numerous and of as excellent quality as those received for the first meeting. The nominations show that at least two score of the well-known performers now stabled at Saratoga will be on hand to race for the \$100,000 in stakes and purses to be distributed during the seven days of racing.

GREEN B. MORRIS SEVERELY INJURED

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 13.—Slight hopes are entertained for the recovery of the veteran Green B. Morris, who was taken to the hospital following an injury by an automobile last night. His right breast was badly crushed and several ribs broken. His wife reached his bedside late in the afternoon, coming here from Washington. During the afternoon a report gained currency at the track that Morris had died, but he was still alive after the racing was concluded. Morris is the second veteran trainer to be hurt by automobiles in the last few months. Mr. M. F. Danaher being run down in Baltimore and receiving injuries from which he died a few weeks later.

RICH HAVRE DE GRACE STAKES

Maryland Track Will Distribute Between \$200,000 and \$250,000 to Horsemen at Fall Race Meeting.

HAVRE DE GRACE, Md., August 13.—Between \$200,000 and \$250,000 will be distributed among horsemen at Havre de Grace in the course of the coming September race meeting of the Harford Agricultural and Breeders' Association, arrangements for the conduct of which General Manager Edward Burke is pushing with energy. The foremost thoroughbreds of the most powerful eastern stables will participate in renewals of the \$5,000 Harford County Handicap, one mile and seventy yards, for three-year-olds and over; the \$10,000 Potomac Handicap, one mile and a sixteenth, for three-year-olds exclusively; the \$10,000 Eastern Shore, three-quarters of a mile, for two-year-olds, and the \$10,000 Havre de Grace Handicap, one mile and an eighth, for three-year-olds and over. These specials will close on Monday, September 6. Altogether there will be \$187,300 added to the stakes and purses during the seventeen days of racing beginning September 11 and ending September 30.

The renewals of these valuable stakes at their present values will be their first. The Eastern Shore was won last year by Commander J. K. L. Ross' Constancy, the most successful two-year-old filly of 1919. The Canadian sportsman, whose stable will cut a conspicuous figure in Maryland racing again next fall, won the Potomac Handicap with Sir Barton, the star three-year-old of 1919, and the Havre de Grace with Cudgel. Cudgel was held to be best and given preference in a betting way. The head of the Ross Farm Stud. Edward Beale McLean of Washington won the Laurel County Handicap with gallant little The Porter. The latter and Leechares will race again in Maryland this coming fall.

The overnight races of the Havre de Grace meeting will pay from \$1,200 to \$2,500 in added money. Martin Nathanson will act as racing secretary of the course in succession to Joseph McLennan. Improvements that will cost some \$60,000 have been made at Havre de Grace this summer. But the work of improvement has been restricted to stable construction because of the impossibility of obtaining structural steel and skilled labor for the task of doubling the sheltering capacity of the grandstand. This work will be undertaken in the late autumn and winter.

LORD DERBY'S BIG DAY AT LIVERPOOL

Lord Derby had a field day in the racing of the chief day of the Liverpool summer meeting, July 23. His horses won four of the six events of the afternoon. All were home-bred, too. Hawkhead, two-year-old bay filly, by Swynford—Silver How, took the School House Stakes, and Spinney, two-year-old bay filly, by Great Sport—Russet, was first in the Jolliffe Stakes. Redhead, three-year-old bay filly, by Harry of Hereford—Swynford's brother recently sold to France—dam Hair Trigger II, won the event of the meeting, the Liverpool Cup of eleven furlongs, worth \$8,750. She was at 8 to 1, and beat The Midshipmate, Devizes Alasnam and Tangiers and four others by four lengths in 2:31%. The Atlantic Stakes, \$8,750, one mile and one-quarter, ascended to the Derby white and black when Archaic, three-year-old chestnut filly, by Polymelus—Keystone II, the stout favorite, won handily in 2:20%. The track was a sea of mud that day.

FALL RACING DATES FOR MARYLAND

BALTIMORE, Md., August 13.—Fall racing over the large tracks in Maryland will begin at Havre de Grace on September 11 and continue there to and including September 30. Laurel Park will be the scene of action during the entire month of October, then on November 1 the Maryland Jockey Club will throw open the gates of the popular Pimlico course, where the sport will hold sway for eleven days. The wind-up will be at Bowie, as in former years, the season coming to an end about November 30. While no official announcement

THREE STRAIGHT VICTORIES

Eddie Rickenbacher Continues His Winning Way at Fort Erie.

Runs Remarkably Fast Race to Account for the Buffalo Courier Handicap.

FORT ERIE, Ontario, August 13.—Commander J. K. L. Ross' big sprinter Lion d'Or went down to defeat at Fort Erie this afternoon when he was beaten by the three-year-olds Eddie Rickenbacher in the Buffalo Courier Handicap, a dash of three-quarters, which brought out the best band of sprinters that have gone to the post in Canada this summer. Eddie Rickenbacher won in runaway fashion. He set a remarkable pace all the way and passed the winning mark a length and a half in front of Marjorie Hynes. Lion d'Or was third, beaten four lengths for second place. Carmandale ran well to the turn out of the back stretch, where he tore for the outside fence and it took all that O'Brien could do to straighten him out. This put him out of the running. Today's victory is the third successive one that Eddie Rickenbacher has scored since passing into the hands of W. A. Burtischi, who is training him for J. R. Skinner, and in his present form he seems unbeatable by anything racing on this circuit at anything like equal weights.

The attendance keeps up in a remarkable manner and another large crowd turned out to witness the sport. The maiden jockey race was won by Sandy H., which beat Humina by a head in a driving finish. Both Aron and Remmert, who rode the first two horses, put up excellent rides for beginners. This was Remmert's first mount. The lad is under contract to J. B. Dunn, who picked him up at Aqueduct last spring.

Roy Gordon has taken over jockey G. Walls' book and will make his engagements in the future. Harry Giddings' plater Wralte and jockey K. Parrington had a narrow escape from injury this morning. Wralte was being worked while the horses were on the track and Parrington was unable to keep him straight and he jumped inside the horse row and out of it and in some remarkable manner escaped injury.

The Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Minister of Agriculture, was a visitor at Fort Erie this afternoon. He made a thorough inspection of the plant, accompanied by Mr. S. Gilmartin, who is in charge of the mutual department, and was well pleased with the manner in which that department was conducted. It is understood that the Hon. Tolmie will make a tour of inspection of every race course in Ontario and Quebec.

Pat Knebelkamp, who is spending the month of August in Canada, contemplates adding a couple of useful horses to his string which will be shipped from Saratoga to Kentucky. He will choose horses that favor racing over a long distance of ground.

C. R. Anderson's useful horse Stevenson pulled up lame in his race yesterday and will be on the shelf for a couple of weeks.

The sixth race on the original program for tomorrow was declared off and a race at one mile substituted.

James T. Looney, accompanied by his son R. J. Looney, stopped off in Buffalo on their trip from Lexington to Saratoga and took in the races at Fort Erie this afternoon.

Jockey Richcreek suffered a smashed toe while Fletcher broke his collar bone as a result of the mixup at the finish in the second race yesterday when Musket and Pokey B. fell fifty yards from the finishing mark.

Johnny Schorr left for Saratoga this morning with The Porter and The Baggage.

The condition book for the Ottawa meeting racing here this morning and were distributed among the horsemen by Joseph McLennan. The purse have been increased \$4,000 over those of the spring meeting. The club, in conjunction with the Montreal Jockey Club and the Ontario Jockey Club, is making an extra effort to attract owners to ship their steeplechase horses to Ottawa and there will be a jumping race every day of the program.

James Milton has received an offer for the brood mare Golden Ruby and will probably dispose of her. She has a filly foal at her side by Great Britain and was bred back to the son of The Comoner again last spring.
